Following is a proposed outline of questions for the environmental debate prep book. This outline reflects input from a meeting with Katie McGinty, Jonathan Sallet, Bob Baum, and Tom Grumbly. That meeting also produced agreement that we will work toward separate books on this issue for Gov. Clinton and Sen. Gore, in order to accommodate their different preferences for briefing formats. However, we will work to ensure substantive and rhetorical consistency.

Per your 8/5 memo, each question will be followed by a suggested answer, Clinton position, Bush vulnerabilities/contrast, Bush position, Bush attacks/ Clinton rebuttal, and background. Questions will be grouped into two areas: questions on cross-cutting thematic topics, and questions on specific environmental issues. The questions listed below are examples, and the actual book will likely have additional questions under each section.

I. Thematic Questions

A. Clinton Plan:

1. How would you summarize your approach to the environment?
2. What are your environmental goals for your first term?
3. What do you mean when you talk about market-based initiatives?

B. Bush Critique:

1. What are the key differences between your plan and Bush's?
2. Why don't you think Bush deserves the title of "enviro president"?

C. Arkansas Record:

1. Given your AR record, isn't your new "green tone" a flip-flop?
2. Isn't the White River your Boston Harbor?

D. Jobs vs. Environment

1. How do you respond to the charge that your plan will cost jobs?
2. Doesn't your AR record prove that enviro and jobs do conflict?
3. Aren't you siding with upper-class greens over blue-collar workers?

E. Gore

1. How do you and Sen. Gore differ on enviro and how do you resolve that?
2. Do you support the plan Sen. Gore laid out in his book?

II. Issue-specific Questions

- A. Air: Didn't the "environmental president" earn the title by passing the Clean Air amendments?
- B. Biodiversity: Would you have signed the biodiversity treaty? Why is that worth it to the U.S., given the possible harm to U.S. firms?
- C. Endangered species/Forests: You and your supporters seem to care more about spotted owls than families of American loggers; true?
- D. Global warming: Aren't fears of global warming based on sketchy science, and aren't you endangering American economic growth by overreacting to it?
- E. Clean Water/Oceans/Rivers: Candidate Bush campaigned at Boston Harbor; President Bush took steps to clean it up; hasn't he fulfilled his promises?
- F. Solid waste: Some states want the right to refuse trash being shipped in for disposal from other states; do you support that right?
- G. Superfund: 20% or more of Superfund costs now go to lawyers, consultants, and other middlemen; is this a good law or a bad one, and what would you do?
- H. Toxics/hazardous waste: How would you reduce the flow of toxic wastes without hurting jobs in chemicals and other industries?
- I. Trade: Won't NAFTA be an environmental disaster?
- J. Wetlands: You say you favor "no net loss"; yet you wrote a letter to the White House supporting an exemption for farmers; isn't that a contradiction?

[Note: This section will have other issue-specific areas as well.]

Draft: Outline for Debate Prep Book on Environment

This outline proposes that we organize the book primarily by thematic questions, with the last portion of the book focused on issue-specific questions (e.g., global warming). The following are the major thematic questions (although there are clearly many possible ways of phrasing these general points):

3. Isn't your environmental record in Arkansas pretty awful?

I thought it might be helpful to summarize our delightful meeting of yesterday. The four of us met, along with Michael Fisher, the Executive Director of the Sierra Club who happened to be in Senator's Gore's office at the appointed time of our meeting.

We first discussed our understanding of the nature of the issues briefing book, and concluded that these papers are to serve as both background on the issues and to suggest positions for the campaign. The goal is to contain recommendations which consistent with the candidates' positions, and not merely reflecting one environmental group's views. We should speak with the authors to see whether the papers were individually authored or whether there was a diversity of input. If the papers were individually authored, since most of the annointed authors are affiliated with environmental advocacy groups, to the extent practicable, it would be worthwhile to discuss individual papers with moderates outside the particular environmental organization.

We have now received 11 papers from the areas designated on Clay Peters' list. Those have been divided among Clay, Jeremy and me for editing, as per the attached schedule. In addition, we added topics of economy and jobs, health, taking, trade and super-fund.

Clay believes that he will have the rest of the issues papers by Friday, except perhaps for Clean Air. I will contact Dave Hawkins, and unless he can explicitly represent that the paper will be in my hands by Friday, I will replace him with another author. Furthermore, if Clay detects any hesitancy among those who cannot produce their papers about their ability to provide the papers by Friday, then he will find replacements for them. We agreed that it is better to have two papers than none.

We will ask the authors of the papers, or the prepare ourselves, bullets on each topic which can be quickly referred to slam President Bush and or bolster the Clinton/Gore position.

Where major edits are required, the authors will be asked to make the changes. Where minor edits are required, we will make the edits ourselves. Each of the editors should obtain disks in Wordperfect 5.1 from their authors, and then the disks will be compiled into one disk which will be sent to Little Rock.

After the Issues Book is completed, then we will turn our attention to future activities, including developing a list of talking points for the Clinton/Gore campaign, experts in each of the areas to be available when questions arise, schedule of environmental activities that might warrant attention from the campaign, particular environmental initiatives in Congress (e.g., introduction of the Rio Treaty) and a list of local contacts which should be passed on to the field or political desk.

At 3:30 on Thursday we will have a conference call to decide the status of the issues book. I will initiate the call and call Jeremy and Clay at their offices and Katie (215) 742-2489. If possible, we will send the almost complete book to Bill on Friday.
