I. PURPOSE

To continue a tradition that began in 1947, and to make brief remarks on the meaning of the Thanksgiving season.

II. BACKGROUND

President Harry S. Truman in 1947 began what has become an enduring Thanksgiving tradition at the White House when he accepted a live turkey from the National Turkey Federation (NTF).

Founded in 1937 in Mt. Morris, Illinois, NTF represents virtually all of the nation's turkey industry. It is the only trade association representing the turkey industry exclusively.

The turkey industry processes almost 300 million turkeys each year, totalling more than five billion pounds of ready-to-cook product, the retail value is about \$6 billion. North Carolina is the nation's largest turkey producing state, followed in order by Minnesota, Arkansas, California and Missouri. The industry employs more than 50,000 people. Americans consume 18.2 pounds of turkey per capita annually. Approximately 45 million turkeys will be consumed this Thanksgiving.

This turkey however, will not be eaten. Each year the turkey is retired to an area farm or petting zoo. This year, the turkey will be taken to Kidwell Farms' Frying Pan Park, a replica 1930s working farm in Chantilly, Virginia operated by the Fairfax County Park Authority.

This year's turkey was raised by nine-year-old Shawn Arbogast of Harrisburg, VA under the direction of this year's NTF chairman, Larry Fanella. Mr. Fanella is general manager of live operations for Rocco Turkeys of Dayton, VA. He will be accompanied by his wife, Susan, and his four daughters. Robert Strickler, owner of Rocco Turkeys, will also be present.

Also included in the presentation will be Stuart Proctor, President of the National Turkey Federation and his wife Cherie.

Attending this presentation will be the 5th grade students from Murch Elementary School in Washington, DC. Murch Elementary School is part of the District of Columbia Public Schools.

The NTF will also bring two fully dressed, ready to cook turkeys. These will not be part of the presentation, but will be delivered to the White House Kitchen following the event.

SUBJECT: Your Meeting with Ukrainian-American Leadership

Your meeting with Ukrainian-American leaders is an opportunity to reach out to a community that has been negative toward our Ukraine policy in the past, but is now beginning to reassess. Nick and I met with a smaller group of the leadership two weeks ago, and while there were complaints that we had not done enough on a number of individual matters, the assessment of our overall policy was very positive--for a change, we got an "A+".

The community is clearly very pleased that we were able to arrange a State Visit for President Kuchma. They also now seem willing to listen to us as we portray our efforts, bilateral and multilateral, on Ukraine's behalf. They were especially impressed and surprised by what we had done to seek balance of payments support and debt relief for Ukraine so that it could weather the early difficulties of the economic reform effort.

Ukrainian-American leaders remain sensitive, however, to an impression that our policy is "Russo-centric". Strobe Talbott's speech to the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace on November 18 will, we hope, have helped to set the tone on this issue for the Kuchma Summit. You will want, in addressing the issue for this audience, to use a persistent theme of our policy that Strobe employed in his speech: the fate of Ukrainian reform is profoundly linked to the fate of Russian reform; by supporting Russian reform, we also support Ukrainian independence.

The format of the meeting will be similar to the one we used in February, when you last met with this community. The meeting is scheduled from 4:00 to 5:00 pm in the Roosevelt Room. You will speak for 15 or 20 minutes and then take questions if you wish. Nick and I will be available for longer discussions if you must depart at that point. Alexis Herman will welcome the community on behalf of White House Public Liaison, which is participating with us in organizing the meeting.

Core Points

- President began his term with clear objectives for Ukraine policy:
 - Convince Ukraine (with Belarus and Kazakhstan) to become non-nuclear states as they had committed to do, thereby ensuring nuclear stability in world.
 - Help ensure Ukraine's survival through commitment to economic reforms and efforts to counter economic depression.
- President has led international efforts to accomplish these two objectives:
 - On nuclear issue, President's use of Nunn-Lugar funds and consistent diplomacy with Kravchuk and Kuchma led to last week's vote to accede to the Non-Proliferation Treaty.
 - President pushed hard to improve relations between Ukraine and Russia on this issue, resulting in Trilateral Statement that gives Ukraine fair compensation for nuclear warheads. At Budapest, we will provide Ukraine security assurances.
 - U.S. will continue to be involved in Ukraine's security, both in trilateral process and as we look to future of European security, expansion of NATO, and role of CSCE.
- On economic reform, President created and led international coalition of G-7 and IFIs to push Ukraine on reform--helped by President's \$4 billion Naples initiative.
 - Once Kuchma committed to reform in October, President allocated \$100 million in balance of payments support.
 - He also convinced Russia and Turkmenistan, Ukraine's two largest creditors, to reschedule Ukraine's energy debt.
 - President has asked his G-7 colleagues to contribute to balance of payments support. (Both EU and Japan have not yet committed and we are stepping up the heat on them to deliver.)
- President's personal and persistent diplomacy, backed by our financial resources and political influence in the region combined to make U.S. the key outside influence in helping Ukraine achieve these two goals.

-- Will now use summit to look to new goals in partnership with Ukraine. We are committed to Ukraine's future.

SUBJECT: Background for meeting with aviation interests

The aviation industry is generally united on (1) the desirability of extending airlines' exemption from the transportation fuels tax and (2) the need for the Administration to nominate quickly a strong, confirmable Assistant Secretary for International Aviation Policy. The industry has conflicting views on the Administration's performance in the arena of international aviation.

1. Fuel Tax. The '93 budget agreement granted airlines a two-year exemption from the 4.3 cents per gallon fuel tax increase that was imposed on all other transportation industries as a deficit reduction measure. Airlines argue that this exemption should be made permanent. While airlines' economic health has improved sharply, and some companies will make profits, the industry as a whole will lose money this year. The fuel tax would raise approximately \$400 million per year. Airlines argue that they would bear the entire burden of this tax. Although Treasury has not undertaken an analysis of the incidence of this tax, theory suggests that the burden of the tax is probably split between carriers and travellers. The Administration recognizes the economic importance of the airline industry, however, and is reviewing the fuel tax exemption as part of the 1996 budget process.

2. The Need for an Assistant Secretary for International Aviation. The Administration's nominee for Assistant Secretary of DOT for International Aviation Policy was not confirmed by the Senate. With the post now vacant for the past two years, the airline industry argues that the Administration should nominate early next year a strong, confirmable candidate for the AS position.

