SECRETARY CHRISTOPHER: Good morning. It's a great pleasure to have spent some time again this morning with my good friend, Foreign Minister Sung-Joo Han from the Republic of Korea. He's here for several days of talks with senior Administration officials.

I am pleased to tell you, as I've told the Foreign Minister, I'll be travelling to Seoul later this year to advance our shared interests and to continue our discussions with our close ally, the Republic of Korea.

For more than 40 years now, the United States and South Korea have stood shoulder-to-shoulder in an alliance that has deepened as the years have passed. As President Clinton said last year when he was in Seoul, "Geography has placed our two nations far apart but history has drawn us close together. Linked by open societies and open markets, our two nations have woven a web of political and economic ties that have served to enrich both of us."

Strong relations with South Korea are essential to advancing America's deep and enduring interests in the Asia-Pacific region. Today, the most urgent security issue in the Asia-Pacific region is North Korea's nuclear program. It threatens the security of key American allies, beginning with South Korea.

It increases the likelihood of a destabilizing arms race in Asia, and it undermines our strong interests in maintaining effective global regimes against the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction. Hence, controlling this situation is a top priority of the Clinton Administration.

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Last month, the United States and North Korea made some progress in resolving the nuclear issue in the Geneva talks, but we still have a considerable distance to go. We need to translate statements into actions that lead to a solution to the problem.

Talks between the United States and North Korea will continue this month at the working level in the technical talks going forward in Berlin and Pyongyang. In preparation for a resumption of the talks with Korea in Geneva on September 23, we'll be discussing a number of important issues, especially North Korea's transition to light-water reactors.

Light-water reactors can be provided to the North only when they respond to the international community's concerns about past nuclear activities. Unless North Korea resolves concerns about its past nuclear activities, it will be unable to implement its safeguards agreements under the non-proliferation treaty.

The Geneva statement, which was released after the negotiations recessed recently, highlights the importance of this very requirement.

As part of what we and our South Korean allies have called the broad and thorough approach to the nuclear issue, the United States and North Korea have agreed to move forward to a more normal political and economic relationship, including the establishment of liaison offices. But for such a relationship to take shape, we will need further progress on the nuclear issue and an openness to improve relationships between North and South Korea.

In our talks with North Korea, we've made clear that we expect to see progress in the North-South talks as we make progress in our own talks with the North. North and South need to implement the denuclearization declaration that they signed in late 1991. That objective is also reflected in the recent statement made in Geneva.

Let me emphasize that we cannot finally resolve the nuclear issue until and unless North Korea resumes the substantive dialogue with the Republic of Korea.

Our commitment to South Korea's security remains absolutely firm. Thirty-seven thousand American troops stand watch at Korea's 38th Parallel, and they will continue to do so.

We'll continue to work in concert with the South Korean Government to resolve the nuclear problem. It is in that spirit of cooperation and determination that I welcome

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Foreign Minister Han here to Washington today to continue our friendship and our longstanding dialogue on this issue.

Mr. Foreign Minister, you're very welcome here, as you always are, sir.

FOREIGN MINISTER HAN: Thank you very much. I just want to say that Secretary Christopher has just summed up the substance and spirit of our meeting this morning. It went very well, and I also want to say that I'm here in Washington to confirm our objectives and our ways of dealing with the North Korean nuclear issue and to work out, chart out our strategy and plans in preparation for the forthcoming meetings regarding this issue.

We have accomplished this objective, which is part of the ongoing consultation that we have at several levels, including this very high-level meeting that we just had. In our meeting this morning and in the course of discussions that I've had with other members of the U.S. Government, we have confirmed the importance of securing nuclear transparency of the North Korean program, not only the present and the future but also the past activities in this nuclear issue.

Also, the importance of parallel involvement in North-South Korean relations, on the one hand, and the U.S.-North Korean relations and dialogue on the other. We also confirmed the importance of the light-water reactor project, and we confirmed our willingness to be a major participant and contributor in the project, as long as the North Korean nuclear program becomes transparent and resolved, and we find the appropriate ways and conditions of participating in the project.

I'll stop here and you can proceed from here.

QUESTION: Minister Han, does your government have any reservations or objections to the United States participating in the working-level talks either in Berlin or in Pyongyang?.

FOREIGN MINISTER HAN: We think this is an opportunity to make progress in the North Korean nuclear issue, and we have no reservations. We have had very fruitful discussion on how to proceed in these two meetings, and we hope that they will bring out the desired results.

QUESTION: Mr. Secretary, have you set a date for the talks with Cuban Officials.

