NEW YORK, NY-- From Singapore to the southside of Chicago, girls, parents, companies, mentors, and organizations are preparing for the third annual **Take Our Daughters to Work[®] Day on Thursday, April 27**. The day, sponsored by the Ms. Foundation for Women, was designed to bolster self-esteem in girls, foster resilience, and expose girls to all the opportunities available to them in the work world.

"This day gives adults a chance to focus on girls and their development," said Marie C. Wilson, President of the Ms. Foundation for Women. "We continue to be thrilled with all that girls see, do and learn on Take Our Daughters to Work[®] Day. We also welcome the discussion this day has opened up about our nation's sons."

Take Our Daughters to Work[®] provides a unique opportunity for girls to see the realities of the workplace and to identify role models. Last year, 25 million American adults -- one out of every six -- participated and 125 million Americans have heard of the day; nine out of ten believed the day was a positive experience, according to a Roper Starch Worldwide poll.

- ◆ The Chicago Institute of Neurosurgery and Neuroresearch will be fostering doctors of the future by hosting girls from public housing in Chicago.
- ◆ The accounting firm, Deloitte & Touche, LLP, will be participating all over the country. The Parsippany, N.J. office will be hosting girls from an inner city school and holding a mock audit-- the IRS better watch out.
- ◆ Girls with disabilities will be paired with mentors with disabilities in Washington, D.C. through the Mayor's Committee on Persons with Disabilities.
- ◆ University of Maine Women's basketball team star player, Cindy Blodgett, featured in *Sports Illustrated*, will be visiting Orono Middle School in Orono, ME.
- ◆ 25 girls 'gotta make the doughnuts' in Randolph, MA. Dunkin' Doughnuts will be hosting girls from the area and will put them to work making doughnuts in the lab.
- ◆ Girls from LaGuardia High School in New York will accompany Opera Diva Jessye Norman to Carnegie Hall for a rehearsal with the London Symphony Orchestra.
- ◆ Girls with disabilities from the Henry Viscardi School in Alberston, NY will spend the day in the courtroom with the only woman New York Supreme Court Judge, Sandra Feurrstein.
- ◆ NOW in New Jersey has announced an essay contest for girls aged nine to 15. The question is "What would happen if one day everyone treated girls like boys and boys like girls?" The ten winners will spend Take Our Daughters to Work[®] Day at the Statehouse in Trenton and one girl will shadow Christie Whitman, Governor of New Jersey.
- ◆ Caroline's Comedy Club in New York City will be hosting girls to show them the nuts and bolts of the entertainment business. Maybe your daughter will be the next to say, "take my parents -- please."
- ◆ Girls take over the air waves at KXXO Radio in Olympia, WA. Station manager, Toni Holm, will have girls on the air on Take Our Daughters to Work[®] Day.
- ◆ Girls will take over the ticket counters at American Airlines across the country. Girls will also help board flights, and serve as flight attendants.

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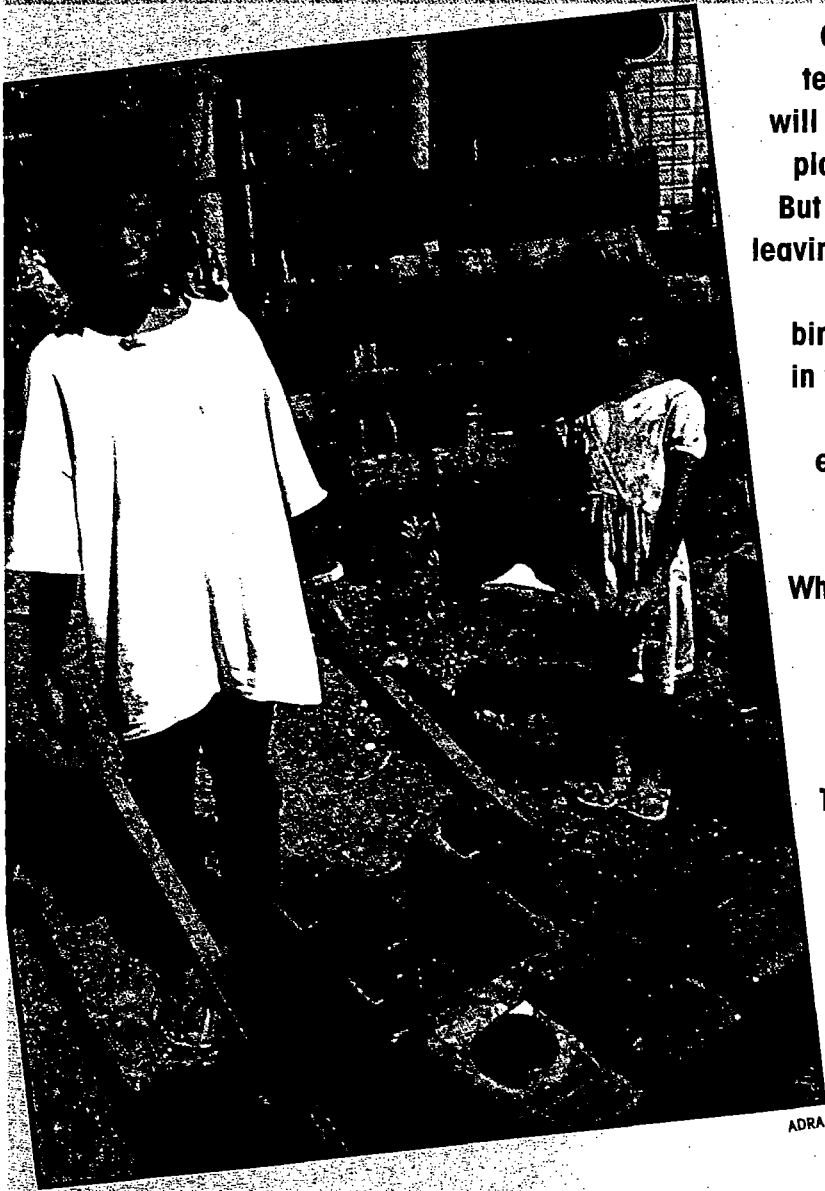

