Dear Mr. O'Connor,

It was a pleasure to talk to you briefly on the telephone yesterday about the World Congress on Urban Growth and the Environment, which is to be held in Hong Kong from 7th to 12th November 1994.

I appreciate that it will not be possible to persuade Senator Gore to focus on this far-distant conference just a week before the Presidential Election. I thought it might, nevertheless, be useful if I summarised for you the question to which I was seeking an answer.

The organisers of this Congress have asked whether The Prince of Wales would be prepared to lend his support, and to attend. His Royal Highness is unable to commit himself to being there some two years in advance, but has expressed a willingness to be Patron or President - in the hope that circumstances will, after all, allow him to be there in person on the day. It occurred to him that the most effective way of helping might be to join the Senator as Joint-President. Before giving a definitive answer to the Congress organisers, however, he instructed me to find out whether Senator Gore would be in favour of a joint association of this sort. Needless to say, The Prince of Wales has no desire to pursue the idea if it does not enjoy the Senator's support.

As you know, I am under some pressure from the organisers of the Congress to let them know the precise extent of His Royal Highness's involvement. I should be grateful for anything you can do, as and when the opportunity arises, to let me know the Senator's views.

Dear Senator,

In my new position as Senior Vice President of our World Congress in Hong Kong, I have been invited by my colleagues to take over the responsibility of bringing you up to date from time to time on all the latest developments in the preparations for an event which is gradually being accepted as an important sequel to this year's Earth Summit in Rio. This I shall be delighted to do.

May I first of all congratulate you, however belatedly, on your nomination as the Democratic Vice Presidential candidate in the U.S. elections? As you may imagine, the campaign is being followed with great interest by all of us here in Britain.

I draw your attention straightaway to the fact that the decision has had to be taken to postpone the Hong Kong Congress to November 1994. This was done for three main reasons:-

- (a) To allow us more time to establish proper working relations with official as well as professional circles, especially in the People's Republic of China and Japan.

- (b) To enable us to deal systematically with all necessary fund-raising activities.
- (c) To facilitate the personal participation in the Congress of H.R.H. the Prince of Wales, who, as you will note from the attached letter, is likely to respond favourably to our invitation to become a Patron of the Congress. We had previously been informed that Prince Charles' acceptance of our invitation would be conditional on his being able to join us in Hong Kong at the time of the Congress. This was not going to be possible until November 1994.

In April of this year I was invited to attend the Eminent Persons' Meeting on Financing Global Environment and Development, held in Tokyo under the chairmanship of former Prime Minister Takeshita. There I was able to talk about our 1994 Congress to the former Chinese Foreign Minister, Mr. Huang Hua. This led to an introduction to State Councillor Song Jian, Chairman of the newly-established China Council for International Co-operation on Environment and Development. Professor Song has since confirmed his full support for our 1994 project through the British Ambassador in Beijing. His Department for International Co-operation is currently dealing with our request for the selection of a number of prominent Chinese speakers for the Congress.

You may already be aware that the leading Vice Chairman of Professor Song's China Council is the President of the National Environmental Protection Agency (NEPA), Dr. Qu Geping, who has also been approached through Dr. Martin Holdgate, Director General of The World Conservation Union (IUCN) in Geneva. In this connection, it has occurred to me that in due course you may be able to assist us in establishing similar connections with the United States Environmental Protection Agency in Washington.

Dr. Holdgate (who was one of my senior officials when I was Secretary of State for the Environment) has become one of our most active Vice Presidents, and is currently advising the Steering Committee on the necessary revision of the attached "outline programme" for 1994. We need greater focus and cohesion between its seven separate sections, and we are keen that the Congress should be widely seen as one of several events being planned as follow-up to the Rio Conference.

Whilst in Tokyo, in April, I also made the acquaintance of the Indonesian Minister for the Environment, Professor Emil Salim, and I have since invited him to help us with the formation of an official Indonesian delegation to the 1994 Congress. Similar steps have already been undertaken in the Philippines.

