SUBJECT: Justification for \$200 Million Supplemental

Attached is the package prepared for submission with the request to Congress for a rescission/supplemental to fund civilian implementation of the Dayton Peace Accords. The package includes:

- A letter from the President to the House Speaker and the President of the Senate (OMB has solicited comments, and a final version should be available later in the day);
- Draft legislation for the supplemental;
- Three page justification for the \$200 million;
- Detailed breakdown of the \$200 million package -- pls note that the paper reflects OSD's concerns that the justification be tied as closely as possible to the IFOR mission. We have increased funding levels for infrastructure and reduced funding levels for the enterprise finance component. However, we continue to believe the latter element is crucial to the success of civilian implementation and needs to be funded at these levels during FY 96.
- The chart (Tab 2) will be redone prior to the ExComm to reflect the modifications in funding levels.

We believe the package as now drafted provides a solid justification for the supplemental request and look to today's 1100 ExComm meeting to finalize the package in order that it be transmitted to the Hill on Thursday.

Dear Mr. President

The United States and its allies have begun the difficult task of bringing peace to Bosnia. Under the agreement brokered by the United States that resulted in the Dayton Peace Accords, I have committed U.S. troops to a multinational force in Bosnia and Herzegovina and pledged U.S. help in multinational civilian peace implementation programs. I ask Congress to consider expeditiously the enclosed request for FY 1996 supplemental appropriations in support of these efforts. The request seeks \$620 million for Department of Defense operations associated with the NATO-led Bosnia Peace Implementation Force (IFOR) and Operation Deny Flight, and \$200 million for civilian implementation of the Dayton Peace Accords.

The security and success of the IFOR mission go hand-in-hand with the implementation of all aspects of the Dayton Peace Accords. Our planned civilian programs will not only underpin the Dayton Accords but also support IFOR and American troops, enhancing their security as they perform their mission and facilitating their safe and smooth withdrawal upon its completion.

I hereby designate the amounts requested as emergency requirements pursuant to section 251(b)(2)(D)(i) of the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985, as amended. Nevertheless, the requested increases in budget authority are fully offset by rescissions from funds available to the Defense Department, as proposed in the accompanying request.

The details of these requests are set forth in the enclosed letter from the Director of the Office of Management and Budget. I concur with her comments and observations.

FUNDS APPROPRIATED TO THE PRESIDENT
AGENCY FOR INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Assistance for Eastern Europe and the Baltic States

For an additional amount for "Assistance for Eastern Europe and the Baltic States" for Bosnia and Herzegovina, including demining assistance, \$200,000,000, of which not to exceed a total of \$5,000,000 may be transferred to accounts of the Department of State, the U.S. Agency for International Development, and the United States Information Agency for administrative costs: Provided, That not to exceed \$5,000,000 of such funds and any other funds appropriated under the same heading for fiscal year 1996 is available for the cost of modifying direct loans and loan guarantees, as defined in section 502 of the Congressional Budget Act of 1974.

This supplemental appropriation provides \$200 million for civilian implementation of the Dayton Peace Accords in Bosnia and Herzegovina: \$145 million for economic revitalization, \$45 million for police monitors and police training, \$5 million for demining assistance, and \$5 million for administrative costs. Up to \$5 million of all funds made available for Bosnia in FY 1996 is available for the subsidy costs associated with debt reduction, consistent with the Federal Credit Reform Act of 1990.

The entire amount requested has been designated by the President as an emergency requirement pursuant to the Balanced Budget and Emergency Deficit Control Act of 1985, as amended.

U.S. Participation in Civilian Implementation
of the Dayton Peace Accords

The U.S. sent troops to Bosnia to be part of the military Implementation Force (IFOR) because U.S. national interests required our participation in the military implementation of the Dayton Peace Accords. As President Clinton and other Administration officials made clear at the time, those same interests also require U.S. participation in civilian implementation of the Dayton Accords.