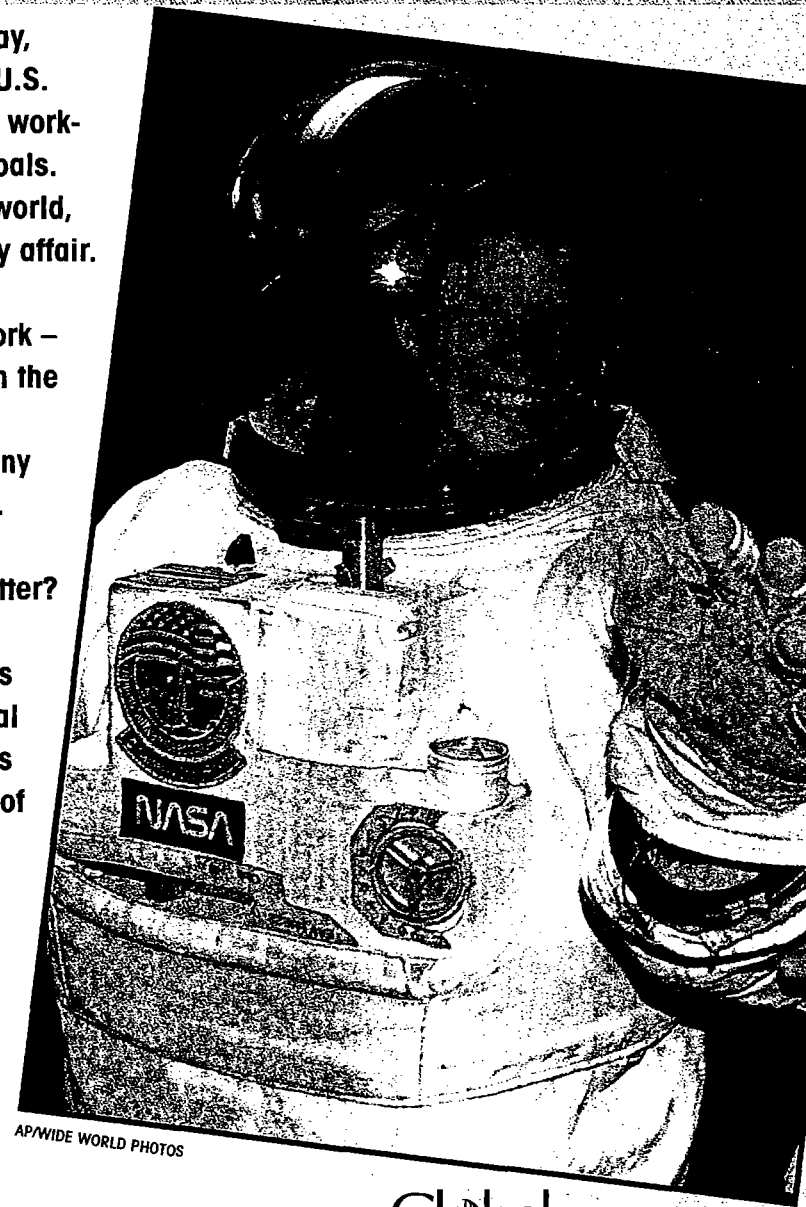

Program Description

Take Our Daughters To WorkSM, the public education program of the Ms. Foundation for Women, was launched in 1993 in response to disturbing research findings on the adolescent development of girls. Studies by Harvard University researchers, the American Association of University Women (AAUW) and the Minnesota Women's Fund indicate that during adolescence girls often receive less attention in school and in youth-serving programs, suffer from lower expectations than do their boy counterparts, and tend to like or dislike themselves based on aspects of their physical appearance. It is during these formative years that countless girls also grapple with eating disorders, negative body image, teen pregnancy, poverty, discrimination, substance and sexual abuse, and distrust in the promises of education.

Those are the problems. Fortunately, the Ms. Foundation for Women has the solution - to prevent these problems from happening by helping girls to strengthen their resiliency. Research has shown that by intervening with girls before these problems take root, we can help girls to grow up with confidence, in good health and ready to fulfill their dreams. In planning a day to celebrate girls - by taking them seriously and listening to their ideas - girls begin to believe in themselves, their abilities, and by extension, their futures.

Now in its third year, *Take Our Daughters To WorkSM* will take place on Thursday, April 27, 1995 and every year thereafter on the fourth Thursday in April. This year's theme, *A Girl Is Watching. What Is She Learning?* spotlights the educational value of the day. When a girl walks through your doors, what does she learn about being a woman? About resolving conflict and working with others? About what it takes to be a grown-up in the world? Around the country, millions of girls between the ages of nine and 15 will go to work with adult hosts - parents, grandparents, cousins, aunts, and friends - to learn first-hand the exciting range of life options while getting the attention they deserve.

A recently conducted Roper Starch Worldwide survey reports that more than 25 million adult Americans say their company or organization participated in *Take Our Daughters To WorkSM* in 1994; and that more than 125 million are aware of the day. What's New This Year?

As organizers around the country plan their events for Take Our Daughters To WorkSM Day, we will update you with descriptions and contact names. In addition:

- ⇒ Our theme, "A girl is watching, what is she learning?" is new. This theme highlights the educational nature of the day. When a girl is watching her parents at work, what is she learning about being an adult? An employer or employee? What is she learning about her roles and responsibilities? About what she can do with her life?
- ⇒ We are also spotlighting the issues of the integration of work and family life. - **High Awareness:** Two thirds of American adults -- 125 million people -- have heard of *Take Our Daughters To Work Day*.

WHY DO WE ONLY TAKE GIRLS TO WORK?

Take Our Daughters To Work Day is designed to focus attention on the neglected needs of girls. What are these needs?

- o At the beginning of adolescence, many girls experience a sudden drop in self-esteem. While adolescence is also a tough time for boys, approximately 30% more girls than boys suffer this decline in the basic feelings about themselves. *Girls need extra support and attention to boost their confidence and to believe in themselves.*
- o Girls tend to like or dislike themselves based on aspects of their physical appearance. Boys typically identify things they can do with what they like about themselves. *Girls need to be encouraged for what they can do with their lives rather than how they look.*
- o In addition to the drop in self esteem, girls are twice as likely as boys to be depressed, between three and five times more likely to attempt suicide, and girls report that they are under far more stress than boys. Girls also live with a persistent fear of violence -- often in intimate relationships. *Girls need the support of caring adults -- particularly women -- to maintain their resilience, health, and mental health as they mature into adulthood.*
- o Both in schools and in youth-serving programs, boys receive more attention than girls. Take Our Daughters to Work is the only day of the year when girls get the uninterrupted and positive attention of adults. On that Day, girls are on TV and the front pages of newspapers -- being celebrated and asked about their dreams. *Girls need to know that they are important enough to warrant attention.*

What about the boys?

As experts on girls and women, the Ms. Foundation For Women created Take Our Daughters to Work as an intervention in the troubled lives of adolescent girls. Yet we know boys are at serious risk, too, and that for girls' lives to change we must talk to and educate boys. We have created materials for Take Our Daughters to Work Day that address boys' needs -- and we encourage organizations that work with boys to identify, study, and address their needs as well.

- o The Ms. Foundation, working with nationally recognized boys' and men's organizations -- particularly the Oakland Men's Project and the Families and Work Institute -- has created specially designed lesson plans -- called "Working It Out" -- for teachers to use with boys in the classroom on Take Our Daughters To Work Day. *"Working It Out," explores gender roles and boys' attitudes about work, home life, fatherhood, mentors, and stereotypes of both men and women.*
- o A recent *New York Times*/CBS News poll reported that 86% of girls surveyed said they expected to work outside the home. Yet 19% of the boys surveyed said they expected their wives to work at home, raising children, cleaning, cooking, and managing the household. Most of the girls interviewed were adamant about their plans to have a career and an egalitarian marriage. Many of the boys expressed firm convictions that a woman's place was in the home. *Boys need to learn about their changing roles and responsibilities -- and the changing roles and responsibilities of girls.*
- o Boys need to know that families can no longer survive on a sole financial supporter. Most families need dual-incomes today -- just to get by. Boys need to realize that their lives as men will involve sharing in work and home-life responsibilities. *"Working It Out" explains this to boys and offers them an opportunity to think about this new reality.*

