SUBJECT: Jacksonville, Florida Urban Renewal and Defense Conversion Priority
Pilot Project

BACKGROUND: Cecil Field, Naval Air Station in Jacksonville slated for the first round of base closures has projected a loss of 16,000 jobs with an economic impact of over \$500 Million. Due to the economic impact and other urban distress, Jacksonville has been elevated to a Status I Cabinet level priority. In addition to the base closure, Jacksonville's Northwest Quadrant, a predominantly minority community has a high level of unemployment and appears to be a severely economically distressed area. The Clinton Administration has a major commitment to assist this community.

The City of Jacksonville and the Mayor's office have begun an "Urban Renaissance" effort focusing on the southern part of the city with little consideration for the distressed minority communities. Considering these factors, a team from headquarters was assembled to tour the area and meet with community and business leaders.

FINDINGS: 1) Northwest Quadrant Tour - Accompanied by Boyd Rice, Chief of the Planning/Technical Assistance Division based in Atlanta and Leta Smith, State EDR, we toured the Northwest Quadrant and found severe lack of basic infrastructure including unfinished sewer lines and sidewalks. Also, most neighborhoods in the Northwest Quadrant have no local grocery store or financial institution. Over 8,000 people a day commute on buses to the nearest grocery store over 10 miles away.

Following the tour, we met with the Jacksonville Northwest Task Force and discussed their frustration and need for federal assistance.

2) Cecil Field Naval Air Station - We attended the Mayor's Base Reuse Commission meeting discussing options for Cecil Field's 25,000 acres. We met with Herb McCarthy, Chief of Staff for the Mayor's Commission on Base Realignment and Closure who will provide us a concept paper regarding the discussed options for conversion of Cecil Field.

PLAYERS: The involvement of the following people has been secured and they are supportive of any actions or policies we might suggest for Jacksonville: Mayor's Office, City HUD, Jacksonville NW Task Force, Edward Waters College (historically black college), Florida State Economic Development Office, private business owners and corporations, and other community leaders.

From the federal viewpoint, this is an opportunity to bring together various agencies and develop an immediate federal intervention and assistance plan. Political appointees from the following agencies are leading this project with technical support from the programmatic career personnel.

Boyd Rose and Lola Smith of EDA are on the ground mobilizing the local community and assessing the programmatic options for a strategic plan and list of objectives.

RECOMMENDATION for ACTION - Develop a plan considering the following:

- 1) Refurbish and rebuild infrastructure
 - partner with the State to identify corporate grocery chain to provide a store in NW and job training for youths
- 2) Assist in planning (develop a strategic plan for the NW Quadrant)
 - encourage the City to combine the Cecil Field Conversion plan with redevelopment of the NW Quadrant
- 3) Provide business assistance and entrepreneurial training
 - establish an incubator at Edward Waters College in conjunction with the Mayor's Business Assistance Center
- 4) Assist local community and city to develop a long-term vision for the entire city
 - develop training programs for the NW Quadrant related to the development of the southern sector of downtown (i.e. hotel management school)

NEXT STEPS: A team from Commerce will meet on a weekly basis to discuss progress. Travel to Jacksonville is expected once a month. MBDA will set up a MBOC (Minority Business Opportunity Committee) providing a vehicle for organizing and unifying efforts on the local level. SBA has been brought in and developed a list of potential assistance and programs available.

Week of October 25 - all political representatives will meet to discuss a plan of action to present to the community and city on November 3-4.

November 3-4 - In Jacksonville, Administration representatives will hold a Community meeting to present our plan of action.

November 8 - Senator Gramm visits Jacksonville accompanied by Alvin Brown for a community conference.

We will keep you informed of our progress. Your ideas and recommendations are welcomed and we will meet with you if you feel necessary.

TO THE MEMBERS OF THE POLICY COMMITTEE OF THE BUSINESS ROUNDTABLE

On January 13th and 14th we held conference calls with those of you who were available. Forty-five of you participated on the calls and twelve more called me or sent me notes expressing your views. We had the views of over two-thirds of the Policy Committee.

