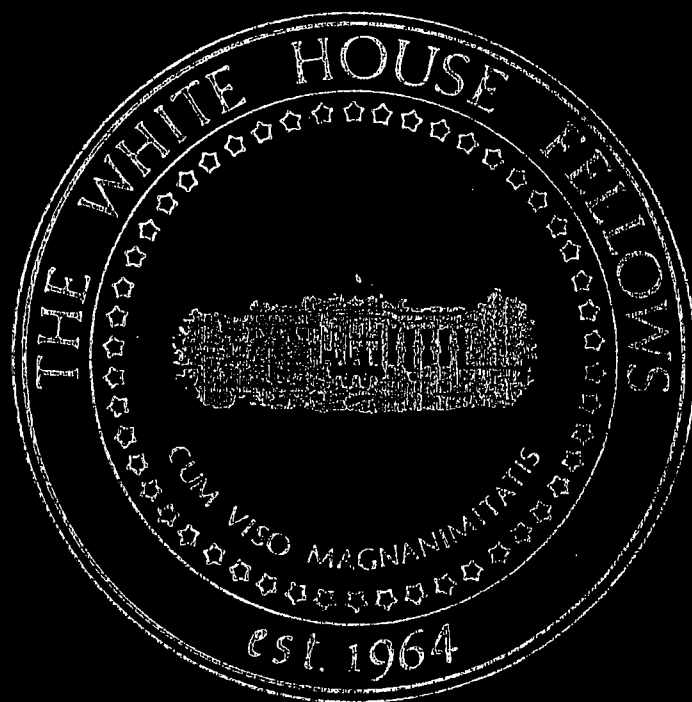

WHITE HOUSE FELLOWS

JANET B. ABRAMS
Atlanta, Georgia

Abrams, 33, is Director of Government Relations for Emory University. Previously, she served as Director of Policy and Planning for the Georgia Division of Public Health and managed federal appropriations for the State of Georgia as Legislative Assistant to U.S. Sen. Wyche Fowler, Jr. She has written on women's health policy for the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. A native of Atlanta, she graduated with a B.A. *summa cum laude* in History and First Marshal of Phi Beta Kappa from Harvard University in 1983. At Stanford, where she earned an M.B.A. in 1987, she founded FoodNet, an organization assisting families in the Bay Area.

TIMOTHY ATKIN
Duncanville, Texas

Atkin, 31, a Lieutenant in the United States Coast Guard, has commanded two Coast Guard cutters. The vessels have garnered seven unit citations for rescues at sea, law enforcement and ice breaking. In 1989, he received a commendation for initiating federal involvement in a narcotics and money laundering case that led to the seizure of \$1.4 million. He has written and directed two one-act plays, and produced a video used as a model for building cultural awareness. He graduated from the Coast Guard Academy in 1985 with high honors, and earned an M.P.A. from Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government in 1992.

LARRY BERGER
Ithaca, New York

Berger, 26, is a candidate for the doctorate in Literature at Oxford, where he was a Rhodes Scholar. He is co-author of "I Will Sing Life," a book which tells the life stories of seven children with cancer, AIDS and blood diseases. The work, which won the 1992 Fassler Award for the best book about children's health, was gleaned from three summers teaching poetry writing at a camp for children with illnesses and a year spent living in the campers' homes and hospitals. In 1990, he graduated *summa cum laude* from Yale University. He was awarded the Herson Prize for an outstanding student of English, the Wallace Prize for fiction writing, and the Connecticut Student Poetry Award. In high school, Berger co-authored the best-seller, "Up Your Score: The Underground Guide to the SAT."

