NATIONAL GALLERY OF ART SCULPTURE GARDEN

DEDICATION CEREMONY

MAY 19, 1999

-- Thank you, Robert Smith, for that generous introduction. This is a historic day for the nation. I am reminded of President Franklin Roosevelt's words when he accepted the National Gallery on behalf of the nation:

What a wonderful gift you have given to the American people, and the millions of foreign visitors who will pass this way in future decades.

-- Of course, I especially want to thank the Morris and Gwendolyn Cafritz Foundation. For three decades, the Cafritz Foundation has set a pace for philanthropy in Washington, DC. We a great deal to the Foundation and the Cafritz family for their support of community service, education, and the arts here in the Nation 's capital, and all Americans owe a debt of gratitude to them for making this Sculpture Garden possible.

-- Some of you may be familiar with the White House Millennium project, which the President and I created to celebrate how we became Americans and what our values and ideals are. We wanted to ask all Americans to help us live out the national theme of "honor the past and imagine the future."

-- It is fitting that as we prepare for the new Millennium, that we dedicate this Garden which is truly a gift to the future. It also honors the past, as the vision for a garden on this spot was laid a two centuries ago when Pierre L 'Enfant created his plan for the city of Washington. He imagined in this location a landscaped park, and I am sure he would approve of this wonderful oasis which the National Gallery has built for all to enjoy.

-- The President and I believe strongly that art should be accessible to everyone, because it has the power to evoke in each of us a deeper understanding of our lives and the world around us. That is why he has been a steadfast supporter of public funding for the arts, including the NEA.

-- Among the arts, sculpture holds a special place in our lives. I often

tell the story of how sculpture brought Bill and me together ? after standing in line to register for law school classes, we found ourselves in front of the Yale University Art Gallery, which had a wonderful sculpture garden. A labor dispute had closed the museum ?s doors, but Bill managed to get the two of us in by offering to pick up trash. That was our first date.

-- I have always loved sculpture, and shortly after his first inauguration, I started thinking about bringing favorite American pieces to the White House. With the help of J. Carter Brown, the idea for an outdoor sculpture garden began to take shape. We hoped to touch the million people who tour the White House each year. To lift their spirits, and inspire them, and sometimes puzzle them -- to encourage them to find the deeper meaning in what they see.

-- The National Gallery has always been an important steward of our artistic and cultural heritage. By opening its doors to millions of students, it has played a profound role in teaching the next generation about our history and the ties between past cultures and modern spirit. I am sure it has inspired countless future artists, helping to preserve and nurture American creativity. And by creating an outdoor space for sculpture, it has expanded the horizons of every visitor, just as two decades ago, the East Building gave 20th century art the prominence it deserves.

-- The National Gallery ?s Sculpture Garden will be accessible to the millions of visitors who come to Washington each year. They will be able to walk around these great works of art; sit and think about them and observe others ? reactions; enjoy a refreshment while they take it in; or even take a spin around the ice skating rink. All in the grandeur of this beautiful setting in the shadow of the Capitol Dome. What a wonderful way to expose people to the world of art.

-- I have been eager to view the new collection here and hope that I can come back one day when I have more time to experience it. I am intrigued by Thinker on A Rock ? Rodin ?s The Thinker is now on display in the White House sculpture garden where I have the privilege of viewing it every day. Now I will look at Rodin ?s Thinker differently having seen Barry Flanagan ?s whimsical and provocative treatment of the subject.

-- And having just returned from Macedonia, where I had the chance to talk with Kosovar refugees who have endured such terrible suffering, I have looked forward to contemplating Puellae by Magdalena Abakanowicz. I understand the sculpture was inspired by a story the artist heard about children who were found frozen to death in cattle cars as they were transported from Poland to Germany in 1942. Surely this work of art has

meaning as the haunting images of Nazi death trains are replayed today in Yugoslavia.

