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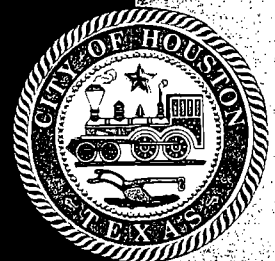

MEMORANDUM FOR THE PRESIDENT

SUBJECT: Long-Term Strategy on Littleton Aftermath

Doug, Karen, Loretta, and I have met with several White House offices, including the Vice President's and the First Lady's, to develop options for what the Administration can do to advance the national debate in the wake of the Littleton tragedy. These options are designed to 1) let the healing continue in Colorado and elsewhere; 2) help launch a serious national conversation on violence, the media, responsibility, and community; and 3) build pressure on Congress to seriously consider our gun and safe schools legislation.

1. Presidential Visit to Littleton: As you know, we are trying to determine by week's end when you can travel to Littleton, either to deliver the Columbine commencement on May 22 or to meet with families and the community in some other fashion.

 **2. White House Summit on Violence and the Media:** There is growing interest in a White House summit to launch the "national conversation" on the culture of violence that you and the First Lady spoke of last week. The Vice President's office has suggested a series of actions over the next five months, culminating with a National Town Hall on School Safety and Parental Involvement in September. Senators Lieberman and McCain (along with Reps. Markey and Burton) wrote today asking you to convene "an emergency summit meeting at the White House with the leaders of the entertainment industry."

It might make sense to do both. The Vice President's proposal would help reassure parents and students when school resumes in the fall, and would give us time over the summer to develop a truly interactive day of dialogue which, unlike a typical White House summit, would attempt to involve communities and middle and high schools across the country via the Internet and cable. But we should also consider convening a smaller, more immediate meeting in mid-May, because we risk losing some of the urgency of this debate if we wait until the fall. One option would be to summon entertainment, media, and Internet leaders to the White House for a three-hour meeting, without the usual break-outs and run-up that accompany a typical summit. (That also would enable you to challenge the entertainment industry before your trip to Los Angeles on May 15.)

The Vice President has lined up some good announcements to make next week --

including an agreement with major internet service providers to provide a single, standardized, one-click menu that would enable parents to filter or block access to inappropriate material, and review a list of Web sites their children had recently visited.

3. Katie Couric Interview: If you're ready to commit to a summit, you could announce it in a Today show interview with Katie Couric that would air Friday. This is also a good chance to repeat your message about the culture of violence and the urgent need for legislation on guns.

4. Counterscheduling on Guns: Your impassioned speech yesterday about the gun culture led all three networks. Already, spokesmen for the gun industry have signaled that they're prepared to accept your proposals on gun shows and trigger locks. We should look for every opportunity to maintain the pressure on this issue. The Secret Service probably would not allow you to visit a gun show, but perhaps we could visit a community where a gun show is going on. Or you might take your case to a reasonable sportsmen's group -- ideally in an unexpected place like Boise or Las Vegas on your upcoming western swing.

5. Safe Schools Legislation: Sometime in the next ten days, you should announce your safe schools bill, which will include increased funding for counselors, mandatory counseling for young people who bring guns to school, expanded character education, alternative placements for disruptive youth, and so on. This legislation can be ready anytime: for example, you could do a safe schools event with Lee Brown on your trip to Houston May 7th.

6. White House Conference on Mental Health: This conference on June 7th will attract even more attention in the wake of Littleton. We will make sure that it places a strong emphasis on youth and violence. At the First Lady's suggestion, we are exploring the possibility of requiring insurers to provide greater parity in mental health coverage for young people.

7. Address to Parents: At some point, you should find a venue to speak directly to parents about their responsibilities, as well as about the challenges they face in finding more time to be with their families and getting more involved in their children's lives. We have a couple of announcements we have been saving: a Council of Economic Advisers report on the time crunch for working families, and the formal announcement of our parental discrimination bill.

8. High School Commencement Outside Colorado: Some people have suggested that in addition to the Columbine commencement, you do a commencement to reassure students and parents at another typical, all-American high school (such as Squirrel Hill in Pittsburgh).

9. Town Hall with Young People: As you saw at T.C. Williams High School, young people are eager to talk about this issue, and we need to keep listening. The Vice President is doing a town hall on MSNBC tonight; Nightline did one last week; CNN has another tomorrow. We will encourage Cabinet members and other principals to keep doing these. You should let us know if you would like to do one yourself.