Consider This! A Fact Sheet about Women and Work

- ⇒ By the year 2000, two out of three new entrants into the work force will be women.
- ⇒ For the first time in history, a majority of all new jobs will require education or training beyond high school.
- ⇒ By the time our daughters are ready for work, the economy will require 500,000 additional scientists and engineers.
- ⇒ Between 1980 and 1990, the number of senior girls in high school interested in engineering dropped by 25%.
- ⇒ Among top science students, those most likely to enter the field, gender differences in achievement (favoring boys) are increasing at the 4th, 8th and 12th grade levels.
- ⇒ On the middle and high school levels, Latina, African-American, and American-Indian girls lag far behind white and Asian students in math and science achievement.
- ⇒ Nationally, the number of college women going into science and graduating in science is declining.
- ⇒ Women and girls continue to be enrolled in education and training programs that prepare them for low-wage jobs in traditionally female occupations.
- ⇒ In 1992, 53.8 million women were employed; 3.5 million women were employed in nontraditional occupations.
- ⇒ In the field of medicine, 83% of the doctors are men; 97% of the nurses are women.
- ⇒ Women working in nontraditional jobs typically earn 20% to 30% more than women in traditional jobs.
- ⇒ Men working in traditionally female occupations earn more than women in those fields.
- ⇒ African-American women are unemployed at over twice the rate of white women.
- ⇒ Women of color make up 3.3% of all women corporate officers.
- ⇒ Women working in the same occupations as men still do not earn equal pay. There is a 29% gap between truck drivers, 26% gap between lawyers, and 19% gap between police officers.
- ⇒ The U.S. Merit Systems Protection Board 1987 survey estimated that during a two-year period, sexual harassment cost the government \$267 million in lost productivity and turnover.
- ⇒ In 1990, nearly 40% U.S. working women were mothers, and over 60% of all children had working moms.
- ⇒ Almost 5 million working mothers maintain their families alone, and 22.3% of them live in poverty.
- ⇒ In 1990 in the U.S., fathers owed mothers \$24 billion in unpaid child support.

The book has been hailed by Gloria Steinem, among others, as "the book women have been waiting for." It is a groundbreaking blueprint for creating powerful new relationships between mothers and daughters and for changing society. *Mother Daughter Revolution* was a Book-of-the-Month Club selection. This year Ms. Wilson also unveiled the Ms. Foundation's Healthy Girls/Healthy Women campaign, a public-education and policy project that studies how preventative health measures for girls can make health the norm for their adulthood.

On April 28, 1993, Ms. Wilson led the charge of millions of girls into the halls and offices of the American workplace on the first-ever **Take Our Daughters To Work Day**. Part of the Ms. Foundation's National Girls Initiative, this interactive, public-education campaign captured hearts, imaginations, and headlines across the country. Appearing on the front pages of *USA Today*, the *Washington Post*, the *Wall Street Journal*, the *New York Times*, and on network broadcasts by Peter Jennings and Dan Rather, Ms. Wilson's now annual Take Our Daughters To Work project was celebrated as a crucial show of support for the self-esteem of adolescent girls everywhere.

Born and raised in Georgia, Ms. Wilson began her professional life as a school teacher in Des Moines, Iowa -- with five small children in tow. It wasn't long before her first-hand experiences in education and motherhood earned her an appointment as the Director of Women's Programs at Drake University in 1979. In this capacity, Ms. Wilson designed and instituted innovative programming to prepare women to enter the work force. She also drafted legislation to provide safe and affordable child care in the state. Investigating and funding cutting-edge issues as employment re-entry training, minority career development, job sharing for older women, and flexible work time, Ms. Wilson offered solutions in the late '70s that are now accepted as responsible policies.

In the years to follow, Ms. Wilson served as Vice President, and Director of Education and Human Resources, for the Iowa Bankers Association. Consulting with the association's 650 member banks, Ms. Wilson gained the expertise in private and public-sector joint ventures that would ultimately position her as one of the nation's foremost not-for-profit fund-raisers -- but not before a term as an elected official.

Overcoming stiff opposition to the notion of a mother of five joining city government, Ms. Wilson was the first woman elected to the Des Moines City Council as a Member-at-Large in 1983. During her term, she turned her attention to making her city a community that supported families through its housing and workplace policies.

Ms. Wilson's tenure at the Ms. Foundation, beginning in 1984, has been a study in the sort of economic responsibility she fosters in others. During her presidency, the Foundation has expanded dramatically in size and programming -- its annual budget has grown from \$400,000 to \$5 million under her leadership. Ms. Wilson has initiated trail-blazing programs in health, safety, domestic violence, economic justice and development and girls at the Foundation. Some include: Women's Voices, a bipartisan, multi-cultural policy guide designed to highlight the issues that unify women across race, class, age and geography, and the Reproductive Rights Coalition Fund, which established state-by-state support coalitions that emphasized the importance of organizing in the states at a time when reproductive rights were treated almost exclusively as a national issue.

Ms. Wilson has led the way in creating jobs. She has generated more than \$2 million for the first funding collaborative on women's economic development. Many of Ms. Wilson's other grant-making and technical assistance programs, founded upon the idea that women have much to teach one another, have now become popularized as ways to place enterprising women -- from community activists to microbusiness managers to artists -- in contact with each other.

Gilbert F. Casellas was nominated by President Bill Clinton on July 1, 1994, and unanimously confirmed by the United States Senate on September 29, 1994, to serve as Chairman of the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC). As Chairman, Mr. Casellas is responsible for the administrative operations of the Commission, as well as serving as one of the five members of the Commission. Chairman Casellas' administrative duties include both the implementation of Commission policy and the day-to-day management of the Agency.

Prior to his appointment to the EEOC, Mr. Casellas was appointed by President Clinton to the position of General Counsel of the United States Department of the Air Force. In his capacity as General Counsel, he served as the Department's chief legal officer and as final legal authority to 2,000 military, civilian, and reserve attorneys on all matters except military justice.

Before entering public service, Mr. Casellas was a partner at the law firm of Montgomery, McCracken, Walker & Rhoads in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, where he specialized in complex litigation and appellate work. He served as Personnel Partner and was a member of the Management Committee for the firm. Mr. Casellas also was an instructor at the University of Pennsylvania Law School and taught courses on trial and appellate advocacy.

Throughout his legal career, Mr. Casellas has been a leader in local, state, and national bar association activities. Among his many accomplishments, he served as Chair of the Board of Governors of the Philadelphia Bar Association, a member of the American Bar Association's House of Delegates and Commission on Opportunities for Minorities in the Profession, and National President of the Hispanic National Bar Association.

Mr. Casellas was also on the Board of Trustees of the Philadelphia Bar Foundation and served as Special Counsel to the Philadelphia Commission on Human Relations. He has spoken extensively on the subject of minority involvement in the legal profession.

Mr. Casellas' civic activities include serving on the boards of the Public Interest Law Center of Philadelphia, the Community Legal Services, Inc. of Philadelphia, and the Free Library of Philadelphia, as well as serving on the Mayor's Commission on Puerto Rican and Latino Affairs.

