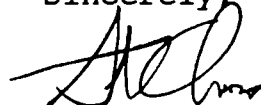

I would like to apprise you of the current status of U.S. responsibility for cleanup of former military facilities in the Philippines.

The Philippine government has officially asked that the United States release documentation on suspected toxic and environmental damage at former US military facilities in the Philippines. The U.S. is responding positively and DoD is in the process of compiling documentation.

I just returned from a trip to the Philippines where I discussed the issue of the cleanup with officials from the national to local level. Although officials stressed that they want to develop the internal capacity to tackle the cleanup, they made it clear that the country has never dealt with pollution of the scope that potentially contaminates the bases. The capacity to undertake the cleanup is minimal.

Toxic cleanup at our overseas bases (and those of the former Soviet Union and their allies) is a legacy of the Cold War and our containment policy. The ability to productively convert these lands to commercial and civilian use is compromised by inaction on this issue and makes the new foreign policy emphasis on market democracy ring hollow.

I realize market democracy is a new concept, one that needs to be fleshed out concretely. This is one issue to do it with. The Philippines would prefer to develop the capacity to handle the cleanup themselves. This could enable them to strengthen key agencies within their state to tackle similar issues. It could provide a structure to move from the rhetoric of citizen participation to real participation in determining future land use. And, with training, technical assistance, and technology transfer, the Philippines could develop an industry they and the region desperately needs.

Sen. Daniel K. Inouye called September 23 for the creation of a joint task force to investigate the extent of contamination and identify appropriate cleanup actions. This is a very positive first step, but one which the executive branch will have to act on.

Enclosed is a copy of my trip report, "Creating a Positive Legacy", along with specific recommendations on how to proceed in a way that will strengthen the development of a more equitable bilateral relationship.

I will be coming to Washington sometime over the next few weeks. I would appreciate a meeting with you. I will be in touch soon. If you have any questions, please contact me at (617) 868-6600.

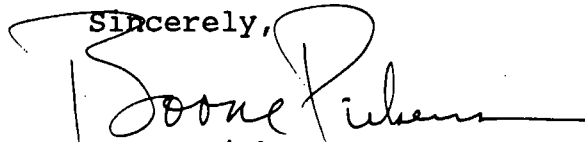

On Monday, October 11, the American Gas Association will convene its 75th Annual Meeting at the Washington Hilton in Washington, D.C., and I'm writing to invite you to participate in one or more high-profile events revolving around the opening festivities.

By participating in these events you will have an opportunity to highlight the Administration's environmental and domestic energy objectives by showcasing the potential of clean-burning natural gas, particularly as a transportation fuel alternative to foreign oil/gasoline.

It is my understanding that Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro has -- or will -- speak to you about your participation in these events, but I thought a personal invitation was in order.

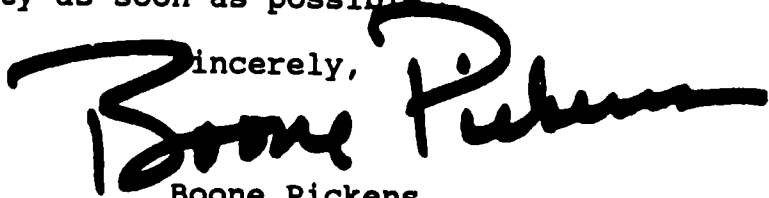
First, I invite you to fire the starting gun on "Clean Across America," a caravan of about 15 natural gas-powered vehicles that will leave Washington, D.C., that morning for a two-week trip across the U.S. This is the first cross-country caravan that will feature natural gas vehicles being produced and marketed by Ford, Chrysler and General Motors. The objective of this initiative is to showcase the availability of natural gas vehicles as well as the rapidly developing natural gas fueling infrastructure. We're planning a large rally of between 500 and 1,000 to send these vehicles on their way.

Second, you could deliver brief remarks to NGV Summit 2010, a gathering of about 150 top executives of the nation's largest gas utilities who will be focusing on the steps that they must take in the coming years to help meet the Administration's alternative fuel objectives by taking a lead role in developing the natural gas vehicle market.

We at Scenic America were delighted when we heard of your appointment as the Secretary of Transportation. Chris Duerksen, a member of our Board's Executive Committee, has spoken very highly of you and of your support for issues that affect communities' scenic character and appearance.

You may have seen **Primetime Live** on **ABC** April 1 which focused on the Federal billboard law as an example of blatant government waste. It is our Board of Directors' concern about the issues covered in this TV presentation that prompts me to write.

Scenic America's mission is to preserve and enhance the scenic character of America's communities and countryside. Our organization was founded eleven years ago in response to the outrageous results of implementation of the Highway Beautification Act (HBA), a law flawed from the start but which is now resulting in construction of 15,000 new billboards every year along Federal-aid highways.

On **Primetime Live** Sam Donaldson revealed several loopholes of the HBA which have resulted in wasting federal dollars used to take down billboards. His closing remarks point out this is not a situation of the past, but that states already have plans to spend \$17.3 million to perpetuate the situation.

While Scenic America believes that citizens should be able to remove billboards by regulation and without using federal taxpayer dollars, where the taxpayers' money is spent for billboard removal, it should not be wasted. We are extremely concerned that billboards only be removed that are located where new ones cannot be built, i.e., along scenic roads where ISTEA bans the erection of new billboards and in jurisdictions like Denver where new billboards cannot be constructed.