SUBJECT: Agency Efforts on behalf of Littleton, Colorado School Shootings

* Connotes new information

INCIDENT UPDATE

According to Sheriff Steve Davis, there are fifteen (15) confirmed fatalities; two of which include the suspects. Of the fifteen, eleven (11) are male and four (4) are female. One of the victims is reported to be an adult. In addition, thirty (30) explosive devices were found in the school, one suspect's vehicle in the school parking lot, and in the suspects' residence. Investigators will enter the school this morning and early afternoon to conduct a search and to take photos. After the photos and first search is complete, local officials will commence a major investigation involving agents from several jurisdictions. Sheriff Davis also reported that he will update the press every hour on the half hour. His last statement was at 10:30a.m.

AGENCY EFFORTS

The Department of Education

* The Department of Education reiterated their commitment toward helping to fund long term costs associated with counseling services for students and school officials.

Secretary Riley called the Jefferson County School Superintendent this morning to offer any assistance to the community. Specifically, the Secretary outlined joint efforts between the Department of Education, Justice, and HHS to provide crisis counselors and any other assistance that is needed. Additionally, Secretary Riley and the Department of Education (DOEd) provided local officials with contact names and numbers for those officials seeking federal assistance. The DOEd has made the following contacts:

- William Molonoy, Chief State School Officer, Colorado: Judith Johnson called Mr. Molonoy and offered assistance; DOEd will follow-up this afternoon.
- Susan Goren, President, National Association of School Psychologists: Susan offered help of NASP in providing assistance to the school system.

- Jenelle Kruger, Safe and Drug Free Schools Program Coordinator, Colorado: State Education Agency: Assistance of SDFS Program was offered.

- Marleen Wong, Director of Mental Health, Los Angeles Public Schools: Marleen has been instrumental in helping various communities that have experienced crisis similar to Colorado. Marleen offered her help in this effort.

- Kathryn Thurman, Director, Office for Victims of Crime, Department of Justice. OVC and SDFS have joint agreement with National Office for Victims of Crime to form crisis response teams and send those teams where they are needed. Kathryn has been working with community victim advocates and feels that the community is very well prepared to deal with this crisis.

Throughout this afternoon, DOEd is in contact with the Superintendent of Jefferson County schools and find out what assistance is needed. DOEd can offer the following:

- Identification of persons who can provide crisis counseling assistance and payment to get those persons to Colorado.
- Identification of persons who have experienced similar tragedies to provide "hands on" help in days immediately following incident. We can pay for travel and per diem of these persons.
- Identification of persons who can help the school district plan a long-term recovery effort which DOEd is currently working on in Springfield, Oregon. DOEd will pay the costs of getting people to Colorado.
- Identification of Security Experts. Often after such a shooting a school district wants to do a thorough review of its school safety plans, policies, etc. DOEd can help identify a person(s) to conduct such a review and will pay costs of getting person to Colorado.

The Department of Treasury

* Treasury is sending two (2) chaplains and between 4-5 agents who have specific training and expertise with trauma situations and counseling for law enforcement personnel, specifically ATF and police, and other first responders. These teams have been used during the Waco, Oklahoma City, and TWA crash incidents. These agents will provide peer support based on first hand knowledge and experience in dealing with the stresses that officials will feel immediately and long term. This team's expertise is also available to anyone else needing such counseling

According to the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms (ATF), 13 ATF investigators are on the scene in addition to two (2) canine handlers and two (2) explosive enforcement officers. ATF was asked by the County Sheriff to assist in clearing the scene of explosive devices and was concluded at 1:30am Denver time. Seven (7) destructive devices were found in the trunk of one suspect's vehicle and 12 small devices were found inside the school. ATF's crime scene mapping system has also been requested by the County Sheriff. ATF will also be involved in tracing firearms described as two (2) sawed-off shotguns, one handgun and one carbine. In addition, ATF will help canvass explosive licenses in an effort to determine who purchased explosives related to this incident. ATF will send a peer support team, including two chaplains, to provide services to the victims, witnesses and investigators.

The Department of Justice

Along with the ATF, FBI agents are on the ground providing technical assistance to local law enforcement officials. They are not active in the investigation as it is considered a local effort at this point. Additionally, these agents may provide added security to the local hospitals and funerals if requested and needed.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency

The FEMA State Director is contacting the local officials to assess needs in dealing with the ongoing community relations initiatives. FEMA officials involved in the Jonesboro incident have been put in contact with the county sheriff in Littleton. These FEMA personnel will provide guidance and expertise to those in Littleton. Two (2) FEMA Public Affairs officials will travel to Colorado to work with state and county officials.

