REQUEST: To have the President discuss the Family and
Medical Leave Act in his radio address on August
5th with families and businesses who have
benefitted from Family and Medical Leave Act.

PURPOSE/MESSAGE:

To demonstrate how the Family and Medical
Leave Act has succeeded in helping the
working families of America over the last two
years, and to combat a growing movement in
Congress to weaken this law.

BACKGROUND:

Saturday, August 5, 1995, marks the second
anniversary of the enactment of the Family and
Medical Leave Act. The FMLA is perhaps the single
most popular of the President's domestic
accomplishments, and an August 5 radio address
provides a terrific opportunity to reinforce the
popularity of the law and the President's
leadership ensuring its enactment. More broadly,
this is an opportunity to remind the Nation that
this has been an Administration of accomplishments
-- in the interest of working families.

The families invited to the address will represent
some of the true success stories of FMLA over the
last two years. We will also invite CEO's of
businesses with exemplary family and medical
leave programs.

Some of these invitees will be identified from
among the witnesses at hearings being held by the
Commission on Family and Medical Leave, chaired by
Senator Chris Dodd. (A hearing was held in
Chicago in May, will be held in San Francisco in

June, and Washington, D.C. on the day before the proposed radio address.)

In Chicago, the Commission heard from Kenny and Rosemarie Weaver, the parents of a girl with leukemia who visited the White House in October, 1993. The Make-a-Wish Foundation made that visit possible and gave Mr. Weaver the opportunity to thank the President for signing a law that enabled him to share in his daughter's final days.

PREVIOUS PARTICIPATION:

The President signed the Family and Medical Leave Act in a Rose Garden Ceremony on February 5, 1993.

DATE AND TIME: Saturday, August 5, 1995.

DURATION: 7 minutes for Radio Address; 25 minutes to visit families and companies attending the address.

LOCATION: The Oval Office.

PARTICIPANTS: The Commission on Leave would develop a list of possible participants through its list of witnesses at the three hearings. The White House can select from this list and/or its own list of employees and employers who have benefitted or supported the Family and Medical Leave Act.

OUTLINE OF EVENT:

This would be the usual Saturday morning radio address, with the President greeting the families and companies after the address.

THE PRESIDENT'S PLAN: REFORMING ENTITLEMENT SPENDING

The President is proposing a series of reforms in entitlements and other mandatory programs that will raise tens of billions of dollars by targeting benefits to those who need them and ensuring that taxpayers get a fair return on public resources. Republicans would cut too deeply into entitlements and threaten services and benefits on which millions of Americans rely.

Veterans:

- The President proposes to protect pensions for poor veterans and compensation for service-connected disabled veterans.

-- Republicans would restrict or eliminate compensation benefits for certain veterans, and redefine and narrow eligibility for service-connected disabilities.

Farm Programs:

- The President proposes to save \$4.2 billion over 7 years by allowing farmers to use more acreage to plant what the market demands, reducing inequitable treatment of farmers by crop and region, and targeting payments to smaller farmers.

-- Republicans would cut farm program spending 3-4 times as much -- the House by \$17 billion over 7 years, the Senate by \$12 billion over 7 years -- without specifying how.

Spectrum Auction:

- The President proposes to raise \$14.3 billion from 1996-2002 by expanding the Federal Communications Commission's spectrum auctions to a variety of new wireless services.

-- The House and Senate also would expand the Government's auction authority.

We feel strongly that the mess privileges are important for these staff members to effectively carry out their roles as liaisons with key constituencies. It enables them to bring key supporters into the White House for meals, which is perceived by these supporters as a prestigious and important honor, in order to thank them for their support and to encourage them to continue to be active.

Debbie Fine in Alexis Herman's office will follow up with you. Thank you for your help.

DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA'S FINANCES

- The District of Columbia continues to face a set of difficult fiscal problems.
- a) The District is projecting a cumulative deficit of \$722 million by the end of FY 1995, which represents 21% of the 1995 enacted level of \$3,394 million. The \$722 million consists of a \$230 million deficit for 1994 and a \$492 million shortfall for 1995 based on figures from the District's budget office. The deficit is due primarily from increases in Medicaid costs and overexpenditures in such areas as public safety and public education.
- b) Congress directed the District in its 1995 appropriations bill to submit a revised spending plan with reductions of \$140 million and 2,000 FTEs. However, the revised plan approved by the Council in December that meets the Congressional mandate will not resolve the District's current operating deficit in 1995 let alone the projected cumulative deficit.
- c) The District also experiences perennial cash flow problems. In January, the District issued \$250 million in short-term notes to avoid running out of cash. The GAO indicated in a recent briefing that based on its preliminary analysis of the District's cash flows and actual spending patterns for 1995, the District will need to approach Treasury by late spring/early summer for a loan. Treasury officials concur with the GAO's prediction.
- d) The District's FY 1994 financial audit report (released February 1) revealed a FY 1994 budget deficit of \$328 million. The GAO is reviewing the audit results due to some questions about the accuracy of the data.
- The District, under current law, does have the ability to borrow from the Treasury to deal with short-term cash flow problems. OMB and Treasury staff believe the Federal government can impose conditions on such Treasury borrowings such as requiring that private-market borrowing be exhausted but the District may challenge this interpretation. DC Committee staff has indicated that any attempt to exercise this authority will trigger prompt Congressional action.
- In the likelihood that the District seeks Federal assistance, the Administration needs to develop a long-term strategy to help the District resolve its fiscal crisis. Such strategy might include an accountability mechanism to oversee the District's finances, proposals to improve District programs currently under court supervision, streamlining the District government based on Rivlin Commission recommendations and addressing the unfunded pension liability.
- The President's FY 1996 budget includes an annual Federal payment to the District of Columbia of \$660 million which is equal to the 1995 enacted level. The President's request is also based on the current one-year FY 1996 Federal payment reauthorization. Currently, the impact on the Federal deficit is limited to the Federal payment. However, any additional Federal assistance such as a Treasury direct loan or loan guarantee may have a deficit impact.

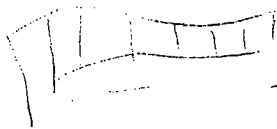

Thank you Director Bowron. I'm glad to have this chance to meet with all of you. I wanted to come here because there is nothing more important to restoring our community than your work. America's law enforcement officers risk their lives to protect our lives, and to help our communities come together, instead of continue to pull apart. We owe you our enduring thanks and respect.

That's why I am so angry about recent attempts by some people to attack police officers for doing their job. People may disagree with certain laws -- like the ban on assault weapons -- but that doesn't give them the right to willfully ignore the law. And it certainly doesn't give them the right to assault, and even kill, police officers who are doing their duty. Whatever you believe, you have no right to attack the people who uphold the law.

The police are on our side. When they act to uphold our laws, they are acting for us. There is no moral equivalency between the criminals in Waco who stockpiled illegal weapons and the police who tried to protect the innocent people in Waco by disarming those criminals.

Nothing is more irresponsible than for elected officials to perpetuate the falsehood that the police are some kind of armed bureaucracy, acting on private grudges and hidden agendas. That is wrong; that is reckless; and anyone who does it ought to be ashamed of themselves. Federal law enforcement agents got involved in Waco because dangerous people were amassing dangerous weapons and committing crimes against innocent children. Period.

We know that people made some mistakes, and we've made the appropriate changes because of that. But anyone in Congress who equates mistakes by federal police officers with the criminal misdeeds of a violent cult is out of line. Police officers sacrificed their lives trying to stop what turned out to be the suicide and mass murder of a religious leader gone wild. It is wrong to profane their memory.

The American people want our police to get rid of drugs and guns and gangs. They want our streets and our schools to be safe. They do not want criminals to be emboldened because some people are running down police officers for their own political ends.

That's why Americans in Oklahoma City are wearing shirts like this. "A society that makes war against its police officers had better learn to make friends with its criminals." That's a fact. And nobody -- nobody -- is going to make war against America's police officers on my watch. Thank you and God bless America.