3. International Aviation. For many U.S. carriers the greatest potential for new growth lies with international, not domestic, markets. The current system of bilateral aviation treaties, however, strictly limits entry into most international markets. As a result, Administration actions in specific markets cannot always benefit the entire industry. Indeed, opportunities for additional service by new U.S. entrants is sometimes felt as a loss by the incumbent U.S. carriers. The carriers are likely to voice concerns about the Administration's recently-released "Statement on International Aviation Policy," and about various actions taken by DOT and State. The views of the individual airlines will vary with their different marketing strategies.

A. CODE-SHARING. "Code-sharing" involves listing in computer reservation systems the connecting flights of different airlines as if they were connecting flights of a single airline. The policy statement speaks with guarded optimism about code-sharing, although code-sharing continues to divide the industry (Northwest and United often support; American, and to a far lesser extent Delta, oppose). Among other things, American believes that code-sharing deceives consumers into thinking that an interline service is actually service by a single carrier, and thereby disadvantages US carriers that have no code-sharing partner. American also may argue that the Administration should not have embraced code-sharing before seeing the results of DOT's long-promised study of code-sharing's economic effects. The DOT study is due sometime this month. I believe that the study will demonstrate clearly that international code-sharing is *generally* beneficial to US carriers and consumers. The study will not, however, be the definitive economic analysis that American seeks.

American and Delta have specific complaints about Administration actions on code-sharing:

- Delta wants the Administration to approve its plan to code-share with Virgin Atlantic Airlines. DOT has voiced concern about the effect of the proposed Delta-VA code-sharing on the (currently-suspended) US-UK talks on liberalizing the existing bilateral.
- American opposes the recent DOT approval of Continental-Alitalia code-sharing. DOT argues that this code-share will benefit both US carriers and US consumers. American complains that the deal allows code-sharing without significant liberalization of the US-Italy market, something that American may regard as contradicting the Policy Statement.
- American and Delta oppose last year's agreement with Germany, which gave code-sharing rights to United-Lufthansa and to Delta, while temporarily restricting Delta's ability to grow in that market. 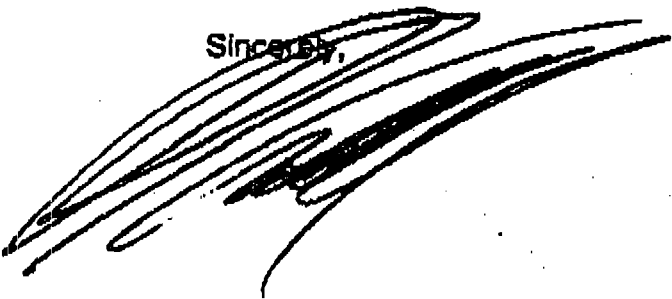
I understand you had some kind words to say about our partnership with the U.S. Customs Service at a recent Business Leadership Forum.

SUBJECT: Background for meeting with aviation interests

The aviation industry is generally united on (1) the desirability of extending airlines' exemption from the transportation fuels tax and (2) the need for the Administration to nominate quickly a strong, confirmable Assistant Secretary for International Aviation Policy. The industry has conflicting views on the Administration's performance in the arena of international aviation.

1. Fuel Tax. The '93 budget agreement granted airlines a two-year exemption from the 4.3 cents per gallon fuel tax increase that was imposed on all other transportation industries as a deficit reduction measure. Airlines argue that this exemption should be made permanent. While airlines' economic health has improved sharply, and some companies will make profits, the industry as a whole will lose money this year. The fuel tax would raise approximately \$400 million per year. Airlines argue that they would bear the entire burden of this tax. Although Treasury has not undertaken an analysis of the incidence of this tax, theory suggests that the burden of the tax is probably split between carriers and travellers. The Administration recognizes the economic importance of the airline industry, however, and is reviewing the fuel tax exemption as part of the 1996 budget process.

2. The Need for an Assistant Secretary for International Aviation. The Administration's nominee for Assistant Secretary of DOT for International Aviation Policy was not confirmed by the Senate. With the post now vacant for the past two years, the airline industry argues that the Administration should nominate early next year a strong, confirmable candidate for the AS position.

3. International Aviation. For many U.S. carriers the greatest potential for new growth lies with international, not domestic, markets. The current system of bilateral aviation treaties, however, strictly limits entry into most international markets. As a result, Administration actions in specific markets cannot always benefit the entire industry. Indeed, opportunities for additional service by new U.S. entrants is sometimes felt as a loss by the incumbent U.S. carriers. The carriers are likely to voice concerns about the Administration's recently-released "Statement on International Aviation Policy," and about various actions taken by DOT and State. The views of the individual airlines will vary with their different marketing strategies.

A. CODE-SHARING. "Code-sharing" involves listing in computer reservation systems the connecting flights of different airlines as if they were connecting flights of a single airline. The policy statement speaks with guarded optimism about code-sharing, although code-sharing continues to divide the industry (Northwest and United often support; American, and to a far lesser extent Delta, oppose). Among other things, American believes that code-sharing deceives consumers into thinking that an interline service is actually service by a single carrier, and thereby disadvantages US carriers that have no code-sharing partner. American also may argue that the Administration should not have embraced code-sharing before seeing the results of DOT's long-promised study of code-sharing's economic effects. The DOT study is due sometime this month. I believe that the study will demonstrate clearly that international code-sharing is *generally* beneficial to US carriers and consumers. The study will not, however, be the definitive economic analysis that American seeks.

American and Delta have specific complaints about Administration actions on code-sharing:

- Delta wants the Administration to approve its plan to code-share with Virgin Atlantic Airlines. DOT has voiced concern about the effect of the proposed Delta-VA code-sharing on the (currently-suspended) US-UK talks on liberalizing the existing bilateral.
- American opposes the recent DOT approval of Continental-Alitalia code-sharing. DOT argues that this code-share will benefit both US carriers and US consumers. American complains that the deal allows code-sharing without significant liberalization of the US-Italy market, something that American may regard as contradicting the Policy Statement.
- American and Delta oppose last year's agreement with Germany, which gave code-sharing rights to United-Lufthansa and to Delta, while temporarily restricting Delta's ability to grow in that market. Delta believes that the agreement sharply reduced the value of Delta's international routes. DOT and State, however, believe that the 1993 agreement will benefit U.S. carriers as a whole. Dear Mr. President:

Permit me to add my voice to those airline executives urging a prompt revival of serious negotiations on a new, more liberal air services agreement between the United States and the United Kingdom. At the same time, I ask you to reject the approach now advocated by some U.S. airlines as one that would impede, rather than expedite, the creation of new competitive opportunities for U.S. carriers in international markets crucial to the growth and future well-being of our industry.

