About Juneteenth . . .

Since June 19th 1865 when General Gordon Granger issued his proclamation at Galveston declaring all slaves to be free *Juneteenth* has been recognized among many people both black and white in Texas as a day of celebration.

President Lincoln's proclamation, January 1, 1863 had declared slaves to be free. The South chose to disregard Lincoln's command until it was enforced by northern armies.

As long as an one in Texas can remember, *Emancipation Day* has been referred to as *Juneteenth*! Throughout the South, and even as far away as New York City, while *Emancipation Day* officially occurs in January, March or August, *Juneteenth* is the name held dearest to Black people.—by Edgar Jones

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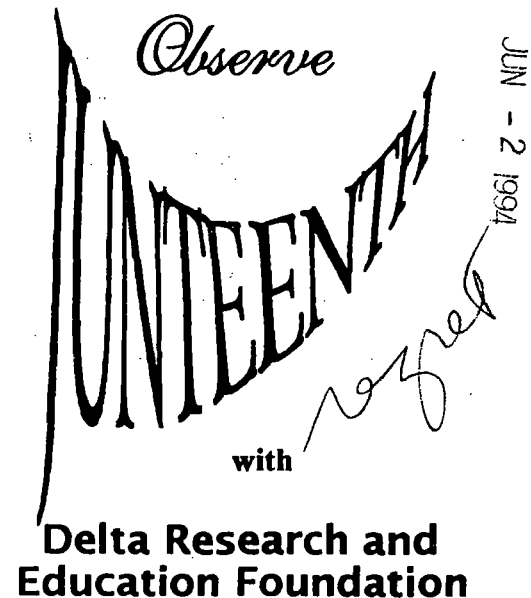

