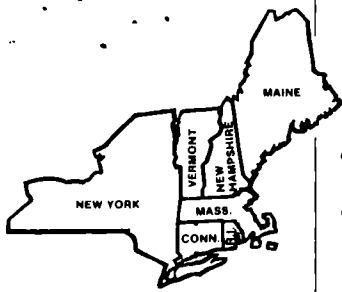

Dear Director McGinty:

The continued availability of timber supply is on the minds of retail lumber dealers from Albany, NY, to Augusta, ME, and throughout the United States. We have witnessed the closure of federal harvestable forest lands over the past five years, have directly felt the impact of record high lumber prices and watch our industry's economic base shrink. At the moment we are looking towards the future and it is questionable at best.

We would like your help with this very important issue. As part of the NRLA 100th Anniversary Celebration, a Second Annual Forest Resources Forum will be held. The purpose of the forum is to provide an arena where policymakers, retailers, educators and scientists can join together and develop a workable solution to balancing the economy and the environment.

The forum is schedule for Friday and Saturday, Jan. 14-15, 1993, at the World Trade Center in Boston, MA. I invite you to participate in a panel discussion with Sen. Patrick J. Leahy (D-VT) and Rep. Billy Tauzin (D-LA). The panel would be moderated by NRLA First Vice-President K. David Hancock, Hancock Lumber, Casco, ME. Sen. Leahy and Rep. Tauzin at this time are invited speakers. The panel is scheduled for Friday, Jan. 14, 1993, from 2:00 p.m. - 3:00 p.m.

This letter is being mailed to you the day before the administration is due to release its policy recommendations to break the gridlock that has tied up the forest lands in the Pacific Northwest. The retail lumber industry was very supportive of the President's Forest Summit and through our dealings with the American Forest and Paper Association, hope to continue to work with the Clinton administration on the issue of timber supply for the future.

Western Washington University will host an important international conference titled, "Georgia Basin-Puget Sound-Willamette Valley International Conference: Building Bridges to Sustainable Communities" on September 8-11, 1993. We would be honored to have you address our general session at 9:00 a.m. on September 9.

The focus of the conference is the urbanization challenge facing the metropolitan region stretching from Vancouver Island in British Columbia through the coastal corridor of Washington to the Willamette Valley in Oregon. With the population of this binational corridor expected to double in the next 25 years, we face the enormous challenge of preserving a high level of environmental quality while maintaining and fostering economic vitality. We are especially excited that the conference encompasses the international regions of Canada and the United States where there is a demonstrated determination to work together to achieve common goals. In fact, we think this determination is so strong that with strong initiatives at this time we have a chance to make this unique corner of the planet a living laboratory for the rest of the world.

We are pleased that the "Rio to the Capitols" sustainable development conference in Kentucky last May designated our September conference as the official follow-up event for the Northwest region. In Canada, the recent Georgia Basin Initiative Report, published by the B.C. Round Table on the Environment and the Economy speaks to the need for greater cross-border cooperation to deal with the serious environmental and economic problems common to this part of North America.

I am a contributor and environmental columnist for Governing Magazine. In addition to monthly columns, I write occasional feature stories and Governing Guides that the magazine publishes on environmental issues that concern state and local government officials.

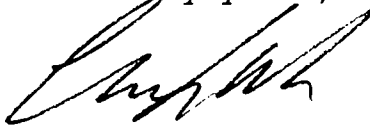

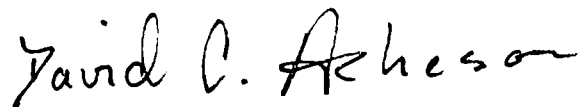

On behalf of the Prof. Antonino Zichichi, Director of the Majorana Center for Scientific Culture, Erice, Sicily I wish to invite you to address the 14th International Seminar on Planetary Emergencies concerning the public policy approaches to the control of CO₂, ozone, and other greenhouse gases. The meetings will take place from 20 - 23 August, 1993. The specific time of your presentation would be set for your convenience.

Each year under the sponsorship of the President of the Italian Council of Ministers, this Seminar, chaired by Prof. Zichichi, brings together senior scientific and science policy leaders from the United States, Europe, the former Soviet Union, and China to explore means of international cooperation to ameliorate potentially grave threats to our planet. This year we again expect prominent representatives of the Russian and Chinese governments; having a senior U. S. government official would be an appropriate means of articulating the Administration's vision of environmental preservation in an international, yet informal forum.