S. LAEL BRAINARD
Charlestown, Massachusetts

Brainard, 32, is Assistant Professor of Applied Economics at Massachusetts Institute of Technology and a Faculty Research Fellow at the National Bureau of Economic Research. Her research on international trade policy and trade and investment has won several grants and awards. She has worked for the Council of Economic Advisors and McKinsey & Company and as a consultant on small development in Senegal for the Ford Foundation and Harvard Institute for International Development. She earned masters and doctoral degrees in economics from Harvard University in 1989. A former National Science Foundation Fellow, she graduated Phi Beta Kappa with honors from Wesleyan University in 1983. She serves on the Board of the Boston Urban Youth Foundation, and is leading an effort to create an entrepreneurship program for inner city teenagers.



YVONNE E. CAMPOS
San Diego, California

Campos, 30, is an attorney specializing in real estate, environmental law and land use. She is an associate with the law firm of Brobeck, Phleger & Harrison in San Diego, where she counseled clients on acquisition, development, financing and disposition of real property. She graduated with distinction from Stanford University in 1985, majoring in economics and political science. She received her J.D. from Harvard Law School in 1988. She worked as a legislative assistant in the California State Senate, and served as a staff attorney for the Christopher Commission during its investigation of the Rodney King incident. Since 1990, she has served on the Board of Directors of California Rural Legal Assistance, Inc., a non-profit legal services organization which represents farmworkers and the rural poor.



DENNIS COBB
Las Vegas, Nevada

Cobb, 37, a native of southern Nevada, is a Lieutenant with the Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department. He earned a political science degree from the University of Nevada-Las Vegas in 1979. In 1992, he was a Fulbright Scholar in Police Studies, and has participated in professional conferences at the British National Police Command College. As a police officer for the last twelve years in the Las Vegas area, he has specialized in patrol, narcotics, investigations and internal quality control. He works in a nationally-recognized community policing program.



PHILIP HART CULLOM
Flossmoor, Illinois

Cullom, 36, a Commander in the U.S. Navy, is Executive Officer of the USS Mobile Bay, a cruiser based in Yokosuka, Japan. After graduating with distinction from the U.S. Naval Academy, he participated in drug interdiction operations off the coast of South America and in two Operation Desert Storm campaigns. Ashore, he was a test reactor engineer, instructor at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory and a Special Assistant to the Chief of Naval Operations for political-military-economic affairs. He holds an M.B.A. with distinction from Harvard Business School. He has earned three Navy Commendation Medals and the Navy Achievement Medal. In Japan, he volunteers at an orphanage, and when deployed, coordinates Project Handclasp's humanitarian relief efforts in the Pacific Rim.



CHRISTOPHER J. DAY
Wilmette, Illinois

Day, 31, is Director, Operations Planning and Development for Packaging Corporation of America (PCA), a Tenneco subsidiary. Born in Alaska and raised outside of Chicago, he attended Northwestern University and, at 19, became the youngest person ever accepted to Northwestern's Kellogg School of Management. Since graduation, he has held positions in corporate finance, strategy, operations, marketing and sales with Morgan Stanley, Sears Roebuck and Tenneco. Most recently, he merged the operations of two PCA divisions to create the \$500 million Specialty Packaging Group. Active in his community, Day started a tutoring program at the Corporate Community School on Chicago's west side.



ANGELA DIAZ
New York, New York

Diaz, 39, is Chief of the Division of Adolescent Medicine and Director of the Adolescent Health Center at Mount Sinai Medical Center, New York City. She works with inner-city adolescents and runs a program which provides medical, reproductive health, mental health and health education. She co-chairs a chapter of the Committee on Adolescence for the American Academy of Pediatrics. She is co-founder of the Women Faculty Group and the Culture Diversity in Medicine Program at Mount Sinai. Born in the Dominican Republic, she immigrated to the United States as a teenager, attended public schools and the City College of New York, and received her M.D. from the College of Physicians and Surgeons of Columbia University in 1981.



