Today, Sally Katzen testified before the House Science Committee's Technology Subcommittee on the year 2000 software problems, and concerns that computer programs will malfunction in the future because they were not written to handle the change from the year 1999 to 2000.

Tomorrow, Sally Katzen will testify again, before the House Subcommittee on Civil Service. The hearing addresses Federal employee unions and the use of taxpayer money.

Dear Mr. Clinton (and his assistants who handle his copious email):

I watched with dismay, but little surprise when I heard that the Senate had passed the bill tonight which defined marriage on the federal level as existing solely between one man and one woman. I understand that you intend to sign it, although I am uncertain whether it is simply political posturing at this crucial time in your career, or if it truly reflects your beliefs on the sanctity of traditional marriage.

If it is the former, I respect your formidable political adroitness. I urge you to find some clause in the bill which would give you the excuse to send it back to congress, at least until after the election. Alternatively, tack on some provision so obviously unconstitutional that the Supreme Court will have no trouble throwing the whole thing out. (I have a friend who truly believes that this is how you're managing the White House -- attacking the Congress from the right to steal their thunder and quietly nudge along the more

liberal agenda you advocated four years ago. She just wishes, every so often, that you'd let those of us who voted for you know what you're up to. Do us a favour -- look straight into the camera during one the debates and give a wink -- we'll know what that means, really.)

If your position is truly one in which you cannot understand the need for homosexual unions, or are opposed to the concept, well, I can respect your beliefs, but I have a few things to say. Gay men and women have made their own declaration of independence and require the recognition of their rights to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. In particular, the right to legally unite with their partner in a life-long committed relationship. Their hospital visitation rights, unquestioned status in legal wills and private property, tax status, health insurance, and other benefits must be recognized and protected as they would be for any two heterosexuals joined in marriage. We are equal partners in society and we expect no less.

To those who say it is not the role of the federal government to address this issue, I would merely ask them to revisit the political history of the 1960's.

To those who decry the perversion of the institution of marriage, I merely comment that this is not an insistence that we be married and accepted by churches, synagogues, and mosques. Those choices are for each denomination and their learned leadership to make, given deeply held personal beliefs. The separation of church and state, however, is very easy to understand. This is a question of the LEGALITY of a union, and of the denial of status to a certain segment of the population -- of the punishment, not for lack of commitment, for the abuse of the institution, but for stepping outside the norm, of a group of American citizens. The legal union of two private citizens is not a privilege, or a religious issue. It is part of the rights granted us by the founding fathers, whether literally encoded or not.

To those who continue to cling to the ill-educated notion that homosexuals are a hopelessly amo
