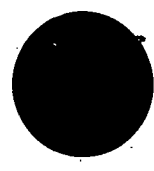

SUBJECT: Update on Civil Aviation Negotiations with
the United Kingdom

First Phase Concluded

The first phase of negotiations with the United Kingdom concluded on Monday, June 5, 1995, with the signing of an agreement. The key elements of this agreement include: a Chicago Heathrow route for United; open rights for US and UK carriers to fly between UK regional airports (all airports except Heathrow and Gatwick) and the US; greatly expanded code-sharing rights for US carriers beyond London; limited access to US government traffic on a code-share basis for the US Air/British Airways alliances; and additional frequencies for British Airways in the Philadelphia/Heathrow market.

In addition, the first phase included an agenda and schedule for the second phase. The agenda includes liberalization of cargo, pricing, and charters, as well as very limited additional access to Heathrow and/or Gatwick and additional access for the US Air/BA alliance to carry US government traffic.

The schedule for phase 2 is as follows: Working group session will be held the week of June 19. Plenary sessions will then be held July 17-21, August 7-11, and September 11-15. It is hoped but certainly not assured that phase 2 can be completed by the end of September.

Phase 2 Issues and Alignment of Interests

- Cargo: Federal Express is very supportive and interested. UPS is also interested but to a much lesser extent.

- Pricing: Consumers would benefit, and our carriers would also benefit because they are so competitive and efficient.
- Heathrow and/or Gatwick: New opportunities will be very limited. Any new routes will be awarded in a formal, administrative route award proceeding. Currently only two carriers, American and United, have authorization under the bilateral to serve Heathrow. We have been trying to end the "2 - Carrier Rule" for a long time. The following is a brief sense of our carriers' priorities on new London routes.
 - o American - Dallas/Ft. Worth to Heathrow (current service is to Gatwick)
 - o Continental - Newark to Heathrow (current service to Gatwick)
 - o Delta - Atlanta and New York to Heathrow (current service to Gatwick, or to Heathrow on the recently approved Delta-Virgin Airlines code sharing alliance)
 - o Northwest - perhaps from Detroit or Boston to Heathrow (current service to Gatwick), but seems less a priority for Northwest than some other carriers
 - o TWA - New York to Heathrow (or perhaps Gatwick). This has been a difficult situation, beginning with TWA's sale of its Heathrow rights in 1991. Until fairly recently, TWA wanted to fly to Stansted from New York (which it can now do, but is not), or to Gatwick from New York. Now it seems to be focusing on Heathrow. The Missouri delegation and the Governor are starting to portray this one route as if the entire financial health, even the existence of TWA, depends on it. TWA is cutting back or ending its service to a number of foreign markets, most recently Paris.

Realistically, we should anticipate perhaps one or two routes to Heathrow and maybe one to Gatwick.

ELEMENTS OF THE SECOND-STAGE NEGOTIATIONS WITH THE UNITED KINGDOM1. PRICING LIBERALIZATION

Under the current "double approval" pricing regime, air carriers can only offer those air fares that have not been rejected by either government. Air fares for nonstop services are very competitive. However, the British routinely reject low-price initiatives from interior U.S. cities. The U.S. objective is to introduce a "double disapproval" pricing regime (i.e., both governments would have to disapprove a fare to prevent it from being charged) either immediately or on a phased-in basis.

2. CARGO LIBERALIZATION

The cargo regime between the United States and the United Kingdom is essentially deregulated. However, U.S. carriers can transport local traffic between the United Kingdom and only a limited number of third countries (fifth freedom rights). Moreover, the fifth freedom rights that do exist can be used by only three U.S. airlines. The U.S. objectives are to expand the number of available fifth freedom opportunities and to eliminate the restriction on the number of U.S. carriers that can use them.

3. CHARTER LIBERALIZATION

The regime for passenger charters is significantly more restrictive than what is allowed under U.S. domestic charter rules. For example, no one-way charters are allowed, sign-up time limits exist, and passenger substitutions are restricted. The U.S. objective is to eliminate as many of these restrictions as possible either immediately or on a phased basis.