The dynamics of the two calls were different. On the first call there was much more concern regarding employer mandates and their significance to the health care debate. In the second call members were far more concerned with the fundamental approach of the Clinton plan.

It was clear from the discussions that there are problems with both the Clinton and the Cooper-Grandy-Breaux-Durenberger bills. Key concerns raised about the Clinton plan include the magnitude of the cost and financing problems, the heavy regulation of the alliances and the use of price controls. The issue of tax deductibility of employer costs and cost shifting were concerns identified with respect to the Cooper-Breaux bills.

Fourteen members of the Policy Committee do not believe that Cooper-Grandy-Breaux-Durenberger should be the starting point for health care reform. Many of them feel strongly about it. Some of those members support the Clinton plan.

The strong majority, however, (43 members) voted to support Cooper-Breaux as a starting point. There was not a strong consensus as to when to finalize that position. Thirty-two wanted to issue a statement immediately and twenty-five wished to wait.

Those wishing to wait indicated the White House was willing to make changes in its bill and suggested that we put off a final decision until the February 2nd Policy Committee meeting. Those members working with the White House will see what kind of changes the Administration

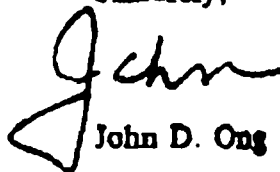

is willing to make and report at the February 2nd meeting. Given the close vote, Bob Winters and I have decided to wait until February 2nd to ask for a final decision.

In the meantime, we have received a number of calls from reporters who have caught wind of our discussions inquiring about our position. We have prepared the attached statement to respond to these inquiries.

Thank you for your participation and input. I look forward to seeing you on the 2nd.

SUBJECT: MILWAUKEE TRIP

The Office of Public Liaison has proposed, in coordination with the National Security Council, that the President meet with members of the Central European American community prior to his departure to Prague. The purpose of this meeting is to:

- (1) affirm the United States commitment to Central Europe within the Polish, Hungarian, Czech, and Slovak American communities,
- (2) gain the support of ethnic American leaders who maintain strong ties with their homeland to
 - (a) communicate and reinforce our resolve to European leaders and
 - (b) allay fears within the ethnic American community that the U.S. is not doing enough to promote democracy and economic development and ensure security in Central Europe.

We recommend a Milwaukee meeting, where the President will make a major foreign policy address prior to his departure to Prague.

PROPOSED ACTIVITIES

- (1) Pre-Dinner for leadership of Polish, Hungarian, Czech, and Slovak American communities with Office of Public Liaison and National Security Council staff.

On the evening of January 5th in Milwaukee, we will host a working dinner with the leadership of Polish, Hungarian, Czech, and Slovak American communities. The purpose of the dinner is to flush out issues of concern and frame the discussion for the next day.

- (2) Audience building for the President's foreign policy address.

The audience for the foreign policy address should be diverse. The Office of Public Liaison will build an

audience that focuses on ethnic Americans, including Central European, Eastern European, and Russian Americans. We are compiling a list of approximately 200 ethnic leaders and supporters for the speech. This number can be adjusted depending on the total size of the audience. The Office of Public Liaison will provide additional constituency lists as needed.

- (3) Roundtable discussion with the President and leadership of Polish, Hungarian, Czech, and Slovak American communities.

The roundtable discussion can be held after the President's speech on January 6th. Depending on the time of day, the roundtable can be done over coffee or lunch. The Office of Public Liaison is constructing a list of 20-25 potential invitees and working with the National Security Council to lay out the framework for the discussion.

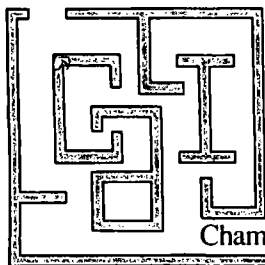

Congressman Montgomery is holding two hearings on the "Persian Gulf Mystery Illness": a field hearing in Mississippi on January 21 focussing on effects on children; and, a hearing on February 1 in Washington on the illness in general. The Departments of Defense, Health and Human Services and Veterans Affairs are sending medical staff to testify at the Mississippi hearing; Department Secretaries will testify at the February 1 hearing.