The current U.S.-U.K. bilateral denies Delta the access it has long sought -- and needs -- to support its European operations and remain a strong transatlantic competitor. That competitive void led Delta to join with Virgin Atlantic Airways earlier this year in a proposed partnership that would open the door to more U.S. carrier access to Heathrow -- a central objective of U.S. policy for some time -- enhance competition, and expand consumer choices in transatlantic service.

The benefits of that partnership to U.S. aviation, commercial, and consumer interests should not be delayed or derailed by holding it hostage to the conclusion of a new bilateral. Yet, that is what others now propose -- some to protect their own privileged positions at Heathrow from new competition by Delta, and others in an effort to use the Delta/Virgin Atlantic agreement as leverage to attain their own narrow parochial commercial objectives.

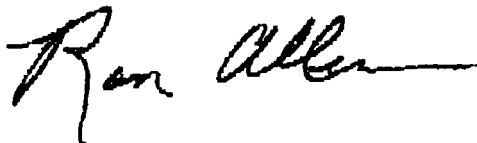

But until negotiations on a new bilateral succeed in striking a fair balance among all the competing commercial priorities and national interests at stake in this matter, approval of the

Delta/Virgin Atlantic partnership is one of the most effective ways our government can create an opening for further progress without jeopardizing the leverage we need to achieve our ultimate goal of "open skies".

Approval of the Delta/Virgin Atlantic application, at this time and on the same extra-bilateral basis used in the past to expand U.S. carrier service in other restrictive international markets, would underscore the desire of both of our governments to move towards serious liberalization. Rather than lower our sights, as others suggest we do, our government should seize the opportunity at hand to inject much-needed new competition into the U.S.-U.K. marketplace and use that as a catalyst for the conclusion of a bilateral that sets into place a solid framework for a fully liberalized U.S.-U.K. aviation relationship.

DRAFT TALKING POINTS REGARDING SECTOR SATURDAY/BRIEFING SATURDAY

The Summit of the Americas was always intended as an opportunity for the leaders of the Western Hemisphere to meet, discuss and enhance their ability to communicate with one another concerning opportunities and problems in the hemisphere. The focus of the Summit will be on hemispheric trade, enhancement of democracy and sustainable development.

Because the only official events in Miami will be for democratically elected leaders of the hemisphere, other individuals have not been encouraged to come to Miami to participate in events.

It is inevitable that groups interested in such matters will also wish to be present in Miami during such an historic event. The White House Summit staff in conjunction with the National Security Council, Commerce Department, Transportation Department and others as well as the Host Committee in Miami has been making extensive arrangements to reach out to such groups.

In an effort to enhance communication among such groups during the weekend, the White House has requested various members of the President's Cabinet to participate in four specific events on Saturday, December 10. These will include a breakfast at which guests will be briefed by Secretary Christopher, Secretary Bentsen and Secretary Brown. There will also be three luncheons that day each of which will be briefed by two Cabinet Secretaries: Secretary Brown and Secretary Pena; Secretary Reich and Chairman Tyson; and Administrator Browner and Ambassador Kantor.

The invitations to these events will be extended by the White House, in cooperation with the Cabinet Departments.

There will be numerous other opportunities for networking and social mingling at the Summit which are being arranged by the Host Committee.

As part of our advance planning, we plan to have an office at the Summit which will aid business people to understand the schedule and to help run these events.

Obviously, neither the White House or the Cabinet Departments can be involved in the details of housing or entertainment of individuals who wish to be present in Miami, who are not part of the official parties of our government and the government officials who are the President's guests.

It is our understanding that the Host Committee has some capabilities in this area.

The President and his Administration have made an unprecedented commitment to empowering women through greater economic security, more workplace flexibility, and more emphasis on children and families and on women's health and safety. The Administration has invested in the economic and personal security of women through the President's economic plan, the Family and Medical Leave Law, the Earned Income Tax Credit, the Brady Law, and the Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act. They have advanced women's rights through a series of executive and legislative actions that allow women the freedom to make their own reproductive decisions and to do so safely, with accurate information and without obstruction. They have put women's health concerns at the top of the medical research agenda by dramatically increasing the government's commitment to research cures for breast cancer, ovarian cancer, and osteoporosis. Finally, the Administration has changed the face of governing by giving women a greater voice in all branches of the federal government, including Cabinet-level posts never before held by women.

What does all this really mean for women?

1. It means that two million women are working in jobs created since President Clinton took office.
2. It means that millions more single working mothers will get a tax break to help their earnings go farther.
3. It means that a medical research team with promising breakthroughs in breast cancer detection and treatment will get the funding they need.
4. It means that for the first time, mothers, regardless of family income, will be able to get their children the vaccines they need.
5. It means that a woman who wants to take time off from work to care for an ailing parent or child can do so...and know her job will be there when she gets back.
6. It means that mothers of almost 800,000 children will now get help through HeadStart, and more than 5 million children will now get nutritional assistance through the WIC program.
7. It means that young women studying science and engineering will have new career opportunities denied them in the past.
8. It means that women unsure of how to deal with an unintended pregnancy will be able to get professional advice and counsel and will know that the option of abortion is safe and legal. It also means that couples looking to adopt will soon be able to do so with less difficulty and red tape.
9. It means that women will be able to register to vote at the motor vehicle registry, through the mail, at social service offices and elsewhere -- to make it as easy as possible to exercise their right to shape our political future.
10. It means that the history books young girls read will now include leadership figures like Janet Reno, Alice Rivlin, Donna Shalala, Madeleine Albright, Ruth Bader Ginsberg, and Hillary Rodham Clinton.