Born and raised in Tampa, Florida, Mr. Casellas received his B.A. from Yale University and his Juris Doctor from the University of Pennsylvania School of Law. He served a two-year clerkship for the Honorable A. Leon Higginbotham, Jr., U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit.

Mr. Casellas is licensed to practice before the United States Supreme Court, the United States Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit, the United States District Courts for the Eastern and Middle Districts of Pennsylvania, and the Supreme Court of Pennsylvania.

Dear Ms. Herman,

I write to you because of your interest in the work of the EEOC, and to share with you where we are in the process of responding to the many challenges we face here.

As you know, when I assumed the Chairmanship on October 3, 1994, I was confronted with an agency beset with many significant and seemingly insurmountable challenges, including: a nearly \$5 million budget deficit for fiscal year 1995; an intractable labor-management relationship; nearly 100,000 unresolved private sector charges; a dedicated, but overwhelmed, staff; and four other Commissioners who were anxious to contribute to, but historically not included in, efforts at overcoming the agency's many challenges. Finally, Commission meetings were rarely held and the public's access to the agency had become limited.

I am pleased to report some significant progress. First, the budget challenges are being addressed aggressively. We began FY 95 with an appropriation that was \$5 million less than the projected costs we will incur in 1995. Approximately 90% of our projected costs are non-discretionary, that is salaries, rent and overhead. Thus, the bulk of the \$5 million deficit must come from the approximate \$20 million of "discretionary" funds. This discretionary budget includes those items essential to our work: litigation support, including transcript costs, travel, expert witness and the like; employee training; computer technology (which is currently antiquated or nonexistent); administrative travel and support; and education, outreach, and technical assistance.

We have implemented several cost saving initiatives such as reducing administrative travel, delaying equipment purchases, and limiting new hires. We requested and received approval from the Office of Personnel Management to offer an early out retirement

opportunity for agency employees, thus providing an additional means by which savings could be realized. We are also giving favorable consideration to employee requests for part-time employment or extended leave without pay for personal/professional reasons.

Although these efforts have helped reduce costs, current estimates still reflect a significant agency shortfall for this fiscal year. Consequently, it is obvious that additional efforts must be made to achieve savings and eliminate the need for more extreme measures.

Second, the labor-management challenge is the one most successfully addressed to date. Upon my arrival, I began a dialogue with labor representatives that has resulted in resolution of all litigation relating to our invalidated employee performance appraisal system. In addition, 96 of the 98 pending employee grievances have been resolved through negotiation instead of litigation; a high-exposure dispute relating to overtime compensation has also been resolved through negotiation; and a process is in place for negotiating new provisions of our long-expired collective bargaining agreement and for a new performance appraisal system. These breakthroughs not only demonstrate our commitment to a true partnership with our employees, but our willingness to tackle seemingly impossible challenges and to overcome them.

Third, we have moved aggressively and creatively to address some of the underlying causes of our enormous backlog of pending charges. In November, I established 3 Commissioner-led task forces. This is the first time in the Commission's history that all Commissioners have been involved in leading such a fundamental review of policy and operations.

The Charge Processing Task Force, led by Vice Chairman Paul Igasaki, is charged with conducting a "clean sheet" review of our charge processing system, examining fundamental assumptions of how we do our core work. The task force has held meetings throughout the country with agency employees, charging parties, groups who represent the interests of charging parties, employer groups, and others. Commissioners R. Gaull Silberman and Paul Steven Miller chair the taskforce on Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) and are preparing a set of recommendations for the adoption by the Commission of appropriate forms of ADR to enhance the charge processing system. Commissioner Joyce E. Tucker is leading a task force examining our relationship with the state and local fair employment practices agencies searching for ways to improve upon the relationship with and the work performed by these agencies. The task forces have followed my recommendation that they seek input both within the agency and outside the agency from among the many groups and organizations that have a stake in what we do.

Additionally, we have embarked on an aggressive effort to "reinvent" the Commission consistent with the principles embodied in the President's National Performance Review. By being open, accessible, and creating an environment in which bold ideas are encouraged, we are beginning to realize progress. Collectively, we are clarifying our mission; identifying methods to streamline our processes so that they are quality driven and result in increased efficiency and effectiveness; and creating a culture which values employees and embraces the principles of partnership and participatory management. My vision for the Commission is that it will preserve these organizational values and become a national model of commitment to continuous institutional improvement.

Finally, we have worked hard to reopen the Commission to the public. I have established regular monthly Commission meetings with increased outreach to the public, Congress, and the media. I have ordered the development of an aggressive education and outreach plan to reach historically underserved communities (Hispanics, Asian Pacific Americans, and Native Americans). I have also asked that quality customer service be a priority in all our dealings with the public.

These efforts have had a positive effect throughout the agency. Employees feel re-energized as we make sincere efforts to solicit their input. Our relationship with and involvement of our labor union in all of our efforts has engendered a sense of true employer-employee partnership. I hope that my visits to 9 of our field offices and personal contact with over 1100 of our 2900 employees has also assisted in that effort.

Much remains to be done but we have come a long way in fulfilling the pledges I made at last summer's confirmation hearings: that we are open for business and will be accessible and user friendly; that we will operate as a business, reinventing ourselves into an efficient and effective organization; and that we will remain a strong law enforcement agency that means business in vigorously enforcing the laws within our mandate.

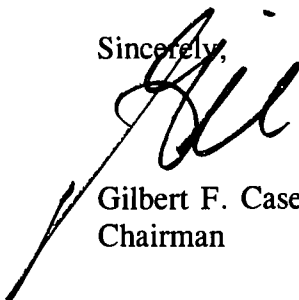
We still face an enormous budgetary challenge for the remainder of this fiscal year. We are encouraged for next year by President Clinton's 1996 budget which would give the agency a much needed 15% increase to \$268 million. This increase would fund the many positions for which we have been authorized for years, but have been unable to support. This increase will allow us to assign these additional personnel to the field, to implement an integrated information technology program, and to engage in the employee training so vital to accomplishing our mission.

Our final and most formidable challenge is to remind the American public and our lawmakers that the tens of thousands of pending charges represent real people who seek nothing more than to avail themselves of the only process through which their rights to equal employment opportunity can be considered. What we do is indeed a noble mission. Unfortunately, the promise of equal employment opportunity remains unfulfilled.

We continue to value and welcome your input, suggestions, and support.

The National Teacher of the Year Program is sponsored by the Council of Chief State School Officers in partnership with Scholastic, Inc.

Each year, every state selects a Teacher of the Year who then enters the national competition. Elaine graduated from Barnard College in 1969, received her Masters Degree in Library Science from Berkeley in 1971 and her teaching certificate from Northern Arizona University in 1974. Through an exchange program Elaine has taught all over the world; from Mexico to Calcutta to Australia.

