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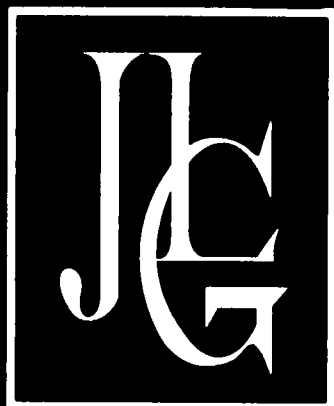

What is the Junior League of Greenville?

Mission Statement:

The Junior League of Greenville, Inc. is a non-profit organization of women committed to promoting voluntarism and to improving the community through the effective action and leadership of trained volunteers. The League's purpose is exclusively educational and charitable.

Reaching Out Statement:

The Junior League of Greenville, Inc. reaches out to women of all races, religions and national origins who demonstrate an interest in and commitment to voluntarism.

In other words, the Junior League of Greenville is a group of diverse, enthusiastic, and hard-working women who commit a major portion of their lives to improving life in Greenville, particularly for its children.

From its roots in 1929, as a group of twenty women called the Junior Charities, the Junior League of Greenville has grown into an organization of over 1200 Active, Provisional and Sustaining members. In 1993, a coalition was formed with the Anderson Junior League and the Spartanburg Junior League to create the Upstate Junior Leagues. Our affiliation with the Association of Junior Leagues International, Inc. also makes us part of a network of over 280 Leagues throughout the United States, Canada, Mexico and Great Britain.

Where does the Junior League of Greenville focus its attention?

In order to assure that the volunteer time and monetary contributions of JLG make a worthwhile impact on the community, the membership voted to focus its efforts based on three focusing statements dealing primarily with children's health and welfare, education and families.

Focus Statements:

1. The Junior League of Greenville, Inc. believes that the health and welfare of our community's children is of vital importance to all citizens. We support programs that address the prevention of adolescent pregnancy, promote proper prenatal care, and promote child care in an environment that is safe, loving, and developmentally appropriate, all of which are critical factors in insuring that children are given the best possible chance to develop to their greatest potential.
2. Believing that strong families are the cornerstone of a viable community, the Junior League of Greenville, Inc. supports programs that address the essential need for food and shelter, provide counseling and support services for dysfunctional families, provide for parental support and education, and empower parents to be effective and loving caretakers.
3. The quality of public education impacts significantly upon the future of our community, and the Junior League of Greenville, Inc. supports programs that enhance educational opportunities for children.

As a result of this focused approach, JLG proudly serves Greenville with three important ongoing projects: Partnership for Families, Project R.E.S.P.E.C.T., and the Awareness Team (see insert). All of these projects were created by our membership and represent a significant donation of time and dollars to the community.

How we serve Greenville.

It takes time. The members of JLG contribute more than 50,000 volunteer hours annually to community service. Each Active member in the League commits herself to a volunteer placement annually. These placements cover a broad range of needs in the community and focus on education, enrichment of arts, health care and welfare. In addition to volunteer placements in the community, many members serve within the League on committees that help train members and administer to the needs of the League.

It takes money. The Junior League of Greenville has raised over \$1 million for the community through ongoing fund raising projects, including the Nearly New Shop through the sale of cookbooks, and special intensive fund-raising events every three years.

The Nearly New Shop is a retail store offering quality new and used merchandise at affordable prices. It is staffed by volunteers of the League and the inventory comes from donations by JLG members. The Nearly New Shop has been a fund-raiser for JLG since 1948, and more than \$70,000 in proceeds from the Shop are contributed annually to Greenville community projects.

Greenville Junior League Publications promotes the sale of two excellent cookbooks *Uptown Down South* and *300 Years of Carolina Cooking*. These books are sold throughout the country and proceeds have contributed significantly to the League's ability to contribute to the community.

Membership Criteria

The basic qualities for a prospective member of the Junior League of Greenville are that she be a woman between the age of 21 and 39, a resident of Greenville County, show a keen interest in voluntarism, a commitment to community service, and an interest in developing her potential for voluntary community participation. Each new member must complete an intensive Provisional training course designed to educate the member about the community and the Junior League. 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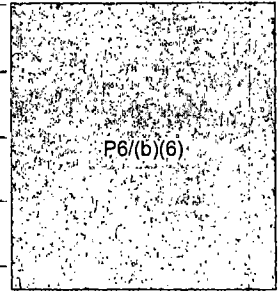

FINANCIAL REPORT

During the fiscal year ending May 31, 1995, the Junior League of Greenville, Inc. received \$255,163 in income and incurred \$246,559 in expenses. Of the total expenses incurred, \$100,372 were support expenses (those administrative expenses required to run the League) and \$146,187 were program expense (contributions to the community).

Awareness Team

Originally formed as a teen peer panel, concentrating on the prevention of teen pregnancy, The Awareness Team has sharpened its focus toward the promotion of abstinence as a viable alternative for today's teens. This goal is accomplished by recruiting and training teens, who have made the decision to remain abstinent during their teen years, to talk openly as a panel to groups of teens and adults regarding their decision. These teens provide a positive role model to other teens struggling with difficult decisions regarding their own sexuality.

The Awareness Team is fully funded by the Junior League of Greenville. This funding has allowed the Team to address thousands of young people across the state of South Carolina. Whether the Team is addressing a church group or a community center, the Team and the Junior League are providing excellent role models to teens who may have no positive role models in their lives.

Partnership For Families

A private, non-profit organization developed through the initiative of the Junior League of Greenville in 1990, Partnership for Families was established with the help of various community groups including the Greenville Urban League, Greenville's Child and the City of Greenville.

The purpose of Partnership for Families is to provide prevention oriented support to families living in low income neighborhood settings through family support centers. These centers provide families with positive support by integrating existing community resources and offering them in a focused and comprehensive program which is located and administered at the neighborhood level.

Project R.E.S.P.E.C.T.

Sponsored by the Junior League of Greenville, Project RESPECT is dedicated to alerting parents to the detrimental effects of sex and violence in the media, specifically that which is targeted to our youth. The Project RESPECT team offers its 20-minute slide presentation to PTA's, church groups, civic groups and non-profit gatherings. It is a shocking exposé that wakes up parents and gets them talking about the problems involved with rock videos, teen magazines, cable television and even network "family programming". Fully researched, Project Respect also covers the areas of video games, gangsta rap, and bestselling pre-teen literature.

Project RESPECT does not promote censorship, but it does offer tangible solutions to help parents regain control of what their children are exposed to. And ways to help children make positive choices for themselves. The committee has offered its presentation to Junior Leagues across the nation.

V.I.S.I.O.N. Grants

V.I.S.I.O.N. Grants were developed by the Long Range Planning Committee to disburse the remaining \$72,352 raised from the Dinamation Fundraiser. This grant opportunity stands for Volunteers Involved in Strategies to create Innovative Opportunities Now. It was voted by the membership that the specific focus of the grants will be early childhood development. Guidelines have been established to be used in the review process.

Touchpoints

In association with Greenville's Child, Inc. and The Children's Hospital of The Greenville Hospital System, the Junior League of Greenville has joined in an innovative and unusual collaboration benefiting children and families in the upstate. World renowned pediatrician and author T. Berry Brazelton has selected Greenville as one of six national sites to work on the first national field test of "Touchpoints". "Touchpoints" are the predictable times in development at which a child's behavior seems to fall apart. The initial team will work in the areas of pediatrics, nursing, occupational therapy, social work and early childhood education. Development and support in parenting issues will be included in each phase of the project. Along with financial support, assistance in coordination of the project will be a two year placement for a Junior League member.
