Q: Another proposal of the Contract would make late-term abortions illegal, would permit states to withhold Medicaid funding for abortions in cases of rape and incest, and would end public funding of family planning organizations. The Christian Coalition says these steps will protect innocent human life and ensure that tax dollars are not used to promote abortion. People opposed to this proposal say that it is wrong to eliminate all funding for family planning services when we face the growing problems of teen pregnancy and out-of-wedlock births. They also say that the personal decision on abortion should be made by the woman and her doctor -- not the federal government -- especially in cases of rape or incest. How do you feel about this proposal?

Q: The final Contract would abolish the US Dept. of Education and repeal its 'Goals 2000' national standards program. The Christian Coalition says that this will strength parental involvement and local control of the schools. People opposed to this proposal say that we need real standards in our public schools, so that American kids can compete in the global economy when they grow up. They also say that it is wrong to reduce support for education and abolish the Dept. of Education at a time when we need to strength our public schools.

Q. The next Contract proposal deals with the issue of pornography on the computer Internet. The Christian Coalition says we need a new law making it a federal crime to distribute any pornography on the Internet that could be viewed by children. People who oppose this approach say there are already tough criminal laws against the distribution of obscene materials. They say this new law goes too far in letting the federal government interfere with parents' rights and in imposing censorship, which is why even many conservatives oppose it.

Q. Another Contract proposal would end all federal support for the arts, such as the National Endowment for the Arts and the National Endowment for the Humanities, and also eliminate federal funding for public television. The Christian Coalition says the government now funds controversial and obscene artworks, and that the private sector -- not the federal government -- should fund the arts. People opposed to this proposal say that public funding for local arts programs has brought art to many communities for the first time, and that public television has provided some of the best nonviolent, educational programming for children on television -- like Sesame Street. They say that if we really want to help families and teach children good values, we should strengthen public television, not weaken it.

WOMEN AND FEDERAL SPENDING -- LET'S COMPARE

THE CLINTON ADMINISTRATION

THE REPUBLICAN CONGRESS

--- ECONOMIC SECURITY ---

More than 60% of women with children younger than six are in the labor force.

- Proposes a middle class tax cut.
- Increases Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) by 21 billion. This insures that over 20 million working families will receive up to a \$1400 tax credit per year.

- Huge tax cut to the wealthiest Americans.
- Reduces the EITC, raising taxes for as many as 14 million EITC recipients and 20 million children.

--- CHILDREN AND EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES ---

2,699 infants are born into poverty every day in the United States.

College graduates earn 74% more than high school graduates.

- Protects Head Start by adding 50,000 children by 2002 and increasing funding by \$400 million.
- Insures commitment to children's nutrition in school.
- Protects Pell Grants by helping 200,000 more students next year with a maximum reward of \$2,620 and assisting 800,000 more students by 2002.
- Increases National Service funding by \$345 million next year reaching nearly 50,000 community service and college aid opportunities.
- Insures a safer learning environment for 39 million children with \$500 million per year.

- Up to 230,000 children would be denied Head Start in 2002.
- Abolishes children's entitlement to school lunch.
- Sets maximum Pell Grant award at \$2,440 and eliminates eligibility for 360,000 students.
- Eliminates 50,000 AmeriCorps opportunities next year and more than 4 million other service opportunities over 7 years.
- Slashes funding by 60% -- at a time when drug use among students rose 50% between 1992 and 1994 -- depriving over 23 million students of services next year.

--- HEALTH ---

Over 20 million women rely on Medicare for their healthcare services.

- Reforms Medicare financing to cut spending by \$124 billion without any new costs for beneficiaries.
- Insures the trust fund solvency through at least 2006.
- Eliminates co-payment for mammograms for senior women.

- Cuts \$270 billion from Medicare over the next seven years, while giving a \$245 billion tax cut to the wealthiest Americans.
- Increases average out-of-pocket expenses by \$2,825 (\$5,650 per couple) over a seven year period.
- Forces recipients -- 75% of whom have incomes under \$25,000 -- to pay significantly more for their fee-for-service plan and to guarantee their choice of doctor.

Women comprise over 69% of all Medicaid beneficiaries between the ages of 18 and 64.

About 2/3rds of the dollars spent on Medicaid are for services for elderly and disabled Americans.

- Reduces costs by \$54 billion between now and 2002 -- without increasing out-of-pocket expenses.
- Promotes efficiency and gives states more flexibility while protecting coverage.
- Reforms system to target Federal payments to states for hospitals that serve a high proportion of low-income people.

- Cuts \$182 billion from Medicaid by 2002.
- Up to 8.8 million children and elderly and disabled persons could lose their insurance coverage in the year 2002 alone.
- Forces working families with a parent or spouse who need long-term care to face nursing home bills averaging \$38,000 a year.

--- CRIME & VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN ---

In a typical year, over 4.5 million American women 12 years and older are raped, robbed or assaulted, or are a victim of a threatened or attempted violent crime. Almost 3/4ths of these attacks are committed by someone the victim knows.

- Strengthens the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA) -- the first comprehensive federal effort to fight violence against women and protect the rights of victims.
- Protects neighborhoods with 100,000 more police.

- Cuts VAWA funding by nearly \$50 million -- threatening the full enforcement of the Act and reducing the number of shelters, police and prosecutors.
- Abolishes this program for 100,000 more cops.
