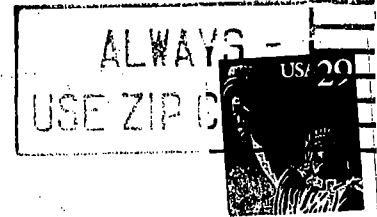
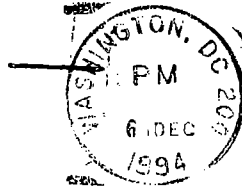

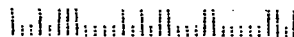

INTERAGENCY NON-PROFIT LIAISON NETWORK MEETING

November 30, 1994

Doris welcomed everyone and spoke about some of the points that she felt were important. Turned the time over to Jonathan Silver. She suggested that they wait for introductions until Alexis returned.

Points of significance:

A. IMPORTANCE OF CONSTANT COMMUNICATION

1. We need to share with each other what we are doing.
2. Share information about resources and groups especially because some of the resources are the same.
3. Share our strategies, i.e. what we are doing with our resources.
4. Understand our limitations, i.e. tax breaks.
5. Form subgroups and task forces.
6. New ideas, do not always do things the same way.

B. ISSUES IMPORTANT TO NON-PROFIT ORGANIZATIONS

1. Non-profits will have a much more viable role since the elections.
2. Communication Strategy
3. Health Care was a first tier project but might be second tier now.

Alexis entered. Doris explained to her what they had been speaking about.

Alexis welcomed the group and gave a brief introduction with the following points:

1. There will be a clarification of their individual roles, and importance of those roles. Roles will not be as loosely structured.
2. Non-profit is not second tier.
3. We need to let public know about the accomplishments of non-profit.
4. Need to strengthen communication efforts with non-profits.

- * Mrs. Clinton has always felt non-profits were important.
- * First two years administration focused on legislation.
- * Now we need to focus on letting people know what those accomplishments were.
- * **NON-PROFIT COMMUNITY VERY IMPORTANT**

EACH PERSON INTRODUCED THEMSELF AND SPOKE ABOUT THEIR PAST INVOLVEMENT.

Alexis spoke of two main points:

- I. Role of non-profit as it relates to policy issues is important.
 - A. Healthcare
 - B. Welfare Reform
- II. New Emphasis on Executive Level
First two years President Clinton accomplished 80-85% of his legislative agenda. Now we need to show how we support that legislation. People feel we are not moving fast enough. We really need to show our accountability.

Jonathan Silver outlined three main points that were important to him.

1. Closure on issue of institutional coordinator for non-profits.
2. Outreach and problem solving.
3. What can be unique and what can be applicative.

Alexis in reply said:

OPL WILL BE INSTITUTIONAL COORDINATOR FOR NON-PROFIT.

FORMATION OF TWO TASK FORCES

- I. CORE ISSUES TASK FORCE
 - a. develop energizing and concise issue
 - b. emphasize 2 or 3 issues with a non-profit focus
- II. COMMUNICATION TASK FORCE

 - c. key relationships -IDENTIFY KEY OPINION MAKERS AND LEADERS
 1. more active partnership with young Americans.
 - d. Grants- who are we funding

MEET ONCE A MONTH. MORE FREQUENTLY IN TEAM GROUPS.
IRS ISSUE FOR A SEPARATE MEETING. POSSIBLE IRS NON-PROFIT LIAISON.

OTHERS IN THE MEETING EMPHASIZED THE IMPORTANCE OF SERVING THE PEOPLE, SERVING AS ADVOCATES FOR VARIOUS GROUPS. "BEING ON THE SIDE OF WORKING FAMILIES," SAID ALEXIS.

The Battle of the Bulge

Between December 16, 1944 and the end of January 1945, a six week battle fought in the forested hills and towns of the Belgian Ardennes and in Luxembourg proved to be the last big battle in Western Europe during World War II.

Begun as a desperate Nazi offensive to reoccupy Belgium in order to recapture Liège and the harbor of Antwerp, the Ardennes campaign was called the Battle of the Bulge because of the way it bent back the American line.

The Americans fought heroically in the frigid cold, on frozen earth, grimly but gallantly holding on to vital positions in Bastogne, Malmédy and St. Vith. They were successful but at great cost: there were 76,890 casualties in this final stand against an enemy who for five years had occupied Belgian soil.

