The purpose of this letter is to invite you to participate as a discussant in the Second International Conference of the Next Generation of Nuclear Power Technology on October 25 and 26, 1993. The enclosed material describes the Conference agenda. This Conference is being sponsored by the MIT Center for Advanced Nuclear Power Studies as a continuation of its energy policy-related work, and is being organized (by invitation) by myself.

As you can see from the agenda, the Conference consists of seven topical sessions, and luncheon and dinner addresses. We shall follow the practice of our initial 1990 conference, i.e., in each topical session the issue to be discussed is to be introduced by keynote and respondent papers, after which it is to be discussed by the participants. The product of the meeting will be its *Proceedings*, consisting of the keynote and respondent papers and associated discussion (synopsized) from each session and panel discussion. The *Proceedings* will be available for use as any interested reader thinks worthwhile.

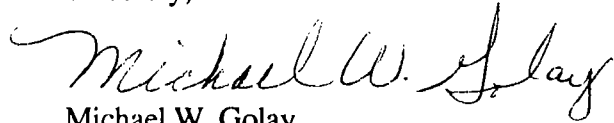
The purpose of the Conference is to stimulate communication among the various parties who will have a voice concerning the acceptability of future nuclear power technology. Concern over issues including global warming, the environmental effects of fossil fuel use and issues of economic efficiency have caused many people to consider whether an attractive second generation of nuclear power technology should be developed and deployed. Important questions to be addressed include those of whether a second nuclear generation would be beneficial, how it might fit into the future array of energy technologies, and the forms under which it might be undertaken. If there is to be a next nuclear technology, an effective consensus regarding these questions will be necessary. Our meeting is intended to assist this process of consensus building—both through the discussions of the Conference and the resulting *Proceedings*.

You are invited as a participant in this meeting because of your strong background in the subjects of the Conference. It is our desire to have the topics of the meeting discussed in a thoughtful, informed fashion by a group drawn from the important constituencies which will affect the future uses of nuclear power technology. Because of the desire to have a candid discussion we are asking all participants to provide only their personal understandings of the issues. Statements of organizational positions by the participants are not desired in the Conference discussions. A statement to the effect that all positions presented are purely personal will appear in the Conference *Proceedings*. In the *Proceedings*, individuals will not be identified with their statements; rather a class of organizational affiliation (e.g., university professor) will be noted. This will be done to enhance the candor and thoughtfulness of the discussions.

Enclosed is a Marriott Hotel reservation card. Please note that the rooms which are reserved for our conference will not be held after 4 October 1993. Reservations made after

that time will be on a "first come, first served" basis. Since the meetings will all be held at this hotel, it is the most convenient place to stay. 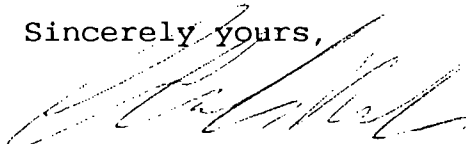

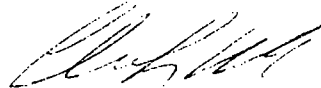

Dear Katie:

I wanted to let you know of a very positive development concerning the bio tech industry in California. As you know from our prior discussions, the bio tech industry in California, as well as medical research centers and academic institutions, have been severely handicapped by delays in developing the state's low level radioactive waste disposal facility in Ward Valley. The efforts of the state of California have now led to a license being issued by the state of California to solve this problem. After consultation with Secretary Babbitt, California issued the license yesterday.

At Secretary Babbitt's request, the state will conduct a limited hearing to address the potential for buried wastes to migrate and affect adjacent federal lands. Although there have already been numerous hearings held, this process should help build additional public confidence in the safety of the facility.

Issuance of the license and eventual approval of the land transfer by the U.S. Department of Interior will allow the California bio tech industry and the medical research centers in California to make viable plans for their continued existence and future growth.

I am sure they would appreciate any continued support that the Administration can give to help ensure that the hearing and

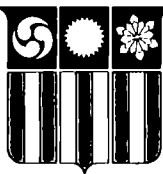

- * Complete Clean Up To Protect Public Health And The Environment
- * Rapid Movement Toward Sustainable Reuse
- * Worker Safety During Current Base Operations And Clean Up
- * Retraining and Re-employment Of Displaced Base Personnel

If we prove lacking in addressing these issues, history might close the American century noting that the military superpower that "won the Cold War" lost the battle to build an environmentally sustainable economy.

