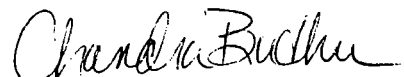

SUBJECT ROOM AND STAFF ASSIGNMENTS

While everyone is working diligently to ensure a smooth transition, I want to clarify a few points before final decisions are made:

(1) Kevin, John and I are each entering departments that are already working to full capacity and feeling sorely understaffed. We intend to become fully active in our respective offices and consequently will bring additional work loads for support staff. In my case, I will be overseeing a number of assignments simultaneously - all of which will require serious attention and time. There are simply not sufficient staff resources in any of these offices to assume the new workloads which we will each generate.

(2) With respect to staffing equity, each of the Deputy Assistants to the President who work in the three departments have a staff assistant. Given the preceding paragraph, I doubt that the departments will be able to provide Kevin (I am assuming that his rank will change to Deputy), John, and me with assistants from their existing staffs. While Kevin is currently using an intern, John and I both assumed, based upon our early dialogues with Bruce and Roy Neel, that our assistants would go with us. All discussions and memos have reflected that assumption.

(3) Because the discussions have taken longer than anyone anticipated, Dana Lawrence, unfortunately, could not wait. Even though she is leaving for SBA, her position with John can be transported without disrupting the existing staff structure since Dana has been working exclusively for John.

(4) My assistant, Tim Flynn, has been working on independent projects related to this transfer since October. I have always planned to bring him and my secretary with me and have structured the Correspondence Department operations to

reflect that move. The Correspondence Department has been functioning since early October on this basis.

(5) Kevin, John and I have agreed that to conserve limited space and staff resources, we would share my secretary and split two assistants among us. My understanding is that the current COS proposal is that the three of us split one full time assistant. In addition to creating logistical problems, this would necessitate the dumping of much of our workload on the already overworked support staffs of the three departments we are entering. It would also create staffing inequity between the three of us and all of the Deputy Assistants who currently work in the three departments.

There can be a very smooth transition with little impact to our departing departments if you will allow us to proceed with the originally proposed staffing arrangements. We need to work as a team and as new team members we must not present an added burden.

RE: URUGUAY ROUND

On December 15, 1993, 117 countries concluded the Uruguay Round, the most comprehensive trade agreement in history. It reduces barriers blocking exports to world markets, extends discipline and coverage on critical areas of trade, and creates a faster and more enforceable set of world trade rules.

BACKGROUND:

Following WWII, the major economic powers of the world negotiated a set of rules to reduce trade barriers and settle disputes. These rules were called the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade (GATT).

As world trade increased, it became clear that the GATT rules were not keeping up with rapidly changing world conditions. For instance, they did not cover new areas such as intellectual property and services; they did not provide meaningful rules for such sectors as agriculture; and they could not bring trade disputes to quick resolution.

These talks were originally launched at a meeting of trade ministers in 1986 in Uruguay, hence the nomenclature "Uruguay Round" of multilateral trade negotiations. These have been the largest and most significant since the GATT began.

The final agreement is good for both workers and business. It will bolster the competitive edge of U.S. industries, thereby creating more jobs, a greater standard of living, and a higher standard of living for people in other countries.

IMPACT:

The Uruguay Round will open up new markets for U.S. goods and services, the largest in history.

It protects the intellectual property of U.S. entrepreneurs in industries such as pharmaceuticals, entertainment, and software products in world markets.

It opens up new markets for U.S. services such as accounting, advertising, computer services, engineering, and construction.

community should let OMB figure out how to pay for it; their job is to make sure that lawmakers understand that it is important for business, jobs and the overall economy.

SUPPORTERS:

Generally speaking, these sectors are supportive: high tech, beer and distilled spirits, aircraft, toys, furniture, paper, agriculture, construction, medical and scientific equipment, pharmaceuticals. USTR can provide a more detailed list.

"Alliance for GATT Now Membership" numbers over 270, and includes most members of the BRT. Jerry Junkins of Texas Instruments heads this group. There also other informal groups, but no one is truly energized. Although business is supportive, the community as a whole is holding back and not committing enough resources to this effort. As with NAFTA, they are waiting for the President to become involved. The problem with this approach is that there is not much time left, and they will have to put out huge amounts of resources to make up for lost time. In addition, the business leadership on GATT is not effectively organized. They need something to kick them into action.

What they want is some attention by the President demonstrating to them that GATT is important to this President, and that he is committed to it.

DETRACTORS:

Once again, Millkin is against this agreement. So are the textile people and Senator Hollins. Newt Gingrich is now using the sovereignty argument against the GATT. He says that we will be yielding our sovereignty to the WTO and that developing countries will be able to dictate to us. Our response is that we just want a more expeditious way to deal with trade disputes and that we still retain our ability to use unilateral bilateral sanctions such as 301, anti-dumping, and anti-dumping countervailing duties.

ACTION STEPS:

It is clear that the business community must be energized. Keeping in mind the tight time frame, here are some recommendations:

*You convene a group of business supporters to demonstrate that the White House is engaged, to clarify who is doing what, to set some time lines, mechanisms to keep informed, and set forth action plans.

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*May 10, ACTPN is meeting here at the Indian Treaty Room for a working lunch with Mickey Kantor. In addition, Mickey has invited IGPA, the International Group Advisory Committee, a group that involves high profile governors and mayors, such as Cuomo, Richards, Riordan, etc. The newly constituted ACTPN includes many members who were active in NAFTA and who also have a lot at stake in GATT. People like Larry Bossidy, Jerry Junkins, Maurice Greenberg, Linda Wachner, Frank Schrontz. In addition, there are newly nominated individuals such as Susan Hammer, Andy Young, John Bryson, Owen Bieber, Fred Krupp, etc. With these individuals, we have some labor, environmental and political people who could be helpful to us. Susan Hammer is chair of ACTPN and has indicated that she is organizing a group to go to the Hill.

Recommendation: That the President or Vice President drop by this luncheon with remarks about the importance of this group showing their support of GATT to members of Congress. His message should be "let the Congress and Panetta work on the financing, what you should do is to talk to the members of Congress. They need to hear from you." Additionally, the President could have a reception later on that evening to spend more time with this group to get them going. This day could be the public kick off or the Uruguay round outreach.

*May 18, ISPAC, the Investment and Services Policy Advisory Committee is meeting. This is a newly constituted group, which includes such individuals as Michael Eisner and Clarence Avant.

Recommendation: That the President or Vice President Drop by and exhort the members of ACTPN to get involved.

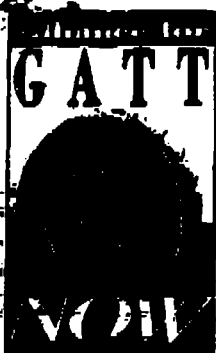
*CEO lunch

Recommendation: That the President host a luncheon entirely focused on GATT, so that the CEO's will realize its importance to the President.

*Sector briefings at the White House, such as with NAFTA, to inform, but most importantly to energize the various sector groups. It will demonstrate that the White House is committed as well as to motivate the attendees.

CONCLUSION: The outreach should begin as soon as possible, as the legislative time frame is getting tighter and tighter. I believe that we could organize a selective group of briefings and events which will demonstrate our commitment as well as motivate the troops.

SUBJECT: FOREIGN POLICY OUTREACH: '94, '96 & 43%

The Administration has had considerable foreign policy success during its first year - Japan, APEC, NAFTA, South Africa and our Korean diplomacy. However, our foreign policy strengths haven't been sufficiently highlighted nor our limitations sufficiently minimized. Yet there are some simple and effective things we can do to reverse this trend, especially as we move into the partisanship of the 1994 (and 1996) campaign seasons.

A couple of factoids:

- o Americans have a growing recognition that their fate is more tied to global markets, yet we are losing political support for some key international programs on the Hill and on Mainstreet USA;

- o Administration foreign policy is getting bashed in the Op-Ed pieces, in Congress and now (over Haiti) there are demonstrations in the streets;

- o Newt Gingrich, Bob Dole and other leading Republicans threaten to make foreign policy a big issue in the upcoming 1994 and 1996 elections;

- o When we do mesh our foreign and domestic strategies on critical international issues like NAFTA and GATT, we win big.

A Big Question:

What impact will foreign affairs have on the President's standing in the 1994 and 1996 elections? The President has lost support in the public opinions polls when our foreign policy appears indecisive or our message to the public is mixed. Since we won with 43% of the popular vote, foreign policy should at a minimum not lose points, and if possible gain the President 3-4 points in our push for 51%. An international crisis at the time of the elections risks damaging the President's standing unless we take some of the steps recommended below.

We should work on two things -- process and themes.

Five Things to Do Now: Process

- o Create soon a small **Strategy Planning Group** from NSC/NEC, State and USIA to identify the 5 or 6 'hot button' issues. (Haiti, Bosnia, China MFN, Americas Summit, etc.) State has started working on this already.

- o Task each relevant **international agency** to develop quickly **its own strategy** for these hot button issues, describing how they deal with them now, and how they could improve their handling in the future. What groups should they regularly target? How?

- o The Strategy Planning Group should then outline an overall coordinated outreach strategy for each hot button issue. They should develop a **press plan, a Congressional plan, constituency groups plans, and a plan for speeches** beyond the Beltway, for each hot button issue.

- o Create regular channels of communication and concise updated materials for the **DNC** and urge them to include international issues in all their national activities, where appropriate. Also, meet regularly with the leaders of private foreign policy associations.

- o **Assign some one person the responsibility to track and monitor these 'hot button' issues for the White House.** (Create a mini 'war room' to track each element for each topic, complete with time lines and calendar of events.)

Things to Do Now: Themes.

- o The President has an **appealing set of domestic themes**: people-to-people programs; reinventing how government and the private sector can work together; the importance of leadership; the need for security. These same themes **should be applied to our international initiatives**. Emphasize what the President is so good at -- reaching out to individuals and groups and making them feel involved and connected with something bigger. We should reinvent foreign policy. Move the discussion beyond the traditional pin striped experts, beyond the Beltway to the heart of America. Start **dialogues with non-traditional groups** like the League of Women Voters, unions, and other private voluntary organizations and government units (like cities). All of them are developing their own international links right under our noses. They are starving for a little encouragement and guidance from Washington. Let's give it to them. It gains political points. It's a cheap date.

- o for this, we already have a powerful and appealing set of themes that are just right for our time and post Cold War circumstances: economic growth at home and abroad; peace and security; and promoting democracy. These Presidential themes must be taken to America, constantly invoked and explained over and over and over again. Otherwise, people simply don't get it.

I think that the potential loss of support from these groups extends beyond trade issues. I have not seen all the farm groups working together in this way before except on NAFTA.

Dear Marion:

This is to confirm our conversation of April 4 concerning the interest on the part of a number of commodity, livestock and general farm organizations to meet with you and members of the Administration to discuss the budget implications of the GATT agreement. We are specifically interested in discussing the Administration's plans for dealing with the reported loss of over \$16 billion in tariff revenues as a result of implementing the GATT 1994 agreement.

As you know from earlier discussions with members of an ad hoc working group, a substantial number of farm and food assistance groups are interested in capturing funds that result from reductions in so-called "red and/or amber box" activities and utilizing those funds in "green-box" activities such as food aid, export credit guarantees, international market promotion programs and other activities. While we want to communicate our interest in ensuring that U.S. agriculture has access to adequate funding for "green-box" activities in order to successfully compete against subsidizing countries, we are also very concerned about the budget implications of the GATT 1994 agreement.

In the absence of a clear signal from the Administration, there have been rumors about spending reductions that might be directed to the agriculture sector in order to help off-set projected revenue losses anticipated from other sectors of the economy. The numbers we have seen have been high, and, quite frankly, are frightening.

The Administration has repeatedly stressed compliance with the GATT 1994 agreement will not require cuts in price support programs beyond those already sustained by U.S. agriculture price support programs over the past few years. In fact, with respect to many commodities, current U.S. spending levels are far below the GATT 1994 maximums. Further, the Secretary and the U.S. Trade Representative have repeatedly assured Congress and farm groups that they intend to fully utilize export programs, like EEP, to the maximum allowed under the GATT 1994 agreement.