WIFREDO A. FERRER
Miami, Florida

Ferrer, 27, is an attorney who specializes in pro bono civil rights and children's cases. In 1984, he received a Silver Knight Outstanding Community Service Award from the Miami Herald. A native of Miami, he graduated Valedictorian of Hialeah Miami-Lakes High School and first in his class from the University of Miami. In 1990, he earned a J.D., cum laude, from the University of Pennsylvania Law School. During his tenure as student body president, he created the first mandatory pro bono law school program of its type in the United States. In 1992, he helped found the Hurricane Andrew Disaster Assistance Center, where he and his law firm colleagues at Steel Hector & Davis provided free legal services to the citizens of Homestead, Florida.



PRESTON FOSTER
Atlanta, Georgia

Foster, 37, is a District Sales Manager for AT&T in Atlanta. A native of Hyde Park, N.Y., he graduated from Oakwood College in 1978 with a B.S. in Business Administration. He received a M.P.A. from the Kennedy School at Harvard in 1991. In 1986, he founded Business Associates of America to promote minority business development in Alabama. In 1987, he was a business advisor to "Take 6," a five-time Grammy Award winning jazz vocal group. He is a volunteer at the Atlanta InRoads Program and the National Alliance of Business Youth Motivation Task Force.



MÉGAN GOLDEN
New York, New York

Golden, 28, an attorney, is a Skadden Fellow at Neighborhood Defender Services of Harlem, an innovative, community-based public defender's office. She represents indigent Harlem residents in matters ranging from housing to civil rights. She received her J.D., magna cum laude, from N.Y.U. School of Law, where she was a Root-Tilden-Snow Scholar. She won the Maurice Goodman Prize for Outstanding Scholarship and Character. Raised in Washington, D.C., she earned a B.A. in political science from Brown University in 1987. In 1987-88, she served as a New York City Urban Fellow, where she worked to improve city elections.



DAVID C. IGLESIAS
Albuquerque, New Mexico

Iglesias, 36, is the director of the Albuquerque City Attorney's Civil Rights Division, which defends the city police and its officers in federal civil rights lawsuits. Born in Panama, he spent his early years with the Kuna tribe, one of the few unconquered native peoples in the Americas. A 1980 graduate of Wheaton College, he played varsity football. He graduated from the University of New Mexico School of Law in 1984. In 1985, he served as an active duty U.S. Navy Judge Advocate, where he was a defense counsel in a court-martial which was the basis for the motion picture "A Few Good Men." After leaving active duty in 1988, Iglesias was a white-collar prosecutor with the New Mexico Attorney General's Office in Santa Fe, New Mexico. He writes for Native Peoples magazine and is a Lieutenant Commander in the United States Naval Reserve.



JEFFREY L. KANG
Wayland, Massachusetts

Kang, 38, is a geriatrician and Executive Director of the Urban Medical Group, a non-profit medical practice that cares for the frail elderly, homebound, indigent and HIV positive residents of Boston. He is on the staff of Boston's Beth Israel Hospital and a Clinical Instructor at Harvard Medical School. He is the Vice-Chairman of the Massachusetts Board of Registration in Medicine. He has volunteered as a paralegal for the United Farm Workers Union and served as the Chairman of Boston's Asian American Unity Dinner. His parents immigrated from Shanghai, China, and he was born and raised in New Jersey. He received his B.A. from Harvard College, M.D. from UC San Francisco, and his MPH from UC Berkeley.

SHARON C. KIELY
Middletown, New Jersey

Kiely, 36, is Director of Medical Ambulatory Care at The Western Pennsylvania Hospital, a community teaching hospital. She founded and directs a program that provides homebound elderly persons with regular medical care at home. Born in New Jersey, she earned a B.S. in 1980, and an M.D. in 1984 from Georgetown University. During the fall of 1983, she volunteered as a member of a team of healthcare workers sent to a Thai refugee camp. Later, she completed her training in primary care internal medicine at St. Vincent's Hospital and Medical Center in New York City. She is a Clinical Assistant Professor of Medicine at the University of Pittsburgh School of Medicine.