We will combat all attempts to compromise environmental standards, regulations, and other "quick-fix" approaches that might continue to allow environmental issues like sustainable reuse to be ignored.

We will seek to establish new priorities and reallocate a portion of the public resources, currently spent on military defense, toward putting displaced base workers back to work through environmental restoration and sustainable civilian economic activity.

The **Citizens' Base Closure Network** will be in the forefront of the effort in confronting these issues. Specifically, we will:

- * Create a model for organizing local communities on the issues of effective environmental clean up and reuse of military bases.
- * Establish a network to facilitate mutual support and the exchange of information.
- * Influence national policy for sound clean up and environmentally sustainable reuse.

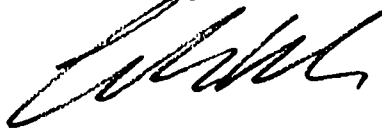

For the past few years my colleague Gordon Thompson and I have been promoting the idea that institutions and people should be doing more to see to it that information is acquired and exchanged on the practical performance of greenhouse gas control projects and programs and that this kind of practical experience is fed into policy analysis. We are presently engaged in two efforts which may be of interest to you. We are conducting a feasibility study for the GEF of an approach to privatizing (and enhancing!) the monitoring, evaluation, and dissemination of information about the performance of GEF projects relating to Climate Change. Attached is a short description of that project, as part of an announcement of a workshop at CSIS Sept 9-10 that we will be holding. We would very much appreciate your input on the project; we also hope that someone from your office would like to attend the workshop. We believe that this project has relevance to many of the concerns expressed worldwide about transparency in GEF operations.

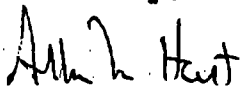

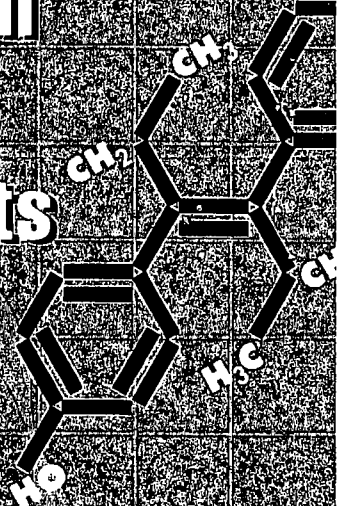

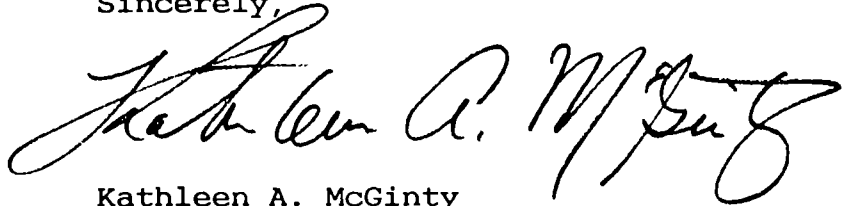

Article I Creation

An Appeals Commission will be established by the World Bank Board of Executive Directors by section 1 (b) of the World Bank by-laws and will be known as the Independent Appeals Commission of the World Bank.

Article II Jurisdiction

1. The Commission established by the Executive Directors shall be competent to investigate and pass judgement on complaints regarding violations of all World Bank policies, procedures, loan and credit agreements, and violations of international human rights and environmental law. The violations shall have occurred during the course of the design, appraisal, monitoring or implementation of an ongoing World Bank financed project or program.

2. The 'World Bank' shall include the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development (IBRD), and The International Development Association (IDA).

3. The Commission shall be competent to recommend modification, suspension or cancellation of a World Bank financed project or program.

4. The Commission's jurisdiction shall be distinct and separate from the World Bank's Operations Evaluation Department which conducts evaluations of completed World Bank financed projects.

