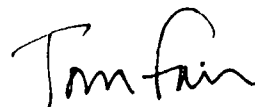
Niagara Mohawk is offering to provide transportation as well as room and board for all speakers at the conference. The estimated cost is as follows:

As we discussed this afternoon, Delphi International has been selected by the U.S. Information Agency to coordinate a program entitled "U.S. Environmental Protection Efforts in the United States" for 24 senior environmental specialists from around the world. The four-week project will examine how Americans confront environmental protection concerns; the importance of international cooperation in environmental protection; and the workings of the federal system of government and political process with regard to environmental issues.

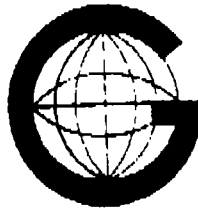

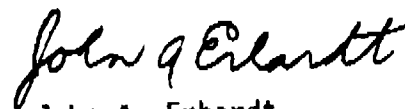

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

The Global Business Forum is a private limited membership organization consisting of international corporations based primarily in Europe and North America. Through its focused and timely programming, the Forum brings small groups of business executives and opinion leaders together to exchange views on the key business issues of the day in an informal, depoliticized setting. Unlike trade associations or lobbyist groups, the Forum does not take positions on issues. Rather it provides a neutral "forum" for a frank, off the record exchange of opinions on issues with specific impact on the strategic and operational environment facing corporate management. In this way, the Forum serves as a bridge between the North American and European business communities, on the one hand, and national and intergovernmental policy-makers, on the other.

Among the Forum's guest speakers have been numerous high level government and regulatory officials, heads of UN agencies, EC commissioners, ambassadors and ministers from a wide range of countries, and representatives of non-governmental organizations.

INFORMATION SERVICES

The global business environment is a mosaic of constantly shifting economic trends and regulatory changes. To help companies keep abreast of these trends, the Forum tracks issues and regulations at all stages of

their evolution through governments and international organizations, and monitors changes in policy and personnel to provide an early guide to problems and opportunities.

Regularly monitored are those organizations that have the greatest impact on the operating environment of multinational corporations, including:

- European Community
- The United Nations System
- Multilateral Development Banks
- Environmentalists and other Public Interest Groups
- Office of the U.S. Trade Representative

Among the international issues regularly covered by the Forum in meetings and reports are: biotechnology, product safety, consumer protection, environment, energy, hazardous product control, health and pharmaceutical cost-containment, foreign investment rules, patent and trademark protection, taxation, protectionism, South Africa and trade.

MEETINGS

Each Forum discussion meeting is divided into two parts. First, senior policy-makers and opinion leaders brief Forum executives on their priorities and programs, providing business leaders with a first-hand analysis of the issue at stake. The second half of each meeting consists of an active question and answer interchange by which the officials hosted at Forum meetings have the opportunity to gain insight from the practical

experience of the Forum's business executives. Such contacts facilitate the kind of "soft" lobbying that can yield benefits in terms of influencing the progress of new rules or legislation.

The Forum holds four to eight informal meetings monthly with senior policy-makers. The meetings are usually held in New York at the United Nations or in Washington. The issues raised are both general and industry specifics — but always with specific needs of our members in mind. The Forum also holds four to six conferences annually in various capitals, including Brussels, Washington, Ottawa, Tokyo, Geneva and Beijing. The conferences allow for intensive review of key issues over a two day period and consist of sessions with officials at the highest government level.

As a complement to its general program of meetings, the Forum has formed subgroups focusing on specific clusters of international issues and regulatory initiatives in which Forum members have a common priority interest. These groups include:

- Health Care
- Environment
- Energy
- Trade

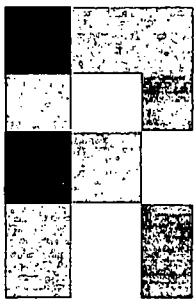

Dear Katie McGinty:

As you may recall, we met when you spoke to a large group of young women at my house in Rock Creek Park late last spring. We also spoke during the Presidential transition about my non-profit pr firm for the environment, still in formation.