THE RIGHTS OF WOMEN

A prominent feature of the presidencies of Presidents Reagan and Bush was their attack on reproductive choice, both at home and around the world. At the same time, these Republican administrations opposed attempts to improve access to the democratic process for millions of Americans, including the close to one-third of American women who are not registered to vote.

Reproductive Health – The President continues to protect the right of American women to make their own reproductive choices. He repealed the "Gag Rule" that restricted abortion counseling at federally funded family planning clinics; revoked the import ban on RU-486; reversed the ban on abortion services at military hospitals; repealed the Mexico City policy that banned funding to international organizations that promoted comprehensive family planning; strengthened support for international family planning and reproductive health initiatives; and signed the Freedom of Access to Clinic Entrances Act to ensure that women and their doctors can enter clinics without fearing intimidation and violence. The Department of Health and Human Services implemented a change to the Hyde Amendment obligating states to pay for abortions for poor women whose pregnancies result from rape or incest, or endanger the life of the mother.

Empowerment of Women – The United States delegation to the International Conference on Population and Development in Cairo, led by Vice President Gore, successfully advocated a global approach to improving the status of women and stabilizing the world's population. The United States forged a partnership with more than 150 nations around a program of action that promotes gender equality, reproductive health, and universally recognized human rights that apply to reproduction and recognizes the importance of addressing the threat posed to women's health by unsafe abortions. The conference emphasized the necessity not only of increased access to contraceptives, but also of sustainable economic development, a reduction in child and maternal mortality, and the empowerment of women through increased educational and economic opportunities.

Motor Voter – President Clinton signed the National Voter Registration Act, which makes it easier and more flexible for citizens to register to vote. This will enfranchise women -- who comprise 52% of the population -- by making it easier for women who are on welfare, homebound, or simply unable to build in extra time between work and family, to register to vote through the mail, at motor vehicle registries, unemployment offices, vocational rehabilitation agencies, and welfare offices. These programs will give an additional 65 million Americans, including tens of millions of women who have been left out of the democratic process, a way to make their voices heard.

Women in the Military – "You're too old, you can't see, and you're a woman." That's what Hillary Rodham Clinton was told in 1975 by a Marine Corps recruiter when she inquired into joining the Corps. Today, opportunities for women in the military have been expanded dramatically. Under the Clinton Administration, combat aircraft and surface warships have been opened to women and the criteria used to bar women from ground combat positions has been redefined, giving women access to 259,000 previously male-only positions. In the past few months, the U.S.S. Eisenhower became the Navy's first permanently coed combat ship and the Army approved a plan to include women soldiers in the prestigious Old Guard,

responsible for guarding the Tomb of the Unknowns and for greeting visiting heads of state.

WOMEN APPOINTEES

President Clinton pledged to appoint an Administration that "looked like America." As the *Baltimore Sun* noted in an editorial, he has delivered on that promise "more fully than even he could have predicted. No Administration has ever produced such diversity."

Overall Administration Appointments -- 46 percent of President Clinton's appointees have been women -- by far the highest percentage of any Administration in history. Women hold 30 percent of top-level appointments, with African-American women accounting for 5 percent of them.

In addition to the sheer numbers of women appointed by President Clinton, there have been a number of women appointed to Cabinet-level posts never before occupied by women, including Attorney General Janet Reno, Council of Economic Advisors Chair Laura D'Andrea Tyson, and OMB Director-designate Alice Rivlin.

Women populate the ranks of the sub-cabinet as well. At the Department of Justice, for example, the Deputy Attorney General and 7 of the 11 Assistant Attorneys General are women.

Judicial Selection Record -- Of the Clinton Administration's 143 nominations to the federal bench, 44 are women. 58% of all the judicial nominees are women and minorities. At this point in previous administrations, the number of women who had been nominated was dramatically lower: President Bush had nominated 8 women, President Reagan had nominated 4, and President Carter had nominated 6. Before President Clinton took office, one of every five active federal judges was a woman or a racial minority; as of July 1 of this year, the number had increased to one of four.

The Alliance for Justice reported that federal judicial appointments in 1993 demonstrated "unparalleled diversity." And the quality and professionalism of these nominees prove that excellence and diversity are not mutually exclusive goals. The proportion of the Clinton Administration's judicial nominees who received the American Bar Association's highest rating exceeded that of the past three administrations

JOB SECURITY AND ECONOMIC OPPORTUNITY

When President Clinton took office, the country faced major economic challenges, including rising federal deficits, a jobless recovery, and a legacy of more than a decade of underinvestment. Female heads of households, an ever-increasing portion of the labor force, were particularly hard hit by worsening economic conditions and decreasing workplace-based benefits. Entrepreneurial women were hindered by the weak economy and by other barriers to their success.

Economic Growth and Job Creation – The President's economic plan is putting our economic house back in order. Over 4.6 million jobs have been created in the first 20 months of this Administration. The President's plan is reducing the deficit at a rate of nearly \$700 billion over 5 years. Women have contributed nearly half (49%) of the net job creation since January 1993 -- over 2 million new jobs. 88% of these new jobs have been in the private sector. In the economic recovery as a whole, the employment growth of women has outpaced that of men.

EITC – The Earned Income Tax Credit, dramatically increased as part of the President's economic plan, will make work pay for over 15 million families and households making up to \$27,000. A majority of the beneficiaries of this tax credit are female workers and their families. For working mothers with minimum wage jobs, the increased EITC is the equivalent of up to a 40% pay raise.

Working Women – The Women's Bureau of the Department of Labor surveyed over a quarter of a million working women to learn more about their experiences in the workplace. The Department of Labor is now developing initiatives to encourage the private sector to respond to the needs identified by the survey participants -- an increase in pay and benefits, assistance in balancing work and family, more job training opportunities, and an end to discrimination. President Clinton has directed the heads of the executive branch agencies to expand opportunities for flexible family-friendly work arrangements within each agency, including job sharing, career part-time employment, alternative work schedules, telecommuting, and satellite work locations.

Greater Technical Assistance to Women-Owned Businesses – Along with its plan to revitalize the economy as a whole, the Clinton Administration has encouraged the formation and development of women-owned businesses. The SBA is creating a women's mentoring program at sites around the country, where women business owners join together to share information and network. They have created resource guides that include information about technical assistance and loan resources in every state.

