I. PURPOSE

This event will give you an opportunity to highlight the Administration's anti-drug efforts. By honoring 98 schools that have made outstanding progress toward meeting the National Education Goal of having all schools free of drugs and safe for learning, you will reiterate your commitment to school and community safety.

I. BACKGROUND

The Safe and Drug-Free Schools Program (SDFSP) was established in 1994 to provide a comprehensive, coordinated approach to the prevention of alcohol, tobacco and other drug use by young people and to the prevention of school related violence. SDFSP administers state formula grants and discretionary grants; and provides technical assistance to schools in the development of comprehensive programs to prevent violence and drug use.

The Drug-Free Schools Recognition Program was created by the Department of Education in 1987 and expanded in 1992 to promote school safety and discipline. The purpose of the program is to acknowledge schools that have worked to achieve a safe, disciplined and drug-free environment -- or are making great strides toward that goal. To date, 467 schools have been honored; 107 of them last year.

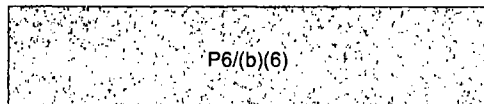

article on Johns Hopkins report. Teenagers are
having more health problems than ever as a result of

- increased violence.
- drug abuse
- un protected sex.

Study looked at 5,000 teens across US.

1 in 4 teens report being assaulted.

Number 1 type of abuse was sexual abuse.

1 in 10 teens have been either raped; abused by a
family member; or have had to physically fight off
an attack.

Violence causes major problems.

- Girls who have been sexually abused are 3 times
more likely to commit suicide.
- Boys who have been sex. abused are 3 times more
more likely to use drugs.

These problems are not confined to any particular
ethnic group or social class - THEY ARE PROBLEMS
ACROSS THE BOARD.