SECRETARY CHRISTOPHER: This morning the head of the Cuban delegation indicated that he was going to make a quick trip back to Havana to talk with officials there, but he

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indicated he would be back in the very near future, and that negotiations would resume here within the next few days -- the next two or three days.

He's leaving his delegation here, so we see the talks as continuing to be useful, and we see this as only a very brief interruption in the talks while he returns for a quick trip to Havana.

I don't want to get into the details of the negotiations, but I do indicate that there will be two or three days between now and the time he returns and the talks will be resumed in a relatively short time.

QUESTION: (Inaudible)

SECRETARY CHRISTOPHER: I don't want to characterize it one way or the other. The talks have been productive, useful, businesslike. This we see as a not unnatural part of the talks that he needs to return for consultation in Havana. I think the fact that he's going to be returning very promptly, he's leaving his delegation here, is an indication that this is not by any means a breakdown in the talks, but it's part of the useful talks that are taking place.

QUESTION: There are reports that the U.S. might take a broader (inaudible) with Cuba after the migration (inaudible).

SECRETARY CHRISTOPHER: As I say, I don't want to get into the details of the discussion here. Those talks have been going on very actively in New York for several rounds, and I don't want to characterize any particular aspects of them one way or the other.

QUESTION: On Haiti, Mr. Secretary, there was a report last night on NBC that an invasion was rather imminent. What is its status, Sir?

SECRETARY CHRISTOPHER: With respect to that, I would say that one way or the other, the de facto government is going to be leaving. Their days are definitely numbered, but we think that they should get the message and leave themselves. But at the present time, we continue to put pressure on to that end. I would say that no particular outcome is inevitable at the present time, and we're continuing in the process.

But I would like to reiterate what my colleagues have been saying, and that is that one way or the other, the de facto government will be leaving.

QUESTION: (Inaudible) a deadline.

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SECRETARY CHRISTOPHER: There's no specific deadline at the present time.

QUESTION: Mr. Secretary (inaudible).

SECRETARY CHRISTOPHER: Yes. At the present time the IAEA has indicated that special inspections are a very important part of the safeguards agreement which must be entered into -- or must be carried forward by the North Korean Government. So we regard those special inspections as being a very important part of the nuclear issue that must be resolved.

These are standards laid down by the IAEA and ones that we think are essential for the ultimate resolution of this issue. The fact that I did not mention it in my statement was that I was trying to keep it relatively brief. But I would emphasize once again that we need to find a way to deal not only, as the Foreign Minister said, with the present and the future but also to give us a full understanding of the past.

QUESTION: Minister Han, what is the current status of the attempts to arrange for or reset the talks between North and South. Mr Secretary, what is the United States' role using its good offices to promote them.

FOREIGN MINISTER HAN: As you know, there was a summit meeting between the Presidents of the Republic of Korea and the DPRK, scheduled for July the 25th, but then President Kim Il-Sung died and the meeting could not be held.

We got the notification from North Korea that due to unavoidable circumstances, the meeting could not be held and that they will get back to us for future possibilities.

The problem now is that there has been no formal assumption of the top offices of either of the party or the government in North Korea. We expect the position or positions, the power would pass on to the son of Mr. Kim Il-Sung, but it has not been formalized. So we have to wait until this formalization is made. We don't know when that will be, but we are keeping all the doors open for talks between North and South Korea.

SECRETARY CHRISTOPHER: As far as our part in that, in our meetings with the North Koreans, we are making clear to them that we expect that there be progress in the North-South talks just as we make progress in our talks with the North. So we're taking every opportunity to urge them to re-engage in those talks.

QUESTION: Mr. Secretary, as part of this (inaudible) approach, would the Administration be willing to negotiate a formal peace treaty with North Korea to end the Korean War?

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SECRETARY CHRISTOPHER: We would certainly see that as something far down the road. We would certainly see that as something only done in consultation with the South. At the present time, we're trying to resolve the nuclear issue in the Geneva talks. That certainly will have to take priority. The other issues are a very substantial distance down the road.

We have, as I mentioned in my statement, talked about more normal relationships with them. In Pyongyang, starting on this Saturday, we'll be trying to gather facts with respect to the Liaison Office as a possibility. But I emphasize, those are not negotiations but simply the gathering of facts that might enable us to move more briskly in the future. In Berlin, there will be other technical talks.

Those are the matters that must have the priority at the present time. I do want to underscore the importance of our alliance with South Korea and our intention to consult with them at every phase of this matter as we go forward in the close harmony that we've had in the past.

QUESTION: Is South Korea now building (inaudible) outlined to provide money for a light-water reactor (inaudible)?

