Dear Mr. McGinty ,

The Second International Symposium "*In Situ* and On-Site Bioreclamation" will be held at the Sheraton Harbor Island Hotel in San Diego, April 5-8, 1993. We have several important matters to share with those attending the conference. Dr. Don Crawford will be presenting a paper on our bench scale treatability study. This study involves the biodegradation of Oily Filter Cake Waste from a Superfund Site, containing 20-30% petroleum hydrocarbons, Aroclor 1260, lead, 8 semi-volatiles, and 11 volatile contaminants. Dr. Crawford's presentation is Tuesday, April 6th, at 3:30 pm.

Bioremediation Service, Inc. (BSI) will also have an exhibit (booth #33) at the conference. In addition to our 100 ton/hour soil mixing technology used in the bioremediation of petroleum-contaminated soils, we will also show pictures of our new anaerobic soil reactors successfully used on TCE and PCE-contaminated soil as well as our bio air filtration systems used for treating volatile hydrocarbons. Our bio air filters successfully degraded TCE and PCE volatilized from the soil mixing process.

We have lots more to show and discuss with you, including an *in situ* project at the 9th Army Depot in Germany. See also the attached news releases.

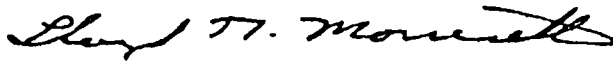

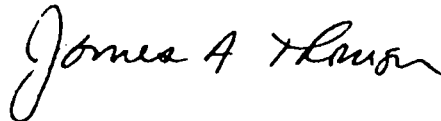

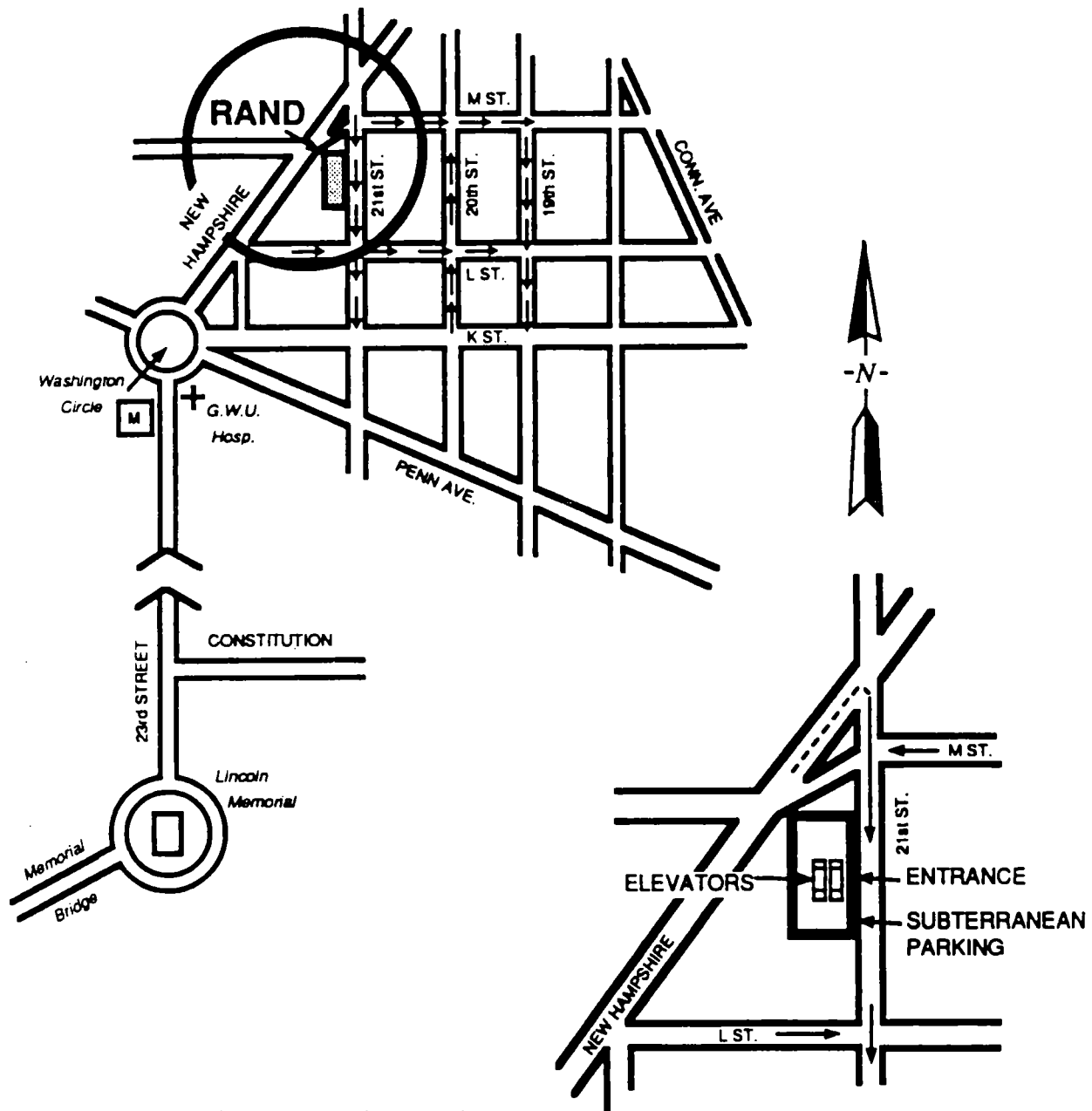

management or political campaigns may accept meals, lodgings, transportation and other benefits, including free attendance at events, when provided, in connection with such active participation, by a political organization described in 26 U.S.C. 527(e). Any other employee, such as a security officer, whose official duties require him to accompany an exempt employee to a political event may accept meals, free attendance and entertainment provided at the event by such a political organization.

Example 1: The Secretary of the Department of Health and Human Services is exempt from the noted Hatch Act restrictions. He may accept an airline ticket and hotel accommodations furnished by the campaign committee of a candidate for the United States Senate in order to give a speech in support of the candidate.

(g) Widely attended gatherings and other events-(1) Speaking and similar engagements. When an employee is assigned to participate as a speaker or panel participant or otherwise to present information on behalf of the agency at a conference or other event, his acceptance of an offer of free attendance at the event on the day of his presentation is permissible when provided by the sponsor of the event. The employee's participation in the event on that day is viewed as a customary and necessary part of his performance of the assignment and does not involve a gift to him or to the agency.

(2) Widely attended gatherings. When there has been a determination that his attendance is in the interest of the agency because it will further agency programs or operations, an employee may accept a sponsor's unsolicited gift of free attendance at all or appropriate parts of a widely attended gathering of mutual interest to a number of parties. A gathering is widely attended if, for example, it is open to members from throughout a given industry or profession or if those in attendance represent a range of persons interested in a given matter. For employees subject to a leave system, attendance at the event shall be on the employee's own time or, if authorized by the employee's agency, on excused absence pursuant to applicable guidelines for granting such absence, or otherwise without charge to the employee's leave account.