MICHAEL LEVITAN
Wyncote, Pennsylvania

Levitan, 36, is Country Director in Thailand for Save the Children. He supervises an integrated rural development program that is helping disadvantaged Thai communities combat poverty and environmental degradation. Prior to posting in Thailand, he worked with Save the Children programs in Bangladesh and Nepal. He began a career in international development at Dartmouth College, where he was a Rufus Choate Scholar, graduated with honors and high distinction and played four intercollegiate sports. After a short stint with the State Department, he served with the Peace Corps in Senegal. After Peace Corps service, he earned an M.B.A. and an M.A. in International Agricultural Economics from Stanford University. He also worked at the World Bank and Agency for International Development.

MARCEL T. THOMAS
Dixon, California

Thomas, 32, is a Special Forces Captain in the U.S. Army. Born in San Francisco, he received his bachelor's degree in civil/environmental engineering from Stanford University, where he graduated as a ROTC Distinguished Military Graduate. He earned an M.B.A. and a master's degree in industrial engineering from Columbia University. He has served as a detachment commander and special projects officer for the 5th Special Forces Group (Airborne) and has been involved in numerous humanitarian assistance and military operations in Africa and the Middle East. One year ago, Bob Patricelli & I stood before this gathering and kicked off "Leadership & Commitment" -- a far-reaching fund raising effort that seeks to put the WHF program on solid financial footing.

At that time, we had commitments for \$1.1 million(M). I am delighted to announce that we have now more than doubled that amount, having received 3-5 year pledges totalling \$2.3M. This is an enormous step forward for an organization that had an endowment of \$337 thousand(K) in 1991, \$430K in 1994, and has an endowment of \$660K now.

We have a ways to go, however. I'd like to share with you five observations about our success and the challenges remaining:

- 1.) It's important to understand why we've been successful. The following ingredients were key:
 - An all-star cast of committed campaign leaders who gave of their time, talent and treasure.
 - Several very generous individuals who led the way for others by raising their gifts above historical levels. Thirteen individuals pledged between \$25,000 and \$100,000 each, contributing 30% of total pledges. We are deeply grateful for their abiding commitment to the program and generous spirits.
 - Strong corporate support, which in each case, resulted from having a WHF alum or friend lead the proposal effort. Special thanks to Dana Mead and Art House (Tenneco), Bob Patricelli (Value Health) Ron Baukol (3M), Jane Pfeiffer (Cummins Engine), Kathy and Walter Wriston (GE Foundation), and Fred Benson and Steve Hill (Weyerhaeuser), among others.

- Faithful assistance and counsel from Brooke Shearer and the Commission staff, who helped within the confines of their status as Federal employees.
 - The high esteem in which our nation's leaders and philanthropists hold the WHF program. The reservoir of goodwill and respect for this program runs deep.
 - The professional counsel and project management services of Don Corrao and Community Counselling Services, without whom we could not have done this.
- 2.) While \$2.3M sound like a lot, it represents pledges, not cash in hand. Since these pledges will not be paid in total until the Year 2000, the program will continue to run a cash flow deficit until then. This necessitates continued fund raising efforts.
- 3.) We still have not reached our goal of having the program be self-supporting. That requires that an additional \$2.7M be raised -- \$.4M to fully fund the education program, and \$2.3M for long-term endowment to secure and safeguard the program.
- 4.) Analysis shows that the greatest remaining potential for giving is with the alumni. Fifty-nine percent of alumni have contributed to the campaign; almost 200 alumni have not. You can help in the following ways:
- Make a pledge if you have not already. Talk to your Class Chair and classmates if your class participation is low.
 - If you made a one-time gift, extend it to a 3-5 year pledge.
 - If you work for, or have a relationship with, a corporation or foundation that might support the campaign, lead the proposal effort.
- 5.) INSTRUCTIONS FOR ENTRY TO WHITE HOUSE THURSDAY, MAY 4 AT 4:00 PM

Because of the heightened security throughout Washington, D.C., and the rest of the country for that matter, the White House has made some specific requests concerning our arrival at the White House today.