FOREIGN MINISTER HAN: I think the timing is such that we have not yet reached the stage where we can talk about either money or the hardware, whatever it is. All we are saying now is that we are willing to make the contribution. We are willing to play the role that would be useful. Again, it all depends upon whether North Korea will fulfill its obligations.

QUESTION: (Inaudible) goal of the North Korean nuclear program is to generate energy, not nuclear weapons. Do you have any evidence suggesting that there is a (inaudible)?

FOREIGN MINISTER HAN: We recognize that light-water reactors are much more proliferation-resistant than the type that North Korea has right now. That's as much as I would say in relation to the connection between reactors and their nuclear program.

Draft ROK-U.S. Presidential assurances

I am pleased to confirm that the Republic of Korea will cooperate fully in efforts to arrange for the financing and construction of a light-water nuclear power reactor project in North Korea. In particular, the Republic of Korea guarantees that it will provide not less than (___%) of all funding necessary to construct light-water reactors in North Korea with a total design capacity of approximately 2,000 MW(e) and will authorize full participation by South Korean firms in the project. Such funds will be made available to the organization overseeing the project (or its designee). It is understood that South Korean firms will participate in this project to the maximum extent possible.

In the event that the reactor project referred to above is not completed for reasons beyond the control of the DPRK, and the United States or another country completes the project pursuant to the U.S. letter to the DPRK of September ___, 1994, the Republic of Korea guarantees to the United States that it will provide (___%) of the funds necessary to complete the alternative project. The assurances in this letter are subject to the same conditions as described in the U.S. letter to the DPRK of September ___, 1994.

TALKING POINTS

U.S. EXPERT-LEVEL TEAM VISIT TO PYONGYANG

o The U.S. delegation is here as a result of the statement agreed to between our two countries August 12 in Geneva. That statement calls for expert level discussions between our two countries to prepare for the establishment of liaison offices in each others capitals, should the political decision be made by our two governments to do so.

o We are not here to discuss what the criteria might be on which the U.S. government may or may not decide to establish a liaison office in Pyongyang. That decision is for the policy levels of the U.S. Government and the DPRK government to decide. We have no authority to address that issue.

o We are here to discuss technical issues and to gather information. Should the United States and Democratic Peoples Republic of Korea decide at a later date to exchange liaison offices, our talks can speed the establishment of those offices by identifying in advance technical areas which must be addressed at the time liaison offices would be established.

o During our trip to Pyongyang, we would like to gather as much information as possible on legal and technical issues, as well as on living and working conditions for diplomatic missions in Pyongyang. In that way the State Department can begin staff preparations for establishing a liaison office in Pyongyang should our government decide to do so.

o We would also like to inform the DPRK of how the U.S. views several technical issues -- legal, logistical, consular -- that will arise should liaison offices be established.

o We welcome technical questions the DPRK may have on setting up a liaison office in Washington. If we cannot answer a question, we will refer it to our experts in Washington after our return there and will send you an answer.

o As noted in our communication with the DPRK mission to the United Nations concerning this trip, we would like during our visit to Pyongyang to call on the Russian, Chinese and German missions so that we may get the perspectives of those missions on technical questions concerning diplomatic working and living conditions in Pyongyang.

o It is the view of the United States that if liaison offices are established, their purpose will be to establish effective liaison between our two countries. Such offices will not represent full normalization of relations. Rather, per the August 12 Agreed Statement, they will represent a move toward full normalization.

o Accordingly, liaison offices will not need to carry out the full range of functions of an embassy.

o However, the U.S. liaison office in Pyongyang and the DPRK liaison office in Washington must be able to carry out those functions necessary to provide effective liaison between our two countries. These functions may be asymmetrical. In other words, the U.S. office may need to carry out certain functions that the DPRK office in Washington may not need to carry out and the vice versa.

o We propose to do this on the basis of "functional reciprocity." That is, the U.S. will be authorized to carry out necessary functions in Pyongyang and the DPRK will be authorized to carry out necessary functions in Washington. Reciprocity will be based on functional need, not on a strict application of quantitative criteria -- number of personnel, square footage of building, etc.

o We would now like to discuss a number of technical issues on which we will give the U.S. view and request the DPRK view. **These are preliminary U.S. views and are not final positions. Please understand this point -- should our two governments later decide to exchange liaison offices, these positions may be modified.** However, they represent U.S. views at this time.

Legal Basis

o We believe that liaison offices should be set up under the Vienna Convention on Diplomatic Representation and the Vienna Convention on Consular Representation. Both the U.S. and the DPRK are parties to these two agreements. This will preclude lengthy bilateral negotiations.