As you will note from the attached information, in addition to the overall patronage of the Landscape Institutes of the United Kingdom, the United States and Japan, since you met Professor Hare and Mr. Hugh Clamp in Washington on 11th January last we have succeeded in obtaining the official support of the following institutions:-

1. The World Conservation Union (IUCN), Geneva
2. Royal Geographical Society, London
3. The Royal Society of Canada, Ottawa
4. University of Toronto

Although, unfortunately, this does not include financial support, it means a great deal to us to have the backing of the four institutions for reasons of prestige, professional advice and publicity.

I regret that the postponement of the Congress to November 1994 has resulted in our losing Professor Ivan Head as the event's Chairman. However, you will be pleased to know that the position has already been filled by Professor Arnaldo Gabaldon from Venezuela, another of our Vice Presidents, who I believe is well known to you. Professor Gabaldon, who recently visited us here in London, is well known to several members of our existing team, all of whom have the highest possible respect for him. Quite apart from Professor Gabaldon's personal reputation, we believe there is virtue in having as Chairman of our Congress a leading personality from the Developing World, which features so prominently in our programme.

I leave again for Japan in a few days' time, where I shall be seeing my old friend, Mr. Kazuo Aichi, former Minister for the Environment, and the President of the Japanese Institute of Landscape Architects, Dr. Sadatoshi Tabata, among others. At the beginning of November I go to Hong Kong where I have been invited to attend the Prince of Wales' Business Leaders Forum. This will provide a golden opportunity for me to meet some of our prospective sponsors from the local business community, who have been waiting for the arrangements for 1994 to be formalised.

Hoping to have the pleasure of meeting you in person in the not too distant future, I would like to thank you most sincerely for your personal support, and remain in the meantime, with warmest best wishes from us all,

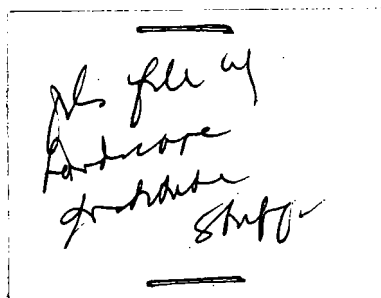

WORLD CONGRESS ON URBAN GROWTH AND THE
ENVIRONMENT, HONG KONG, 18-23 OCTOBER 1993

Further to our meeting in your office on 11th January, in the company of Professor Kenneth Hare, I wonder if I may draw your attention to the fact that, as far back as December 1990 (at the time through the Heritage Trust), we were strongly advised to approach Mr. Li Ka-shing, Chairman of Hutchison Whampoa in Hong Kong, for possible sponsorship of the Congress in question.

The reason for this was not only Mr. Li Ka-shing's position as a leading member of the Hong Kong business community, and the example set by his group in establishing worthwhile business relations with the People's Republic of China (a most important partner in the 1993 Congress), but also his substantial Canadian interests. The latter, it was assumed, might encourage Mr. Li Ka-shing to support a project with a very strong Canadian involvement, through Professor Hare, Chancellor of Trent University, Peterborough, Ontario, Canada's leading atmospheric scientist, and Professor Ivan Head, Past President of the International Development Research Centre in Ottawa, who some time ago kindly accepted the position of overall Chairman of our World Congress in Hong Kong.

The fact that you yourself should have paid us the honour of becoming the President of the Congress, has strengthened our position in North America even further, especially in view of your personal and passionate commitment to environmental protection for more than twenty years, which has encouraged Professor Hare and Professor Head to serve under you as Vice-Presidents.

During the course of our informal, Autumn 1990 talks here in London with Lord Derwent, Managing Director of Hutchison Whampoa (Europe) Ltd., we were advised not to approach Mr Li Ka-shing formally until all the principal preparations for 1993 had been dealt with. I believe it was rumoured at the time that Hong Kong Electric, one of the companies in the Hutchison Whampoa Group, might be the first to look at a formal application for sponsorship.

The Professional Institute for Landscape Architects, Landscape Managers and Landscape Scientists

The above condition having now been complied with, following the switch in overall responsibilities from the Heritage Trust to the Landscape Institutes of the United Kingdom, the United States and Japan (under whose joint auspices the 1993 World Congress in Hong Kong will now be held), I wonder if I may ask you, as our President, to approach Mr. Li Ka-shing on our behalf, in recognition of the worldwide aspect of our objectives and the substantially increased North American involvement in our project, which you are personally encouraging. As far as Canada is concerned, we have been informed recently by Professor Hare that the Royal Society of Canada and the University of Toronto mean to join the many international institutions that are supporting our cause already.