(3) Determination of agency interest. The determination of agency interest required by paragraph (g)(2) of this section shall be made orally or in writing by the agency designee.

(i) If the sponsor is a person who has interests that may be substantially affected by the performance or nonperformance of an employee's official duties or an association or organization the majority of whose members have such interests, the employee's participation may be determined to be in the interest of the agency only where there is a written finding by the agency designee that the agency's interest in the employee's participation in the event outweighs concern that acceptance of the gift of free attendance may or may appear to improperly influence the employee in the

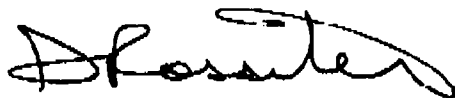

SUPERFUND RE AUTHORIZATION ROUNDTABLE OVERVIEW

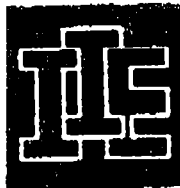
The Institute for Civil Justice (ICJ) at RAND is sponsoring a roundtable discussion on Superfund re authorization. We are inviting a wide range of parties interested in Superfund issues. The discussion will focus on the Congressional debate over Superfund. The specific questions we hope to address include:

- Where does Superfund fit in the array of environmental cleanup programs?
- What do we know so far about Superfund's strengths and weaknesses?
- What issues are most likely to be addressed during the re authorization debate?
- Who are the stakeholders and what are their positions on these issues?
- What issues are likely to remain after re-authorization?

The Roundtable will be held on April 6, from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., at the RAND Washington, DC office, 2100 M Street. The program will begin with Dr. Lloyd Dixon of the ICJ staff laying out a framework for the discussion to follow. The rest of the morning will be comprised of the panel discussion and questions and comments from the audience. The audience will include representatives from a wide range of organizations interested and involved with various aspects of environmental liability. The discussion will end at noon, and be followed with a luncheon address by a key policy maker

This Roundtable is one in a series that the Institute is holding on critical liability policy issues. The ICJ is sponsoring this roundtable to promote an open exchange of opinions, facts, and concerns about Superfund issues. In view of the intensifying legislative activity on Superfund, the discussion will be a particularly timely one.

A tentative agenda is enclosed. Full details about the Roundtable, final agenda and participants will be sent to those attending in late March.

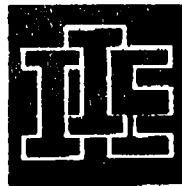

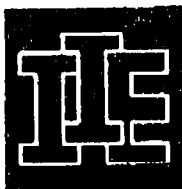

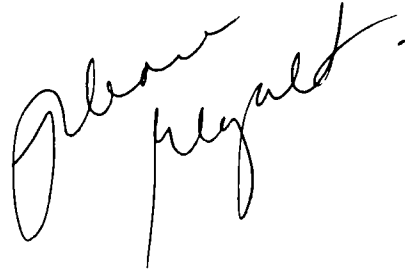

On behalf of leaders of the magnetic fusion energy community I am requesting a meeting with Katie McGinty April 14, 15 or 16. I would like to bring Dr. Ron Davidson, Director of Princeton Plasma Physics Laboratory, Dr. David Overskei, Sr. Vice President of the fusion group at General Atomics, Dr. John Sheffield, manager of the fusion program at Oak Ridge National Laboratory, and Dr. Bob Conn, Chairman of the Fusion Energy Advisory Committee and Director of the fusion program at the University of California, Los Angeles.