In order to try to shape the public discussion before the hearings, Secretaries Aspin, Shalala and Jesse Brown plan to hold a press briefing prior to the January 21 hearing. They have set a tentative date of January 19. We can work with them to set the volume of their briefing, and thus the volume of the hearings -- however, the hearings will receive press attention regardless of our input.

Thus far, I have told the Departments to plan for the briefing to be at an agency and to focus on technical information. However, Secretary Brown is **very** interested in personally participating in the briefing, and it may be difficult to successfully dissuade him. If he is involved, it seems necessary to balance him with at least Secretary Aspin. Secretary Shalala may not be necessary.

We ought to discuss amongst ourselves what kind of input to give to this briefing. We can raise its profile by encouraging the Secretaries to attend. We can lower its profile by keeping it technical, with staff only. In either case, there is little real news other than the announcement of the interagency group and the message that the Departments are working together on the issue.

Per a conversation with Bruce Reed and Jeremy Ben-Ami (Mary Jo Bane's special assistant), the Welfare Reform Working Group is under strict instruction by the First Lady to "do whatever is necessary to make Moynihan happy."

From a policy standpoint:

Due to the aforementioned instruction, the Working Group is committed to producing legislation that has Moynihan's blessing. Both Bruce and David Ellwood have met with Moynihan numerous times on this.

From a timing standpoint:

Moynihan's reactions, triggered by extensive press coverage on the Administration delaying Welfare Reform, was meant to foreclose that Welfare Reform is be introduced during the spring.

From a message standpoint:

The Welfare Working Group is working to assure Moynihan that Welfare will be introduced and passed this year. They hope that the State of the Union will further emphasize this commitment.

From a legislative standpoint:

We are operating under the assumption that the Committees will not consider welfare until health care goes through. According to Bruce, once the welfare legislation is introduced, it will pass quite speedily (as welfare is anticipated to be much less controversial than health care).

Moynihan Presses Welfare Reform

White House Warned Not to Defer Issue Because of Health Care Debate

Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan (D-N.Y.) complained yesterday that the administration was moving too slowly on welfare reform and suggested he might hold up President Clinton's health care reform bill if welfare is not made a priority issue by the White House.

"We don't have a health crisis in this country. We do have a welfare crisis. And we can do both," said Moynihan, one of Congress's leading advocates for welfare reform.

Moynihan, who as chairman of the Senate Finance Committee would play a key role in advancing both bills, said that at a meeting at the White House last Monday, administration officials said they "won't have time for welfare until we get this health care bill."

Speaking on NBC's "Meet the Press," Moynihan said yesterday, "That won't work. We promised in that last presidential campaign that we would address the issue of welfare."

Asked if he would block health care reform until the administration sends a welfare reform bill to Congress, Moynihan replied, "I think we have their attention." He said he was assured by presidential adviser George Stephanopoulos on Saturday that welfare reform was "coming along," but, the senator added, "It's been a year now and we still have no bill."

Clinton, whose promise last year to "end welfare as we know it" was one of the most popular issues in the campaign, appointed a 32-member interagency task force on welfare reform, which last month completed a working draft of a plan to overhaul the nation's public assistance programs.

Among scores of reforms suggested by the task force is a plan to make Aid to Families with Dependent Children (AFDC), the main cash assistance program, a transitional benefit limited to two years, after which recipients would have to work. If they could not find jobs in the private sector, they would be required to earn benefits through community service work.

