U.S. PRESS STATEMENT

(TEXT AGREED BY THE USA AND THE DPRK DELEGATIONS)

The delegations of the United States of America (USA) and the Democratic People's Republic of Korea (DPRK) met from July 14-19, 1993, in Geneva for a second round of talks on resolving the nuclear issue.

Both sides reaffirmed the principles of the June 11, 1993 joint USA/DPRK press statement.

For its part, the USA specifically reaffirmed its commitment to the principles on assurances against the threat and use of force, including nuclear weapons.

Both sides recognize the desirability of the DPRK's intention to replace its graphite moderated reactors and associated nuclear facilities with light water moderated reactors. As part of a final resolution of the nuclear issues, and on the premise that a solution related to the provision of light water moderated reactors (LWRs) is achievable, the USA is prepared to support the introduction of LWRs and to explore with the DPRK ways in which LWRs could be obtained.

Both sides agreed that full and impartial application of IAEA safeguards is essential to accomplish a strong international nuclear non-proliferation regime. On this basis, the DPRK is prepared to begin consultations with the IAEA on outstanding safeguards and other issues as soon as possible.

The USA and DPRK also reaffirmed the importance of the implementation of the North-South Joint Declaration on the Denuclearization of the Korean Peninsula. The DPRK reaffirms that it remains prepared to begin the North-South talks, as soon as possible, on bilateral issues, including the nuclear issue.

The USA and the DPRK have agreed to meet again in the next two months to discuss outstanding matters related to resolving the nuclear issue, including technical questions related to the introduction of LWRs, and to lay the basis for improving overall relations between the DPRK and the USA.

DPRK PRESS STATEMENT

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For its part, the USA specifically reaffirmed its commitment to the principles on assurances against the threat and use of force, including nuclear weapons.

Unilateral U.S. Press Statement

You have seen the press statement agreed by the U.S. and DPRK delegations. I would like to present the U.S. view of this important issue and where negotiations stand.

As the President recently indicated, the North Korean nuclear program represents a grave threat to international security and the non-proliferation regime. Our talks in Geneva are part of a steady and determined effort by the international community and the U.S. to resolve the nuclear issue and reinforce security in the region.

In the course of our discussions, both sides reaffirmed the principles of the June 11, 1993 joint U.S./DPRK press statement. The principles referred to in this statement and its reaffirmation in Geneva are based on U.S. obligations under the UN charter. These obligations commit us to refrain from the threat or use of force against another country, except in self-defense or otherwise in accordance with the Charter of the United Nations. Obviously, these principles preserve our obligation and ability to assist the ROK in its self-defense, including the right to conduct defensive exercises.

Our objective is to achieve a non-nuclear Korean peninsula and a strong global non-proliferation regime. We want the DPRK to remain in the NPT, comply with IAEA fullscope safeguards, and fully implement the North-South Denuclearization Declaration. In our meetings last month in New York, the DPRK agreed to suspend its withdrawal from the NPT. This was a positive step. In keeping with its status as an NPT Party, we continue to expect the DPRK to accept regular IAEA inspections.

At this round of talks, we achieved three further steps towards a resolution of the nuclear issue. First, the DPRK has agreed to begin consultations with the IAEA on outstanding safeguards issues, including the IAEA's requests for additional information and visits to additional sites. The question of access to these sites remains a critical issue for resolving international concerns about the DPRK's nuclear program, and we urge the DPRK to reach agreement with the IAEA without delay.

Second, the DPRK has agreed to resume discussions as soon as possible with the Republic of Korea on the implementation of the North-South Denuclearization Declaration and other bilateral issues. The Republic of Korea has also said it is ready for this dialogue. Accordingly, we look to the two Koreas to reach agreement on implementing an effective bilateral inspection regime.

Third, the DPRK announced that it is prepared to abandon its graphite moderated reactors and associated facilities in favor of light water reactors (LWRs), which are less suitable for nuclear weapons material production. In the next round of U.S./DPRK talks, we have agreed to include discussions on this issue. While we support the conversion to LWRs as part of a final resolution of the nuclear issue, it is understood that the U.S. cannot engage in any peaceful nuclear cooperation with the DPRK, or support others in assisting the DPRK, until the DPRK has unambiguously complied with its non-proliferation obligations, including the NPT, IAEA, and the bilateral North-South Declaration.

Obviously, sale of a power reactor would also involve complex financial and legal matters which would have to be addressed at an appropriate time in the future. Nonetheless, we believe that our long-term non-proliferation objectives will be served by beginning to explore ways for the DPRK to make a conversion to LWRs once the DPRK is in full compliance with its non-proliferation obligations.