The purpose of this meeting would be to discuss the fusion program both in this country and world wide. It has been widely publicized that a group of solar and environmental representatives met with Ms. McGinty urging significant cuts in the magnetic fusion energy program, even though the President called for increases in his "Vision of Change for America". The Association of Forest Service Employees for Environmental Ethics (AFSEEE) is a non-government organization of 2000 current and retired Forest Service employees. We possess a unique "insider's view" of this very troubled agency.

The purpose of the meeting would be two-fold. First of all, to share our thoughts about important reforms that are needed within the Forest Service. Secondly, to present you with a copy of our White Paper to the Administration regarding the Tongass National Forest.

As the Administration struggles to place National Forest management on the track of ecosystem approaches, the greatest impediment you face is the Forest Service, itself. Recently, Vice President Gore received a letter from 23 of the nation's top resource scientists regarding abuses of science by the agency. That letter, facilitated by AFSEEE, points not only to suppression of reports and intimidation of resource professionals, but also of the reward and incentive system that promotes commodity extraction over resource protection. Furthermore, the agency is currently down-sizing in a manner that is cutting the muscle of ecosystem management from the agency, the biologists, hydrologists and ecologists on the ground. In many instances, these "ologists" are surplusd while their position is filled with timber sale planners who have seniority. These are two of several institutional issues that must be addressed as you grapple with the issue of Forest management.

Attending the meeting would be Dave Iverson, President of AFSEEE's board and the regional economist for Forest Service Region 4 (Mr. Iverson will be on his personal time as a citizen and not acting as a representative of the agency), Jeff Ruch, Esq. of the Government Accountability Project and myself.

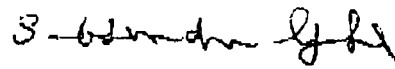

It was a pleasure meeting with you last Friday. As we explained, United Solar Systems Corp. (USSC) is a Joint Venture Company between Energy Conversion Devices, Inc. of Troy, Michigan and Canon Inc. of Japan. USSC is an American company engaged in research and development, manufacture and sale of amorphous silicon alloy based photovoltaic modules and systems. A copy of the press release announcing the formation of the Joint Venture is attached herewith.

At present, USSC has a manufacturing plant in Troy, Michigan with an annual production capacity of 2 Mega Watt (MW). With the increasing awareness of the need for clean energy, we expect a larger demand for photovoltaic panels and have therefore decided to expand our production capacity substantially. We are building a new plant of 10 MW/year capacity; the plant will be located in Virginia and will be operational in 1994.

On behalf of the board of directors of USSC, I am writing this letter to invite you to be our honored guest for this meeting and join Governor Wilder to make a few remarks. We share and admire the bold vision of the Clinton/Gore Administration for an environmentally sustainable economy, and we believe that the building of our new plant is an important step in that direction. We also applaud your commitment to a clean environment and hope that you will be able to join us on this important occasion.

I have recently been asked to serve as a Consultant to the U. S. Advisory Commission on Inter-governmental Relations (ACIR). My work will be with the ACIR Task Force for Streamlining Environmental Permitting Processes to Reduce Investment Costs and Delays in Infrastructure Development, a part of the Commission's study on Federal Infrastructure Investment Strategy.

I was asked to work with the ACIR because of my earlier assignment to the Civil Works Directorate of the Corps of Engineers, a longtime association with National Environmental Policy Act issues, and a one-year detail assignment to CEQ. (See my CV at Enclosure 1.)

Recognizing that two major national goals, and Administration priorities, protecting the environment and providing adequate infrastructure, are intrinsically intertwined with our Number One priority - the economy, I would like to arrange a meeting with you at your earliest convenience but preferably before the first Task Force meeting on April 5, 1993. I would like to be able to fill you in on ACIR's earlier work in this study area (see Summary, Enclosure 2) and obtain some insight from you on Executive Branch views on these issues and your interest in participating in the Task Force study. I am particularly interested in your ideas for addressing environmental requirements in the implementation of the Administration's economic stimulus package. As Enclosure 2 indicates, it has been ACIR's recommendation that the NEPA process be used to integrate administration of Federal environmental protection laws in the public works arena, with CEQ playing a key role in coordination and mediation. With President Clinton's announced intention of abolishing that agency, early identification of alternative approaches would seem to be central to assuring the success of employment/infrastructure initiatives.

I trust that we may be able to assist one another, the President, the ACIR, and ultimately, the Nation on these important issues.

