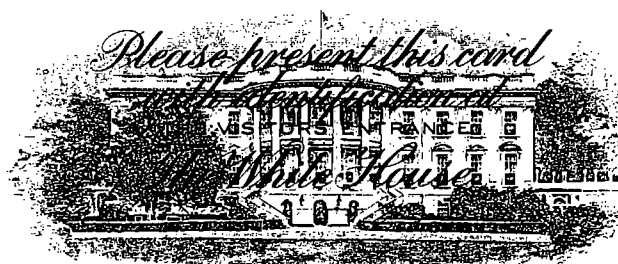

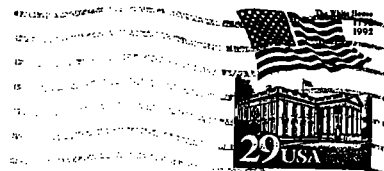

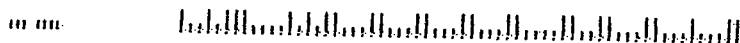

I. Purpose

To fulfill a request from Marian Wright Edelman and to show support for a group that worked hard on the crime bill and will be important to its implementation.

II. Background

This weekend, (September 10-12), a "Summit" of Black juvenile and family court judges from across the country is being hosted by the Children's Defense Fund (CDF) and the Black Community Crusade for Children (BCCC).

BCCC is coordinated nationally by CDF in partnership with well-established and regional child-serving organizations. Their goal is to ensure a better life for Black children, working with the current Black leadership around specific goals for children. Their mission statement: "to leave no child behind and to ensure every child a Healthy Start, A Head Start, a Fair Start and a Safe Start in life with the support of caring parents and nurturing communities".

The goals of the summit are to learn from and educate the participants about the problems, resources and ideas relevant to the welfare of Black children and their families. Four broad policy statements have been developed in which to frame the summit:

- 1) Prevention/Early Intervention
- 2) Diversion/Alternatives to Detention
- 3) Rehabilitation
- 4) Transition/Aftercare

To meet these goals BCCC is attempting to establish a strong network of juvenile and family court judges.

It was founded in 1880 when several African American Baptists organizations and churches united under the National Baptist Convention, USA banner. The organization promotes home and foreign missions, encourages and supports Christian Education, publishes and distributes Sunday School and religious literature world-wide. It also operates a number of black colleges and seminaries.

The National Baptist Convention, USA has had 12 previous presidents including Dr. Elias C. Morris, a former President of the Arkansas Baptist State Convention, who during his tenure (1893-1922) was instrumental in organizing the Arkansas Baptist College. The organization is currently headed by The Reverend Doctor Theodore J. Jemison, Pastor of the Mt. Zion First Baptist Church of Baton Rouge, Louisiana. Dr. Jemison is very active in the civil rights movement and marched with Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. in the early 1950's. He is one of your most loyal supporters and played a pivotal role in galvanizing clergy support for the crime bill. He is a solid supporter of your efforts to reform the nation's health care system. Additionally, several religious leaders in attendance have been rallying their church congregations in support of universal health coverage and were instrumental in passage of the crime bill.

This year's convention is expected to be the largest ever because of the retirement of Dr. Jemison, who is stepping down after 13 years as national president. On September 8, 1994, a new president will be elected and the closeness of the race between the four candidates is expected to boost attendance to maximum capacity. The candidates vying to succeed Dr. Jemison are Dr. Franklyn Richardson of New York, Dr. Henry J. Lyons of Florida, Dr. Caesar Clark of Dallas, and Rev. William Shaw of Philadelphia. This election is being conducted by secret ballot and voting machines will be used to tabulate the votes. We expect to know the election results late thursday evening.

Jesse Jackson is attending the conference and is expected to be seated on the stage with 120 other clergy leaders when you speak.

ON THE CONVENTION DIRECTION

Dr. Lyons believes that as we move forward in addressing the many social, economic, and political concerns of our constituents, it is even more important to re-affirm our commitment to the word of God. In these times of trouble, trials and tribulations, it is absolutely mandatory that we lift up our belief in the sovereignty of God, the infallency of the scripture, the death, burial and resurrection of Jesus Christ for our sins, and the power of the Holy Spirit in our lives. *With Dr. Lyons, Jesus is first!*

ON THE PROBLEMS OF FAMILY, DRUGS & YOUTH

Dr. Henry Lyons, as president of the Florida General Baptist Convention, has constructed a Family Life Retreat Center to deal with the problems of family, drug abuse, and poor performance among our youth. Situated on 160 acres of land in northeast Florida, this facility includes cabins, an assembly hall, recreation facilities, and a drug treatment program. Individual families, church families, as well as youth are able to come and participate in workshops, seminars, and wilderness experiences that provide solutions to the problems of urban America. Dr. Lyons has also built an eight room hotel also on the retreat and a 400 seat picnic pavilion.

