Dear Mr. Vice President:

Knowing your commitment to alternative fuels, I want to invite you to attend an important event commemorating West Virginia's many successful efforts to promote the use of compressed natural gas (CNG) as an automotive fuel.

Through a coordinated effort, during the past three years, West Virginia has developed the most comprehensive CNG program and infrastructure of any state east of the Mississippi River. Working at every level of government and the private sector, our state provides an excellent model of what can be done to implement this Administration's commitment to alternative fuels.

West Virginia's commitment to saving our natural resources and promoting natural gas vehicles has resulted in much activity. Several accomplishments include:

1. State enacted legislation which authorizes WV state and local governments to acquire through purchase, lease, gift or loan vehicles capable of operating on alternative fuels.
2. State enacted legislation which requires state and political subdivisions in the state to phase in alternative fuel vehicles in their fleet acquisition, beginning with 20% of new acquisitions in fiscal year 1995 and working up to 75% of new acquisitions by fiscal year 1998 and thereafter.
3. Creation of the National Center for Alternate Transportation Fuels at West Virginia University in 1990. One of its developments, the transportable emissions test laboratory, is currently measuring exhaust emissions from heavy duty vehicles that operate on both alternate and conventional fuels. The lab has performed emissions tests on more than 90 vehicles in locations from New York to California. Receiving funds from the Department of Energy (DOE), the center is conducting research in areas such as emissions testing, conversion technology, fuel injection, catalytic converter systems, mini dilution tunnel design, methanol car conversion and butanol fuel blending.

4. Ongoing program to convert the West Virginia University auto fleet. Currently the WVU Physical Plant is utilizing a \$500,000 grant to convert its fleet; in 1991, following the completion of a conversion station, fleet conversion commenced. To date, 64 compressed gas vehicles have been converted. After receipt of additional grant money conversion will continue.

5. Fifteen natural gas fueling stations are available for public use with several more to be completed this Spring. These stations are strategically located throughout the state. One can travel hundreds of miles from either West Virginia's Northern or Eastern Panhandle to the extreme southern border along developed interstates and have access to natural gas fueling stations the entire way.

6. Four NGV automobile conversion stations are currently operating in West Virginia. Kleenair Systems Inc., which runs a conversion business in Martinsburg, recently was granted a contract to convert vehicles to natural gas for the DOE. The target quantity for the conversion is 300-900 vehicles over a three year period. The joint project undertaken by Kleenair and the DOE is a good example of the cooperative projects the NGV industry and the federal government have undertaken to provide safe and clean alternatives to gasoline.

7. Conversion of the Charleston Kanawha Valley Regional Transportation Authority (KAT) van fleet. Currently 2 KAT vans have been converted to natural gas vehicles. Construction of a KAT fueling station, which is expected to open May 1, 1994, will initiate conversion of the remaining 8 KAT vans. Two trolleys have been converted to 85% natural gas and 15% diesel engines. KAT is awaiting funds to convert these vehicles to 100% natural gas.

8. The West Virginia State Government has become a leading advocate for the promotion of using natural gas as an alternative fuel. To date, 22 state vehicles have been dedicated to using only natural gas. An additional 122 vehicles are fueled by dual engines running on both gasoline and natural gas. Natural gas utilization and conversion has become part of the state bidding process. West Virginia State officials travel across the country promoting the usage of natural gas as an alternative fuel.

9. Continuing conversion efforts of West Virginia school districts to convert their school bus fleets. The Wood County school district in Parkersburg has converted 10 buses to run on compressed natural gas. Acknowledging that natural

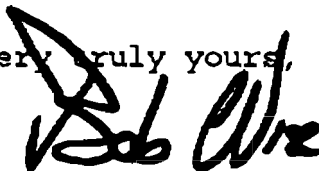

gas is safer than gasoline as a fueling agent, the goal of this county is conversion of the entire fleet. Other school districts are presently exploring or contracting for similar conversions.

On June 6 and 7, 1994, the Natural Gas Transportation Company headquartered in Charleston, WV and I are hosting our Second Natural Gas Caravan. At the send-off June 6 in Martinsburg, we will be conducting numerous activities and displays to showcase both the accomplishments and the potential for CNG. I wish to express my deep hope that you will join us in this important kick-off event.