Size

o We have not yet decided on the number of personnel that would man a U.S. liaison office in Pyongyang. It will be no larger than necessary to perform the liaison functions which it must perform. We do not intend that there should be strict numerical reciprocity in the number of personnel in each others missions, but the numbers should be no greater than that required to perform necessary functions. Over time, as relations normalize, the number of U.S. personnel would increase.

Visas

o Both liaison offices should be empowered to issue visas for the purpose of expediting necessary travel between our two countries. The U.S. sees no need for the liaison offices to issue tourist visas.

Communications

o Both liaison offices should be allowed to have diplomatic communications equipment if so desired.

Access to Host Country Nationals

o The U.S. liaison office should have ready access to DPRK officials and citizens whom it must contact to fulfill its liaison functions.

o In-country travel should be allowed to the maximum extent possible. Any restrictions imposed by either host state should not restrict the effective fulfillment of necessary liaison functions.

Consular Access

o The U.S. expects that in the context of a broad and thorough solution to the nuclear issue there will be increased travel to the DPRK by American citizens. A U.S. liaison office in Pyongyang will require consular access to American citizens wherever in the DPRK they may be and prompt notification by DPRK authorities of the detention of any American citizen. Likewise any American citizen in the DPRK should not be deprived of rapid and easy communication to the U.S. liaison office.

o Does the DPRK have any laws which may cause disputes as to the citizenship of Korean-born American citizens -- those born in what is now the territory controlled by the DPRK, those born in what is now the territory controlled by the Republic of Korea.

o The U.S. does not recognize dual citizenship. Any American citizen is considered by us only to be a citizen of the United States and entitled to consular representation by the resident U.S. mission.

Logistics

o For both logistic and policy reasons, the U.S. would like to have free access for its personnel assigned to Pyongyang to travel back and forth across the DMZ at Panmunjom.

o This would allow our liaison office in Pyongyang to keep close communication and coordination with our embassy in Seoul. This will facilitate liaison in expediting a broad and thorough solution to the nuclear issue and increase the policy input of those U.S. personnel in Pyongyang most familiar with the DPRK point of view.

o This would also allow the U.S. liaison office in Pyongyang to be logistically supported by our established base in Seoul. Logistical support through Beijing will be more difficult.

o Logistical support through Beijing may be at times be inadequate to the needs of a U.S. liaison office in Pyongyang, requiring support flights by either U.S. Air Force aircraft, or U.S. government chartered aircraft, into Pyongyang.

Building

o We are not prepared on this trip to make any site selection, even of a preliminary nature, of a building for a U.S. liaison office. We are, however, authorized to tour representative diplomatic mission areas.

o At a future date, if a political decision is made to exchange liaison offices and when site selection is warranted, we will send a complete site selection team.

o The U.S. does not intend to establish its liaison office in a building designated to be the eventual permanent home of a U.S. embassy to the DPRK. Instead, it will first search for temporary quarters. Permanent site selection would take place only after full normalization, when the long range size of a U.S. mission could more adequately be determined.

o When a decision is made by our two governments that we must find sites for our respective liaison offices, the State Department stands ready to assist the DPRK in finding a suitable building in Washington.

o The DPRK should understand that real estate in Washington operates on a free market system and that local zoning laws in some cases restrict building use. Does the DPRK intend to have both its liaison office and housing in the same building?

Housing

o What housing would be available for the families of U.S. personnel assigned to Pyongyang. We are authorized to view representative housing, but not to make any commitments of any kind.

Schooling

o What schooling is available for the children of foreign diplomats in Pyongyang -- preschool/kindergarten, grade school?

Medical Facilities

o What medical facilities are available to the foreign diplomatic community in Pyongyang? What payment system is used? We are authorized to make a preliminary tour of such facilities.

o In the U.S. medical care is readily available to the foreign diplomatic corps at any U.S. facility. However, the cost of such care must be paid for: either privately by the individual treated, by the foreign mission, or through health insurance which can be purchased in the United States.

Automobiles

o Are foreign diplomats in Pyongyang allowed to have private autos? If so, under what circumstances?

o In the U.S. private autos and mission autos are allowed; drivers licenses for members of foreign missions are issued by the U.S. Office of Foreign Missions. There are mandatory liability insurance standards.

Procurement of Services

o Is there a government agency in the DPRK to assist foreign missions in the procurement of goods and services? If so, is it mandatory to use this agency or may missions procure goods and services directly?

o Goods and services may be procured directly in the U.S. However, in cases of reciprocity, the U.S. may require the procurement of goods and services through the intermediation of the Office of Foreign Services.

Personnel

o What is the procedure for hiring DPRK personnel to serve in clerical and maintenance positions at a foreign mission?
