We Shall Overcome became the anthem that set America marching towards racial equality. By tracing the sources of one song, the film uncovers the diverse strands of social history which flowed together to form the Civil Rights movement. The film is narrated by Harry Belafonte.

Extremely unique in concept and delivery, the production is participated in by many students who talk to Mrs. King about Dr. King and the movement.

Nonviolence: The Building Blocks of Character. 9 min. and 35 sec.

This video features Ms. Yolanda King. It is a valuable educational tool, and related to young people in a way they understand and enjoy. Through narration by Ms. King and superb animation, Dr. King's philosophy of nonviolence is communicated to ages five through ten via terms like honesty, humility, courage and cooperation.

This is the original video of the historic speech delivered by Dr. King in Washington D. C. on August 28, 1963. It consists of the most complete collection of footage available of that event as well as other historic footage directly related to Dr. King's delivery.

The program is a biographical sketch of Dr. King, his life from birth through death, his work and his application of nonviolence in social action. Designed as an educational tool for elementary and secondary grade levels, the production contains excerpts from several of Dr. King's better known speeches.

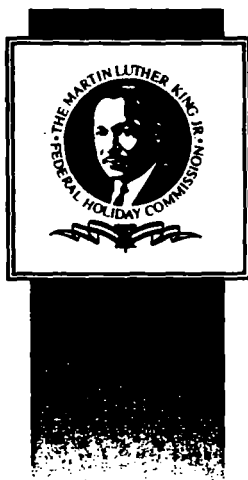

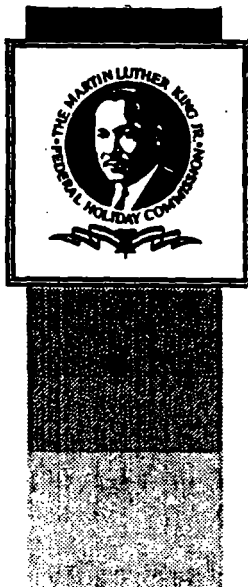

Additional Business:

EXTENSION LEGISLATION

Mrs. King opened the discussion by identifying the work of the Commission as having reached a new plateau last January when all 50 states observed the King Federal Holiday for the first time. However, that accomplishment should be viewed as a part, not the end, of the continuing process to bring integrity and continuity to the occasion.

Mrs. King then spoke of the continuing need to bring substance to the Holiday through meaningful activities such as community service. Pending legislation for reauthorization of the Commission introduced by Representative John Lewis and Senator Harris Wofford expands the mission of the Commission to include community service. This provision of the legislation would make the King Federal Holiday more of a living tribute to Dr. King's legacy of service and direct action, said Mrs. King.

TerriAnn Lowenthal, representing Congressman Sawyer, emphasized the importance of mobilizing the Commission's constituents support for the legislation. Mrs. King added that it would be important to distribute to the Congress material describing the short and long term plans of the Commission, and that Congressman Sawyer had volunteered his staff to work with the Commission staff to develop a paper.

Commissioner Bill Darnell then distributed two documents developed by his committee: (1) the MLK, Jr. Federal Holiday Commission Program Report and (2) the Business Advisory Council Sponsorship Proposal. The "Program Report" contained short and long-term plans and was an attempt to change the way people think of the holiday through a strategic marketing and promotion campaign. Components such as the National Youth Assembly and the Law Enforcement/Youth Against Violence Symposiums would support the value of the legislation extending the commission beyond its expiration date of April 20, 1994.

Commissioner Leonard Burchman asked if there was an action group in place to follow the legislation through the House and Senate to which Commissioner Darnell clarified that his committee did not have that responsibility but agreed that the idea was a good one.

Commissioner Alexis Herman said the Commission clearly has the interest and support of the President and Commissioner Wishner added the importance of securing the support from the private sector such as religious, labor, community, civic, etc. organizations. Mrs. King requested each commissioner to help disseminate information and secure support for the pending legislation from their respective contacts. Mr. Davis welcomed any other networks that commissioners might have access to in terms of organizations in the private sector.

Marty Rogers, representing Senator Harris Wofford, briefed the Commission on the pending legislation which would provided the Holiday Commission with review authority for \$300,000 in MLK, Jr. related community service grants issued through the Federal Commission on National and Community Service.

Commissioner Darnell stated that one of the things they would like to do as part of the marketing for community service and the legislation is to send out guidelines for community service that would target youth service organizations, worships, schools, etc.