Martinsburg, WV is only 70 miles, about one and a half hours drive by CNG from Washington, D.C. This event will be a main event for West Virginia as well as the immediately bordering Virginia, Maryland and District of Columbia. I hope you will attend.

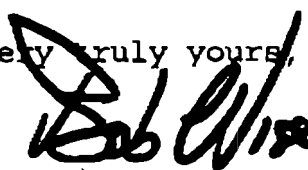
Dear Mr. Vice President:

Rally To Save Belt Woods

On the evening of **Tuesday, June 7th**, the Coalition to Save Belt Woods will hold a rally at Tall Oaks Vocational School (located at 2112 Church Road, 1.25 miles north of Route 214, near Bowie.) The rally will begin at **7:00 pm**.

The focus of the rally will be a massive development project which threatens a 300 year-old forest ecosystem that is rated as one of the most important woodlands on the East Coast. According to the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, Belt Woods, located at Church Road and Route 214 (Central Ave.), has the highest known density of nesting songbirds in a deciduous forest!

While a portion of this forest was saved as a State (of MD) Park in 1984, the Episcopal Diocese of Washington now seeks to destroy the taxpayers' investment in an effort to maximize the financial return on 515 acres of farmland that was donated for preservation - the Capital Home Farm of Seton Belt, a faithful parishioner. The 515 acre proposed housing development project would isolate the State Park from the wetlands and surrounding woodlands which are essential to maintaining the ecological integrity of the old growth forest ecosystem. The Coalition is also concerned that the 649-unit residential development project will add to school over-crowding and traffic congestion.

The rally is being held to alert those who live in the nearby communities. At the rally area residents will have an opportunity to learn more about how this development project may affect their quality of life. The Coalition to Save Belt Woods will also present their strategy for ensuring that the project does not proceed until impacts to schools, roads, and Belt Woods have been resolved.

Flyers have been distributed, a phone bank is reaching the impact area, and volunteers have been out in front of the woods every morning for the past week during rush hour (at Church and Central) to announce the rally to those waiting in bumper-to-bumper traffic. We expect a large turnout Tuesday night. We have heard word that many politicians and members of the media already plan to attend. This is a media event!

Save the Belt Woods!

Dan Boone, Coalition to Save Belt Woods

The Episcopal Diocese of Washington is seeking to maximize the financial return on 515 acres of farmland and forest that was donated for preservation - the Capital Home Farm of Seton Belt, a faithful parishioner. Mr. Belt's Will established a trust containing over 3,000 acres endowed with considerable income to help his local church - St. Barnabas', and to care for his beloved forest and farms. He especially intended for his church to safeguard his Home Farm, including its substantial tracts of old growth forest. His will stipulated that the forest never be commercially logged and "expressly prohibited and enjoined" from selling "the Home Farm", which sustains the highest nesting density of forest interior songbirds in the nation.

Unfortunately, the Church legally overturned the environmental protections in his will, logged most of the oldest trees for veneer, and now seeks to build 649 houses and destroy over 120 acres of forest on the Home Farm. While little old growth forest will be cleared, the loss of half of the present forest interior acreage and the additional 2,000 neighbors and their pets would devastate the ecological integrity of the remaining forest ecosystem.

The Washington Diocese is fully implicated because it will receive most of the income generated by the sale of the Home Farm, and the Bishop (if he wants) can single-handedly stop the sale of the property.

The Diocese of Washington and the St. Barnabas' Church currently share \$500,000 of interest revenue each year from the trust fund established by Seton Belt. They also will reap the benefit from the sale of Belt's 453 acre Willowbrooke Farm. This beautiful old forest tract is the proposed site for a warehouse and office complex. The construction, if completed, would destroy over 350 acres of woodlands and yield tens of millions of dollars to the trust. Therefore the Church's "need" for additional income is no excuse for destroying Belt's Home Farm.