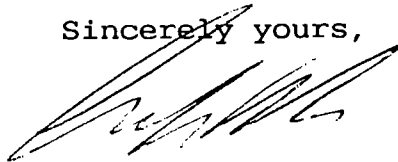

The years 1994 and 1995 will be very meaningful both socially and politically in North America and Europe. The importance of these dates for environmental issues will be underscored during the elections on both continents, when the theme will either be taken up or given more weight.

3. The location

The choice of Washington, D.C., as the conference site will be justified by its cultural-political location on the North American continent. Because of this position, Washington will be able to assume the role of a catalyst of trends and ideas on the topic.

Goals:

Environmental protection and the world of entrepreneurs: A Dialogue

The environmental conscience in Europe, especially that in Germany, has developed an intensity and function widely unknown to the American public. American entrepreneurs, particularly since the Earth Summit in Rio in 1992, have put their hopes on responsible environmental policies with a global horizon.

The impression that vital elements are threatened is universal. Since the 1980s, there have been movements opposing the destruction of the environment in numerous countries, and, because the environment is so threatened, they appeal to the collective conscience.

I have the pleasure of writing, on behalf of the Board of Governors of the Federal Circuit Bar Association and the Association's membership, to extend an invitation to participate in the Association's annual meeting on June 17, 1993. The Natural Resources Committee of the Circuit Bar, which includes governmental, environmental, and economic interest practitioners in these bars, would welcome your perspective on environmental and natural resources issues at its annual meeting on the 17th. The meeting will be held, along with other activities, at the Washington Hilton, here in the District of Columbia. Typically, attendance includes not only practitioners but also law clerks and representatives of the Bench.

As your own experience with these courts would confirm, the Association's meeting is the first day of two days of annual events holding great significance for practitioners in the United States Court of Appeals for the Federal Circuit and its constituent national trial tribunals, including the United States Court of Federal Claims (CFC). On the following day, June 18, Chief Justice Rehnquist will address the Federal Circuit's annual judicial conference plenary session, and Attorney General Reno will be the luncheon speaker.

Over the past several years, practice before the Circuit and the CFC has come to have enormous interest for those of us involved in environmental and natural resources issues. Subject to the Supreme Court, jurisprudence developed in these courts guides the federal government through the relationship between implementation of environmental programs, on the one hand, and lawsuit claims that that implementation occasions regulatory takings, on the

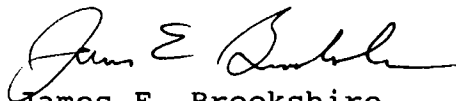
other. Given their national jurisdiction, these tribunals regularly "make" this significant area of the law for the United States. For these reasons as well as recent developments in regulatory takings caselaw, interest is intense.

That interest has spurred the development of an active Natural Resources Committee of the Federal Circuit Bar Association and a number of balanced programs exploring environmental issues. Last year's annual meeting focused, for instance, on the Chesapeake Bay and wetlands concerns. More recently, academicians, practitioners and the General Counsel for the National Audubon Society gathered in San Francisco to focus on developments in the caselaw itself.

The program on June 17 has enough flexibility to accommodate a focus of your choosing for your remarks and, although scheduled for 10:00 - 11:00 a.m., could be easily adjusted to your availability. I would be glad to furnish any additional information you might wish. I also believe that the Honorable H. Robert Mayer of the Circuit would be pleased to address any questions you might have about the judicial conference and the Association's activities.

On behalf of the national membership of the Association, I hope that you will be able to join us here at the Hilton on June 17 and later that evening for the reception sponsored by the Association for the judges of the courts.

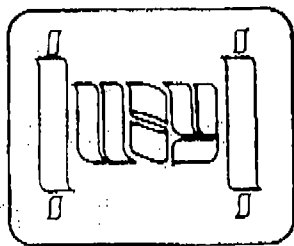
We have a room reserved in the Capitol building on September 9, from 11:00 AM until 4:00 PM. Perhaps we could arrange a session at some point on that day?