PRESIDENTIAL APPOINTEES

Mrs. King announced the new Presidential Appointees to the Commission. Appointment were: Henry Cisneros, Secretary, Department of Housing and Urban Development; Mike Espy, Secretary, Department of Agriculture; Alexis Herman, Assistant to the President and Director of Public Liaison, and that Bruce Babbitt, Secretary of the Department of Interior, was to replace Judge William Sessions, Director, Federal Bureau of Investigation after June 1, 1993.

The Commission approved Donald Alexander to fill the Operation Committee's vacant position.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

Mr. Davis requested that the commissioners review the draft guidelines and submit any suggestions or questions on the text. Commissioner Regula suggested that the guidelines be revised and acted on at the next meeting.

RESOLUTION - JUDGE SESSION DEPARTURE

A resolution was read by Commissioner Regula recognizing Judge Sessions services to the commission. The commissioners in total seconded the motion unanimously by acclamation. Judge Session stated that it had been an honor to have been asked to serve and to be associated with the commission.

ACTIVITY REPORTS

1993 International Interfaith Prayer Breakfast

Commissioner Miller reported that the National Religious Involvement Committee is considering holding a third International Interfaith Prayer Breakfast in Washington, D.C. on the morning of Dr. King's birthday (1994). The committee is also seeking members to support this prayer breakfast. Rev. Joe Watkins was introduced as the co-chairperson.

1993 Youth Assembly

Gayle Mason-Jenkins and Joel Soobitsky, reported on the progress being made on the 1993 "I Have A Dream Youth Assembly" to be held in Washington, D.C., August 26-30. Mr. Soobitsky indicated that they're exploring the possibility of holding 10 state assemblies next year with the objective of eventually getting all 50 states to feed into the national assembly.

Commissioner Sessions made a motion that the Commission contact existing state MLK Holiday Commissions and governors' offices to urge special consideration be given for developing Youth Against Violence Symposiums as part of the King Holiday celebrations. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Minton and Ms. Beverly Goode and approved by the Commission.

30TH ANNIVERSARY MARCH ON WASHINGTON

Mr. Davis reported that a meeting was being held to look at the draft call and a tentative legislative agenda prepared under the leadership of Rev. Walter Fauntroy. He reported that the theme for the 30th March is "Jobs, Justice and Peace". He stated that the mobilization committee is in need of money and volunteers. There is an office now operational at the National Education Association, thanks to Commissioner Keith Geiger and that an office will be opening soon at the MLK, Jr. Community Center in Atlanta.

Mr. Davis introduced the MLK, Jr. Federal Holiday Commission's Washington office staff.

(c) Each duly authorized representative shall be responsible for providing the executing Commissioner with a full and accurate account of all transactions, decisions, and subjects discussed during Commission meetings at which said Commissioner was not in attendance.

THE CHALLENGE OF COMMUNITY SERVICE

"Make a career of humanity...and you will make a greater person of yourself, a greater nation of your country, and a finer world to live in.

Martin Luther King, Jr.

The Martin Luther King, Jr. Federal Holiday Commission's Community Service Program has been established to ensure that the Commission continues to be responsive to changing national circumstances and interests. The Commission believes that as a matter of policy, the King Federal Holiday should be a day of community service and interracial cooperation. The motivation for community service initiative comes from Martin Luther King, Jr.'s belief that people should aspire to a higher calling, seek greatness through service to others, and make individual and collective contributions to the common humanity. As federal resources for social programs become more scarce, the need for involvement in community service is greater than ever before.

At the heart of Martin Luther King, Jr.'s philosophy was the concept of service. Dr. King believed that a person's worth was not measured by his or her color, culture or class but rather by his or her commitment to making a better life for all. He often stated that a definition of a successful life must include service to others. Dr. King talked of mature men and women emerging from the civil rights struggle *"experienced in life's lessons, socially aware, unafraid of experimentation and most of all, imbued with the spirit of service and dedication to a great ideal."*

Dr. King also spoke of the potential in each individual. *"Everyone can be great because everyone can serve. You don't have to have a college degree to serve. You don't have to make your subject and verb agree to serve. You don't have to know about Plato and Aristotle to serve... You only need a heart full of grace. A soul generated by love. And you can be that servant."*

The King holiday is a unique American holiday in that it challenges Americans to remember, celebrate but most importantly act to address those issues for which Dr. King and others gave their lives. One of the most important issues today is the violence which jeopardizes an entire generation and terrorizes family environments and communities. This nation's youth must be inspired to embrace an alternative to violence for settling disputes and conflicts and to reject those influences which destroy rather than sustain life.