These assurances ring hollow if agriculture is asked to change its programs and reduce its expenditures even more in order to "pay" for GATT 1994. This is particularly true if agriculture is assigned costs of the GATT 1994 that have nothing to do with reductions in tariff revenues from agricultural imports. As you know, many agricultural groups view the net gains for agriculture under GATT 1994 as marginal at best, with significant trade-offs

already contained in the GATT 1994 agreement. If agriculture is asked to reduce its domestic or export programs beyond the reductions already sustained through budget reconciliation and beyond the reductions required in order to comply with GATT 1994, many agricultural groups will undoubtedly reevaluate the level of their enthusiasm for the agreement.

In general, we view the argument that a GATT agreement "costs" \$15 billion because of lost tariff revenues as traditional government accounting, at best. If one is to believe the argument that GATT 1994 is good for the economy and will increase business output and revenue, certainly any tariff losses will be more than off-set by gains in other sectors of the economy. We have also reviewed estimates of significant "savings" in farm programs attributable to increases in prices caused by increased trade activity under the GATT. Both of these categories of "savings" are just as real as the "costs" of GATT 1994. However, no legislation is required to generate this increase in business or the savings in farm programs.

Our earlier meetings with key Administration officials to discuss the balanced budget amendment and other Administration priorities were interesting and informative. We would be grateful for your assistance in arranging a meeting with officials from USTR; OMB, Office of Public Liaison, Office of Legislative Affairs; the Council of Economic Advisors; and the National Security Council to discuss the Administration's strategy for moving the GATT implementing legislation through Congress. If the GATT 1994 agreement is to be treated as on-budget, we would like to discuss the likely spending off-sets which might be included in the legislation.

Representatives from commodity groups, general farm organizations and livestock groups will be available for the meeting at a time convenient to the Administration participants. The interested groups include, but are not limited to: American Farm Bureau Federation, American Meat Institute, American Sheep Industry Association, American Soybean Association, National Association of Wheat Growers, National Barley Growers Association, National Broiler Council, National Cattlemen's Association, National Corn Growers Association, National Cotton Council, National Council of Farmer Cooperatives, National Grange, National Potato Council, National Milk Producers Federation, National Pork Producers Council, National Sunflower Association, National Turkey Federation and the Rice Millers Federation. As always, thank you for your assistance and for being agriculture's advocate.

I attended a meeting today regarding the Summit of Americas in December. The participants included: Ricki Seidman, Kristie Kenney and Richard Feinberg(NSC), Lt.Gov. Buddy McKay (FL), Anne Walley and Isabelle Tapia, Rita Lewis, Ann Stock, Ambassador Gillespie (State).

The agenda included an overview of the summit for date and planning purposes; some discussion of foreign policy objectives; an outline of the goals the state of Florida had regarding the Summit; and more of the details as to the structure of the Summit.

It was stated that the Summit would be structured similarly to the APEC Summit model, in terms of the relationship between the State Department, White House and Florida officials. It is expected that the Americas Summit will be **2-3 times larger** than the APEC Summit. (3,000 press alone.)

Public Liaison will work with Political, the State Department and the Host committee in coordinating ancillary events and Summit events. An idea for an ancillary event, may be to hold a briefing here for those that have a business interest or actually do business in Latin America. These events may be held in other cities as well, i.e., New York, California, etc.

The Summit is being envisioned as a process. The goal is for business associations, non-governmental associations and government officials to build new networks and formulate new initiatives for Summit leaders and themselves.

RE: Group Tour Requests

The Visitors Office is happy to work with you on arranging visits to the White House for special guests. However, I believe you may be unaware of some of the circumstances which govern what we can and cannot do.

We reserve or "book" group tours one month in advance. That means that requests for dates within that month are extremely difficult to accommodate, as all the slots available have been filled.

Our primary constituency is the Members. They consider the White House to be "theirs" just as much as it is the President's (and I think he would probably agree). Requests from the Speaker, the Majority Leader, the Whips, Committee Chairs and others have high priority. The tour coordinators in their offices understand the time frame we work with, and send us the requests as early as possible. Because we know there are often last minute emergencies, we always try to leave some room for a small group or two.

We also understand that OPL is the President's outreach arm, and clearly, access to the White House is a powerful tool for making friends. We are eager to make arrangements for your group tour requests as often as possible. Unfortunately, more often than not, these requests come to us at the very last minute, and as "must do". A great many of these requests represent groups coming at great distances or to annual conventions for one organization or another. It seems likely to us that they have been planning these trips for some time, and we are puzzled by how often the tour request is last minute. As an example, the enclosed request for visitors from South Africa, a trip that would appear to have required significant planning time, but which came to us two days before a heavily booked Saturday in spring.

While we are happy to make whatever accommodation is possible, I am writing to urge that your staff let guests know that White House tours require advance notice of at least five weeks, **before any commitment is made to guests**. We appreciate your help in making the tour process work efficiently for all the President's guests.

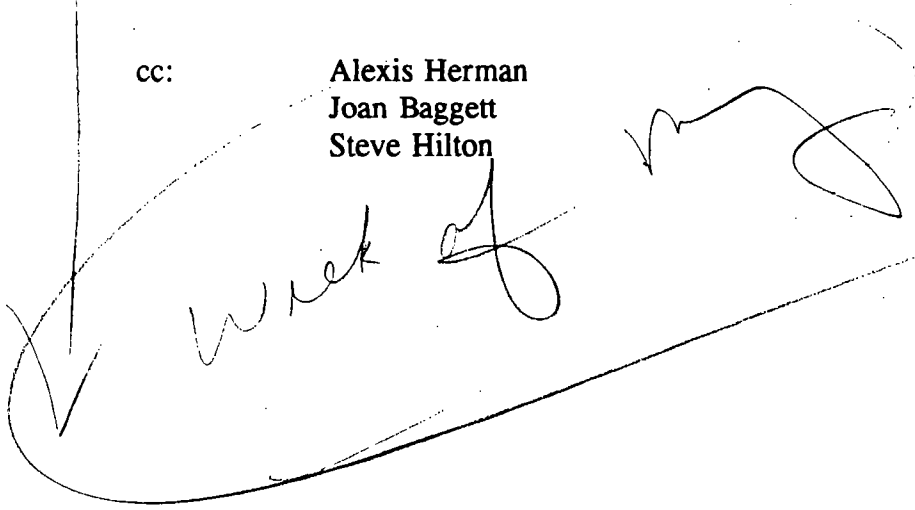

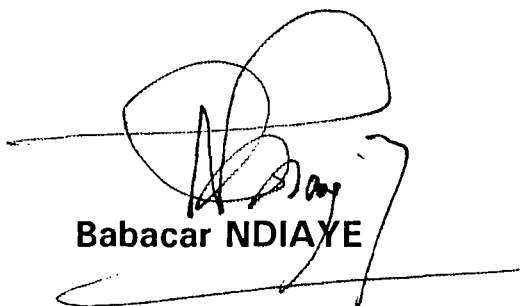

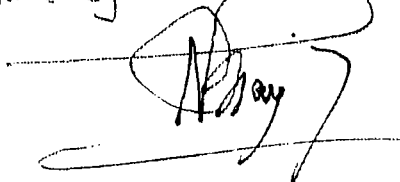

of the
National Council of Senior Citizens
on
Health Reform Legislation

March 25, 1994

The National Council of Senior Citizens continues to support comprehensive reform of the nation's health care system that incorporates sound principles:

- universal coverage financed through mandated contributions by all employers, fair share contributions by individuals, and tax revenues;
- a comprehensive and high quality benefits package that includes children's health services, preventive services, home and community-based long-term care, pharmaceutical benefits, early retiree protection and acute and other services now included in mainstream health plans;
- a clear single-payer option for states;
- strong cost restraints, including controls on drug prices;
- full choice of physicians, other health providers and health plans with strong consumer controls in the operation of the health system;
- full parity for older persons and persons with disabilities in terms of benefits and financial obligation.

The Health Security Act proposed by President Clinton (H.R) 3600, S. 1757) substantially advances these principles. We urge the Congress to accelerate its work in fashioning health reform based on the President's initiative while assuring equal coverage for Medicare beneficiaries.

The nation's seniors want action now and demand that these health reform principles as incorporated in H.R. 3600 and S. 1757 be enacted prior to the 1994 elections.

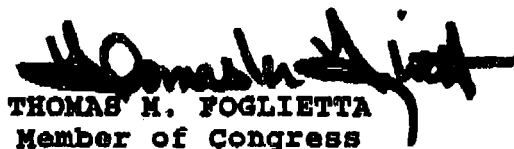

U.S. CHAMBER POLICY AND MEMBERSHIP GROUPS REORGANIZED

WASHINGTON, April 5 -- The U.S. Chamber of Commerce today merged its Development and Policy Groups as part of a reorganization to streamline operations and better serve members, president Richard L. Leshner announced.

The newly formed Membership Policy Group will be headed by Senior Vice President R. Bruce Josten, a 20-year U.S. Chamber veteran, who most recently has been in charge of the Development Group. Reporting to Josten will be five divisions -- Planning and Marketing, Membership Sales, Domestic Policy, Economic Policy and International. The new group also will include congressional liaison and GAIN, the Grassroots Action Information Network.

Leshner said, "The merger moves policy formation and implementation closer to the Chamber's 220,000 members, and will achieve efficiencies consistent with what most of American business is doing. The bottom line is that we will be able to represent our members more effectively, giving our members a greater return on their investment in us."

Josten came to the U.S. Chamber in 1974 as a telemarketing representative in New York City after graduating from Harvard University. He rose through the ranks, holding key field marketing positions in the Chamber's San Jose and Dallas offices. In 1983, Josten moved to Washington as the national membership director. A year later he became group vice president of development, assuming the position of senior vice president in 1991.

William T. Archey, who has served as senior vice president of the Policy and Congressional Affairs Group, is leaving the Chamber on the basis of a mutual agreement and will pursue other interests.

The consolidation will result in a top management team consisting of the president and three senior vice presidents. Along with Leshner as president and Josten as senior vice president of the Membership Policy Group, Carl Grant will continue to serve as senior vice president of the Communications Group and Lawrence B. Kraus as senior vice president of the Administration Group.

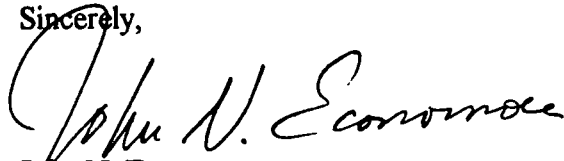

As you know, the United States has extended formal recognition to the Former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia. This decision recognizes the democratic expression of the citizens of the Former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia to establish a sovereign and independent state based on democratic principles.

I am fully aware that Greece and the Former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia have outstanding differences, which we expect will be resolved through good faith negotiations. Public Hearings on Information Age Privacy Set for California and Washington, D.C.

Representatives of the public, private and non-profit sectors will discuss personal privacy and data protection in the information age at hearings of the Privacy Working Group. This Working Group, which has been chaired by Patricia Faley, Acting Director of the United States Office of Consumer Affairs (USOCA), is part of a task force set up by President Clinton to plan development of an "information superhighway."

Officially known as the National Information Infrastructure, the "data highway" will be capable of exchanging data, voice and images electronically

among a vast network of individuals, businesses, government agencies and other organizations around the world. Ensuring ready access to information is the Administration's goal, but protecting individual privacy is essential to its success.

The hearings will be in the form of open meetings of the Privacy Working Group and will examine privacy issues in such areas as law enforcement, financial services, information technology and direct marketing. The California meeting, January 10-11, 1994, from 8:30

a.m. to 5 p.m., will be hosted by Jim Conran, Director, California Department of Consumer Affairs, in the first floor hearing room at 400 R Street in Sacramento. The Washington, D.C. meeting will be held January 26-27 at the U.S. Department of Commerce Auditorium, 14th Street and Pennsylvania Avenue, N.W.

