We are writing in regards to the WTI incinerator plant in East Liverpool, Ohio. It has come to our attention that too many questions remain unanswered over the process in which the EPA approved the plant construction and we are deeply concerned about the impact on the health and safety of the local residents this plant may have. A previous investigation by the GAO of the EPA approval process, which was conducted at the request of Congressman Mollohan, was weak and incomplete and did not answer questions concerning compliance with state and federal laws. The plant is already in the "Shake-Down" stage, which includes minor burning, and has twice needed adjustments to prevent leakage. Despite this and other questions concerning the plant's readiness, WTI may soon get approval from the EPA for its final trial burn plan.

Accordingly, we are requesting a thorough and immediate investigation by the GAO that will answer all questions left unanswered by the previous report. There should be left no doubt that the incinerator plant is prepared to operate in full compliance with the law and in the interest of the health and future of local residents and their families.

We ask that the following issues be addressed in detail:

GORE ASKS FEDERAL WATCHDOG AGENCY TO INVESTIGATE OHIO INCINERATOR
With Ohio Lawmakers, Says Disturbing Questions Must be Answered

WASHINGTON, DC -- Serious questions concerning the safety of an East Liverpool, Ohio hazardous waste incinerator must be answered before the plant may begin operation, Vice President-elect Al Gore said today (12/3), announcing that he and XXXXXX are asking the General Accounting Office for a thorough investigation. "For the safety and health of local residents rightfully concerned about impact of this incinerator on their families and their future, a thorough investigation is urgently needed. Too many questions remain unanswered about the impact of this incinerator and the process in which it was approved," said Gore.

Keeping his promise to local residents made during visits to the area in recent months, Gore had instructed his staff to conduct a preliminary investigation into the incinerator and questions that have been raised about its safety. Gore said information gathered in that effort convinced him a full investigation by the GAO is warranted and necessary.

In addition, Gore said that when he and President-elect Bill Clinton take office, their Administration will not re-issue the temporary permit that has been granted allowing test burns of the incinerator.

Shake Down

"Until all questions concerning compliance with state and federal law have been answered, it doesn't make sense to grant any permit," said Gore. "The potential impact on the people of this community -- on their health, on their children's health, on the investment they have made in their homes and businesses -- is too great to proceed without study and caution."

The incinerator operated by WTI, Inc. has been the center of a more than decade-long controversy in the East Liverpool, Ohio area. Over the years, questions have been raised about the process by which the incinerator was approved and about the safety of the incinerator, with the operators paying more than \$100,000 in fines.

Incinerator burn delayed

EAST LIVERPOOL(AP) — Minor adjustments on a stack fan to prevent leaks will delay the trial burn of a hazardous waste incinerator until at least January, the operator said Wednesday.

Julia Bircher, spokesman for Waste Technologies Industries, said the incinerator has been fired up twice and each time adjustments were needed in a stack fan designed to prevent leaks.

The second round of adjustments is still under way, Bircher said. She called the procedure routine testing. The trial burn was scheduled for either late this month or in January.

The site alongside the Ohio River continues to accept about three truckloads of waste daily, Bircher said. When the incinerator is operational it will receive 12 to 18 truckloads of waste daily, she said.

The site has an area for storing

packaged wastes, such as 55-gallon drums and cardboard containers, and can hold up to 300,000 gallons of liquid wastes.

WTI can continue to accept waste at the current rate for several weeks before its storage capacity is reached, Bircher said.

Last week opponents of the \$160 million incinerator suspended their protests at the plant gate to discuss strategy with their lawyers.

More than 120 demonstrators were arrested during a seven-day series of protests. Four demonstrators were jailed for two days each last week and two were jailed Wednesday.

Telephone messages were not returned Wednesday by four anti-incinerator groups: Greenpeace, Save Our County, Tri-State Environmental Council and SOS.

WTI supporters schedule rally

EAST LIVERPOOL — A new group has been formed in support of Waste Technologies Industries and has scheduled its own event for this weekend.