-- With the Kosovar tragedy so fresh in my mind, I am reminded of why art is so important and why it continues to deserve public support. President Kennedy once said that "the life of the arts, far from being an interruption, a distraction in the life of the nation, is very close to the center of a nation's purpose, and is the test of quality of a nation's civilization." He noted that Abraham Lincoln ordered work to continue on the Capitol Dome during the Civil War. That Franklin Roosevelt, in the midst of World War II, dedicated the National Gallery of Art. They were not deterred by circumstances that today would seem daunting. They understood what they were fighting for.

-- Thank you for giving us the inspiration and purpose to go on fighting. I hope that every American who comes to Washington will visit the Sculpture Garden because they will leave enriched. I know that I will.

-- I am honored to accept, on behalf of the nation, the National Gallery of Art Sculpture Garden. Thank you.

These are comments from Ann Lewis and me.

Is it correct that the two purposes are to inform the development of the ad campaign and to yield at least some results that could be released to the public? If so, which questions do you see as potentially releaseable?

We have several overarching concerns. First, it is a little misleading about the population we are focusing on (it's not youth or teenagers, it's young adults, 18 - 30) -- we're afraid people will be thinking "high school" rather than "college-age". Second, it yields no information on one of the most fundamental communication challenges we have, which is how to describe what AmeriCorps members are doing. Rather than doing the laundry list of helping seniors, providing disaster relief, cleaning up rivers and streams, etc., I'd like to know if we do better pitching a focused, qualitative series of projects (such as working with younger children and youth, helping out in schools, working in afterschool programs). Third, it doesn't address one of the President's major goals for AmeriCorps which was bringing people of different backgrounds together in a common purpose in order to build a stronger community and country. We are interested in service as a way of teaching responsibility, community, and common values -- giving young people the chance to connect in a values context, to be a part of something larger than themselves. These are community impacts, not just individual impacts. Finally, we would like to see it test some specific messages (perhaps provided by GSD & M).

Here are our specific comments:

Q1 I would add something about people of diverse racial and ethnic backgrounds working together and respecting one another (and maybe drop the strong families? or another one?)

Q2 AmeriCorps doesn't include many teenagers -- you have to be over 18 to sign up, and the average AmeriCorps member is over 21. I wouldn't put teenagers in this question -- it skews the results.

Q3a What about "caring"? "involved"? What does this question tell us? I'm not sure how we would use this information. Again, we are talking about young adults, not youth as most people define them.

Q3b Is this question too vague?

Q4 I think goals 3 and 4 are too similar -- will most people know what "building a lifelong dedication to community service" means?; concept of

tolerance should be tied to people of other races and ethnicities.

Q5 Why tie this to the military?

Q7A Need to include information about the diversity of AmeriCorps -- need to get past stereotype that all AmeriCorps members are middle class. Also I don't think providing the laundry list of different types of service works -- it gives one the impression that AmeriCorps members are moving from short-term project to short-term project, rather than seriously focusing on a specific need in a specific community for a year. It feeds the "why not just use unpaid volunteers" argument. At least let's try alternating descriptions and see which is more appealing -- the laundry list v. a set of activities focusing on children and youth. I might even say (this is not in survey -speak): "Each AmeriCorps member is assigned to spend a year working with a school or community group to meet a locally identified need -- most often helping younger children and youth."

Q8B Same problem re: list of what AmeriCorps members are doing.

Q10 Education award or scholarship, not stipend. Same problem about getting things done -- this has been a serious communications challenge for AmeriCorps since it was first conceived -- I'd like to see this survey help us decide how to describe what they do, rather than assume this is the only formulation. Please add an alternative that gets at the depth of the work, the focus on youth, and the fact that communities identify the need to be met.

Ten years ago, I had the privilege of serving on a Commission set up by the WT Grant Foundation to recommend strategies to help our young people succeed. The resulting report, called "The Forgotten Half," for the then-fifty percent of youth who didn 't go on to college, called for many things " including more money for college, better job training, and greater youth involvement in community organizations.

Many of these proposals were put into practice by the Clinton Administration. School-to-Work legislation helped build stronger connections between educators and employers. 20th Century Learning funds will create x thousand new openings in after school programs, and (other). And today, the Forgotten Half has become just a third, as the number of young people going to college has increased by x, thanks in part to the availability of HOPE Scholarships, which [do x].