As you are aware, Landscape Architects nowadays consider themselves to be responsible for the planning and the protection of all outdoor spaces, both urban and rural. Together with our American and Japanese colleagues we thus like to think of ourselves as ideally placed to organise and promote an event of worldwide significance, that will address some of the major environmental problems caused by the population explosion, especially in the larger cities of the Developing World.

The 1993 Congress, which stands to gain a great deal from Hong Kong's experience in the last mentioned field, is expected to attract a multi-disciplinary, professional audience of around 800 delegates, from all over the world, with a programme that covers a total of 30 papers by leading international experts and several workshops, over five days. Most of the papers will be presented as case-studies, dealing in some depth with the environmental problems and corresponding solutions of specific metropolitan centres.

It may interest Mr. Li Ka-shing to know that Sir David Akers-Jones, Chairman of the Hong Kong Housing Authority, has kindly agreed to act as Head of a small Action Committee in Hong Kong, which will advise our Steering Committee in London on all local issues, including the participation in the Congress of a substantial number of young graduates from mainland China. Sir David is already looking at a number of possibilities in this direction.

Unfortunately, the holding of the World Congress under discussion has to be conditional on our ability to raise the required £350,000 (U.S.\$602,000) from outside sources, especially from the Hong Kong business community, which stands to gain the most from the event in terms of international confidence, so important in the run-up to 1997, and the worldwide publicity that is involved.

Moreover, the financial support of the Hong Kong business community is absolutely essential to us in gaining also the support of the Japanese, whom we intend to approach through Sir Peter Parker and Lord (Patrick) Jenkin, as soon as we know what is happening in Hong Kong.

Whilst trying to find out the best way of presenting our case to Mr. Li Ka-shing, we have already approached Lord Kadoorie, Chairman of the China Light & Power Company in Hong Kong, through our Vice-President, Prince Abbas Hilmi, and Lord Young, Chairman of Cable and Wireless, through Lord Jenkin, who is another of our Vice-Presidents. Both companies are still considering our application for sponsorship.

In view of the strong Canadian connection, however, Mr. Li Ka-shing's personal support would appear to be more appropriate, seen in the light of a major international event that will make a substantial contribution, not only to the field of global environmental protection, but also to international co-operation and goodwill, especially throughout the Pacific. It would appear to be meaningful, in this connection, to say the least, that Professor Ivan Head, as Chairman of the 1993 World Congress in Hong Kong, should now be based at the University of British Columbia in Vancouver.

Should Mr. Li Ka-shing decide to support our cause, may be he would consider paying us the honour of joining our small team of Vice-Presidents, either personally or through one of his sons, who apparently represent him in Canada.

May I also remind you that to safeguard the interests of the Landscape Institute, itself a charity, as well as those of our sister-organisations in Washington and Tokyo, we have decided to form a small limited liability company named "Hong Kong Congress 1993 Ltd. ", which will be responsible for administering all the funds of the Congress.

On a more personal note, since meeting you in Washington, together with Professor Hare, in January, I have read with great interest and pleasure your latest book, "Earth in the Balance ", which deals in such depth with so many of the environmental issues we shall be addressing in Hong Kong. We will make good use of it throughout our preparations for 1993!

I was most interested to hear from Professor Head that Marcel Masse, President of the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA), has been appointed a Vice-Chairman of the Chinese Government's newly established China Council for International Co-Operation on Environment and Development, as the only foreigner, together with two leading Chinese personalities. I consider this to be highly significant for our own dealings with the PRC over the 1993 World Congress in Hong Kong.

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It may interest Mr. Li Ka-shing to know that Sir David Akers-Jones, Chairman of the Hong Kong Housing Authority, has kindly agreed to act as Head of a small Action Committee in Hong Kong, which will advise our Steering Committee in London on all local issues, including the participation in the Congress of a substantial number of young graduates from mainland China. Sir David is already looking at a number of possibilities in this direction.