The King Holiday and the year of activity surrounding it can be an important vehicle for focusing national attention on the need to "Stop the Killing" especially among young people. Such a thrust can challenge young people to bring healing and hope to their families, their schools and their communities. Community service directed at saving this and the next generation of young people would be a powerful testimony of faith in Dr. King's teachings and life work.

The King Federal Holiday Commission believes that every person regardless of age, gender, race, or economic background has the ability to give assistance to someone in need. Additionally, every organization, be it corporate, educational, religious or community based has the ability to voluntarily undertake direct action initiatives to address those problems and social ills that are urgently in need of solutions.

THE COMMUNITY SERVICE OPPORTUNITY

The Commission views community service as being voluntary and monetarily non-compensatory. Such community service refers to the full scope of service activities either full-time or part-time, occurring within organizational or institutional structures or simply as one individual reaching out to make a difference by helping others.

The concept of community service represents a serious commitment, roughly a year or more of full time service or its equivalent in part-time service over a longer period of time. Community service activities can cover a broad and comprehensive range of opportunities which must address unmet social needs. These activities also help participants to shape their character, increase self-confidence and develop civic responsibility. Such activities can assist in the breaking down of social and economic barriers that divide people and in turn bring people together around the common focus of service to others. Community service work can build the bridges of unity and understanding between races and cultures and stimulate interracial cooperation.

The following list is only a sampling of possible community service activities that can be undertaken by individuals or organizations.

- Combatting the violence of crime, drugs and social disintegration
- Helping to feed the hungry and shelter the homeless
- Working to eliminate racism
- Building better relations between races and cultures
- Tutoring grade and high school students
- Helping to improve the quality of education
- Working with the physically impaired
- Volunteering to serve in hospitals and health care facilities
- Working to improve the quality of life for American Indians
- Helping to improve the environment
- Participating in Big Brothers and Big Sister Programs
- Working with those with AIDS and other fatal diseases
- Working with the elderly
- Working with those in prisons
- Helping with voter education and registration
- Working on blood drives for the Red Cross
- Working with "youth-at-risk"
- Providing legal aid for the powerless
- Assisting with literacy programs
- Supporting charitable projects and initiatives of established civic organizations
- Leadership development projects
- Refugee assistance programs

IMPLEMENTING THE COMMUNITY SERVICE PROGRAMS

The Commission has established a Committee on Community Service to: (1) oversee the implementation of its Community Service Guidelines including goals, targets and timetables; (2) develop and maintain a working relationship between the King Federal Holiday Commission and the Commission on National and Community Service, and; (3) help the King Federal Commission raise the funds and secure the personnel required to administer its new community service program.

The Commission has also established a Community Service Clearinghouse in order to provide, information, technical assistance, speakers, and strategic referrals on community service program to local and state governments as well as private and public organizations.

Individuals and organizations participating in King Holiday community service programs are asked to report on any activities undertaken. This information will be published in the Commission's quarterly "I Have A Dream" newsletter and annual report to the President and Congress and should be forwarded to:

Six Principles of Nonviolence

1. Nonviolence is a way of life for courageous people. It is active non-violent resistance to evil....
2. Nonviolence seeks to win friendship and understanding. The end result of nonviolence is redemption and reconciliation....
3. Nonviolence seeks to defeat injustice, not people. Nonviolence recognizes that evil doers are also victims....
4. Nonviolence holds that suffering can educate and transform. Nonviolence willingly accepts the consequences of its acts....
5. Nonviolence chooses love instead of hate. Nonviolence resists violence of the spirit as well as the body. Nonviolent love is active, not passive. Nonviolent love does not sink to the level of the hater. Love restores community and resists injustice. Nonviolence recognizes the fact that all life is interrelated.
6. Nonviolence believes that the universe is on the side of justice. The nonviolent resister has deep faith that justice will eventually win.