FDA Approves Genetically Engineered Animal Drug

The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has approved a new genetically engineered drug for increasing milk production in dairy cows.

The drug, called somatitrove, increases milk output by supplementing the cow's natural bST (bovine somatotropin), a hormone produced in the pituitary gland. Milk from treated cows has been found to have the same nutritional value and composition as milk from untreated cows.

FDA Commissioner David A. Kessler, M.D., called somatitrove "one of the most extensively studied animal drug products to be reviewed by the agency." He said steps have been taken to ensure that any unsafe residues in the milk of bST-treated cows are detected well before the milk or its products reach the grocery shelves.

Monsanto Co. of St. Louis, Missouri, the drug's sponsor, has agreed to conduct a post-approval

monitoring program that includes the following steps:

- a two-year tracking system of milk production and drug residues in 21 top dairy states that will compare periodically the amount of milk discarded after bST is marketed to the amount discarded prior to approval;
- a 12-month comparison of the proportion of milk discarded because of positive drug tests between bST-treated and untreated herds;
- a reporting system to monitor all bST use and follow up on all complaints; and
- the use of somatitrove in 24 commercial dairy herds will be monitored specifically for mastitis, a common infection of a cow's udder, animal drug use and resultant loss of milk.

FDA also has concluded that it lacks a basis to require special

labeling of products from bST-treated cows. Food companies may, however, voluntarily label their products as long as the information is truthful and not misleading. "There is virtually no difference in milk from treated and untreated cows," according to Dr. Kessler.

The American Dietetic Association (ADA) has issued a statement approving the FDA's findings on the safety of milk from bST-supplemented cows. "The evidence is clear that bST does not change the composition of milk, and consumers should have complete confidence in the milk supply," said ADA President Sara C. Parks.

The ADA's Consumer Nutrition Hotline, at 1 (800) 366-1655, is playing a recorded message on bST. A fact sheet on bST is also available through the hotline.

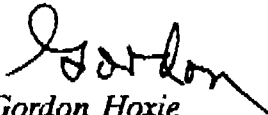

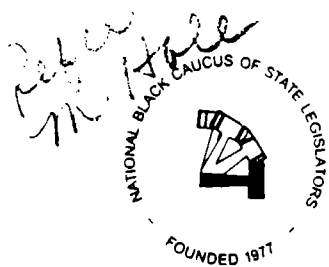

Humanitarian Assistance to Cuba: Expanding the Role of Private Agencies in Meeting Human Needs and Promoting Democracy in Cuba

A PROPOSAL FOR U.S. CONTRIBUTION TO CARITAS CUBA

Within the context of the Cuban Democracy Act of 1992, the present policy of the U.S./ toward Cuba has been described as having two clear emphases: to send a message to the Cuban government on the need for political liberalization, and to support the people of Cuba in their just aspirations and their human needs.

Over the past year, the provision of humanitarian aid by private U.S. entities, such as Catholic Relief Services and the Archdiocese of Boston, have been encouraged and aided by the Administration, for which we are appreciative. This aid, provided to CARITAS CUBA, has totalled well over \$1 million worth of medicines in 1993; while this represents a significant increase over private donations in previous years, it only begins to touch the desperate need of the Cuban people.

The program has been made possible as well by two other factors: the ability of the Catholic Church in Cuba to restore and extend its programs of social assistance carried out by CARITAS, at the national, diocesan, and parish levels; and by the tolerance and cooperation of the appropriate Cuban government ministries.

Both factors point to a modest opportunity that was not present before. They thus represent a tendency, however tentative, toward accepting a role for private institutions in this area. An increase in the amount of aid provided would, in all likelihood, further the church's role of promoting pluralism in that society, increase the influence of local lay leaders, and challenge the authorities to continue recognizing the role of non-governmental organizations, especially of the church, once considered the regime's greatest internal threat.

Of even more urgent importance, however, is the fact that large segments of the Cuban population are experiencing deprivation, hunger and sickness greater than ever before in modern times. In addition to the inadequacies and inefficiencies of the Cuban economic system and the dramatic end of the former Soviet subsidies in aid and trade, natural disasters have lately taken a further toll on the Cuban people. Whatever the reasons for the US-imposed economic embargo on trade, there can be no moral justification for preventing adequate provision of medicines and food, especially when the means to alleviate this human suffering are readily at hand.

A change in U.S. policy, rescinding legislation that forbids trade in foods and medicines and their delivery to Cuba, is, from our point of view, clearly desirable. It is also, from all indications, unlikely to occur in the near future. Therefore, we propose still greater U.S. cooperation in the provision of humanitarian assistance by private groups.

We do not envision a massive program. A large and necessarily highly visible "airlift" would be unacceptable to either government at this time. But for the private aid now begun to have a major impact both on the human needs and on the growth of pluralism in Cuba, the needs are far greater than entities such as Catholic Relief Services or the Archdiocese of Boston could sustain.

It is for this reason that we propose that appropriate but significant amounts of medicines and foods, presently at the disposal of the U.S. government, be made available to CARITAS CUBA through Catholic Relief Services. We further propose, assuming the concurrence of the government of Cuba, that a number of government surplus vehicles be also made available to CARITAS CUBA for the purpose of distributing the materiel throughout the island.

It is our understanding that this proposal conforms to both the letter and the intent of the Cuban Democracy Act, and we would welcome the opportunity to discuss this further.

The mothers of invention

How a mighty grass-roots movement of parents with disabled kids is changing the nation

Bill Clinton's chief domestic policy adviser is not one of the West Wing's Rhodes scholars. In fact, there is little on Carol Rasco's early résumé to suggest she would become the nation's First Policy Wonk. She studied to be an elementary-school teacher, then found happiness working as a grade-school counselor. Until Clinton

Like Rasco, millions of mothers across the United States have been thrust, usually without warning, into becoming advocates for disabled children. Often, such mothers get discounted as isolated parents flailing away to help an "unlucky" son or daughter. In truth, these parents have launched a mighty grass-roots campaign. They have made schools, the law and social-service departments more humane and more efficient. Their work has helped not just the disabled and chronically ill but all those who rely on services from health care to welfare. And it has allowed a generation of disabled children to grow up to make major breakthroughs themselves.

Changing things. Carol Rasco is Exhibit A in the proof that few experiences are more empowering—even radicalizing—than being an advocate for a disabled child. "When Hamp was born, the doctors thought he would either die within 48 hours or should find an institution for him," recalls Rasco in her large wood-paneled office in the White House West Wing. "I felt I had a lot to offer to keep him at home, but I certainly needed help." What began as her quest to get adequate social services and schooling for her son put her on a path to becoming a presidential confidante and policy guru. Once she learned how to change things for her own son,

Rasco volunteered with an Arkansas children's lobby to organize on behalf of poor children. Her inside knowledge of state programs caught the eye of one of the group's founders, Hillary Rodham Clinton, whose husband, then the state's

governor, hired her for a succession of ever more important jobs.

Fighting for her son's rights forced Rasco, like other similarly situated parents, to find ways to make programs work. Her character-testing experience provided, in effect, a hard-knock education in the shortcomings of government.

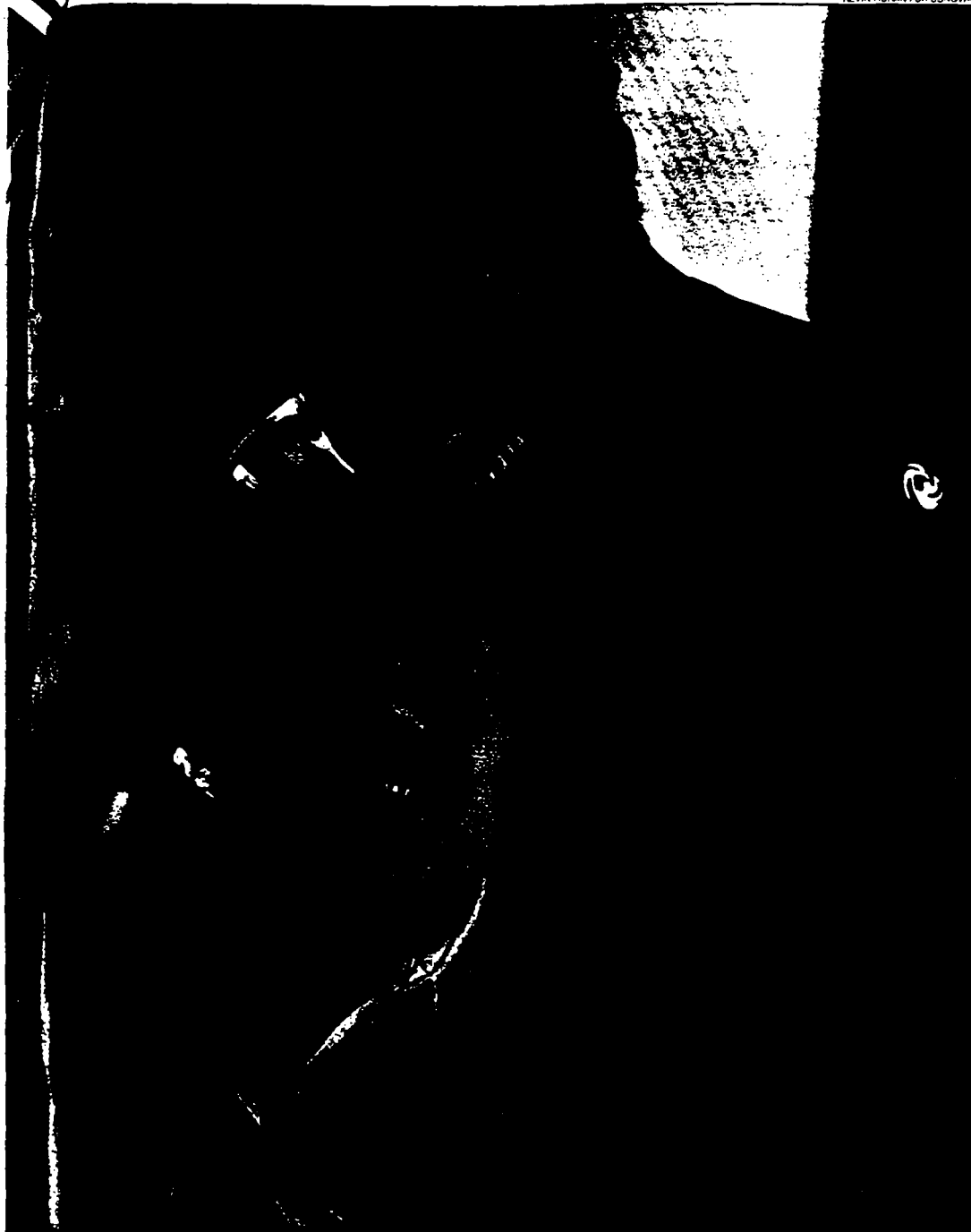
Surely Rasco is the only one in her current post who ever had to struggle to get a son qualified for Social Security disability benefits. No other occupant of the office ever had a Social Security case-worker abruptly cut off a vital but uncompleted meeting with a brusque: "It's 12

summoned her to Washington, she had lived all but the first six months of her life in Arkansas. What propelled her into an extraordinary public life? The birth, 20 years ago, of her multiply disabled son, Hamp.

o'clock, the start of my lunch hour." And certainly she is the first to have her son's multipage application for disability benefits rejected because, among the scores of details she provided on 18 years of Hamp's medical history, she had omit-

ted the five-digit ZIP code of a doctor who had treated him years before. As a result, Rasco is acutely conscious that programs can look good on paper but fail in practice—a fact that she reminds Clinton of as they work together on health care and welfare reform.

