Expanded and Annotated Presentation of AOIP's Goals for The Year 2000 and Beyond

...to coincide with the America 2000 number one affective-oriented educational objective of
Properly Preparing Students for Cognitive-Oriented Classroom Readiness

[The Educational-Enhancement Mission of the Assault On Illiteracy Process (AOIP) is to serve as a catalyst through which Black-led organizations have coalesced in a collaborative manner to properly prepare our students for the cognitive-oriented (or classroom) domain of learning by instilling in them good enough attitudes about themselves and about their surroundings or communities so they will then have the pride-filled CAN-DO attitude so essential for being motivated to want to learn. And; this attention as to how students view themselves and/or their communities is known (in educational circles) as the affective-oriented domain of learning, which—for simple understanding by the average person—has been referred to by Former U.S. Secretary of Education Terrel Bell as the community-building aspect. Also, because many affective-oriented and community-based and largely-imposed predicaments still have not been remediated to a degree sufficient to properly prepare many Black Americans for classroom readiness, AOIP was formed to fulfill this presently-neglected preparatory focus.]

[Preparatory Affective-Oriented Goal for Black Educator Groups.]

1. Create support systems and/or devices (like AOIP's The ADVANCER—both for parallel and simultaneous use in every classroom and in every community—to help compensate for distortions and omissions in text-books and otherwise through which Black and other similarly-situated ethnic groups will be filled with the desire to rise above their present state of dependency by learning of their worth and dignity.

[Preparatory Affective-Oriented Goals for all Organizations]

[Because the long-ago-imposed (and still-unremediated) negative self images of Black (and similarly-situated) Americans is so extensive, deep-seated and costly to all in America, the following are affective-oriented Preparatory Goals for which all Black-led organizations are assuming remeditative responsibility for these largely-exogenously-(and often-deliberately-)imposed conditions. Thus, surely, these organizations (and this coalition) need and deserve a reasonable proportion of all educational funding for this long-overdue affective-oriented preparation set forth as essential in America 2000 and elsewhere.]

2. Have 80% of our Black community population give priority support (including tithing) to Black-run religious institutions and have 100% accountability from these institutions.

3. Have at least 80% of our college-bound Black students attend a historically Black college and/or, only secondarily as a choice, a college wherein Blacks have a high measure of control and is focused on the equitable building of our communities. (The other 20% may choose, for various reasons, to integrate other colleges.)

4. Have at least 80% of our Black community businesses owned by Black or other persons who live in or immediately adjacent to—and identify completely with the needs of—our people and doing the same for Black professionals. (The other 20% can be seen as an equitable exchange for a reasonable percentage of Black ownership of businesses outside our communities.

5. Eliminate the need for unemployment entirely from within Black America by having skill training and equitable opportunities for all.

6. Eliminate the high incidence of teen and adult pregnancies both among persons not able to properly rear and support children and otherwise and, eliminate substance abuse, child abuse and crime completely from our neighborhoods and create safe aesthetically valuable communities.

7. Own and support fully in a primary way all of the means of communications which are working totally on our community-building behalf such as those cooperating fully with AOIP by providing guaranteed regular publicity at the national or local level at all times, as well as carrying all of AOIP's "affective-oriented" learning materials.

8. Have all corporations and other entities that directly or indirectly benefit from the Black community to deal equitably with the Black community as set forth in our Credo For Justice and Equity.

9. Have our people in proportionate bargaining positions in all major political parties so as to assure that an equitable number of Blacks working for us are elected and we can obtain an equitable share of all benefits from the political system.

10. Have Black Americans assuming full fiscal obligations for the basic needs of our interorganizational, interdependency-producing efforts like AOIP in a manner such that necessities will never have to be begged for when "others" feel threatened by Blacks' becoming independent...and our "retiring" national officers never have to be dropped completely from leadership roles with dignity even after they leave office within their organizations.

11. Have at least 80% of our Black families investing in ownership/savings plans that build for their fiscal independence and the same percentages strengthening their family ties both spiritually and economically.

AOIP's overall objective is to begin immediately to transform the discrete communities within Black America, through pride-instilling "togetherness," into such Shining Oases of Hope that there will be a greatly lessened desire, or "felt need," to abandon support for Black-led organizations that opened economic and other doors, Black-owned businesses and professional entities, Black churches, etc., by inordinately integrating and/or invading the communities and social and other institutions developed by—(and for) other ethnic groups. 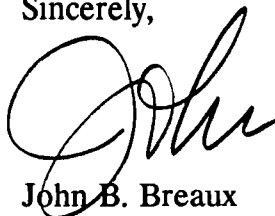

New Cystic Fibrosis Drug Approved

The Food and Drug Administration yesterday announced approval of a genetically engineered drug treatment for cystic fibrosis that promises to extend the lives of the 30,000 Americans who suffer from the disease.

The drug, dornase alfa (also called DNase), is manufactured by Genentech Inc. of San Francisco and will be marketed under the trade name Pulmozyme.

"Although this new product is not a cure for cystic fibrosis, the clinical data show that it can make a real difference in the quality of life for many patients," FDA Commissioner David A. Kessler said.

"This is the first treatment that specifically improves lung function in cystic fibrosis patients," he said.

Cystic fibrosis is the most common lethal inherited disease among whites. There is no cure for it. The average victim dies before age 30.

Genentech spokeswoman Laura Leber said the drug would be available nationwide by mid-January. "It's just a matter of getting the labeling and printing it," she said. "We have ample product supply for the entire CF community."

Approval came following a six-month clinical trial of the drug involving 968 cystic fibrosis patients age 5 or older. "Daily doses of DNase, when used in conjunction with standard therapies, reduced the risk of severe res-

piratory tract infections by 27 percent and increased patients' lung function," the FDA said in a statement.

The agency noted that side effects include inflammation of the throat, chest pain, voice alteration and laryngitis.

No tests were conducted on the drug's safety and effectiveness in children under 5 or in patients with less than 40 percent of normal breathing function. Nor was the drug tested to see if it would be safe and effective for more than a year.

Michael J. Sevka, an FDA doctor, has said that the long-term effects of using the drug are unknown.

Leber said it would be up to doctors to determine whether children under 5 should use DNase. The severity of the disease would be a factor, she said.

Cystic fibrosis sufferers inherit a flawed gene from each parent. The disorder causes the buildup of dense mucus in the walls of the breathing airway and in the digestive tract. Frequent bacterial infections and eventual damage to lung tissue usually result.

DNase acts by dissolving the tangle of matter from dead cells that accumulates in the lungs. It is inhaled through a device that converts the liquid drug into an atomized spray. The drug thins and then liquefies the mucus, which then can be coughed up.

The FDA's approval came under a 1992 law providing resources for speeding up review procedures. Licensing came nine months after the review started.