JANET RENO was sworn in as the nation's 78th Attorney General by President Clinton on March 12, 1993. From 1978 to the time of her appointment, Ms. Reno served as the State Attorney for Dade County, Florida. She was initially appointed to the position by the Governor of Florida and was subsequently elected to that office five times.

Ms. Reno was a partner in the Miami-based law firm of Steel, Hector & Davis from 1976 to 1978. Before that, she served as an assistant state attorney and as Staff Director of the Florida House of Representatives Judiciary Committee, after starting her legal career in private practice.

Ms. Reno was born and raised in Miami, Florida, where she attended Dade County public schools. She received her A.B. in Chemistry from Cornell University in 1960 and her LL.B. degree from Harvard Law School in 1963.

Biography of Carol M. Browner

Carol Browner became the administrator of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency in January, 1993. Her mission is to promote public health by protecting the nation's air, water, and soil.

In her first year at EPA, Browner launched the agency in an important new direction by promoting a firm commitment to environmental goals, along with common sense, innovation, and flexibility in reaching those goals. She has declared pollution prevention her priority.

In naming Browner, President Clinton cited her strong administrative background and her record in building innovative partnerships to protect our environment while also promoting economic growth.

As head of EPA, Browner is charged with protecting the nation's air and water from harmful pollution, overseeing garbage and hazardous waste disposal, cleaning up contaminated sites under the Superfund law, and establishing rules for pesticide use and food safety.

In Browner's first year at EPA, she issued tough new controls over hazardous waste incinerators, expanded the Toxics Release Inventory requiring industry to inform the public of toxic emissions, and issued the Chemical Manufacturing Rule, which will reduce smog-producing chemicals by 1 million tons per year.

Browner announced a new industry-by-industry approach to environmental regulation, a move away from the old piecemeal approach that dealt with air, water, and land pollution one by one. She negotiated water quality standards for San Francisco Bay, established broad protection for the Great Lakes, and played a leading role in President Clinton's requirement that all federal agencies cut down on pollution. She took enforcement action against a record number of polluters.

Browner announced an ambitious legislative agenda to amend the nation's major environmental laws. She is working with Congress to clean up the nation's rivers, lakes, and streams through changes in the Clean Water Act and the Safe Drinking

Water Act. She is committed to making the Superfund law work faster, fairer, and more efficiently to return contaminated sites to productive community use. She brought together the Department of Agriculture and the Food and Drug Administration and forged a proposal to protect children from harmful pesticide residues by reforming food safety laws.

In the international arena, EPA played a key role in negotiating the environmental side agreement to the North American Free Trade Agreement. EPA worked to develop the Administration's Climate Change Action Plan to slow global warming and the Administration's proposal to ban the overseas export of hazardous wastes.

Browner knows environmental regulation both from the Washington perspective and from the state viewpoint.

From 1991 to 1993, Browner was Secretary of the Department of Environmental Regulation for the State of Florida, the nation's third-largest environmental agency. She won praise for dealing effectively with complex issues involving wetland protection, hazardous waste disposal, and Everglades cleanup.

From 1986 to 1988, Browner worked for Sen. Lawton Chiles, now Governor of Florida, helping to negotiate a complex land swap that expanded Big Cypress National Preserve. She then served as Legislative Director for Sen. Al Gore, Jr., helping to draft amendments to the Clean Air Act.

Browner grew up in south Florida, where the Everglades were a bike ride away. Her parents, college professors at Miami-Dade Community College, gave her her first lessons in politics and an appreciation for the natural world.

Browner graduated from the University of Florida in 1977 and then earned a degree from its law school. She began working on environmental issues as General Counsel for the Florida House of Representatives Government Operations Committee in 1980. She then worked for Citizen Action, a grassroots consumer group, in Washington, D.C., where she met her husband, Michael Podhorzer. They have a son, Zachary, 6, and live in Maryland.

"I want my son to be able to grow up and enjoy the natural wonders of the United States in the same way that I have," Browner said at her swearing-in ceremony on January. "I believe that we will now be able to make the investment in our economy that we so desperately need, yet preserve the air, land, and water."