Significant progress in civilian implementation while IFOR is still on the ground will help demonstrate to the parties formerly at war that there are substantial rewards in maintaining peace even after IFOR withdraws. If we provide evidence of the benefits of peace, this will ease IFOR's mission during its remaining months, diminish the risk to our troops while they are there, and help ensure IFOR's safe and smooth withdrawal later this year. In addition, a substantial portion of the U.S. contribution to civilian implementation efforts will be used for activities in the zone in which U.S. IFOR personnel are located or in areas where the U.S. Government has special political or strategic interests.

Military and civilian implementation go hand in hand. Without the secure environment IFOR is designed to create, civilian efforts will not take firm root. By the same token, stability in Bosnia -- the basic object of IFOR's work -- will ultimately turn on our ability to help redirect the country and its people from war to peace.

American commanders in the field have stressed the need to proceed quickly and decisively with these civilian implementation efforts. As NATO's Supreme Commander, General George Joulwan said recently, "it is on the civilian side that we will determine whether we really have true peace and stability in Bosnia."

The Dayton Peace Accords establish a comprehensive context for new civilian institutions in Bosnia -- for a strong and integrated Federation, a functioning free market economy, and a democratic government. It is vital that during the limited period of IFOR's deployment, the people of Bosnia begin to see the benefits of peace -- not just an absence of violence, but a measurable and rising improvement in their lives. That improvement will be brought about by economic revitalization, stimulated by reconstruction and reform; political reconciliation, fueled by the establishment of democratic institutions; and the return of long-absent friends and family to secure communities.

The U.S. has been working with our NATO allies, the World Bank, and others to develop a comprehensive set of humanitarian assistance, economic stabilization, police training, demining, and related programs for Bosnia. The bulk of the cost associated with these efforts will be picked up by the Europeans, Japan, the Gulf states, international financial institutions, and others.

As part of this international effort, the Administration intends to provide \$200 million in FY 96 to support economic revitalization and democracy in Bosnia. This is the FY 96 portion of the U.S. contribution of \$600 million over three years in support of Bosnia's economic recovery, announced by President Clinton in Paris at the signing of the Dayton Peace Accords. In addition, the U.S. civilian peace implementation program includes \$70 million for police training and monitors, \$8.2 million in support of elections and human rights monitoring, \$162 million in humanitarian assistance, and \$91.5 million for a variety of other activities, including demining.

The Administration has thoroughly examined all options for meeting these U.S. costs from International Affairs accounts. Over sixty percent of our overall costs will be met this way. However, additional funding of \$200 million is required to ensure the successful implementation of the Dayton Peace Accords in 1996.

Economic revitalization and reforms must get under way rapidly to sustain the momentum for peace and directly support the IFOR mission. This additional \$200 million package contains \$145 million for these essential activities, about three-fourths of which will be undertaken in the zone in which U.S. IFOR personnel are located. This portion is intended to fund activities such as financing productive enterprises that will generate employment, and repairing urgently required infrastructure and services.

Training of local police, deployment of monitors in an International Police Task Force (IPTF), and demining have a direct and immediate impact on IFOR's mission. IFOR is not a police force, and its own demining mission is strictly tied to its own security. Civilian efforts must pick up the slack. The \$200 million supplemental package contains \$45 million for police training and monitors, and \$5 million for demining.

The final element in this additional request covers operating expenses for the Department of State, USIA, and USAID. These funds are necessary to ensure that management of U.S. Government-funded civilian implementation programs is effective. The package contains \$5 million for this purpose.

A significant U.S. role in civilian implementation efforts is a necessary consequence of our leading role in negotiating the Dayton Peace Accords and in the NATO-led IFOR mission. As experience has shown, it is only when the United States leads that other nations follow - Our own active engagement is key to attracting the necessary resources, support, and services from our European allies, Japan, and other friends for this essential effort.

Introduction

The following describes the President's request for \$200 million in additional funding in FY 1996 to support civilian implementation of the Dayton Peace Accords.

