Further to your telephone conversation yesterday with Ann Cronin-Cossette, I am writing to inform you officially of the visit to Washington of the Honourable John Ciaccia, Minister of International Relations of the Province of Quebec, Canada. He will be here April 27-29. He has expressed an interest in renewing his acquaintance with Vice President Gore, who he met at the Rio Summit. Attached is Mr. Ciaccia's biography.

Mr. Ciaccia would like to take the opportunity to explain the position of the Government of Quebec on the proposed Grande-Baleine project. As the negotiator for the original 1975 James Bay and Northern Quebec Agreement with the Cree and Inuit, and as the former Quebec Minister of Energy and Quebec Minister responsible for relations with the aboriginal people, Mr. Ciaccia is well placed to describe the background for this project. For additional background on this issue, attached is a fact sheet on the project prepared by the Embassy.

I fully appreciate that the Vice President's schedule is very tight. However, if he could meet even briefly with the Minister, we would be very appreciative. The afternoon of April 28 would fit in best with the Minister's program as it currently stands.

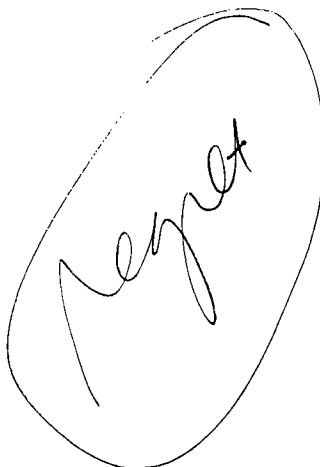

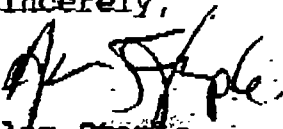

1. 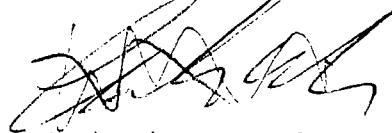

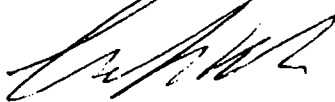

STATEMENT OF BASIS AND PURPOSE FOR THE CONFERENCE:

**"NATIONAL WATER RESOURCES REGULATION - WHERE IS
THE PENDULUM NOW?"**

Prepared by: Conference Organizing Committee:

"National Water Resources Regulation - Where is the Pendulum Now?"

The American Society of Civil Engineers (ASCE) and the American Bar Association (ABA) as primary sponsors, along with 25 additional federal government and professional co-sponsors, have arranged a conference in Washington D.C. on January 31 and February 1, 1994 entitled: "National Water Resources Regulation - Where is the Pendulum Now?" This *Pendulum* conference will feature nationally-recognized legislators, scientists, attorneys, planners, regulators, engineers and others who will discuss the scope and reasonableness of important water-related federal regulations, and who will offer specific suggestions for improvement.

The conference participants will debate questions of water-related regulation -- is there over-regulation, under-regulation, or does the existing regulatory process meet present and future national needs? Since the people of the United States spend over \$150 billion per year on environmental regulation, an obvious question is whether this money is well spent. Some believe not; the regulatory activity has gone too far and is hurting individuals, companies and the economy, oftentimes with little incremental benefit for the environment. Others downplay cost and argue that existing regulation has not gone far enough. They call for action to assure there is no backsliding on the commitment to environmental protection.

Issues other than cost have also been raised. Some see politics controlling regulation, without adequate scientific justification. Others ask if regulations emphasize legal expediency at the expense of science and engineering. Many ask if agencies effectively communicate with each other, with the regulated community, and with the public. The participants in the *Pendulum* conference will address these and other questions, encouraging review of existing regulations and focusing on new regulatory strategies and tactics, emphasizing cooperation, economic incentives, and regulation that protects both environmental resources and the national economy. Although this conference focuses on water resources regulation, much of the discussion and recommendations should be applicable to other regulatory areas.

Since 1970, over one dozen major federal laws have been enacted to regulate water resources, either directly or indirectly. Old regulations rarely die. New laws demand more regulations that produce multiple, and sometimes conflicting, requirements. This regulatory setting, combined with financial constraints and scientific or technical uncertainties, sets the stage for conflict among regulators, the regulated community, advocacy groups and the public. Regulators demand compliance, the regulated community seeks relief from overregulation, environmental advocates seek full protection of the environment, and the public demands quick and cost-effective responses to environmental problems.

HOW DID WE GET HERE? The Congress writes laws in a political process that is driven by public and private interests and, at times, scientific knowledge or technical capability. The transformation of law to enforceable regulations follows a multiple step process that considers the intent of Congress and public concerns, producing regulations that must then stand the test of judicial review. In this lengthy process, one or more competing interests may have an inordinate influence as regulations are being written, during the public comment period, or during the judicial review. The regulated community is forced to deal with a confusing array of existing regulations, regulations awaiting judicial review, new regulations under development, and policy announcements that presage new regulation. While legal issues are effectively addressed in this process, advances in science and engineering are often ignored, leaving old and sometimes expensive processes or practices in place.