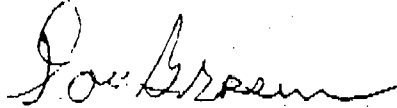

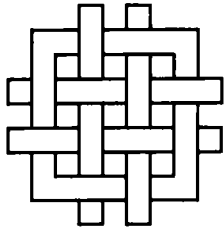

WRI is releasing a compelling new policy research report, *Agricultural Policy and Sustainability: Case Studies from India, Chile, the Philippines and the United States*, edited by Senior Associate Paul Faeth. The luncheon will be held in the First Amendment Lounge of the National Press Club, 529 14th St. NW, from 12:00 to 2:00 p.m. on Wednesday, September 22, 1993.

Throughout the world's farming regions, such problems as salinization, erosion, soil compaction and waterlogging, water pollution and depletion, and desertification indicate that much of today's agriculture is unsustainable. If current land degradation patterns continue, farmers will be hard-pressed to grow enough food, fuel and fiber for the more populous world of the next century.

WRI undertook this series of case studies because evidence suggested that many agricultural policies discourage, rather than encourage, sustainable agriculture. The case studies define sustainability in economic terms and move beyond the rhetoric to provide practical guidance to policymakers and researchers.

The authors of the case studies concluded that resource-conserving farming practices can compete economically and financially with conventional ones. Additionally, agricultural policies can act as a key constraint to the adoption of more sustainable farming methods, distorting the true economics of sustainable farming and causing significant economic and fiscal losses.

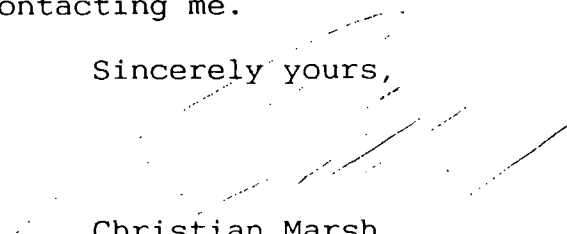

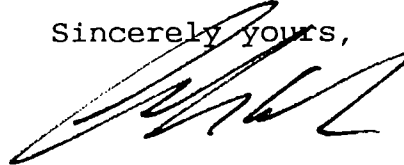

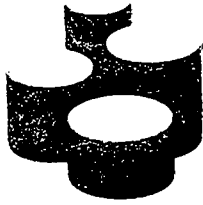

I write to request a meeting on behalf of the Can Manufacturers Institute (CMI) regarding an issue of fundamental fairness. While some technical issue are involved, this matter needs resolution at a policy level.

The Can Manufacturers Institute (CMI) is the national trade association of the metal and composite can and end manufacturers and their suppliers. CMI represents over 45 companies with nearly 250 can plants across the United States. The metal can manufacturing member companies account for nearly 90 percent of the approximately 130 billion cans shipped annually.

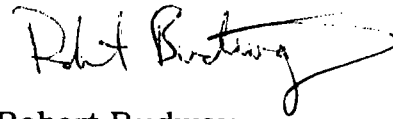
EPA's final guidance to states and permitting agencies requires that VOC capture efficiency (CE) for existing sources be measured using temporary total enclosures (TTE). As opposed to traditional methods, the enclosure requirement will impose very high costs, precipitate production losses, and jeopardize worker safety for minimal "improvements" in measurement precision. Moreover, due to unique can coating operating patterns, production line and control device configurations, it may be an impossibility for some can manufacturers to show compliance using the procedures required by EPA.

CMI has met with EPA several times over the past year to discuss alternatives to TTE use. Specifically, CMI is concerned with the high cost of enclosure installation -- approximately \$60,000 per line -- which is unnecessary given advancements in field testing using inexpensive traditional testing methods. In other words, a company with 45 coating lines would expend revenues in the neighborhood of 2.7 million dollars. In comparison, use of traditional CE measurement methods would reduce costs more than ten-fold (or \$6,000 per line for a \$250,000 total). CMI feels strongly that the new EPA method is technically unnecessary given that traditional methods have been used and proven to determine CE cost-effectively.

In an attempt to resolve this matter, the industry entered into an agreement with EPA to perform several tasks designed specifically to compare the various methods of measuring CE. CMI is confident that the results of the test will demonstrate, technically, that enclosures are not necessary to determine CE compliance; however, we feel that our technical efforts need the support at a policy level as well.

We look forward to meeting with you concerning this important issue. If you have any questions, please feel free to contact me at CMI.

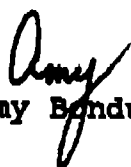
experience in the alternative fuel industry. He currently serves on the President's Federal Fleet Conversion Task Force, representing propane on that panel.