THOMAS F. (MACK) McLARTY

Counselor to the President of the United States

White House Counselor to the President Thomas F. (Mack) McLarty is a lifelong friend of President Clinton, serving for 18 months as his Chief of Staff, and is the former chairman of the board and chief executive officer of Arkla, Inc., one of the nation's largest natural gas companies.

President Clinton and Mack McLarty met in kindergarten in their native town of Hope, Arkansas. Since that time, they have stayed in touch, personally as well as professionally, and have always referred to each other as "my oldest friend."

Student body president at the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville, McLarty, at age 23, was elected to the Arkansas House of Representatives. One of the youngest people ever to be elected to the Arkansas House, McLarty later went on to serve as chairman of the Arkansas State Democratic Party from 1974 through 1976. He was also treasurer in the successful gubernatorial elections of Senator David Pryor and President Clinton.

McLarty became the youngest person ever elected to the Arkla board in 1974, and was named president of Arkansas Louisiana Gas Company in 1983. McLarty was named chairman and chief executive officer of Arkla, Inc. in 1985 and held this position until being asked to serve as White House Chief of Staff after the election of President Clinton in 1992. During McLarty's tenure, Arkla was recognized by Forbes and Financial World magazines, as well as the Wall Street Transcript, as one of the nation's most innovative companies in the natural gas industry. Additionally, he was personally recognized on several occasions as one of the natural gas industry's most outstanding chief executive officers.

Under McLarty's leadership, Arkla was praised for its efforts to promote minority business growth and to enhance the company's efforts to employ minorities. For these efforts, McLarty received a Fair Share Award in 1991 from the NAACP. McLarty also led Arkla's efforts to preserve natural resources, and in 1991, Arkla received the first ever Corporate Stewardship Award from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service for its environmental sensitivity and cooperation with many national and local environmental groups during the construction of a major pipeline project.

In addition to his work for Arkla, McLarty helped transform a five-generation family business, McLarty Companies, into one of the South's largest transportation companies, with interests ranging from truck leasing to automobile dealerships.

Despite his national success, McLarty has always remained a devoted advocate of economic and civic development in his home state of Arkansas. He was particularly active in the Arkansas public school system, and was instrumental in establishing a program to bring computers into the public school classrooms.

McLarty is married to Donna Cochran, also a native Arkansan and graduate of the University of Arkansas at Fayetteville. They have two sons, Mark, a student at Georgetown University, and Franklin, a student at New York University. During her years in Little Rock, Arkansas, Donna was very active in community affairs and served on the board of directors for the Centers for Youth and Families and as a member of the Little Rock Airport Commission.

LAURA D'ANDREA TYSON

President Clinton appointed Laura D'Andrea Tyson as his National Economic Adviser on February 21, 1995. Dr. Tyson had previously served as the sixteenth Chairman of the White House Council of Economic Advisers and as a Member of the President's Cabinet since February, 1993. She is also a Principal Member of the President's National Security and Domestic Policy Councils. Dr. Tyson is currently on leave from the University of California at Berkeley, where she is Professor of Economics and Business Administration, and was Director of the Institute of International Studies, and Research Director of the Berkeley Roundtable on the International Economy (BRIE). She received a B.A. summa cum laude from Smith College in 1969 and a Ph.D. in economics in 1974 from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

Dr. Tyson has been a visiting scholar at the Institute for International Economics, and a member of the Cuomo Commission on Trade and Competitiveness, the Advisory Board of the Economic Strategy Institute, the Conference Board Economics Colloquium, the Economic Policy Institute Research Council, the Council on Foreign Relations, and the Subcommittee on a Global Economic Strategy for the United States. She was a member of the Los Angeles Times Board of Economists from 1989-1992.

