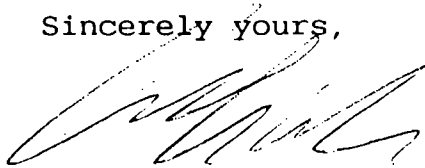

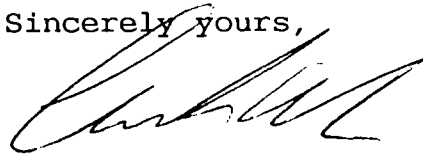

THE PROJECT

This project will examine the relationship between environmental challenges and the potential role of naval forces. It will be designed around a survey of the current literature, fact-finding interviews with substantive Navy and non-Navy experts, and at least one meeting with key personnel to discuss naval capabilities for environmentally-related missions. It should be stressed that the focus of this study is not base cleanup. Rather, it is an attempt to anticipate the greater attention to environmental problems and the demands that may be made of the Navy as a result of that more intense focus.

The following major questions will be the focus of the interviews and discussions:

1. What has the Navy done in the past to combat environmental problems?
2. On which environmental issues, if any, should the Navy be involved? What are the areas of most immediate concern? Which are most amenable to participation of the Navy in their resolution? What ~~are the~~ kinds of environmental roles is the Navy not well equipped to do?
 - What would be the most efficient use of existing Navy resources?
 - How can Navy capabilities not yet used be most effectively exploited?
3. How will greater involvement in environmental issues affect the way the Navy prepares for and accomplishes its primary missions?
 - To what extent will environmental roles compete with traditional missions? How can environmental efforts be made to reinforce traditional roles and missions?
 - What are the budgetary implications of the Navy's greater involvement in environmental issues?
 - Are there implications for training? For acquisition and ship design?
4. To what extent can dealing with environmental issues be a source of international cooperation among navies? In the NATO context? With the former Soviet Union? With navies of the Third World?
5. How might the Navy contribute to the work of international organizations dealing with environmental problems?

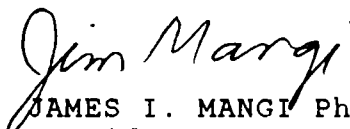
I am not looking for a job. And I don't represent any interest group. I am an environmental scientist who has worked for about twenty years with NEPA; I make my living preparing Environmental Assessments and Impact Statements.

My purpose is simply to offer ideas for cutting out the significant wastefulness of the NEPA process as it is presently practiced. The taxpayer spends roughly \$100 Million a year on NEPA, but that money does not buy \$100 Million of value. Far from it. The law is a great idea, and the process could be a very powerful tool for meaningful environmental protection and pollution prevention. Indeed, NEPA was intended as a device for achieving environmentally sensitive planning and design. Instead, it is still widely treated as a paperwork exercise, consuming large amounts of time and money and accomplishing little. It is a procedure whose excellent underlying purpose has been lost from view, buried under tons of paper.

My ulterior motive? To improve substantially the cost-effectiveness of NEPA, so that the taxpayer money expended on EAs and EISs yields actual environmental protection benefits--for us and for future generations. As a contractor who makes money from NEPA, I think I have a valuable perspective on how the Government could spend less and get more out of NEPA.

There are some very specific steps which can be taken to accomplish this. I would appreciate the opportunity to make an information presentation to you on this subject. Thank you.

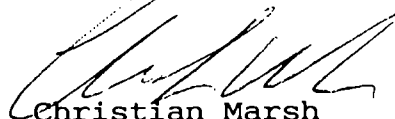

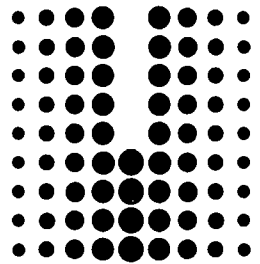

In 1986 a group of women in Argentina felt that the women of the nations of the American Hemisphere needed to join together to discuss, dialogue and focus on issues of concern to women within the Hemisphere. They formed the Foundation for the Rights of Women and proceeded to establish chapters through out the spanish-speaking countries over the next four years.