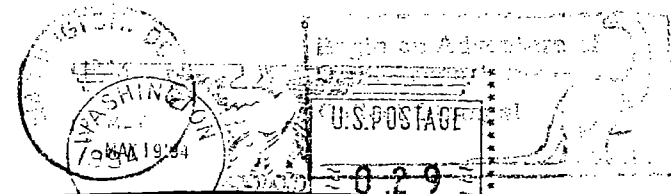

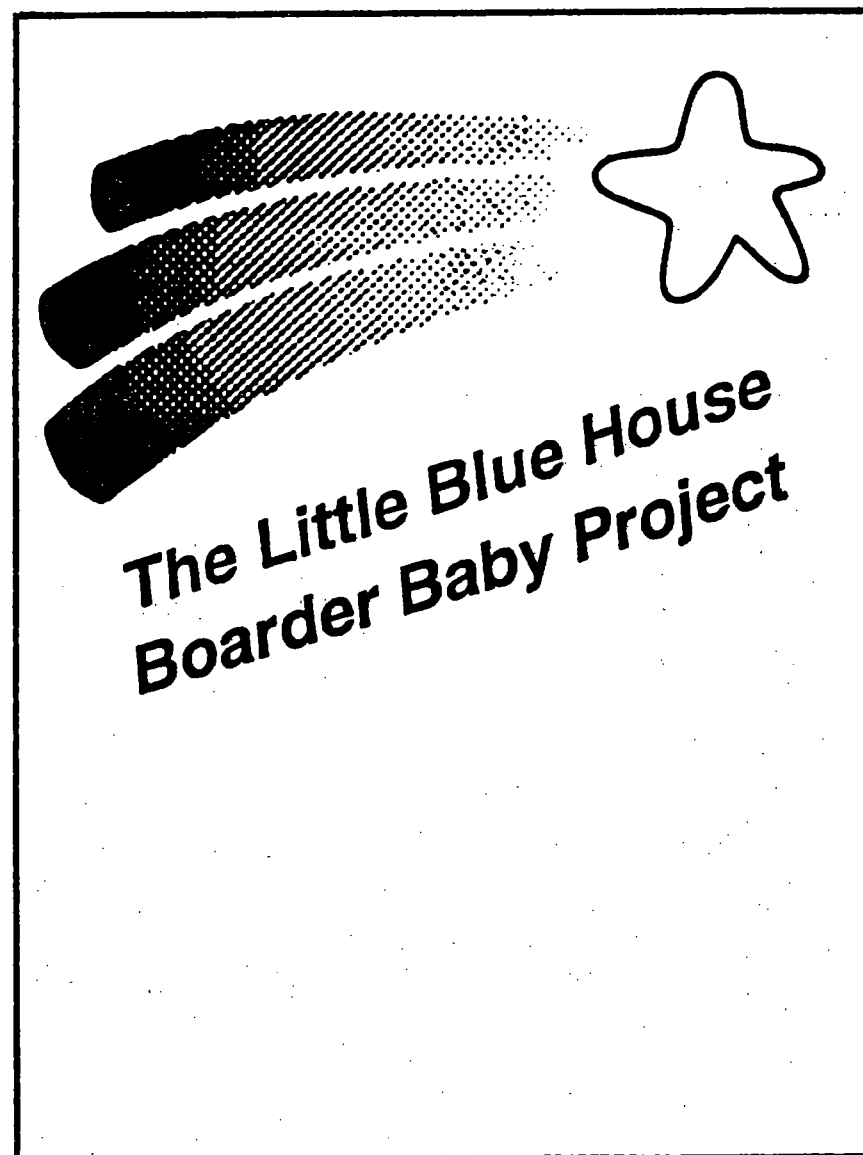

The Little Blue House Boarder Baby Project

A boarder baby is an infant medically ready for discharge who has been abandoned in the hospital by his or her parents. Many of these infants are born addicted, primarily to crack cocaine, and must endure painful withdrawal — sometimes lasting as long as three months. Now medically stable and ready for adoption, they languish in a sterile hospital environment.

The Little Blue House Boarder Baby Project was established in 1990 by Patty and Lynne Gartenhaus. This non-profit organization addresses the crisis of boarder babies — infants abandoned in Washington area hospitals by their poverty-stricken and drug addicted parents. Realizing the desperate need to remove the infants from the hospital setting, the Project opened "*The Little House*," a warm, home-like environment for the babies.

In August, 1990, Freddie Mac donated a single family dwelling to the Project which required extensive renovation. The community was galvanized by the boarder baby issue and offered labor, supplies, financial support, saving the Project 50% of the renovation costs.

In the fall of 1991, "*The Little Blue House*" opened its doors, welcoming four boarder babies into its refurbished facility. After a successful appeal to the Board of Zoning, the capacity of the home was increased to six babies.

"*The Little Blue House*" operates as a small, intimate and well-managed program which can serve as a model for private initiatives across the nation. Stable, home-like care for these babies is a far more beneficial option than a series of short term foster care placements. Each separation from a foster parent is stressful and disruptive. Our home provides continuity and security until permanent placement can be arranged.

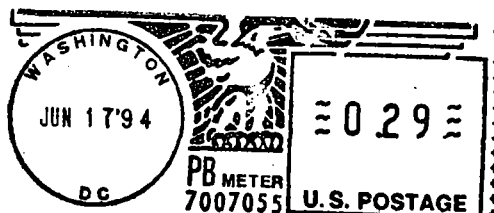

MEMORANDUM FOR THE FIRST LADY

FROM: The Health Care Delivery Room

Attached are talking points on universal coverage. The message of this event should focus on the fact that any proposal that does not achieve universal coverage will exclude millions of Americans with pre-existing conditions and will leave millions hitting their life-time limits.

- Universal Coverage means putting you and your doctor in charge for a change. It is you who know best what care you need, not your insurance company. To your insurance company, it is a "pre-existing condition" but to you, it is diabetes, it is asthma, it is cancer -- and it needs medical attention. To your insurance company, it's a "life-time limit," to you, it's fine print that means even though you have insurance, you have thousands of dollars in medical bills. We need universal coverage to end these kinds of limits and exclusions and to get you the health care you need.

In addition, we suggest touching on the following:

- I want to thank Steve McConnell with the Alzheimer's Association, Dr. Joseph Bates with the American Lung Association, and all of you standing with us today. You represent tens of millions Americans who support universal coverage. You are the parents, the grandparents, the hard-working middle class Americans who will remain at risk under reform that does not achieve universal coverage.
- I want to acknowledge the Members of Congress who are here today and who have been working so hard to pass real health care reform -- reform that includes universal coverage. (List of these Members to be provided on site.)

Other Issues of Importance to the Groups that You Might Want to Touch On

- We believe in increased biomedical research funding to find more and better cures for diseases like cancer, AIDS and bone diseases. We believe in a strong outcomes research funding program to evaluate what treatments really do work.
- We feel strongly that quality health care means that every American has the right to choose his or her doctor. Today, most employers -- not their workers -- choose health plans, and more and more people find themselves locked into plans where they can't see the doctor of their choice.