ON ADMINISTRATION

During Dr. Lyons 10 years as State President, he has instituted a system which allows the convention to have a full staff which operates 365 days per year. With an Administrative Specialist, Secretaries, Resource Persons, and Field Representatives, this program, called the Unified Program, makes the convention available to its membership every day of the year. In order to fund this program, each church is simply asked to give 2% of its tithes and offerings on a monthly basis to the convention. A bonus of this program is that there is no need for enrollment during the annual session.

ON SUPPORT OF THE LOCAL CHURCHES

Dr. Lyons has instituted a program whereby every church that participates in the Unified Program can receive workshops and seminars at absolutely no cost to the church. Experts from the convention staff are sent to the churches to conduct seminars in areas such as church administration, stewardship, evangelism, growing the church through the Sunday School, and Youth Ministries. All expenses for the facilitators are covered by the convention.

ON CHURCH FINANCING

Dr. Lyons has instituted a program with the First Union National Bank of Florida which enables the convention to guarantee loans that churches need to build or renovate. With this program, the convention itself processes loan applications from churches and then informs the bank as to which loans they should approve.

ON INSURANCE

Dr. Lyons has instituted a program whereby every pastor and church member may have the life, disability, and retirement insurance they need without any qualification requirements. This program is operated through the Preferred Risk Insurance Company, one of the largest in the world.

ON TRAVEL

Dr. Lyons has instituted a program where all Florida Baptists receive travel discounts from major air carriers as well as discounts of car rentals through Budget Rent-a-Car Company.

ON ACCESS TO PUBLIC GRANTS

Dr. Lyons has instituted a program whereby convention churches receive seminars on how to form 501(c) 3 corporations which make them eligible for a variety of city, county, state and federal grants. This program greatly increase the churches image and effectiveness in the community.

ON HIGH EDUCATION

The Florida General Baptist Convention under the leadership of Dr. Lyons, has taken extraordinary steps to insure that its school, Florida Memorial College remains educationally and fiscally sound. With tremendous financial support from the convention, this college is one of only a very few fully accredited black colleges that is operating in "the black".

ON HOUSING FOR LOW-INCOME FAMILIES

Dr. Lyons' dream of all blacks being able to purchase their own home has been partially realized. In October of 1992, the convention built 30 new homes in northeast Florida. This meant a happy holiday for 30 families who are now proud owners of new homes for the first time in their lives.

We agreed that I would focus on the following areas:

- 1 Identifying Catholic venues -- schools, hospitals, charities, and other events -- for possible presidential appearances or messages.
- 2 Writing on Common Good themes on appropriate occasions.
- 3 Contributing lists of names of prominent Catholics for:
 - * Catholic press, Catholic opinion leaders, secular press contacts with Catholic connections and interests.
 - * Upcoming events such as the religious leaders breakfast, Americorps launching, Community Development Bank signing, and the Yeltsin luncheon with business leaders.
 - * The 10 most important Catholics in 12 targeted states - California, Pennsylvania, Michigan, Ohio, Tennessee, New York, Minnesota, Illinois, Florida, Missouri, Washington, and Oregon.
- 4 Identifying Catholic opinion leaders to be kept up to date on key speeches such as the major U.N. speech on 9/26.
- 5 Alerting you and appropriate staff people about other developments such as the Cal Thomas column accusing the President of claiming that it was "God's will" to pass the crime bill and recommending responses.
- 6 Working with Flo McAfee to develop an informal network of Catholic contacts that parallels her existing formal network of religious liaison contacts.
- 7 Taking part in the staff workgroup on Catholics which meet every other Thursday.

I'll work with Donald Dunn in dealing with the external Catholic advisory group and with Flo on internal administration activities.

You asked me to "create a road map for Flo McAfee" on these activities. As the speechwriting office assigns a speechwriter to an appropriate event, they'll know that I'm available to work with them.

