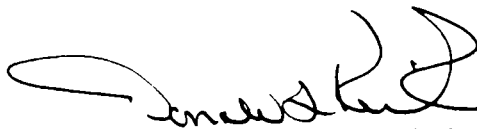

Following up on our conversation last Friday (good speech- I didn't ask when you were going for fast track because I thought it wouldn't be helpful) I would like to repeat my plea for help on getting the President to just stop by for 10 minutes at the Council of the Americas' Washington Conference Reception on Monday night.

I am enclosing a copy of the original invitation. Bob Mosbacher again pledged to the President at the State Dinner in Chile that the Council would do everything it could to help him on encouraging free trade. Providing an outstanding business forum for him at our Washington Conference on May 11 is a near perfect vehicle. The conference is shaping up very well. We will have over 200 top business executives, including the CEOs of FMC, Enron, ASARCO, BP America, G.E. America, Quaker Fabric, Southern Peru Copper, IBM Latin America, and Trust Company of the West.

We have made a conscious decision to broaden the conference's perspective to include non-trade issues like the environment and education, and have arranged a dialogue (not a debate) with AFL/CIO President John Sweeney. We are doing everything we can to broaden support for the President on trade, and we really need his help. If he can spend just ten minutes at the State Department on the evening of the 11th, it will give his and all our efforts a tremendous boost.

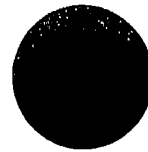

Dear Colleague:

On behalf of the Women's Leadership Conference of the Americas (WLCA), we are pleased to present the enclosed *Communiqué*, directed to the hemisphere's heads of state who will meet at the second Summit of the Americas in Santiago, Chile, on April 18 and 19, 1998. The WLCA is a network of 90 top women leaders from the United States, Canada, and seventeen countries of Latin America and the Caribbean—including former presidents, prime ministers, business executives, women's rights activists, and other non-governmental leaders—dedicated to promoting policy and institutional changes that will improve opportunities for all women. This group is urging the region's governments to adhere to the commitments made four years ago at the first Summit in Miami, and at other international forums. They are demanding that governments focus important attention on increasing women's opportunities in the workforce by strengthening education; advancing women to positions of power and influence; and stopping the brutality of violence against women.

On releasing the *Communiqué* in Managua, former Nicaraguan President Violeta Chamorro declared, "The lack of opportunities for women in our society weakens the legitimacy of democracy. No country can exclude the talent and creativity of the female population without affecting the essential values of democracy." According to WLCA Co-Chair and Costa Rican Congresswoman Sonia Picado, "The Summit of the Americas is going to be a meeting of powerful, political men with an amazingly small representation of women. For that reason it is imperative that women's voices be heard at the Summit."

We have published the *Communiqué* with a report on the proceedings of the first meeting of the network, convened in July 1997 by the WLCA's sponsoring organizations—the Inter-American Dialogue and International Center for Research on Women (ICRW). We hope you will find that this *Communiqué* is a constructive contribution to the Summit process, and we urge you to join us in promoting a place on the agenda for investing in women.

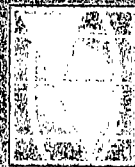