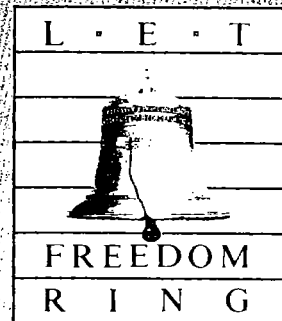

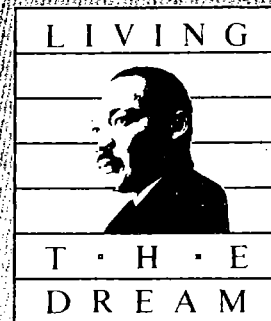

...from every village and every hamlet, from every state and every city, we will be able to speed up that day when all of God's children, black men and white men, Jews and Gentiles, Protestants and Catholics, will be able to join hands and sing... "Free at last! Free at Last! Thank God Almighty, we are free at last!"

1955 . . . Tired after a hard day at work, Rosa Parks, a 42-year old black seamstress, refuses to give up her seat on a city bus to a white passenger. She is arrested. Dr. King successfully leads a year-long boycott achieving integration of Montgomery, Alabama buses. The victory attracts world attention.

1959 . . . Inspired by Dr. King, nonviolent protests to end segregation sweep the nation. Hundreds of thousands, young and old, black and white, conduct sit-ins, freedom marches, and freedom rides to achieve equal treatment for all people in restaurants, libraries, hospitals, schools, and other public places.

1963 . . . In the largest civil rights demonstration in history, 250,000 marchers, of all races and religions, peacefully gather at our nation's Capital calling for civil rights, jobs, and freedom for all. Dr. King's words that day will live forever in history: "I have a dream," he said, "that one day, this nation . . ."

1964 . . . The world honors Dr. King's work, and he is awarded the Nobel Peace Prize for creating positive social change using nonviolent means. For the world, he becomes a symbol of peace. His work continues; in America he leads a nonviolent movement to ensure black citizens the right to vote.

1967 . . . Dr. King begins a campaign to help poor people. Through creative nonviolent actions, he hopes to draw attention to their need for decent jobs, housing, health care, and education. On April 4, 1968, before joining Memphis, Tennessee sanitation workers for a planned protest march, he is assassinated.

Martin Luther King, Jr. awakened our national pride and the essential goodness of our people and led an American nonviolent revolution that enriched our moral purpose as a nation.

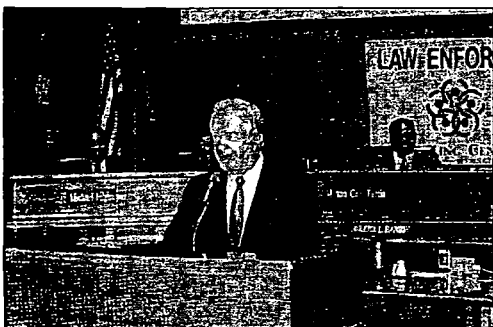
Six Steps for Nonviolent Social Change

1. **Information Gathering:** In order to understand and articulate the issue, problem or injustice facing the community, you must first research, investigate and gather all vital information that will increase your understanding of the problem. Know all sides of the issue, including the other party's position.
2. **Education:** It is essential to inform others about your issue. This minimizes misunderstandings, and gains you support and sympathy.
3. **Personal Commitment:** Eliminate hidden motives and prepare yourself to accept suffering, if necessary, in your work for justice.
4. **Negotiation:** Using grace, humor and intelligence, confront the other party with a list of injustices and a plan for addressing and resolving these injustices. Nonviolent communication does not seek to humiliate, but to call forth the good in an opponent.
5. **Direct Action:** Used to morally force the opponent to work with you in resolving the injustices, direct action imposes a "creative tension" into the conflict.
6. **Reconciliation:** Nonviolence does not seek to defeat the opponent, but to seek his/her friendship and understanding. It is directed against evil systems, forces, policies and acts, not against persons.

HISTORY OF THE NLEIC

The National Law Enforcement Involvement Committee (NLEIC) was established by Mrs. Coretta Scott King in 1990 and operates under the auspices of the MLK Jr.



National figures such as former President Jimmy Carter are involved in this program.

Federal Holiday Commission. In 1990, Mrs. King, with the assistance of Mr. Lloyd Davis, Executive Director of the King Federal Commission, recognized the need to foster and perpetuate Dr. King's philosophy of methodology of nonviolence through a body of law enforcement personnel with the cooperation of youth, parents, educators, and business and religious leaders. Through Mrs. King's and Mr. Davis' efforts, the NLEIC has evolved into a very effective, action-oriented body, which sponsors and facilitates Youth Against Violence Symposiums throughout the Nation.