The Department of Health and Human Services

* Services are being used quite heavily with hundreds of parents and students receiving counseling in various centers set up throughout the surrounding area. HHS expressed concern from officials in Colorado about the ripple effect on surrounding school students indirectly impacting students. School students in proximity to Columbine are expressing concerns by students with regard to their own safety in their schools. The short-term efforts seem to be proceeding well, but there is concern about long term funding issues with respect to counseling services. DOEd has expressed their commitment toward assisting in the long term efforts.

* The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA): CMHS (Center for Mental Health Services) has been in contact today with Fred Acosta, the Colorado State Disaster Mental Health Program Coordinator, to offer technical assistance if requested by the State. Currently, the state is requesting that counselors and assistance not be sent as they are concerned with the volume of response of numerous mental health professionals wanting to provide services.

HHS' Center for Mental Health Services has contacted the Colorado State Mental Health Director to offer assistance with crisis counseling if requested. In addition, the Surgeon General stands ready to provide assistance.

PURPOSE: To offer condolences to the parents of Lauren Townsend, who was killed during the Columbine High School shooting.

BACKGROUND: Lauren was 18 years old.

Lauren was the captain of the girls' varsity volleyball team, coached by her mother. Other players said she was "consumed" by the sport.

She was a member of the National Honor Society and was a strong candidate for valedictorian. She planned to attend Colorado State University on an academic scholarship and become a wildlife biologist, like her oldest brother.

ACTIONS TO HELP KEEP OUR SCHOOLS SAFE**

"We must do more to keep guns out of the hands of children; to help our young people express their anger and alienation with words, not weapons; to prevent violence from shattering the peace of our schoolyards. By taking actions to prevent future acts of violence in our schools, we can best honor the memories of those who lost their lives."

Today, at the White House, President Clinton announced new assistance for the community of Littleton, Colorado and added resources for communities to help keep students safe at school. Specifically, he announced up to \$1.5 million in immediate funding from the Justice Department to assist the victims, their families, and the Jefferson County community with expenses relating to the Littleton school shooting; and \$70 million in Justice Department grants to help fund more than 600 school resource officers in 336 communities across the country.

EXPANDING ASSISTANCE TO VICTIMS. In response to the recent tragedy at Columbine High School, and subsequent requests from Colorado authorities, the Justice Department will provide up to \$1.5 million in immediate funds from the Crime Victims' Fund to support:

- Direct compensation to victims and their family members for funerals, uncovered medical expenses, lost wages of parents, and private mental health counseling for victims;
- Additional personnel and overtime costs for critical incident stress management services for first responders to the crisis; and
- Added victims services and counseling personnel to help meet the immediate and longer-term support needs of the community.

HELPING SCHOOLS WORK WITH LAW ENFORCEMENT TO PREVENT CRIME AND VIOLENCE. The President announced that the Justice Department COPS Office will release \$70 million to fund an additional 600 police officers in schools in 336 communities across the country. Today's announcement is the first installment in meeting the President's pledge made at the White House Conference on School Safety to provide funds for up to 2,000 officers in schools this fiscal year. In addition, the COPS Office is providing \$17 million through a School-Based Partnerships initiative. The funds will help strengthen partnerships between local law enforcement and schools, and help them to focus on school crime, drug use, and discipline problems. Schools have until the end of April to apply for these funds.

PROMOTING COMPREHENSIVE SCHOOL SAFETY STRATEGIES. The President urged communities to apply for funds through the Safe Schools/Healthy Students Initiative. This initiative will provide up to \$180 million this year -- and a total of \$380 million over the next three years -- to help 50 communities develop and implement violence prevention programs, such as establishing conflict resolution groups, hiring more mental health counselors, or installing security equipment. A product of the White House School Safety Conference, this initiative represents an unprecedented collaboration between the Departments of Justice, Education, and Health and Human Services to provide comprehensive educational, law enforcement, mental health, juvenile justice, and other services to help communities prevent youth violence and drug abuse, in and out of school. Communities have until June 1st to apply for funds under this initiative.

DISTRIBUTING ADDITIONAL GUIDES ON THE EARLY WARNING SIGNS OF VIOLENCE. Next week, the Departments of Justice and Education will distribute 150,000 additional copies of *Early Warning Timely Response: A Guide to Safe Schools*. The guide, written for teachers, principals, parents, and others who work with young people, provides information on how to identify and respond to the early warning signs of troubled youth that can lead to violence in schools. The guide also helps schools develop a crisis procedure checklist if violence occurs, and lists actions students can take to help make their schools safer. INCIDENT UPDATE

According to Sheriff Steve Davis, there are fifteen (15) confirmed fatalities; two of which include the suspects. Of the fifteen, eleven (11) are male and four (4) are female. One of the victims is reported to be an adult. In addition, thirty (30) explosive devices were found in the school, one suspect's vehicle in the school parking lot, and in the suspects' residence. Investigators will enter the school this morning and early afternoon to conduct a search and to take photos. After the photos and first search is complete, local officials will commence a major investigation involving agents from several jurisdictions. Sheriff Davis also reported that he will update the press every hour on the half hour. His last statement was at 10:30a.m.