4. NEW ACCESS TO LONDON'S HEATHROW AND/OR GATWICK AIRPORTS

Only two U.S. carriers can serve Heathrow Airport. In addition, U.S. gateway cities to either Heathrow or Gatwick are limited, and in most cases, only one U.S. carrier can operate in any city-pair market. Although our ultimate objective is broad new access for additional carriers and cities, the British are only prepared at this stage to talk about "very limited" new access. However, we would expect at least one new Heathrow opportunity since the British are interested in securing the right to move Virgin Atlantic's Boston service from Gatwick to Heathrow. Depending on how the whole package develops, we might also secure a new Gatwick opportunity.

5. FLY-AMERICA ACCESS

In the just concluded first-step package, U.S.-U.K. airline alliances received rights for the U.S. alliance partner to bid for Government travel contracts between five U.S. cities and the United Kingdom. The U.K. objective is to expand the number of those opportunities.

Prior to that, he managed the "War Room" at the Democratic National Convention in New York City and managed the Los Angeles Field Office during the California Primary campaign.

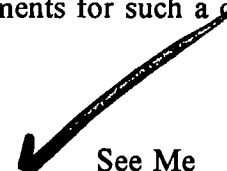
Attached is a letter from Jesse Jackson following up on a recommendation he made to the President to hold a "White House Conference on Jobs, Racial Justice and Gender Equality." I recently met with Jackson, at which time I recommended that we invite him in, along with five other representatives of his ministerial coalition, to discuss their ideas for this conference.

While it is true that the President said he thought the conference would be a good idea, I do not believe that the President was explicit in saying it had to be White House-led. Before this emerges as an issue publicly, I strongly recommend a meeting with you, Harold and this ministerial group, with a possible POTUS drop-by, to listen to their recommendations. Ultimately, we need to consider other partnership arrangements for such a conference.

Dear Mr. President:

Just prior to the November 8, 1994 mid-term elections, I -- along with nearly 200 other African American clergy -- had a conference call with you on campaign issues and recommendations for getting-out-the-vote. After you and others on the conference call had shared your thoughts and observations, you asked me for mine.

As you know, I was in the middle of a nation-wide GOTV campaign on behalf of Democrats and, based upon my observations and experiences on the campaign trail, I recommended that you call a "White House Conference on Jobs, Racial Justice and Gender Equality" after the election. I, along with a group of Rainbow ministers, would like to meet with you as soon as possible to reiterate our concerns in this regard.

In the State of the Union address you spent a lot of time discussing welfare reform and the work ethic. We agreed that there is a great need for welfare reform; and we believe that people should be able to learn and earn their way off of welfare and out of poverty. We thought that it was ironic, however, that while you spent a lot of time in the address discussing welfare reform and the work ethic, the speech contained no jobs program initiative, no economic stimulus package and no urban policy.

The history of private and public job creation since the Great Depression reveals that the United States government, in spite of a rhetoric which emphasizes the work ethic, has been far more willing to establish entitlements to welfare or income transfer programs than to job creation and work. The White House Conference that we recommend could go a long way in changing the "work ethic rhetoric" into a "job creating reality."

Welfare is the caboose on an economic train that has gone wrong. A comprehensive "jobs for all" program is the only real alternative to welfare. These Rainbow clergy believe that jobs, as an alternative to welfare, is where the emphasis should be. Full employment is both an ethical imperative and the key to economic justice and prosperity for all Americans.

Recent studies have shown that real unemployment is much higher than the official unemployment rate projected by the government

and the media. While the official unemployment rate is less than six percent, the real number of the unemployed and underemployed today may be somewhere between 16 and 20 million people.

For example, in 1992, there was an unemployment rate that included 9.4 million people who were officially jobless. To that, however, should have been added another 6.4 million persons who wanted full-time jobs but were involuntarily forced to settle for part-time work (on the average, for 20 hours weekly). It also should have included all 5.2 million persons who wanted jobs but were so discouraged that they had given up actively looking for them -- a group that is disproportionately comprised of women, African Americans and Latinos. Finally, none of the over 1 million (and growing) persons in prison today are counted in the ranks of the unemployed, and unemployment is at least part of the reason why some of them are in jail. Therefore, there is an urgent need for a conference that focuses on jobs.