Barbara Roberts is another militant mother turned canny politician. When the local elementary school sent home her autistic 6-year-old son, Mike, and

told her not to bring him back. Roberts took one day a week off from her job as a bookkeeper and lobbied the Oregon Legislature for five months until it passed a 1971 law guaranteeing all disabled kids a right to an education. That law became a model for federal legislation. And Roberts, the timid volunteer crusader who did not even know the names of the lawmakers she buttonholed, is now the governor of Oregon. Similarly, the birth of a severely disabled daughter helped turn Sharon Sayles Belton from a 20-year-old, single-mom college student to a political career that culminated in her November election as mayor of Minneapolis.

Life on the line. Only a handful of militant mothers end up running for political office, of course, but many change the world, or at least their communities. Most have needed services for a child but instead got caught up in a rulebound system or stuck on a long waiting list, says Niki Smith, who is part of a group of Oregon women who call themselves the Mothers from Hell. "When you have a disabled kid, it's like someone drops in on you from outer space and says, 'Your perfect child is not perfect anymore.'" says Smith, the mother of a daughter with Down's syndrome. "You go to the service system and most often it's helpful. But mistakes still happen, or somebody treats you in a way that's unkind or disrespectful, and you get angry. Your kid's life is on the line. That's what makes a mother from hell."

Often, the things a mother does for her own child end up helping many others. Typical is Jacquelyn Brand. When her

daughter Shoshana, who has cerebral palsy and poor vision, began falling behind in school because she could not grip a pencil or speak clearly. Brand and her husband, Stephen, set out to learn all they could about computers. The couple devised a system with a voice synthesizer—similar to the one used by scientist Stephen Hawking, who has Lou Gehrig's disease—that became Shoshana's voice, her paper and her pencil. Today, the 19-year-old high school senior takes small parts in school plays and plans to go to college.

Brand became to technology what



Andrew Carnegie was to books: She created a national network of local lending libraries of the latest devices, which disabled children and adults can try out at home, in school or on the job. Since 1983, the nonprofit Alliance for Technology Access, which the California mother started with grants from Apple Computer and other companies, has established 45 such centers in 34 states.

Costly laws. Frequently, the law itself is the target of a militant mother's work. Julie Beckett's daughter, Katie, spent the first 3½ years of her life in an Iowa hospital; viral encephalitis had struck in 1978, when she was five months old, shutting down her neuromuscular system and forcing her onto a respirator. Beckett quickly learned that Medicaid would only pay for Katie to live in a hospital, even though it was tens of thousands of dollars a year cheaper to let her live at home, where she could breathe on a portable respirator. Beckett wrote letters to lawmakers noting the stupidity—not to mention the cruelty—of a fiscally unsound rule that kept a child separated from her family. In 1981, President Ronald Reagan created what is now known as the Katie Beckett waiver. It has allowed Katie and, today, some 300,000 other "technology dependent" children and adults to leave drab hospital rooms.

She says her daughter Rachel, who is retarded, learns better with nondisabled children. Her lawsuit against the Sacramento school system could force schools across the country to step up the full inclusion of disabled kids.

After her daughter left the hospital, Beckett received hundreds of phone calls and letters from other parents, many of them desperate. She logged the calls and started a center at the University of Iowa to help parents share information and fight for policy. Recently, she started a group called Family Voices to lobby on health reform. Katie, now 15 and a high school honors student, testified before Hillary Clinton at one hearing. "I don't

think it's fair for me to change my career just because of my disability," said Katie, fearful that her choices will be limited by whether she can get health insurance. The new Clinton reform plan addresses her worry by guaranteeing access to health care. But parents like Beckett still want to fill what they see as a gap that could leave some children, like Katie, without the rehabilitation services needed to stay out of the hospital.

Once children with medical conditions get out of hospital, they still find obstacles at the schoolhouse door. In this area, too, militant mothers led a revolution. The 1975 Individuals with Disabilities Education Act, a law won by activist parents, noted that some 800,000 children with disabilities got no schooling at all—gave disabled kids the first guarantee that they could go to school.

But in 1979, Mary Tatro, a neighborhood preschool refused to accept 3-year-old Amber because the girl, born with spinal cord damage, still needed help with a catheter. Tatro said this was a simple procedure—she did it at home—that could be handled by a teacher or a nurse. School officials insisted it was a medical

procedure that needed to be done by a doctor. The effect was to exclude the girl from school. "I'll see you in the Supreme Court," Tatro blurted out at an unpersuaded administrator. And so, enough, a few years later they did not. The steps of the U.S. Supreme Court, which in 1984 gave Tatro a victory, since has prompted schools to meet the medical needs of tens of thousands of disabled kids.

These days, a new generation of militant parents is pushing school districts to the frontier yet. They insist their children have a right to take every class with nondisabled kids, rather than be segregated.

with only disabled ones. Kim Connor says her retarded 11-year-old daughter, Rachel Holland, achieves far more academically and socially when she learns side by side with nondisabled kids. Many school officials say such integration would be too costly and complicated. Yet Rachel, who, Sacramento school officials argued, would never master simple skills and needed to practice recess indoors before she could join other kids outside, is now in a private school where she spells, writes poems and even speaks Hebrew. The family's case is rising through the court system and could set a national legal precedent.

Not surprisingly, school districts often hate these pushy parents. But at higher levels of government, there is growing belief that they are a force for good. The U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, in fact, has begun a \$1.8 million program to train parents and their children to become advocates for services, even to the point of agitating for systemic change or leading street protests.

The federal program is modeled after Minnesota's successful Partners in Policymaking, founded in 1987. The idea, says Colleen Wieck, head of the Governor's Planning Council on Developmental Disabilities, was to give

parents and disabled adults the skills to stand up to obstinate bureaucracies. The program includes training in community organizing tactics. At one Minnesota training session, a community organizer sought to turn parents from ineffectual letter writers into in-your-face agitators. He tipped them to the best time to hold a demonstration (before 11 a.m. for the best media coverage) and how to create a successful protest (appoint "inciters" to

"move about to heat up the action, getting people angrier and encouraging them to show their anger").

"Doing a good job." This is Advocacy 101, straight out of Saul Alinsky's classic rules for organizers. But when the old federal Office on Economic Opportunity and the Legal Services Corporation funded this sort of grass-roots activism, conservative politicians quickly shut down the antipoverty programs. Telling-

ly, it was the Bush administration that funded the new parent programs. Explains Deborah McFadden, President Bush's commissioner for developmental disabilities at HHS: "Parents know best the needs of their children." But schools will resist their suggestions, she says, claiming they are too technical or too expensive. "The unfortunate truth," says McFadden, who changed her agency's mission from research to advocacy training, "is that if you are hated in your school system, you're probably doing a good job."

That is why such mothers organize themselves into neighborhood, nationwide and even international networks, many of them ad hoc and underground. The Oregon Mothers from Hell meet monthly, sometimes over potluck suppers. "We've infiltrated the system," says Kathryn Weit, explaining how many take jobs in far-flung parts of the social-service system, in effect becoming moles deep within the bureaucracy. Weit works for a statewide parent train-

ing group; another mother assists a lawyer who brings disability complaints, and still another, who works for a large philanthropic organization, teaches the mothers how to write grant applications. Pooling their talents, these activist moms wrote, filed and won *Mothers from Hell v. Eugene School District*, a legal action that ended the exclusion of disabled kids from summer school.

"Terrible isolation." Because shared knowledge is power, parents have started 67 federally funded Parent Information and Training Centers. These are run almost solely by activist mothers to teach others how to get services and technology, and legal and medical advice. Says Martha Ziegler, who started the first center, "Most parents of children with disabilities go through a period of terrible isolation and loneliness. Many of us come out of it wanting to help other parents not suffer quite so much." One mother, Patricia McGill Smith, acts as the Washington voice for these parents. She runs the National Parent Network on Disabilities and carries their message on health care and other issues directly to lawmakers.

Although militant parents have won new laws and federally funded support programs, for the most part, parent groups run on a shoestring and volunteer power. Yet their amateur status belies their sophistication. Typical is the National Down Syndrome Congress, begun in 1972 by parents concerned by reports that doctors did not act aggressively to keep such children alive at birth. These mothers have cultivated sympathetic doctors and nurses across the country, who now tip off the parents almost anytime a child with Down's syndrome is born. The new mother gets a phone call, usually within 48 hours, offering an instant network of support and advice.

Although the first parent ad-



vocates were almost always white and often wealthy, today's activists include poor and minority parents, like the mothers of Illinois Fiesta Educativa. These Latino women were angered by the lack of services in their Chicago neighborhood. Maria Medina took her son Moises, who has Down's syndrome, by two buses and a train, an hour each

way, just to reach the one suburban swimming pool that would teach her son to swim. She and other mothers, many of them single and unemployed, wrote to the city asking for a similar program for their kids. At first, since they didn't really know to whom they should write—or what exactly to say—their letter got no response. But with the help of a community organizer, they learned to target the state and city officials who made such decisions. When Gov. James Thompson snubbed their invitation to talk in 1989, 250 mothers marched to his mansion. The resulting television and newspaper coverage forced the governor to meet with the mothers and support a parks program.

Since then, the group's victories have included a \$2 million "respite program" to provide temporary in-home care for Spanish-speaking families. Fiesta Educativa has also forced schools to hire special-education teachers who are bilingual. Perhaps the surest sign of success says Medina, is that the mothers now have an amicable partnership with state officials and can call up whom they want when they want and get attention.

New tensions. Nationwide, the movement is not without growing pains. There is emerging tension, for example, between parents and their disabled children, as children grow into adult self-advocates and start groups that compete for funding and stature. And although militant mothers and fathers are more expert than ever, their issues have become more complicated and harder to resolve, says parent advocate Rud Turnbull of the University of Kansas. Distributing limited health care resources, for example, can pit those who benefit from expanded access to basic services against those who may need costly and exceptional ones.

Still, the most enduring legacy of militant moms is their militant kids. Having watched how their parents fought for them, many disabled people grow up to be forceful self-advocates. It is disabled people themselves who are emerging to take the lead on most disability issues, starting their own organizations to work alongside the ones begun by their parents.

One such advocate is Robert Williams, who was recently appointed by President Clinton to head the Administration on Developmental Disabilities at HHS. Says Williams, who has cerebral palsy: "For children to believe in themselves, they have to see that their parents believe in them and are willing to go to bat for them."

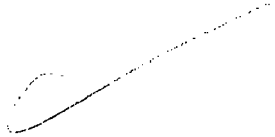

A Strategy to Stop Filibusters and Restore Majority Rule to the U.S. Senate

Handgun control, campaign finance reform, President Clinton's jobs and economic stimulus package, the National Service Act, the Motor Voter Bill, changes in air pollution standards, and natural resource protection policy: all had the support of a majority of Senators. Throughout most of our nation's history, this almost certainly would have meant Senate approval. Yet each was blocked or weakened because the Senate no longer operates on the basis of majority rule.

On virtually every significant piece of legislation last year (except NAFTA and the budget, which came up under special rules prohibiting filibusters), a minority filibustered, refusing even to allow the Senate to vote up or down on the legislation until concessions were made.

It's gotten so that even before a filibuster begins, the threat of a filibuster forces compromise after compromise. Legislation isn't even considered "realistic" unless it has the support not simply of a majority, but of 3/5 of the Senate's members. And as the bargaining goes on to pick up that critical 60th vote to shut off a filibuster, any one Senator has enormous power to demand concessions.

What is at stake?

As we write, the ever-present threat of a filibuster appears likely on legislation on health care reform, air pollution, labor law reform, the rights of gays, lesbians, women, and other minorities, further steps towards restricting the sale of guns and bullets, occupational safety and health, and the clean-up and prevention of environmental hazards -- indeed, virtually any legislation that spells significant change.

For example, the National Right to Life Committee has announced that health care reform will "die by filibuster" if abortion is covered in the standard benefits package. Senator Dole has announced that, with or without abortion coverage, he will be working to hold together a block of forty-one Senators to block any plan not to his liking. And Sen. Moynihan, chairing one of the two key Senate committees with health care reform jurisdiction, has observed "the name of the game in the Senate is [agreeing upon a package which can garner] sixty votes.

