DRAFT (Please note, that as discussed this does not necessarily accurately reflect what I do now, but also includes what I think would be helpful to do.)

OVERVIEW:

The main objective of Special Assistant to AMH is to staff AMH in the more political and substantive roles:

- to ensure that she is substantively prepared for her meetings;
- to ensure that commitments made by AMH are kept, either by staff or by her;
- to keep an eye/ear open to make sure AMH informed about or involved in relevant issues;
- to handle some of her politically sensitive calls or issues.

MEETINGS:

- Ensure that she is prepared for meetings on a day-to-day basis (although Ruby has been responsible for making sure that staff turn in their briefing/event memos).
- Anticipate any needs for meetings AMH is responsible for organizing:
 - If an agenda or other materials are needed for distribution at the meeting, Special Assistant should prepare/gather relevant information.
 - If AMH has not been able to focus on the agenda or other aspects of the meeting that she might need to, Special Assistant should try to do get her to do so ahead of time.
- Attend appropriate meetings with AMH in order to note commitments she has made for her or OPL, and to track progress on issues.
- Attend appropriate meetings on behalf of AMH.

FOLLOW-UP:

- Following meetings, download commitments made to Lee or other staff where appropriate, and debrief on any developments appropriate staff ought to know.
- Track staff follow-up and AMH follow-up; and often make recommendations or observations to AMH about holes in follow-up. Also, execute AMH follow up as appropriate.
- Get download from AMH on follow-up generated at meetings that Special Assistant does not attend.
- Serve as a resource for staff in OPL, other White House departments, and occasionally other agencies who are trying to get answers to questions from AMH or get information to AMH on various issues.
- Request that relevant staff identify follow up in meetings Special Assistant was not at.

SUB-CABINET GROUPS:

I was originally assigned to help keep these on track from an OPL internal process perspective; this seems more appropriate for Lee than for AMH Special Assistant.

SPECIAL PROJECTS:

AMH Special Assistant is responsible for managing designated "special projects" on behalf of AMH. Some of these are ongoing, while others are not. Examples include:

- Affirmative Action: under AMH, managed coordination of meetings and conference calls around the speech.
- Base Voter Coordination with DNC: Set up bi-weekly meetings with DNC and manage follow-up out of these meetings.
- State Days: Have served as OPL contact for these.
- Gays and Lesbians: Serve as Marsha Scott's contact in OPL.
- Personnel or Administrative: I did more of this prior to Lee. This included helping orient newcomers to OPL (Kate and Betsy), following up on requests for mess privileges, etc.
- Special Briefings: Work with Danny to organize format for briefings like HRC fan club, HRC reunion. Also worked with Barbara Woolley, Dana Wyckoff, Beth Dozoretz, and Jeff Shulman to shape the first women's luncheon.
- OPL Systems: Worked closely with AMH prior to Lee on helping pilot new systems in OPL, such as the sub-cabinet groups.

SCHEDULING:

Currently

Coming out of meetings that I attend where AMH has agreed to set up another meeting, I either let Ruby know about that commitment so that she'll know what it is when she gets the call, or I will get a time from Ruby and set up the meeting myself.

Proposed

AMH has expressed that I be a little more involved in the scheduling process. The nature of this needs to be fleshed out further.

NOTE: One problem that makes it more difficult to develop a mechanism for coordination between Ruby and me is the inability to do much long-term scheduling and the frequency with which the schedule changes.

Better coordination might be helpful in terms of the organization of some meetings. I personally have not been aggressive about tracking meetings that I'm not naturally involved in, and occasionally there are holes that might have been prevented. For example, sometimes immediately prior to a meeting AMH has a question about something that wasn't set up the way she wanted, and neither Ruby nor I knew enough about it to have prevented the confusion/screw-up.

WRITING:

Edit and write memos from her that either she drafts or dictates, or that a staff person drafts for her.

PAPER:

Ruby takes primary responsibility for receiving and tracking paper.

- Special Assistant ought to look through the In-Box daily to identify any papers that are time sensitive, or that should get a response more quickly.
- Sort through papers into categories that are priority to AMH.
- Keep the files and track the information she would need or want to refer to on issues she is particularly engaged in.
- Oversee intern updating of binders for AMH: i.e. talking points, weekly Political summaries, etc.

POLITICAL:

Re-Elect activities seem like an appropriate area for Lee, but one where the Special Assistant, depending on who it is, could be helpful and ultimately will need to understand and be involved with to a certain extent.