Citizens for Progress has planned a rally and march through town beginning at 2 p.m. Saturday to show support for the controversial hazardous waste incinerator.

Dick Kelly, a local insurance agent and spokesman for the newly formed group, Citizens for Progress, said the group is looking for as many people as possible to take part in the rally, which is set to begin in front of City Hall.

"This is definitely a response to the recent arrests and protests of demonstrators," Kelly said. "We don't disagree with their right to protest as long as it's people from our area who are doing it."

The rally and march are not only to show support for WTI, but for any related companies, Kelly said.

Opponents of the facility have recently held daily protests at the incinerator site, resulting in more than 100 arrests over a 10-day period.

Proponents of WTI have been less vocal than opponents in the past.

Protesters jailbound — somewhere

LISBON — WTI protesters sentenced this week to short jail terms for being in contempt of court may do their time at a Dayton work farm and not at the Columbiana County Jail.

Protesters will do jail time somewhere if the Appeals Court does not rule on their appeals by Dec. 11.

County Sheriff Richard Koffel said Wednesday if the county jail is full when and if the time comes for the protesters to serve sentences, they would have to be taken to another facility.

"We have no choice but to transfer them," he said.

A federal court order permits the current county jail to hold up to only 28 inmates at a time while the new county jail is under construction. Koffel said the county jail was at full capacity Monday when the protesters were sentenced.

"It's our responsibility to house them," he said, and a judge's to say when they will serve their sentences.

Koffel said the Dayton facility in Montgomery County is the only county facility which has the bed space to hold all of the protesters. Cost to house prisoners there would be \$65 per day per person. He said there would be limited transportation costs as the protesters would be picked up here and transported.

The subject of where and when the protesters would be serving their time surfaced at Wednesday's county commissioners meeting.

Commissioner John Wargo said it was not fair for the protesters to serve their time ahead of those currently on the county jail waiting list. Wargo is the only county commissioner who opposes WTI, a controversial toxic incinerator ready to go on line in East Liverpool.

More than 1,100 names are on the waiting list, primarily made up of traffic offenders, such as DUI. "These are not violent people," he said of the protesters, adding there are third- and fourth-time DUI offenders out on the streets still waiting to serve their sentences. Wargo said it's the latter group which poses more of a threat to society.

Commissioner Donald Lowe disagreed. "(WTI opponents) broke the law," he said. "They knew what they were doing."

Wargo also opposes paying other counties to house the protesters across the state when sentences can now be served at the county jail.

Columbiana County Common Pleas Judge Douglas Jenkins ruled Monday that 24 WTI opponents violated a permanent injunction he issued last year which prohibited them from trespassing on WTI grounds. All were fined, and 16 were sentenced to one to two days in jail. They immediately filed appeals.

Jenkins initially suspended sentences pending the outcome of their appeal to his permanent injunction. He changed his ruling Tuesday, giving the Appeals Court until Dec. 11 to delay the sentences pending its official ruling.

WTI trials costly to city

More judges and clerks hired

EAST LIVERPOOL — Many Municipal Court services will be decreased or put on hold for the next several weeks.

Seven jury trials have been scheduled to begin Dec. 14 through the rest of the month and into next year. The final trial is set to begin Jan. 4.

All the trials are in connection with recent arrests of protesters at the Waste Technologies Industries hazardous waste incinerator. In all, 106 defendants are to be tried on 135 counts and trials are to begin on seven separate days.

"We're stretched, and I just hope we can do it," said Judge Melissa Byers-Emmerling. "There are so many unforeseen difficulties you can run into when you're dealing with something of this magnitude."

Some of the court clerks are being asked to serve as bailiffs because they are familiar with the procedures in Municipal Court, thereby leaving few people in the clerk's office to tend to daily business.

She said there will be delays in filing civil cases, because there are only so many employees available.

Attorney Colleen Hall Dailey has agreed to serve as acting Municipal Court judge throughout the duration of the trials. Day-to-day court business is tentatively scheduled to be held in the mayor's office.