- Prevention is the heart of the President's approach. Without doubt our system can provide some of the highest quality care available anywhere. But it is a system in which a focus on curing can obscure the values of prevention; in which a focus on treating the sick can overshadow the values of keeping people healthy. Our insurance policies may cover some of the most expensive of high-tech procedures but we fail to immunize all our children. We provide life-saving coronary by-pass technology, but often fail to promote the wellness activities that might render it unnecessary. We marvel at our ability to treat a prematurely born child in an intensive care unit: but the child might be there because its mother went through pregnancy without ever seeing a doctor.

Close

- Many people are opposing health care reform that achieves universal coverage. It is critical that you voice your concern and make people understand why universal coverage is so important to you and the families you represent.

WHY WE NEED UNIVERSAL COVERAGE:

Incremental measures cannot accomplish most goals of health reform. Almost every goal of comprehensive reform depends on universal coverage.

1) Without universal coverage, the hard working middle-class is left behind.

Partial solutions will protect the wealthy and help the poor, but stick it to the middle-class. These half-measures and quick fixes would leave every middle class American at risk of losing their insurance. And at least 24 million Americans who work for a living would have no coverage at all. People like Jim Bryant and his family. Jim Bryant works 70 hours a week, juggling two jobs, but has no health insurance for his family. And the Congressional Budget Office also says that under the 91% scheme, "health insurance coverage would probably be more limited for middle-income people than the rich or poor." [CBO analysis, 5/94, pp. 17, 20]

2) Without universal coverage, every American remains at risk of losing their insurance.

Those who urge Band-Aid solutions say they're reforming the health care system. But they fail to provide every American with the ironclad guarantee that they'll have private health insurance that can never be taken away. According to a new study by Families USA, under a partial solution over one million Americans a month will still lose their insurance. We need universal coverage because every family -- including middle-class families -- must be protected. [Families USA Special Report, 6/94, p. 1]

3) Without universal coverage, the link between work and reward is broken.

Think of the message that non-universal reform would send to literally millions and millions of working Americans. It would say, much as we do today, *"If you are lucky enough to work for someone who will help you with your insurance, or if you are poor enough and down on your luck enough to qualify for government assistance, then you'll have health security. But, if you're in the middle and you get up every day and work for a living, your health coverage is always at risk."*

In fact, surveys suggest that as many as 30 percent of people feel locked into their current jobs because they fear losing the health insurance their families depend on. The CBO has said that incremental reforms will "reduce" -- but not solve -- this problem. ["Health Benefits Found to Deter Switches in Jobs," The New York Times, 9/26/91; CBO, 4/94, p. 28]

4) Without universal coverage, we pay more to cover less.

The CBO has said that under the President's proposal, *"significant deficit reduction will be achieved by 2004."* Under the 91% scheme -- where billions in government subsidies are used to help the poorest people buy insurance -- a \$300 billion shortfall would result by 2004. Meanwhile, the President's proposal would guarantee coverage to everyone, while the 91% scheme wouldn't guarantee coverage to anyone. [CBO analysis, p. 22]

5) Without universal coverage, insurance reforms won't work.

Today, insurers pick and choose who to cover -- charging sick people significantly more based on their health care "experience". One of the main goals of the President's proposal is to prohibit insurers from discriminating against people: no more charging sick people more than healthy people, young people more than old, small businesses more than large businesses. This will return insurance to what it used to be -- everyone pays in at the "community rate" and their insurance is there when they need it.

But, the Wall Street Journal says that "*experts insist and real-life evidence shows*" that insurance reforms such as community rating would be "*nearly impossible without universal coverage*". In fact, when one state recently enacted insurance reform without universal coverage, rates for the insured went up by 35% and the number of people with insurance declined. Why? Because all the sick people who had previously been denied coverage entered the system, driving up the rates for everyone. This caused young, healthy people and their employers to drop their coverage, which drove rates even higher. In fact, the CBO has said that incremental reforms can cause "*an upward spiral*" of premiums, with fewer people covered at the end. [WSJ, 6/15/94; WSJ, 5/27/94; CBO, p. xlv]

6) Without universal coverage, thousands of Americans will stay on welfare.

Studies have shown that thousands of people are on welfare because it's the only way their families can get health care coverage. An analysis of the effects of the Clinton proposal estimate that at least 840,000 people -- or 15% of welfare rolls -- will leave if the President's reform passes. While some incremental reform proposals would solve this, insurance reforms without subsidies would do nothing to encourage people to leave welfare for a job. Just like today, they say to those on welfare: "*If you stay on welfare, you and your family will be protected by comprehensive health benefits. If you leave welfare and get a minimum-wage job, not only are you unlikely to get health care but your taxes will pay for health care for those who remain on welfare.*" [Ellwood and Adams, Health Care Financing Review, 1990 Supplement; University of Wisconsin, L.A. Times, 11/18/93]

7) Without universal coverage, people with insurance will pay for those without insurance.