I'll fax future messages to you, Flo, or Donald, with a copy of everything going to Flo so that she can keep a file.

I believe this reflects our conversation. Please let me know if I've left anything out or missed anything.

P.S. Because some key events will take place so soon after Labor Day, I spoke with Flo on 8/29 and began work on a few projects:

* Flo told me to fax informaion about the Baroni event to Dana Wyckoff, and I have done that.

* I faxed Flo and Mark Gearan copies of the Cal Thomas column along with a recommendaion that the President address the broader issue of claiming that "God's will" is on one side or another of a political debate in his remarks to the religious leaders breakfast.

* Flo told me to talk to David Kusnet who is drafting possible remarks for the President for the breakfast. David asked me to draft something that would be more than a memo but less than a finished draft, for use in both the breakfast remarks and the 9/9 speech to the National Baptist Convention.

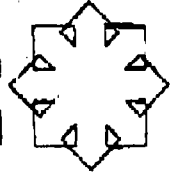

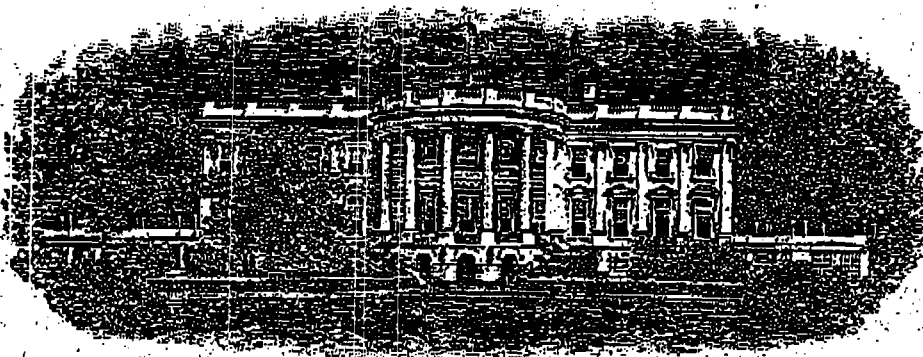

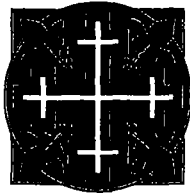

**The President of the United States
Breakfast with Religious Leaders
The White House
September 8, 1994**

I want to welcome all of you to the White House. I hope you had the chance to take a break from your work this summer, as I did. I got a little nudge about that from one of your brethren. The Sunday morning after I left Washington, the minister told the congregation where I was worshipping: "The rhythm in life is not all work . . . It's work, rest, worship, and play." I think he was sending me a message to enjoy my vacation -- and, of course, as a good churchgoer, I followed his counsel.

It has become a tradition with me, on the day after I return from vacation, to meet with a group of religious leaders from all faiths. With summer over, with school starting again, and, this year, with the Jewish High Holy Days so early, it is an ideal time to rededicate ourselves to renewing our spirit and the promise of America.

After returning from vacation last year, I spoke about **The Culture of Disbelief: How American Law and Politics Trivialize Religious Devotion**. In that book, Steven L. Carter, a professor at Yale Law School and a committed Christian, argued that our popular culture and political process minimize the role that religious values and religious leaders have always played, and must always play, in American life.

One year later -- thanks largely to your good work -- there is reason for hope that Americans of many faiths are coming to a new consensus.

We are rejecting two equally wrongheaded extremes: those who say the voices of religion have no place at all in public life -- and those who claim a monopoly of public truth in a public square filled with many faiths and many truths.

I'm glad we have done what we can do in government this past year to restore religion to its rightful place in American life. Religious conviction in this country has typically gone hand-in-hand with religious toleration. At our best, we understand that the best way to defend my freedom to worship as a Baptist is to defend your freedom to worship as Catholics, as Jews, as Muslims, or in any way your conscience commands. At our best, we understand that freedom without tolerance is freedom unfulfilled.

Last fall, I had the great honor to sign the Religious Freedom Restoration Act, which was supported by faith communities as diverse as this wonderful gathering this morning. And I am proud that our national service program, Americorps -- which we

will kick off formally next week -- allows its participants to work within religiously sponsored organizations to make our communities stronger.

And now, across America, we are beginning to understand that we need the moral voice of religious leaders to help find answers to the moral problems confronting our country. You know better than anyone why we need your help.