INTERGOVERNMENTAL DECISIONMAKING
FOR
ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AND PUBLIC WORKS

Two national goals--protecting the environment and providing adequate infrastructure--are compatible in theory, but often do not mesh well under current policies. Changing our expectations about how public works and environmental goals can mesh satisfactorily will require additional education and training, research and development, and taxpayer/citizen commitment. It will also require changes in governmental processes.

Federal legislation establishing a framework for integrating federal environmental review actions has been in place in the form of the National Environmental Policy Act for two decades. A number of federal and state agencies seek to coordinate federal permit, license, and review requirements--including studies and data gathering, public review, and agency consultation--within the environmental impact statement (EIS) process. Sometimes they have great difficulty doing this because of competing and incompatible statutory and regulatory mandates that also apply.

Integration and coordination of federal review and decisionmaking requirements and procedures concerning state and local public works projects can reduce project delays and costs while improving services to the public and protecting the environment. Several federal and state agencies have recently demonstrated that agency coordination, combined with consideration of the environment at every stage of project development, can increase the efficiency and effectiveness, and decrease the time required for, federal environmental reviews. More can be done to improve the governmental processes.

After two years of studying the decisionmaking processes for environmental protection and public works the Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations in March 1992 adopted the following recommendations:

INTERGOVERNMENTAL DECISIONMAKING
FOR
ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AND PUBLIC WORKS

PRINCIPLES

1. The nation's environment requires protection.

The country is committed to achieving increasingly effective protection of the environment. Federal government review processes have reduced the adverse environmental effects of public works projects during the past two decades; yet, our lifestyle choices--how we live, consume, farm, travel, and produce products--continue to threaten the health of the environment.

2. The nation's economic well-being requires public and private infrastructure investment.

America requires new highways, airports, drinking water supplies, sewage treatment plants and solid waste facilities to meet growing population, economic development, international competitiveness, and quality of life needs.

3. The intergovernmental processes used to achieve environmental protection and infrastructure goals in mutually satisfactory ways should be clear, cooperative, consistent, efficient, flexible, definitive, responsive, and fair to all concerns.

These two goals--protecting the environment and providing adequate infrastructure--are compatible in theory, but often do not mesh well under current policies. Changing our expectations about how public works and environmental goals can mesh satisfactorily, and will require additional education and training, research and development, and taxpayer/citizen commitment. It will also require changes in governmental processes.

Federal legislation establishing a framework for integrating federal environmental review actions has been in place in the form of the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) for two decades. A number of federal and state agencies seek to coordinate federal

FINDINGS

1. With respect to infrastructure, present federal rules and procedures governing decisionmaking for protecting the environment often are complex, conflicting, difficult to apply, adversarial, costly, inflexible, and uncertain.

Federal environmental laws affect the nature and timing of state and local public works by requiring (1) environmental permits (or licenses), (2) approval for grant funding subject to environmental constraints, and/or (3) environmental impact reviews. Although NEPA requires federal and state agencies to integrate and coordinate the review and decision processes, many projects go through a long series of sequential and distinct review and/or decision steps to satisfy federal environmental requirements.

For example, approval for dam construction may include the licensing review requirements of the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC); the preparation of an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS); a Clean Water Act Section 404 permit from the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (COE) and then review of that permit by the Environmental Protection Agency under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act; determination of impacts on endangered species by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service; and separate reviews under state and local government regulations.

The reasons for lack of coordination include separate and overlapping federal environmental laws, legislative committee jurisdictions, and implementing agency responsibilities; the large number of federal, state, and local agencies involved in decisionmaking; the gap between environmental agency responsibilities and the staff and budget resources to undertake the job; inadequate processes for accommodating differences; and inadequate communication and public participation.

2. The present federal decisionmaking rules and procedures too often result in delay, wasted effort and money, lost opportunities to accommodate both environmental protection and infrastructure objectives, prolonged litigation, and more

environmental costs within the total project costs that should be shared among all of the benefitted parties.

The EIS and permit processes are fundamentally different from each other. An EIS may provide valuable information for project design, open the review process to public comment, delay a project, add to a project's costs, or stop a project on procedural grounds. The permit (or license or grant review) decision focuses on two alternative results: either a project is allowed to proceed or it is stopped. While mitigation can be negotiated in the permit process, frequently there is much greater opportunity for affected parties to be involved in the EIS process. In some instances, permitting, licensing, and funding requirements take precedence over the findings of an EIS.

Under some federal laws, such as the Clean Air Act, Clean Water Act, Endangered Species Act, and Department of Transportation Act, a federal permit, license, or grant may not be approved if the project does not comply fully with very specific uniform standards for protecting wetlands, endangered species, and air or water purity. Assessments prepared to support federal permits and grantmaking decisions often include data gathering and analysis similar to, but separate from, an EIS. However, the permit or grant review analysis is designed to determine on much narrower grounds whether the proposed project meets specific regulatory requirements.