They would like to avoid a crowd of us standing on the street, so they we requested we arrive by bus. Buses will be here at Ft. McNair to take us to the White House in ample time for the event. The buses will also take our guests/spouses to the Hay Adams for tea, so they can get on the buses with you.

The buses will take us to the East Visitors' Gate--the entrance on East Executive Drive next to the Treasury Department. White House Security will come on the buses and check photo identification. You must have a photo identification. When everyone on the bus has been cleared, everyone on the bus will be taken as a group into the White House. The buses will arrive at the White House between 3:15 and 3:45. Everyone will be cleared in before 4:00 PM. The President has blocked off an hour of his time and the reception is from 4:00 until 6:00 PM.

If for some reason you cannot ride the buses to the White House, but plan on going to the White House, you should not arrive before 3:30 PM. The White House will not clear you early, and they do not want a group of people waiting at the gate.

At 5:45 the buses will be available for boarding to return you to Ft. McNair, if you have left a car there or need to return for some other reason. They will leave as they are full. The last buses will not leave the White House until the event is completely over (after 6:00 PM) and everyone is out of the White House, so you cannot miss the last bus. If you do not wish to return to Ft. McNair, there is no need to get back on the bus.

Thank you for your cooperation. The White House has planned a wonderful reception. We hope you will enjoy the event.

Attached are three exhibits which provide alumni an update of the White House Fellows Foundation's investment portfolio as of March 31, 1994; and the assets and liabilities, as well as the revenue and expenses for the first seven months of the current fiscal year. Exhibit I is an Income Statement reflecting revenue and expenses for the seven month period ended March 31, 1995 and for the year ended August 31, 1994. Exhibit II is a Balance Sheet and depicts the Foundation's assets, liabilities and the fund balance as of the end of those same periods. Exhibit III describes the Foundation's investment portfolio values as of March 31, 1995.

The "Revenue" section of Exhibit I shows Total Revenue of \$435,875. Donations to date are double those received in the entire prior fiscal year, reflecting the tremendous success of the capital campaign launched at the annual meeting last May. (Thru March 31, 1995, actual donations/commitments total about \$2.25 million and continue to rise.) Program expenses for the seven months of the current fiscal year total \$44,000 -- well below the \$104,000 authorized for the full Program year. After deducting "Total Expenses" of \$114,000, there was a "Net Profit" of \$322,000.

In Exhibit II, "Total Assets" have more than doubled from the August 31, 1994 level (from \$1.3 million to \$2.7 million). There has been a substantial increase in the level of cash (due to fundraising) from \$43,287 to \$84,468. Through March, the level of net pledges receivable also doubled.

The market value of the investment portfolio as described in Exhibit III stands at \$660,099 with a projected annual income of close to \$33,000. This reflects substantial cash contributions of almost \$235,000 in the January to March timeframe. The last quarter's portfolio performance at 2.86% was disappointing when compared to the performance of the Dow Jones at 8.4% and the S&P 500 at 9.0%. Prudent investment opportunities consistent with Board guidelines will continue to be sought and implemented by our investment counsel, de Garmo & Kelleher.

Finally, new auditors -- Argy, Wiltse & Robinson (AWR) -- were chosen this past year through a competitive process. AWR completed an audited review of the prior year's Income Statement as well as completed the 1993 Form 990 "Return of Organization Exempt from Federal Income Tax" for the White House Fellows Foundation for the year ending August 31, 1994. A couple of minor internal financial control procedures were recommended by the auditors and were quickly implemented by the Board.

The White House Fellows Foundation (the Foundation) is a District of Columbia Not-For-Profit Corporation, established in 1969 and organized to operate exclusively for charitable, scientific, literary and/or educational purposes within the meaning of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954. Specifically, the purpose of the Foundation is to support the White House Fellows educational program financially, to broaden the Foundation members' understanding of government and the problems confronting government, and to encourage members' contribution to public service and the education of the public at large.