When people without insurance get in an accident and go to the emergency room, they receive the health care they need. But when they can't pay their bills, the hospital shifts these costs onto people with private insurance. Some experts estimate that \$25 billion in health care costs are shifted onto people with private insurance each year. Without universal coverage, this "cost-shift" will remain in the system -- penalizing those who take responsibility and letting millions of others "ride free". [Congressional Budget Office, May 1993]

8) Without universal coverage, for all workers, responsible businesses bear the burden.

Today, the businesses that provide their employees with insurance pay for those who do not. A recent study found that as much as one third of premiums currently paid by employers who provide coverage for their employees and dependents goes to cover the shortfall from companies who do not cover their employees and families. In 1991, employers spent \$26.5 billion to cover dependents who are employed by firms that did not offer insurance. [Hewitt Associates, 1/94; National Association of Manufacturers/Lewin-ICF, 12/91]

9) Without universal coverage, billions will be wasted on expensive, last-minute care.

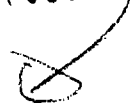
Until all Americans have comprehensive benefits stressing preventive and primary care, billions of dollars will continue to be wasted on expensive, last-minute care. A national survey of hospital emergency room departments determined that fifty-five percent -- or 50 million -- of the 90 million emergency room visits in 1992 were for ailments that were not medical emergencies and could have been treated in a doctor's office. An emergency room visit costs at least three times that of a visit to a community-based physician in the same area. [National Hospital Ambulatory Medical Care Survey, 1994; HHS, Inspector General Report, 1992]

10) Experts Agree -- We Can't Get Cost Control Without Universal Coverage:

- **Rashi Fein, Medical Economics, Harvard University:** *"We cannot have real savings and real cost containment without universal enrollment. Such enrollment is not a welcome bonus delivered with cost containment dollars; it is what makes cost containment possible. Only with universality can we eliminate the practice of making patients with insurance pay the medical costs of those without it."* [New York Times, 10/28/93]
- **Ted Marmor and Jerry Mashaw, Yale University:** *"It is the experience of every industrialized democracy with a universal health insurance program that cost control becomes easier when the plan is universal, not harder. . . that counsel currently offered by critics -- go slow in adding new benefits until we can assure everyone that the savings are real -- is advice that is likely to doom the plan to failure. Universalism and cost control go hand in hand. Otherwise it is politics as usual, full of special pleading."* [L.A. Times, 10/7/93]
- **The Washington Post:** *"Universal coverage is not only a fair and noble objective, consistent with America's values: it is also essential if health care markets are to work well."* [Editorial Page, 6/16/94]
- **Alain Enthoven:** *"By putting market pressure on providers to cut costs, market reforms promoting competition -- absent universal coverage -- could exacerbate access problems. It would be more humane, economical and rational simply to adopt a policy providing coverage to virtually everybody through an integrated financing and delivery organization that provides primary and preventive care as a part of a comprehensive benefits package."* [Health Affairs, 1993]

I. PURPOSE

The purpose of this event is to join 24 of the most prominent health organizations in the United States in standing firmly in support of universal coverage. These groups, most of which are household names, represent tens of millions of Americans.

II. BACKGROUND

The 24 organizations standing with you today are all voluntary health agencies, organized by volunteers whose mission is to serve the public through research, providing services and influencing public policy on behalf of victims of these disorders and their families.

(Although they have paid staff, their governing board is comprised of volunteers.) The people represented by these groups deeply understand the importance of universal coverage: they are Americans who are denied coverage due to pre-existing conditions and who suffer the burden of life time limits. They all strongly support universal coverage and are generally supportive of the administration's approach to health care reform.

They are non-profit organizations who raise their money through membership dues and grants, and as a result their political activities are severely limited. They also tend to be conservative and cautious organizations, many of which are well-known and well-respected by the American public.

Although each group represents a constituency with different disorders and different needs -- they have agreed to stand together today to emphasize what they have in common. Universal coverage is the most important issue to these groups -- universal coverage regardless of employment status, ability to pay or pre-existing conditions. Other issues that are very important to the participating groups are:

- elimination of preexisting conditions clauses,
- research,

- choice of physician allowing for access to specialty care,
- prevention.

Each group has released a press statement in conjunction with today's event to underscore the need for universal coverage.