Unfortunately, the holding of the World Congress under discussion has to be conditional on our ability to raise the required £350,000 (U.S.\$602,000) from outside sources, especially from the Hong Kong business community, which stands to gain the most from the event in terms of international confidence, so important in the run-up to 1997, and the worldwide publicity that is involved.

Moreover, the financial support of the Hong Kong business community is absolutely essential to us in gaining also the support of the Japanese, whom we intend to approach through Sir Peter Parker and Lord (Patrick) Jenkin, as soon as we know what is happening in Hong Kong.

Whilst trying to find out the best way of presenting our case to Mr. Li Ka-shing, we have already approached Lord Kadoorie, Chairman of the China Light & Power Company in Hong Kong, through our Vice-President, Prince Abbas Hilmi, and Lord Young, Chairman of Cable and Wireless, through Lord Jenkin, who is another of our Vice-Presidents. Both companies are still considering our application for sponsorship.

In view of the strong Canadian connection, however, Mr. Li Ka-shing's personal support would appear to be more appropriate, seen in the light of a major international event that will make a substantial contribution, not only to the field of global environmental protection, but also to international co-operation and goodwill, especially throughout the Pacific. It would appear to be meaningful, in this connection, to say the least, that Professor Ivan Head, as Chairman of the 1993 World Congress in Hong Kong, should now be based at the University of British Columbia in Vancouver.

Should Mr. Li Ka-shing decide to support our cause, may be he would consider paying us the honour of joining our small team of Vice-Presidents, either personally or through one of his sons, who apparently represent him in Canada.

May I also remind you that to safeguard the interests of the Landscape Institute, itself a charity, as well as those of our sister-organisations in Washington and Tokyo, we have decided to form a small limited liability company named "Hong Kong Congress 1993 Ltd. ", which will be responsible for administering all the funds of the Congress.

On a more personal note, since meeting you in Washington, together with Professor Hare, in January, I have read with great interest and pleasure your latest book, "Earth in the Balance", which deals in such depth with so many of the environmental issues we shall be addressing in Hong Kong. We will make good use of it throughout our preparations for 1993!

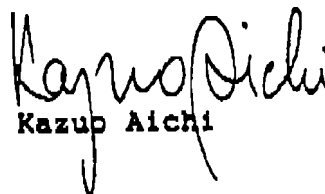

**PETER ROWE NAMED DEAN OF HARVARD UNIVERSITY
GRADUATE SCHOOL OF DESIGN**

Peter G. Rowe, the Raymond Garbe Professor of Architecture and Design and Chairman of the Urban Planning and Design Department, has been appointed Dean of Harvard University's Graduate School of Design (GSD), effective July 1.

In making the announcement, Harvard President Neil L. Rudenstine praised Rowe for his intellectual capacity, energy, and integrity.

"He has been a highly successful department chairman and is regarded by senior faculty in all three departments as capable of integrating the different parts of the School," Rudenstine said. "He has incisive ideas about an academic and financial plan for the School's future and is a person of unquestioned integrity and energy who displays a deep commitment to the School's central purpose."

Rowe succeeds Gerald McCue, who has served as Dean since 1980. McCue will step down as Dean in June, and after spending next year on sabbatical, will resume teaching at Harvard.

Rowe, 46, born in New Zealand and raised in Australia, received his bachelor's degree in architecture from Melbourne University and his master's degree in urban design from Rice University. He joined Harvard in 1985 as professor of architecture and urban design and director of the Urban Design Programs. In 1988, he was named Chairman of the Urban Planning and Design Department.

From 1981 to 1985, he was director of Rice University's School of Architecture and from 1979 to 1981, he served as vice president of the Rice Center in Houston. He is the author of *Making a Middle Landscape* (M.I.T. Press, 1991) and the soon-to-be-

published *Modernity and Housing* (M.I.T. Press). He is also the author of *Design Thinking* (M.I.T. Press, 1987) and *Principles for Local Environmental Management* (Ballinger Press, 1978).