The significant accounting policies followed by the Foundation are described below:

Investments

The Foundation has been funded over the years by alumni, other foundations, and corporate gifts. The Foundation's investment strategies are established by the Board of Directors and are designed to achieve long-term growth (for the benefit of future Fellows) and income (for the benefit of current Fellows). The soundness of this strategy depends ultimately on the performance of the investments as well as the control of expenditures. The Board monitors these activities on an ongoing basis.

Pledges receivable and deferred revenue

Pledges receivable represent legally enforceable pledges, less an allowance for uncollectible amounts, which are recorded in the year the pledges are made. Pledges for support of current operations are recorded as revenue while pledges for support of future operations are recorded as deferred revenue.

Marketable securities

Investments in marketable securities are stated in the aggregate at the lower of cost or fair market value. For purposes of determining the loss or gain on a sale, the cost of securities sold is determined on a first-in, first-out basis. Monies in excess of current operating requirements are invested in money market accounts, common stocks and notes issued by the Federal National Mortgage Association and the United States Treasury.

Income taxes

The Foundation is a not-for-profit organization exempt from income taxes under the provisions of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.

Cash and cash equivalents

All highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less when purchased are classified as cash equivalents.

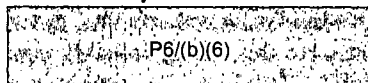

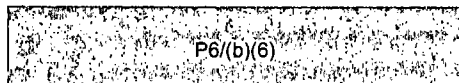

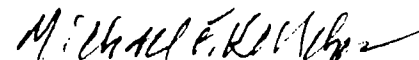

Enclosed please find our most recent report of the securities for the White House Fellows valued as of March 31, 1995. The market value as of that date was \$660,099 with a projected annual income of \$32,983. This figure is well above the December value (\$410,044) reflecting contributions of \$234,950 during the quarter, largely in the last 45 days of the period. Adjusted for the contributions the investment return is 2.86% which is disappointing in light of good gains in stocks although the timing of the contributions was a major factor. The fund experienced withdrawals in 1993 and most of 1994 but the contributions from the campaign have doubled the size of the assets in the last 6 months. Obviously, we are working to stay appropriately invested for the increased size of the account.

We did invest in additional stocks and some bonds in the quarter but the amount of cash is still sizable (almost 20%) and reflects our attempts to move deliberately in investing the additional funds. We will continue to build positions for both stocks and bonds. We added Abbots Labs, American International Group, du Pont and York International to the portfolio while also increasing existing positions of Archer Daniels, Banc One, Federal Realty, Minnesota Mining and Nextel.

The economy has continued to do nicely although its growth is now perceived as being less threatening by the Federal Reserve and thus interest rates have fallen since year end 1994. Lower interest rates, no signs of inflation and continuing good earnings have helped push stocks to record levels. The one troubling element in the current climate is the action of the dollar which has been largely ignored by the financial markets. The consequences of this erosion are far reaching. The value of the dollar affects the willingness of foreign investors to purchase our bonds to finance our deficit and creates potential inflationary pressures if foreign companies try to raise prices to maintain margins. Fortunately, competitive pressures have limited sizable price increases. However, U.S. exports are much more competitive and U.S. assets are now on sale, particularly for German and Japanese buyers whose currencies have been so strong against the dollar.

I look forward to reviewing our report with you.

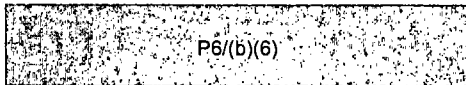

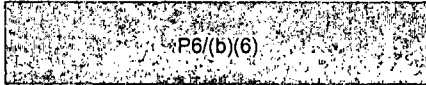

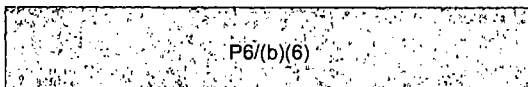