With the tremendous acceptance of the concept the Foundation espoused, plans were made to hold a Continental Congress, at which women could come together to address their various concerns and the issues impacting them. It was decided that the "First Continental Congress for Women of the Americas" be held in Santo Domingo, Dominican Republic at a time when said gathering would coincide with the celebration of the Quincentennial slated for that country. To this First Continental Congress, in excess of 700 women, representing 25 countries of the Continent were in attendance. The President of the D.R., Joaquin Balaguer, addressed the Congress making headlines with his statement that "in the execution of many public functions women have shown superiority".

The three day event brought commitments, papers, dialogue and thought which evolved into the forum it became. At the closure of this First Continental Congress, the leadership made the decision to provide continuity to this dialogue, and therefore, to hold a Second Continental Congress for Women of the Americas. However, this time, the site selection came to be the United States of America, where strong strides to attain women's rights are on-going. Washington, D.C. became the selected host city, and the Isabella International Institute ("III") the general planner and coordinator of the event.

A theme for the Continental Congress has been agreed upon which addresses the focus of the women. The theme for the Second Continental Congress for Women of the Americas is: "Strength Through Communication". Congress proceedings will be held in two languages, spanish and english, the theme in spanish is: "Fuerza a Traves de la Comunicacion".

The Second Continental Congress for Women of the Americas will take place at the Crystal Gateway Marriott Hotel from February 17 through 22, 1994. It is anticipated that in excess of 1500 women will be in attendance with several non-hemispheric nations sending observers. To date the commitment of New Zealand, Australia, China, Taiwan, Russia, Norway, Tunisia, and all the Latin American countries have been made for observer participation.

The five day Congress will consist of plenary, general and topic specific sessions on subjects including: the family, education/literacy/retraining, politics and public administration, health, the environment, business/economics, equality/self-empowerment and arts/culture/sports. Each of these topics will be presented in panel format with distinguished international women addressing their interpretation of the subject matter under the guidance of a moderator. Women with expertise under each subject will be asked to submit a ten page (double spaced) paper regarding their area of knowledge. From these papers, four under each heading will be chosen by a chairperson of that topic for a 10 minute presentation, (including 3 minutes for question/answer time) by the author, at the Congress. All the papers will be included in a published syllabus that will be distributed to all Congress attendees.

Co-chairs for the Congress have been designated, and each represents a cultural and ethnic make-up of the American continent. Among them we count Asians, Native American Indians, Blacks, Hispanics and Caucasians. As the Co-chair representing Caucasian women, Ambassador Holland H. Coors request your consideration of contributing your expertise on the subject of the environment to the Congress by submitting a paper, possibly to be presented at the Congress.

Women Heads of State or their spouses, jurist, academicians, CEO's, educators, community and social leaders, farmers, Nobel Prize winners, homemakers and others have been invited in order to present a total spectrum of the woman of the Americas, her thoughts, her needs, her ideas, her problems and possible solutions thereto.

There will be two luncheons, each with a recognized and celebrated keynote speaker, and the closure gala banquet will present to the audience an array of women leaders from around the Hemisphere. In addition, within the overall program time will be set a side to allow for the women to interface with each other, establishing networks and linkages within their own specific areas of expertise. There will be a Market Place that will bring a dimension to the Congress under which business, cultural and academic transactions can be conducted with prospective and/or ongoing partners. Plans are also under way for an evening at the Kennedy Center, an evening with Ambassadors from nations who send delegations, several receptions and some surprise outings.

As you can see, it promises to be an interesting and important event impacting women throughout the world. Your involvement would greatly add to the Congress and should be an educational and rewarding experience. We would be honored by your participation and hope to talk to you soon regarding this matter.

A PACIFIC PERSPECTIVE

Nowhere is the need to balance natural resource conservation and sustainable economic development more apparent -- and more critical -- than in the islands of the Pacific, where nations are in rapid transition, and where there is more biological diversity per unit land area than anywhere on Earth. Over 75% of the nation's bird and plant extinctions have occurred here. Today, 34% of the country's endangered plant species and 41% of the endangered bird species are found in Hawaii alone; while another 30 bird species are proposed for listing just from Micronesia. In the challenge of biodiversity protection, the Pacific is an urgent national priority.