His research includes serving as co-principal investigator for research entitled, "The Feasibility of Housing Surveys Using Remote-Sensored Data," the Aga Khan Unit for Housing and Urbanization, GSD, 1988; principal investigator, "Urban Design in a City of Fragments," National Endowment for the Arts, 1987-89; principal investigator, campus coordinator and consultant, "Jamiah Project—King Faisal University," U.S.-Saudi Arabian Joint Commission on Economic Cooperation, U.S. Department of the Treasury, 1981-86; principal investigator, "Identification, Analysis and Evaluation of Alternative Actions for Achieving Energy Savings in the Transportation Sector," U.S. Department of Transportation, 1979-1980; principal investigator, "Environmental Analysis for Development Planning," National Science Foundation, 1973-78.

Rowe is a member of the Regional and Urban Design Committee of the American Institute of Architects, a member of the Institute for Urban Design, an associate member of the Urban Land Institute, and an honorary member of the Boston Society of Architects.

Meeting with Senator Gore in Washington,
at 10.30 on Saturday, 11th January 1992

In view of the importance of the meeting in question, which will determine the extent of Senator Gore's personal involvement in the preparations for the October 1993 World Congress in Hong Kong on Environmental Protection, could I ask you to pay special attention to the following points:

- 1) First and foremost we need the Senator's official confirmation that he is prepared to support our cause by accepting the position of President of the Honorary Advisory Committee. We shall require this in writing, in a personal letter from him to you, which should include a personal message of encouragement, as well as of recognition that the programme is one aimed at tackling " global environmental pollution ", not urban regeneration! Such a letter will be indispensable to us for the 12th February meeting with Prince Philip, and all subsequent approaches to prospective sponsors from the Hong Kong business community.
- 2) In view of Senator Gore's well known, personal commitment to environmental protection, we would greatly appreciate some indication from him of the American organisations and institutions which we could turn to with his support, for assistance in selecting suitable speakers for the 1993 World Congress in Hong Kong, and in promoting the event throughout the United States in due course. We are particularly interested in establishing close connections with the United States Environmental Protection Agency, that may be prepared to appoint and sponsor three keynote speakers to the Hong Kong Congress, in its own right.
- 3) If there is any likelihood of Senator Gore coming to England at any time between January 1992 and October 1993, we should be informed well in advance, if at all possible, on the chance that we may succeed in arranging a meeting or function with Prince Philip and some of the members of the Honorary Advisory Committee, whilst he is

in London. The Committee in question, as you know, is not expected to convene under normal circumstances.

4) We will need to know exactly who we will be expected to deal with in Senator Gore's Washington office, on normal, day-to-day matters. The Senator may also be prepared to let us have a personal letter of introduction to the United States Consul General in Hong Kong, whom Derek Lovejoy and I will want to call on for reasons of courtesy and moral support.

5) It would be interesting for us to have the Senator's comments on the involvement of the Japanese, on which so much time is currently being spent here in London, with the support of Sir Peter Parker and Lord (Patrick) Jenkin, the former Secretary of State for the Environment.

6) Senator Gore will be kept fully informed of all the developments in the preparations for the 1993 World Congress in Hong Kong through the minutes of the meetings of the Steering Committee, to be held in London every two months, starting, hopefully, in May 1992.

Since you, Kenneth Hare and David Bohardt are due to have dinner together at the Hyatt Regency Hotel on Capitol Hill on the Friday, 10th January, please remember to make all final arrangements with David by phone from New York, and to advise him of the exact time of your arrival in Washington. All arrangements should be co-ordinated with Professor Hare in Toronto (our " elder statesman "), who, as you know, is paying us the compliment of flying down specially for the meeting with Senator Gore. David's full address is the following:

Dear Mr. Li,

I am taking the liberty of writing to you in my capacity as a Vice-President of the World Congress on Urban Growth and the Environment to be held in Hong Kong in October 1993, to seek your help and support.

You will see from the lists of names attached that the Congress enjoys distinguished international support. Our President is Senator Al Gore, who has made himself a leading authority on environmental concerns; among the Vice-Presidents we can number Mr. Kazuo Aichi, a former Environment Minister in the Japanese Government, Dr. Martin Holdgate, a former Chairman of the United Nations Environment Programme Council and other distinguished names.