IS OUR \$150 BILLION WELL SPENT? Obviously, cost is a major issue. Real costs escalate as the last small quantities of a pollutant are removed. How clean is clean enough? Is regulation too conservative because it is based on criteria that are overly protective, particularly when the scientific or technical information is absent or inadequate? How can regulation deal with improved analytical techniques that find more and more contamination of our environment, causing regular panic "events" because risk is poorly understood by, and communicated to, the public? Investment in pollution control has shifted from a reasoned, long-term strategy for environmental protection to an uncertain, and often high-cost, response to short-term demands of the public and government. Who pays for our environmental protection? We all do, but is it at the local level where government has the greatest problem balancing the competing demands of environmental protection against other services on limited tax receipts, or is it industry that must meet environmental regulation costs in competitive global markets? For any given industry or local government, the environment must compete with all other demands made on limited financial resources. Any environmental expenditure must meet the criteria of need, utility, and expected success.

CAN WE STRIKE A BALANCE? A balance in environmental regulation must be reached among multiple competing interests to avoid over-emphasizing any single factor such as economics, legal process, political "fads", scientific testing, or engineering feasibility. In the water resources regulatory arena, a bilateral view of balance is not entirely valid. A bilateral view allows a pendulum to swing freely across a known path between the two interests. The pendulum is pulled back and forth, stopping when competing forces are balanced. With more than two interests, the path of the pendulum is erratic, swinging across a field of influence rather than a single path, pulled this way and that by each competing interest. If the pendulum stops moving, the stop may be temporary as new forces align to pull the pendulum in a new direction. Paths, stopping points, and expected influences of competing forces are unpredictable and regularly result in gridlock!

Environmental regulation is difficult and contentious, but necessary. There is a need to protect the environment. There is a need to have regulation that is practical, workable, and economically efficient. Progress has been made over the last two decades in the United States in meeting the conflicting demands of environmental regulation, but continuing progress may be limited as economic, scientific, technical, social, and legal realities test a system that is finding it harder and harder to adequately meet the needs of multiple competing interests. How can regulation and the regulatory process be improved? This and the following questions will be addressed at the conference, in the context of contemporary water resources issues:

- Are existing regulations reasonable from a cost versus human and environmental benefit perspective?
- Are current regulations correlated with reliable scientific knowledge?
- Can we identify a regulatory approach that is flexible and that allows creative implementation of effective environmental control on a case-by-base basis?
- How far should regulations go when our knowledge is imperfect?
- How can we recognize the need for change in existing regulations and how can we implement these changes?
- Does multiple jurisdiction by several agencies serve the public interest and provide for regulatory efficiency?
- How do agencies address risk when writing regulations?

- How do small towns and small businesses deal with very expensive regulatory processes?
- How do we fix the problems created in the past by inadequate or ineffective regulation?
- Do we need new regulations or can existing regulations be used effectively and creatively to meet new needs?
- Should large sums of money be spent to eliminate small risks?
- Who should bear the cost of compliance? What mix of federal and state funding reflects the protection of the public good?
- Can regulation meet multiple interests through better planning?

Our speakers, all of whom are nationally recognized experts in their respective areas, will address these specific questions and make definitive recommendations for change. The status quo is not acceptable from the standpoint of any interest group, and the stakes are far too high to allow the status quo to continue.

Please accept my apology for the delay in responding to you with regard to the electric opera "Lone Season." I have reviewed the libretto of the opera and the vignette tapes "Courtship of the Wolves" and "The Dog and the Wolf." This is certainly an innovative idea concerning ways to educate and inform the public regarding wolves. Of course, I have no opera expertise, and can only provide some input from the biological perspective.

I appreciate your interest, and that of your client, Mr. Steve Guyer, in bringing attention to wolves as an endangered species and in utilizing the opera as a fund-raiser. I am very interested in cooperating with you in this regard to the degree that I am permitted as a government employee; however, I am not authorized to openly endorse a product such as the opera. I can provide you with a letter evaluating the opera from the standpoint of biological accuracy, which I have enclosed. You may use this letter in any way you deem appropriate.

There are things I can do to help get the message concerning the opera to the public--where and when it is scheduled to be performed and the fact that it is a fund-raiser for wolf recovery activities. Possibilities in this regard include a U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service news release as well as articles in prominent wolf magazines, newsletters, updates, etc..

In regard to your request for other contacts, I am enclosing a list of organizations that was published in the Winter 1992 issue of "Wolves and Related Canids."