TAB 1 provides background information on the present situation in Bosnia and Herzegovina. TAB 2 shows total anticipated FY 1996 United States contributions to all aspects of the civilian implementation component of the peace implementation program for Bosnia and Herzegovina (\$532.2 million). TAB 3 contains detailed information on the \$145 million Economic Revitalization portion of the \$200 million request for programs to diminish the risks for IFOR, ease its mission, and help ensure IFOR's safe withdrawal. A substantial portion of these programs will be carried out in the zone of U.S. IFOR deployment. TAB 4 provides details on the participation thus far of international donors in economic recovery and reform activities.

Economic Revitalization..... \$145,000,000

Under the Dayton Accords, the parties will undertake a wide range of activities, including rehabilitation of infrastructure and economic revitalization, establishment of political and constitutional institutions in Bosnia and Herzegovina, and the holding of free and fair elections in accordance with the timetable specified in Annex III to the Dayton Peace Accords. The business of economic revitalization -- reform and reconstruction -- must begin immediately in order to build the momentum for peace in the region and to ensure that when military forces withdraw, peace and stability will be maintained.

This will be accomplished in two principal ways. First, these funds will be used as part of a multi-donor effort to help the government of Bosnia and Herzegovina (GOBH) meet its reconstruction needs which require external financing. The USG will participate in this World Bank-led program through the parallel financing mechanisms of its Economic Revitalization program. These USG funds will have an important leveraging impact on resources from other donors and will be instrumental in triggering the participation in reconstruction efforts of multi-lateral financial institutions, including the IMF.

Second, in order to provide rapidly the civilian population with a stake in building peace, the U.S. will execute written agreements with the GOBH to allocate, in tranches of local currency (currently Deutschmarks), an amount equivalent to the total United States contribution for two, quick-disbursing activities: (1) making urgent repairs of infrastructure and restoration of services -- for use by IFOR personnel and civilians alike -- such as electric power, water supply and waste water treatment, solid waste management, roads, bridges and housing, primarily in municipalities and cantons located in the zone in which United States IFOR personnel are located, or in which the USG has a special political or strategic interest; and (2) generating economic growth and employment, including for demobilized soldiers. These two activities, identified as Municipal Infrastructure & Services and the Enterprise Finance programs, will maximize self-help to restart commerce and restore municipal services.

Using these funds to provide credit to small and medium sized businesses, at market or near market terms, will facilitate the demilitarization process by creating employment opportunities to former combatants and others. The economy needs to generate jobs to absorb the approximately 180,000 troops who will be demobilized in Bosnia. The faster that former soldiers are productively engaged in rebuilding Bosnia's economy and civil society, the greater the reduction in the security threat to IFOR personnel and the safer and easier the withdrawal of our troops will become. To the extent such funds are used for external procurement, United States and front-line state sources will be given appropriate priority.

Infrastructure repair and reconstruction, including roads and other services, within the territory in which United States IFOR personnel are located, or in which the USG has a special political or strategic interest, will improve the overall environment of those forces and help to ensure a lasting peace upon the departure of U.S. forces. Decisions regarding which infrastructure should be repaired will be made in close consultation with the United States IFOR command structure, the U.S. Mission in Bosnia and local officials. To the extent possible, preference and priority will be given to projects which promote cooperation among multi-ethnic groups.

Police Training and Monitors\$45,000,000

Pursuant to the Dayton Accords, the United Nations has created an International Police Task Force (IPTF) to monitor, advise, and provide on-the-job training for local law enforcement personnel in Bosnia and Herzegovina. U.S. troops were not sent to Bosnia to carry out police functions; IPTF is the necessary civilian complement to IFOR's military role in establishing a secure and stable environment throughout Bosnia. The IPTF will facilitate the creation of an effective law enforcement capability by developing competent local police that can maintain security while respecting human rights. The development of this capability is critical to the overall success of U.S. policy in Bosnia. IPTF simultaneously will help ensure the safe and timely departure of IFOR and create the necessary precondition for such bedrock policy goals as the orderly return of displaced persons and the holding of free and fair elections.