AGENCY EFFORTS

The Department of Education

* The Department of Education reiterated their commitment toward helping to fund long term costs associated with counseling services for students and school officials.

Secretary Riley called the Jefferson County School Superintendent this morning to offer any assistance to the community. Specifically, the Secretary outlined joint efforts between the Department of Education, Justice, and HHS to provide crisis counselors and any other assistance that is needed. Additionally, Secretary Riley and the Department of Education (DOEd) provided local officials with contact names and numbers for those officials seeking federal assistance. - Kathryn Thurman, Director, Office for Victims of Crime, Department of Justice. OVC and SDFS have joint agreement with National Office for Victims of Crime to form crisis response teams and send those teams where they are needed. Kathryn has been working with community victim advocates and feels that the community is very well prepared to deal with this crisis.

Throughout this afternoon, DOEd is in contact with the Superintendent of Jefferson County schools and find out what assistance is needed. DOEd can offer the following:

- Identification of persons who can provide crisis counseling assistance and payment to get those persons to Colorado.
- Identification of persons who have experienced similar tragedies to provide "hands on" help in days immediately following incident. We can pay for travel and per diem of these persons.
- Identification of persons who can help the school district plan a long-term recovery effort which DOEd is currently working on in Springfield, Oregon. DOEd will pay the costs of getting people to Colorado.
- Identification of Security Experts. Often after such a shooting a school district wants to do a thorough review of its school safety plans, policies, etc. DOEd can help identify a person(s) to conduct such a review and will pay costs of getting person to Colorado.

The Department of Treasury

* Treasury is sending two (2) chaplains and between 4-5 agents who have specific training and expertise with trauma situations and counseling for law enforcement personnel, specifically ATF and police, and other first responders. These teams have been used during the Waco, Oklahoma City, and TWA crash incidents. These agents will provide peer support based on first hand knowledge and experience in dealing with the stresses that officials will feel immediately and long term. This team's expertise is also available to anyone else needing such counseling

According to the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms (ATF), 13 ATF investigators are on the scene in addition to two (2) canine handlers and two (2) explosive enforcement officers. ATF was asked by the County Sheriff to assist in clearing the scene of explosive devices and was concluded at 1:30am Denver time. Seven (7) destructive devices were found in the trunk of one suspect's vehicle and 12 small devices were found inside the school. ATF's crime scene mapping system has also been requested by the County Sheriff. ATF will also be involved in tracing firearms described as two (2) sawed-off shotguns, one handgun and one carbine. In addition, ATF will help canvass explosive licenses in an effort to determine who purchased explosives related to this incident. ATF will send a peer support team, including two chaplains, to provide services to the victims, witnesses and investigators.

The Department of Justice

Along with the ATF, FBI agents are on the ground providing technical assistance to local law enforcement officials. They are not active in the investigation as it is considered a local effort at this point. Additionally, these agents may provide added security to the local hospitals and funerals if requested and needed.

The Federal Emergency Management Agency

The FEMA State Director is contacting the local officials to assess needs in dealing with the ongoing community relations initiatives. FEMA officials involved in the Jonesboro incident have been put in contact with the county sheriff in Littleton. These FEMA personnel will provide guidance and expertise to those in Littleton. Two (2) FEMA Public Affairs officials will travel to Colorado to work with state and county officials.

The Department of Health and Human Services

* Services are being used quite heavily with hundreds of parents and students receiving counseling in various centers set up throughout the surrounding area. HHS expressed concern from officials in Colorado about the ripple effect on surrounding school students indirectly impacting students. School students in proximity to Columbine are expressing concerns by students with regard to their own safety in their schools. The short-term efforts seem to be proceeding well, but there is concern about long term funding issues with respect to counseling services. DOEd has expressed their commitment toward assisting in the long term efforts.

* The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA): CMHS (Center for Mental Health Services) has been in contact today with Fred Acosta, the Colorado State Disaster Mental Health Program Coordinator, to offer technical assistance if requested by the State. Currently, the state is requesting that counselors and assistance not be sent as they are concerned with the volume of response of numerous mental health professionals wanting to provide services.

HHS' Center for Mental Health Services has contacted the Colorado State Mental Health Director to offer assistance with crisis counseling if requested. In addition, the Surgeon General stands ready to provide assistance.
