• BELOW-COST TIMBER SALES POLICY

Senate Agriculture, Nutrition and Forestry - Subcommittee on Agricultural Research, Conservation, Forestry and General Legislation

In attendance: Tom Daschle (D-SD) [chair], Larry Craig (R-ID), Judd Gregg (R-NH), Patrick Leahy (D-VT) and Max Baucus (D-MT).

The Senate subcommittee on agricultural research, conservation, forestry and general legislation held a hearing on "below cost" timber sales (BCTS) by the U.S. Forest Service. Early this year the Administration expressed its intention to phase out these money-losing sales to save \$46 million in fiscal 1994. The phase-out of BCTS was not included in the Administration's budget bill but the matter may be pursued regulatorily.

Jim Lyons gave a brief overview of the Administration's proposed policy. He explained that a task force will be convened to review BCTSs. Michael Francis of The Wilderness Society argued that the BCTS system should be eliminated "to stop the drain on the Treasury" and prevent environmental damage. James Riley of the Intermountain Forest Industries Association supported BCTSs due to: 1) the extra law enforcement required by Earth First and 2) the injunctions which prevent any cutting.

Remarks were made by Senators Daschle, Craig, Gregg, Leahy and Baucus. They all generally supported BCTSs, citing the loss of jobs, increased importation of timber, and the move would only treat symptoms of poor management. There was recognition that the system could be improved with reduced accounting costs, ecosystem management and possibly the prevention of some BCTSs.

• MANAGEMENT PROBLEMS AND CONTRACTING ACTIVITIES AT EPA LABS

House Government Operations, Subcommittee on Environment, Energy and Natural Resources

In attendance: Jimmy Hayes (D-LA) [sitting as Chair], John Mica (R-FL)

EPA labs have become increasingly dependent upon outside contractors and assistance. According to the EPA Inspector General

(IG) John C. Martin, this over-reliance has fostered an unhealthy relationship between EPA personnel and on-site contractors. As a result, contracts are often awarded to favored incumbents without the opportunity for fair and open competition. The IG feels that this problem is more one of mismanagement than of a criminal nature.

Several of the 12 EPA Laboratories have been cited for obstruction of IG official audits. These cases have involved stonewalling, staff-coaching in preparation for Federal audits and "cleansing" official documents.

Rep. Mica recently, (along with 27 other members) wrote to the Vice President and Attorney General requesting action and improved agency performance. He has also recommended a joint EPA and DOJ task force to pursue these matters.

Administrator Browner submitted a letter to the Subcommittee underscoring her interest in resolving the Agency's contract and resource management problems. She also stressed the importance of Agency-wide responsibility and accountability.

• CLIMATE CHANGE MITIGATION

Senate Energy and Natural Resources (full)

The main purpose of this hearing was for the Committee to gather information on the status and proceedings of the Administration's work on global climate change mitigation. Sec. O'Leary spoke on the President's goals and reported on the June 10-11 conference. Robert Sussman explained the process that would be utilized in reaching the stated goal of emissions reduction (i.e. the purposes of the IAT and the CCMG).

Questions and concerns of Committee members:

- Joint implementation was expressed as the most cost-effective means to reduce net GHG emissions (Johnston). O'Leary's response was that joint implementation should be analyzed but that credit for reductions in emissions should not be considered until after 2000.
- O'Leary committed to "stabilization" but not necessarily to "continuation" of downward trends, at least until the final analyses can be done.
- A series of questions on the uncertainty in the science of global warming, both the predicted temperature increases and

the effects of these increases (**Bennett, Wallop**), although several at the table accepted the science as basically accurate.

- Interest in knowing more about economic issues and the cost-effectiveness analyses that will be part of the process.
- Appropriateness of the U.S committing to targets that were not required by the Rio treaty and that are in advance of any other developed country.
- **Johnston** questioned the status of nuclear power in the deliberations, given that no mention of nuclear was made in anyone's testimony. O'Leary said it was an oversight in preparation of her testimony and that nuclear will be analyzed.
- The Committee questioned the apparent haste with which the policy is being analyzed and finalized.
- Several comments were made on the lack of Congressional interaction to date.
- **Wallop** questioned the precedent of other countries having the right to acquire U.S. technology, but he was apparently confusing the Biodiversity and the Framework Convention treaties.
- In the context of the baseline, the gas tax currently being considered was predicted to produce only a quarter of the emission reductions of the Btu tax.
- Outstanding: **Harlan Mathews (D-TN)** submitted written questions that were not read at the hearing.

I am beginning to make files on every Senator, House member and Committee so that our office can be fully prepared when Katie or others on our staff have to meet, write or take phone calls from the Hill. Please either let me know verbally (or preferably in a memo that I can keep on file) at the end of each week what contacts you have had with Congressional people. This is very important so that our office is speaking with one voice -- and it makes my life easier when last minute congressional briefings/actions come up. If you are contacted by a Congressional person and would like background, that's what I'm here for.

