THEME: Increased Federal Support for Children and Youth: New Funding Opportunities for Practice and Research

Substantial, recent increases in federal funds for practice and research have potential to increase mental health services for youth in schools and communities in today's tight budget climate. Psychologists often have the skills to effectively utilize these funds, but may lack the "nuts and bolts" details necessary to find and secure these funds.