Mission Statement

The NLEIC Committee seeks to build a viable partnership among law enforcement agencies, students, parents, educators, administrators, business leaders, and the religious community in the spirit of Kingian nonviolence and to aggressively address the problems impacting the lives of youth today. The Committee seeks to identify those areas where law enforcement officials, educators, parents, business leaders, and youth can effectively work together to resolve potential and actual problems. The Committee uses the life, works and example of Dr. King in its work to demonstrate in the context of today's realities, the lasting effectiveness of nonviolence.

Membership

The NLEIC Committee is composed of high level officials from local, state and federal law enforcement agencies as well as leaders from the business, education and religious communities. Law enforcement representatives come from local police and sheriff departments who serve along side representatives from federal agencies such as the FBI, the US Secret Service, Drug Enforcement Administration, US Federal Penitentiary, the Alcohol, Tobacco & Firearms Administration and the United States Attorney.

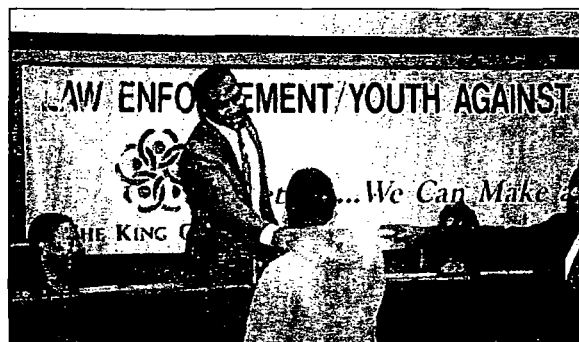
Goals

The Committee's ultimate goals are to help bring into existence a generation of young people who are technically excellent and morally and spiritually mature and who personify in their lives the values of love, tolerance and nonviolence. The Committee's immediate goals are to help youth deal with problems of drugs, crime, gangs, suicide, transmittable diseases, low self esteem and the many forms of violence found in the family, school and community.

GUIDE TO YOUTH SYMPOSIUMS

Adhere to the Mission and Goals

Bring representatives of law enforcement, business, the schools, parents and youth together to assess the problems causing difficulty and to explore the sponsorship of a Youth Against Violence Symposium.

Use the first meeting to thoroughly discuss the mission and goals of the National Law Enforcement Involvement Committee and the objectives of the Youth Against Violence

Symposium (i.e. provide youth with alternates to the violent and criminal conflicts that they face on a day to day basis in the home, classroom or community).

Identify youth populations to whom the Youth Against Violence Symposium should be targeted. Assign responsibility among organizers for logistics, communications, recruitment, publicity, finances, site and other related matters. Identify panel members including youth for the exploratory presentation at the Symposium. Assure that Panel Members represent the experience and skills necessary to contribute to any discussion of the issues of violence and the acceptable alternates for dealing successfully with the relevant forms of behavior.

The Outline of a typical Youth Against Violence Symposium:

- I. Greetings
- II. Welcome and introductions
- III. Opening Remarks (Speakers should call attention to Dr. King's "Blueprint for Life" which was directed specifically at young people)
- IV. The Challenge (Issues to be addressed/solutions to be sought/leadership to be required)
- V. Panel Presentation on Issues and Resolution of Problems
- VI. Formal Response to Panel (one or more persons)
- VII. Questions and Answers (Dialogue between presenters and audience)

Time permitting some Symposiums can be structured in such a manner as to provide the opportunity for participants to assemble into smaller focus groups to reflect on particular problems or issues and then to return to the larger group with recommendations. It is important that focus groups be assigned capable facilitators and reporters.

At the Conclusion of the Symposium every youth in attendance should be urged to individually sign the "Youth Against Violence" pledge developed by the King Federal Holiday Commission. The pledge can also be enlarged and hundreds of youth can sign one giant-pledge card. Giant pledge cards can be effectively and dramatically used at Youth Against Violence Rallies and other public programs.

Symposiums in and of themselves will not solve or resolve the problems facing young people in any given community. The Symposiums are but a first step in an evolving process of information, education, dialogue, training and action.

