PURPOSE

The purpose of the seminar is to provide an in-depth background for people who want to learn more about the use of regional models for forecasting, planning and policy analysis. Knowledge of modeling is a necessary precondition to understanding how models can be used effectively.

READING MATERIALS

This course will be based on a book by Dr. George Treyz, Regional Economic Modeling: A Systematic Approach to Economic Forecasting and Policy Analysis, published by Kluwer Academic Publishers, 1993. The preface to the book reads as follows:

"Regional economic models are the key to predicting the effects of transportation, economic development, energy, fiscal, and environmental policies. Despite this, the principal regional economic policy analysis model used throughout the United States by government agencies, universities, and the private sector has not been presented in a book until now.

Our approach to building, understanding, and using regional models is progressive. We start with the simplest possible models and conclude with a full presentation of the leading model used by policy makers today. The full details are presented along with facilitating software so that the reader can build a prototype model for any state or county and can perform policy simulations with a full operational model for a sample county. We discuss policy studies that have been carried out with the model, as well as the range of ways in which policies can be tested through policy simulations.

We develop the background necessary for understanding the ways models can be used to improve the basis upon which policies are evaluated, as well as the sensitivity of the predicted effects to the model chosen for the analysis. Our presentation is multifaceted and includes equations, diagrams, and numerical examples. We have integrated the professional literature with introductory materials to produce the first comprehensive book on regional modeling that extends from economic base models to modeling advances that are currently being published in economic journals."

Regional Economic Modeling, as well as menu driven software for a PC for operating the prototype model and the Demo model will be provided to participants. (Examination copies of the book may be obtained but must be returned unless the conference fee is paid. The book may be purchased directly from Kluwer for \$89.)

PARTICIPANTS BACKGROUND

We expect that participants will have different backgrounds. While the readings are self-contained in principle, those without any economics background may wish to supplement their reading of the Regional Economic Modeling book with readings from an Introductory Macroeconomics text (will be supplied upon request). Those with economics background may want to extend their understanding by reading supplementary Journal articles mentioned in the text. Finally, all participants will be expected to read the material in Regional Economic Modeling before the seminar.

The seminar will be primarily taught by Professor Treyz with assistance from staff members at Regional Economic Models, Inc. (REMI).

SINGLE-SECTOR MODELS

Most of the key causal relationships in regional models can be discussed in a simple framework with one industry, one region, one occupation, and two factor inputs. Thus, we will wait until the second day to formally introduce the complications that arise as we expand from one or two of the above to many. Even after the more general models have been introduced, we may come back to the prototype model for analysis of the effects of policy changes.

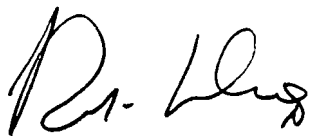
- The top emerging markets of the late 1990s

AMERICA'S FIRST ENVIRONMENTAL BUSINESS INCUBATOR

America's first environmental business incubator, designed to help Silicon Valley environmental business start-ups become successful, will be located in San Jose. The formal announcement will be made on Saturday at the City's Earth Day Family Festival.

The San Jose incubator is a joint project of the Environmental Partnership, an affiliate of Joint Venture: Silicon Valley Network, and Peninsula Conservation Center Foundation.

The incubator, called the Environmental Business Cluster, will provide environmental entrepreneurs with inexpensive space, furnishings and management services in a collaborative framework. It will be housed in a building at 1830 Bering Drive, San Jose, provided in a partnership agreement with United Defense LP (FMC/BMY) which leases the space.

Studies conducted by the National Business Incubation Association report that incubators can increase the odds for success of start-up companies.

Jim Robbins, manager of the incubator, said, "We expect to be operating early in May and have 25 start-ups located at the same time in our facility within the next several months. Some of the biggest problems for entrepreneurs are isolation, the inability to network with other companies, and finding support services that enable them to develop. The San Jose incubator will give environmental start-ups what they need."

Rosanna Garrison of Half Moon Bay, who is starting an environmental business, is the first entrepreneur committed to join the incubator. This business, A&A Rock Science, will be an environmental contractor that will provide equipment, operators, and construction services to help solve environmental problems.

Greg Larson, chair of the Environmental Partnership and San Jose's former deputy city manager, praised United Defense for making one of its buildings available for this important effort to support environmental entrepreneurs in Silicon Valley. "This type of private support from United Defense for development of environmental companies can result in more high level jobs for our region and better protection of our environment."