PARTICIPATING VOLUNTARY HEALTH ORGANIZATIONS

June 29, 1994

Alzheimer's Association: The Alzheimer's Association represents over 4 million Americans with Alzheimer's disease and their 19 million family members; they have a 50-state network and approximately 35,000 volunteers. The Alzheimer's Association chairs the Long Term Care Campaign and is a member of the Health Care Reform Project. As you know, Alzheimer's Association is one of our strongest supporters, and has been very active in the health reform debate. The group participated in a brunch with supportive seniors groups and the President in February. Steve McConnell, Executive Vice President, will have a speaking role.

American Lung Association: The American Lung Association has volunteers and staff offering programs and educational services related to lung disease in 115 state and local offices. The American Thoracic Society is the professional medical arm of the American Lung Association, which is the only medical specialty group that joined with other physician groups in support of the Health Security Act in December. We have had a positive relationship with the American Lung Association. Joseph Bates, M.D., ALA President, will have a speaking role.

AIDS Action Council: AIDS Action Council represents approximately 362,000 Americans with AIDS and over 1000 community-based AIDS service organizations throughout the United States. It is the only national organization devoted solely to lobbying on AIDS policy, legislation and funding. They have been active in the health reform debate and are early and strong supporters of the administration's approach to reform. They have, however, expressed publicly disappointment with the Office of the AIDS Czar.

American Cancer Society: The American Cancer Society represents approximately 8 million Americans who have a history of cancer, and has over two million volunteers. Although they have been somewhat reserved with their support at times, they continue to work constructively with the administration and have released a positive press statement in conjunction with today's event and expressing its support for universal coverage.

American Heart Association: American Heart Association represents over 56 million Americans that have cardiovascular disease and is comprised of approximately 2,100 community organizations in fifty states, with over 3.6 million volunteers. AHA's mission is to reduce disability and death from cardiovascular diseases. The group has been reserved in its support of the administration, but felt strongly about participating in this event.

American Kidney Fund: The American Kidney Fund represents 230,000 Americans.

American Social Health Association (ASHA): ASHA represents approximately 55 million Americans with sexually transmitted diseases.

Arthritis Foundation: The Arthritis Foundation represents the 37 million Americans with Arthritis.

Epilepsy Foundation of America: Epilepsy Foundation has represents 2.5 million Americans. It is strongly supportive and has generally been active in the health care reform debate, particularly in conjunction with the grassroots network of the Consortium of Citizens with Disabilities.

Interstitial Cystitis Association (ICA): ICA represents approximately 1.5 million Americans affected by interstitial cystitis, who are predominantly women. It is an educational and patient advocacy group; this year is its tenth anniversary. (Interstitial Cystitis is an inflammatory condition of the bladder lining.)

Lupus Foundation of America: The Lupus Foundation of America represents over 500,000 Americans affected by Lupus.

March of Dimes Birth Defects Foundation: March of Dimes Birth Defects Foundation is dedicated to improving the health of babies by preventing birth defects and infant mortality.

National Breast Cancer Coalition (NBCC): NBCC is comprised of over 250 organizations advocating on behalf of the 2.6 million women with breast cancer to influence public policy and educating the population to raise awareness. NBCC represents millions of patients and professionals. They have a strong grassroots network. You met with the leaders of NBCC during the campaign, and participated in an event in October with NBCC and the President at the White House. NBCC is a member group of the Health Care Reform Project.

National Diabetes Research Coalition (NDRC): NDRC represents a broad range of scientists, researchers, doctors and care givers involved in researching ways to develop new prevention, treatment and cure of diabetes. They represent 14 million Americans with diabetes.

National Down Syndrome Society (NDSS): NDSS represents 250,000 Americans and has a membership of 60,000.

National Easter Seal Society: National Easter Seal Society represents 49 million Americans with disabilities. It has 150 affiliates nationwide, offering services to over one million individuals.

National Hemophilia Foundation (NHF): NHF represents 20,000 Americans with bleeding disorders.

National Mental Health Association (NMHA): NMHA has a membership of approximately 40,000, with 326 chapters in 36 states. NMHA estimates that 10-12% of the nation have mental health problems at any given time. NMHA has had a strong, ongoing relationship with the administration, particularly with Mrs. Gore. NMHA has been one of the most active mental health groups in the health reform debate; recently, they participated in a mental

health constituency day.

National Multiple Sclerosis Society (NMSS): NMSS represents approximately 333,000 Americans and their families has 400,000 members, 2,200 volunteers and . NMSS has been strongly supportive of the administration and active in the health care reform debate; they are a member of the Health Care Reform Project.