In addition to these procedural differences, federal environmental laws and regulations encompass two types of criteria for approving a public works project or for selecting the "best" project alternative. First, laws such as NEPA and the Federal Power Act (and Electric Consumers Protection Act) call for balancing environmental, economic, and social objectives. But others, such as effluent standards under the Clean Air and Clean Water Acts, wetlands "dredge and fill" regulations under Section 404 of the Clean Water Act, and the Endangered Species Act, apply definitive environmental standards irrespective of other needs. These definitive standards emphasize the potential to veto rather

(a) developing a coherent strategy for avoiding or mitigating conflicts between environmental protection and public works goals, based on:

- consideration of environmental protection goals at all stages of planning, design, and implementation, beginning from the earliest stages before alternative projects are developed or considered;
- comparative environmental risk assessments;
- nonstructural and other project designs that do not lead to environmental permit and review problems;
- sound ecosystem management practices; and
- a clear, scientifically informed understanding of the environmental and project costs;

(b) requiring federal agencies to cooperate with all the parties to identify as early as possible a project-specific list of the criteria to be applied to the evaluation of a project, including the benefits inherent in the need and purpose of the project and the benefits to accrue from mitigating the environmental impacts of projects. The criteria should be clearly related to federal statutory authorization and sufficiently specific for the state or local government project sponsor to make responsive decisions regarding alternatives, mitigation, and project modifications. State and local governments should be able to rely on the fact that these criteria, to be applied to the evaluation of a project, once established, will not change except as required by law or modification of the project application;

(c) directing each federal agency to exercise its permitting, grantmaking, licensing, and evaluation responsibilities in a cooperative, consultative

The "record of decision" requirement in NEPA provides a good model for this procedure.

RECOMMENDATION 2: Administration of Environmental Decisionmaking by Executive Order

The Commission finds that additional coordination of federal environmental decisionmaking activities can be achieved within the existing statutory framework of the National Environmental Policy Act if that goal is supported by strong presidential leadership. Indeed, improved coordination under this act was begun with an executive order in 1977 that expanded the role of the Council on Environmental Quality. Additional steps under this act, however, still need to be taken.

The Commission recommends, therefore, that the President issue an executive order going as far as present law will allow to achieve a coherent strategy within the executive branch for avoiding or mitigating conflicts between environmental protection and public works goals as outlined in Recommendation 1 of this report. This executive order should be administered by the Council on Environmental Quality.

RECOMMENDATION 3: Integration of Federal Pollution Control Laws

The Commission finds that the nation's pollution control laws are fragmented, overlapping, and often contradictory. State and local governments seeking the best answers to air quality, water quality, and waste disposal problems find it difficult to administer their programs in ways that are responsive to the natural relationships that exist between these three media because they are separated legally. These separations

programs by the federal government and innovative ways to monitor state activities without undue paperwork are additional factors in encouraging states to seek delegated powers.

The Commission recommends, therefore, that the federal government encourage the states to administer a greater number of federal environmental standards with appropriate safeguards and oversight. Furthermore, to encourage states to accept delegation of federal programs, the federal government should institute funding and program changes and give assurances that the states will not be arbitrarily overruled.

RECOMMENDATION 5: Federal and State Use of Environmental Mediation for Dispute Resolution and Negotiated Rulemaking

The Commission finds that when environmental regulations are written with sensitivity to diverse viewpoints on many matters of interpretation, the number and nature of disputes that may arise when the regulations are implemented can be reduced significantly. Negotiated rulemaking procedures are a promising means of achieving this result. The Commission found examples of success with this procedure.

When disagreements over public works projects cannot be resolved through normal administrative channels, alternative dispute-resolution methods offer another means of avoiding costly, lengthy, winner-take-all litigation. Dispute resolution has been used in several cases that included political controversies, a long time horizon, many stakeholders, and complex issues. Dispute resolution can be expected to reduce

RECOMMENDATION 6: Federal Reimbursement of Mandated Environmental Protection Costs