With regard to using the opera as a fund-raiser for the red wolf, proceeds that you wish to contribute should be made to the "Red Wolf Fund" and should be sent directly to Mr. Whitney C. Tilt, Project Director, National Fish and Wildlife Foundation, 1120 Connecticut Avenue, NW., Suite 900, Washington, DC 20036. Such contributions will be matched by the National Fish and Wildlife Foundation, effectively doubling the amount contributed. This money will be made available for use by the red wolf program.

If several wolf programs are to benefit from funds raised by the opera, how do you propose to distribute contributions? It seems there are at least two possibilities. One method would be an equal distribution of all proceeds to each wolf program. However, I believe the best way would be to designate proceeds from performances in the geographic area of the various wolf programs to that particular program. For example, proceeds from a performance in Tennessee would be designated for the red wolf program; in Wyoming the Rocky Mountains wolf program, in Arizona the Mexican wolf program, and in Minnesota the eastern timber wolf program. In this regard, I would certainly encourage having a performance in North Carolina; our largest wild red wolf population is in North Carolina. Cities offering possibilities in North Carolina include Raleigh and Charlotte. Other possible performance sites in our geographic area would include Atlanta, Georgia, and Charleston, South Carolina.

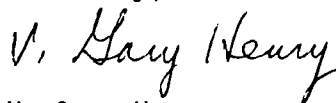

I'm glad we finally found time to have lunch again -- I miss our conversations. Thanks, too, for your suggestions for an Administration speaker to discuss the environment as part of the "Emerging Issues" symposium at the upcoming NEXPO '93 in New Orleans.

First, let me give you some background on why I'm involved with this.

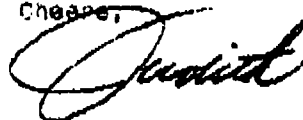
I was one of the nation's first full time environmental reporters (circa 1973), covering at that time the environmental aspects of the energy crisis, offshore exploration and development, coastal zone issues, and growth. I carried a deep personal as well as professional interest in environmental issues with me into OTA where I learned much more about the technical and political aspect of developments affecting the environment. And, of course, you know that while I was at NOAA, I was (literally) head over heels in oil spills. Now -- what's all that got to do with the newspaper business?

In the years that I have been a newspaper executive with Independent, I have used that knowledge and experience to try to do my part to bring an environmental conscience to the newspaper business. Far too many newspapers are staunch environmentalists in their news and editorial columns, but fail to bring the same concern and commitment to how they run their own businesses. I've tried to change that. For example, we have experimented extensively with all the major ink companies to promote the development of rubproof soybean news inks. Ultimately, the State News was the first newspaper in the nation to print EVERY DAY with 100% soybean ink (black and colors) on 100% recycled newsprint.

I have spoken extensively at industry conferences about the environmental challenges facing newspapers and, until my recent resignation from the Board of Directors of NAA, I was (fondly, I hope) known as its "#1 greenie." As I head off into early retirement this "Emerging Issues" symposium is probably my last major opportunity to try to make other publishers face up to the fact that we can do much more than we are to meet our environmental challenges.

I appreciate your willingness to carry my invitation to Katy McGinty. I think she could be an excellent addition to the program...and it could also be a wonderful opportunity for her to get an Administration message to newspaper owners and publishers. Last week I spoke with your assistant Kurt Zwally, and he recommended that I write to set a time when you and I could meet.

From the start let me assure that time is as valuable to me as it must be to you. The risk that either of us would be wasting time by meeting for a half hour on environmental issues is extremely small. What I want to do is offer you my assistance in technical support for environmental decisions. This is why I think the technical support could be of value to you:

I am a Director of Tetra Tech, a 27-year-old publicly-owned environmental engineering and consulting firm. It turns out I contributed to Bill Clinton's campaign and voted for him, but I don't think that's the most relevant qualifying criteria here. Tetra Tech is the premier environmental assessment contractor with the Air Force for base closings, realignments, and reuse; and we are currently developing the guide for preparing Environmental Impact Statements throughout the Air Force. As General Manager of Environmental Sciences for Argonne National Laboratory, I would like to meet with you to discuss the role of the national laboratories in U.S. environmental policy.

Scientific uncertainty has often set the stage for disagreement among various interests, which has impeded efforts to effectively resolve issues at the environmental/economic interface.

More specifically, the forum's main purposes are: to identify attributes of electricity-based technological innovations that could lead to increased productivity and enhanced environmental quality and societal well-being; to lay the groundwork for developing a monograph on the state of knowledge about these questions; and to identify new research directions appropriate to these themes.

A draft agenda for the forum is attached. It will open with a historical background of the role of electricity in society. The opening session will be followed by discussions on anticipated future applications such as industrial processes, transportation, communication and information systems. The second day will address connections between electricity use, environmental quality, and sustainability. The last session will be a discussion of energy-society connections in the next century. We believe that the chosen mix of topics and participants will stimulate a lively and useful discussion.
