Bruce Joel Rubin, writer of GHOST and JACOB'S LADDER, has begun research on a film for Steven Spielberg. DEEP IMPACT, based loosely on the 1950's film WHEN WORLDS COLLIDE, will tell the story of what happens when astronomers discover a comet, big enough to destroy all of humanity, on a path to crash into the earth in three years. The filmmakers are in the process of doing very extensive research so that the film will have a solid scientific based structure. 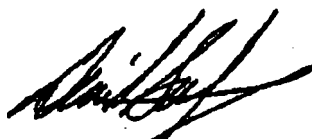

I am writing at the suggestion of Richard Feinberg and Cathryn Thorup of the National Security Council to invite you to a meeting of NGO groups convened by the North-South Center to discuss policy recommendations for the Summit of the Americas, on Wednesday, November 16, 1994 at the Inter-American Development Bank, 1300 New York Ave. N.W., Rm. 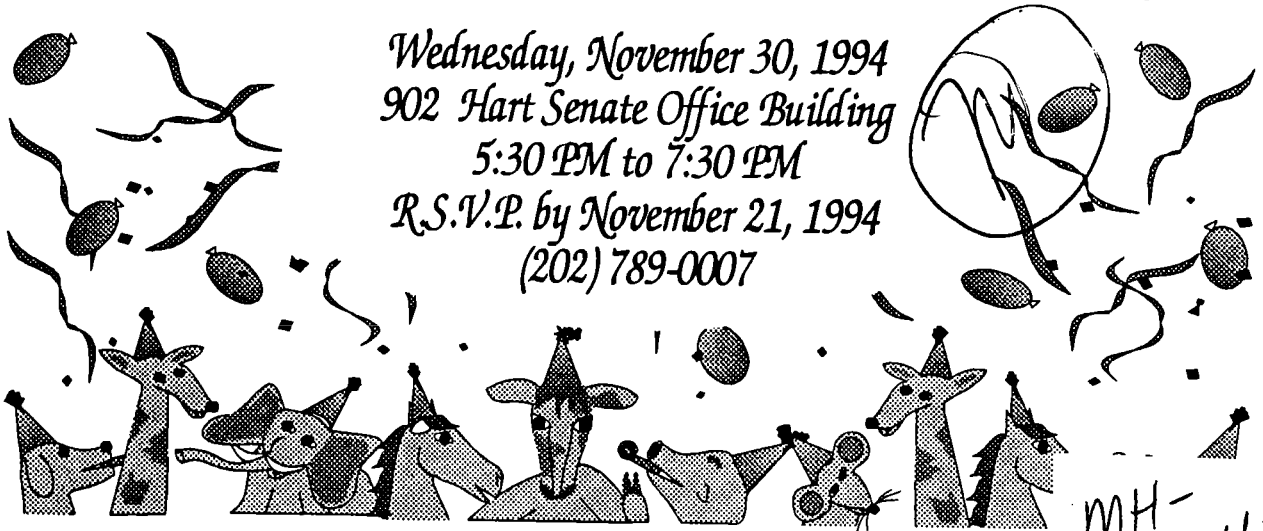

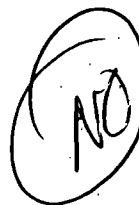

- I have also taken the liberty of inviting Mr. Hal Resnick to attend. Hal is president of Work Systems Associates, experts in total quality management, based in the Boston area. Hal is an outstanding meeting facilitator and has led CH2M HILL through its reengineering efforts. Given our limited time and the need to draw out the best ideas of this relatively "high profile" group, it seems wise to have a professional facilitator to ensure that all voices are heard, and all viewpoints have an ability to express themselves.