Health care reform is probably the most prominent, but hardly the only issue which will be affected by the filibuster.

The same band of Senators who filibustered efforts to limit overgrazing of public land and reduce public grazing subsidies for ranchers are expected to filibuster efforts to end the give-away of mining rights on federal lands and to prevent and clean up mining's toxic disasters. Filibusters or threats of filibusters are likely force watering down of other environmental legislation this year, ranging from the Clean Water Act to Superfund, from Endangered Species to wetlands protection.

Even if public pressure keeps opponents of assault weapons bans from filibustering the

crime bill when it comes back from the House/Senate conference, we'll see more filibusters on gun control in '94. For example, now that the Brady Bill has finally become law (after being killed by a filibuster two years ago, and narrowly escaping that fate this year) it becomes important to do something about the high percentages of handguns that are bought and sold illegally. Despite their standard argument that criminals will get guns illegally, NRA supporters can be expected to filibuster even modest efforts to limit the supply of guns to illegal gun resellers, such as restricting the number of guns an individual can purchase in a month. Similarly, now that the years of delay in handgun control have put an enormous arsenal in the wrong hands, regulating the sale of ammunition appears to be one of the most promising strategies to control gun violence -- but such efforts appear likely to be blocked by filibusters.

The list goes on. But the issue is not whether a particular piece of legislation is good or bad; it is whether we will respect democracy and majority rule or continue to be governed by minority rule. The question is whether we will have action or gridlock.

The Solution? Kindling a Prairie Fire of Public Outrage

There once was a respected distinction between opposing a bill and refusing to allow the Senate to vote on it. The filibuster was reserved for extraordinary "matters of conscience." But, during the 102nd Congress (1991-92) alone, the Senate voted on cloture 48 times — as many as in the entire half century from 1921 to 1970. And this year, the filibuster completed its evolution to a routine tool used to obstruct Senate action whenever opponents can muster 41 votes.

If the distinction between opposing a bill and filibustering it continues to be obscured, the only way to break filibusters will be to persuade 60 Senators of the merits of the legislation. In short, the Senate will continue to operate by minority rule.

The Message

Even on those issues where public attention and concern are greatest, many Americans lack the time or expertise to form a strongly held opinion on the merits of competing legislative proposals. Many will throw up their hands in confusion as they try to evaluate the arguments for and against alternative bills on a particular issue, such as health care. Citizens who are unsure of their own opinion on the substance of legislation won't act to demand support or opposition.

But these same citizens will act when they perceive a clear, simple principle of right and wrong — as so many have, correctly or incorrectly, on term limits, congressional pay raises, the "bouncing checks," and, most recently, on discharge petitions. And this is the key which can unlock a solution.

The filibuster strikes at the heart of the democratic process, and it can and should be presented simply and forcefully as a matter of action vs. inaction, of respect for majority rule vs. insistence on minority rule and gridlock. Such an approach could appeal not only to those who support legislation blocked by filibusters, but also to constituencies who have been supportive of term limits, Perot's candidacy, and other reforms which demonstrate their disaffection with the current state of politics.

Regardless of their views on specific legislation, a broad spectrum of Americans can agree that we need a government that can take action. They do recognize gridlock. And they do believe in majority rule.

Absent an understanding of the filibuster, the public is unable to hold particular Senators responsible for gridlock, and instead blames all of Congress. But an understanding of the

filibuster could provide the spark to transform that generalized resentment of Congress into the fuel for a "prairie fire" of focused outrage, reminding selected senators:

We're not paying you to go to Washington and stand in the way, wasting your time and our money, making sure no decisions get made. *Vote for proposals or against them, but let the Senate vote, and let the democratic process work.*

We will wage an ongoing campaign over the next year aimed not at a particular piece of legislation, but rather at the use of the filibuster as a tool to enforce gridlock, hold the government hostage to minority rule, and obstruct the democratic process itself.

On most filibusters, a shift of a few votes can change the outcome. Our main objective is to push the filibuster into the national spotlight and to create enough of a public outcry to shift a few swing Senators to vote for cloture more often and make obstructionists wary of filibustering so often. If we can do that, whether or not the filibuster rule itself is changed, we will have had an extraordinary impact, dramatically changing the legislative landscape.

The Strategy

The campaign will have two major strategic components...

- **Intensive, Targeted State Campaigns.** Because we recognize that winning just a few votes for cloture would change the entire legislative landscape, we will implement intensive local strategies in the states of a small number of swing senators. In order to maximize the impact of each dollar expended, we will select those states on the basis of the Senators' susceptibility to constituent opinion and on the relative cost of mounting an effort in the state.

- A national public education campaign will help to reinforce state level efforts and create a broad outcry against the filibuster. This campaign will involve three entities: a national coalition which Action, Not Gridlock will help to coordinate; Action, Not Gridlock and its Advisory Board; and a free-standing Citizens Committee, comprising prominent citizens who will speak out on this issue.

The Tactics

The campaign will rely on three different tactics:

A. At both the national and state levels, we are beginning to build bipartisan advisory boards, including Republicans and Independents, as well as Democrats, who agree that respect for the democratic process means allowing a majority to act. Members of these advisory boards will play important roles in a media strategy which will rely upon: talk radio, and television talk show appearances; meetings with editorial boards; press conferences, letters to the editor, op-ed pieces, etc., to create a public outcry that reliance on the filibuster amounts to saying, "I'm only for letting the majority rule when the majority agrees with me."

B. We will experiment with phone solicitation, direct mail or door-to-door canvasses *in the targeted states*. Such efforts are not expected to make money. We will be happy if they come close to paying for themselves while enabling us to: a) communicate with thousands of voters, directly impacting public opinion; b) build a membership base which can be publicly cited to enhance the credibility of the state group; and c) possibly building a "quick response network" which can be tapped to generate letters and calls to Senators when a cloture vote is near.

C. Grassroots organizing, aimed primarily at the target states, and including, in addition to the creation of state-level advisory boards and coalitions: 1) drives to get phone calls, letters, and pre-printed cards to the Senator from ordinary citizens, 2) organizing meetings of community leaders with target Senators; and 3) Organizing concerned citizens to attend the Senators' public appearances, calling upon the Senators to defend their use of the filibuster.

The Staff

Action, Not Gridlock! Education Fund will be directed by Sanford A. Newman, who founded the non-partisan Project VOTE!, and directed it from 1982 until this year. Under his direction, Project VOTE! registered two million voters, including 560,000 in 1992, pioneered the strategy of registering voters in social service agencies, developed a reputation for tight management of field operations and effective voter education and turnout programs, won a dozen lawsuits to protect the right to vote, and developed a diverse funding base of foundations, individuals, corporations and unions, who together contributed \$2 million in 1992.

Action, not Gridlock! Education Fund will also recruit and train 6-8 state directors and between 20 and 30 organizers for its grassroots campaign.

Progress!

Over the last month we have made a great deal of progress. Former Senators Mathias (R-MD) and Eagleton (D-MO) have agreed to co-chair a committee which will be speaking out on this subject. And Dr. Arthur Fleming, who served as Secretary of HEW under Eisenhower and in a variety of Presidentially appointed positions by the Nixon, Ford, and Reagan administrations, has also agreed to be involved. With this foothold, we expect to be able to recruit others who will help insure that this effort can't be dismissed as "Democratic liberals complaining."

We have also begun testing the appeal of our message to talk shows. The message has resonated so well even with conservative hosts and listeners that Talkers, the trade publication of talk radio, listed Action, Not Gridlock first in its year-end list of recommended guests.

The Ticking Clock

If this kind of effort is to have a substantial impact on the 1994 session of Congress, it must raise approximately \$100,000 over the next several weeks so that it can have staff in the field no later than the end of March.

The Filibuster: A Fact Sheet

Imposing Gridlock by Minority Rule

Many Americans assume that gridlock occurs because a Congressional majority just can't reach an agreement on forceful action. But the real problem is more fundamental: **majority rule has become the exception, rather than the rule, in the U.S. Senate.**

Over and over again in recent years, we've seen a majority of the Senate ready to act—only to find a minority of Senators filibustering—holding the Senate hostage, refusing even to allow a vote on legislative proposals.

What is a Filibuster?

When a minority prevents a majority from voting, it's called a filibuster. Under Senate rules, it takes 60 out of the Senate's 100 members voting for "cloture" to stop the filibuster and insist on their right to vote up or down on legislation. Democracy and the principle of majority rule are turned upside down as a minority of 41 Senators (or even less if some Senators are absent) insist on blocking any action, rather than allowing majority rule to produce a result with which they disagree.

A High Price to Pay

The ever-present threat of a filibuster forces compromise after compromise even before legislation is introduced. Senators know majority support won't do; today, they must have 60 votes to pass any significant legislation. And as the bargaining goes on to pick up that critical 60th vote to shut off a filibuster, any one Senator has enormous power to demand concessions—or pork—as the price for allowing the majority to vote.

So instead of forceful action, we get a Congress too often unable to move in any direction. Instead of effective decision-making and coherent policy, we get either policy paralysis or responses so watered down and toothless that they can't begin to solve the serious problems we face. And instead of public respect for our system of government, we get public disgust at a spectacle of gridlock by minority rule.

Does the Filibuster Really Protect Debate and Deliberation?

No. In fact, under the current rules, once a filibuster is announced, the Senate usually moves on to other business until enough deals can be struck to win 60 votes for cloture, or the bill dies.

Did the Constitution's Framers Intend the Senate to Work This Way?

No. The Articles of Confederation had proven ineffective because they required the approval of 2/3 of the states for most legislation. The impotency of a government which could act only with the approval of a supermajority was seen as a fatal flaw to be avoided in the new Constitution. While the Constitution provided many checks and balances to prevent rash action, including requiring a 2/3 majority for constitutional amendments, impeachment, treaties, veto overrides and expulsion of members, the framers considered and explicitly rejected efforts to require more than a majority vote on other matters.

"[Supermajority requirements] destroy the energy of government, and substitute the pleasure, caprice, or artifices of an insignificant or corrupt junto to the regular deliberations of a respectable majority. In those emergencies of a nation, in which the strength of its government is the greatest importance, there is commonly a necessity for action. If the majority, in order that something may be done, must conform to the views of the minority, the smaller number will overrule the greater. Hence, tedious delays; continual negotiation and intrigue; contemptible compromises of the public good."

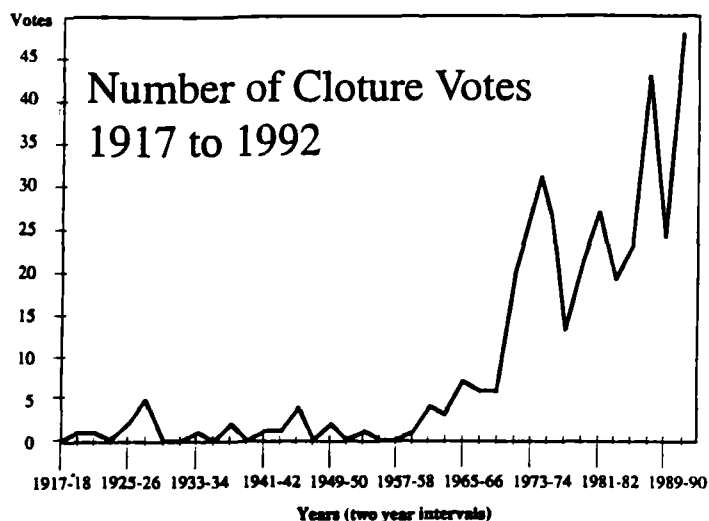
A Historical Accident

Indeed, until 1806, the Senate had a "previous question" motion, which could be used by a majority to bring a matter to a vote. When the Senate codified its rules that year, this motion was omitted, apparently because it was so rarely used in the small Senate of that day that it was thought unnecessary. In 1917, the Senate adopted Rule 22, which provided that two-thirds of all Senators present and voting could end a filibuster. A 1975 battle led to the compromise

which remains in effect, providing that cloture can be obtained when supported by 3/5 of all Senators.