Please write to Bishop Haines and urge him to adopt Paul Winter's recommendation that the Home Farm be preserved for songbirds and to provide children the opportunity to learn about old growth forests. 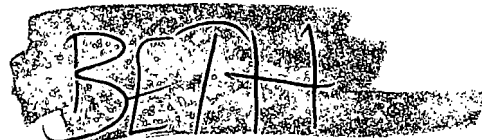

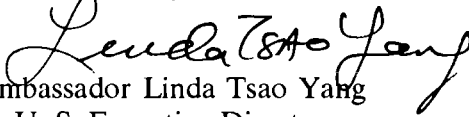

REGIONAL CONFERENCE ON BIODIVERSITY CONSERVATION

Asian Development Bank

Manila, 6-8 June 1994

A. Background

1. The Convention on Biological Diversity was signed by more than 150 governments as a part of the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development (UNCED), also referred to as the Earth Summit, held in June 1992 in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. Actions mandated in various articles of the Convention highlight the measures to be undertaken by national governments and institutions as well as international agencies, emphasizing the conservation of biodiversity as a global asset which demands concerted action.

2. With specific reference to the Asia and Pacific region, inadequate understanding of various elements of the Convention, particularly those pertaining to the significance of socioeconomic benefits of biodiversity conservation, the availability of financial resources, as well as the associated legal and institutional implications of conservation, are the major constraining factors affecting implementation of the Convention.

3. A Regional Conference on Biodiversity Conservation is being organized at the Bank's Headquarters in Manila on 6-8 June 1994 jointly by the Asian Development Bank and the International Union for Conservation of Nature and Natural Resources (IUCN). During deliberations of the conference an assessment of the current status of implementation of the Convention in the Asia and Pacific region will be made and the key socioeconomic, financial, legal and institutional issues and constraints affecting biodiversity conservation will be examined to provide a framework for regional and international cooperation and investment.

B. Objectives

4. The main objectives of the conference are to: (i) identify socioeconomic incentives for the DMCs to invest in conservation of biodiversity as called for by the Convention on Biological Diversity; (ii) provide an opportunity for the DMCs to gain a clear understanding of alternative financial and technical assistance options available to support their investments in the conservation of biodiversity; (iii) address the significance of integrating conservation with economic development in the DMCs; and (iv) identify specific priority investments for conservation of biodiversity in selected DMCs.

C. Participation

5. The Conference is targeted at senior level policy makers and planners of the participating DMCs, representatives of international/national organizations and NGOs engaged in biodiversity conservation. The Conference will allow exchange of views amongst participants to foster cooperation and ensure consistency of biodiversity programs in the international and regional context and provide a forum in which to discuss various initiatives. The participating DMCs, selected on the basis of the importance of their biodiversity, include: **Bangladesh, Fiji, India, Indonesia, Malaysia, Myanmar, Nepal, Pakistan, Papua New Guinea, People's Republic of China, the Philippines, Sri Lanka, Thailand, Vietnam, and Western Samoa.**

D. Analytical Studies

6. A set of analytical studies on priority topics pertaining to biodiversity conservation will be commissioned utilizing the services of eminent experts from international conservation institutions as well as those of the professional staff of IUCN. The topics include: (i) Biodiversity Conservation in Asia and the Pacific region; (ii) Social Dimensions of Biodiversity Conservation; (iii) Economic and Financial Incentives in Biodiversity Conservation; (iv) Commercialization of Biodiversity Assets : Intellectual Property Rights and the Perspective of the Private Sector; (v) Financing Biodiversity Conservation and Investment Priorities in Asia and the Pacific Region; and (vi) Legal and Institutional Issues in Biodiversity Conservation.

E. Format of the Conference

7. The Conference consists of six sessions, each focusing on one of the topics outlined in Paragraph 6 above. The main theme in every session will be introduced through a keynote address (10 minutes) by an eminent expert who would provide a broad overview of the concerned topic. This will be followed by one or two presentations on the theme (20-30 minutes each) by international experts commissioned to prepare the analytical studies. Panel discussions, with panelists consisting of one international expert and two representatives from the Bank's Developing Member Countries, will follow the presentations (20 minutes). Finally, a general discussion (30-40 minutes) will be held to allow for free discussion on the concerned subject by all participants.

8. Six Working Groups will be constituted, one for each Conference themes to draft recommendations on the first day of the Conference. The recommendations drafted by each group will be presented and discussed at the Conference at the Concluding Plenary Session Meeting (one and a half hours) on the last day. Tentative Conference Agenda is in Attachment 1.