To meet this challenge, adequate scientific resources must be appropriately deployed to address the special conditions of Pacific island conservation. Saving the large numbers of poorly studied, endemic species requires a commitment to well-coordinated field research by teams focused on these unique island ecosystems. These teams must address the paucity of ecological information on most rare species, and the overwhelming problem of alien species invasion that often predominates island conservation. They must be locally based to conduct their work in concert with the cultural traditions and present issues of the local communities living amidst and, in many cases, relying upon resources from these precious native ecosystems. They must also be able to service the most far-flung and inaccessible geographic jurisdiction of any world region.

Within the current U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service jurisdiction alone, the Pacific Islands Office covers 2,300 islands in eight political jurisdictions, stretching 5,000 miles from east to west, and encompassing 3,000 miles from north to south -- an area much greater than that of the entire continental U.S. The native resources of the Pacific Islands are unique and distinct from those of terrestrial ecosystems found in any continental region. Yet Hawaii and the Pacific have traditionally been included by the Department of the Interior in a "Western Region," along with California, Oregon, and Washington -- states with which they share few resource protection problems and even fewer species or ecosystem types. A separate regional office, focused on and located in the island Pacific, is necessary for the Department to adequately protect this major portion of our nation's natural heritage.

The formation of the National Biological Survey provides the opportunity to create a separate Pacific Regional Office based in Honolulu. This office should service the biological survey and applied research needs of conservation efforts in Hawaii and throughout the Pacific*. It will build upon existing relations with Pacific agencies and organizations, and provide the "critical mass" of trained professionals focused on Pacific issues that will be necessary to resolve many of them in a timely way. It will also represent a U.S. commitment to Pacific conservation that can attract stronger participation by other industrialized Pacific Rim nations in the protection the the planet's most fragile treasure of biodiversity.

The Center for Health Communication of the Harvard School of Public Health and The Annenberg Washington Program are pleased to invite you to a conference on *Mass Communication and Social Agenda-Setting*. Twenty-five years ago, tobacco was an attractive habit. Today, due to a sharp change in social norms, the identical behavior carries a powerful social stigma. What factors are responsible for these changes in tobacco habits and in other areas of social behavior? What roles are played by mass communication, and other factors, both in reinforcing current norms and serving as a catalyst for change? What factors explain why particular issues surface on the public agenda? Is there a natural life cycle to such issues? Why was the Carnegie Commission on Public Television such an immediate success? Why do such issues sometimes attract great attention, then disappear, and later reemerge on the public agenda?

These questions are not only important intellectually, but are important operationally for individuals and institutions seeking to influence the public agenda. To explore these related questions concerning tobacco, domestic violence, drugs, alcohol, AIDS and the environment, the conference will bring together scholars, activists, public opinion analysts, journalists, and government officials.

On September 11, 1992, Hurricane Iniki hit the small Hawaiian Island of Kauai with winds of up to 225 miles per hour. Local authorities estimate that about 1.8 million cubic yards of disaster-related debris -- five to eight years' worth -- were generated in just over five hours.

Faced with limited land area, a single landfill rapidly reaching maximum capacity, and a population relatively uninformed about recycling, the question of how to manage this enormous increase in solid waste had to be confronted directly. The result was what may have been one of the world's most extensive curb-side recycling programs, and the initiation of an on-going effort to develop innovative, long-term solutions to the complex problems of solid waste management.

"Disaster Response Waste Management: Lessons from the Past and Planning for the Future" is an international conference to explore the problems and potential solutions to the waste management crisis generated by natural disasters. Floods, tornados, and earthquakes, as well as hurricanes, produce an enormous amount of debris that must be dealt with quickly and safely. The issues to be discussed at this conference have direct relevance to any geographic region susceptible to sudden and unexpected natural disasters.

