PRESIDENT NOMINATES INEZ SMITH REID TO DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA COURT OF APPEALS

The President yesterday nominated Inez Smith Reid to serve on the District of Columbia Court of Appeals. The President is authorized by statute to nominate D.C. Court of Appeals judges from a list of three individuals submitted by the District of Columbia Judicial Nomination Commission.

Inez Smith Reid, 57, has been in private practice since 1986 and is now a member of the law firm of Lewis, White & Clay. Previously, Reid served as D.C. Corporation Counsel from 1983 to 1985. She also served as Inspector General of the Environmental Protection Agency; as Deputy General Counsel for the Department of Health, Education and Welfare; and as General Counsel for the New York State Executive Department. Reid received a B.A. from Tufts University, an LL.B. from Yale University, an M.A. (political science) from U.C.L.A., and a Ph.D. (law and government) from Columbia University.

If confirmed, Reid would fill the vacancy on the D.C. Court of Appeals created by the resignation of Judge Emmet Sullivan who now serves on the U.S. District Court for the District of Columbia.

AROUND THE REGION

Va. Appeals Court Restores Revoking of Driver's Licenses

The Virginia Court of Appeals has reversed a ruling that had effectively blocked prosecutors from revoking the licenses of residents with bad driving records.

The court decided 7 to 3 Tuesday to overturn a May 24 ruling by a three-judge panel. That 2 to 1 ruling said the Department of Motor Vehicles did not provide enough information to prosecutors about drivers' previous convictions.

The attorney for the six plaintiffs who had challenged the DMV's procedures, Dabney Overton Jr., said he may appeal to the state Supreme Court.

But Jeffrey Spencer, an assistant attorney general who argued the case for the state, said he believes most commonwealth's attorneys soon will restart their habitual offender proceedings.

Under Virginia law, the DMV certifies drivers as habitual offenders if they are convicted within 10 years of three major offenses, such as drunken driving, driving with a suspended license or vehicular homicide. The habitual of-

fenders then are prosecuted by their local commonwealth's attorney and can lose their license for up to 10 years.

Overton's clients had contended that the DMV was not providing prosecutors with all the driving record information required by state law, and most habitual offender cases across the state had been on hold since the May court decision.

The General Assembly will consider a bill next month to assign the habitual offender process entirely to the DMV.

D.C. Appeals Court Candidates

■ The names of three lawyers—a former D.C. corporation counsel, the acting D.C. corporation counsel and a sitting D.C. Superior Court judge—have been forwarded to President Clinton for consideration for a vacancy on the D.C. Court of Appeals. The vacancy occurred Nov. 14 when Judge Emmet Sullivan resigned to become a judge of the U.S. District Court here.

The candidates, selected by the D.C. Judicial Nomination Commission, are Inez Smith Reid, 57, a D.C. corporation counsel during Marion

Barry's second term as mayor, who is now in private practice; Elias A. Hyman, 50, the acting corporation counsel, who headed the D.C. Parole Board in Mayor Sharon Pratt Kelly's administration; and Michael Lee Rankin, 48, since 1986 a D.C. Superior Court judge and, for five years before that, an assistant U.S. attorney in the District.

Chief Makes Holiday Arrest

■ Maryland Police Superintendent Larry Tolliver took a break from Christmas shopping this week to make a shoplifting arrest.

Maryland's top police officer approached a fellow shopper at a Marshall's department store in Annapolis on Tuesday after he saw the man stuff a boot in his pants, police said.

Tolliver walked up to the man, who by that time was putting a second boot under his coat, and placed him under arrest, police said.

The man allegedly struggled as Tolliver walked him outside. Two state troopers and two county police officers arrived to help arrest Tierre T. Wallace, 18, of Annapolis.

ESTIMATED 1993 DIRECT JOBS CREATED BY THE PRESIDENT'S JOBS PACKAGE

- ◆ As OMB notes, these figures are estimates.
- ◆ **THESE ARE DIRECT JOBS ONLY -- THEY DO NOT INCLUDE INDIRECT AND SPIN-OFF JOBS.** Thus, these figures are a floor or a minimum. Final job creation could be much higher when indirect jobs are added.
- ◆ These figures assume swift enactment of the President's entire jobs proposal by the Congress.

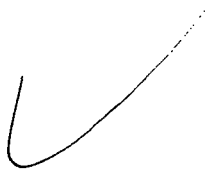

* On Wednesday, the Republican filibuster in the Senate held and the President's jobs plan was changed to include only funding for unemployment benefits. The Senate's failure to pass President Clinton's jobs package represents a tremendous loss for thousands of Americans who want to invest in job creation today.