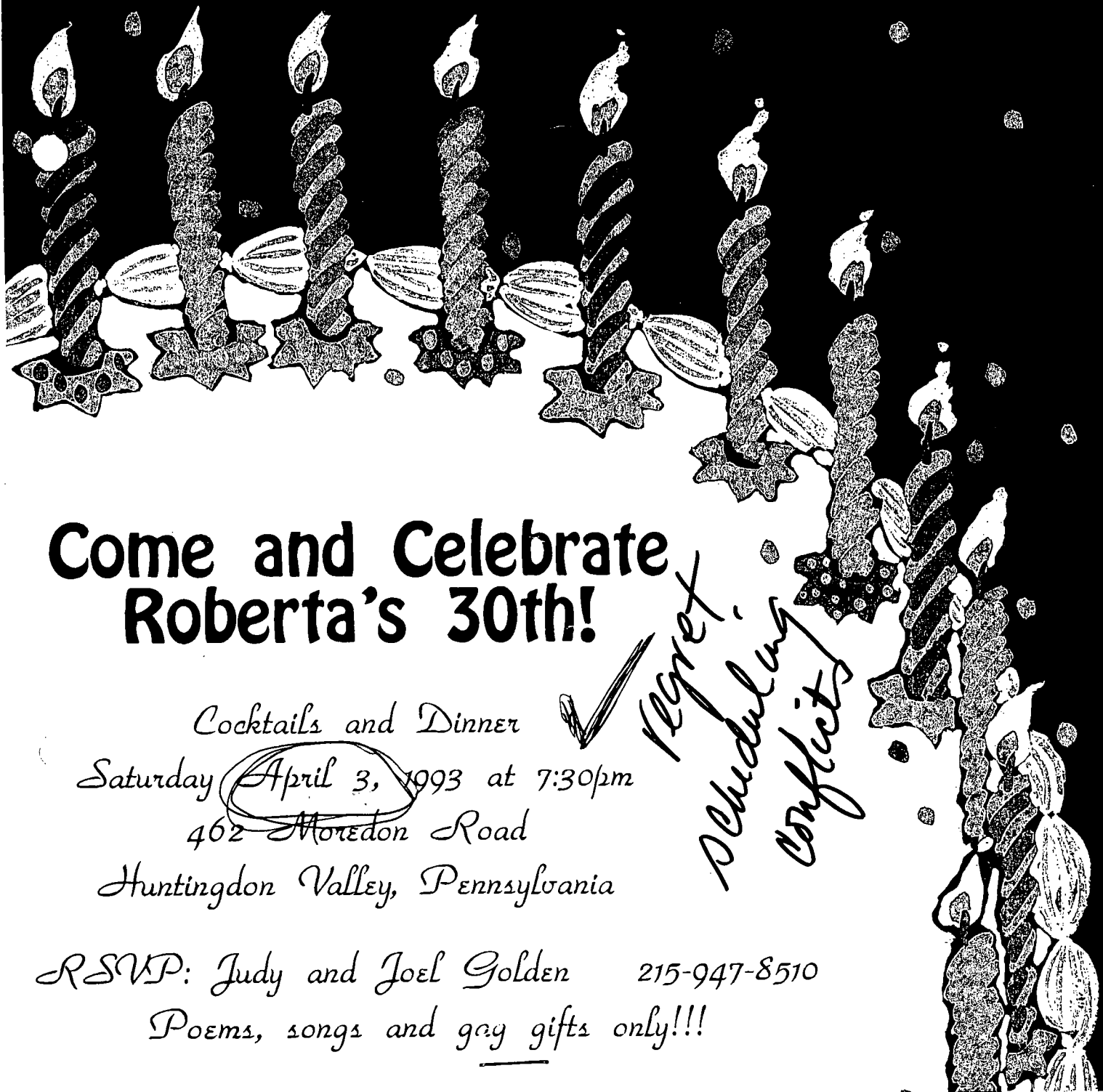
The Commission finds that the costs to state and local governments of complying with many federal environmental protection requirements are high, and that many state and local governments have difficulty financing the necessary expenditures. In some cases, federal standards and regulations do not allow state and local governments to comply with these requirements in the most efficient and cost-effective ways.

The Commission recommends, therefore, that the Congress and the President enact legislation requiring the federal government to reimburse state and local governments for the additional costs of complying with federal environmental standards, over and above the costs of providing strictly state, local, and private benefits. The costs to be shared equitably among all of the benefitted parties should include the full costs of maintaining healthy and stable ecologies over the long run.

RECOMMENDATION 7: The Scientific Basis for Ecological Management

The Commission finds that management of specific ecosystems may offer better prospects for balancing environmental protection and public works needs than a series of individual and unrelated standards for protecting single-media environmental resources. Ecosystem management includes a collection of operational strategies and land-use decisions that attempt to sustain the functions of a healthy environment, even if parts of the ecosystem are separated by political or land ownership boundaries. 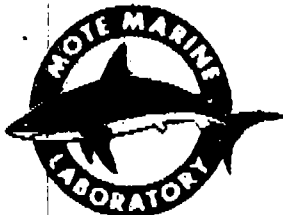

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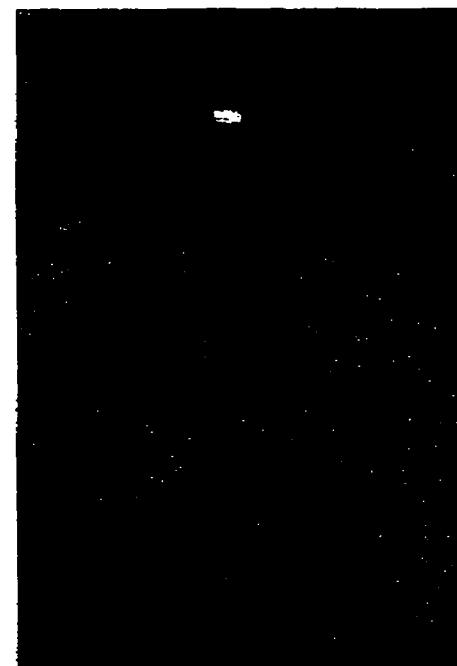

Thank you for meeting with Allen Hershkowitz, Clifford Case and me yesterday to discuss recycling and the Clinton Administration's environmental agenda. As we stated yesterday, we believe that cities and environmental organizations can organize into a very effective "recycling coalition" with the Administration's help.