One final point. As many of you know, OMB sends out legislative referrals. LR's offer our office the chance to comment on any bill, testimony or questions submitted by any executive branch office or agency. They are very important to keep our administration speaking with one voice. **Most of these LR's -- with limited exceptions -- should continue to come to me first.** I log them into my calendar by date of comment needed, and then either farm them out to staff or deal with the LR myself. If you don't have comments for me, simply give the LR back and mark no comment. If you do comment, keep a record of what you what changed and then fax it to OMB. Then make me a copy of the testimony for my files and keep one for yourself. I have begun to keep all these LR files in the far upper left cabinet above my desk. They are labelled by "agency -- subject". They are very handy as quick reference to what the Administration policy is on any given subject. Please remember to meet the deadlines on these in your area if I give them to you..

CONGRESSIONAL ACTION:

o Appointments.

Here are the folks who had confirmation hearings last week: Bob Sussman, Deputy Administrator EPA, Jim Baca, BLM director, Bob Armstrong, Ass't Sec for Land and Minerals at Interior, Bonnie Cohen, Ass't Sec for Policy and Budget, Interior, and Jim Lyons, Ass't Sec for natural Resources, Ag.

o Appropriations.

Hearings have been going on all week. Interior, Ag, Commerce and Energy all appeared before the House to talk about their budgets.

o California Desert.

The bill to designate 8 million acres of protected wilderness in the California desert has been on the table for over 10 years. But hostile Republican administrations and a lack of consensus within the California delegation have doomed this bill every year. Last year Senator Gore was an original cosponsor.

This year, however, with two democratic Senators, and our administration, this bill is expected to pass. Babbitt testified in favor at the Senate Energy Subcommittee on public lands. DOD has also been brought along board in support of the wilderness designation although they originally did not want to. (NOTE that OEP concurred with Interior and Ag in statements to OMB that DOD should alter their original testimony that they wanted to submit to the Senate. This testimony contradicted what Interior was going to say and DOD indicated that they wanted substantial changes in the desert bill. We said that the changes already made in the bill concerning adequate flyways for military overflights had been made. DOD finally agreed to change its position. Interior was much appreciative of our help.)

This bill does face opposition by miners, the 30 ranchers who have land, and off road vehicle enthusiasts that currently use the BLM land.

o Clean cars.

The Senate environment subcommittee on clean air held a hearing this week focusing on government and industry initiatives to develop cleaner-running automobiles such as electric cars and vehicles powered by compressed natural gas. Although it was mentioned that the Clinton Administration may be involved in discussions with the automobile industry to promote research partnerships aimed at designing low-pollution technologically advanced automobiles, this hearing focused mainly on currently known initiatives and on implications that developing clean cars has for US industry in the world market. Other topics for discussion were the California waiver under the Clean Air Act and its implication for the auto industry and the auto parts recycling business. See me for testimony.

o Clean Water.

Browner will testify next week on the Clean Water Act. Her testimony will emphasize the need for watershed protection, pollution prevention, and increasing funding for state enforcement of water laws.

o Drinking Water.

House Energy is marked up this week a plan to create a four year, \$3.6 billion program to help state and local governments finance construction of drinking water treatment facilities. The recent incident in Milwaukee - where an outbreak of intestinal disease was caused by poor water filtration - spurred this quick action. Additionally, a recent GAO report (see me if you want) concluded that states are doing a poor job of keeping contaminants out of drinking water because they lack sufficient funds.

The bill is a joint Dingell/Waxman measure that may go to the House floor in the next few weeks. The bill embodies a proposal in our 1994 budget to provide \$599 million in federal funds next year and \$1 billion annually for the following three years to help states comply with the Safe Drinking Water Act. The money would be distributed by the EPA to the states to establish revolving funds which in turn would provide low interest loans to communities for drinking water treatment projects. The proposal is patterned after the revolving loan funds established for wastewater treatment projects under the Clean Water Act. One important aspect of the plan requires smaller water supply systems that can consolidate with a larger system to do so. Federal funds would not be available for capital improvements on smaller systems that did not consolidate. Investor owned public water systems are also eligible for the loans.

o Energy.

Fusion research at the Department of Energy was reviewed in a hearing this week. We have asked for a cut of 47% in all nuclear energy research except fusion, and the House Science Subcommittee on energy reviewed the status of current fusion research.

o EPA Cabinet Level.

This bill is struggling along through the Senate and looks like it will pass relatively unscathed. It has been the object of several hostile Republican amendments, included one to require a 'economic impact assessment' for every new regulations or executive rule, one that would require an offset in cost for every new rule and one that would establish a separate Regional EPA Administrator for Alaska. Those all failed. However, amendments to provide more technical assistance to small businesses and governments, to use cost-benefit analysis when feasible, and to establish an Assistant Secretary for Indian Affairs passed. Roth passed a amendment making the abbreviation of the Department the DEP -- which apparently Administrator Browner is upset about because she wanted USDE. More troubling was the amendment by Johnston that codified that nutty Bush executive order requiring the impact of decreased wages because of regulation on health and safety concerns to be figured into cost

benefit analysis (ie if somebody makes less money, he's less likely to live as long). On Tuesday, we face several more amendments, including the Dole takings amendment (which will not have a vote, but rather is for discussion only), and a Bond wetlands amendment to move wetlands regulatory authority from the EPA and Corps to the Soil Conservation Service (which we strongly oppose). Vote on the final passage will be Tuesday night. Enviro's have been edgy so far about all the amendments that are being attached, but I think we will get them to support the final bill.