The Chairman of our Action Committee in Hong Kong is Sir David Akers-Jones, whom of course you will know well.

The decision to hold this Congress in Hong Kong was warmly welcomed by the Governor,

formerly Sir David Wilson (now Lord Wilson of Tillyorn); I attach a copy of his letter. The purpose of the Congress is to address the increasingly grave problems confronting countries in the developing world caused by mass migration to major cities and the consequent urban degradation and pollution and human misery they occasion. I attach a note of the main themes that the Congress will cover.

The Congress has been in preparation now for nearly three years and Committees are at work both in London and in Hong Kong. We envisage the Congress catering for a professional audience of around 800 people drawn from the worlds of politics, science, urban planning, social science, landscape architects, and so on; we also aim to include 150 young graduates from institutes of higher education throughout the Far East whom we hope to invite free of charge.

The event is being organised under the auspices of three prestigious national Landscape Institutes, in the UK, the United States and Japan. It is seen as a much-needed follow-up to the Rio Conference on Environment and Development next month.

We attach particular importance to the Canadian involvement. Professor Kenneth Hare, Canada's leading atmospheric scientist, agreed at the outset to join in the preparations and he brought on board Professor Ivan Head, immediate Past President of the International Development Research Centre in Ottawa (IDRC). Professor Head has agreed to be the overall Chairman of the Hong Kong Congress, a position for which he is eminently qualified in the light of his great experience in helping to solve the problems of the developing world. The President of the University of Toronto, Robert Prichard, has also confirmed his support - I attach a copy of a letter of confirmation he has written to me.

I was fortunate in being invited to attend the recent Eminent Persons' Meeting on Financing Global Environment and Development held in Tokyo under the chairmanship of former Prime Minister Takeshita. I was able there to enlist the support for the Hong Kong Congress not only of Mr. Takeshita but of several other distinguished Japanese people. At the same meeting I made the acquaintance of the former Chinese Foreign Minister, Mr. Huang Hua (I have since spoken to him again here in London) and he has proved most helpful.

Mr. Huang Hua has put me in touch with the Chairman of the newly-established China Council for International Co-operation on Environment and Development, Mr. Song Jian, and this should ensure a strong participation in the Hong Kong Congress from Mainland China. It is worth noting, too, that the current President of the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA), Marcel Massé (a close associate of Professor Head) is the only foreigner to have been invited to join the China Council as a Vice-Chairman.

I come now to the purpose of this letter. My colleagues on both sides of the Atlantic have asked me to approach you in the hope that you may be prepared to assist with the funding of the Hong Kong Congress. We need to finance a budget of £350,000, and I enclose a copy of that budget showing exactly how this is made up. There are prospects of some funds both from Japan and from America, but potential sponsors are looking for a sizable commitment on the part of Hong Kong business. Despite a number of approaches to Hong Kong businessmen, no commitments have yet been made.

Given your own close involvement with Canada and the importance I believe you attach to building close and cordial relations between Hong Kong and Japan, and Hong Kong and Mainland China, it is my hope that you may feel able to become associated with this high-profile Congress.

You will obviously want to consider this approach most carefully. If you would like one of our associates to meet you to discuss the project in person (either in Hong Kong or elsewhere) we would be happy to make the necessary arrangements. You may prefer to discuss the position first with Sir David Akers-Jones, to whom I am copying this letter.

We were hoping very much that you yourself, as Executive Director of UNFPA, might be prepared to deliver the first one of the two above mentioned keynote introductory lectures, or that failing the likelihood of a personal intervention on your part, you may be willing to appoint a senior member of your team to deal with the fundamental, poverty-related factors affecting the uncontrolled spread and ensuing environmental impact of Squatter Settlements throughout the Developing World, which so many of us have come to regard as an environmental and political time-bomb! The second introductory lecture under Section B. of our programme has already been allocated to Dr. Jorge Hardoy from Argentina.

Quite apart from your own, personal reputation, we see the involvement of UNFPA in our plans as an essential link in ensuring that our 1993 World Congress in Hong Kong draws the maximum possible benefit from the experience that will have been gained from the United Nations' forthcoming Earth Summit in Rio de Janeiro, the resolutions of which we shall be studying very carefully indeed.