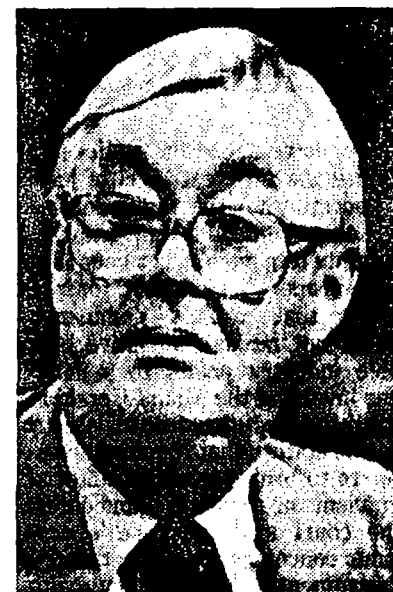
Although details of the task

force's draft proposals have been known for weeks, Clinton has said little about welfare reform publicly, while health care reform has occupied center stage. This has led many welfare reform advocates to conclude that the White House has put welfare reform on a back burner.

Moynihan said he believes Clinton is more serious about welfare reform than his aides. "No, he is serious. He's dead serious. He's got, he's appointed a lot of people who aren't as serious as he is," the senator said.

Bruce Reed, a White House domestic policy adviser and co-chairman of the task force, last week denied in an interview that the administration had decided to hold up welfare reform in favor of health care. "We will introduce a bill this year and we will push it," Reed said.

Clinton has come under intense pressure from House Republicans, who have drafted their own welfare reform measure and have threatened to embarrass the president by pushing more aggressively than him on one of his own key campaign

promises if he fails to move quickly on welfare reform.

The Mainstream Forum, a group of 77 centrist House members, is expected to introduce a welfare reform bill when the House convenes Jan. 25. In addition, a group of urban Democrats in the House is preparing legislation aimed at softening some of the harsher aspects of the administration's time-limited benefits proposals and calling for more spending for education, day care and job training for welfare recipients.

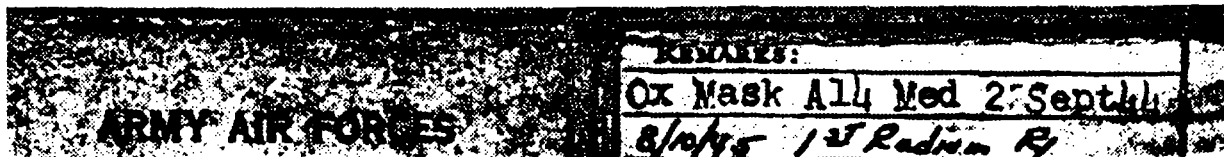

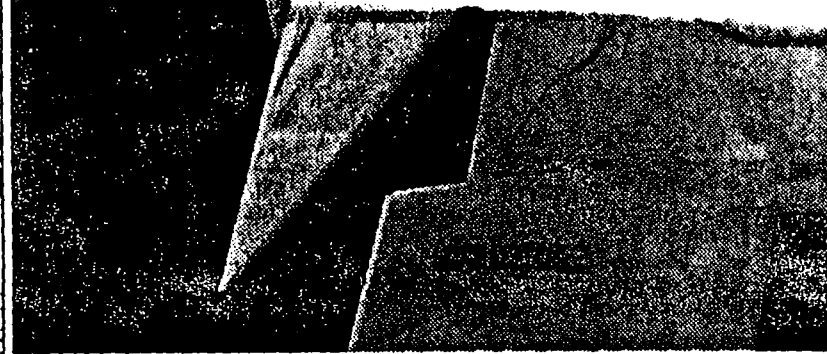

Moynihan Says Clinton Isn't Serious About Welfare Reform

WASHINGTON, Jan. 7 — The tempestuous chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, Daniel Patrick Moynihan, has accused the White House of acting in bad faith on welfare reform, and he has threatened that "I might just hold health care hostage" as a result.

Speaking at an editorial board meeting at The New York Post, the Senator said the White House was using welfare reform, a popular campaign issue, as "boob bait for the Bubbas." He said President Clinton raised the subject of welfare reform to appease the public "whenever he gets in trouble." At the same time, he said, the President was "appointing people who have no intention of doing it."

His remarks, quoted in today's New York Post, went unnoticed in Washington until late in the day, when word

spread through the offices of the Administration's welfare officials.