Our nation is also becoming increasingly racially polarized. With the 1965 Voting Rights Act under attack over majority-minority districts; with the University of Maryland being challenged on its minority scholarship program; and with the California Republican Party getting ready to turn affirmative action into a national "wedge issue" for the 1996 campaigns, racial justice is being threatened. Presidential leadership is needed to restore moral authority and civil discourse to the issue of racial justice.

Finally, the issue of gender equality is of great concern to Rainbow ministers. They know, as Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. taught, that injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere. The recent incident involving the new Speaker of the House and the First Lady could not more clearly demonstrate the growing climate of gender polarization. We must put an end to such language, but even more importantly, put an end to the underlying attitude that would allow a high public official -- or anyone -- to speak of women (much less the First Lady) in such a vulgar and degrading manner.

A "White House Conference on Jobs, Racial Justice and Gender Equality" is needed now more than ever -- with jobs as the key. While Rainbow ministers do not believe that full employment will deal completely with the problems facing different individuals and groups, we do believe it is the necessary precondition for reducing the barriers to their resolution. Full employment also offers superior solutions to the problems of the deficit, poverty, homelessness, crime and other economic and social problems that are currently paralyzing our political process and harming our society.

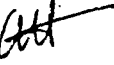

Our idea is to invite a wide variety of people to go back to their school, their children's school, their grandchildren's school or their neighborhood school and get involved. We are hoping to raise awareness and generate enthusiasm across the country for the Administration's education programs and to emphasize just how important family and community involvement are in our children's education.

Later this week, Secretary Riley will be sending a letter to: Members of Congress, state and local elected officials, celebrities, artists, astronauts, policemen, the AARP, CEO's, professional women's organizations, and AMERICORPS, etc. asking them to go back to school on September 11, 1995 or throughout that week. In the letter, the Secretary will give participants ideas for events which will demonstrate how easy and rewarding it is to support efforts to improve our schools. At the end of each event, we are asking participants to plan a brief press avail to generate local media across the country. We are planning to supply each site with a media advisory, press release, media contact list, and parent involvement print and video materials.

Our initial feedback has been very positive, indicating support for this initiative will be relatively easy to generate. We believe this will be an effective first step in our ongoing effort to promote family and community involvement in schools.

The Secretary is planning to kick off the initiative with a school visit on Monday, September 11th followed by a speech at the National Press Club on Tuesday. We would love to be able to put out a press release that says the "The Clinton

AMERICA GOES BACK TO SCHOOL: A PLACE FOR FAMILIES AND THE COMMUNITY

PURPOSE: Many schools across America are turning themselves around. They are raising their educational standards, making their campuses safe places to learn, and getting computers into the classroom. But, schools cannot do it alone. *Back-to-School: A Place for Families and the Community* extends an invitation to individuals -- parents, grandparents and community members proficient in their vocations, skills, or trades (e.g., electronics technicians, computer programmers, doctors, nurses, engineers, police chiefs, military, astronauts, physicists, authors, sports stars, actors/actresses, government officials) to come into our schools and help in the school improvement efforts. A strong family involvement message will be stressed: *Our schools belong to families and the community; they are places for everyone to help solve the problems confronting schools—all year long. All Americans must come together as partners in this effort.*

DESCRIPTION: The American public has identified six critical aspects of public schooling that concern families and communities. As the kick-off for our community-focused back-to-school effort, Secretary Riley will invite famous Americans to return to their "hometown schools," neighborhood schools, or children's or grandchildren's schools to address a parent group, conduct a town meeting, highlight an effective innovation, or "rap" with kids on one of the concerns. The focus will be on how everyone can pitch in to help:

