Subject: Forming an Inter-Departmental Working Group for National Service

Now that national service legislation has been reported to the floor in both houses of Congress, the White House Office of National Service has begun to focus on developing implementation ideas to share with the states and potential applicants as a guide and a stimulus for thinking. To carry out this task successfully, the Office of National Service will need the continued support and assistance of high level officials in the Cabinet Departments.

To this end, Eli Segal has asked Peter Edelman, Counselor to Donna Shalala at HHS and a senior policy advisor to Eli Segal at the White House, to establish and chair an inter-departmental working group on national service. The group will have two main functions:

* It will involve department representatives in the process of building the national service program. Department representatives will be asked to help identify experts in their fields, both inside and outside their departments, who can help establish basic program priorities and guidelines, solicit the advice and assistance of other experts, and identify the main constituent groups which can help with outreach and information dissemination efforts.

Note: As Susan Stroud, Director of Program Development for the Office of National Service, begins to establish working groups to help move program development efforts forward, ONS wants to establish some general policy priorities within the areas of education, public health, public safety, and the environment which can be a guide for all those involved. Since ONS would like the policy priorities in these areas to be consistent with overall Administration policy priorities, the first thing we will ask the representatives to do is to let us know the top policy priorities of their departments as they are applicable to these four priority areas for national service. This will help in thinking through priorities for implementation of national service.

*** It will give department representatives the opportunity to share ideas and information with each other about planned or existing department-sponsored service initiatives and to encourage the creation of additional department-based service initiatives. Drawing upon each other's ideas and experiences, representatives will help invigorate the ethic of service in the federal government, in general, and in their own departments, in particular, by generating new ideas for program development and additional service components in existing programs, suggesting ways to increase employee volunteerism, and finding ways to form partnerships between departments as program planning moves forward.**

Representatives to the working group should be able to attend meetings at least once a month and do follow-up work on behalf of the group and their departments when necessary. While we recognize that most departments have already designated community service contacts who have helped the Office of National Service complete an inventory of department-sponsored service initiatives, the status of these contacts varies in each department. Please take the time to carefully select the representative to the working group. The role of the representative will be quite different from that of the initial contact who was identified previously. In order to serve effectively, representatives to the working group must be high level officials who have policy expertise and a great deal of experience in their fields.

The first working group meeting will take place on Wednesday, June 30th at 4:00 in the OEOB room 180. Please select a representative from your department and call Kate Frucher in the Office of National Service at (202)456-6444 with that person's name and phone number by Friday, June 25th. Once selected, the representative should fax a list of the service-relevant top policy priorities of your department (see previous page) to Kate at (202)456-6420 before the first meeting.

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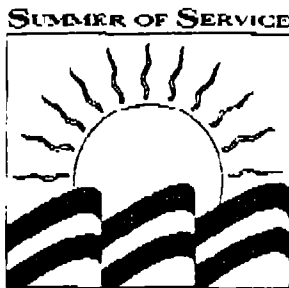

National Training Week June 19-25

For one intensive week, nearly 1,500 young people will participate in an innovative national leadership training on Treasure Island Naval Base in San Francisco. National leaders and participants in the President's Summer of Service will gather at the base from June 19 - 25 for a "boot camp" style training that will help participants begin to build the base of knowledge and skills to effectively serve and meet the needs of children this summer.

The Summer of Service is a national service project initiated by President Clinton and administered by the Commission on National and Community Service. The project will involve young people ages 17-25 in eight weeks of community service at sixteen urban and rural locations throughout the country. Summer of Service programs will address the needs of children, providing services in the areas of health, education, public safety and the environment. The programs will run in Atlanta, Baltimore, Boston, Oakland/East Bay, Los Angeles, New Orleans, Newark, New York City, Philadelphia, Delaware (Ohio), and Red Lake (Minnesota).

National Training Week is the kick-off for the Summer of Service and builds a foundation of future leaders of national and community service. The training incorporates the best practices and thinking of the training field, including input from leaders of the military, the Peace Corps, academia, corporate America and the youth service field.

Participants will live on the naval base, eat at the mess, and start each morning with physical training. Throughout the week, participants will engage in interactive leadership development which includes classroom work, community case studies and group leadership exercises of the type used by many Fortune 500 companies. Activities during the day are intensive, hands-on learning exercises while evening activities are more informal. As an integral part of their training, the participants will spend an entire day in the Bay Area community performing a wide range of service projects such as renovating a public housing complex and a child care center.

During the week, participants will be introduced to children's education, health, environment, and public safety issues by national and local leaders which will include Vice President Al Gore, high level Administration officials, Members of Congress, and Children's Defense Fund President Marian Wright Edelman.