For more than two decades, the rapid pace of change has strained our social fabric. Middle class families have been working longer hours for stagnant living standards, and having a harder time balancing the demands of their jobs and the needs of their children. In communities devastated by the loss of industrial jobs, crime and drugs are filling the vacuum created by the collapse of work and family. And there is a growing tendency to see neighbors as strangers, and strangers as enemies.

We Americans need a spiritual renewal to meet these challenges. I'm doing my best to make government give our citizens the opportunities they need to renew the American Dream, and in the process, to find the room in their lives for the deeper things they need -- for faith and family and community.

We are doing what we can to reward work and strengthen families. Our economic plan helped business create 4 million new jobs. And it cut taxes for 15 million hardworking families with children.

The real meaning of so much we are doing is to return to our people the power to shape their own lives. That is at the heart of our efforts to improve education and training, to reform health care and welfare, and to give communities more resources to fight back against crime and violence. [More about Crime Bill below.]

Together with our homes and our houses of worship, our schools are where our children learn their values. That is one reason why, with Goals 2000 [acknowledge Secretary Riley], we encourage grassroots reforms to make our schools stronger. And we expect our local communities to keep their schools free from drugs and guns -- not with bureaucratic mandates but by setting goals that express our moral commitments as a people. I am glad to say that there is evidence our efforts are going to help keep guns out of our schools this fall, as our children go back to school, eager to learn and not to dodge bullets.

But we know that success as a nation is, fortunately, dependent on much more than what we do in this city. It depends on the moral choices that people make in their lives. Government can only do -- and should only do -- so much. For us to have the spiritual renewal that will help pull our people through, we

urgently need your moral voice, your moral guidance, and your moral commitment to inspire our people to make the right choices and to find the discipline to do the right things.

I honor all the good work that you do. But we all must do more. And we all have to work in a partnership, so that we all can do more to heal this wonderful but troubled country.

That means we must reach across our differences and work together in ways that do not compromise but actually fulfill our deepest moral and religious convictions. We can and must find common ground for the common good. Every one of our major faiths honors the values that are the moral foundations of American life, the values of work and family and community. That is why, in a survey last year, the Gallup Institute found that almost 70 percent of Americans believe their communities can reach agreement on what values should be taught in their schools; 97 percent believe that honesty should be taught as a moral value; and 93 percent support the teaching of a belief in democracy and the acceptance of racial groups other than their own.

I ask you to engage in a common struggle to help our hardworking citizens breathe new life into these common values. Help us all to find the ways to uphold them despite the tensions and temptations of life in this time of rapid and wrenching change. Help us understand that the values that unite us are infinitely more important than the issues that divide us. Call upon "the better angels of our nature; call us together; and call us to action.

We need that call to action right now in the fight against crime and violence. As difficult as it was to pass the Crime Bill, the real work begins right now in every one of our communities. We need your help, in your churches and synagogues and mosques, to create a climate of civility and cooperation in our communities. We need your help to mobilize the members of your faith communities to work with the 100,000 new officers in community policing programs; to help parents to teach their children the difference between right and wrong; and to help create zones of safety and support, in which our children can live and learn, play and pray, free from guns and drugs.

In the fight against crime and violence -- and in everything we must do as a nation -- we need your ministry. Together, we can fulfill our country's ultimate moral purpose: to enable people to reach deep inside themselves and bring out the goodness and the greatness that was put there by the Almighty.

Thank you for everything you are doing, and thank you for coming here this morning.

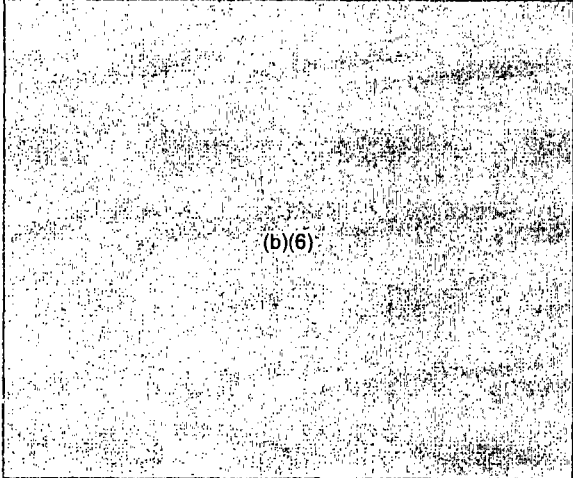