* The American people understood the need for the President's job package. The President, intent upon breaking gridlock in Washington and jumpstarting the economy, offered the Senate leadership a compromise designed with both objectives in mind. Senate Republicans decided to put politics ahead of people and fund unemployment, over jobs.

* The President's complete plan fundamentally reorders the nation's economic priorities by increasing investment, reducing the deficit and moving the economy into the future. The President's Strategy for Growth

Congress has adopted President Clinton's plan for increasing investment, creating jobs, and reducing the deficit. While this plan will ensure that the United States enjoys economic growth and its workers experience rising incomes in the long-term, we still need to increase economic growth and the creation of jobs in the short-term.

The Economic Case for Change

According to the Department of Labor's latest job figures, unemployment stayed above 7% for the 16th month in a row and the total number of jobs dropped by 22,000. At the same time, there are still 16 million Americans who want full-time work and can't find it. This anemic and fragile recovery is not producing jobs, and we need to take action now to put people back to work. The President's plan will produce over 500,000 full and part-year jobs. Here are some highlights:

- **Small Businesses (\$141 million in section 7a loan guarantees)**

Small businesses have created most of the new jobs in this country and they need to flourish. We must put an end to the era of shipping American jobs overseas while leaving small businesses without basic support. Instead, we must encourage our small business people and entrepreneurs to take risks and invest in our own communities.

- **Highways (\$3 billion)**

To build a twenty-first century, America must start investing in its own infrastructure. Just as interstate highway construction in the 1950s ushered in two decades of unparalleled growth, investment in our highways now will create large predictable markets, stimulate private industry, and put Americans back to work.

Youth Summer Jobs (\$1 billion)

We need to provide educational enrichment for kids in the inner-city and rural communities. The summer jobs programs will create 700,000 real jobs renovating housing, repairing public buildings, doing clerical work, providing nursing assistance in hospitals, supervising and training children at child care centers. For many of these young people, this will be their first experience in the world of work. A first job can teach self-discipline, responsibility and steady work habits that businesses will want to see in their future employees. In the process, our kids will be helping to build local communities, strengthen local economies and solve local problems.

Immunizations (\$300 million)

Studies under all administrations have shown that vaccines are the most cost-effective way to prevent human suffering and to reduce the economic cost that result from vaccine-preventable diseases. But because we've gotten away from preventive care and because immunizations have become unaffordable or unavailable, millions of infants and toddlers are at risk of completely preventable diseases like polio, mumps, and measles.

AIDS (\$200 million for programs authorized under Ryan White Comprehensive AIDS Resources Emergency Act)

If we fail to commit our hearts and resources to fighting AIDS now, we will pay a far greater price in the future, both in deaths and in dollars. We need to focus our resources on new initiatives in research, prevention, and treatment. We need to work closely with individuals and communities that are affected by HIV to create a partnership between the federal government and those with knowledge and experience in fighting HIV.

● Wastewater Clean-up (\$845 million)

Environmental protection is fundamental to America's national security. We need an aggressive national strategy to cut pollution and clean up the waste that has already harmed our environment. We need to take effective measures to preserve our resources; and we can start by building sewage and wastewater treatment plants to clean our water supply.

- Police (\$200 million)

At a time when too many of our people live in fear of violent crime, when too many businesses have closed and too many people have lost their jobs because people are afraid to leave their homes, helping local communities to rehire police officers is the best investment we can make.

- Communities (\$1.4 billion* for community development grants)

Our nation cannot move forward until our cities and rural communities become centers of expanding opportunity and engines of economic growth. We need to require that companies that bid on community development projects 1) set up their operations in low-income neighborhoods and underserved regions and, 2) employ local residents. America's communities should be places where hardworking families can put down roots and find good jobs; let's make it so.

- Head Start (\$317 million* for summer programs)

Children who participate in Head Start do better in school and become more productive as adults. By giving them the caring, stimulating environment they need, Head Start programs enable at-risk children to become problem-solvers instead of problems. With this initiative, one of our country's most cost-effective programs will become far more widely available and help change countless lives.

- Women, Infants, and Children (\$43 million*)

Children are our future. If our nation is going to prosper, our children will have to grow up healthy, not hungry. This special supplemental food program for women, infants and children, helps make sure they do.