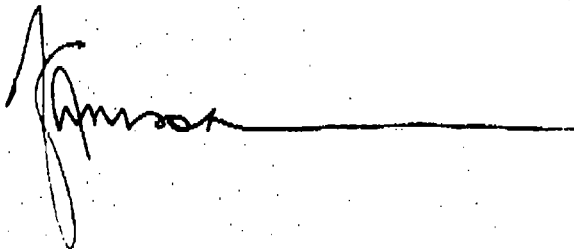

PROGRAMS OF THE BETHUNE-DuBOIS FUND

BETHUNE-DuBOIS FUND NATIONAL LEADERSHIP FORUM

The Fund sponsors, hosts and conducts bi-monthly forums for the purpose of bringing together national African-American leaders to discuss and develop strategies that provide solutions to issues and problems impacting urban America. In addition, the forum provides an opportunity for young professionals to interact on a one-on-one basis with leading authorities in various professional fields. Forum speakers have included Congressman William H. Gray, III, Dr. Ramona Edelin, Congressman Charles Rangel, Rev. Jesse Jackson, Congresswoman Maxine Waters, Gregg Watson (Xerox Corporation), Honorable Richard Hatcher, Dorothy Gilliam (Washington Post), the Honorable Julian Bond, Dr. Claud Anderson (Author of *Black Labor, White Wealth*) and Dick Gregory.

AUGUSTUS "GUS" HAWKINS INTERNSHIP PROGRAM

The internship program, named after Congressman Augustus Hawkins, provides the opportunity for minority college students to work on Capitol Hill in Washington, D.C., and interface with Members of the U.S. Congress, as well as the corporate sector. While in residence, students also participate in educational and cultural programs throughout the nation's capital in order to broaden their leadership skills. In addition, Howard University's Political Science Department offers a grassroots political course which is co-sponsored by the Fund.

"PROJECT WORKFORCE 2000: PASSAGE TO SUCCESS"

This newly started program is an extension of the internship program. We sponsor eight students year-round, by providing high school and college students job experience during the academic year, supplementing their academic course schedule and during the summer. The training will also expand to include executive assistant skills and professional protocol and communications.

JUNIOR ASSOCIATES CAMP PROGRAM

The camp is sponsored by the Fund for disadvantaged youth, ages 8-14. The aim of the camp program is to provide diverse experiences for economically and socially disadvantaged students who have no access to life outside of urban areas. This enrichment camp prepares students for higher educational opportunities, promotes responsibilities of leadership, and nurtures a healthy sense of community through seminars that examine value development, nonviolent philosophy, and conflict resolution strategies.

INTERNATIONAL PROGRAM

This program provides African American students the opportunity to study and live abroad to study different cultures and social systems. Students are able to meet their counterparts and interface with international leaders to discuss various issues. The first international program was held in the Bahamas. Programs have also been developed with the Caribbean and African nations.

BETHUNE-DuBOIS PRODUCTIONS

The objective of the non-profit production segment of the Fund is to preserve our history and culture through documentaries and other audiovisual programs which will advance a deeper knowledge of our history. The first major project was the "Rosa Parks Tribute", which was launched as a result of a personal request. Future projects will be underway to expand the "Legends of Our Times" series.

BETHUNE-DuBOIS PUBLICATIONS

The objective of the publications unit is to provide a literary vehicle for the preservation and dissemination of speeches, commentaries, lectures, sermons, and research on a variety of issues. Vital Issues: The Journal of African American Speeches is the first and only quarterly journal dedicated to publishing speeches by African Americans. This publication is invaluable to research and history, and includes all academic disciplines.

ANNUAL DINNER

Each year, approximately 1,000 individuals attend the Fund's annual awards dinner which is held in Washington, D.C. This dinner serves as the primary funding source and support for the Fund's programming, and assists in ensuring the worthwhile mission of the Fund.

ANNUAL CHRISTMAS DINNER PARTY FOR CHILDREN

The success of this first time event in which over 300 children and adults attended far exceeded our expectations. The 260 children were feted with a buffet dinner, Christmas play and a musical program. Gifts were distributed to all the children by Santa.

To say she was there in spirit would be too ethereal.

For 800 black American leaders and lawmakers at Wednesday night's Bethune-Du Bois dinner, the hurt seemed to infuse every pore and almost seemed to hum: Lani, Lani, Lani.

Lani Guinier, stymied Justice Department civil rights nominee, said she'd try to come but didn't. But her name was both spoken and unspoken as black leaders shakily tried to regroup after her nomination's disappointing denouement.

Sensing this, the White House dispatched its most high-profile spokeswoman, first lady Hillary Rodham Clinton, to begin damage control and the sanding process on a million unhappy edges. Despite the fact that Chelsea Clinton graduated from eighth grade on Wednesday and Mrs. Clinton had to leave behind a house full of friends and relatives.

"Is it going to be easy? No," Mrs. Clinton said in her introduction for

one of the night's honorees, Illinois Sen. Carol Moseley-Braun. "Is it going to be free of controversy? No. Are we always going to agree, even those in the same tent trying to move in the same direction? No."

She went on, "You know, there are hopes that bind us together, common causes that link our hearts and hands. But I'm in it for the long haul."

Others weren't so sure.

Michigan Rep. John Conyers was fresh from a Congressional Black Caucus meeting, where the unhappy group had postponed a meeting with the president planned for yesterday and plotted post-Lani strategy. A "drastic change" has occurred in relations between the

White House and the caucus, Mr. Conyers said, adding that things are "worse than they have ever been."

"I can't tell you how disappointed we are," he said.

The president of the Bethune-Du Bois Fund was more forceful. "Her and our civil rights were violated," C. DeLores Tucker said to loud applause. (Named after black leaders Mary McLeod Bethune and W.E.B. Du Bois, the fund has worked since 1984 to provide scholarships for minority college students.)

Later on, introducing the first lady, Ms. Tucker switched gears, comparing Mrs. Clinton to the likes of Harriet Tubman, Martin Luther

King and, "yes, Lani Guinier."

On hand for the speeches and singer Melba Moore's performance were Jesse Jackson; civil rights activist Dorothy Height; Molly Yard, former chief of the National Organization for Women; and WOL's Cathy Hughes.

Dionne Warwick was there, too, looking casually chic in shorts and sandals and not to sing but to talk politics and rehash her day's health care tete-a-tete with Mrs. Clinton. ("Finally," she said, "we have somebody that has a clue.")

Reminded that everyone from Tinseltown seemed to be talking politics these days, she quickly pointed out she has been an advocate of health issues since Ronald Reagan appointed her "ambassador of health" in 1987.

"There's nothing new about me being in Washington," she said. "I'm not part of the new Hollywood contingent."

PRESIDENT CLINTON ON DR. FOSTER NOMINATION

Press Conference: April 18, 1995

QUESTION

Mr. President, Senator Dole has threatened to block Dr. Foster's nomination as Surgeon General from reaching a vote, or going to the Senate floor. I have a two-part question. Are you going to the mat to fight for it? Are you going to withdraw it? And do you think that abortion, which is still lawful in this country, will be a litmus test in presidential politics?

THE PRESIDENT:

Yes, I'm going to the mat for the nomination. Whether abortion is a litmus test in presidential politics is up to the voters. Dr. Foster is a good man with a good record as a family doctor, as someone who has helped thousands of mothers to give birth to their children, and as an academic, and as someone who has supported policies that are pro-family and pro-child. He is qualified. He should be confirmed. He should not be caught up in any kind of politics -- presidential or otherwise.