Toward that end, Rep. Al Swift, Chair of the House Subcommittee on Transportation and Hazardous Materials, and Senator Max Baucus, Chair of the Environment and Public Works Committee, have both agreed to speak at a major national recycling conference on April 1, 1993 at the Capital Hilton, here in Washington, D.C. The recycling conference is cosponsored by the United States Conference of Mayors, its affiliate the Municipal Waste Management Association, and the National Association of Counties, all of which have endorsed the President's economic plan in its entirety. We expect an audience of 250 made up of mayors, county commissioners and public works directors and sanitation commissioners that are responsible for designing recycling programs locally. It was at this meeting last year that we developed the idea that eventually evolved into the Dingell/Bilirakis Newsprint Amendment that would have required the nation's largest newspaper publishers to use recycled-content newsprint.

We believe this Conference represents an excellent opportunity for the Administration to signal its interest in promoting recycling, particularly with the key congressional members present. We had invited Administrator Browner, but her schedule does not allow

her to attend. We would be most interested in having the Vice-President stop by to kick-off the Conference, or to have you represent the Administration's support for recycling. I fear that the Administration's absence may inadvertantly be interpreted as a lack of interest, and based on our conversation yesterday, I know that is not your intent.

We would obviously adjust our schedule to fit yours, but would be most appreciative if you could kick-off the Conference at 9:00 a.m. Thursday, April 1, 1993. Your total time commitment should be no more than 30 minutes.

These companies explore for and produce natural gas and crude oil in all of the major basins of the United States. DPC members are committed to the economic development of our nation's oil and gas resources in an environmentally responsible manner.

DPC members are distinct from the major integrated energy companies that not only produce oil and gas but also refine it into petroleum products and market these products through retail outlets, such as gasoline stations. DPC companies are principally in the business of finding and producing oil and gas.

DPC members are also distinct from the large number of smaller—often family-owned—independents. DPC members are substantial corporations and, for the most part, are owned by holders of publicly-traded stock and run by boards of directors. Because of their size and focus, DPC companies account for a very large percentage of the U.S. independents' oil and gas exploration and production expenditures.

Formed in 1975, DPC has historically focused on a narrow range of federal legislative and regulatory issues having a dis-

tinct impact on its membership. Recent efforts have been directed at changing discriminatory provisions of the tax code, preserving state control over the regulation of wastes generated in the exploration and production of oil and natural gas, and developing a sound national energy policy.

DPC has always advocated a free market framework for the domestic oil and gas industry and believes that the role of the government is to provide a stable regulatory and tax environment that is equitable to all who participate in supplying this country's energy needs. Federally-directed choices of fuels and technologies through fiscal policy or control programs are seen as creating market inefficiencies that only serve to distort the economy.

The United States now depends on other countries for nearly 50 percent of its daily oil requirements. If this trend continues, by 2010 imports will rise to 70 percent of our daily oil consumption. Importing oil means exporting wealth and jobs. In the past ten years, the U.S. oil and gas industry has lost 350,000 jobs—more than any other industry. To help counter this trend, the United States must promote the development and use of our domestic energy resources. DPC looks forward to working with the new Administration and Congress on approaches that will accomplish these goals.

THE SOUTHERN STATES ALTERNATIVE FUELS COALITION
A QUICK OVERVIEW PREPARED
BY SOUTHERN STATES ENERGY BOARD

WHAT'S HAPPENING?

The Southern States Energy Board is creating a Southern States Alternative Fuels Coalition. This group will consist of state officials named by their governors, federal and local governments, industry and non-profit organizations and environmental groups.

MISSION OF THE SOUTHERN STATES ALTERNATIVE FUELS COALITION

The mission of the Coalition is to develop and promote a program for producing, distributing and utilizing alternative fuels in the residential, commercial, industrial and governmental sectors of the economy of the southern region. Immediate emphasis will be placed on the development and expansion of state, local and private fleet vehicles to natural gas. Policies that foster approaches to the utilization of alternative fuels will be vigorously pursued. The Coalition will stimulate implementation of programs for alternative fuels utilization (encouraging fleet purchase mandates; analyzing the potential for job creation; promoting expansion of natural gas pipeline capacity, etc.).

WHY A REGIONAL COALITION?