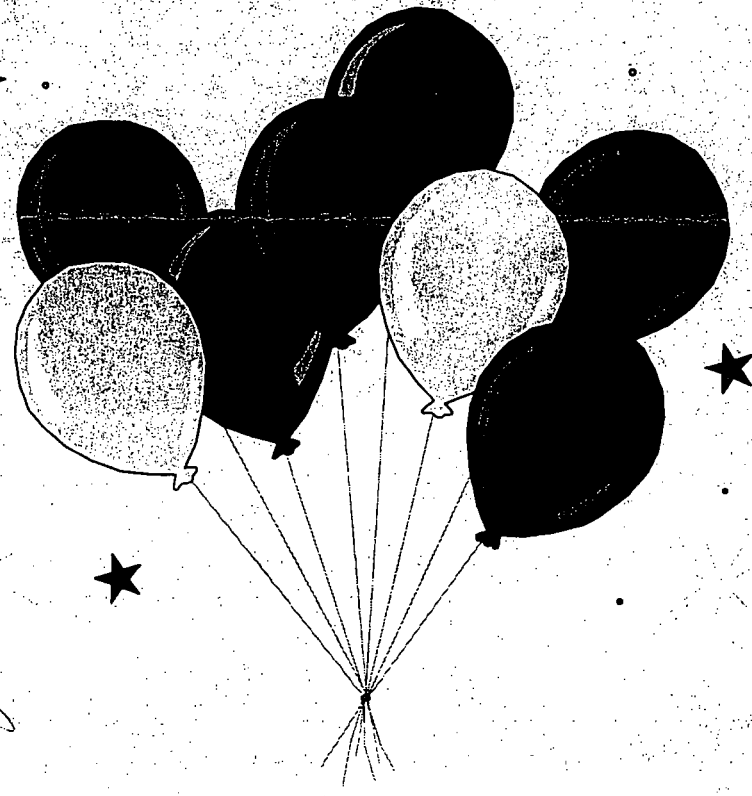

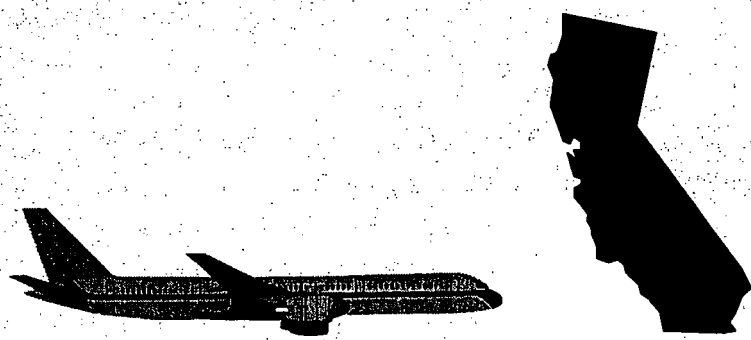

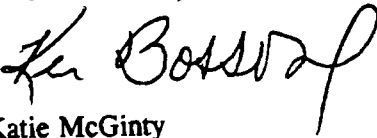

We would like to request a meeting with Ms. Katie McGinty to review opportunities to work together to promote DOE's FY'96 budget and the energy efficiency provisions in the EPA's budget with the new Congress as well as to safeguard the FY'95 budget already approved against a possible rescission amendment.

The Sustainable Energy Budget Coalition is a coalition of nearly 40 national environmental, business, governmental, utility, and energy policy organizations (list available upon request) founded in 1992 to encourage a redirection of federal energy funding to favor renewable energy, energy efficiency, and end-use natural gas technologies. We have had the opportunity to meet with Ms. McGinty several times during the course of this past year.

We would particularly like to discuss the following issues:

- (1) opportunities to coordinate our respective media and congressional outreach efforts;
- (2) developing, if possible, a common message for the incoming Congress regarding the FY'95 and FY'96 DOE and EPA budgets;
- (3) assessing opportunities to shore up support for DOE's budget within the Administration;

Dear Ms. McGinty:

The Upper Mississippi River Basin Association is sponsoring a conference entitled *Management of the Upper Mississippi River Basin: Current Issues and Future Options* and we would be honored if you could join us as one of the speakers. The conference is scheduled for November 29-30, 1994 in Minnesota at the Minneapolis-St. Paul Airport Hilton Hotel.

As you know, the Interagency Floodplain Management Review Committee, led by Brigadier General Gerry Galloway, has forwarded its recommendations to you and others on the White House team. Among the recommendations contained in the "Galloway Report" is that a river basin commission be re-established in the Upper Mississippi River basin. While the Galloway Report has certainly stimulated interest in such institutional issues, it is by no means the only impetus for exploring regional management questions. In this region, we are struggling with the challenge of ecosystem management, the Corps of Engineers is engaged in a major study of the future of the navigation system, and legislative proposals for major new water quality programs in this basin have been offered in the context of the Clean Water Act reauthorization. It is clear that the time is ripe to address the issue of regional management.

The overall goal of the November 29-30 conference is to explore the strengths and weaknesses of the existing regional management framework and to discuss the merits of alternative institutional models. Given that you are part of the President's team charged with deciding how the Administration will deal with the recommendations of the "Galloway Report," including the question of re-establishing river basin commissions under the authority of the 1965 Water Resources Planning Act, we are anxious to hear your perspective.

As the enclosed preliminary agenda indicates, we are hopeful that you can join us on November 30 at 8:15 a.m. If time permits, we would, of course, be delighted if you could attend the entire conference. We anticipate a very lively discussion among participants with a variety of differing perspectives.