Evolution from Irritant to Epidemic

There once was a respected distinction between opposing a bill and refusing to allow the Senate to vote on it. In the years after Rule 22 was adopted, the filibuster remained a rarely used tactic, reserved for extraordinary "matters of conscience." In the 50 years after the rule's adoption in 1917, there were only 38 cloture votes—well under one a year.



But the filibuster has now become a routine tool used to obstruct Senate action whenever opponents can muster 41 votes. From 1991-93, there were 68 cloture votes, nearly twice as many as in the entire half century after Rule 22's passage.

Minority rule by filibuster will inevitably leave us with a government frighteningly like that which was tested and found wanting under the Articles of Confederation — a government which can act only if policy proposals are diluted to find a least common denominator upon which 3/5 of its Senators can agree.

The Choice: Gridlock or Action to Meet Our Nation's Challenges

Americans may disagree about the solutions to our nation's challenges, but we all know that we need a government that can take action.

Among the legislation facing the threat of a filibuster are proposals to deal with guns and violence, labor law reform, occupational safety, the rights of women and minorities, environmental protection and, of course, health care reform.

The jobs bill/stimulus package, the National Service bill, Campaign Finance Reform, the Motor Voter bill, and natural resource management reforms, all had majority support in the Senate last year. Yet all were killed or weakened by filibusters.

The issue is not whether the proposals blocked by filibusters are good or bad. It is whether we will be better served when we let the democratic process work, allow decisions to be made, and allow voters to hold their Senators accountable at election time. At any given time, filibusters may be used by Democrats or Republicans, liberals or conservatives. In the long run, we are all the losers. The reciprocal use of filibusters leaves all sides paralyzed.

This is neither a partisan issue nor an issue of ideology. The question is whether we will respect democracy and majority rule or continue to be governed by minority rule. The question is whether we will have action or gridlock.

Action, Not Gridlock!: Making Democracy Work

Action, Not Gridlock! is a grassroots movement of people who are fed up with gridlock, and are ready to do something about its biggest cause: the filibuster. *Action, Not Gridlock!* is strictly non-partisan, and neither supports nor opposes particular legislation. It seeks to further no group's ideological agenda, but simply to make democracy work.

Action, Not Gridlock!'s mission is to help citizens understand what's causing congressional gridlock, and to arm them with the information they need to do something about it.

Its members will join together to send Senators a simple message:

Vote your conscience, for or against legislation. But at least respect majority rule and the democratic process. Give the Senate back its right to vote. Give us back our right to a Senate that can make decisions - our right to action instead of gridlock!

A HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION to honor Dr. Bill Moffit by naming him Music Arranger Laureate of Indiana.

WHEREAS, Dr. Bill Moffit is presently Marching Band Director at Purdue University and has been responsible for numerous arrangements of band music performed at various band events including the Indianapolis 500 Race Day ceremonies, the Pan American Games, and Wander Indiana celebrations; and,

WHEREAS, while a resident of Texas Dr. Moffit was honored by a Concurrent Resolution of the Indiana House and Senate and was named an Honorary Citizen of Crawfordsville for his musical service to Indiana bands; and,

WHEREAS, Dr. Moffit was recently interviewed on the CBS Morning News which was televised nationally. His work with WLFI's "Lafayette's Great" promotion is well known locally. He's working with Cable News Network on a "Music Makes me Healthy" program of walking exercise to the beat of music. This was the subject of an article featuring him in the national publication Walking. Like many of the things he does nationally, this was pioneered in Indiana first; and,

WHEREAS, Dr. Moffit was selected to conduct the fanfare trumpets for the 1984 Olympic Games and most recently for the 1987 Pan Am Games.

In 1985, Purdue President Steven C. Beering presented him a special gold watch and honored him as Purdue's "Man of the Hour." Moffit is

also listed in "Who's Who in America"; and,

WHEREAS, Dr. Moffit is a member of ASCAP and the College Band Directors National Association. He has been on the board of directors of the National Band Association and is a past president of the Texas Bandmasters Association; and,

WHEREAS, Dr. Moffit's awards include the Distinguished Service to Music Medal from Kappa Kappa Psi, the George Washington Medal for Patriotic Musical Activity from the Freedoms Foundation of Valley Forge, the Distinguished Alumni Award from Baldwin-Wallace College, and an honorary Doctor of Music from Otterbein College. He has received resolutions of honor from the Ohio and Indiana legislatures and was nominated as a candidate for the Presidential Medal of Freedom; and,

WHEREAS, Dr. Moffit has prepared special arrangements of "On the Banks of the Wabash" and "Back Home Again in Indiana"; and,

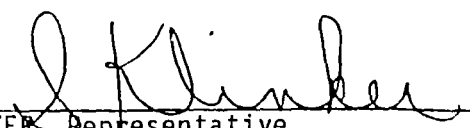

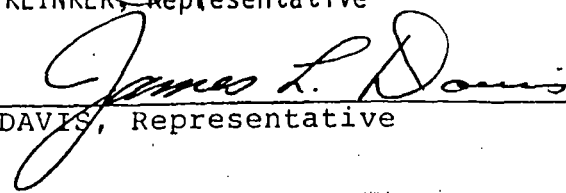

Moffit to Arrange New Russian National Anthem for Presentation on *Trans-Siberian* Trip

Indiana Music Arranger Laureate Dr. William C. Moffit was recently selected to arrange for band the new Russian national anthem, the first copies of which will be presented to the mayors of seven Russian cities in July during a *Trans-Siberian* Railroad excursion, according to Mark L. Eutsler, president of Railway Heritage Network, which is promoting the trip.

The anthem, *Glinka's Patriotic Song*, was officially introduced by Presidential Decree in December of 1993. It was called for in Russia's new constitution, according to Lonni H. Spiegel of the U.S. Department of State's Office of Independent States and Commonwealth Affairs.

The arrangement will be suitable for performance by school, community, and military bands, according to Eutsler. It will be presented during stops on *Trans-Siberian* trip sponsored by The Conner Center for East/West Reconciliation as a gesture of friendship and respect.

Recipients include Mayor Viktor Bolotnov of Byrobidjan, Mayor Viktor Tevelevich of Khabarovsk, Mayor Boris Govorin of Irkutsk, Mayor Yuriy Luzhkov of Moscow, Mayor Ivan Indinok of Novosibirsk, Mayor Anatoliy Sobchak of St. Petersburg, and Mayor Yuriy Novikov of Yekaterinburg.

A copy of the original symphonic score and audio recording was provided by Andrkei Pogov, Third Secretary of the Embassy of the Russian Federation's Office of Congressional Affairs.

Moffit, professor emeritus of Purdue University Bands, is a former director of the *All-American* Marching Band. He is the author and originator of *Patterns of Motion* publications and more than 400 SOUNDPOWER music arrangement titles selling nearly one million copies. He was appointed Music Arranger Laureate by the Indiana General Assembly in 1988.

Travel Across Russia on the *Trans Siberian Express*

An experience for persons holding a fascination with railroads and thirsting for the exotic is planned by traversing eight time zones through Russia aboard the *Trans Siberian Express* on the world's longest railroad line, according to Mark Eutsler, president of Railway Heritage Network. Produced by the John T. Conner Center for East/West Reconciliation of West Lafayette, the trip will be a 19-day traveling seminar adventure.

Departing Khabarovsk, the train moves westward with overnight stops in Birobidzhan, Irkutsk, Novosibirsk, and Ekaterinburg before arriving in Moscow. There will be an add on for travelers wanting to experience St. Petersburg by taking the overnight express train from Moscow. "A total of eight days will be spent aboard the train July 8-26, 1994, as travelers come to know the richness and expanse of Russia through its culture and history," Eutsler, who is also secretary of the Conner Center board, notes. "The day trip at Irkutsk will include a visit to Lake Baikal which is the largest fresh water lake in the world holding more than one-fifth of the world's fresh water supply at a depth of over one mile," he adds.

According to the Rev. Dr. Don Nead, director of the Conner Center and tour leader, the exotic aspect of the trip is that the group will be traveling through the region of the world where the philosophical understanding of reality shifts from oriental to occidental (east to west). "At each stop we will visit religious communities and cultural venues," he says. Retiring in December of 1992 after 20 years as campus pastor of University Church at Purdue he has conducted 12 traveling seminars to what is now the former Soviet Union over the past 10 years.

"The uniqueness of this experience is heightened by the possibility of having a private train for the group," Eutsler notes. "Each coach holds 18 people in nine compartments. If five coaches are filled, a special train with limited stops just for the tour group will be scheduled," he explains.

The trip costs \$3490 per person and includes first class hotels (two persons per room), soft class on the train (two persons per compartment), round-trip air from New York, flight from Moscow to Khabarovsk, train to Moscow, and some meals. 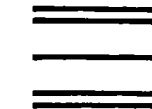

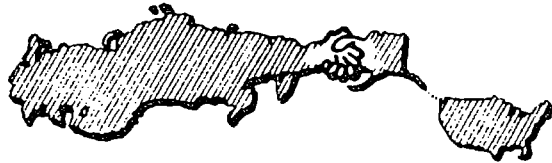
The Conner Center Profile:

SUBJECT: Guidance on Voting Rights Cases

In light of the extensive interest in the pending voting rights cases, we thought that it might be helpful to issue specific guidance regarding this litigation.

1. It is appropriate to state that the President and the Attorney General are strongly supportive of defending minority voting opportunities and that, at this point, the Justice Department is vigorously participating in litigation in four States in defense of challenged plans (Georgia, North Carolina, Texas, and Louisiana). Copies of the President's statement and the Attorney General's statement are attached.
2. It is important to point out that all litigation decisions are up to the Justice Department, and that comments or concerns can be addressed to the Associate Attorney General or his office.
3. If a person or organization continues to wish to raise specific comments or concerns, the person or organization may be directed to the White House Counsel's office.

STATEMENT OF THE PRESIDENT ON DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE
ACTION IN VOTING RIGHTS CASES

I have been advised that the Department of Justice has announced that the United States will participate in voting rights litigation in three States to defend minority voting opportunities. The legal action taken today in cases in North Carolina, Georgia, and Texas reaffirms my Administration's strong commitment to defend the historic gains made under the Voting Rights Act.

The Voting Rights Act ensures that all Americans may fully participate in the democratic process. In recent years, our nation has enjoyed a tremendous increase in minority voter access to our electoral system.

These hard-won victories must not be abandoned. I applaud the forceful actions of Attorney General Reno and the Justice Department to ensure that voting rights are vigorously protected.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE DEFENDS RIGHTS OF MINORITY VOTERS
TAKES ACTION IN NORTH CAROLINA, GEORGIA AND TEXAS

WASHINGTON, D.C. -- The Department of Justice today moved to defend the rights of minority voters in separate cases in Georgia, North Carolina and Texas, where Congressional districting plans have been challenged.

"This Department is committed to protecting minority voting rights gains that were achieved through redistricting after the 1990 Census," Attorney General Janet Reno stated. "Our actions today will help ensure that the clock is not turned back and that those gains are not undone."

In compliance with the Voting Rights Act, Georgia, North Carolina and Texas each drew additional black or Hispanic majority congressional districts in order to fairly reflect minority voting strength. Under the Bush Administration, the Justice Department approved each of the state's districting plans before they were implemented, as required by Section 5 of the Voting Rights Act. The Department's decisions to defend minority voter opportunities in each state were based on individual assessments of each of the districting plans.

The suits against the districting plans in Georgia and Texas

are based on a Supreme Court case, Shaw v. Reno, challenging the constitutionality of North Carolina's Congressional plan. That challenge resulted in a decision in June of 1993 which set forth new districting standards. In Shaw, the Court found that a redistricting plan that segregated voters by race and was "irregular on its face" was subject to strict constitutional scrutiny.