Access to Capital for Women-Owned Businesses – The Small Business Administration (SBA) has taken several steps to increase the capital available to women-owned firms. The SBA has established goals for dramatically expanding lending to women-owned businesses, increasing the number of loans to women from 3,880 in 1993 to 7,211 in 1994. These efforts complement SBA's innovative "prequalification pilot program," under which SBA certifies that a woman business owner is eligible for a federally guaranteed loan *before* she selects a lender--increasing lending to women-owned businesses and reducing the paperwork involved in such borrowing. The SBA's new "LowDoc" loan program allows prospective borrowers to get loans without paperwork hassles or long waits for approval, relying on their character and

credit history. Early results indicate that women are getting over 30 percent of these loans.

Expanding Procurement Opportunities for Women-Owned Businesses - The Administration has worked closely with congressional leaders to ensure that a goal for procurement contracts with women-owned business was included in the recent procurement-reform bill. This goal represents a several-fold increase in contracting opportunities for women-owned businesses. The SBA has established a pilot project to bring together business groups and select government agencies to increase contracting with women-owned firms.

FIGHTING CRIME, INCREASING SAFETY AND SECURITY

Perhaps no issue grips American women more than the fear of crime and gun violence. In a typical year, 2.5 million American women 12 years old and older are raped, robbed or assaulted, or are the victim of a threatened or attempted violent crime. Two-thirds of these attacks are committed by someone the victim knows.

Safer Streets – Thanks to President Clinton's leadership, the Brady Law and The Violent Crime Control and Law Enforcement Act of 1994, the products of more than six years of bipartisan efforts to take back our streets and increase the safety and security of American women and their families, are finally the law of the land. In addition to imposing a waiting period for handgun purchases, adding 100,000 more police to our streets, stiffening penalties for criminals, and banning military-style assault weapons, the crime bill invests heavily in increasing the personal security of women.

Violence Against Women Grants – Nearly \$1 billion dollars will be invested to support police and prosecutor efforts, as well as victims services, in cases involving sexual violence or domestic abuse, and for programs that strengthen enforcement.

Domestic Violence – The crime bill also triples funding for battered women's shelters, to a total of \$325 million. Spouse abusers who cross state lines to continue their abuse will face federal penalties, and each state will be required to enforce "stay-away" orders issued by another state.

Registration of Sexually Violent Offenders – It requires prison officials to notify state agencies when sexually violent predators are released from prison, and it requires states to register these individuals for the ten years following their release.

Repeat Sex Offenders – The crime bill doubles the maximum term of imprisonment for repeat sex offenders convicted of Federal sex crimes.

Victims of Crime – It allows victims of Federal violent and sex crimes to speak at the sentencing of their assailants. It strengthens requirements for sex offenders and child molesters to pay restitution to their victims, and improves other victim-assistance programs.

Civil Rights Protections – For the first time, victims of felonies motivated by gender bias have the option of filing civil rights actions to obtain redress for such crimes.

Rape Shield – The crime bill extends rape shield law protections beyond sexual assault cases to civil cases and to all criminal cases, barring embarrassing and irrelevant inquiries into victims' sexual histories at trial.

HEALTH CARE

Women are society's caregivers, responsible not only for their own health but also for the health of their children, spouses and parents. Despite being the biggest consumers of health care services, women have a harder time getting health coverage than men. And those lucky enough to have insurance at all pay more; women ages 15 to 44 pay 68 percent more out-of-pocket for health care than their male counterparts.

At the same time, women are increasingly at risk for some of our most deadly diseases. For example, the incidence of AIDS is increasing at a faster rate among women than men. The lifetime risk of developing breast cancer has risen from 1 in 20 women twenty years ago to 1 in every 8 today. The Clinton Administration has launched or supported a variety of programs to improve women's health and to solve the nation's health care crisis.

Increased Funding for Breast Cancer Research – Since President Clinton took office, federal funding for breast cancer research at the National Institutes of Health has increased 64% -- to \$375 million in fiscal year 1995 alone. The Department of Defense distributed an additional \$240 million, allocated in fiscal years 1993 and 1994, to fund more than 440 research and training grants; the fiscal year 1995 budget includes another \$150 million to be awarded by the Department of Defense. The Clinton Administration initiated the creation of National Action Plan on Breast Cancer, a blueprint for a partnership among scientists, policymakers, activists, and the private sector, to work to prevent, diagnose, treat and ultimately to eradicate breast cancer.

The Health Security Act – President Clinton introduced his Health Security Act to guarantee affordable, secure health insurance to every American. The legislation covered a range of benefits that are essential for women -- preventive measures including mammograms and Pap smears, reproductive services, prescription drugs and prenatal care -- and invested in a new federal long-term care program. The President will continue to fight for this national priority, and the First Lady will continue to be a strong advocate and spokesperson for the need for health care reform.

Women's Health Initiative – This initiative, the largest clinical research study ever conducted on either men or women, is an exploration of the major causes of death, disability and frailty in post-menopausal women: heart disease, breast and colon cancer, and osteoporosis. An emphasis on including minority women at each clinical site is a major component of the study.

Increased Commitment to Combatting AIDS – The President created the National Task Force on AIDS Drug Development, charged with expediting the search for new treatments for AIDS and HIV; increased funding for the Ryan White CARE Act for outpatient AIDS care; increased the National Institutes of Health's spending for AIDS research; and increased funding for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The National Institutes of Health has conducted research studies demonstrating the effectiveness of AZT treatment in reducing dramatically the transmission of HIV infection from pregnant mothers to newborns, has increased significantly the number of women participating in AIDS clinical trials and the number of epidemiological studies of HIV in women, and has begun exploring woman-controlled barrier methods for preventing transmission of HIV.

TAKING CARE OF OUR CHILDREN AND FAMILIES

Despite widespread support in Congress, the Family and Medical Leave Act was not enacted during the Reagan or Bush Administrations. Presidents Reagan and Bush talked about "family values," but it is the Clinton Administration that has taken action to help preserve families and encourage the values that keep them strong.

Family and Medical Leave – Under the Clinton Administration, American workers are no longer forced to choose between their job and their family at times of crisis. The Family and Medical Leave Act allows workers to take up to 12 weeks of unpaid leave to care for an infant or a loved one without losing their job.