MISCELLANEOUS:

- Sometimes work with staff to advise on what AMH looking for them in implementation of specific projects or memos
- Keep Occasionally apprise her of problems or good things I see in the office that she might not be aware of.
- Consider if Special Assistant should staff AMH more when she is travelling or outside of the office.
- Track priority and hot-button issues in which AMH is personally more engaged.

OTHER COMMENTS:

1. Communications: To date this has not included any work in the communications or press areas; however, there is clearly room for expansion to include those areas. Ruby currently deals with the process around responding to press calls into Alexis; however, I am not aware of extensive proactive work that goes on around AMH travel. I do think it would be quite easy to set up press interviews, and even editorial boards when AMH travels. As an example, I know that Julie Demeo does that for Carol Rasco when she travels.

2. Role Definition: I think it will be important to define more clearly the roles of Lee, Ruby and this person in the areas where they overlap. For example:

(a) Ruby and the Special Assistant: Although we've developed a pretty good system as we've gone along, I think Ruby and I could do a better job of coordinating in certain areas. This might include scheduling, some meeting preparation, longer term planning (which as we all know is complicated for a variety of reasons.)

(b) Lee and the Special Assistant: Although Lee and I have done a good job of communicating with each other several times daily to ensure coordination, over time clearer role definition might be helpful in terms of office memos, special projects, etc.

NOTE: During Steve's phase-out and prior to Lee's arrival, I often served as the point person for staff for coordinating and managing initiatives in the office, or working with staff to ensure that they were following through on what they needed to be doing. It is clearly more appropriate and effective for Lee to be doing this.

On the other hand, I think that for Lee's sake it is important though that she not get sucked into doing some of the things that AMH's special assistant should be doing -- this includes editing memos, tracking/doing smaller scale follow up, etc.

3. Constituency Work: I think this is a full time job, and I would not recommend one person being responsible for staffing AMH and a constituency. It is difficult to truly accomplish all that needs to be done both for AMH and for the constituency if that is the case. (Although it was helpful for me at times to have a constituency because I was automatically involved in and aware of some of the office activities to a degree that I otherwise might not have been.)

4. Sensitive Information: AMH's special assistant must be both loyal to AMH and trustworthy. This person has a tremendous amount of exposure both to sensitive information, and to many people in and out of the White House. For this reason, he/she should also have good judgement (including good political judgement).

5. WW/OEOB Coordination: I think it is important for the Special Assistant to be part of the OPL team, which may not naturally occur because of his/her physical location and because he/she is not coming from within OPL. I think it's really helpful to have relationships with people in OPL and for OPL staff to trust this person.

Special Assistant should definitely attend OPL OEOB staff meetings. If it's not too redundant, it might further be helpful to develop some kind of system for coordination between Lee, Special Assistant and Ruby on a weekly basis as well.

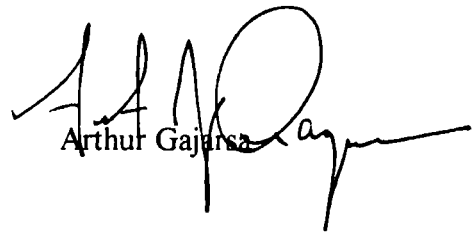

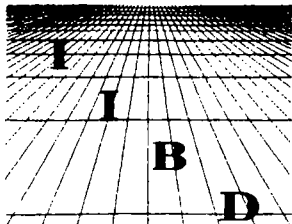

Dear Dr. Washington:

Thank you for your August 18, 1995, letter to the Attorney General, to which she has asked me to respond.

You raise several serious allegations about the conduct of certain members of the Los Angeles Police Department toward criminal suspects arising from claims allegedly made by former LAPD Officer Mark Fuhrman in a series of taped interviews. We are aware of these allegations through recent press accounts and share your concerns.

As you know, the Civil Rights Division of the Department of Justice has the authority to prosecute certain acts of police misconduct criminally and also to bring civil cases to enjoin patterns and practices of police misconduct. Indeed, we have recent experience with such matters through our work on the prosecution of the officers who violated Rodney King's civil rights.