As we have said, the U.S. is prepared to continue its dialogue with the DPRK as long as we are making progress to resolve the nuclear issue. Based on the outcome of this round of discussions, we have agreed to meet again in the next two months to continue our efforts to resolve the nuclear issue. In this regard, I would add that since the DPRK has said it will begin talks with the IAEA and ROK as soon as possible, we would not expect to begin a third round of U.S. talks with the DPRK until serious discussions with the IAEA and ROK are underway. We have also made it clear that our dialogue cannot continue if the DPRK withdraws from the NPT, engages in additional reprocessing, or fails to accept regular IAEA inspections necessary to maintain the continuity of safeguards.

DPRK Q's and A's

Q. President Clinton recently said that the U.S. would destroy North Korea if it developed and used nuclear weapons. How does that square with your assurances to the DPRK against the threat and use of force, including nuclear weapons?

A: There is no contradiction. The President's remarks stand on their own, as an expression of our longstanding security commitment to defend our ally, the Republic of Korea and are consistent with the June 11 U.S./DPRK statement and the Geneva press release.

The principles referred to in the statement and its reaffirmation in Geneva are based on U.S. obligations under the UN charter, which commit us to refrain from the threat or use of force against another country, except in self-defense or otherwise in accordance with the Charter of the United Nations. Obviously, these principles preserve our obligation and ability to assist the ROK in its self-defense, including the right to conduct defensive exercises.

Q: Did you agree to give up Team Spirit?

A: No. We have made no changes in our plans concerning Team Spirit. I refer to DoD for any further questions on military exercises.

(Suggested DoD answer: "We have made no changes regarding future Team Spirit exercises.")

Q: Why is the U.S. offering to help North Korea's nuclear program, when North Korea is trying to build nuclear weapons?

A: During our discussions, the DPRK expressed an interest in converting its nuclear energy program to a more proliferation-resistant technology base, to assure the international community of its peaceful intentions.

The U.S. supports this conversion, and we assured the DPRK that we will explore ways for the DPRK to obtain assistance in making this conversion once the nuclear issue has been fully resolved. We stressed to the DPRK the need for it to first attain a solid non-proliferation record. Until that time, we will not provide the DPRK with nuclear assistance, or encourage others to assist the DPRK.

DPRK Q's and A's

Q: Is the DPRK going to accept routine IAEA inspections?

A: The DPRK remains a party to the NPT. Accordingly, we expect the DPRK to cooperate with the IAEA to maintain the continuity of IAEA inspections, including acceptance of regular IAEA inspections.

Q: The IAEA wants to send inspectors to North Korea next week. What if the DPRK refuses?

A: We have made it clear to the DPRK that certain steps must be avoided if our discussions are to continue. In particular, we would regard any additional reprocessing or any break in the continuity of IAEA safeguards as harmful and inconsistent with our efforts to resolve the nuclear issue through dialogue.

We expect the DPRK to cooperate with IAEA in all regular safeguards activity required by the IAEA.

Q: Is the DPRK going to let the IAEA conduct special inspections of the two suspect waste sites?

A: As part of our agreement today, the DPRK has agreed to begin consultations with the IAEA on all outstanding safeguards issues, including any IAEA requests for additional information and visits to additional sites. We encourage the DPRK to make arrangements with the IAEA to resolve these issues as soon as possible.

Q: How much longer are you going to let the DPRK drag this out before seeking sanctions? Aren't they building a bomb while you are talking?

A: We have said that we will continue to hold discussions with the DPRK only as long as progress is being made to resolve the nuclear question. At this round, we made concrete progress in two areas: DPRK agreement to hold nuclear discussions with both the IAEA and the ROK. On the basis of this progress, we have agreed to meet with the DPRK again in the next two months to assess the situation and discuss remaining issues.

(If pressed -- We are encouraged by the progress that has been made so far, but we recognize that the international community is seized with the urgency of the issue.)

DPRK Q's and A's

Q: What does the DPRK have to do to get another meeting? What if they don't meet with the IAEA or ROK?

A: As I said, we will continue to meet only as long as we believe we are making progress to resolve the nuclear issue. The DPRK has agreed to move ahead as soon as possible in its discussions with the IAEA and the ROK, and we expect them to do that. We look forward to holding another round of meetings with the DPRK in the next two months on the basis of this progress.

Q: Are you planning to support UN Security Council sanctions against the DPRK?

A: Additional UNSC resolutions are not now under active consideration. As long as we are making progress to resolve this matter, I think the Security Council would support the dialogue.

Q: When are the ROK and DPRK going to meet to discuss the nuclear issue?

A: That is up to North and South Korea to decide. However, we are encouraged by the DPRK's agreement to meet with the ROK as soon as possible to discuss bilateral matters, including the nuclear issue, and we understand that the ROK stands ready to resume the inter-Korean dialogue.

Q: Is the U.S. going to normalize relations with the DPRK? Lift economic sanctions, etc.?