Family Preservation Act – The President's economic plan included a billion-dollar program that supports at-risk families in the areas of literacy, childhood education, child abuse prevention and other support services to help strengthen families and intervene before they break down.

Child Support Enforcement – The President introduced the Work and Responsibility Act, which includes the toughest child support enforcement laws ever proposed and would double federal child support collections by the year 2000. Individuals shirking their child support payment responsibilities could have their wages garnisheed, their drivers license revoked, and be tracked down across state lines.

Encouraging Work Over Welfare Dependency – The Work and Responsibility Act includes a national campaign against teen pregnancy and measures that would empower young mothers through child care, education, training, job placement services, and the employment opportunities they need to get off welfare. In addition, the proposal increases funding for programs that provide child care for the families of the working poor. By the year 2000, one million people who would otherwise be on welfare will be part of our nation's workforce.

Immunization Plan – President Clinton acted upon the importance of disease prevention for our nation's children by sponsoring and signing the comprehensive Child Immunization Plan, insuring that children, regardless of family income, will be vaccinated against disease.

WIC– The Women , Infants and Children Program (WIC) was put on a full-funding path so that by the end of 1996, all eligible children between the ages of one and four will be served. That means that an additional two million children will have access to the WIC program, a nutrition program that serves pregnant and post-partum women and their children.

HeadStart – The President's dramatic increase of HeadStart funding will allow almost 800,000 children to participate in this preschool education program next year, up from 621,000 in 1992.

End Adoption Discrimination and Delays – Legislation passed as part of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act Reauthorization prevents discrimination against interracial adoptions and reduces the time children have to wait in foster care.

EDUCATION

The percentage of American women 25 and over who have at least a high school education increased substantially between 1970 and 1990, particularly among black women. However, although equal access to education has always been a foundation of women's struggle for equality, access alone is not enough. As studies by the American Association of University Women, the Department of Education and others have shown, as we educate girls and women, we must examine what subjects they learn and how they learn them, and how they are treated in the classroom by their teachers and peers. The Clinton Administration's education initiatives increase women's involvement in education and will improve their academic success and professional opportunities.

Women's Educational Equity Act – Demonstrating the commitment of the Clinton Administration to equality in education, funding for the WEEA increased 100% from fiscal year 1994 to fiscal year 1995. The WEEA provides educational materials and helps train teachers to be more sensitive to gender equity in the classroom and to ensure equal access to quality education programs for all women and girls. It also includes special efforts aimed at women and girls who suffer from multiple forms of discrimination, including race, ethnic origin and disability discrimination.

Goals 2000 – The Goals 2000: Educate America Act sets national education goals and gives resources to states and communities to implement comprehensive education reforms. Because women continue to fall behind in math and science -- and as a result lack access to high-paying, high-skill jobs -- one of the national education goals seeks to increase the number of women and minorities who complete degrees in math, science and engineering.

Student Loan Reform – The Federal Direct Student Loan Program increases access to higher education by giving millions of students the opportunity to take advantage of lower-cost loans and better repayment terms. The Income Contingent Loan Repayment program will allow women who have received a student loan to leave their jobs -- for example, to raise a family -- without the penalty of loan default.

AmeriCorps – One of the most important accomplishments of the Clinton Administration, this program will inspire our young citizens and provide them with opportunities to serve their communities. National Service also helps students further their education; those who want to contribute to their communities through public service in AmeriCorps can receive college tuition assistance.

The School-to-Work Opportunities Act – This legislation invests in training and education programs to prepare students for further education and for high-skill, high-wage jobs. Through work-based and school-based experiences, women and girls are exposed to a variety of occupations traditionally dominated by men.

Increasing Parental Involvement – Strong Families, Strong Schools is a national initiative that encourages and supports efforts by families to take a more active role in their children's learning and that encourages businesses to allow employees to participate more fully in their children's schooling.

SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY

For too long, many girls interested in a career in science abandoned this goal while still in school, hampered by the biases against girls that persist in our nation's classrooms and discouraged by the dearth of female role models. For too long, those women who did become scientists were confronted by an impenetrable "old boys network" in the scientific community. And for too long, an promising area of medical research was blocked despite its potential for helping and healing millions of Americans afflicted with heretofore intractable diseases.

National Science and Technology Policy - The Clinton Administration has appointed female scientists to top-level government research positions and has created a national science and technology policy that will encourage women and underrepresented minorities to pursue careers in the sciences and promote gender equity within the profession.

Removal of the Fetal Tissue Research Ban - On his first day in office, President Clinton ended a five-year moratorium on federal funding of human fetal tissue transplantation research. This research has important therapeutic implications for diseases such as Alzheimer's and Parkinsons.

Breast Cancer Detection Technology - The Public Health Service's Office on Women's Health (OWH) and the National Cancer Institute (NCI) have initiated an exploration into applying imaging technology used by the defense, space, and computer graphics industries to the early detection of breast cancer. OWH and NCI will facilitate collaborations among those involved in imaging technology in government, academia and industry to further the development of this potentially life-saving application.

BREAST CANCER

Breast cancer is the most commonly diagnosed cancer and the second leading cause of cancer deaths among American women. The lifetime risk of developing breast cancer today is one in every eight women, up from one in every 20 women just two decades ago. Despite these numbers, nearly half of women age 50 and older have not had a mammogram in the past two years.

In December 1993, Secretary Donna E. Shalala convened an historic conference to establish a National Action Plan on Breast Cancer, affirming the Administration's commitment to addressing breast cancer as a high priority concern. The conference was attended by 150 representatives from advocacy groups, private industry, academia, and government. Proceedings from this conference will provide a framework for action in three major areas: the delivery of health care, the conduct of research, and the enactment of policy. To further the implementation of the National Action Plan, three coordinating groups are continuing to work on a range of activities and strategies.