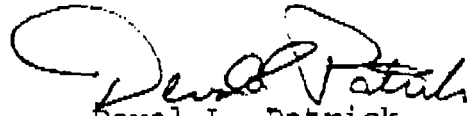
We will review the information you have provided and any other information you may have in this connection. In cooperation with the office of the United States Attorney for the Central District of California, Nora Manella, we will evaluate the material and conduct further investigation as warranted. Because of the need to avoid any possible interference with the pending People v. Simpson trial, however, certain aspects of the inquiry may need to be deferred until the trial is concluded.

Please do not hesitate to contact me directly with any further information. I am deeply committed to seeing that justice is done in matters of police misconduct and interested in a continuing dialogue with you on issues of concern to the Los Angeles community.

STATEMENT ON CONNECTING CALIFORNIA SCHOOLS
THE EXPLORATORIUM
SAN FRANCISCO, CALIFORNIA
SEPTEMBER 21, 1995

Today I am issuing a challenge to America to see to it that every classroom in the country is connected to the Information Superhighway.

To demonstrate that this is possible, I am announcing a giant step toward that future.

By the end of this school year, every school in California [12,000] will have access to the Internet and its vast world of knowledge. By the end of this school year, fully 20 percent of California's classrooms -- 2,500 kindergartens, elementary, middle, and high schools, from one end of this state to the other -- will be connected for computers.

If we can do it in California, we can do it in the rest of America. But the key is to have a real public-private partnership, as we've done here. The job of connecting California's schools will be undertaken by a wide alliance of private sector companies, among them: Sun Microsystems, Apple, Xerox/Parc, Oracle, 3Com, Silicon Graphics, Applied Materials, TCI, Cisco Systems.

My administration has brought these companies together, we have set the goals, but they are doing the rest. Just as the connecting of our classrooms is a model for the 21st century, so is the way we are doing it: With government as a catalyst, not as a blank check.

So today, I challenge business and industry and local governments throughout America to make a commitment of time and resources so that by the year 2000 every classroom in America will be connected.

Tens of millions of parents across this country have watched their children play every kind of video game, from Mortal Combat and Primal Rage, to Killer Instinct and Super Street Fighter.

Today, there is a new computer game in America: Learning. And we are going to put it at the disposal of every child in America by the end of the century.

Last month I announced a broad initiative to stop kids from being addicted to tobacco because it was bad for them. Today I hope to encourage a good habit: a lifelong commitment to learning. I want to get the children of America hooked on computers for education.

Our country was built on the value that we pass better lives and brighter opportunities on to the next generation. Education is the way we make this promise real. And today, at the dawn of a new century, in the midst of an information and communications revolution, education depends on computers.

If we make opportunity for every student a fact in a world of modems and megabytes, we will make the American Dream a reality - and not virtual reality, either.

The facts speak for themselves. Children with access to computers learn faster and test better. According to a new study [Apple Classrooms of Tomorrow, a 10-year report due out 9/30], scores on standardized tests for kids taught with computers went up by 10 to 15 percent; these kids mastered basic skills in 30 percent less time than they would have normally.

They also stayed in school. Absentees dropped from 8.4 percent to 4.7 percent. I cannot emphasize how important this is at a time when we want people to stay in school and get as much education as they can possibly get their hands on. Technology enriches education. It teaches kids how to learn better. [Could point to exhibits you saw.]

Technological literacy must be a standard. Preparing our children for a lifetime of computer use is as essential as teaching them to read, write, and do math.

With this effort, we are also reinforcing the core convictions that have stood us so well for so long. Computers offer a world that lives up to our highest hopes of equal opportunity for all...a world where you are judged not by the color of your skin, or your gender, or your family's income, but by your mind: how you express yourself on screen. If we can teach our children these values, if they can learn to respect themselves and each other, then we can be certain of stronger families, stronger communities, and a stronger country in the 21st century.

I can think of no better place for us to begin the mission of connecting America's schools than here in California. This state leads the world in technological innovation. Until now, however, this leadership stopped at the school-room door. California ranks 45th in the nation in the ratio of students to computers.

While suburban kids often have access to computers in their homes, other children -- in rural areas, in the inner cities -- pass their school years without coming close to the Information Superhighway. The longer they are kept away, the less chance they will have of building good lives in the global economy.

Well, thanks to the dedicated Americans gathered here today, all that is going to change. These companies, who compete vigorously

every day in the marketplace, have come together in the classroom. We shared with them our vision and they shared with us their ideas, their resources, their know-how. Every company is making a different contribution, but all are committed to the goal of connecting California. They know the future depends on it.

