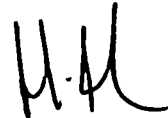

Dear Senator Coverdell:

Thank you for your letter regarding the Summit of the Americas in Chile, and specifically the Summit Action Plan's call for a multilateral hemispheric alliance against drugs.

Based on our discussions there, I fully agree that there is an unprecedented level of consensus within the hemisphere about the dangers posed by narcotics production and trafficking to all our societies and institutions. The hemispheric alliance you have championed, to which we committed ourselves in Santiago, will use this consensus to develop greater multilateral cooperation against drugs.

This alliance, to include a multilateral evaluation mechanism that hemispheric delegates will begin negotiating shortly under OAS auspices, offers an opportunity to strengthen and supplement the extensive bilateral arrangements we already have in place to pursue the war against drugs.

I appreciate your efforts to shape and promote the concept of a hemispheric alliance against drugs. By establishing a strong commonality of purpose, and the mechanisms needed to assure joint actions, we can fight and decisively win the war. Purpose

Background

Dear Mr. President:

The enclosed sense of the Senate amendment to the budget resolution was adopted by the Senate on April 2. It calls upon the Administration to include on the agenda of the upcoming Summit of the Americas in Santiago, Chile discussion of a multilateral "war alliance" against drug trafficking in the Western Hemisphere.

I have discussed this idea with General McCaffrey and officials of the State Department, as well as with high officials and diplomatic representatives of many of our neighbors in the hemisphere. The response has been uniformly positive. While peace, democracy and free trade have advanced in the Western Hemisphere, all parties recognize illegal drug trafficking, with its attendant violence and corruption, as a dark cloud threatening to undermine those accomplishments. Leaders in every country can see the need for a common response to a common enemy.

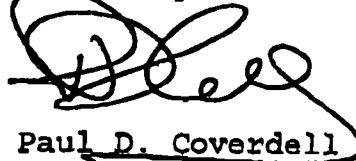
In my own view, this alliance should take a form similar to the Gulf War coalition -- countries coming together voluntarily as allies and equal partners to take the measure of the enemy, muster the resources necessary to defeat the foe, and carry out a common plan of action.

Some have seized on the alliance concept as a replacement for the certification process or as a new formal structure operating in tandem with the OAS. I fear that model will become yet another debating society and not a springboard for action. If we bring together our allies in the drug war the way we brought together our allies in the Persian Gulf and mount a serious, sustained, and coordinated attack on drug trafficking in the Americas -- with no less a goal than the complete destruction of the trafficking

organizations -- the certification process will become moot.

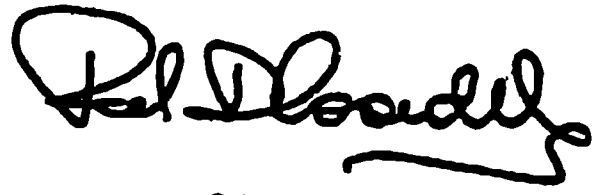
I urge you, Mr. President, to discuss such an effort with your counterparts in Santiago. I believe they will be receptive. Creating a dynamic war alliance against drugs would be a significant accomplishment that could turn the tide in our long struggle against this scourge.

FINDINGS -- the Senate finds that

- 1) the traffic in illegal drugs greatly threatens democracy, security and stability in the Western Hemisphere due to the violence and corruption associated with drug trafficking organizations;
- 2) drug trafficking organizations operate without respect for borders or national sovereignty;
- 3) the production, transport, sale, and use of illicit drugs endangers the people and legitimate institutions of all countries in the hemisphere;
- 4) no single country can successfully confront and defeat this common enemy;
- 5) full bilateral cooperation with the United States to reduce the flow of drugs is in the national interests of our neighbors in the hemisphere;
- 6) in addition, victory in the hemispheric battle against drug traffickers requires expanded multilateral cooperation among the nations of the region.

SENSE OF THE SENATE - it is the sense of Senate that the provisions of this resolution assume that in addition to existing bilateral cooperative efforts, the Administration should promote at the Summit of the Americas and in other fora the concept of a multinational hemispheric "war alliance" bringing together the United States and key illicit drug producing and transiting countries in the Western Hemisphere for the purpose of implementing a coordinated plan of action against illegal drug trafficking and promoting full cooperation against this common menace.

Honduras: Deportations and IPR Dispute

Background: The recently inaugurated government of President Carlos Flores has taken umbrage at recent U.S. actions in the immigration and trade areas. On immigration, in accordance with recent reforms to U.S. legislation, we have been deporting Honduran criminals and Hondurans who are found to be in the United States illegally. Most are recent arrivals. The Hondurans are particularly upset that they were left out of legislation passed in 1997 that benefited Salvadorans, Nicaraguans and Guatemalans. The limited scope of this legislation is partly explained by the fact that persons from these countries were protected under various actions by the U.S. government because of the civil wars in their countries; Hondurans did not receive similar protection. The President recently indicated in a letter to certain members of Congress that he was not inclined to grant "Deferred Enforced Departure" status to Hondurans because there is not a sufficiently compelling foreign policy reason for delaying the ordinary application of our immigration laws to them. Nevertheless, we are seeking legislative changes that would address some of the immigration problems that Hondurans and others face.