Article III Standing

1. The Commission shall receive complaints from the following parties:

- a. any individual who is a citizen of a member country of the World Bank who is affected by the operations of a World Bank financed project or program;
- b. any non-governmental organisation that is incorporated or established in a World Bank member country that has an interest in or whose members are affected by a World Bank financed project or program; and
- c. any member country of the World Bank.

Article IV Composition

- 1. The Appeals Commission shall be composed of nine members; no two members may be nationals of the same country.
- 2. Commission members will operate in panels of three people.
- 3. Commission members will sit for four year terms.
- 4. Commission members shall include, but not be limited to, lawyers, environmental and human rights experts, and anthropologists.
- 5. The Commission shall operate with a minimum of three members on each case.
- 6. No member of the presiding panel in an individual case shall be of the same nationality as the claimant or from the country where the project at issue is located.
- 7. Commission members shall be appointed by the World Bank Board of Executive Directors.
- 8. At least two commission members shall be nominated by non-government organisations.
- 9. No Commission member shall be dismissed unless all other members of the Commission are of the unanimous opinion that he or she is unsuited for continued service.

Article V Access to Information

- 1. The Appeals Commission shall have access to all World Bank documents which are relevant to the subject of a complaint. This will

include, but not be limited to:

- a. Loan and credit agreements between the World Bank and the central or state governments governing the project or programme in question;
- b. All World Bank operational directives, operation manual statements, and policies; and
- c. pre-appraisal reports, staff appraisal reports, mid-term reviews, presidents reports, project completion reports, country economic memoranda, inter-office memoranda, back to office reports, aide memoires, consultants reports, and staff memoranda to Executive Directors;

2. The Appeals Commission shall have access to country-generated documents required by the World Bank if they are relevant to the subject of the complaint or are required by a Bank policy or loan/credit agreement which is the subject of the complaint. Country-generated documents required by the Bank which should be made available would include, but not be limited to, environmental impact assessments and project preparation documents such as baseline data or cost/benefit analyses.

3. Information requests from the Appeals Commission which are refused by the World Bank or a member country should be justified by compelling policy reasons such as national security or prevention of procurement abuses.

4. All information obtained by the Appeals Commission from the World Bank and member countries will remain confidential and within the property of the Commission. After a judgement is rendered on a specific complaint, the Commission will return all documents to the World Bank or member country within 20 days.

Article VI Enforcement

1. All judgements of the Appeals Commission will be final and binding, unless reversed by two thirds of the World Bank Board of Executive Directors.

2. A Board vote on a specific judgement will occur if Executive Directors representing 50% of the Board call for a vote.

Article VII Procedure

1. The Commission shall be competent to conduct its investigation into a complaint through any or all of the following methods:
 - a. meetings with governments officials, members of the public, and affected people in the country where the appeal originated;
 - b. public hearings in the project area;
 - c. site visits to relevant projects;
 - d. meetings with World Bank staff;
 - e. requests for written or oral submissions on specific issues by the party making the appeal, experts, affected people, non-governmental organisations or government officials; and World Bank staff; and
 - f. any other reasonable method normally used for conducting such an investigation.
2. The length of time needed for investigating a complaint shall be determined by the three members conducting the investigation. No investigation will exceed one year.
3. All judgements of the Commission will be published independently of the World Bank and made available to the public at cost.
4. All judgements will be housed in a library in the Commission, to which the public will have access.

Article VIII Rulemaking

1. Upon establishment, the Commission will issue rules governing the format and procedure for filing a complaint with the Commission. The format shall allow for complaints in local languages.
2. Upon establishment, the Commission will issue rules governing the criteria it will use for selecting complaints to be investigated.
3. Draft rules governing format, procedure and criteria will be circulated to interested members of the public for comment 30 days before becoming final.

4. The Commission shall establish rules concerning the election of the President and Vice-President of the Commission (see Article IX).

Article IX Accepting a Complaint

1. Upon receipt of a complaint, the Commission will respond within 30 days to the relevant party as to whether it will investigate that specific complaint.

2. If a party does not meet the criteria laid down by the Commission, they may resubmit their complaint again in six months, providing there is new evidence.

Article X Decision-making

1. Decisions on a complaint will be made by the three panel members who conducted the investigation.

2. Subject to the provision in Article VI, all decisions of the Commission are final and binding.

3. The Commission's judgement will be in writing and shall include findings of fact and reasoning upon which the decision was based.