United Defense is a user and a provider of environmental technologies "so we are interested in supporting the first environmental business incubator in the country," Bill Highlander, communications director for United Defense, said. "As a corporate citizen of the Valley for many years, we are pleased to be able to help environmental entrepreneurs, Joint Venture, and the Peninsula Conservation Center Foundation."

Some of the Partnership's current projects include the upcoming Remediation Technology Certification Workshop with CalEPA in May and the targeting of base closure business opportunities.

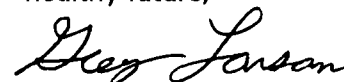
BUSINESS PARTNERING

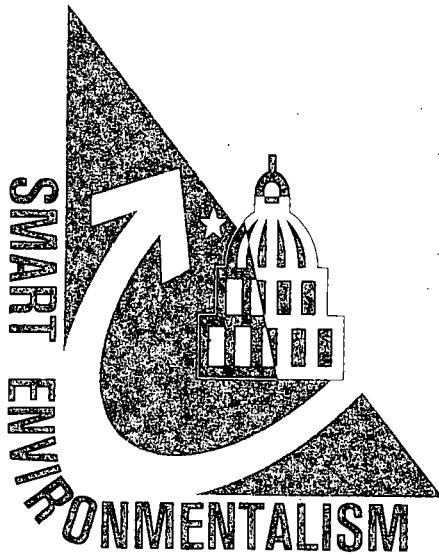

**DOD AND THE ENVIRONMENT
CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES IN THE 1990'S**

**DEPARTMENT OF THE ARMY
JUNE 14-16, 1994**

This three-day program is designed for senior military and civilian officials in DOD involved in research and development, acquisition of weapons systems, military training and operations, logistics and installation management who may be directly or indirectly involved in the complex legal and policial world of modern environmental regulations.

For most of the period since the onset of the Industrial Revolution, neither private entrepreneurs nor governmental bodies have factored into their calculations the financial and social costs of environmental degradation. The demands of the World Wars and the Cold War insured that such costs would receive relatively minor attention. The end of the Cold War and heightened environmental consciousness have changed this attitude and raised the awareness of this issue for everyone from base commander to those in the most senior levels of the Army.

In many respects, the legal and political dimensions of the problems are more difficult than the technical aspects. The contending public priorities and antagonistic interests, as well as an increasingly complex body of regulations, make responsibilities in this area particularly troublesome. It is not enough to address environmental policy simply as a scientific or technical problem. One must address these issues within the broader context of social movements, political struggle, bureaucratic politics, and economic realities.

Since the days of its political infancy in the early 1970's, the impetus to protect the environment has grown exponentially. Today, no government institution is immune to or exempt from the responsibility for environmental clean-up, restoration and prevention. This is especially true in the military, where the Army holds 2/3 of all military acreage. The concept of "defense" has now broadened to include air and water quality protection, wetlands preservation, and solid and hazardous waste management. Failure to prevent pollution can result in massive costs, decreased efficiency and public relations fiascos. It is also the harbinger to further regulation.

Environmental compliance is becoming increasingly complicated. Defense and military planners and decision-makers now share responsibility for the ponderous requirements and regulations currently being put into place. The White House, OMB, DOD, and the military services have embarked on a vast remedial effort which ranges from heightened integration of environmental management within the Army (from secretaries to base commanders) to compliance with environmental regulations, restoration, prevention and, ultimately, conservation and preservation. This DOD-wide effort involves over 13 billion dollars in FY94 alone.

The Army must, therefore, develop an integrated approach which includes: keeping abreast of changing requirements, establishing relationships with communities and regulators, prioritizing clean-up sites, and developing proactive and cost effective prevention strategies. These efforts will be especially difficult to implement in an era of a declining defense budget. Budget restrictions will make it paramount for the military to achieve the biggest "environmental bang per buck".

This workshop will address these challenges and opportunities through presentations made by a diverse series of experts in the environmental field, drawn from the executive, legislative and judiciary, as well as from academia, industry, interest groups and the media. This seminar will assist DOD and Army executives in understanding not only the technological realities of environmental management but the political and public policy milieu that will shape and affect military planning, programs, and management in the coming years.

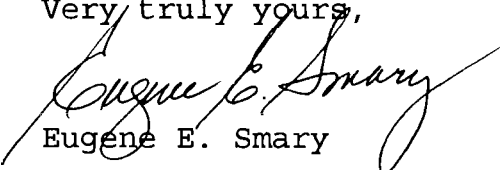