No Comment on His Comments

Senator Moynihan, Democrat of New York, was in his office, but did not return phone calls from a reporter today seeking to discuss his published remarks.

President Clinton made his pledge to impose strict work requirements on welfare recipients a centerpiece of his 1992 presidential campaign. But after almost a year in office, he has still not

spelled out what he has in mind nor has he forwarded a proposal to Congress.

At a Cabinet meeting on Monday, Mr. Clinton said he would likely delay action on a welfare bill until his health care proposals clear Congress. Both bills would travel through the same congressional committees, and the President told his aides that the White House would find it difficult to handle both issues simultaneously.

Needling the President

Senator Moynihan, the leading welfare authority in Congress, has been needling Mr. Clinton since he began making welfare promises during the campaign, accusing the President of using the issue for political gain.

But the senator, who is nothing if not volatile, has also publicly changed tones quickly. In January, Mr. Moynihan said the Administration's attitude on welfare reform amounted to "a clatter of campaign promises being tossed

"Everything we see in the black community right now is on the level of exhortation," said Milton Morris, vice president of the Joint Center for Political and Economic Studies which researches black-oriented issues. FOREST PLAN FOR SUSTAINABLE ENVIRONMENT AND ECONOMY

We have reached final agreement with the plaintiffs on the first batch of sales that we will ask Judge Dwyer to release from injunction, and we are working with the Justice Department to accomplish this next Thursday (1/13). Stories lifting the mask off the timber industry's media campaign (the new coalition of non-timber leaders in business, academia, clergy, and publishing who are lending their names to an effort to overturn the plan) have run in the Seattle Times and Post-Intelligencer. The Vice President intends to call Boeing's CEO Frank Schrontz to encourage him to withdraw his support from this campaign. Three excellent editorials in the same papers reinforce support for your plan. We have not been able to generate such press in Oregon, but we will continue working on it. The Oregonian is pulling together a six month retrospective on what the Administration has accomplished since you announced your plan, and we are working to pull together a good package and will provide them with access to key people who have been involved with the process. Senator Murray has been a great help in publicly speaking out against the media campaign and in support of your plan. The regional directors of the Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management recently held their first interest group and press briefing on their watershed restoration program which will also provide alternative jobs in the woods.

CLEAN WATER

OMB and the NEC completed the first phase of efforts to cost out several of the significant components of the Administration's clean water proposal this week with an analysis that -- although requiring more polishing -- will provide a powerful tool in the reauthorization effort. By making the changes we will be proposing, the Administration will be increasing the flexibility for states and local governments and saving millions over what might otherwise be required under existing Clean Water mandates. We will also be tackling the always hard but necessary issue of control nonpoint source pollution. OEP will now convene an effort to complete the Administration's recommendations on the reauthorization, which will be provided to you by the beginning of February.

RUSSIA'S PROPOSED AGREEMENT ON ARCTIC RADIOACTIVE POLLUTION

At the December meeting of the Gore-Chernomyrdin Commission, the Russian side proposed an agreement on radioactive pollution in the Arctic and pushed for signature at the Clinton-Yeltsin Summit next week. The Vice President indicated that we would undertake an expedited review of their proposal, with the possibility that an agreement might be signed at the Summit. OEP, the NSC Office of Global Environmental Affairs, and OVP coordinated rapid agency development of a U.S. counter-proposal, which was sent to Russia earlier this week. Two key points in the U.S. counter-proposal should be mentioned:

(1) The U.S. counter includes a provision committing the Russians to accept the global ban on ocean dumping of radioactive waste recently adopted by the London Convention. The Russian proposal was silent on this subject. The U.S. provision would prevent Russia from "opting out" of the ocean dumping ban, an option that remains open to Russia under the London Convention until February 20.

(2) While the Russian proposal calls for useful scientific and technical cooperation, it also would implicitly commit the U.S. to undefined expenditures for disposal of Russian radioactive wastes. The U.S. proposal avoids commitments to financial assistance; any such commitments would have to be negotiated separately.