A Selection of Comments on the USIA Discussion Paper:
AMERICAN FOREIGN POLICY IN AN INFORMATION AGE

The Honorable Dante Fascell:

"There is an enormous task facing USIA both internationally (to do its job) and domestically (to be able to do its job)...I share your concerns and vision. I applaud your efforts. May the Office of Management and Budget and the Appropriations Committees of the House and Senate see the U.S. need with the same clarity and provide absolutely essential priority for sufficient financial support."

Mr. Don Wallace, Jr., Chairman, International Law Institute:

"I favor an ambitious Agency in the post-Cold War period. I would add that most of us do not know enough about some of the talent that resides in the Agency, and I suppose the public at large has a very indefinite view of the Agency. I have the impression that overseas it is sometimes confused with the CIA!"

The Honorable Eugene V. Rostow, Research Professor, National Defense University:

"I do not believe the national interest of the United States is to conduct a crusade for the universal spread of democracy and capitalism. I believe we should pursue active programs of public information in defending the values of Western culture, and be a strong and persuasive combattant in what you call the 'clash of cultures.' But I also believe, and believe strongly, that everything we say or do should sharply distinguish between peace, which I think is our fundamental interest in world politics, and the spread of democracy and the capitalist system, an enthusiasm of ours which should not be confused with the interests we should defend with force, if necessary."

The Honorable Douglas J. Bennet, Assistant Secretary, Bureau of International Organization Affairs, Department of State:

"I think it is particularly important that we understand that there is a great deal more going on in the world than the disintegration of Soviet communism. Underlying historical forces that helped end the Cold War continue to transform international politics and diplomacy in ways unimaginable only a few years ago. Foremost among these is the revolution in the transmission of information. America's success in the world will depend frequently on the degree of international support we receive which will depend, in turn, on how well (and how quickly) we are understood. It strikes me that your blueprint for streamlining and modernizing USIA operations is a good one and I will be pleased to help in whatever way I can."

Dr. Joshua Lederberg, President Emeritus, Rockefeller University:

"Frankly, my first reflex when I saw your letter was 'Do we really need USIA' any more, in the privatized post-cold war world? I was thinking of activities like print media and VOA and related media. Your thinking is obviously several steps ahead of that reflex. Where private sector, transnational informational activities are barred for economic or political reasons should be your most important mission areas....Interpretation of media and other public reaction to the U.S. is an area that obviously must be better coordinated with State and with CIA...you do not mention much focus on areas where U.S. culture is most systematically distorted, e.g. the Islamic world; there are profound needs for greater (mutual) insight."

General Andrew J. Goodpaster, USA (ret.), Co-Chair of The Atlantic Council of the United States:

"...the projection of an understanding of America and American life and values is something that I regard of fundamental importance. From the time of my association with President Eisenhower, who strongly held these views, it seems to me that this provides the soundest possible basis for developing our relationships with other peoples and other governments....At a time when much of the message conveyed by the media is necessarily fragmentary and lacking in balance, I believe the USIA can make an essential contribution to worldwide better understanding of complex issues and international concerns...whatever arrangements are made must assure that the USIA has full opportunity to perform its extremely important mission."

Ambassador Samuel W. Lewis, Director Emeritus, Policy Planning Staff, Department of State:

"I am particularly pleased to see the fresh attention that you plan to give to building support among foreign publics and elites for U.S. efforts to forge effective multilateral coalitions...The importance that the Administration is giving to opening markets and gaining support for multilateral trade agreements is one area where public diplomacy is increasingly important for gaining support among industrial democracies, as well as formerly Communist countries and developing countries."

General John Shalikashvili, USA, Chairman, Joint Chiefs of Staff:

"The Agency has made many important contributions in the past, and I agree that any future role USIA will play in the complex landscape of the post-Cold War world needs to be re-evaluated. The Joint Staff and I will continue to cooperate fully as you embark on the ambitious program of change for the agency."

Rear Admiral Joseph C. Strasser, USN, President of the Naval War College:

"I would agree totally with your assessment of the importance of public opinion in achieving (and formulating) our national objectives. One can argue, from the perspective of domestic public opinion, that has always been the case. However, perhaps more significant for USIA is the irrefutable increase in the importance of foreign public opinion in formulating and achieving our national objectives.