The USG has pledged to provide 200 of the approximately 2,200 highly qualified police monitors required for the mission in Bosnia (1,721) and a related mission in Eastern Slavonia (approximately 450-500). As has been the case with all activities related to establishing peace in the region, U.S. leadership - through the timely deployment of our force - is key to assuring the active participation of other Western nations and, ultimately, to guarantee the success of the mission.

Of the funds requested for this activity, \$25 million will support, by means of salaries and equipment, the U.S. contingent of 200 highly skilled police monitors to serve in the UN Civilian Police operations in Bosnia and Herzegovina and Eastern Slavonia. The remaining \$20 million will fund a transitional training program for selected local law enforcement personnel.

Demining\$5,000,000

The estimated 3 - 6 million land mines in Bosnia and Herzegovina pose a significant threat to IFOR, and a large stumbling block during all phases of peace implementation and economic recovery. Freedom of movement and repatriation of refugees, repair of national infrastructure, commercial development, agricultural recovery, and the ability to conduct free and fair elections are all dependent upon the pace and progress of mine clearance operations. For the safety of IFOR and civilian population, demining support from the U.S. and others is crucial and in our best interests.

Of the funds provided under this supplemental request, \$5 million would be used by the United States to help establish a Mine Action Center, an information clearing house and training/demining center, established by the U.S. in Sarajevo. Approximately \$5 million in other U.S. funds will be utilized to rapidly assist the opening of this center. As with the other parts of the Economic Recovery

program, the vast majority of the funds will be provided by other countries and entities. Given the long term nature of demining activities, this effort will ultimately be carried out by agencies to be established by the GOBH.

Operating Expenses..... \$5,000,000

The final element of the supplemental request is to cover the cost of implementing these activities. The Department of State, under the Support for Eastern Europe and Democracy (SEED) Act, is responsible for providing overall coordination of United States economic recovery efforts in Bosnia and Herzegovina. The United States Agency for International Development (USAID) and the United States Information Agency (USIA) will be asked to undertake additional operating expense associated with their responsibility for on-the-ground implementation of the recovery and reform program. The costs of administering these programs were not included in the annual budget submissions of these agencies for Fiscal Year 1996, which were prepared and submitted long before the Dayton Peace Accords seemed possible. A total of \$5,000,000 is therefore requested to help cover these expenses. We estimate that the allocation of these funds will be apportioned as follows: Department of State (\$2,000,000), USAID (\$2,000,000), USIA (\$1,000,000).

The funds requested herein are in addition to funds otherwise authorized by law for humanitarian, economic and other assistance in Bosnia and Herzegovina. These supplemental funds would be available for obligation and expenditure in accordance with Section 526 of the Fiscal Year 1996 Foreign Operations Appropriation Act.

TAB 1***Background on Bosnia***

After nearly four years of violent civil conflict, the citizens of Bosnia and Herzegovina are now taking the first tentative steps towards a lasting peace. The war decimated the Bosnian society and economy, destroying substantial amounts of productive capacity and infrastructure. Civilian institutions, such as police, functioned capriciously, if at all. GDP per capita has been reduced to only one-fourth of its pre-war level. Major national industries have been shut down and may not, and in some cases should not, reopen, while many private enterprises have been equally devastated. High unemployment stands as a major issue certain to be heightened by the return of demobilized soldiers. The population of Bosnia and Herzegovina has dropped from a pre-war level of four million to less than three million. With 1.3 million displaced persons in Bosnia, 900,000 in surrounding territories, and 800,000 displaced abroad, resettlement presents a major challenge to the peacemakers, complicated further by the partial or total destruction of 60% of the housing stock. Because of the economic and social consequences of the war, many became dependent on international relief assistance.

The United States Government has provided substantial humanitarian assistance throughout the war (approximately \$1 billion, 1991- present). European contributions for humanitarian assistance over this same period have been more than twice this sum. U.S. assistance will continue over the next 12-18 months in the form of food assistance, refugee and displaced persons assistance and resettlement, temporary shelter materials, clothing, fuel and other items critical for the survival of vulnerable populations, particularly during the harsh winter months. As longer-term recovery activities take hold, the emergency humanitarian program will be phased down.