We do not have a response from the Russian side yet.

WETLANDS POLICY

The wetlands policy that we released in August made a commitment to shift responsibility for identifying wetlands on agricultural lands to the Soil Conservation Service (SCS). This has been an important issue because farmers have been subjected to two different wetlands regulatory regimes: one under the Swampbuster provisions of the Food Security Act and the other under the Clean Water Act. As a result, many farmers received conflicting opinions from the Federal government when identifying wetlands on agricultural lands. The new policy giving SCS the authority to delineate wetlands on agricultural lands for both statutes was warmly received by farmers, but caused considerable dismay among environmentalists. On Thursday (1/6), EPA, the Corps of Engineers, USDA, and DOI signed a Memorandum of Agreement to implement our new policy. This is reinventing government at its best: we should get increased protection of wetlands while reducing the burden on the regulatory community. The agriculture community is generally pleased with the agreement, although the cattlemen are disappointed that unmanipulated rangelands have not been included within the definition of agricultural lands. The environmentalists are very skeptical about the initiative, but have grudgingly conceded that the agreement includes a number of safeguards to protect the environment.

SUPERFUND

Congressman Swift and Senator Lautenberg plan to introduce Superfund reauthorization bills on January 26, 1994 and to hold hearings shortly thereafter. The Interagency Policy Committee on Superfund will be working with Congressional leaders and members of the National Commission on Superfund in the coming weeks to arrive at a Superfund reauthorization vehicle that will receive broad stakeholder support. The National Commission on Superfund is a broad-based group of stakeholders that recently issued recommendations on Superfund reform.

CLIMATE CHANGE

OEP established a permanent management structure to guide implementation of the Climate Change Action Plan and for further policy development. The Climate Change Mitigation Group, which developed the Action Plan, will become an interagency steering committee. This structure will allow White House coordination across the many elements of climate change issues. The co-chairs of the transportation policy working group outlined in the Climate Change Action Plan (OEP, OSTP, NEC) are drafting a PRD for your approval that outlines the scope of our one-year policy development process. We will set in motion an interagency review of transportation policy and suggest a Federal Advisory Committee to give stakeholder input.

ALTERNATIVE FUELS

OEP is coordinating with DOE and OMB to implement the recommendations of the Federal Fleet Conversion Task Force (FFCTF), and has developed a new proposal for local decision-making to help guide the Federal procurement process. This proposal will be considered at the January 24 meeting of the FFCTF.

FEDERAL FACILITIES

The first meeting of the Interagency Policy Committee on Federal Facilities that I co-chair with Alice Rivlin was held on December 22, 1993. The Committee will meet over the next two years to develop a comprehensive strategic approach to the Federal government's complex waste management and cleanup problems. The topic of the first meeting was priority setting for the management and cleanup of Federal sites.

GLOBE PROGRAM

OEP held a meeting on December 21, 1993, with representatives from the agencies that will take a leading role in developing and implementing this Vice Presidential environmental education initiative. Carol Browner (EPA), Jim Baker (NOAA), Dan Goldin (NASA), Madeleine Kunin (Education), Bob Corell (NSF), Bob Watson (OSTP), and others attended the meeting. The purpose of the meeting was to brief the agencies on our efforts to develop the program and to discuss the funding and resource commitments that each agency will make to the program in the coming years.

REVIEWING AN ADMINISTRATION AGENDA

In an effort to anticipate and map out the coming months, OEP met with representatives of the relevant White House offices to review and discuss the significant environment and natural resource issues for the upcoming Congressional session. We have confirmed that action on the EPA Department bill, the reauthorization of the Clean Water Act and the Superfund program are key opportunities for the Administration. There remain certain trouble spots that we need to address firmly and thoroughly -- like unfunded mandates and the need for greater sensitivity to cost-benefit and risk analysis issues. Congressional and communication strategies will be required in several areas of potential rough sledding, and the process to ensure that what needs doing gets done was charted.

DIRECTOR'S MEETINGS

PAST WEEK