4. The judgement shall be written in English. Within one month the judgement will be translated into the language of the country where the complaint originated.

5. A certified copy of the judgement shall be sent to the party who filed the original complaint.

Article XI Organisation

1. The Commission shall elect a President and Vice-President from among its members:

2. The President shall make the administrative arrangements necessary for the functioning of the Commission, including hiring of support staff.

3. The Commission's annual budget shall be determined by the Commission and submitted to the President of the World Bank for approval.

4. The budget of the Commission shall be borne by the World Bank out of IBRD profits.
5. The Commissions budget shall be replenished annually.
6. The Commission's office shall be based in Washington, D.C., but will be housed separately from the World Bank.

Article XII Appeals

1. If an individual, NGO, or member country or the person in respect to whom a judgement has been rendered by the Commission objects to the judgement on the ground that the Commission exceeded its jurisdiction or competence, has failed to exercise jurisdiction invested in it or has erred on a question of law, or has committed a fundamental error in procedure which caused a miscarriage of justice such a party may within 30 days of the publication of the judgement make a written application to appeal to full Commission.
2. The claimant may petition the World Bank Board of Executive Directors for a final appeal. 50% of the Board of Executive Directors must call for a vote.

Article XIII Revision of Judgement

1. An application for revision of a judgement may be made to the Commission only on discovery of a fact which is of such a nature as to be a decisive factor, and which when the judgement was given, was unknown to the Commission and to the party claiming the revision.

Following up on the conversation that Congressman Yates' office had with Mr. Christian Marsh, I am writing on behalf of the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago (the District) to request an appointment for either Friday, September 17th or Monday, September 20th.

Several members of the Board of Commissioners including president Thomas Fuller and general superintendent Frank Dalton will be in Washington to meet with various executive branch agencies to discuss the administration's environmental policies and the upcoming FY'95 budget.

Every year the District collects and treats more than 550 billion gallons wastewater from most of Cook County which includes the City of Chicago and 125 suburban communities. More than 10 million people are impacted by District projects.

Since 1968, the District has built \$3 billion worth of infrastructure designed to protect Lake Michigan from raw sewage backflows; clean-up the area's rivers and streams by eliminating raw sewage mixed with stormwater overflows to the rivers; and significantly reduce flooding in one of the most densely populated areas in the United States.

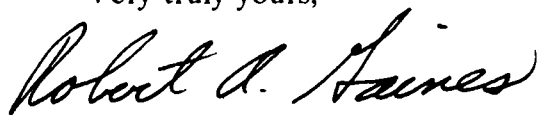

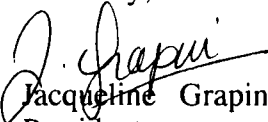

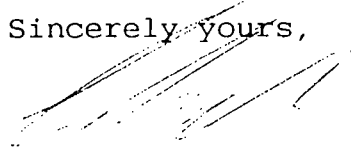

The International Union of Operating Engineers, a labor organization with over 400,000 members employed in the stationary engineering and construction industries in the public and private sector, has a well-earned reputation in the hazardous waste industry. Throughout the United States and Canada, our highly-skilled and well-trained members are uniquely qualified to tackle the problems of hazardous materials and waste.

With a federal grant from the National Institute of Environmental Health Sciences, the IUOE in 1988 established a comprehensive hazardous materials (HAZMAT) training program for its members.

To provide this training, the IUOE inaugurated an intensive 80-hour "train-the-trainer" program at the National Mine Health and Safety Academy in Beckley, W. VA. Under the professional guidance of recognized experts from labor, government, and industry, our IUOE training instructors received a combination of classroom instruction and simulated "hands-on" exercises to familiarize them with all aspects of the proper and safe handling of hazardous materials.

These instructors then returned to their own local unions, where they continue to conduct a 40-hour training course for members who will be working in the hazmat industry. Members completing the 40-hour course fulfill the U.S. Department of Labor's training requirements for hazmat work, and are required to take an annual eight-hour refresher program to remain qualified. (Enclosed is a video tape of the IUOE Hazmat Training Program.)
