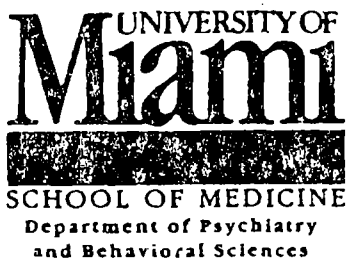

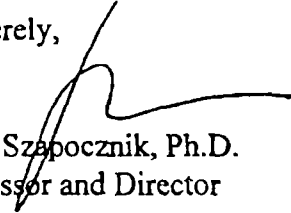

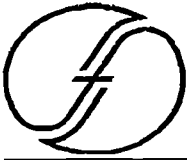

SUBJECT: A Nationwide School Satellite Network on Violence in Schools

In connection with the President's meeting next Monday on school violence, we think it is important to develop a method whereby the dialogue started can continue after the meeting has ended.

The following is a proposal which we can arrange with all the parties and which the President can announce at Monday's session. The principals are the National Education Association (NEA) and EchoStar Satellite Corporation, Littleton, Colorado, the second largest direct broadcast Satellite Company and Future View *Networks*.

EchoStar will donate 1,000 satellite dishes and receivers to be located in 1,000 high schools designated by the NEA by the start of the next school year (September).

EchoStar will also make available to the network free airtime for transmissions for the next school year.

The NEA will provide the programming on school violence on a regular (monthly) basis to schoolteachers, parents and administrators, plus students in some cases, throughout the year. Additionally, the NEA will coordinate involving other organizations in the creation of the programming for the Network, including the National Fraternal Order of Police, the PTA, the National School Board Association and other education related organizations.

The White House will not be committing money or other resources. This is entirely a philanthropic venture by NEA, EchoStar and put together by Future View *Networks*. We envision one of the most visionary outreach processes on an important issue ever put forward.

We would hope that the availability of this communications tool would be a factor in the discussions in Monday's meeting as the nation's leaders consider how to combat violence in the nation's schools.

We would further urge the White House to have the presidents of these three organizations in the meeting itself in order to serve as a resource to the gathering.

Seventeen-year-old Melissa crawled home from her neighborhood bus stop to escape gang crossfire; twelve-year-old Jasmine was asked to join a gang; seventeen year old Johnny watched his best friend get shot on a nice summer evening. Instead of retaliating or caving into peer group pressure, these kids are making a difference in the world through their association with The Happiness Club, a group of 55 Chicago area kids who sing, dance, write and rap most of their own material for their sensational, high energy hip hop show "KIDS MAKE VALUES COOL." The Happiness Club kids sing out against gangs, drugs and violence and say "Yes" to education, racial harmony and high self-esteem. This is truly a unique group of young people whose very being reflects tolerance and diversity. From the ghetto to the Gold Coast, from the inner city to the suburbs, these kids, ages 6-18, represent every size, shape and color. Volunteering many hundreds of hours each year, The Happiness Club works toward one common goal...to draw kids in with music they like, so that they will hear this important message "IT'S OKAY TO BE GOOD." Although many members of The Happiness Club have faced adversity in their young lives, they have made a commitment to be part of the solution rather than part of the problem.

According to founder and director Gigi Faraci Harris, "No one can reach a child like a child. If our show convinces even one child to avoid gangs and drugs, to stay in school or to break through stereotypical barriers, we've accomplished a lot."