QUESTION

Mr. President, as a follow up to Helen's question about the Foster nomination, it is now at the whim not only of Majority Leader Dole but three other presidential candidates who are in the Senate, and then when the going gets tough, there are some Democrats who may very well run for cover. I'm wondering if you can tell us if Dr. Foster knows himself the difficult period that lies ahead if, as you say, you are going to the mat with this and whether -- and the possible or probable outcome.

THE PRESIDENT:

I think he knows that it will be difficult. I think that he has been warned repeatedly -- not by me but by reading it in the press or seeing it -- that presidential politics seems to have found its way into his nomination. But, you know, sometimes the American system works the way it's supposed to. And sometimes the right thing has been done.

I will say again: He is a distinguished physician. He is a good man. He has a good record. He should be confirmed.

To welcome the girls from the DC Public Housing Authority and White House staff and their daughters to the White House, who are participating in Take Our Daughters To Work Day.

BACKGROUND:

The third annual "Take Our Daughters to Work Day," developed and promoted in conjunction with the Ms. Foundation, is designed to focus attention on young women ages 9-15. Last year, 25 million people participated in last year's Take Our Daughters to Work Day. The event produced national media coverage, generating 3000 press releases nationwide. This year, more than 30 Governors have endorsed the day and more than 30 companies support the day with financial assistance. In addition, 15 housing authorities across the country are pairing girls with mentors.

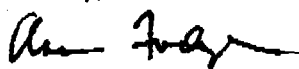

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A Profile—1913-1995 presents general information, purposes, structure and thrust of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSE

Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., is a private, non-profit organization whose purpose is to provide services and programs to promote human welfare. A sisterhood of more than 195,000 predominately Black college educated women, the Sorority currently has over 860 chapters located in the United States, Japan, Germany, the Virgin Islands, Bermuda, Haiti, Liberia, the Bahamas and the Republic of Korea. The major programs of the Sorority are based upon the organization's Five Point Thrust:

- Economic Development
- Educational Development
- International Awareness and Involvement
- Physical and Mental Health
- Political Awareness and Involvement

The Sorority was founded in 1913 by 22 students at Howard University. These young women wanted to use their collective strength to promote academic excellence and to provide assistance to the needy.

The Sorority holds its National Convention biennially to set policies and to determine programmatic goals. Regional Conferences are held in the seven geographic regions of the organization during non-convention years. In the interim, the Executive Board, consisting of elected and appointed members, volunteers to establish and implement policies, as needed. A paid professional staff operates the National Headquarters office in Washington, D.C.

No part of the net income or contributions accrue to the benefit of, or is distributed to, the Sorority members, officers or other private persons except as authorized by the Sorority to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered or to make payments in furtherance of its purposes.

As a non-profit organization, no substantial part of the Sorority's activities shall be for propaganda purposes or otherwise attempting to influence legislation in a lobbying role.

The Sorority does not participate or intervene in any political campaign on behalf of any candidate

for public office (including publishing or dissemination of statements). Other restrictions of this non-profit organization stipulate that its income must be used for educational and charitable programs and services; and must be used for the Sorority's purposes and, that its investments must not bring it into conflict with the Tax Reform Act.

DELTA RESEARCH AND EDUCATIONAL FOUNDATION (DREF)

Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. established the Delta Research and Educational Foundation (DREF), as a 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation.

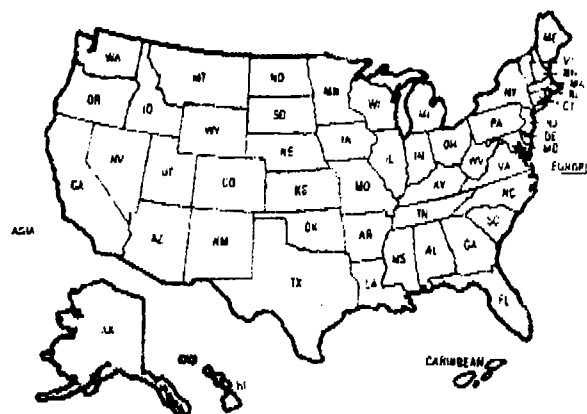
The Foundation's programmatic areas include:

- Research and support service programs for family welfare;
- Research and service projects in educational development;
- Research and study programs to increase international awareness, particularly in relation to the African Diaspora and Caribbean countries.

DREF is a public foundation that serves Delta Sigma Theta Sorority and other similar public service organizations.



Delta chapters are located in 44 states of the United States of America, the Caribbean, Germany, Haiti, Bermuda, Liberia, the Republic of Korea and Japan.



MEMBERSHIP PROFILE

Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc., is a membership organization. Its members are collegiate women who are matriculating at colleges and universities and alumnae members who have completed their undergraduate studies. Undergraduate chapters are located on the campuses of colleges and universities, and in some cases are designated as city-wide chapters. Alumnae chapters, located in cities, counties and towns, are composed of Delta members who are no longer matriculating in college and/or have graduated.

The Delta Data Resource Bank was recently updated by the Sorority's Organization Research Task Force whose mission is to provide information about Delta Sigma Theta Sorority through surveying the membership about its demographics, attitudes, operations and its perceptions of what should be the Sorority's major thrusts and concerns about the organization's future. The Organization Research Task Force will also build a comprehensive database of information about Delta's organizational infrastructure, that is, the professional and technical skills held by Deltas, their external and internal participation in community service and other information.

Recent database surveys report the following:

- Alumnae Deltas compose the largest proportion (76%) of the membership. Delta alumnae mem-

bership is young. Thirty-two percent of alumnae Deltas are between the ages of 26-40, and 26 percent are between the ages of 41-50. The largest segments of alumnae Deltas are almost equally divided among three of the seven regions, Eastern (21.8%), Southern (21%) and South Atlantic (20.5).

- Undergraduate Deltas comprise 24% of the membership and have the largest segments of their members in the Southern (23.6%) and South Atlantic (22.7%) regions.
- Seventy-two percent of alumnae Deltas are homeowners and the majority, 52 percent are married.
- Eighty percent of alumnae Deltas are employed while 17 percent are retired.
- Nearly fifty percent (49%) of alumnae Deltas hold a Master's Degree in Social Science, Education, Social Work, and Business. Forty percent hold Bachelor of Arts or Sciences Degrees.

Previous database surveys report the following findings:

- A majority of the Delta members are employed in education as teachers, school administrators, counselors, professors, and higher education administrators.
- Other occupations frequently reported included management, social sciences, social work, medicine/health, law, engineering, architecture, the performing arts, information sciences, public administration (federal, state and local levels), the judiciary, journalism and religion.
- Many members are published authors of books and periodicals.
- The survey also indicated that Delta members are committed to public service and maintain active roles with various social action programs and volunteer efforts in the communities where they reside. An important criterion for membership in undergraduate and alumnae chapters is documented and credible participation as a volunteer in public service.

The Sorority, now in its 82nd year, continues to grow and expand. The increased mobility characterizing the people of the nation also characterizes the members of the organization. As our members move and organize in geographic areas of the United States and other countries, new chapters are established for their involvement.

The Regional Directors and Representatives of the seven geographic regions, along with the organization's Scholarship and Standards Committee, have criteria and oversight responsibilities for the membership program. Listed below are the names of the regions and the states included in each.