The House began hearings in the Government Ops committee this week, which I attended. Chairman Conyers wants environmental justice to be attached to the House bill (elevate the Environmental Justice office to be under the Secretary, form a citizen's advisory board to the EPA) which Administrator Browner is now favorably disposed toward. This is not in the Senate version and would have to be resolved in committee.

o Grazing.

The GAO issued a report this week that found that grazing on lands owned by the US Forest Service is dominated by larger operations rather than small family ranches. Among the findings of the report: one of the largest operations profiting from low grazing fees is the Sieben Ranch in Montana, partly owned by Max Baucus.

Today is the first of several hearings on grazing fees that are being conducted by Sec. Babbitt. The three other hearings will be held next week. The hearings will explore possible rate increases and how to improve land management practices on the range.

o High Speed Rail.

Transportation Sec. Pena announced yesterday, 4-29, a five year \$1.3 billion plan to create Federal state partnerships to develop high speed train service in highly populated corridors.

o Mining law.

After Clinton decided to pursue the change in mining royalties through administrative means, rather than through the budget, interest has been high in mining law reform. Senator Bumpers introduced his environmentalist-backed bill, S. 257, that would charge mining royalties of 8%, and set federal standards for mine reclamation. An industry backed bill with smaller royalties and no reclamation standards was introduced 4/5 by Craig, Wallop, Bennett, Burns, Hatch and Stevens. (This is the bill we succeeded in peeling Reid and Bryan away from).

This week, Sec. Babbitt testified before the House that the Administration still wants a 12.5% royalty and that it should be applied retroactively to existing mines. He retracted that statement Thursday saying it was probably not a serious suggestion.

o Recreation fees.

As part of the budget proposal, the Administration recommended higher recreation fees for the use of public lands, such as entrance fees at national monuments. OMB says this collection of fees would generate \$346 million over the next five years. A hearing was held at the House Natural Resource Subcommittee for National Parks this week on the proposal. Environmentalists are generally supported but want the fees to be channelled back into the parks for restoration and maintenance.

o Superfund.

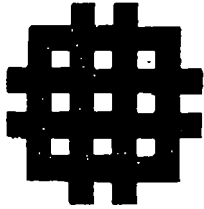
Environmentalists now are urging Senate Democrats to delay Superfund Reauthorization in favor of letting EPA address the program's problems administratively. In a letter to Senate EPW Chair Max Baucus, seven major environmental groups asked Congress to allow EPA the time to make administrative changes in the Superfund and Safe Drinking Water Act. Environmentalists may be afraid that a complete overhaul of Superfund may be inevitable, including laying the polluter pays principle on the table. Enviro's are pushing more for a recycling bill independent of SARA/ CERCLA or RCRA reauthorizations, then a monetary reauthorization for CERCLA in 1995 when it's slated to run out.

The House Science subcommittee on oversight held two hearings focusing on obstacles to using innovative technologies in cleaning up hazardous waste sites. The hearing was convened by Jimmy Hayes (D-La) to determine whether the Superfund law makes it too difficult to bring new technologies into use at site cleanups. GAO, OTA, and EPA, as well as contractors and Clean Sites Inc. testified. The key problem in using new technologies was identified as risk aversion -- companies don't want to pay more for untested technology.

Q's & A's on Biodiversity Convention

Q. What were the problems with the treaty last year--why didn't Bush sign it then?

A. The Bush Administration over-reacted to the ambiguities of the treaty. Instead of working with leaders in industry and the environmental community to find solutions, they just stone-walled and refused to sign.

Q. Have the industry and environmental groups been consulted on this approach to signing the treaty?

A. ^{we have} Yes. My Office on Environmental Policy has worked with leaders in the pharmaceutical and biotechnology industries and in the environmental community. Some of them have played a very active role in helping us to understand the key concerns of the industry and in helping us find a way to sign the treaty that also protects the patent and other rights of our industry.

Q. Can you release the draft interpretative statement?

A. No, we're not releasing it at this time, because it is the subject of discussions with other governments. We will release it as soon as we have completed those discussions.

Q. When will you submit the treaty to the Senate for ratification?

A. As soon as we complete the discussions with other governments, so that we have an approach to an interpretative statement that we feel will have broader support.

Q. How long is that going to take? Will it be done in 1993?

A. We have already begun these discussions with some of the European leaders who were here two weeks ago. We want to complete them soon--and certainly expect it well before the end of the year.