1. **Teach the basics and the core academics**
 - *Families* - read and write together, use TV wisely, and encourage their children to do their best
 - *Schools* - rigorously teach the basics and encourage family involvement in teaching and learning the basics
 - *Community, religious, and business groups* - provide tutors, as well as adult literacy training
2. **Make schools safe and drug-free places of learning**
 - *Families* - organize and participate in "parent patrols" or "security dads and moms"
 - *Schools* - require firm, fair rules, and keep in touch with families instead of waiting until problems arise
 - *Community and religious groups* - make safe neighborhoods and safe passages to school a priority
3. **Get technology and computers into the classroom**
 - *Families* - work in partnership with the schools to get computers in schools and homes
 - *Schools* - make the use of technology and computers a learning priority
 - *Community and religious groups* - establish computer labs in neighborhood centers
 - *Business* - assist schools directly through supplying computers and computer training
4. **Raise standards of achievement, and discipline**
 - *Parents* - enroll their children in tougher courses and keep in contact with teachers to ensure their children are getting what they need
 - *Schools* - raise academic standards and encourage students to work hard to meet them
 - *Community, religious, and business groups* - offer mentoring programs and homework centers
 - *Business* - adopt flexible employee leave policies that accommodate school visits/volunteering
5. **Make available school-to-work opportunities with local employers**
 - *Families* - make sure their children enroll in courses that prepare them to enter the workplace directly and/or enter college
 - *Schools* - build local partnerships with employers and community colleges to create work-study opportunities
 - *Business* - provide apprenticeships and internship opportunities in promising careers
6. **Connect local schools and families to community resources (e.g., colleges, museums, libraries, science laboratories, civic groups, retired citizen organizations, etc.)**
 - *Families* - take advantage of learning opportunities in the community
 - *Schools* - forge new partnerships with community groups to expand learning opportunities in evenings, weekends, and summer
 - *Community/religious groups* - offer affordable, quality afterschool/summer learning opportunities

Responsibilities included planning, directing and integrating the District government's fiscal management, taxation and related revenue programs and activities; developed a fiscal base for financing programs of the District government; and proposed and reviewed legislation relating to finance and revenue matters in the District.

Decided the merits of taxpayers' requests for waiver of penalty or interest; made final determination of all requests for exemption from taxes administered by the District and offers to settle tax liabilities.

The department administered the District's 18 tax programs for individual income, business income, real and personal property, excise and sales and use taxes -- tax systems that in other states are divided among the state, county and municipal governments. Additionally, DFR estimated revenues, assessed all real property instruments, provided tax-related information and assistance to tax professionals and the public, administered the unclaimed property program and coordinated the District's user fee program. The agency had a budget of \$24.5 million and more than 560 employees.

**SUBJECT: COMMENTS MADE BY DEWEY STOKES AFTER YOUR LAW
ENFORCEMENT MEETING**

Summary:

After your meeting with the law enforcement community on Friday, May 19, 1995, Dewey Stokes, the President of the Fraternal Order of Police, endorsed your re-election.

Discussion:

On Friday, May 19, 1995, you met with the heads of the major law enforcement organizations to discuss the N.R.A. and your terrorism legislation. After the meeting, many of the law enforcement leaders walked to the stakeout to discuss their meeting with you. All who spoke were supportive of your efforts. Dewey Stokes, the President of the Fraternal Order of Police, and Bob Scully, the Executive Director of the National Association of Police Organizations, were especially supportive.

When asked by the media whether he would endorse your re-election in 1996, Dewey Stokes stated unequivocally that he would support you. I have talked with Dewey Stokes personally since the event to determine the veracity of his statement. Dewey stands by his statement based upon your actions, as well as the actions of other administration officials in support of law enforcement.

Dewey's tenure as president will end at the Fraternal Order of Police's August 1995 Convention. Therefore, any positive comments after that date will reflect his personal, but still influential view. We are continuing to work closely with Dewey, as well as the likely next President, Gil Gallegos of New Mexico, to maintain their support. I recommend that you write a personal note to Dewey on the attached photograph taken during the Memorial event on May 15th.