"...there are very few policy decisions today that are strictly 'domestic' in nature and which can be made without consideration of their international implications. This only underscores the critical importance of international 'public diplomacy' for the United States and the contribution USIA makes in that arena."

Mr. Richard L. Leshner, President, Center for International Private Enterprise:

"I would like to first compliment you and offer our strong support for the enhanced emphasis on America's business and economic interests. Your ideas are right on target with respect to the international visitors program, electronic media, and other information programs. USIA can play an enhanced role in promoting U.S. economic concerns as well as supporting the development of market-oriented democracies."

Mr. Willard A. Workman, Vice President, Chamber of Commerce of the United States of America:

"...the role of USIA has to reflect the broader evolution of our foreign policy objectives in the post cold-war era. We have argued for the last several years that the U.S. government, especially the foreign policy establishment, has too often subordinated our commercial interests to our so-called 'higher' diplomatic, security or human rights concerns. That is why we are encouraged that economic interests are gaining attention. In the more traditional USIA efforts to communicate U.S. policy, greater emphasis on the extent to which the United States is a market open to foreign trade and investment would help dispel the false notion that we are moving towards protectionism."

Mr. J. Paul Martin, Center for the Study of Human Rights, Columbia University:

"I appreciated especially the prominence given to the role of the field officers whom I have found often remarkable in their knowledge of local societies....my criticism of the paper is that it emphasizes free markets without giving equal prominence to the political and educational programs and structures that make free markets, as opposed centralized or highly monopolistic economies, possible. This relationship has been at the heart of the American experience."

The Honorable Elliott Abrams, Senior Fellow, Hudson Institute:

"You clearly, and rightly, focussed on how to use new technology in and for USIA. This does, however, raise one concern: the subordination of the written word. All of us have computers and TVs but none of us have cancelled all our own newspaper and magazine subscriptions. Obviously USIA should not duplicate what is commercially available, but I wonder if the production of no magazines is wise. If it is wise, or necessary, can the Agency keep alert to the times when written dissemination of ideas is by far the best form?"

Dr. Robert Satloff, Executive Director, The Washington Institute for Near East Policy:

"I read with great interest the USIA Discussion Paper titled 'American Foreign Policy in an Information Age' and generally concur with the thrust of the analysis and programmatic initiatives outlined therein....The one proposal that I read with consternation was the elimination of all worldwide and regional magazines as well as the office responsible for overseas exhibits. While I recognize and support the emphasis on technology, I would urge you not to dismiss the continued significance of the written word, which retains a power and significance long after any particular radio or television transmission is aired. Having lived in West Africa and spent much time in the Middle East, I know first hand how important these tangible expressions of U.S. policy and culture are to an important segment of local society."

The Honorable Edward P. Djerejian, former Assistant Secretary of State for Near Eastern Affairs, now Ambassador to Israel:

"While there are clear limits on the role of USIA in the United States, it seems to me that some of USIA's programs can have a significant impact on both foreign and U.S. citizens. As an example, I would cite the International Visitors Program. I know from speaking to foreign participants that these visits have a lasting influence on long-term perceptions of the United States. I have always been struck by the comment from almost every IVP participant that the highlight of their program was the 'home stay' with an American family. I cannot help but believe that the hosts of these visitors find the experience just as profitable, and while I don't have a specific suggestion, there should be ways to achieve even greater involvement across the United States in putting a human face on foreign policy."

Mr. Jay Tolson, Editor, The Wilson Quarterly:

"...I do think that public diplomacy in our time will have to devote more careful and refined attention to what the other cultures of the world are saying. We have to hear their fears and complaints, particularly those that relate to the pressures and threats of our culture and commerce. We have to understand what they think is being jeopardized by the spread of MTV-McDonald's culture. And we have to respect the contributions that other cultures can make to the global civilization that is still in an early formative stage. Not least, we have to wrestle with our own arrogance in formulating a vision of global civility, even while we stand firmly by the best values of our own culture."