Following a most important meeting here in London of our organising committees, last Wednesday, chaired by Lord Jenkin and held on the occasion of the visit to England of Professor Hare from Toronto, may I inform you most urgently that the likelihood was discussed of our having to postpone the 1993 World Congress in Hong Kong by approximately six months. 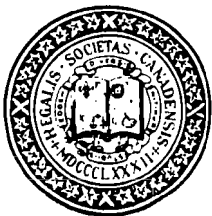

Dear Mr. O'Connor,

It was a pleasure to talk to you briefly on the telephone yesterday about the World Congress on Urban Growth and the Environment, which is to be held in Hong Kong from 7th to 12th November 1994.

I appreciate that it will not be possible to persuade Senator Gore to focus on this far-distant conference just a week before the Presidential Election. I thought it might, nevertheless, be useful if I summarised for you the question to which I was seeking an answer.

The organisers of this Congress have asked whether The Prince of Wales would be prepared to lend his support, and to attend. His Royal Highness is unable to commit himself to being there some two years in advance, but has expressed a willingness to be Patron or President - in the hope that circumstances will, after all, allow him to be there in person on the day. It occurred to him that the most effective way of helping might be to join the Senator as Joint-President. Before giving a definitive answer to the Congress organisers, however, he instructed me to find out whether Senator Gore would be in favour of a joint association of this sort. Needless to say, The Prince of Wales has no desire to pursue the idea if it does not enjoy the Senator's support.

As you know, I am under some pressure from the organisers of the Congress to let them know the precise extent of His Royal Highness's involvement. I should be grateful for anything you can do, as and when the opportunity arises, to let me know the Senator's views.

history to date on this: i was unfamiliar with the landscape institute, however, i was impressed that prince philip was listed as the Patron of the event and by the bios of some of the organizers. i therefore asked a friend of mine at the british embassy (their envtl attache) to check it out. he advised me that the organization is first rate. i therefore accepted their invitation "in principle." (they requested this because they needed at least that much to justify a trip to the US to speak to you in person about the event). the understanding now then is that you will meet with them to discuss the event in greater detail. your further involvement hinges on your impressions after the meeting and, of course, on your schedule. no commitment of time or personal participation has been made to date, and it is my understanding that, even if you do accept their offer, the position is purely honorary and will not require any significant investment of time.

in this meeting you should determine the exact nature and extent of prince philip's involvement. (my latest information from them is that he "has responded to our request for patronage by indicating that he wishes to see us, also early next january.") you should also try to determine how many people -- and who -- would be expected to attend; what are the primary goals of the conference and will there be some written statement or other product

produced at the conference; have speakers been invited to date and if not, who are they considering.

again, my impression is that this is a very solid group and will be a good event -- worth your involvement, even if you don't end up actually participating. i apologize that i am not around for the meeting, but i will ask eric if he can sit in on it to get the scoop on the details. cheers.

I wonder if I may draw your attention to the enclosed information on the World Congress in question, for which the Landscape Institute decided earlier this year to take over the role of principal supporter, in close co-operation with the American Society of Landscape Architects, in Washington, and the Japanese Institute of Landscape Architects, in Tokyo. The project already has the warm support of the Hong Kong Governor, Sir David Wilson.

As you may be aware, Landscape Architects are very much involved, nowadays, in the planning and the protection of the whole of the outdoor environment, both urban and rural. We thus like to think of ourselves as ideally placed to promote an event of worldwide significance, that will attempt to address some of the major environmental problems caused by the population explosion in most of the larger cities of the Third World. First and foremost among these: the global environmental impact of Urban Growth itself, and the totally uncontrolled spread of squatter settlements in so many of the Developing Countries, which we have come to regard as an environmental and political time bomb.

The 1993 World Congress in Hong Kong was originally planned for Beijing in 1991, in accordance with invitation extended to the Heritage Trust in London by the Chinese Research Academy of Environmental Sciences, where it had stood a good chance of being inaugurated by Prince Philip. This followed a lively exchange of correspondence, at the time, between HRH and the Trust's Chairman, Sir Hugh Casson. Unfortunately, both the political situation in the PRC after the June 1989 Tiananmen Square uprising, and the financial set-back suffered by the Heritage Trust over its May 1989 World Congress at the University of Toronto, over which it was badly let down by the Government of Margaret Thatcher, brought the original arrangements to an abrupt halt. These have now been revived under the auspices of the Landscape Institute, in full recognition of the urgent need to address more fully one of the most crucial environmental problems of our time.