PROGRAM PROFILE

The Delta Membership provides an extensive array of public services through its Five Point Thrust:

- Economic Development
- Educational Development
- International Awareness and Involvement
- Physical and Mental Health
- Political Awareness and Involvement

Activities in these areas involve Delta members as volunteers in direct services, catalysts for community action, recruiters of inter-agency support for issues (public and private), leaders in networking and coalition building with other organizations, and sources and resources for the securing and dissemination of information. An integral part of the public service program is the continuous maintenance of an effective system for the gathering and retrieval of data in order to make analyses and evaluations.

Delta's national office encourages innovative program approaches by awarding seed money for various types of programs to chapters who meet the criteria for selection. Successful local program models are disseminated and replicated by chapters. Pilot programs are also initiated at the national level with a plan for replication and follow-up. Task groups are formed at the national and local levels to impact on single purposes and selected concerns.

CURRENT NATIONAL PROGRAMS

Program development and implementation in Delta is a cooperative function with several committees and board members involved. Those with direct responsibilities for implementation include members of the Program Planning and Development Committee, Social Action Commission, Commission on Arts and Letters, Heritage and Archives Committee, Housing and Properties Committee, Information and Communications Committee, Membership Services and the Regional Officers. A summary of selected program areas is as follows:

• Delta Habitat for Humanity

In 1992, the Sorority became affiliated with Habitat for Humanity International, an ecumenical, Christian housing ministry that seeks to eliminate

poverty housing from the world and to make decent shelter a matter of conscience and action. Delta Sigma Theta is the first national African-American organization to collaborate with Habitat. Through volunteer labor, management expertise and tax-deductible donations of money and materials, Habitat builds and rehabilitates homes with the help of the selected homeowners. Houses are sold at no profit to partner families and no-interest mortgages are issued over a fixed period.

Between 1992-1994, Delta has built 22 houses throughout the United States since the beginning of their partnership with Habitat for Humanity International. The Delta Habitat Houses are located in St. Louis, MO, East St. Louis, IL, Camden, NJ, Kansas City, MO, Greensboro, NC, Lynwood, CA, Albuquerque, NM, Cleveland, OH, and Miami, FL. Currently, Delta chapters are launching a blitz build to construct one Delta Habitat House in each state where chapters are located. Additionally, the Sorority is preparing for its "International Blitz Build" scheduled for the fall of 1995. Delta, along with other Greek-letter organizations, will build a village of houses in several African countries.

• Summit IV: "A Global Response to the Pandemic of AIDS and Other Health Issues"

"A Global Response to AIDS and Other Health Issues" is a major national programmatic initiative of Delta. Since 1992, the Sorority has given distinct priority to increasing and heightening the awareness and level of concern regarding the prevention of and the spread of HIV/AIDS. Scientific studies on AIDS show that women of color are the number one at-risk victims of certain kinds of illnesses and diseases, and the rapid spreading of HIV/AIDS among minority women support these findings. In fact, a very recent study conducted by Howard University shows that "of the women infected with HIV/AIDS, 74% are women and teens of color."

In April 1994 Delta convened a two-day AIDS Summit in Washington, D.C. to educate women, teens and others about HIV/AIDS and to formulate action plans and develop strategies to help pre-

vent the spread of this deadly virus. The Summit featured specialists in the medical field, persons with AIDS (PWAs) community organizations, churches and others who are very knowledgeable and concerned about this disease. Persons with expertise in outreach, networking and coalition-building were also very involved. As a result of the two-day conference, a model was developed to share with Delta chapters nation-wide so that they, too, can expand their efforts to heighten awareness and help stem the increasing tide of AIDS in their respective communities.

Major on-going activities of Summit IV include forming linkages with women from other countries where AIDS has reached epidemic proportions (to share strategies and resources), sponsorship of community forums and programs for youth groups to involve them in the fight against HIV/AIDS.

• **Project Cherish**

Project Cherish, a national preservation and beautification program of African-American landmarks, monuments and historic sites, was created in 1992 by the Commission on Arts and Letters and is now coordinated by the Heritage and Archives Committee. Recognizing the fact that there are too few monuments which salute African-American heritage, Delta chapters implementing **Project Cherish** erect landmarks, plaques, statues, etc. to indicate contributions made by Black people. Delta chapters are also encouraged to give special attention to repairing, refurbishing and preserving African-American landmarks through clean-up and beautification projects. Additionally, **Project Cherish** outlines that chapters foster appreciation of Black cultural heritage by hosting celebrations that "tell the Black story" at a historic place or site.

• **Project SMART**

Project Smart (Seniors Medication and Records Tracking) is a medication and health records management program for senior citizens, especially those that live independently. This particular program is a curriculum designed for use with

African-American senior citizens. The program is intended for implementation by volunteer non-health professionals who have been trained by Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. The trainees will facilitate sessions with senior citizens on medication and health records management.

Project SMART is designed for use at senior centers, churches and other community settings that are frequented by senior citizens.

• **Delta Days in the Nation's Capital**

In 1989 the National Social Action Commission instituted "Delta Days in the Nation's Capital." This is an annual two-day activity which is held in the spring on Capitol Hill in Washington, D.C. It is designed to foster expanded involvement of chapters and members in public and social policy issues.

Among the many activities of Delta Days in the Nation's Capital are legislative briefings on legislative issues which impact the African-American community; skill development sessions such as "How to Lobby Effectively," "Understanding the Role of Congressional Staffers," "How to Monitor and Track Legislation," and legislative visits with members of Congress. The participants, who come from all geographical areas of the country, also have opportunities to observe the legislators in session, participate in Senate Press Tours and White House briefings. Members of Delta and others with expertise on various issues conduct the skills development and discussion sessions. Local DST chapters sponsor "Delta Days" activities in their state capital cities.

• **The Delta Immunization Campaign**

The Delta Immunization Campaign is a health awareness project to mothers of young children. This particular campaign was originally designed to reach at least 7000 households with children between the ages of six months and two years, especially in rural areas. However, it has now been expanded to target children in both rural and urban areas and in larger numbers.

The Delta chapters that adopt the project distribute brochures and local information to families

I met with Ed Faberman on Friday. He asked that I pass on the attached information to you regarding the US - UK bilateral agreement and other issues of concern to American.

Also attached is some information regarding the convention.

Steps to a Better International Opportunities

U.K.

1. De-link the BA/USAir codesharing issue from new route rights. Approval of the authority for British Air and USAir to continue their codesharing deal is a foregone conclusion.¹ Therefore, it should be approved immediately and taken off the table so that the parties can focus on new route opportunities.

2. Secretary Peña's decision to put a better U.S. package on the table during the London round of negotiations was an important step. After discussing that package for several days, it is important that the position contained in that last package -- particularly the need for multiple new Heathrow rights -- remain on the table and that DOT/DOS continue to insist that it must be accepted by the British -- nothing less. This would simply allow the U.S. to move current Heathrow gateways that are not being used to cities where they can be used. This gives the U.S. flexibility to pick its own cities and carriers.²

JAPAN

1. Announce that negotiations will start with the Japanese to obtain additional access for U.S. carriers between U.S. and Japan.

2. Emphasize that the primary benefit for the U.S. in Japanese negotiations is the need for additional U.S.-Japan flights.