Following the Supreme Court decision in North Carolina, the Department took steps to ensure that the Voting Rights Act was not undermined by misinterpretations of Shaw. Since the decision, the Department has participated in cases raising issues under Shaw in Louisiana, California and Texas. In August, the Department participated as amicus curiae in Hays v. Louisiana, which challenged the creation of two black majority Congressional districts in Louisiana. The Department argued that the state had a compelling interest in drawing the two districts.

The Department's actions today are outlined below:

NORTH CAROLINA

The Department will continue to defend North Carolina's decision to draw two black majority Congressional districts by participating in the case as amicus curiae.

North Carolina created the two districts in 1992 after the Department of Justice objected to the state's first districting plan. That plan had failed to fairly reflect black voter strength by drawing only one black majority district. Following the objection, the Department approved a plan with two black majority districts.

In March 1992, five voters challenged the creation of the black majority 1st and 12th Congressional Districts. Department of Justice officials were initially named as a defendant in the case, but were dismissed by the trial court.

On June 28, 1993, the Supreme Court affirmed the dismissal of Department officials as defendants and remanded the case back for the plaintiffs to prove that the districts were simply a "racial gerrymander" without sufficient non-racial justification.

The case, now entitled Shaw v. Hunt, is scheduled for trial on March 28. The Department will join the state in opposing a motion to prevent the use of the challenged districting plan in the May 3rd Congressional primary elections.

In its brief, the Department argues that there is substantial evidence that the state's plan is constitutional and is narrowly tailored to meet a compelling state interest.

GEORGIA

The Department will intervene as a defendant on the side of the state of Georgia in order to defend the state's effort to recognize black voting strength. The state drew three majority black districts, one of which is being challenged.

Georgia's Congressional district plan had been precleared by the Department in 1992 after the Department issued two objections to plans submitted with only two black majority districts. The state then drew a third black majority district.

On January 13, 1994, plaintiff's filed Johnson v. Miller, challenging the constitutionality of one of the black majority districts - District 11.

"We are intervening in this case because the state drew this district to resolve concerns raised by the Justice Department," said Acting Assistant Attorney General for Civil Rights James P. Turner.

TEXAS

The Department will participate as amicus curiae to defend the rights of minority voters in Texas in Vera v. Richards, a lawsuit filed on January 26, 1994 challenging the Texas Congressional districting plan.

The Department participated in a status conference called by the Court today and opposed plaintiff's motion seeking a preliminary injunction barring the use of the plan in March 8, 1994, primary elections.

The state has seven Hispanic majority districts and two black majority districts under a plan precleared by the Department in 1991.

"By participating in these cases, the Justice Department will be able to provide the Courts with the benefit of its extensive involvement in redistricting litigation throughout the country," said Turner.

The Department is currently considering its options in a yet another case filed on January 18, 1994, challenging a redistricting plan in the 3rd Congressional district in Florida.

SINCE THE MORNING PAPERS:

- o **Snow-choked roads slowed the pullout of guns** from the hills around Sarajevo today, but the Bosnian Serbs pledged to meet NATO's deadline to remove them. UN officials reported progress toward removing the weapons by Monday's deadline, but the officials wouldn't confirm yesterday's reports of major withdrawals of firepower.

IN THE WHITE HOUSE AND AROUND TOWN:

- o **The President is receiving regular briefings today on the situation in Bosnia.** Spokeswoman Dee Dee Myers said the White House had not received independent confirmation of Serb troop withdrawals around Sarajevo, but she was optimistic about reports that showed forces pulling back. She would not speculate on reports the withdrawals might not include all the Serb troops and artillery.
Congressman Lee Hamilton, the chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, said this morning that "the evidence of yesterday and last night is heartening. So there's at least some optimism here. The long history of this and the difficulties we've had in carrying out of agreements in the past have to make you a little bit skeptical. But so far, so good. They seem to be pulling back those guns." As for the contingent of Russians in Sarajevo, Hamilton said there is a "down side, of course, that if the [air] strikes were to go forward, the Russians are there. It probably means the Russians will have a greater voice as you move along in these events. So the significant thing, I think, is that the Russians now become much greater players, not just in diminishing the possibility of air strikes, but just as importantly in the negotiating track that is ahead of us. They're in the center of things now."
- o **Today is "New Hampshire Day" at the White House.** On the anniversary of the leadoff primary in which President Clinton came in second and labeled himself "the Comeback Kid," about 200 opinion leaders representing New Hampshire business, media and politics are at the White House getting briefings from Administration officials. The day will be capped with a reception in the President's residence. Clinton has granted an interview with a New Hampshire television station and will have a roundtable discussion with print and radio reporters from the state. Press Secretary Dee Dee Myers appeared to play down the anniversary, saying the day's events were part of a series in which opinion leaders from different states visit the White House.
- o **Democrats on the Hill say too much attention is being focused on tinkering with the Clinton health care plan.** According to sources with key congressional committees, the media and others are taking part in a fruitless exercise of trying to figure out just what needs to be trimmed from the Clinton plan to make it fit into the financial constraints recently laid out by the Congressional Budget Office.
"It is important to remember that the President's plan won't pass and that, in fact, whatever plan passes will look significantly different, if not radically different," a Democratic source close to the Senate Finance Committee told the Bulletin. "And so to worry at this stage about meeting CBO's objections on

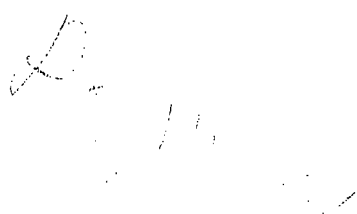
Business Outreach for the Reemployment Act

As you know, the President will travel to Italy, the United Kingdom and France from June 1-7, 1994, to participate in ceremonies commemorating the 50th anniversary of World War II.

To best meet the needs of the President, members of the Cabinet, members of Congress, and other travelling staff with minimum cost to the government, we've instituted a travel approval process. This process will help us allocate available hotel space, issue passports and visas, coordinate logistical details of the President's visit, and limit the travelling party to those staff who are essential to the completion of the President's mission.

The following procedures must be followed for any staff or guests needing to travel in advance of the President, on Air Force One, or on any other commercial or military aircraft. Only persons who follow these procedures will be allowed to travel.

- Requests for travel must be submitted in writing or by electronic mail to Michael Lufrano in Room 185 of the Old Executive Office Building by April 1, 1994. Requests received subsequent to this deadline will be summarily rejected.

Each request must include:

- a. Traveller's name, agency/department, and position;

 - c. Exact itinerary (ie; entire trip or names of those cities to which he or she will travel);

- No traveller will be issued a ticket or allowed on an aircraft without prior approval of the White House Director of Scheduling and Advance. Notice of approval will be sent to all travellers by April 15, 1994.

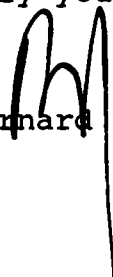

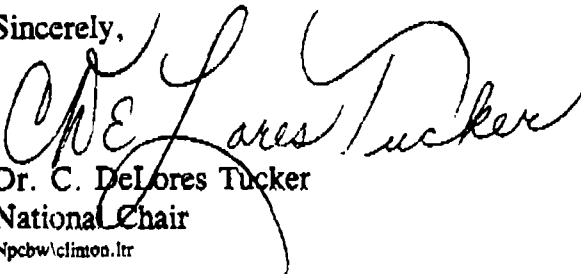

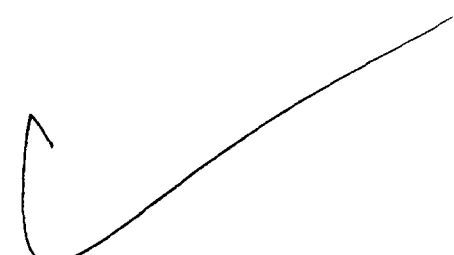

AFRICAN AMERICANS' HEALTH CARE UNDER THE HEALTH SECURITY ACT

Nineteen ninety-four will bring health care reform, but it will bring better health care for African Americans only if President Clinton's principles are not compromised.

President Clinton has introduced a bill in Congress, The Health Security Act, that will overhaul the health care system. It is a comprehensive bill that is based on six simple principles—security, savings, simplicity, choice, quality, and responsibility. Various groups have focused on specific principles as vital to their interests in a reformed health system. The economists demand savings; the American Medical Association trumpets choice; and everyone rallies behind quality.

What about African Ameri-

cans? Crisis describes the status of health and health care in the African-American community, making all six principles vital to African-American interests. However, the security that will follow from everyone having access to comprehensive health benefits that can never be taken away is, in my opinion, the most important principle to the African-American community.

The health care crisis in the African-American community has many causes, but at the core are two issues—disproportionate numbers of uninsured persons and a heavy burden of illness.

One in four African Americans does not have health insurance compared with 14.7 percent for the general population. The reality of this statistic is that virtually every African American knows a family member, friend, or coworker who is uninsured. Most uninsured persons work or are dependent on someone who works.

Moreover, African Americans' health status is lower than Americans as a whole. Life expectancy is lower; infant mortality is greater; many disabling diseases such as heart disease, diabetes, and arthritis are more common. This high burden of illness means that African Americans often have "pre-existing conditions" resulting in high health insurance premiums or worse—being refused coverage by insurance companies. In addition, many African Americans who are insured rely on Medicaid or have

bare-bones policies. It does not make sense for one-fourth of a people so burdened with illness to be without comprehensive health coverage.

Under the Health Security Act

The Health Security Act will guarantee comprehensive health care benefits to every citizen and legal resident. The benefits will cover office treatments, laboratory tests, hospitalizations, prescription drugs and insulin, dental care and eye care for children to age 18, rehabilitation, long-term care, hospice, mental health services, and substance abuse treatments.

Full mental health and substance abuse treatment benefits will be phased in over six years. Even in the beginning, inpatient and outpatient mental health and substance abuse treatments will be covered with some restrictions, but more liberally than most of today's health insurance policies.

Equally important, the Act will cover preventive services such as pap smears, mammograms, well-baby check-ups, and health classes. In order to encourage everyone to take advantage of these services and do everything possible to stay healthy, these services will be free of charge.

Emergency services will be covered, and for true emergencies, there will not be a copayment. The tragedy is that today, many people use the emergency room because they do not have any other

acceptable source of medical care. Because the Health Security Act will increase the number of providers in underserved areas, everyone will be able to reserve emergency rooms for emergencies.

The Health Security Act will provide the security of cradle-to-grave health care coverage. No insurance company will be able to exclude you because you have a serious, chronic, or expensive medical problem such as stroke, cancer, or health disease. A crucial step in improving the health of the African-American community will be assuring that all African Americans have comprehensive health benefits throughout life—no matter what life may bring.

The health care system in this country is extremely complex. Therefore, even though most African Americans know that the system needs fixing and know what would be best for our communities, there is a tendency to leave the fixing to the experts. Our health care system is too important for us not to get involved. Everyone should try to learn how this will affect them, their family, and their neighbors, and make their views known. As the various health care reform bills are debated, African Americans must examine each with regard to the security it brings to our community.

When we last visited, we discussed my recent trip to China and activities of ARCO and others there. As I reported to you then, the Chinese have been very responsive to investment and project proposals from U.S. companies. ARCO's relations with the Chinese government and its state-owned companies have been excellent.

In recent weeks, we have been working with Secretaries Brown and O'Leary to encourage Vice Premier Zou Jiahua to visit the U.S. Vice Premier Zou is the number three person in China and is responsible for manufacturing and energy matters. Secretaries Brown and O'Leary have extended formal invitations to Vice Premier Zou to come to the U.S. during the week of May 1, 1994. In our discussions with the Chinese, both before and after they received notice of the invitation from your Administration, they expressed a sincere interest in coming to the U.S. and their deep appreciation for the invitations which were extended.