Byers-Emmerling said she has received confirmation for one visiting judge to help hear the WTI cases, to be heard in the usual courtroom and in council chambers for any hearings held at a single time.

Retired Barberton Municipal Court Judge John Judge has agreed to serve from Dec. 15-18 and possibly on Dec. 19, a Saturday, if needed, according to Byers-Emmerling, who has placed all defendants on notice to be ready for their cases to be heard at any time between Dec. 14 and Jan. 4. It is not known at this time how much it will cost the city

for the extra judge.

The last jury trial involving the 75 people arrested Nov. 22 at the site has been scheduled to begin Jan. 4, although a location, maybe Kent State-East Liverpool, has not been confirmed.

Other visiting judges may be needed, but Byers-Emmerling said they are difficult to locate and it's even harder to get them to commit to work during the holiday season.

Court reporters will need to be hired for the duration of the trials, she said, noting that they cost \$30 per hour and may be working 10 or more hours each day.

Chairs may have to be rented. Court security will have to be scheduled. It costs a minimum of \$495 per trial per day for juries and the upcoming ones are expected to cost more because of the potential for possible jurors to be excused because they already have opinions about the case and other reasons.

Byers-Emmerling said she is not going to be popular with many people over the holidays because of the jury situation, noting that 38 jurors have been notified to be ready to serve, while the 48 remaining potential jurors for 1992 are being contacted and will probably be asked to serve.

She said that two more pools of 60 jurors each are being placed on notice.

Even the law director's office has been beefed up to contend with the onslaught of hearings scheduled for the next month. Another attorney, William F. Vodrey, has been hired just to deal with the WTI situation, according to G. Thomas Rodfong, assistant to the law director, Charles Payne, who will also be representing the state along with attorney Tim McNicol.

"We're looking to send a message out," Rodfong said. "The state's position is clear. We're looking for jail time and substantial fines for the defendants and are trying to tell them they are not allowed on that property."

W. Virginia asks federal judge to rethink WTI decision

CHARLESTON, W.Va. — The state attorney general's office said Thursday it has asked a federal judge to reconsider a decision that allows an Ohio incinerator to begin burning hazard-

ous waste.

Attorney General Mario Palumbo filed a motion Nov. 27 in U.S. District Court in Wheeling, said Silas Taylor, senior deputy attorney general.

The motion requested Judge

Frederick Stamp reconsider his denial of a preliminary injunction against Waste Technologies Industries of East Liverpool, Ohio.

The injunction sought to keep the plant from burning waste un-

til a lawsuit Palumbo filed in April was heard.

The plant sits across the Ohio River from Chester.

Stamp ruled last month that

Palumbo failed to prove the \$140 million facility would cause "inevitable" harm to the community before the suit is heard. In his ruling, Stamp noted that Von Roll President Blake Marshall testified during a hearing on the injunction in October the company was losing \$115,000 each day it was unable to begin operations.

Marshall also said the company would be forced to default on several loans by early November if it could not begin its shakedown burn. Stamp took that into consideration as well in making his decision.

WTI opponents criticized Stamp's decision, saying he was placing WTI's financial well-being over concerns of potential health risks to the community.

It is on that basis Palumbo's office has asked Stamp to reconsider, according to Steven VanCamp, assistant attorney general in the energy and environment division. VanCamp said they are asking Stamp to consider "a different standard for the injunction."

"When public health is at stake, you're not as concerned about they're going to lose so many dollars," VanCamp said.

Palumbo's lawsuit claims the incinerator will discharge levels of hazardous substances that will exceed air quality standards. It also claims the facility is in a poor location.

Stamp had not acted on Palumbo's request as of Thursday.

The plant has delayed startup of its incinerator until at least January because of adjustments to a fan designed to prevent leaks, officials said Wednesday.

If Stamp does not reconsider his decision, VanCamp said there is still a possibility Palumbo's office will appeal the ruling to the 4th Circuit Court of Appeals in Richmond, Va.

2 WTI foes sentenced