Youth groups, schools, clubs, etc. are encouraged to establish Youth Against Violence Clubs as a means for institutionalizing or formalizing an ongoing Youth Against Violence program.

The National Law Enforcement Involvement Committee is available to provide technical assistance to such Clubs.

The Martin Luther King, Jr. Center for Nonviolent Social Change, Inc., in Atlanta, Georgia is available to establish formal Kingian nonviolence training programs that utilize Dr. King's principles and methods for resolving conflicts.

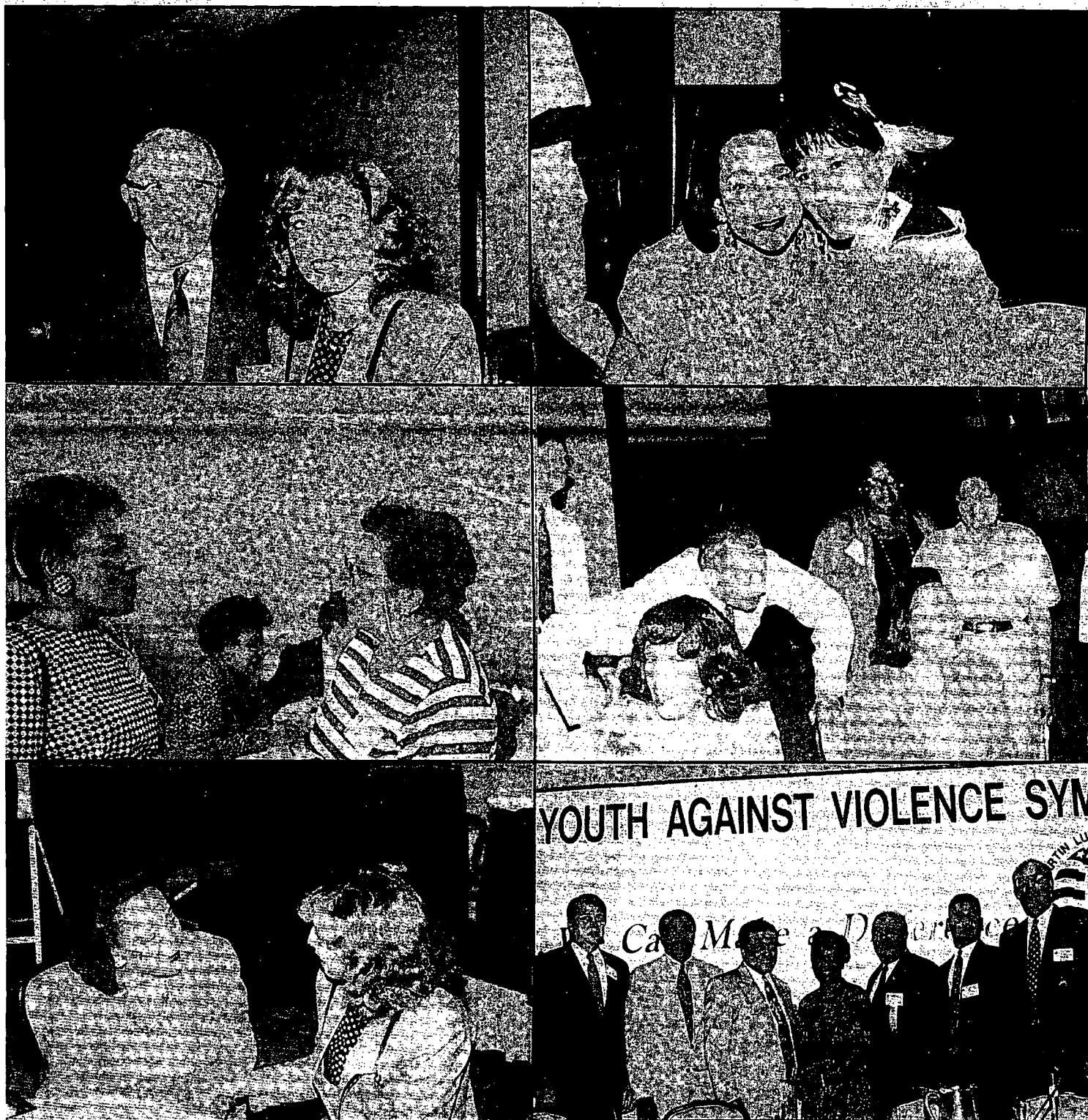