The Role of the Department of Health and Human Services

- ① **Comprehensive Clinical Guidelines.** New guidelines on breast cancer were released on October 19, 1994, clearly outlining the responsibilities of women and their doctors in treating the disease. These guidelines were developed by a panel of private sector experts and were distributed nationwide.
- ② **The Mammography Quality Standards Act.** Effective October 1, 1994, this Act (implemented by FDA) requires uniform safety certification for the roughly 12,000 mammography facilities nationwide. As we promote mammographies for women at risk, this rigorous law requires facilities to hire capable technicians, use quality film, and employ skilled radiologists to interpret the results.
- ③ **The National Breast and Cervical Cancer Early Detection Program.** This program received \$68.7 million in federal grants during 1994. The goal of the program is to reduce breast cancer deaths by 30 percent and cervical cancer deaths by more than 90 percent through increased mammographies and Pap testing. In particular, this program is designed to reach women of racial and ethnic minorities where mortality rates are disproportionately high.

- o **Increased Funding for Research.** A total of \$375 million was appropriated in FY 1995, more funds than under any previous administration, to further understanding of the complexities of breast cancer. Achievements funded and accomplished by this Administration include:
 - o Isolation of BRCA1, a gene believed linked to breast cancer in the 1 of 200 women who have the gene. This discovery should lead to the development of a test, identifying those women at risk for the inherited form of the cancer.
 - o A study sponsored by the National Cancer Institute that found women who exercise four hours a week can cut their risk of breast cancer by 50 to 60 percent.
- o **Imaging Technology.** The Department is working with other federal agencies, including NASA and the Defense Department, as well as private companies, to adapt high-tech imaging and diagnostic equipment to the task of locating malignant cancer in its earliest stages.

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VIOLENCE AGAINST WOMEN AND CHILDREN

Violence against women is an urgent public health problem with devastating consequences for women, children and families. Women are more likely to be physically or sexually assaulted by someone they know than by a stranger on the street.

- o A 1994 Justice Department study found that two-thirds of rapes, robberies and assaults on females age 12 or older were committed by relatives or acquaintances. Estimates of assaults on women by partners or cohabitants range from 1.8 million to almost 4 million per year.

From 1981 to 1992, child abuse and neglect reports more than doubled, to two million reports affecting almost three million children. Tragically, 70 percent of those committing the abuse or neglect were parents. HHS Secretary Donna E. Shalala has called violence in the home "domestic terrorism."

The Role of the Department of Health and Human Services

- o **The Violence Against Women Act.** Segments of this \$1.4 billion portion of the Crime Bill strengthen ongoing efforts at HHS to help prevent violence and crime. The Act provides resources over six years to prevent domestic violence, expand education and outreach on rape and sexual assaults, and help victims fleeing violent homes by expanding funds for shelters. In 1995, HHS will award a grant to a non-profit organization to establish a national, 24-hour toll-free abuse hotline.
- o **Education and Prevention Grants to Reduce Sexual Assaults Against Women.** State grants will be available to rape crisis centers or similar non-governmental, non-profit agencies for rape prevention and education programs. At least 25 percent of funds will target middle school to high school-age students. HHS authorization from FY 1996 to FY 2000: \$205 million.
- o **Education and Prevention Grants to Reduce Sexual Abuse of Runaway, Homeless, and Street Youth.** Grants will be awarded for street-based outreach, education, and referral for runaway, homeless, and street youth who have experienced sexual abuse or are at risk. HHS authorization from FY 1996 to FY 1998: \$30 million.

- o **National Domestic Violence Hotline Grants.** A grant for up to five years will be awarded to a private non-profit organization to create and operate a 24-hour, toll-free national hotline for information and referrals to victims of domestic violence. Counseling and referral services will be provided 24 hours a day. HHS authorization from FY 1995 to FY 2000: \$3 million.
- o **Grants for Battered Women's Shelters.** The Crime Bill amends the Family Violence Prevention and Services Act to expand services and shelter to women and children fleeing family violence. HHS authorization from FY 1996 to FY 2000: \$325 million.
- o **Youth Education and Domestic Violence.** HHS and the U.S. Department of Education will select, implement, and evaluate four model programs for the education of young people about domestic violence and violence among intimate partners. The programs will address four different audiences (primary schools, middle schools, secondary schools, and institutions of higher education). HHS authorization for FY 1996: \$400,000.
- o **Research and Public Awareness.** In FY 1995, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention received \$10 million to develop programs that will improve data collection on the incidence of violence against women, and to develop strategies to reduce and prevent violence by effective intervention, education, training, and public awareness activities. Other agencies of the Public Health Service, including the National Institute of Mental Health, support research and service programs designed to prevent family violence.
- o **The Family Preservation and Support Program.** The Clinton Administration's \$1 billion program helps states and communities reduce abuse and neglect by serving families at risk or in crisis.
- o **The National Center on Child Abuse and Neglect.** NCCAN has nearly \$79 million in funds in 1995 to assist states and communities in developing family resource programs and child abuse and neglect prevention activities, improve child protective services, and improve legal responses to child abuse and neglect.
- o **Head Start programs operating in communities beset by violence now provide instruction on conflict resolution to help youngsters peacefully resolve troubling situations.**

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REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH

Through a series of executive and legislative proposals, the Clinton Administration has helped ensure that women can make their own reproductive health decisions safely, with accurate information and without interference. The Administration continues to emphasize the need for comprehensive family planning services, including education to ensure patient understanding of the consequences of unprotected sexual activity and adequate provision of access to family planning and reproductive health services.

The Role of the Department of Health and Human Services

- o **Improved Information and Access.** On his second day in office, President Clinton repealed the "Gag Rule" that restricted abortion counseling at federally funded family planning clinics. Pregnant women can now receive full information about their options at these clinics.
- o **Equity and Choice.** In the FY 1994 HHS appropriations bill, the Administration made crucial changes to the so-called Hyde Amendment. These changes, renewed this year, obligate states to pay for abortions for poor women whose pregnancies result from rape or incest, or endanger the life of the mother.
- o **Family Planning.** In May 1993, the Food and Drug Administration approved the first barrier contraceptive for women that also offers limited protection against sexually transmitted diseases. Research continues on other woman-controlled barrier methods for preventing transmission of the HIV virus and other sexually transmitted diseases.
- o **RU-486.** In keeping with a 1993 Presidential Memorandum, HHS has pursued the testing of RU-486 within the United States. In May 1994, Secretary Donna E. Shalala announced that the French pharmaceutical company Roussel Uclaf would donate its United States patent rights for the drug to the Population Council, a not-for-profit organization. Clinical trials are underway within a number of communities throughout the country.
- o **Improved Research.** The Administration has ended a five-year moratorium on federal funding of human fetal tissue transplantation research. Through this research, scientists hope to learn more about the reasons behind miscarriages and birth defects.