- ALSO Inside the Stimulus Package

Airports (\$143 million* for improvements)

Mass Transportation (\$429 million* for local transit authorities, primarily allocated to repairs and improvements)

Housing (\$241 million* for supportive housing)

Schools (\$419 million* for Chapter 1 summer and fall programs)

Student Loans (\$1 billion* to cover shortfalls in student aid programs)

Rural Development Administration (\$199 million* in grants and loans)

President Clinton is Fighting for a New Economy

The Clinton budget passed by Congress fundamentally reorders the nation's economic priorities by increasing investments, reducing the deficit, and moving the economy into the future. His jobs plan is an essential element of that plan -- to create jobs, boost consumer confidence, and get the economy moving again. He will not rest until the American economy starts working again for the American people.

Talking Points for Jobs Compromise**Description**

- o The President announced today a compromise recommendation to the Senate leadership on the jobs stimulus bill intended to break the gridlock. While the jobs bill has the support of a majority of Senators, it has been stalled by a filibuster over the past several weeks.
- o The compromise would involve the following:
 - Overall budget authority levels in the bill would be reduced by 25% from \$16.2 billion to \$12.2 billion. However, the jobs created by the bill would be reduced by only 18%.
 - Unemployment benefits, highway programs, summer jobs, childhood immunization, Ryan White program for AIDs victims, construction of wastewater treatment facilities, food safety, and assistance to small business would be fully funded. In addition, the President would target \$200 million for grants to local governments to provide additional police protection.
 - The remaining programs would be subjected to an across-the-board reduction of 44 percent. Programs in this category include CDBG, technology, education, science and housing programs.
- o The President is reluctant to approve any compromise that reduces the overall number of jobs created by his economic plan. But his interest is in breaking gridlock and jumpstarting the economy, and his offer to the Senate leadership is designed with both objectives in mind.

Questions and Answers (not for distribution)

Q. Does the Administration have any Republican support for the compromise proposal?

A. The President has recommended a course of action to the Senate leadership in the hopes of moving forward his jobs bill. The specifics of this proposal were not discussed in advance with Republican members.

Q. Is this proposal a first proposal in a series of negotiations or does it represent a final offer?

A. Negotiations cannot be conducted with only one party. The Republicans have not offered any alternatives to the president's jobs bill. Reluctantly, the President has acknowledged the procedural difficulties faced in the Senate and has offered a compromise position that achieves some but not all of his economic objectives.

Q. Will this proposal survive the Senate?

A. It is our hope that the proposal will be adopted as the Mitchell/Byrd substitute and pass the Senate.

Q. Why did the Administration exempt certain programs from the across-the-board reduction?

A. The President was forced to make difficult choices amongst a series of priorities. The programs selected for funding included those where funding in fiscal 1993 is most desperately needed. We will continue to press for funding of those programs subjected to the across-the-board reduction as part of our long-term investment strategy in the fiscal 1994 and subsequent appropriation bills.

Q. What has the Administration been doing over the recess to generate additional support for the jobs bill?

A. The President has spoken several times on the need for the legislation and the reasons for specific program increases. Senior White House officials, Cabinet members and others have discussed the economic benefits of the proposal with a number of Republican members and urged their support.

- The White House needs to be able to demonstrate that grassroots America is demanding a serious "investment" strategy.
- What could be more grassroots America than local school boards? Over the past three months, close to 2,000 school districts have enacted official resolutions calling on Congress and the White House to "reinvest in America." **Never before in America history have local school boards united in an effort to send Washington a common message.**
- The "Reinvest in America" resolution enacted by all these school boards does not just talk narrowly about investing in public schools. It calls for the broad investment in American kids and families that the Clinton economic plan calls for.
- A White House event to deliver the resolutions could feature any sort of grassroots tableau the White House desires: school board members from Middle America communities, parent leaders, school superintendents from the heartland, principals, teachers, you name it -- either with or without the national presidents of the eight organizations promoting the "Reinvest" resolution campaign. These organizations: the National School Boards Association, the National PTA, the American Association of School Administrators, the National Association of Elementary School Principals, the National Association of Secondary School Principals, the Council of Great City Schools, the American Federation of Teachers, and NEA.
- By recognizing the local school board "Reinvest in America" resolution in a White House event, the Clinton Administration could immediately gain access to the national publications that reach everyone from elected local school board members to PTA parents. 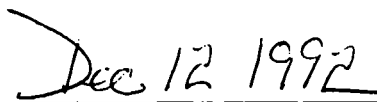

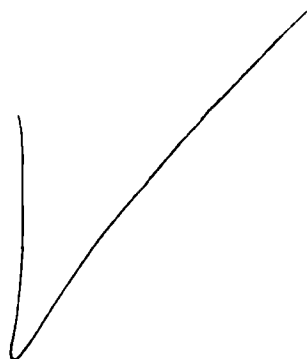