1. A cooperative and coordinated multi-state effort is best to speed the implementation of alternative transportation fuels into the marketplace.
2. It is easier to generate focused educational programs on a regional basis rather than state by state.
3. A cooperative effort helps industry to reduce costs which will be higher if individual ventures are undertaken.
4. The new Energy Policy Act of 1992 sets procurement goals which can more easily be met through a regional approach.
5. The legislative requirements of federal law and barriers at the state level can be addressed and complied with more easily through a focused, regional effort.
6. Control of the development of an alternative fuels economy is placed in the hands of government and industry working cooperatively.
7. A regional Coalition sets a structure in place that allows for the orderly and rational entry of local governments when legislation requires them to take action.
8. The coalition approach establishes a body that can comment on proposed laws and regulations in a manner that supports regional interests more so than individual industry or government agency concerns.
9. The regional approach can target corridors along key interstates and identify obvious refueling sites. This can have an immediate effect on refueling during interstate travel and build public confidence in the availability and stability of alternative fuels.
10. An alternative fuels coalition encourages regulated gas companies to participate on a pace that is commensurate with their resource/business plans.
11. Major natural gas suppliers can target their resources more efficiently and effectively when a regional coalition identifies market areas that should be the focus of activity.
12. A regional coalition can set the stage for fuel neutrality enabling market decisions to drive fuel choice rather than governmental requirements.

13. Public and private fleet operations will be a focus for the Coalition. Once target growth areas are identified, governors can assist in developing fleet markets for alternative fuels.

ORGANIZATIONAL MEETING

An organizational meeting of the Southern States Alternative Fuels Coalition will be held at the Hyatt Regency Atlanta Airport on April 7. Current plans are to begin the program with a keynote address by Governor Lawton Chiles. This will be followed by a federal response and we are talking with Ms. Kathleen McGinty, President Clinton's Environmental Counselor. This will be followed by an industry response at the luncheon by Mr. T. Boone Pickens of Mesa Petroleum and Mr. Pickens is confirmed. After lunch a working session will be held to discuss the strategic plan in more detail and receive commitments from industry to work with us in this venture. The program will begin at 10:00 AM and adjourn by 4:00 PM.

WHAT HAS HAPPENED SO FAR

Last week we mailed out a letter signed by six southern governors (Chiles, Wilder, Walters, Richards, Miller and Campbell). The letter initially was sent to the remaining southern governors asking them to designate a representative to be at the meeting on April 7. The same letter, editorially revised, was mailed to 30 heads of industry that were targeted because of their obvious stakeholder interest in alternative fuels. For instance, Mr. John Brabson of Peoples Gas already has agreed to attend. Attached is the industry mailing list for your perusal.

This week our staff will be phoning state officials to ensure their attendance. We also will be talking to industry and attempting, as much as possible, to firm up the meeting program.

I am writing on behalf of Dr. Riki Ott, Mr. Stan Stephens and Mr. Rick Steiner, three Alaskans who live in Prince William Sound and are active in helping to protect the Alaskan environment. Dr. Ott, Mr. Stephens and Mr. Steiner seek the opportunity to visit your office to discuss oil spill prevention issues critical to Alaska. They will be in Washington, D.C. the week of April 19-23.

Dr. Ott is President of the Oil Reform Alliance, a coalition of commercial fishing and environmental organizations which formed after the Exxon Valdez oil spill for the purpose of reforming oil industry practices. Dr. Ott has a masters and doctorate in marine pollution. She fishes commercially in Prince William Sound.

Mr. Stephens is President of the Prince William Sound Regional Citizens' Advisory Council, an organization established pursuant to the Oil Pollution Act of 1990 to oversee Trans-Alaska Pipeline System (TAPS) operations in Port Valdez. Dr. Stephens operates a charter boat business from Valdez.

Mr. Steiner is an Associate Professor of Fisheries with the University of Alaska and its extension office in Cordova and a fisherman in Prince William Sound. Mr. Steiner helped to define the scope of the Oil Pollution Act of 1990, including the formation of the Regional Citizens' Advisory Council, and was involved in behind-the-scenes activities that led to the \$900 million civil settlement between Exxon and the state and federal governments.

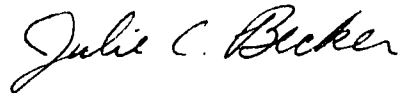
They have summarized their concerns in a 36-page report entitled Status Report on Alaska's Oil Industry: A Blueprint for Improving Performance which addresses North Slope, TAPS pipeline and TAPS trade tankers, and inadequate spill prevention measures (tug escort). The Status Report also describes the aftermath of the Exxon Valdez oil spill. Please let me know if you have not yet seen the Status Report and would like a copy.

Their concerns focus on long-term and ongoing damage to fish and wildlife; damage to fishermen, Natives and municipalities; squandering of civil settlement monies; damage to cleanup workers' health; and lack of followup with requirements of the Oil Pollution Act of 1990. Dr. Ott, Mr. Stephens and Mr. Steiner would welcome the opportunity to share not only their concerns with you, but also their solutions. They firmly believe that none of these problems are insurmountable, but that the issues must be addressed before the oil industry is allowed into other environmentally sensitive areas of Alaska -- notably the outer continental shelf lands.

I trust that you will want to meet with this extraordinary and dedicated group, and would appreciate your contacting me at the telephone number above to set up a meeting date. Just so you know, I have also sent a letter to Trey Lindseth requesting a meeting with Katie McGinty.

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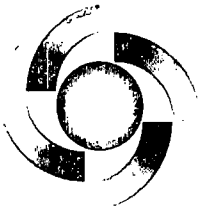