We understand that the Vice Premier is in the process of making his final plans concerning the trip. We noted that when Secretaries Christopher and Bentsen were in China, they were afforded the opportunity to visit with the highest officials in the Chinese government. In view of this hospitality, it seems appropriate for us to afford the same level of treatment. Therefore, I would hope that your schedule would be such that you could visit with Vice Premier Zou when he is in Washington. Such a meeting has the potential to dramatically improve relations with our two countries and could be the catalyst for improved conditions in China.

Phil is contacting Gil Vasquez today to assure his willingness to become EEOC Chair. Phil has interviewed Ed Cook by phone and will hear from him today re whether he would accept Gen Counsel position. If he declines, alternatives are Linda Green, who previously withdrew from consideration, or Michael Middleton, Missouri, recommended by Eleanor Holmes Norton, interviewed by Cynthia but not seen here. Middleton is strong, but was previously ambivalent about his interest in this. Another option would be Susan Ross, who runs the Title VII clinic at Georgetown. She is not Af-American; is very strong. At that point, I believe they decided to go career and simply held off requesting approval until they felt WH would acquiesce. No improvement in diversity has occurred in other appointments in the interim. The majority of Asst. Secy's at State are career (Awilda is compiling specific #s this week for VB reference). This request may provide leverage if WH wants Foreman over Oakley (career FSO) in the Refugees, Resettlement & Population Bureau director (slated to become an Asst. Sec'y position).

Until the Nanny Flap, FBI Hadn't a Clue

Secretary of Defense Les Aspin, who has seen only two of 43 Pentagon officials get through the appointment-confirmation process, has a good news-bad news view of what's happening in his department.

From the viewpoint of Cabinet officers like himself, Aspin told a group of reporters yesterday, Zoe Baird "had a chilling effect" on the Clinton administration's efforts to fill key jobs. "Things were moving along until that point," he said, "and then they just ground to a halt."



When nanny problems shot down President Clinton's first choice for attorney general, "people froze, because the ground rules had changed," Aspin said.

On the other hand, Aspin said, the nanny flap has turned into a blessing in disguise for FBI agents assigned to background checks. "They had been wandering around in a daze," he explained. "They used to have two sure-fire questions: Have you ever been a communist and are you gay? They can't ask either [question] now. One is politically incorrect and the other is irrelevant. So they said, thank God, after Zoe Baird there's something we can ask: Do you have an illegal nanny?"

Black Caucus Pushes FDIC Prospect

■ The Clinton administration is under growing congressional pressure to appoint a minority or a woman to head the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp., which has only had white men as chairman or board members.

Though two Arkansas bankers—William Bowen and William Brandon—have been considered the leading candidates for the post, the conspicuous lack of diversity at the FDIC makes it increasingly difficult to give either of them the job, industry and congressional sources say.

A long list of well-connected Democrats has urged the White House to give the post to Francisco "Frank" Borges, former Connecticut state treasurer. Borges is an immigrant from the Cape Verde Islands who learned English when he was 8 and worked his way up the political ladder to become the state's highest black elected official.

Borges took a top job on Wall Street only a few months ago and earlier indicated he wasn't available. But his candidacy is being pushed anew by key members of the Congressional Black Caucus and other influential lawmakers who say the lack of minority representation has influenced the way the FDIC handles such issues as community reinvestment.

"When you look at the regulatory agencies in the banking community, obviously there has not been much diversity at all," says Rep. Floyd H. Flake (D-N.Y.), one of many black lawmakers who fault the

banking agencies for not moving more aggressively to end discrimination in lending and to promote investment in inner cities.

"The situation would be helped tremendously if they had some African-American, Hispanic or women's influence," said Flake.

Hot Wheels at the White House

■ Amid all the clunkers in the West Executive Drive parking lot at the White House, there is a classic: A 1969 shiny black, Ford Fairlane two-door hardtop, driven by White House staff secretary John Podesta. The mint condition Fairlane, with its fancy white leather interior, has prompted deputy chief of staff Mark Gearan to crack: "It's a float."

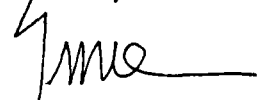

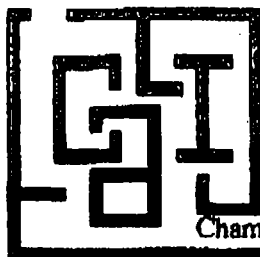

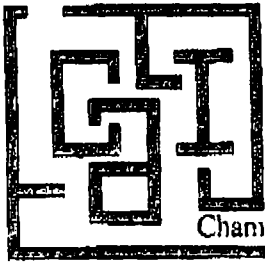

I am writing to call to your attention the potential benefit to the President of announcing at the Moscow Summit the historic investment that US West is making in the development of Russia's telecommunications infrastructure. The new Russian Telecommunications Development Corporation, which has not yet been announced, is the largest single private equity investment in Russia by a western company. US West and its Russian partners would follow-up an announcement or mention of this investment by the President with a release of details.

This project will create several thousand jobs in Russia and will stimulate economic growth and free market democratic expansion. It is also expected to include a major business education center which will provide training to thousands of Russians in critical business skills.

Perhaps of even greater significance, it will provide the capacity for "citizen to citizen" communications within Russia and between Russia and the world, which is necessary for the development of Russian democracy. It also provides critically important infrastructure for Russia's economic development. I have enclosed a brief description of the US West investments and will be happy to provide additional information.

I hope the President will take advantage of the opportunity to highlight this project of historic importance.

All of us at WOW thank you for your collaboration with and support of Wider Opportunities for Women throughout 1993. As we complete our 29th year of work to achieve the goals of improving the economic independence and equality of opportunity of women and girls across America, we are thankful for friends and colleagues like you who have contributed your time, financial support, and good ideas to our mission.

This year, as you begin your holidays, we ask you to help us begin our third decade with a contribution to the Washington area women who are the heart of WOW's work -- the low income mothers who use WOW's local employment and training services. Over this year, WOW's work has focused on women who need our help to build skills and families whose futures are limited by substantial barriers. As you consider your holiday donations this year, we hope you'll think of investing in services which help these women reach their dreams and improve our local economy.

WOW's local work in 1993 and 1994 includes three critical programs:

- **The Family Learning Project**, a comprehensive investment program that assists low income mothers with limited literacy build their skills and take the next steps toward well-paid jobs, while working with their children to succeed in school. This program is a national model for teaching the mother, while reaching the child -- a cost effective family support program. 80% of the women served in this program leave WOW for postsecondary education or a job paying \$8.00 or above after 20 weeks of intensive training. Yet WOW can provide this training for only 10% of the women who call us for help.
- **The Nontraditional Employment for Women Initiative**, a collaboration with local government, the YWCA of the National Capital Area, and local area tradeswomen to provide career counseling, support, and skills training to 300 women interested in gaining high wage nontraditional jobs. WOW's role in the effort is to provide first step career counseling to assist nearly 1,000 women consider nontraditional career options and to demonstrate the pathways to success in these fields.
- **Women's Work, Inc.**, a support group for women working in blue collar and technical jobs to assist them in overcoming the barriers to retaining and succeeding in what used to be thought of as "men's work." Led by former WOW graduates, Women's Work, Inc. is housed at and supported by WOW.

Increasingly, WOW works nationally to achieve its mission. Yet, services to local area women remain the core of all we do and bring credibility to our voices as change agents and policy advocates. WOW is one of the few national women's organizations that is both practitioner and policy change agent -- whose advocacy begins with the needs of individual women's lives.

Locally, resources have grown increasingly limited for even the most successful efforts to assist low income families. Budget deficits abound at the city and state levels; and private foundations and corporations are stretching their resources to meet the need. 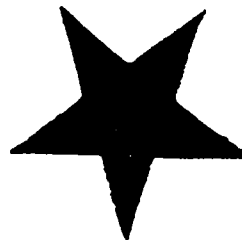

Women learn to earn a living wage

At WOW headquarters in Washington, D.C., policy experts shape national legislation next door to single mothers drilling and hammering their way toward well paid jobs.

WOW's Family Learning Project, a multi-faceted 20-week program introduces women to technical and high-wage jobs while building on their basic skills and enriching their family learning skills.

A typical week for a WOW trainee begins with a Career Development class in which she researches occupations, begins making career choices and establishes action plans. Lisa Hawkins, a 28-year-old mother of one, said the class "forces me to seriously think about my life — my needs, my wants and dreams — and to formulate plans of action."

As economic self-sufficiency for each trainee means supporting herself and her young children, she participates in the Intergenerational Component to reinforce family growth. In this classroom, known as "Mom's Place," she learns about the different stages of child development, prepares enriching activities for her children and sets family goals.

She puts these skills into action through a Family Learning Practicum, in which she works on-site at her child's day-care center one day a week. "I understand my kids more and can pay attention to what they need," said Doris Watson, a 26-year-old mother of six.

Nontraditional Jobs Provide Wider Opportunities for Women

Butte, Montana—Her first day on the job, Sandy Durham's boss told her to watch out for rattlesnakes. "He wasn't kidding," says Durham, who has seen several while driving a water truck for a road construction crew in southwestern Montana. There are other, more common hazards, like the heavy, serpentine water hose that sometimes flies off the water pump, or the sharp inclines of the mountain roads. But Durham, 33, is not fazed. "I love the construction business and I feel I'm a very capable driver," she says.

What's more, Durham earns \$19.01 an hour, nearly four times what she made in previous jobs harvesting potatoes, waiting tables, or flipping hamburgers. The extra income has enabled her to buy new school clothes for her two daughters, repair her trailer home, and stop worrying about where their next meal is coming from.

Last spring, Durham did not even know that jobs like hers were open to women. "I quit school to get married," she says. "I just planned on being a housewife and mother." When she and her husband separated after 14 years of

marriage, she went on public assistance to survive. Then her welfare case worker told her about a new program to train women for jobs traditionally dominated by men but now gradually opening to women. Having driven her husband's truck a few times, she thought the truck-driving course would be right for her.

Sandy Durham began her move out of poverty with the help of Wider Opportunities for Women (WOW). Working closely with local organizations and businesses, WOW gives technical assistance to job-training programs for low-income women in Milwaukee and Hartford, as well as throughout Montana. Based in Washington, D.C., WOW has been active in women's employment issues for more than 25 years. Its nontraditional training project aims to expand women's access to dozens of lucrative industries once closed to them. Thanks to new federal legislation, job-training programs are now required to prepare women for higher-paying, nontraditional jobs. They are using WOW's project as a model.

June Zeitlin, deputy director of the Rights and Social Justice program at the Ford Foundation, which has granted WOW \$675,000 for its project, says that it comes at an opportune time.

Training triumphs over traditional jobs

Second of two parts on tradeswomen.

E laine M. Davis, 31, a construction worker for Hooper Construction Co. of Madison, Wis., lays underground power cables for new buildings.

Davis, who works in Milwaukee, does heavy, physical labor—and loves it.

"I always wanted to do construction work," said Davis, a member of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers. "I got \$5.50 an hour as night manager of a fast-food restaurant—where I had a shotgun put to my head when the place was robbed. Now I get \$12 [an hour]."

She's had her job since June. "For six years, I was in and out of welfare," said Davis, who has four children ages 5 to 11. "The jobs that AFDC [Aid to Families with Dependent Children] trained me for were traditional—low-paying and boring, boring. But after the robbery, I quit my job, went back on welfare—and this time AFDC gave me the chance to become a carpenter."

Davis, a high school graduate, attended an intensive orientation program conducted by Milwaukee's Women in the Trades. Then she became part of a crew of women trained as laborers at a Milwaukee low-income housing unit.

"That training was the best thing that ever happened to me," said Davis, who was recently married. "I'll never go back into a traditional job again—unless I own the business."

Davis is one of many low-income women—most of them on welfare—to benefit from special training programs resulting from the passage in 1991 of an amendment to the Job Training Partnership Act.

The amendment, the federal Non-traditional Employment for Women Act, helps low-income women get into well-paying, male-dominated jobs. Its passage was a milestone for U.S. women, and one of its chief advocates was Wider Opportunities for Women (WOW), an employment-advocacy group based in