One of our recommendations, a decade ago, turned popular wisdom about young people on its head. Youth need many things, and the families deserve the support of the whole community to be sure that they get the education, health care, and moral support that they need. But as much as young people need, they also have much to offer. A decade ago, it was not a common idea to ask a young person to help their community " especially those who were low-income or who had other challenges of their own. And yet, we discovered, when young people are asked to channel their idealism and energy into helping others and solving community problems, they also build respect for themselves and a connection to others.

So our idea was to turn it around, not just to serve youth, but to ask

youth
to serve. And City Year was one of the examples we looked at and wrote about.

A decade ago, not everyone believed it could be done. That young adults from all walks of life could find common ground in service. That their service would make them better citizens. Or that they could make a real contribution to their communities.

City Year proved that what worked in theory could work in practice. It worked so well that the President used City Year as a model for his national service program, AmeriCorps. And now City Year corpsmembers wear the AmeriCorps emblem on their signature red jackets, signifying that they are proud members of the AmeriCorps network.

As you celebrate your tenth anniversary, be proud of what you have done. You have mentored and tutored almost 400,000 children. You have [insert other City Year accomplishments]. And you have helped to launch a national movement, to make service the common expectation of every young person growing up in America.

This fall will mark the fifth anniversary of AmeriCorps. Since the President swore in the first corpsmembers in 1994, more than 100,000 Americans have served in AmeriCorps, including 40,000 this year alone. They, like City Year, represent the diversity that is America ? [insert diversity stats]. They are in every state. They work with well-known nonprofit organizations like the National Council of Churches, Habitat for Humanity, and the Red Cross, and with unknown grassroots groups. And they, in my opinion, are the best kept secret in America.

Two out of every three Americans have never heard of AmeriCorps (check Blueprint). They don't know of the important work you do -- improving the environment, helping senior citizens, and reaching out to children and teenagers, providing them with good role models, tutoring, and someone to talk to who had time to listen. They don't know how AmeriCorps members help bring communities together, recruiting additional volunteers and sparking community involvement. And they don't know that, according to a recent study, although just a little over half of AmeriCorps members had volunteered before they joined, virtually every one planned to continue their service after, with many planning careers in public service.

It's time we let the cat out of the bag. I'm asking you to let people know the best kept secret in America: AmeriCorps is national service and AmeriCorps works. I challenge you to tell ten people this week, and the next, and the next after that. Tell people about your City Year experience, what you've experienced, or if you're not a City Year member, tell why you believe in the program.

Just a month ago (check), America received a wake up call when two young men in Littleton, Colorado, held a school, a community, and the whole nation

hostage. The media attention focused on them will ensure that none of us ever forgets the tragedy they wrought.

It is a shame that the good works of City Year and other AmeriCorps members don't garner one thousandth the media attention as this. On the other hand, the 100,000 current and former AmeriCorps members have surely touched the lives of millions of Americans. We have the power to spread the word, and we should use it.

It is my belief that some good will come from the national soul-searching sparked by Littleton. We have already made some progress promoting gun control [need specifics].

And Littleton has prompted a long overdue discussion not just about the role that violence plays in our popular culture, but what we can do to see that children are not exposed to routine violence in their games, their television shows, and their movies. [more?]

A third important result is a reexamination of the support we are providing our young people, from mental health services to

But it is also time to reexamine what we ask of young people, starting in the earliest grades.

As I've travelled to war-torn countries around the world, I am always struck by the depth of people's hatred for people unlike themselves. Hate that has festered and grown for years, even centuries. I've met good people who have never spoken to someone of another ethnicity or religion. And so the prejudice continues.

These experiences always remind me that despite the struggles we have had here in the United States to become one America, our diversity is our strength, our difference is our s . But there is no question that we have had to work at it.

Today, I worry that we should be doing more to bring people together across racial, ethnic, and economic lines in a common purpose. The military, when it set out to desegregate, did this for a generation of young men. Our schools ought to serve this function, but today, too many children are educated in de facto segregation. I can't think of another American institution that works to strengthen the bonds that tie us together across difference. But I am sure that one thing we should be doing is to make programs like City Year available to young people in state and major city in America.