Professor Tyson is the author of Who's Bashing Whom? Trade Conflict in High Technology Industries (Washington, D.C., Institute for International Economics, 1992). She has written a number of other books and articles on the economics of competitiveness. Her publications in this area include: American Industry in International Competition (co-edited with John Zysman), Cornell University Press 1983; "The Economic Black Hole" (with Lester Thurow), Foreign Policy, Summer, 1987; "Competitiveness: An Analysis of the Problem and a Perspective on Future Policy," Global Competitiveness: Getting the U.S. Back on Track (edited by Martin Starr), Norton, 1988; The Dynamics of Trade and Employment (co-edited with William Dickens and John Zysman), Ballinger, 1988; and Politics and Productivity: The Real Story of How Japan Works (co-edited with Chalmers Johnson and John Zysman), Ballinger, 1989. "Managed Trade: Making the Best of the Second Best" appeared in An American Trade Strategy: Options for the 1990's, Robert Z. Lawrence and Charles L. Schultze, editors, The Brookings Institution, 1990.

Dr. Tyson has also written extensively on the economies of Eastern Europe. Her most recent publication in this area is Power, Purpose and Collective Choice: Economic Strategy in Socialist States (co-edited with Ellen Comisso), Cornell University Press, 1986.

Ickes ran New York State for President Clinton during the 1992 presidential primaries. A hard hitting effort in the Empire State gave Clinton a victory over Jerry Brown at a time when the former California governor had been surging.

Ickes proved his value to Clinton when he managed the most successful Democratic convention in decades. The July nominating convention was viewed by most political insiders as masterfully

staged to present the Clinton-Gore ticket and the Democratic party as disciplined, focused, mainstream and visionary -- in other words, ready to govern. These two considerable contributions to the Clinton march to the Presidency further validated Ickes credentials as a political operative.

When Ickes was mentioned for a top White House post, the media raised questions about his law firm's clients. After a thorough investigation the court officer appointed by United States District Court (S.D.N.Y.) Judge Paterson to investigate the situation, concluded that there was no evidence of criminal misconduct on the part of Ickes or his firm. By the end of 1993, these stories had faded away and the White House offered Ickes the position of Deputy Chief of Staff.

But throughout the month of December, until his naming by the President on 22 December, there were almost daily reports of his uncertainty about taking the job. The reported changes of mind had Ickes characterized as "the Hamlet of Mineola" in various press reports. Press reports also describe Ickes as a "tough political deal-maker" and note that several of the President's political advisers had lobbied on his behalf, hoping to get someone in "the chain of command with a tough demeanor."

Ickes assumed his White House post on 3 January 1994, and was immediately plunged into the White House effort to stem bad publicity surrounding the First Lady's financial dealings in Arkansas.

He coordinated the legislative/political aspects of President Clinton's health care initiative during 1994. He is responsible for managing the political and certain policy aspects of the White House.

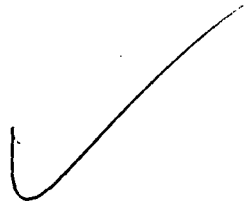

I would like you to join Vice President Gore and me in a conference entitled, "Common Ground: A Call to Responsibility," to be held at the White House on July 6, 1995.

Perhaps the defining characteristic of our nation has been the unique ability of Americans from diverse backgrounds and with different views to work together for the common good of our communities, our country, and our future. In recent years, however, our spirit of community and shared enterprise has often deteriorated in the face of difficult challenges that confront us. 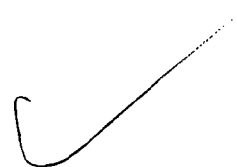

I'm sorry to bother you about such trivial matters as office details, but you seem to be the only one at the White House taking responsibility for actually finding a place to put me. Therefore, with apologies in advance:

1. Office

I've been told that room 469 in the OEOB will be available for me. When I went to visit it, the room was empty with two desks and a phone in place. It was not made clear whether I would be sharing this office space with the support person you mentioned I would have and the other NSC and possible outreach detailees or whether they would sit at another spot. If I will be sharing this space with others, it will be difficult to have meetings with visitors in the office because of lack of privacy; I will need fairly regular access to another meeting space.

There was no other furniture or office equipment such as a computer, printer, fax, or copying machine — all of which I will need to operate effectively.