Sessions on Saturday, September 25, will examine the special requirements of individual types of materials, such as greenwaste, construction and demolition debris, hazardous waste, plastics and household waste. Manufacturers and distributors of recycled products for agricultural, construction, hotel, restaurant, home and office supply use are expected to attend.

Zonta International's participation in the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development (UNCED) and its workshop presentation at the 92 Global Forum, both held in Rio de Janeiro in June 1992, can be considered major visible steps in Zonta's commitment to address environmental issues worldwide. As a non-governmental organization accredited by the UNCED secretariat, Zonta was an active participant in the two years of planning meetings to prepare for the 92 Global Forum. Eight Zontians, from the USA, Switzerland, Argentina, Bangladesh, Brazil, The Netherlands and Sweden, presented the workshop on "Global Environmental Awareness Call for Women," which sought to identify common concerns and explore women's contributions to environmental management.

The result of that workshop was heard by Zonta International members at the 1992 Hong Kong Convention held the following month, and passed in the form of an Environment Resolution by the convention's 2,200 attendees. With this Resolution, Zontians worldwide have committed themselves to initiate active participation in implementation of the UNCED recommendations, to support United Nations Development Fund for Women projects, and to work actively at the local club level on environmental issues and concerns of importance to their individual communities.

In August 1992, the members of Zonta Club of Kauai initiated plans for a statewide conference on recycling, to take place in April 1993. The club's 46 members, representing government, education, the professions and many of the small independent businesses that are the backbone of the Hawaiian economy, recognized the vital need to raise local awareness of solid waste management practices as a major step towards preservation of the islands' fragile environment. Hurricane Iniki, which devastated Kauai on September 11, 1992, with winds gusting over 236 miles per hour, forced the postponement of this conference, as local club members sought to rebuild their homes and their lives.

Even in the earliest days after the hurricane, Kauai Zontians continued their community involvement, organizing disaster relief fundraisers as far afield as San Diego, and spearheading organization of the free Thanksgiving Feast which fed 10,000 of their island neighbors. As local news coverage grew of the environmental crisis caused by Iniki-related debris, club members realized the need for recycling education was greater than ever before.

The international conference on "Disaster-Response Waste Management: Lessons from the Past and Planning for the Future" was born from the Kauai Zontian's direct experience with the type of environmental crisis that results from a natural disaster, and their desire to contribute to the prevention of similar crises elsewhere in the world. The recycled product trade show which will be held in conjunction with the conference, in appealing to a different audience than the conference itself, is intended to raise awareness throughout Hawaii and the Pacific in practical waste management alternatives as well as encourage the entrepreneurial development that is essential to long-range environmental protection planning.

The conference and trade show will function as a fundraiser, to support the development of a statewide recycling education program. Members of Zonta Club of Kauai have opened discussions with leaders in government, education and business, to create a joint task force to determine the ultimate destination of these resulting funds.

At their May 1993 state meeting, delegates from the four Zonta clubs of Hawaii, which include member John Waihee, Governor of the State of Hawaii, unanimously ratified a resolution supporting the Kauai club's environmental action program.

Zonta Club of Kauai members Summer Harrison and Rose Ramos are in charge of coordinating the conference and trade show, respectively.

Harrison has twelve years of experience organizing award-winning special events and international awareness-building campaigns. Her background in special event and conference planning spans the fields of federal legislation, economic development and hotel and airline industries. She managed press relations and supervised the Press Office for the 1983 20th Anniversary March on Washington, which drew 500,000 participants and over 1,000 members of the media to the nation's capital, and which contributed significantly to passage of the Martin Luther King Jr. Federal Holiday Act. Harrison later directed the national media campaign supporting D.C. statehood legislation, including the D.C. delegation's press operation at the 1988 Democratic National Convention. After moving to Hawaii from Washington, D.C., Harrison has been actively involved in promoting greater environmental awareness in the visitor industry. She set up an environmental and cultural awareness guest program for the Hyatt Regency Kauai which was used as a model by Hyatts throughout the state, and recently established an ecotourism program on Maui which benefits the state's only organization dedicated solely to children's outdoor ecology education.