Sun Microsystems is organizing a coalition of companies and volunteers for Net Day...an effort to install networks in at least 2,000 schools...and the number is growing with each new company joining the effort. In the morning, volunteers will arrive at each school. By noon, they will have wired the library, the labs, the classrooms. By nightfall, our schools will have the technology they deserve.

Smart Valley -- a coalition of Silicon Valley companies -- has contributed \$15 million to put technology in the schools. Smart Valley has agreed to develop 500 model-technology schools over two years.

America On-Line has offered Internet services for a year. Even those phone companies that are always going after each other on TV have joined forces in this cause: AT&T will provide Internet access and voice mail to all California schools. Sprint will help connect schools. MCI will provide software for entry into the Internet and help connect schools. And Pacific Bell, which has led the way in linking California's schools, is accelerating its efforts this school year by hooking them up to high-speed phone lines. [Thank them all.]

This is an enormous effort. It will take the same spirit and tenacity that built our railroads and highways. It will take the leadership and dedication of groups like my Advisory Council on the Information Superhighway.

So let us begin. Let today mark the start of our mission to connect every school in America by the year 2000. If we can connect 20 percent of the schools in the largest state in the nation in less than a year, surely we can connect the rest of the country by the end of the decade.

In the coming days I will announce the winners of our Technology Learning Challenge. And over the next several weeks, I will put forward a public-private plan that lays out how we can move our entire nation toward the goal of technological literacy for every young person.

Here are its guiding principles:

- Modern computers in every classroom and accessible to every student, from kindergarten through 12th grade.

- Networks that connect students to other students, schools to other schools, and both to the world outside.
- Educational software that is worthy of our children and their best aspirations.
- Teachers with the training and the assistance they need to make the most of these new technologies.

Make no mistake: Count on us for leadership. But the goal we have set cannot be achieved by government fiat. It can only be met the way these companies are meeting it: by communities, businesses, governments, teachers, parents and students joining together. A high-tech barn-raising.

What we are doing is the equivalent of going to a dusty, adobe settlement in early 19th century California, and giving every child a slate and a piece of chalk to write with. It's akin to walking into a rough-hewn classroom in the Sierras in the 1860s, and wiring it for electricity. It's like going to the Central Valley in the 1930s, to the canvas classrooms of the Dust Bowl refugees, and giving every child a book.

Chalkboards, electricity, accessible books...there was a time when all these were rare. Now, every one is such a familiar part of our lives that we don't even notice them. If we stay on course, we'll soon reach the day when kids, and their parents, and their teachers will walk into a classroom filled with computers, and not even give it a second thought.

Let's get to work.

First House Floor Vote Since 1970 Cuts Economy Aid to Turkey

Washington, D.C. - AHI

In a historic vote taking place at 5:45 a.m. June 29, 1995, the Porter (R-IL), Smith (R-NJ), Wolf (R-VA) Amendment to the Foreign Aid Bill H.R. 1868, introduced on the floor of the U.S. House of Representatives by Congressman John Porter passed overwhelmingly by 247 to 155 bipartisan vote with 32 not voting and one member voting present. (YES: 148 Democrats, 99 Republicans; NO: 37 Democrats, 118 Republicans).

The amendment cuts \$25 million from the \$46 million proposed economic grant aid for Turkey.

This amendment is the current Porter version of legislation initiated by the American Hellenic Institute Public Affairs Committee (AHIPAC) for over the past decade.

AHIPAC congratulates the following 26 members who spoke in support of the amendment:

Eugene T. Rossides, AHIPAC's chief counsel, said, "This vote was a tremendous victory for human rights and the rule of law. It sets the stage for continuing efforts in the State Department's efforts of the Greek American community to tremendous and played a significant role in the outcome of the vote. 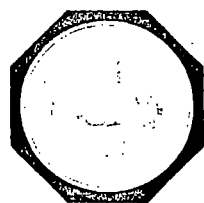

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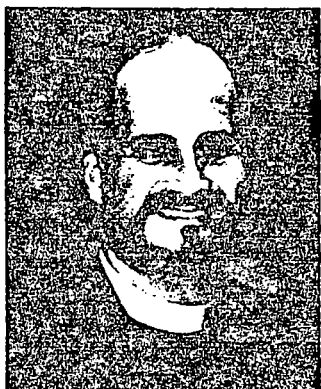

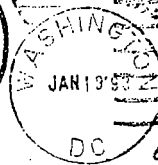