Mr. Eugene S. Staples, Vice President, The Eurasia Foundation:

"My own observation of the collapse of the old Soviet empire is that those institutions possibly most in danger of severe damage are cultural and educational. USIA has always had an important role to play in interpreting American culture overseas and vice versa and assisting cultural exchanges. I hope that your country programs of the future will devote serious interest to and as much funding as possible for working on the problems of cultural transformation, which are essential to the development of democratic societies. The imploding and exploding societies of the world face these with very little money and outside help."

Ms. Diane Knippers, President, The Institute of Religion & Democracy:

"Some now argue that the greatest threat to democratic development around the world today is ethnic conflict. Religion often lies at the heart of these cultural and ethnic divides. For all our continuing struggles in this area, the U.S. has, by and large, gotten it right and has something to offer the world. In your exchanges and other programs, the USIA should not be hesitant to highlight Americans who hold deep personal religious convictions along with an abiding respect for the rights of others."

Mr. William C. Doherty, Executive Director, American Institute for Free Labor Development:

"...we would urge USIA to devote substantial resources to labor-oriented programs. This has been very useful in the past, for example, in Worldnet programming and for trade union exchange programs. AIFLD encourages USIA to tell the story of U.S. labor abroad. We feel that a more full understanding of labor's position (among many others) on world issues will serve to increase U.S. competitiveness and the interests of U.S. foreign policy."

The Honorable Angier Biddle Duke, President, Council of American Ambassadors:

"...it seems to me that the USIA relationship with NGOs is an asset that requires constant attention, cultivation and renewal. I don't think anyone in government understands this better than you do. But the NGOs must also be creative and alert to the potential of interaction with USIA."

Mr. Kevin F.F. Quigley, Program Director for Public Policy, The Pew Charitable Trusts:

"Thank you very much for sharing with me USIA's discussion paper...I found it an extremely impressive vision of how American foreign policy can be best articulated in this information age. The paper was well done, thoughtful, timely and appropriate. What I did not have, however, was a clear sense of the relative priority among the various new areas of emphasis....My strong inclination would be to narrow the range of missions and, hopefully, do a better job in addressing a smaller number of them."

Ms. Julia V. Taft, President, InterAction:

"We believe that much room for collaboration exists between your and our efforts to strengthen global civil society....We are enthusiastic over the expanded possibilities the new technologies offer, and believe they can be used to dramatically widen international mutual understanding. However, the technologies, if used improperly, can work against grassroots civil society by strengthening elites. It is important that these technologies help, among others, local nongovernmental leaders in the global democratic movement."

RE: EPA Operating Budget.

As many of you are aware, Friends of the Earth has identified the EPA Operating Budget as the highest environmental funding priority. This year, we were pleased to see the Clinton Administration agree with us:

"The budget for [EPA's Operating Program] is one of the key indicators of the Administration's commitment to providing adequate resources to manage the country's environmental protection activities..."

(Budget of the United States Government - Fiscal Year 1995, p. 136.)

In February, the Administration requested \$3.051 billion for the operating budget, an increase of about 13 percent. Within a few weeks, Congress will begin to act on this request.

Appropriations allocations

The appropriations allocations (known as the "602(b) allocation") for the House and Senate VA-HUD-Independent Agencies Appropriations Subcommittees create intense pressure to make cuts among competing federal agencies such as the Veterans Department, HUD, NASA, and EPA. Overall, the House Subcommittee was allocated \$361 million less than the President requested in budget outlays for FY95. The Senate Subcommittee was allocated more than \$700 million less than the President requested. A key issue for these subcommittees will be whether or not to fund NASA's Space Station at more than \$2.5 billion. If the subcommittees cut the space station, the squeeze on EPA and other agencies in the subcommittee won't be so tight. If not, it is likely that EPA's operating budget will be cut.

"Save the EPA"

Friends of the Earth, in coalition with several other national environmental groups, has been meeting with House and Senate staff for Appropriations Committee members. In addition, we have initiated a coordinated grassroots effort to urge Congress to fully fund EPA. Attached is a letter to House Subcommittee Chairman Louis Stokes (D-OH), which was signed by more than 220 national and grassroots groups. Signers include church groups, businesses, public health organizations, state officials, research groups, and, of course, environmental groups.