I was also concerned about being on a floor without secure doors, meaning that classified material cannot be left out during the day, and whether I can access the NSC's classified document system. I will also need to have a secure telephone available since I plan to keep in close touch with Joe Sullivan in Havana and most of our conversations have to be conducted by secure phone. Here again, if I share the office with others I will not be able to have secure phone conversations.

Perhaps all of this can be taken care of, but I need to find out how and through whom.

2. Parking

I commute daily from Virginia and work the long hours we all do these days. I currently have underground parking at the State Department and would hope that I could have some kind of close in parking available at the NSC.

Again, I'm sorry to bother you about these details. Many thanks in advance.

A memo from the State Department was sent to the NSC on June 14, requesting a Presidential Delegation of approximately 37 individuals be sent to Haiti to observe Parliamentary and local elections on June 25.

This group will monitor the elections and help establish their credibility, demonstrate the President's commitment to free and fair elections, and focus public attention on the Administration's foreign policy success. The delegation would tentatively leave from Washington June 24 and return June 26. We will need to move very quickly on closure of this delegation to enable us to proceed with all the implementation details.

If we have not received a list from your office by this date, we will assume you do not have any proposed names and we will move forward with suggestions received from others.

We shall then develop the specific proposed delegation list to be forwarded to the White House for final approval.

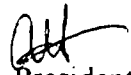

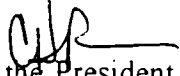

Roundtable discussion to commemorate the fifth anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

PURPOSE:

To underscore the administration's commitment to full enforcement of the ADA.

BACKGROUND:

We propose the President participate in a roundtable discussion on employment and the ADA. The discussion would focus on the legislation's record of success to date in empowering people with disabilities and where we go from here. We would invite individuals from key states whose efforts demonstrate the positive impact of this legislation.

This annual event is the most significant for the President with the disability community. Each year, since the legislation was passed 5 years ago, the President of the United States has participated in an event to commemorate the ADA.

We are encouraging Cabinet Members to celebrate the ADA during the week preceding its anniversary with events appropriate to their agency. We will also send a statement from the President to be read or passed out at events around the country.

In the current climate, visible demonstration of commitment from the administration is particularly important. Some Republicans have criticized the ADA

this year, which in combination with the severe cuts to programs that implement the ADA, has instilled a sense of fear in the community. A perceived lack of Administration response to this has raised doubts in their minds about our level of support. Although their doubts are unfounded, we need to reassure the community of the President's commitment to this legislation.

The community is generally supportive of the administration and has been working closely with us and with coalitions of seniors and labor to fight proposed Republican legislation on the budget, Medicare and Medicaid and welfare reform. They have been working hard to mobilize their grassroots membership and to carry a unified message in the states.

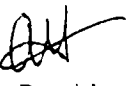

SUBJECT: Celebration of the Fifth Anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act by
Cabinet Members

We feel it is important to encourage as many Cabinet Members as possible to celebrate the fifth anniversary of the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) which is on July 26th. This is landmark civil rights legislation for the disability community, and it is the most significant day of the year for them.

Last year, most of the agencies indicated an interest in commemorating the anniversary of the ADA in some way, and this year we have tried to position ourselves in such a way that we can actually help the agencies craft these meetings or events. (Specifically, we have members of our sub-cabinet core group that would be willing to help locate sites and develop these events.)

The Cabinet and Sub-Cabinet can commemorate the importance of this legislation in many ways, organizing events that are appropriate to the mission of their agency. They could arrange events or meetings with supporters in key states while they are travelling, and they could do it any time during the week preceding and up to the 26th. We have already learned of discussions underway in Justice and Education.

The agencies with jurisdiction over enforcing the ADA are DOJ, EEOC, DOT and HUD. The agencies that implement programs that significantly help this community are Labor, HHS and Education. It would also be great if regional offices worked together to organize celebrations.

Presidential Participation

We expect that the President will participate in an event on the 25th or the 26th. We intend that the focus of the event will be employment, training and education. The date and the nature of the event have not been determined yet, however, we will keep you informed.

We also plan to send a statement from the President that can be read or passed out at events around the country.