Ramos has seven years experience in trade show management. Before moving to Hawaii, she was a partner in Technicon Productions, a conference management company and produced the first-ever HP 9000 Computer User Conference in Berkeley, California, in 1986. Ramos has won four awards for her work with Interex, an HP international users group, where she served as Advertising Manager for their four publications. She regularly attended the group's international conferences

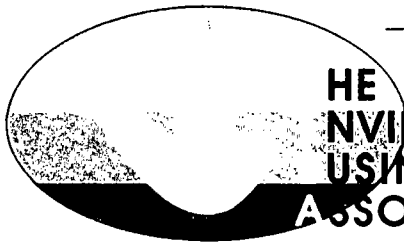

and produced the first-ever conference daily newspaper at their international conference held in Washington D.C. in 1985. Currently, as a marketing consultant, she stays active in the trade show industry by organizing participation for her major client, Aloha Lumber Company, in trade shows throughout the state. In addition, she is a member of the organizing committee for the first Contractors Association of Kauai's Home Expo to be held in June of this year. Because of the recycling and environmental impacts from Hurricane Iniki on the construction industry, Ramos organized presentations by the County of Kauai's Solid Waste Department for the general membership of the organization. The producer of the club's newsletter, she regularly publishes recycling and environmental information of importance to the members.

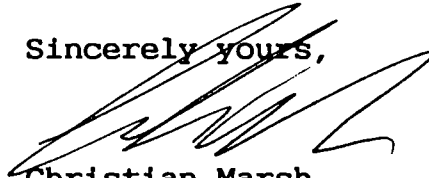

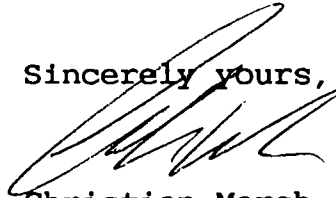

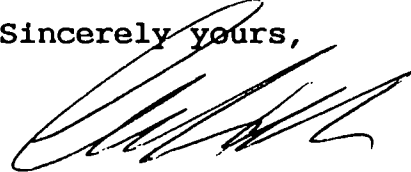

Dear Mr. Marsh:

I spoke to you yesterday about the possibility that the leadership of the American Nuclear Society might pay a visit to Ms. McGinty or her appropriate deputy in the near future. For the record, the ANS is the professional association of engineers and scientists in the field of nuclear technology, ranging from electrical energy to medicine. The Society has 17,000 members.

ANS President Ed Fuller, Vice President and President-Elect Alan Waltar, and Executive Director James Toscas will be in Washington Wednesday through Friday, January 26-28. We have meetings planned for all day Wednesday and for early Friday, and one or another of my colleagues will probably have to attend meetings of the American Association of Engineering Societies on the 27th. Thus, the best time for a meeting as important as this one would be on Friday, the 28th, after about 10:30 AM. The entire rest of Friday is clear.

ANS is very interested in the overall Administration towards nuclear technology. Nuclear engineering seems to fit very well the President's interest in creating high-technology industries with well-educated, well-paid people and a strong export orientation (one nuclear reactor is worth \$2-4 billion in foreign exchange, perhaps the most expensive single exportable object). And yet, frankly, the Administration has not been as supportive as we feel is necessary, to promote research and development in the nuclear electric field.

In the field of nuclear medicine, radioisotopes which are used in over 13,000,000 diagnostic procedures and many cancer therapies are practically all currently being imported from abroad, with possible dire results for the health of Americans—certainly a major concern of this Administration. We are very pleased by the strong lead the Administration has taken in connection with resolving the nuclear waste issue, and wish to commend you on your courage in going ahead. We might wish to discuss with you the problems currently surrounding the Ward Valley low level waste site in California, which is a bellwether state, of course.

As you know, nuclear people also feel strongly that nuclear power can make a real contribution to resolving the CO2 problem in the atmosphere, as nuclear reactors create no emissions, and your office plays a leading role in environmental policy. Thus, there is quite a variety of issues of common interest to us. We will be very glad to speak with you about all these areas. Please give me a call to set up an appointment.