There are positive elements in Bosnia and Herzegovina's pre-war economic situation which may smooth the road towards economic reconstruction and democratic reform. The country has significant productive capacity and potential for creating jobs. The relative openness of the former Yugoslav economy, the limited but growing presence of private enterprise, and established links to international markets during the Communist period can serve as a foundation supporting post-war recovery. Approximately half of Bosnia's pre-war exports were directed to Western and other convertible currency markets. The country has a resilient, entrepreneurial, and well-educated population capable of leading the way to economic recovery and a democratic peace. Also, the country has a tradition of municipal autonomy and a decentralized administration that offer promise for local democratic governance.

The Dayton Peace Accords establish a comprehensive context for new civilian institutions in Bosnia and Herzegovina, bolstered by a temporary, international

military presence (IFOR) under the command and control of NATO. Under the Accords, the international community has established mechanisms for on-the-ground coordination of recovery (led by the World Bank), and for political coordination (led by the Steering Board). The London Peace Implementation Conference established the office of the High Representative and vested him with over-all responsibility for civilian coordination. A mini-donors' pledging conference was held in Brussels on December 22, 1995, to solicit first quarter pledges for economic recovery. A follow-up pledging conference is currently being scheduled for April 1996.

Within this context, the United States civilian implementation program, in full coordination with the IFOR mission, seeks a stable post-war Bosnia and Herzegovina with strong Federation institutions, a functioning free-market economy, and democratic government. During the Implementation Force (IFOR) deployment, it is imperative that the people of Bosnia begin to see the benefits of economic growth and recovery and feel they have participated in democracy-building. This will create the necessary atmosphere and framework for a successful U.S. troop withdrawal. Without such programs, which relate the fruits of peace directly to the people, IFOR's deployment cannot cement the parties or the people in the peace process.

The USG envisions a temporary USAID mission in Bosnia and Herzegovina with three years of recovery and reconstruction funding and closeout by the beginning of the 21st century, to accomplish these objectives.

TAB 3**Detailed Description of Economic Revitalization Activities (\$145 million)*****Economic Revitalization***

(Total estimate: \$145 million in FY 96 Supplemental.)

A lasting measure of the ultimate success of the IFOR mission will be economic recovery in Bosnia and Herzegovina. This recovery will require the repair of physical infrastructure and the initiation of measures necessary to restart commerce, restore municipal services, and rehabilitate the housing stock. Bosnia and Herzegovina faces a severe balance of payments deficit given the need to import most of the goods and services required for this effort. To ensure that Bosnia and Herzegovina remain in compliance with a structural adjustment program supported by the international financial institutions, a substantial portion of USG resources will go to meeting Bosnia's priority needs for external financing. To accomplish this objective, USAID will provide grant funding to the GOBH, with the equivalent in local currency used to finance the repair of local infrastructure in selected cantons or municipalities and loans to viable enterprises to jump-start the economy. In addition, the USG will work closely with the World Bank and other IFI financing mechanisms to address a limited number of critical energy and infrastructure bottlenecks.

A. Municipal Infrastructure & Services (MIS)

(Sub-total estimate: \$80 million in FY96 Supplemental.)

Through this major new initiative, financing will be made available to participating cantons and municipalities, primarily in the U.S. IFOR sector, Sarajevo, and cantons in which the USG has a strategic or political interest. Grants or loans will be applied to agreed programs for urgent repairs of local infrastructure and restoration of services -- used by IFOR personnel and civilians alike -- such as electric power, water supply and waste water treatment, solid waste management, roads, bridges and housing. These activities, focussing to the extent possible on multi-ethnic communities, will encourage reconciliation and bring the benefits of peace more directly to the people. Once again, the employment generated by these activities will put former soldiers in civilian jobs, enhancing IFOR's security. The grants to cantons and municipalities will help ease Bosnia and Herzegovina's balance of payments gap, and will support a return to normalcy in areas of U.S. troop deployment. The emphasis will be on supporting local Federation structures to attract citizens back to their homes, help them restart normal lives, generate income and stimulate economic activity in the local area.