An increasing number of leading international institutions and organisations has since come forward in support of the World Congress in question, which is seen as an important contribution to the objectives of the United Nations' June 1992 Earth Summit (UNCED) in Rio de Janeiro, especially in view of the multi-disciplinary approach adopted by the Heritage Trust and ourselves throughout the lengthy preparations of the attached programme for 1993. This is fully endorsed by the close personal involvement in the project of Professor Kenneth Hare, in Toronto, who over the last three years has been the principal scientific adviser to the Congress, and the choice of Dr. Ivan Head, the recently retired President of IDRC in Ottawa, as the favourite candidate for the position of the event's overall Chairman. I am sure that both Professor Hare and Dr. Head, who are held in the highest possible esteem here in London, are well known to you.

This brings me to the main purpose of this letter, which is to ask you most warmly if you would consider paying us the honour of accepting the key position of President of the Honorary Advisory Committee, in accordance with the enclosed proposal, that is the result of the Landscape Institute's most recent meeting on the subject of the 1993 World Congress.

As you will note from the corresponding footnote, the Honorary Advisory Committee (unlike the Congress' Steering Committee in London, and Action Committee in Hong Kong) is not expected to have to convene at any time between now and October 1993, thus totally avoiding any possibility of your being taken away on a regular basis from your principal commitments as a Congressman.

It would simply be a question of our being given the opportunity of consulting you from time to time on some of the principal aspects of the Hong Kong operation, entirely at your convenience, as in the case of the close working relationship we need to establish as soon as possible with Government Departments and professional circles of several countries in the Pacific Region. If the 1993 World Congress in Hong Kong is to have the required impact, moreover, we shall have to involve the United States and Japanese Environmental Protection Agencies, and to generally emphasize the global aspect of the issues we intend to address. Your reputation as a dynamic and environmentally sensitive, American politician, would be invaluable to us in achieving such aims.

Most of the other members of the Honorary Advisory Committee, whose names appear on the attached list, have been associated very closely with our preparations for 1993. However, nobody has so far been approached formally by the Landscape Institute, pending the appointment of a President for that Committee, whom we would first wish to consult.

The same applies to Prince Philip, over the required royal patronage, and to the members of the Hong Kong business community who have already expressed an interest in sponsoring the entire event. Needless to say, we shall be unable to approach any of these formally, until we have a proper team in place, which naturally includes the President of the Honorary Advisory Committee. This explains why an urgent response on your part is so important to us.

In both environmental and historical terms it would mean a great deal to us if you were able to accept our invitation (at least in principle, at this stage), and may be I could ask you to kindly inform me of your initial reaction by using the following telefax number in London:

The name of the President of the Honorary Advisory Committee is unlikely to be announced formally before the early beginning of next year. This would offer me an opportunity to call on you personally in Washington, possibly in the company of my colleague from the American Society of Landscape Architects, David Bohardt, for all the additional information you would, undoubtedly, require, before coming to a final decision.

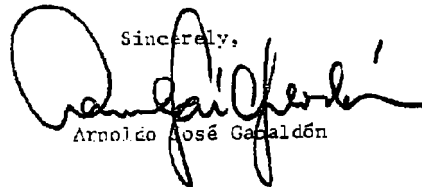

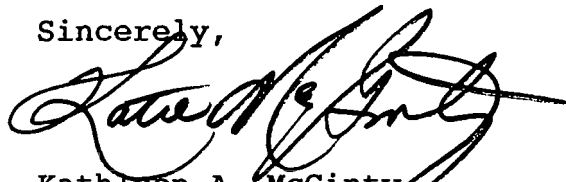

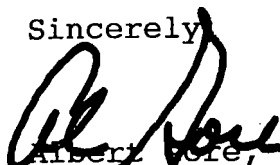