National Neurofibromatosis Foundation: National Neurofibromatosis affects approximately represents 100,000 Americans. It is a neurological genetic disorder.

National Organization for Rare Disorders (NORD): NORD represents 60,000 individuals with rare disorders. There are over 5,000 rare diseases affecting more than 20 million Americans.

National Osteoporosis Foundation (NOF): NOF members, representing the 25 million Americans affected by osteoporosis. Osteoporosis is a bone disease that more often strikes women than men. NOF has been very supportive of the administration, and participated in the women's constituency day last month.

National Psoriasis Foundation: The National Psoriasis Foundation represents over 5 million Americans, with a membership of 25,000. Psoriasis is a chronic, non-contagious skin disorder.

Sjogren's Syndrome Foundation: Sjogren's Syndrome Foundation represents 2 million Americans affected by the disease, and 7,000 patient members. The syndrome is a chronic disabling disease primarily affecting women, who are 90% of its victims.

United Ostomy Association: United Ostomy Association is comprised of 38,000 patients of ostomy or related surgery. Ostomy is an intestinal or urinary tract disorder.

MEMORANDUM FOR THE FIRST LADY

FROM: The Health Care Delivery Room

Attached are talking points on universal coverage. The message of this event should focus on the fact that any proposal that does not achieve universal coverage will exclude millions of Americans with pre-existing conditions and will leave millions hitting their life-time limits.

- Universal Coverage means putting you and your doctor in charge for a change. It is you who know best what care you need, not your insurance company. To your insurance company, it is a "pre-existing condition" but to you, it is diabetes, it is asthma, it is cancer -- and it needs medical attention. To your insurance company, it's a "life-time limit," to you, it's fine print that means even though you have insurance, you have thousands of dollars in medical bills. We need universal coverage to end these kinds of limits and exclusions and to get you the health care you need.

In addition, we suggest touching on the following:

- I want to thank Steve McConnell with the Alzheimer's Association, Dr. Joseph Bates with the American Lung Association, and all of you standing with us today. You represent tens of millions Americans who support universal coverage. You are the parents, the grandparents, the hard-working middle class Americans who will remain at risk under reform that does not achieve universal coverage.
- I want to acknowledge the Members of Congress who are here today and who have been working so hard to pass real health care reform -- reform that includes universal coverage. (List of these Members to be provided on site.)

Other Issues of Importance to the Groups that You Might Want to Touch On

- We believe in increased biomedical research funding to find more and better cures for diseases like cancer, AIDS and bone diseases. We believe in a strong outcomes research funding program to evaluate what treatments really do work.
- We feel strongly that quality health care means that every American has the right to choose his or her doctor. Today, most employers -- not their workers -- choose health plans, and more and more people find themselves locked into plans where they can't see the doctor of their choice.

- Prevention is the heart of the President's approach. Without doubt our system can provide some of the highest quality care available anywhere. But it is a system in which a focus on curing can obscure the values of prevention; in which a focus on treating the sick can overshadow the values of keeping people healthy. Our insurance policies may cover some of the most expensive of high-tech procedures but we fail to immunize all our children. We provide life-saving coronary by-pass technology, but often fail to promote the wellness activities that might render it unnecessary. We marvel at our ability to treat a prematurely born child in an intensive care unit: but the child might be there because its mother went through pregnancy without ever seeing a doctor.

I. Purpose

To emphasize economic benefits of the agreement and the importance of implementing the Uruguay Round agreement this year (hopefully before the August recess).

II. Background

This is the first of a series of industry sector briefing designed to energize the business community. The sectors included in this briefing are: aerospace, agriculture equipment, construction equipment, and pharmaceuticals. Additionally, the Alliance for GATT NOW sector leaders (Washington representatives of major companies) were invited.

Inasmuch as you are the only participant who can ask them to speak with Members of Congress, please impress upon them the importance of visiting their Senators and Representatives at home during the July 4th recess, as well as making certain that Members receive telephone calls and letters from constituents in their district offices. The opponents are airing TV and radio commercials throughout the country. We must make sure the message that this must be passed this year gets communicated.

Your talking points reflect our message of the United States as the leader in international economic affairs.

You will be followed by Ambassador Kantor who will discuss the benefits of the agreement to the sectors in attendance; Secretary Bentsen who will discuss the benefits of the agreement to the U.S. economy; and John Emerson who will discuss the overall White House effort to pass GATT.