In connection with the upcoming announcement of new pesticide legislation, which I imagine your office will work on, I am writing to invite you, or other officials, to visit the nation's leading reduced-chemical farming research center/farm in nearby Pennsylvania. (Not to be too bold, but this farm, which receives USDA and EPA funding, could be a great visual backdrop for an announcement on government encouragement of integrated pest management.)

At the Rodale Institute farm in nearby Allentown, Pennyslavania, commercial yield crop have been grown on 333 acres without synthetic inputs since 1972. The Research Center has, with USDA participation, increasingly proven the scientific and commercial viability of farming with greatly reduced amounts of synthetic fertilizers, pesticides or herbicides.

Currently, visits to the Rodale Research Center are under consideration by the Secretary of Agriculture and the EPA Administrator. Given your involvement in this issue, I thought this might interest you.

With the recent joint announcement by the USDA, FDA and EPA on reduced-chemical farming in the wake of recent NAS report on pesticides, a visit to the Rodale farm could certainly be timely. You or other officials would see fields of corn, soybeans and other field and vegetable crops in alternating plots --one grown with traditional methods, the next grown without chemicals. The quality and yields of the chemical-free plots match or exceed those of the conventional ones, with of course far less environmental; cost or soil erosion. At Rodale, the land is farmed with the goal of improving the quality of the soil so it can last forever.

In addition, the Research Center currently has trials underway to perfect

methods for improving soil fertility through the use of various kinds of compost, including combined manure/municipal yard waste compost, and even composted plastics. There are experiments underway in the apple orchards with beneficial insects and non-chemical insect traps, companion planting to repel pests crop rotation, low impact tillage and other efforts.

The Rodale Institute also runs international programs in Senegal and Guatemala to teach these farming methods to help reduce rainforest destruction and decertification contributed to by conventional farming techniques, and we could brief you on those programs as well.

The Institute is a non-profit endeavor linked to Rodale Press, whose publications on gardening, health and fitness reach over 5 million domestic subscribers every month. The company has been popularizing non-chemical farming and preventative health techniques since the early 1940's. It is a highly respected organization worldwide. A memorial service was held two years ago at USDA in Washington for its President, Robert Rodale, who died in an automobile accident in the Soviet Union. Mr. Rodale was instrumental in helping USDA establish its Sustainable Agriculture and Research program. In other words, this would be a politically respected and real-world place to make news (or just to learn about it firsthand).

Several USDA officials can serve as references on the credibility of the Rodale efforts. USDA currently has two scientists stationed full time at Rodale, with three others visiting regularly. In addition, you can check with Dean Plowman, Acting Assistant Secretary for Science and Education, or Pat Jordan, Administrator of the Cooperative State Research Service, or Jon Von Schilifgard, National Program Director of the Agricultural Research Service, or George Bird, head of the Sustainable Agriculture programs at USDA. These gentleman have all been to the Rodale farm and are intimately familiar with its research findings and programs.

The Rodale farm is an easy one hour flight from Washington. We are ready to welcome you or anyone you suggest anytime, although harvest is largely completed by the middle of October. In addition, our firm is ready to collaborate with you to ensure that, if you wish, any visit is well covered by the press.

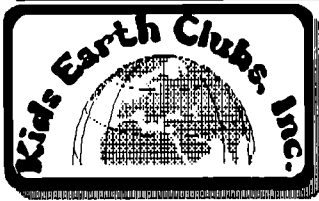
In addition, please note that the scientists at Rodale are ready to help your office in the work you're doing on making the White House an environmental showcase. They could help with designing reduced chemical lawns, rose gardens and set up composting for you.