On the trade front, we recently announced the withdrawal of some tariff preferences enjoyed by Honduras - this move came in response to long-standing U.S. complaints about the Honduran government's failure to protect U.S. intellectual property rights.

What is the United States doing to address the immigration situation of Hondurans in the United States?

- The Administration sought to address the situation of aliens with pending immigration cases, including Hondurans, who were adversely affected by the 1996 changes to the provisions of immigration law relating to the suspension of deportation.
- Unfortunately, the Congress passed legislation that provided relief to only certain nationalities. We continue to work with the Congress to try to bring about fair treatment for those Hondurans who have established longstanding ties to the United States.

If pressed:

- The vast majority of Hondurans being deported from the United States are young men who entered the U.S. during 1997 or 1998. They are not persons who came to the U.S. during the 1980s.

What about the Intellectual Property dispute?

- For over six years, the United States has been urging the Honduran government to put an end to violations of U.S. intellectual property rights. The Motion Picture Association of America petitioned the U.S. government to withdraw certain trade benefits in response to continued violations.
- On March 30, we announced that a very limited number of U.S. tariff benefits would be withdrawn on April 20. We hope the Honduran government will take action to stop the piracy by broadcast stations so that we can restore full trade benefits.

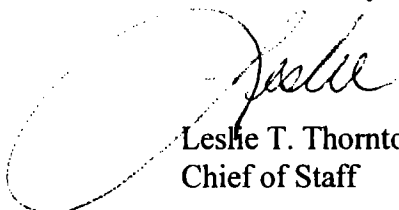

On March 25, we convened a workshop in Atlanta to discuss conventional arms restraint in Latin America and the Caribbean. Noting the region's progress in banning weapons of mass destruction, curtailing illicit arms trafficking and exchanging information through confidence- and security-building measures, we asked whether sophisticated conventional weapons might also be controlled through common accord.

Sophisticated weapons such as advanced attack aircraft and long-range missiles aggravate existing border tensions rather than contribute to defense, and they are extremely expensive. The Santiago Summit's main goals, education and poverty eradication, cannot be achieved if hundreds of millions of dollars are spent on weapons that are not needed.

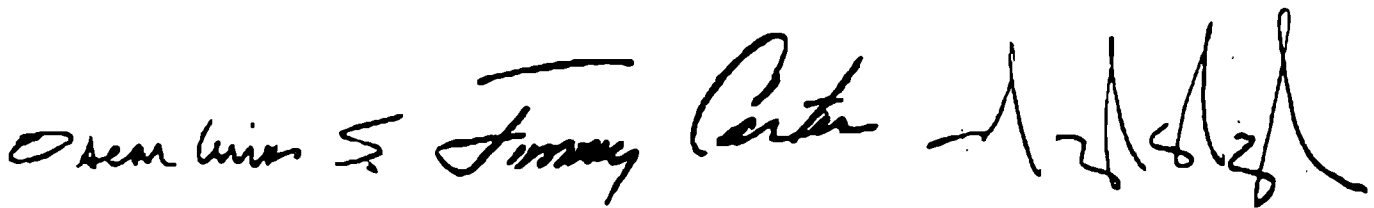
An arms regime should reflect the diversity within the region. For example, for the Caribbean, security threats from small arms and narcotics trafficking are a high priority. For South America, the potential purchase of expensive sophisticated weapons threatens to divert resources from important development needs, and may increase the likelihood of armed confrontations.

An agreement on arms restraint could ban weapons that do not currently exist in the region, such as long-range missiles and certain fighter jets, as well as some that are in only a few countries, such as mid-air refueling aircraft. It could put numerical caps on other types of weapons and call for savings in military expenditures to be shifted to education. Finally, an agreement could establish verification and enforcement mechanisms, such as making foreign assistance contingent on military spending freezes or reductions or elimination of certain weapons.

Collective security can be achieved only through regional cooperation at the highest levels. We are writing to ask if you would raise the importance of conventional arms restraint in your remarks in Santiago, and suggest that government leaders meet before the end of 1999 to consider how best to achieve a conventional arms restraint regime that would limit the purchase of sophisticated weapons. Twenty six leaders in the hemisphere already have endorsed a two-year moratorium on the purchase of high technology weapons. If Latin America and the Caribbean would take the lead in restricting purchases, supplier countries could be pressed to accept their responsibility and limit arms sales.