Background

In the current climate, visible demonstration of commitment from the administration is particularly important. Some Republicans have criticized the ADA this year, which in combination with the severe cuts to programs that implement the ADA, has instilled a sense of fear in the community. A perceived lack of Administration response to this has raised doubts in their minds about our level of support. Although their doubts are unfounded, we need to reassure the community of the President's commitment to this legislation.

The disability community is generally supportive of this administration and they have been working closely with us and with coalitions of seniors and labor to fight proposed Republican legislation that impact many of the agencies. They have been working hard to mobilize their grassroots membership and to carry a unified message in the states.

SUBJECT: Americans with Disabilities Act Anniversary (ADA)

Presidential Event

I met with Carol Rasco, Jeremy Ben-Ami, and Diana Fortuna (my DPC counterpart) yesterday to discuss the nature of a Presidential event commemorating the 5th anniversary of the ADA this year.

We all agree that it would be best if the President could celebrate the ADA with an event that portrays his commitment to this law in a way that is perceived as meaningful by the community. (Meaning not just a reception if possible.) This should be done on the anniversary itself (July 26th) or the day preceding if possible.

Our first choice is a roundtable discussion that would focus on employment and the ADA (as laid out in the attached scheduling request.) Our second choice, if the above is not at all possible, is a reception at which the President would make remarks.

As I've mentioned to you, I have gotten a lot of calls from people in the administration and in the community about this.

Message from the President

I am working with DPC and Correspondence to get a special message or a proclamation from the President to be read at as many events as possible celebrating the ADA.

The chair of Justice For All, an independent grassroots network, has agreed to track events going on around the country for this purpose.

The Other Principals

I strongly recommend that the other principals participate in whatever POTUS does, or organize their own events. I have not recommended anything or submitted any requests, however.

Cabinet and Sub-Cabinet Participation

Attached is a draft memo to Kitty from you and Carol Rasco asking for help from Cabinet Affairs organizing the Cabinet to celebrate the ADA in a way appropriate to their agency.

Political Context

Despite the fact that the bulk of the Republican agenda would seriously hurt the members of this community and that the Republican rhetoric is very threatening to this community (i.e. the forward to the Republican Contract book recently published), it is important to remember that President Bush and the Republicans often get credit for having passed this legislation. I am sure that Bush will have his own celebration this year, and that Dole will organize something. I am told that it is likely that the Republicans will hold hearings all day on that day to highlight the positive aspects of this law.

We need to continue to associate the President and the Democrats with the passage and enforcement of this legislation. You cannot underestimate the depth of the emotional tie to this law and the hope it offers to members of the community, nor the fear and panic they now have about its being repealed or reformed. Particularly because we are not engaging this community at a very high level in terms of our message and events with principals, this is the most important event symbolically and substantively for them.

SUBJECT: Summary of Activities with the Disability Community: 6/9 to 6/16

Budget

- On the day of the President's remarks on television, I made calls to approximately 20 national organizations to let them know that he would be speaking.
- On the day of the remarks, I faxed out talking points to 120 national organizations and state opinion leaders.
- The disability community does not have many prominent national spokespeople, but Justin Dart agreed to be available for press calls to validate the President's message. (Prior to his remarks.)
- The day following the remarks, I included approximately 15 representatives of key disability organizations in the OPL briefing -- who agreed to support this proposal and educate their memberships. (List attached.)
- On Thursday, June 15, I set up a conference call with 15 state leaders, staffed by Marilyn Yager and myself. The participants agreed to educate their communities, and post our literature on the disability computer bulletin boards. (List of participants attached.)
- On Friday, I faxed out the more detailed talking points to 120 national organizations and state opinion leaders, including conference call participants. The material will be posted on disability bulletin boards and sent out to a grassroots e-mail network.

Feedback

- Almost everyone I have heard from is excited both that the President has taken a leadership position on this, and that he has offered something they can be supportive of rather than opposing everything. The response was very positive, with the exception of one person out of 30 that I have spoken with on the phone.
- National organizations were very pleased to receive a briefing so quickly following the President's presentation, and local leaders felt very good about being asked to participate in a conference call that offered our message.