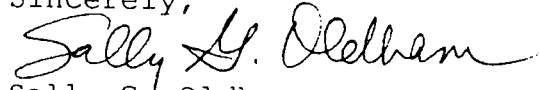
While the Department of Transportation's regulations implementing the HBA have since the early 1970's recommended priorities for removal that would have removed signs from scenic areas, FHWA has never required that its priorities be followed. Instead the states generally chose to give first priority to removing billboards volunteered by billboard companies, and FHWA allowed this. This policy resulted in largely wasting the \$170 million of taxpayer dollars that were spent on nonconforming sign removal between 1965 and 1991. Not surprisingly, billboard companies offered their least productive boards which were spaced such that no observable improvement in visual quality resulted from their removal.

After passage of ISTEA, Scenic America asked FHWA to require that states give priority to removing nonconforming billboards in scenic areas and in jurisdictions where no new billboards could be erected, but our request was declined. Sadly, our fears are being realized. I've enclosed a copy of a letter from Florida's Department of Transportation which has programmed \$3.8 million for billboard removal, in which it indicates it has written billboard companies to ask them to volunteer signs. Clearly the abuses of the past continue today. Your Department could stop this ridiculous practice of waste and abuse of highway trust fund dollars in the name of well intentioned public policy.

I would like to meet with you to discuss these policy issues and related issues affecting ISTEA's newly mandated National Scenic Byways Program. I've enclosed a videotape of the **Primetime Live** segment, a transcript from the show and Scenic America's press release issued following the show. I will call your appointments secretary to see when it is convenient to arrange a meeting.

Thank you for your strong support of visual quality and community issues. Your leadership at this time of the Department of Transportation is particularly fortuitous, because you will be able to spur efforts to achieve the promise of ISTEA's new planning, scenic byways and enhancement provisions.

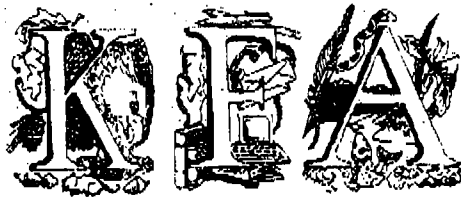

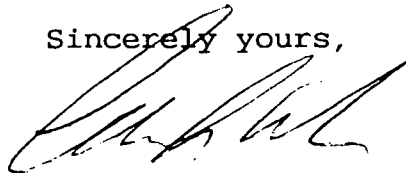

I am writing to update you on my latest request to the United States Department of Agriculture concerning the U.S. Forest Service's timber sale program and to invite you to a meeting on Capitol Hill with Members of Congress.

I remain hopeful that the Forest Service will not eliminate "below-cost" timber sales on national forests or change its accounting system for the timber sale program without prior consultation with Congress. Toward that end, I am spearheading an effort to invite you, Chief Dale Robertson of the Forest Service, Howard Paster of Legislative Affairs, an official from OMB, and Jim Lyons of USDA, to meet with Members of Congress to discuss ecosystem management and the future of the timber sale program.

Congress would like to work with you to develop a joint Congressional and Administration solution to this complex and volatile matter. The National Forests hold a wide spectrum of forest types, forest stand conditions, and local economic and social needs. A solution must contain the flexibility to meet the special concerns in the diverse forest communities.

Enclosed is a copy of the letter which was signed by several Members of Congress inviting Jim Lyons to Capitol Hill. I will have members of my staff contact your office in the near future, and I hope that you are able to join us in our discussion of the timber sale program.

I cordially invite you to the first flight of the Single Stage Rocket Technology (SSRT) Delta Clipper Experimental (DC-X) test flight vehicle. The flight is currently planned for early-to-mid August 1993. Due to the experimental nature of the program, the flight date is subject to change.

This flight test will consist of the vertical lift off of the vehicle from its flight launch mount, vehicle ascent to approximately six hundred feet, and the vertical landing of the vehicle. The flight will last approximately 60 seconds. The flight will take place at the U.S. Army White Sands Missile Range (WSMR) located near Las Cruces, New Mexico. Since this is a secure facility, transportation will be provided to the test site. **No private cars will be allowed on base. Attendance at the flight test is by invitation only.**

Please be advised that, due to safety considerations, the viewing site for the flight will be located 5 miles from the takeoff area. At this distance, visibility of the vehicle is limited. Guests are strongly encouraged to bring binoculars.

At this time we only wish to determine if you plan to attend the flight test. Due to security concerns at the Army test facility, and for planning purposes, it is required that you RSVP by phone at (714) 896-5348 by July 23, 1993. You must RSVP by July 23 to receive final notification of the flight date and further instructions. The draft agenda for the flight day is enclosed.

The SSRT program is a Ballistic Missile Defense Organization (BMDO) sponsored program to demonstrate the feasibility of reusable rocket system flight and operations. This program represents the first step in the development of fully reusable single stage rockets which have the potential for major reductions in spacelift costs. The SSRT program is an investment in dual-use technology that could help to ensure continued U.S. leadership in space well into the 21st century.

The design and fabrication of the flight vehicle, its mobile flight control center, and necessary ground servicing equipment were accomplished in a short 18 months at a cost of under \$70 million by a McDonnell Douglas Aerospace led team. Most recently, the DC-X flight vehicle and ground systems completed a successful series of static engine test fires and system checks at the NASA White Sands Test Facility located in Las Cruces, New Mexico.

I look forward to sharing the experience of viewing the first flight of the DC-X with you.