This is the first time in recent memory such a large and broad constituency has shown support for the EPA budget. Friends of the Earth cooperated with several grassroots networks to put the letter together including the Clean Water Network, Clean Air Network, Working Group on Right-To-Know, and the Sun Day Campaign. A similar letter will go to the Senate shortly.

Dear Mr. Chairman:

We respectfully request that the Subcommittee fully fund the President's budget request of \$3.05 billion in 1995 for what is perhaps the heart of our nation's struggle to protect the environment -- the operating programs of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). Only a funding level of not less than \$3.05 billion -- and the requested staff levels -- will enable the EPA to deliver the new approaches to environmental protection that Congress wants, while also maintaining effective core programs.

The President's budget document says that the EPA operating budget "is one of the key indicators of the Administration's commitment to providing adequate resources to manage the country's environmental protection" programs and indicates that the EPA operating budget is one of his highest budget priorities for the environment. We agree. While each of our organizations may prize particular EPA programs and advocate their funding, we share President Clinton's belief in the overriding importance of the total operating budget in the context of a balanced overall budget for the agency.

EPA's operating programs are workhorses. They include most of the EPA's enforcement, research and regulation-writing, and \$617 million in grants to states. These operating programs determine whether major environmental laws on air, water, drinking water, hazardous wastes, toxics, pesticides and radiation will improve the lives of Americans or end up as unfulfilled promises.

We are grateful for your leadership in the past in protecting the EPA operating budget and encouraging that its dollars be used most effectively. Thanks in part to your efforts, the EPA has proposed a budget that funds new priorities and commits to reform. Approval of not less than \$3.05 billion is crucial in order to:

DELIVER NEW APPROACHES FOR THE 1990S

A significant amount of the requested increase pays for the new generation of environmental policies that Congress has asked for. It provides better science by increasing funding for research and development by 7 percent, and targeting criteria and standards. It boosts the economy through a 34 percent increase for the Environmental Technology Initiative to help develop, commercialize and export

innovative green technologies. It emphasizes cost-effective approaches like pollution prevention by funding expansion of the Toxics Release Inventory. It enhances non-regulatory approaches by increasing funding for voluntary efforts to help industry reduce its energy bills. A 25 percent increase in pollution runoff grants helps states meet mandates and targets a high-risk problem.

CATCH UP WITH WORKLOAD IN CORE PROGRAMS

Not one environmental protection law is being fully implemented by EPA and implementation of several laws is poor. A big problem is that the EPA operating budget was slashed by one-third in real terms in the early 1980's and never recovered. Even if EPA receives \$3.05 billion in 1995, the operating budget would be roughly equal after inflation to the level in 1979 -- 15 years earlier! Meanwhile, the EPA's workload has roughly doubled with the passage of several major new laws and the emergence of global environmental problems and new scientific issues. The President's 1995 request would be a down payment on rebuilding a hard-pressed agency.

STRENGTHEN CONTRACTOR REFORM

EPA's operating budget contains a contractor reform initiative which will ensure taxpayers get more for the operating budget dollars spent in 1995. Even some of EPA's toughest critics like Congressman John Dingell say the President's budget proposal will lessen EPA's dependence on contractors. By shifting dollars from contracting accounts to staff accounts, about 800 positions will be converted from external contractors to in-house staff. This reform will reduce the dual bureaucracy and enable EPA to bring critical jobs back in house. Moreover, it will reduce the waste of funds that has occurred in the past because the agency did not have sufficient staff to hold contractors accountable for the excessive costs billed to the agency. But this badly needed reform will be fully carried out only if the operating budget receives the \$3.05 billion needed to incorporate the budget shift.

For years, Congress has demanded new directions and improved management. In 1994, the EPA operating budget proposed little that was new and received no increase whatsoever. For 1995, we have a new team that wants the agency to succeed in its mission. They have responded to Congress by proposing a new kind of budget. We respectfully urge you to seize this opportunity and give them a chance.

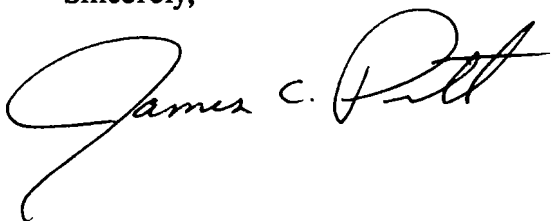