- o **Population and Development.** As one of the leaders at the Cairo International Conference on Population and Development, the U.S. helped ensure the adoption of a comprehensive program emphasizing: commitment to voluntary family planning as a crucial part of reproductive health care; commitment to gender equity through improved education and development; and achievement of these goals in the context of equitable sustainable development.

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OLDER WOMEN

The Department of Health and Human Services, through a range of comprehensive programs and services, is working to improve the quality of life for America's older women. Women comprise 60 percent of today's population aged 65 and over. By the year 2000, it is expected that there will be five women for every two men over the age of 75. Compared to men, elderly women are three times more likely to be widowed or living alone, spending more years and a larger percentage of their lifetimes disabled, and residing in a nursing home. Elderly women are also two times more likely than men to be living in poverty. Recognizing the evolving roles and concerns of women, the Department has devoted new resources to meeting the needs of women throughout their lifespans.

The Role of the Department of Health and Human Services

- o **The Initiative on Older Women.** This multi-million dollar initiative, launched in September 1994 by the Administration on Aging, will increase government partnerships designed to address the needs of older women; improve women's capacity to contribute significantly to society throughout their lives; and establish an Older Women's Policy and Resource Center to educate older women at the grassroots level about issues such as income security, health, housing, domestic violence, and caregiving and the importance of addressing these concerns.
- o **The White House Conference on Aging.** The 1995 White House Conference on Aging will address long-term care, nutrition, and other issues related to the health of America's older women.
- o **Research on Women's Health and Aging.** The Administration's Fiscal Year 1995 budget request included \$1.8 billion for women's health. \$375 million was appropriated for research on breast cancer and additional funds will go to osteoporosis research, a disease for which older women are particularly at risk. Grants totalling \$1.5 million will also fund research on conditions contributing to the loss of independence among older adults; menopause and health in aging women; and elderly population redistribution across the United States.
- o **The National Institutes of Health (NIH) Women's Health Initiative.** This initiative, the largest clinical research study ever conducted, will examine the major causes of death and disability in post-menopausal women: heart disease, breast and colon cancer, and osteoporosis.

- o **Medicare.** At age 65, almost all U.S. women become eligible for the Medicare program, and six out of ten current Medicare beneficiaries are women. The department is also working with consumer and provider organizations to distribute information on Medicare's free annual flu shots and lifetime pneumonia vaccinations to help prevent these life-threatening diseases.
- o **Elder Abuse Prevention.** The Administration on Aging and the Administration on Children and Families are funding a three-year study of the national incidence of elder abuse. In FY 1994, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention also devoted \$9.1 million to improve data collection on violence against women, identify effective prevention strategies, and explore new ways to increase public awareness. \$10.3 million will be dedicated to similar efforts in FY 1995.
- o **Elder Nutrition.** Recognizing that eighty-five percent of older individuals have a nutrition-related condition or chronic disease, the Administration on Aging is also continuing to support community nutrition services. In 1993, the Department began a two-year, \$2.4 million study to evaluate the federal meals program. Last year, nutrition assistance funds totalled \$469 million, and helped provide about 250 million meals for older persons.
- o **Mammography Quality Standards Act.** Annually, breast cancer affects 87,500 women over the age of 65, accounting for 48 percent of all diagnosed breast cancers each year. Through implementation of the 1992 Mammography Quality Standards Act, the Food and Drug Administration will ensure high-quality and reliable mammography for all women.

WOMEN AND HIV/AIDS

The rapid growth of HIV/AIDS among women is a major public health problem. In 1992, the total number of reported AIDS cases among women was 6,295. In 1993, that figure jumped to 16,824, and since women represent the fastest growing population with the disease, the number infected may be much higher. As a result of perinatal transmissions, AIDS is the leading cause of death among Hispanic children and the second leading cause of death among African American children. Recent research findings have shown that the human immunodeficiency virus (HIV) is more easily spread from men to women than from women to men.

The Department of Health and Human Services under the Clinton Administration has marshalled its resources to respond to these troubling trends, protecting American women and their children.

The Role of the Department of Health and Human Services

- o **The National Institutes of Health (NIH)** have adopted a policy requiring the inclusion of women and minority populations in all AIDS clinical trials involving human subjects.
- o **NIH-sponsored clinical trials** provided strong evidence that use of AZT by HIV-positive pregnant women dramatically reduced the rate of HIV transmission from mother to infant.
- o **The Food and Drug Administration** expeditiously approved changes in labelling indications for AZT to include treatment of HIV-infected pregnant women.
- o **The Public Health Service** published "Recommendations on the Use of Zidovudine to Reduce Perinatal Transmission of HIV" to assist women and their doctors in making decisions about the use of AZT to prevent transmission of HIV.
- o The NIH created a **Women's Interagency HIV Study** to identify the nature and rate of HIV disease progression in women.
- o The NIH has initiated a major research effort to develop **female-controlled barrier methods** to prevent HIV transmission.

- o Funding for the **Ryan White CARE Act**, which provides services to people with HIV/AIDS, has risen 81.9 percent since 1993, providing funding for new services to women and children.
- o The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) launched a national **AIDS Prevention Marketing Initiative** aimed at young adults (ages 18-25), featuring frank, culturally-sensitive public service announcements promoting both abstinence and consistent and correct use of latex condoms.
- o **AIDS Hotlines.** The CDC have established two AIDS hotlines, providing general information and treatment referrals to health care professionals and the general public.

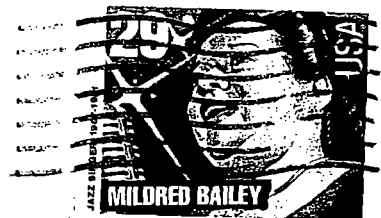

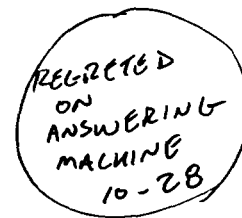