An existing program of small grants through NGOs will continue to support small-scale reconstruction efforts in the same geographic areas. This program provides

immediate assistance to communities, helping make them more habitable for current residents and returnees through repair or reconstruction of housing, community facilities, schools, markets, and community centers. The program is a visible sign to Bosnia and Herzegovina's citizens of U.S. commitment to the reconstruction effort. Activities funded by the grants program are identified and selected in consultation with Federation officials and community leaders and must provide benefits to a range of communities. This element will be closely coordinated with micro-enterprise lending activities described ~~above~~, as the rapid generation of employment opportunities is critical to the return to normalcy in Bosnia and Herzegovina's communities.

B. Enterprise Finance

(Sub-total estimate: \$65 million in FY96 Supplemental.)

This program will provide quick disbursing loans to support the needs of viable enterprises, primarily in the U.S. IFOR deployment sector and in Sarajevo. During IFOR's deployment to Bosnia, both local armies in Federation territory -- the Bosnian Croat and the Bosniac forces -- will downsize drastically. This downsizing facilitates IFOR's mission to create a ~~and~~ stable and secure environment in Bosnia. It also points up, however, the urgent need for the creation of employment opportunities for civilian and demobilized troops alike. The resumption of economic activity will enable former fighters -- and others -- to return to work, earn a living wage, and acquire a stake in a lasting economic recovery. This will directly enhance IFOR's security, both while it is on the ground and when it withdraws.

This revolving facility will use existing commercial banks with full USG oversight and monitoring. Loans will be made on a non-concessional basis to viable firms with a strong likelihood of repayment to provide short-term working capital and finance medium-term capital investment, including imports, equipment and construction. Preference will be given to firms in manufacturing, agro-processing or other sectors which support restoration of food and industrial production and which stimulate employment or exports. High priority will be given to ensure equitable distribution of credit along ethnic lines. There will be limits on loan size, currently estimated at \$400,000 (equivalent) maximum, and on exposure to a single borrower. Repayments will be used for future lending. The program will provide assistance to eligible firms to develop business plans and supporting documentation to allow them to apply successfully for credit. In addition, the program will support a quick impact micro-lending program to be administered by NGOs experienced in micro-enterprise development. The micro-lending element will be closely coordinated with community-based municipal infrastructure and services activities described below.

TAB 4**Donors' Participation in Economic Revitalization Activities**

Overall peace implementation needs in Bosnia include urgent humanitarian assistance and all aspects of civilian implementation, including support for economic recovery and reforms, police training and monitors, elections, and human rights.

The World Bank and IMF have conducted a "needs assessment" in which the USG concurs. This assessment brought together World Bank estimates of priority reconstruction needs in Bosnia over the next three to four years of \$5.1 billion with other medium-term financing needs. It concluded that Bosnia will require some \$6 billion in external financing over the next 3 years. Of this, \$3 billion is to be covered by individual donor states; the rest by International Financial Institutions, debt reductions and foreign direct investment.

It is our firm belief that peace in Bosnia serves a primary European political and economic interest and, therefore, Europe should provide the lion's share of Bosnia's reconstruction assistance. At the Brussels mini-donors conference in December, for example, \$633 million in new and ongoing commitments were pledged for the first quarter of 1996. Pending Congressional approval, the U.S. pledged, \$62.7 million. The total EC and EC member states pledges were \$306 million, or the "lion's share" of the overall pledges. (See following table of Brussels Conference pledges).

We believe that a U.S. contribution of 20 percent of the total World Bank estimate of bilateral aid required, or \$600 million over the next several years, is absolutely essential to long-term U.S. interests in the Balkans and to maintaining our overall leadership of the Dayton peace initiative. Influencing Bosnia's political and economic recovery comes with a price tag, but it is important that we participate in a significant way.

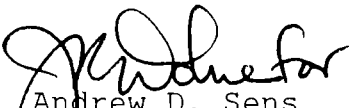