All 1,475 participants will live on the naval base, eat at the mess and begin each morning together with physical training, or PT, a thirty minute physical exercise session, followed by assembly. During the day, participants will engage in intensive, hands-on learning exercises which include class-room work, community case studies, and presentations by national leaders on education, health, public safety, and environmental issues affecting children.

As an integral part of their training, the participants will spend an entire day in the Bay Area community performing a wide range of service projects. Each evening will conclude with TAPS, the Team Assessment and Processing Session, an hour-long reflection session that brings closure to each learning day.

Presidio of San Francisco, one of the oldest and most picturesque Army Posts in the country, is being converted to a national park. Participants will clean up trails and restore vegetation of endangered species.

Marin County *Marin Headlands* are a part of the Golden Gate National Recreation Area along the coast of the Pacific Ocean. Participants will be joined by middle school volunteers to build trails and restore natural habitats for native plants.

Oakland *Habitat for Humanity* works with people to give them the tools and materials to build their own homes. Participants will begin construction on four homes, laying out their footprints, digging the foundation trenches, building and assembling reusable forms.

Emerson School is a local elementary school in Oakland. The school has invited us to improve their school facilities by creating backdrops and props for their theater, and painting and reorganizing their school library.

Berkeley *Educational and Youth Centers.* In the neighborhoods of South and West Berkeley, participants will work at several schools, youth centers, and recreation facilities. Working alongside community members, participants will clean up graffiti, landscape playground areas, and plant a symbolic Summer of Service tree at the end of the day.

East Palo Alto Ravenswood City School District. The school support systems (Headstart, Peer Tutoring, and Parent Education and Counseling) of this East Palo Alto community are housed in two surplus school buildings. Here we will work with community members to paint the school buildings, landscape the school yard, and prepare new signs for the resident agencies.

The Ecumenical Hunger Program is a food and clothing provider for homeless and low income residents in East Palo Alto. Participants will work with community volunteers to design a new, and permanent, system for distributing food and clothing donations.

- afternoon *Community Case Study and Action Planning.* Participants will work with Bay Area community leaders on local community problems to define and understand community issues and develop strategies to address them. At the conclusion of the exercise, community leaders will critique the participants' work and conclusions and add their own perspectives and examples.
- evening *Inventory of Team Assets.* In an informal setting, participants will discuss the experiences that have shaped the skills, values and other attributes that led them to the Summer of Service,
- or *Service Bytes.* In an informal setting, participants will engage in creative problem solving for the key learning areas for Summer of Service.

Thursday, June 24

- 7:00 am *Physical Training*
- morning *Youth Envision the Way Forward.* In a plenary session, participants will hear from early leaders of previous national service initiatives such as the Peace Corps and place their experience in this historic context. The plenary session will be followed by roundtable discussions with guest panelists from the public policy, community service, and youth service fields.
- afternoon *Bringing the Skills Home.* Participants will meet in their local program groups to discuss the specifics of their community projects.

As you may know, as a precursor to his National Service Program, the President has initiated an exciting "Summer of Service" project that will take place in 11 cities and rural areas across the nation this summer.

The project will engage approximately 1,500 young people (ages 17-25) in directly serving the educational, health, public safety and environmental needs of children at-risk in their communities. Summer of Service sites will include Los Angeles; Oakland/East Bay; New Orleans; Atlanta; Baltimore; Philadelphia; Boston; Newark; New York City; Delaware, Ohio; and Red Lake, Minnesota.

The Summer of Service initiative will be launched with six intensive days of service leadership training at Treasure Island Naval Station in San Francisco from Sunday, June 20 through Friday, June 25. The overriding objective of the Peace Corp-inspired training process will be to build a core of young service leaders and equip them with the knowledge and skills they will need for their Summer of Service.

Classroom instruction, interactive leadership exercises, and field training sessions comprising ~~the~~ leadership training have been planned. The training will be executed by a unique public/private partnership that includes the White House, the military, the National Park Service, national and Bay Area service and business communities, and the Commission on National and Community Service.

Each day of the program will feature an all-participant assembly taking place at an outdoor amphitheater highlighted by a special guest speaker from the Administration. The Vice President will address one of the assemblies and we are currently working on the President's schedule to secure his participation during the final session of the week.

I am contacting you in the hopes ^{that} you might be able to participate as a speaker for ^{one} of these special morning assemblies. Summer of Service Training Week will take place in the midst of Congressional consideration of our National Service legislation. While your presence would most certainly inspire these outstanding young Summer of Service leaders, it would also greatly enhance the visibility of our immediate and longterm legislative outreach efforts.