The Symphonic Band of the Belgian Guides' Regiment

Created in 1832 by King Leopold I and attached to the Royal Guard as "The King's Own," the Symphonic Band of the Belgian Guides' Regiment has become one of the foremost symphonic bands in the world.

The Band's performances in Washington, D. C. and St. Louis, Missouri in December 1994 will form an important component of Belgium's contribution to the official American commemoration of the 50th Anniversary of the Battle of the Bulge.

The musical program of the concerts will feature works of both European and American composers, including Shostakovich, Strauss and Gershwin.

It's Get-Real Time for Black America

Whatever analysis you subscribe to about the reasons for last Tuesday's romp toward the right, one message is clear: The stunning victory of the Republicans and their ideology must be seen as a wake-up call for black people.

And the word is: Get Real.

It simply won't do for our leaders to stir us into fearful, emotional reactions to Newt Gingrich or spin us into vengefully turning our backs on Bill Clinton. To deal with the serious crisis this election portends, we must respond by putting down the microscope and picking up the mirror and looking inward.

What we saw in white America this week was what sociologists call a paradigm shift. We must strategize and come up with a response. We, too, need to find a new way to get off the dime for the 21st century.

In recent decades, we have allowed our communities and our families to deteriorate. We have allowed drugs to come in and strangle our young people. We have let a venerable institution such as the NAACP become a disaster.

It's a new day, and new survival tactics are demanded.

The several million of us who benefited from the civil rights movement and the programs that followed may be able to live our individual lives quite nicely. But if we have any desire to see improvement on a larger scale, and perhaps to survive ourselves, we must stop being selfish.

Anyone who has read me over the years knows that I have never shrunk from blaming white America for its role in our ills. However, against the backdrop of an electorate that bought the Republican promises, we have no choice but to use our energy in building rather than blaming.

The Republican "Contract with America" said in the first 100 days of the 104th Congress that Republican legislators would introduce bills that contain effective death penalty provisions, deny welfare to minor mothers, stop giving welfare mothers more money if they have more children, build more prisons and put more police on the streets.

These Times Demand a Strategy for Survival

House Speaker-to-be Newt Gingrich insists, however, that he is not a right winger but a conservative futurist" intent on restoring the civilization of America.

We must be prepared to respond with a new strategy. We can reexamine some basic concepts and ask ourselves if the ones we've been predicating our actions on are moving us forward. If we find that they are not, we can begin to look at some alternatives. What are some of them?

New Role of Churches. We should demand that our churches focus on the financial well-being of their individual members as much as they focus on building expensive new edifices. We need Sunday school, but we also need to teach children and adults about saving and investing.

The concept of entrepreneurship and ownership. In my generation, we were trained to get a good job—and keep it. That was fine for those times. But we know that is not enough today. We know that great creativity exists among the young and the poor—witness the Hip Hop generation. Rap music has become a worldwide industry that has only marginally

benefited the black community. Can we begin to think seriously of community-based businesses, even more community-based schools such as the excellent Roots Academy on Georgia Avenue NW?

■ **Welfare reform.** A majority of black people say some kind of welfare reform is needed. But rather than leave it up to the politicians, why can't we design new approaches to people who need assistance? We might decide that we should help young women living in poor neighborhoods become the owners and operators of day-care centers or other enterprises. We have to respect our brothers and sisters who are on welfare and who are poor.

■ **A new attitude toward technology.** Too many of us are afraid of technology, while many of our children are Nintendo whizzes. Those skills can be transferred into computer mastery. We manage to buy color television sets and VCRs. We can also buy our children computers and lobby to make sure that schools offer that technology.

■ **A new concept about gangs.** Several striking examples of gangs becoming legitimate entrepreneurs have occurred here and elsewhere across America. Benjamin Chavis

was moving in that direction before his misjudgment in other areas derailed his career at the NAACP.

■ **A new concept of who we are.** Under the old paradigm, many of us felt like poor, helpless people who have been victims of a racist society. We were conditioned to self-hatred and hostility toward the poor. But we also are creative and talented people who are able to adjust to changing times.

That is why motivational speakers such as Les Brown, Wally Amos and others have long advocated that we cast out the slave mentality and realize that we can be proactive and flexible.

Some of these ideas are already being put into effect. Certain readers may reject others. That's fine. Many more could be added to the list.

I understand why it is so difficult for black Americans to shift to a new view of things. Because of slavery, indoctrination, oppression and brainwashing, our attitudes about who we are and what we ought to do are tough to change. But for an America turning mean and sour, there's only one way to survive: Change with the times and get real.