With thriving democracies and the end of the Cold War, we believe that now is the moment for the hemisphere to take the lead and serve as a global model for self-restraint in conventional arms.

What can you tell me about the Hemispheric Drug Alliance? Will Summit have any impact on drugs?

- We expect the Santiago Summit to endorse an effort already underway to build a hemispheric alliance against drugs. This will result in a new level of multilateral cooperation against the shared threat of narcotics trafficking, and the money laundering and other crime associated with that threat.
- A centerpiece of this alliance will be a multilateral evaluation mechanism that delegates to the OAS's Inter-American Commission on Drugs, CICAD, will begin developing in earnest in early May. This mechanism will help develop agreed standards on counternarcotics performance, then help assess countries' success in meeting those standards.
- The assessment concept is a familiar multilateral tool; we use it in the context of the IMF and the OECD, where members assess performance on economic policy, or performance against money laundering, for example. NATO has the same sort of process to ensure member countries meet their defense program goals. We envision this evaluation mechanism as a means to enhance multilateral cooperation in the Americas.
- Many of the details of this multilateral effort remain to be worked out. We look forward to the Santiago Summit as an occasion to advance these issues with our partners in the hemisphere. Our goal is a stronger joint effort against drugs.

Do you see this as a substitute for certification?

- Certification is the law. However, there are bipartisan efforts in Congress to improve the certification process, given its often negative impact on the very cooperation we seek to build in the hemisphere and elsewhere.
- The Administration supported one such bipartisan effort last summer, when Senators Dodd and McCain proposed suspending the certification process and looking for more effective multilateral alternatives. This measure garnered 37 votes.
- We will continue to work with the Congress on enhancing drug control efforts at home, bilaterally with partners abroad, and multilaterally. We see the Santiago Summit as a useful step in this process.

Dear Mr. President:

The enclosed sense of the Senate amendment to the budget resolution was adopted by the Senate on April 2. It calls upon the Administration to include on the agenda of the upcoming Summit of the Americas in Santiago, Chile discussion of a multilateral "war alliance" against drug trafficking in the Western Hemisphere.

I have discussed this idea with General McCaffrey and officials of the State Department, as well as with high officials and diplomatic representatives of many of our neighbors in the hemisphere. The response has been uniformly positive. While peace, democracy and free trade have advanced in the Western Hemisphere, all parties recognize illegal drug trafficking, with its attendant violence and corruption, as a dark cloud threatening to undermine those accomplishments. Leaders in every country can see the need for a common response to a common enemy.

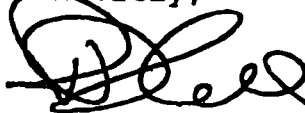
In my own view, this alliance should take a form similar to the Gulf War coalition -- countries coming together voluntarily as allies and equal partners to take the measure of the enemy, muster the resources necessary to defeat the foe, and carry out a common plan of action.

Some have seized on the alliance concept as a replacement for the certification process or as a new formal structure operating in tandem with the OAS. I fear that model will become yet another debating society and not a springboard for action. If we bring together our allies in the drug war the way we brought together our allies in the Persian Gulf and mount a serious, sustained, and coordinated attack on drug trafficking in the Americas -- with no less a goal than the complete destruction of the trafficking

organizations -- the certification process will become moot.

I urge you, Mr. President, to discuss such an effort with your counterparts in Santiago. I believe they will be receptive. Creating a dynamic war alliance against drugs would be a significant accomplishment that could turn the tide in our long struggle against this scourge.

SEC. ____ SENSE OF THE SENATE REGARDING A MULTINATIONAL ALLIANCE
AGAINST DRUG TRAFFICKING

FINDINGS -- the Senate finds that

1) the traffic in illegal drugs greatly threatens democracy, security and stability in the Western Hemisphere due to the violence and corruption associated with drug trafficking organizations;

2) drug trafficking organizations operate without respect for borders or national sovereignty;

3) the production, transport, sale, and use of illicit drugs endangers the people and legitimate institutions of all countries in the hemisphere;

4) no single country can successfully confront and defeat this common enemy;

5) full bilateral cooperation with the United States to reduce the flow of drugs is in the national interests of our neighbors in the hemisphere;

6) in addition, victory in the hemispheric battle against drug traffickers requires expanded multilateral cooperation among the nations of the region.

SENSE OF THE SENATE - it is the sense of Senate that the provisions of this resolution assume that in addition to existing bilateral cooperative efforts, the Administration should promote at the Summit of the Americas and in other fora the concept of a multinational hemispheric "war alliance" bringing together the United States and key illicit drug producing and transiting countries in the Western Hemisphere for the purpose of implementing a coordinated plan of action against illegal drug trafficking and promoting full cooperation against this common menace.