A: After the nuclear issue has been resolved, and the DPRK is in full compliance with its non-proliferation obligations, the U.S. is willing to discuss the improvement of political and economic relations with the DPRK. Beyond the nuclear issue, we remain most concerned about North Korea's continuing export of ballistic missiles, among other things.

Q: We see what the North Koreans say they are going to do, but are you going to meet again for another round of talks even if they don't do it?

A: No. The North Koreans have clearly agreed to begin discussions with the IAEA as soon as possible on all safeguards issues, including the question of visits to additional sites requested by the IAEA. They have also reaffirmed their commitment to the North-South Denuclearization Declaration, and said they are ready now to begin talking to the South Koreans on bilateral issues, including the nuclear issue.

Therefore, we would not expect to begin a third round of talks with the DPRK until those discussions with the IAEA and ROK have begun.

Q: Is the DPRK going to let the IAEA conduct special inspections of the two suspect waste sites or are they just going to talk about the inspections?

A: As part of our agreement today, the DPRK has agreed to begin consultations with the IAEA on all outstanding safeguards issues, including any IAEA requests for additional information and visits to additional sites. The North Koreans have not yet agreed to accept such visits, and so this remains a critical outstanding issue yet to be resolved.

We urge the DPRK to make arrangements with the IAEA to resolve this issue as soon as possible. If it is not resolved, this, among other subjects, will be discussed in our next round of talks.

Q: What will you do if the dialogue fails?

A: The UNSC became seized with the DPRK nuclear issue as a result of a finding by the IAEA Board of Governors on April 1 that the DPRK is in non-compliance with its safeguards obligations under the NPT. On May 11, the UNSC adopted a resolution urging the DPRK to comply with IAEA inspection requirements.

Pursuant to that resolution, we have undertaken to engage the DPRK in discussions aimed at resolving the nuclear issue. We have been consulting closely with the UNSC members on our discussions with the DPRK. If the dialogue fails, we will report promptly the disappointing results of our effort to negotiate a resolution. The next steps will be taken in consultation with allies and others on the Security Council.

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US/DPRK PUBLIC STATEMENT

In discussions held in Geneva July 14-16 and August _____, the United States and the Democratic People's Republic of Korea agreed on the need to achieve a Korean peninsula free from nuclear weapons, and on the importance of the international non-proliferation regime in order to maintain international peace and security.

The two sides, therefore, agreed on the following general principles to resolve the nuclear issue and lay the foundation for better relations between the two countries:

-- The DPRK will remain a Party to the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty. As a non-nuclear weapons state party of that treaty, the DPRK reaffirms its commitment not to develop, manufacture, possess or acquire nuclear weapons;

-- As a Party to the NPT with an International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) fullscope safeguards agreement in force, the DPRK will cooperate with that Agency to ensure that fullscope safeguards, including special inspections as requested by the IAEA, are fully implemented in accordance with that agreement and in an impartial and objective manner:

-- The DPRK, along with the Republic of Korea, will seek to rapidly implement the North-South Denuclearization Declaration as supplement to the NPT. Towards that end, the DPRK agrees that full implementation includes the dismantlement of plutonium reprocessing and uranium enrichment facilities on the Korean Peninsula and the implementation of a credible and effective bilateral inspection regime.

-- The United States reaffirms its commitment not to use nuclear weapons against any non-nuclear weapon state Party to the NPT, except in the case of an attack on itself, its territories or armed forces, or its allies by such a state allied to a nuclear weapon state or associated with a nuclear state in carrying out or sustaining an attack. This commitment is extended to the DPRK for as long as it remains a party in good standing to the NPT.

-- The United States reaffirms that its policy of nuclear deployment is consistent with announcements by the Republic of Korea that there are no nuclear weapons on its territory.

-- The United States reaffirms that it will respect the North-South Denuclearization Declaration, and will consider additional assurances of non-use and non-deployment of nuclear weapons as protocols to that Declaration when its implementation by North and South Korea has begun.

-- Both sides recognize the desirability of the DPRK's intention to replace its graphite moderated reactors and associated facilities with light water moderated reactors (LWRs). As part of a final resolution of the nuclear issue, and on the premise that a solution related to the provision of LWRs is achievable, the U.S. is prepared to support the introduction of LWRs and to explore with the DPRK ways in which LWRs could be obtained.

-- Both sides will refrain from the threat or use of force against the territorial integrity or political independence of each other, and pledge that none of their weapons will ever be used against the other except in self-defense or otherwise in accordance with the Charter of the United Nations;

-- Both sides support achieving the peaceful reunification of the Korean peninsula through dialogue between the Democratic People's Republic of North Korea and the Republic of Korea and on terms acceptable to the Korean people;

-- Future contacts between the United States and the DPRK will be conducted on the basis of the principles of sovereign equality and non-interference in internal affairs; and

-- With the satisfactory resolution of the nuclear issue, both sides will work towards improving relations through an ongoing dialogue to be held at the policy level of their respective foreign ministries.