3. New Japan authority obtained in negotiations will be allocated by June, 1996.

CODESHARING

Since all codesharing proposals submitted by other carriers have been approved, DOT should approve LOT and South Africa codeshare proposals.

INTERNATIONAL LEVEL PLAYING FIELD

Address costs and operational impacts of different security requirements placed on U.S. carriers but not placed on foreign carriers -- even those codesharing with U.S. partners.

¹ The authority for BA/US codeshare expired on March 17, 1995 and automatically continued. Last year, DOT continued the codeshare for one year without any bilateral change. Even if DOT wanted to stop the codeshare, they would have to give BA/US one year notice.

² This approach is supported by 25 Senators, Members of the House, various carriers and cities.

I. PURPOSE

To sign the bill in a public setting.

II. BACKGROUND

Congress approved H.R. 1345 on April 7 without much controversy. The Act, however, is only a first step in an effort to restore the City's financial health. Washington D.C., with a population of about 578,000 residents, has a workforce of some 44,400 persons. It now faces a period of austerity.

Rep. Tom Davis, Chair of the D.C. Subcommittee of the House Government Reform and Oversight Committee, is one of two freshmen subcommittee chairs of this Congress. Previously, Davis served as the Fairfax County, VA supervisor, and thus, is quite familiar with D.C.

Del. Eleanor Holmes Norton, on the other hand, has been placed in a very difficult position. With the change in the leadership of Congress, Del. Norton has had her limited voting powers removed by the Republicans. Coupled with the impending financial crisis of the city, Rep. Norton had to struggle to maintain some degree of home rule in this bill for the District. This was done against strong sentiment by Republicans to place the District in receivership.

You should be aware that some District residents believe this Authority is part of an effort to overturn home rule and put the City in receivership. Rep. Davis and Rep. Walsh (Chair, D.C. Appropriations subcommittee), with the help of Jack Kemp, are drafting a bill, under the general rubric of "Renewal of the District of Columbia," that would apply Republican economic theories to the District in order to restore its fiscal health. Speaker Gingrich has frequently indicated his deep interest in the fate of the District. We expect to see floor action on the bill before adjournment in the Fall.

APR 14

Review of the Authority:

- * The bill you are signing today creates a financial control board to oversee D.C. finances. It is called the District of Columbia Financial Responsibility and Management Assistance Authority, and is an entity of the D.C. government. The bill:
 - * mandates a balanced budget for D.C. over four years, and charges the Authority with ensuring that it happens;
 - * requires that the District borrow through this new Authority, once its members are appointed; and
 - * establishes a series of new financial tests that the District must pass in order to borrow from the Treasury. In the past, D.C. could borrow from Treasury upon request.
- * The bill calls on you to name five board members for the Authority, after consultation with Congress. Key Members of the congressional committees of jurisdiction have been contacted for suggestions and will be consulted again once the field narrows. The Authority could begin operating as soon as you name three members.
- * Board members must meet the following criteria:
 - (1) have knowledge or expertise in finance and/or management of business and/or government;
 - (2) reside or do business in the District;
 - (3) not be employed by the D.C. government; and
 - (4) not provide goods or services to the D.C. government.
- * Alice Rivlin, head of your senior-level Administration task force on D.C., is collecting names and will make recommendations to you.
- * The law sets a goal -- though not a mandate -- of 25 days by which you should make nominations.

I. PURPOSE

II. BACKGROUND

The Order of Sons of Italy in America (OSIA) is the oldest and largest grassroots organization representing Americans of Italian heritage. Established in 1905 in New York City, it has grown into a fraternal and service organization of 500,000 members, 20 state organizations and 750 community chapters. OSIA engages in charitable work and public affairs activities; including scholarship programs. Attached is a one-pager (that I believe is up to date) summarizing the intent and structure of the proposed The National Campaign Against Teen Pregnancy. (See attachment 1)
Essentially, this is an effort that Jody Greenstone is working to coordinate as an independent initiative.

The top priority is to identify who we believe would be best serving on the board as described in the attached memo. (See attachment 2) After identifying who would be effective, we need to discuss a plan for contacting these individuals and asking them to serve.

The plan seems to be for the President to kick-off this campaign, and to appear in a public service announcement potentially next month (one of two that the Ad Council would coordinate.) The PSA (see attachment 3 for a draft of the proposal) would conclude encouraging viewers to call an 800 number for more information on how to get involved. They would call the 800 number to get an informational brochure that would provide several options for people on all sides of the issue.

It seems that one of the key ways for appropriate organizations to become involved is with the operation on the other end of the 800 number, in addition to amplifying the President's message during the kick-off. (See attachment 4.)

Meeting on Friday at 9:45 in Maggie's office:

I believe that the primary purpose of this meeting is to identify who on the attached list (see attachment 5) would be effective serving on the board, and to develop a plan for who should contact each person and by when.

Other issues that will likely be addressed are 1) money and 2) realistic expectations for the program behind the brochure. There may be others as well; this was a meeting Jody asked for.

A NATIONAL CAMPAIGN AGAINST TEEN PREGNANCY

PURPOSE: To catalyze a sustained national effort, involving all sectors of society, to reduce teen pregnancy in the United States.

A NATIONAL BOARD: An independent national board would be formed to lead the effort. The board would be private, bipartisan, and broad-based, including prominent leaders from the entertainment, business, religious, civic, education and foundation communities. The full board would have between 15 and 20 members; however, a "core group" of 5 to 6 could come together initially to launch the initiative and then recruit other members. A national teen advisory committee would also be formed to work with the board.

A NATIONAL EFFORT: Each member of the board would be asked to spearhead an effort in their respective field to make the fight against teen pregnancy a national priority. A national media campaign directed at communities, parents and teens would be launched to reinforce the board's efforts. State boards could be established that would mirror the activities of the national board at the local level and become the critical frontline for the campaign.

A NATIONAL RESOURCE: The national board would focus on discovering and disseminating what works. The board would review what is known about effective approaches to reducing teen pregnancy and would establish a national clearinghouse of such information that would be broadly shared. It would support community-based initiatives as funds were available and offer training and technical assistance to local organizations. However, it would be up to local communities to forge their own approaches to the problem, consistent with their own values and experience. The board would monitor such efforts and support national research and evaluation of programs. It might also hold hearings offering a forum for discussion of key issues, set and monitor national goals, and celebrate local success stories. It could present an annual report to the President and the nation on what is working and on progress in meeting national goals.

FUNDING AND ORGANIZATION: Funds would be sought from foundations, business, government, and wealthy individuals to support the effort. A 501(c)(3) organization would be established, or an existing such organization selected, to accept the funds and manage the effort. The board would have a president and a small professional staff (5 or 6 people initially) to direct day-to-day activities.

TIMING AND PRESIDENTIAL SUPPORT: In the State of the Union, the President called "on parents and leaders all across this country to join together in a national campaign against teen pregnancy -- to make a difference." In addition, it appears that the President tentatively plans to unveil a public service announcement on teen pregnancy in May. It is important that the board be established as soon as possible to take advantage of the momentum sparked by the President's interest. Moreover, if a national board responsive to the president's call comes together in May, there may be opportunities to coordinate the launch of the private campaign with some of the President's activities in this area, including the possibility of a White House "kick-off" ceremony.