I. Establishing an Inter-Agency Working Group

Purpose:

*** To give department representatives the opportunity to share ideas and information with each other about planned or existing department-sponsored service initiatives and to encourage additional department-based service initiatives.**

Drawing upon each other's ideas and experiences, representatives will be able to generate new ideas for program development, suggest ways to increase employee volunteerism, and ways in which partnerships can be formed between departments as work in these areas moves forward.

*** To involve departments in the process of building the national service program. By giving them a role in its development, they will become more invested in its overall success. To this end, the representatives will be asked to serve as liaisons to identify experts in their fields, both inside and outside their departments, who can help establish basic program priorities and guidelines, solicit the advice and assistance of other experts, and identify main constituents who can help with outreach and information dissemination efforts.**

Representatives to the working group should be high level officials in their departments who have policy expertise in their fields.

In response to a request from ONS earlier this spring, the Chiefs of Staff in each department designated community service contacts. (President Bush's Executive Order of Nov. 5, 1992, also mandated that this be done). While we are not in a position to definitively assess the status of these contacts in their departments, our impression is that their positions and levels of expertise vary. We are reasonably confident that the contacts in Interior, EPA, Agriculture,

HUD, and HHS are suited to participate in the working group, time and work assignments permitting. We are not so sure about the others.

Note: When approaching the Chiefs of Staff with this issue, we must clearly articulate the ways in which the representative's role will differ from that of the initial contact. Otherwise, we may appear to be second guessing the COS's judgement if we suggest that the initial contact be replaced.

II. Timeline

- Monday, June 21st - Meet with Christine Varney and Steve Silverman from Cabinet Affairs to discuss the Inter-Agency working group.
- Tuesday, June 22nd - Send out memo to Chiefs of Staff explaining the purpose of the working group and asking them to identify representatives. As ONS begins its general service program development efforts, it is important for the office to establish priorities in the areas of education, public health, public safety, and the environment which are consistent with overall Administration policy priorities in these areas. In the memo, we should also ask the Chiefs of Staff to help us with this effort by identifying the top policy priorities established by their departments as they relate to these four needs areas.
- Friday, June 25th - Complete final list of department representatives and needs-area priorities.

Week of June 27th:

- Wednesday, June 30th - First meeting of Inter-Agency working group.

Tentative Agenda:

- * Brief group on legislation.
- * Describe goals of National Service Policy Development Task force.

- * Explain role of Inter-Agency working group and expectations of individual members.
- * Share the "Inventory of Department-Sponsored Service Initiatives" with all members.
- * Ask Representatives to share with the other members the program priorities identified by their departments which are most suitable for national service.

Before the next meeting, they should:

- * Identify the service program structures, whether federally supported or not, which best address the policy priorities targeted by their departments. Ask them to try to identify the qualities in those programs structures which make them successful.

- * Identify experts in their fields, both inside and outside the government, who can serve on our program development task forces (Environment, Education, etc).
- * Establish a list of key constituents in their fields - non-profits, state and local officials, etc. - who could advise us during the planning process and help with outreach efforts.

Events Already Planned -- Highlights:

Defense:

In support of National Volunteer Week, Secretary Aspin has sent a memo out to troops world wide encouraging them to participate in service activities.

Justice:

On either April 21st or 25th, Janet Reno will visit a local school which has recently been plagued by violence. She will emphasize the need to do more to improve school safety and will point to National Service and other existing programs as ways to do this. She will also hold a Volunteer Awards Ceremony for DOJ employees on April 23rd.

Veterans:

This year marks the 20th anniversary of the VA Secretary's Outstanding Volunteer Service Awards ceremony. A large ceremony will be held on Monday, April 19 to commemorate this event. Today (April 15), the Secretary visited the VA Medical Center in Bay Pines, Florida, to participate in the anniversary celebration in honor of their volunteers and to present a posthumous award to recognize an individual who was a VA volunteer for 45 years.

Education:

Certain Senators are threatening to filibuster the National Service bill.
This is a polical and partisan move.

There will be a cloture vote in the Senate on Tuesday, July 27, at 10:00 a.m. A cloture vote is required to allow debate and voting to continue on a piece of legislation. It is required to stop a filibuster in the Senate.

We need hundreds of calls made to Senators before Tuesday. The following Senators are the most important targets of our phone calls. However, if you are a local organization and your Senator is not on this list, call your own Senator anyway to make sure they are supporting cloture (especially all Democrats).

What to ask Senators:

- Take politics out of national service -- DO NOT FILIBUSTER and vote YES ON CLOTURE.
- National service is meant to bring people together -- it should not be made political and partisan.