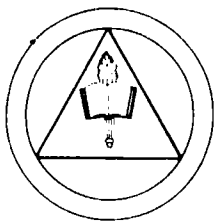

ENVIRONMENTAL LEADERSHIP FORUM

The Environmental Leadership Forum was created to encourage and facilitate the continuing partnership between the environmental community and Democratic Party leaders. January 20, 1993 marked the beginning of a new Administration. The Forum is now the principal organization of the nation's environmentalists who support the Democratic Party.

Through briefings, conferences, and breakfast and dinner events with speakers, Forum members will interact with the key political leaders who will be shaping the future of our party and our country. The Forum will conduct three meetings annually, each of which will include:

Contributions to the DNC are not tax deductible for federal income tax purposes.

I write to request an opportunity to meet with you about an important new nationwide rechargeable battery recycling program.

I am President and Chief Executive Officer of the Portable Rechargeable Battery Association ("PRBA"). PRBA is a not-for-profit trade association whose members include over 130 rechargeable battery manufacturers, consumer product manufacturers, distributors, assemblers and users. Rechargeable batteries power portable computers, telephones, power tools, camcorders and many other consumer products. PRBA's members sell products under some of the nation's most widely-recognized brand names, including Panasonic, Sanyo, Black & Decker, Motorola, Skil, Radio Shack and AT&T.

PRBA has developed a nationwide rechargeable battery collection and recycling program. PRBA anticipates making a major effort to publicize this program later this year and begin the program's implementation. It would be pleased to be able to involve the Administration in this effort, and to acknowledge that involvement.

However, implementation of PRBA's nationwide battery collection and recycling program faces several hurdles. At present, for example, the characterization of many used batteries as "hazardous waste" is a major impediment. Hopefully, this disincentive to recycling will be eliminated if EPA issues an enforcement directive (see attached Congressional letter) and promptly finalizes the recently-proposed RCRA "universal waste" rules.

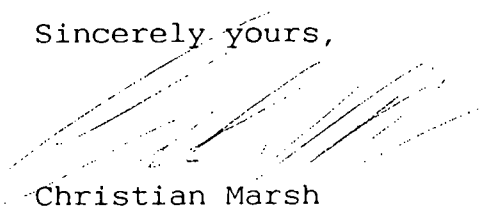

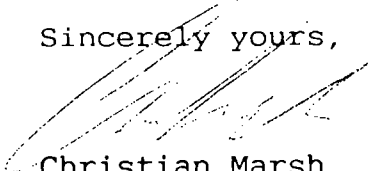

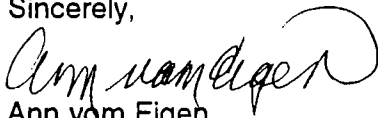
We understand that you are meeting with affected parties regarding the reauthorization of the Superfund program. The American Land Title Association* would deeply appreciate an opportunity to meet with you and discuss our perspective on the Superfund liability scheme.

Title insurance is a key element in the majority of the 5 to 7 million real estate transactions which occur in the United States on an annual basis. Our members search and examine title to real property, including review for Superfund liens, and insure land titles in order to protect owners and mortgage lenders. We often serve as trustees under deeds of trust, the most common form of mortgage instrument in the United States, and so are concerned about and can speak to the issue of trustee and fiduciary liability. Further, ALTA members often serve as overseers in the construction lending process and as such have had concerns about Fleet Factors-type liability. I will attach to a hard copy a more lengthy analysis of the ways in which our industry is affected by Superfund.

We hope that you can find the time to meet with us as we believe that we can provide you with a singular perspective on Superfund liability as an entity with the outlook of an insurer, who nevertheless stands behind the lender, and has significant practical experience with the full range of real estate transactions.

I am bringing in a number of counsels from the major title insurers in the United States, for example from First American Title, Chicago Title and Lawyers Title, to explain our position and concerns to key decisionmakers in this area within the Administration. 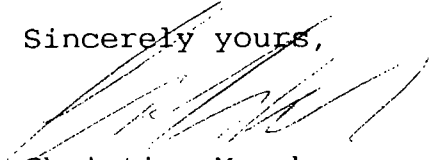