I want to keep you closely apprised of developments on AmeriCorps appropriations. You recall, of course, that the President requested a significant increase -- \$113 million -- on the way to the goal of 100,000 AmeriCorps slots per year.

On Monday evening, the House VA-HUD subcommittee did its mark-up. The results were somewhat mixed -- some quite positive, and some cause for being very alert. The subcommittee put in \$400 million, which is less than current funding levels (\$435 million) and obviously far below the President's request. BUT, this is the first time the House committee has put money in for AmeriCorps, so in that respect it is a big increase from past years. This reflects both the growing bipartisan support for AmeriCorps, and the Chair's (Walsh) special support of AmeriCorps and national service.

The less good news is that Walsh's staff thinks that other Republicans will be gunning for us on the floor, and that the bill could be on the floor as early as next week. So we are readying ourselves for this fight.

You should know that we haven't had a House floor vote for many a moon. Our

previous subcommittee chair (Lewis) had always recommended to us that we not endure (and possibly lose) a floor vote. Most of the threatened amendments in the past have been to pit AmeriCorps against something undeniable such as veterans health. Lewis and his Democratic counterparts have been of the mind not to take that fight, but rather to keep our heads down with the knowledge that we would ultimately get our funds in the final bill.

Walsh's view may be different. With the growing support for AmeriCorps, and the very closely divided House, he has suggested in the past that we may want the floor fight, and we could win it. If we have no Democratic defections, we can probably count on a minimum of 10 Republican votes (and possibly many more). That would win. Harris will be consulting with Walsh tomorrow, and I will let you know the upshot of that conversation.

I wanted to make sure that you (and your colleagues as you think useful) are aware of the situation. The prospect of a winnable floor fight is quite exciting. What better way to prove our point and win our argument. The prospect of a close loss is obviously less appealing.

It is written in the Psalms that a good man & shall be like a tree planted
by the rivers of water (his leaf shall not wither; and whatsoever he
doeth shall prosper. 8

Dan Dutko was that good man. Wherever he planted himself, whether it was
in the West Texas prairie, in the halls of Congress, the DNC, Dan reaped a
bountiful harvest. He made a difference in the lives of all of us in this
room) and countless Americans who will never know his name. For those of
us who were blessed to know him, the memory of Dan ,s work, his love and
friendship, will always thrive, and never wither.

I first met Dan some 27 years ago. Taylor Branch and I were running the
McGovern campaign in Texas and we had asked all the regional coordinators
to meet us in San Antonio. I immediately noticed the energy and optimism
emanating from this slender young man from West Texas. We knew that the
odds weren ,t exactly in our favor. But of all the coordinators, Dan had
one of the toughest challenges. He had volunteered to run our effort in
Tom Green County) a place where we were surprised to find even a single
McGovern supporter, let alone someone willing to work for our campaign.
In the end, through sheer force of will, Dan did a remarkable job in Tom

Green County, rounding up an improbable 30 percent of the vote.

Later, when I got to know him better, I learned that Dan was no stranger to beating improbable odds. It was his life story. From a hardscrabble childhood in Illinois, he made the most of his opportunities -- joining the Air Force, getting a college degree, making his way through Texas and Washington politics to become a mover and shaker in this city. Against the odds, he lived the American Dream. There's a popular saying in Arkansas, "Politics is full of self-made men who were born in a log cabin they built with their own hands." Dan Dutko was truly a self-made man, but he never forgot where he came from -- and those who helped him along the way. He was determined to give something back to the country that had given so much to him.

No one loved the Democratic Party more than Dan. Like so many of us, he truly believed it was the party of the American Dream -- and he fought hard to give more of his fellow Americans the opportunities to live that Dream.

I'm told that Dan loved to garden, that he put many, many hours into planning, planting, coaxing beautiful flowers out of his backyard garden. I'm not surprised. Dan was a nurturer. He was known for taking promising young people under his wing, mentoring them, helping them flourish. So many of you are a testament to his eye for talent -- including the Senator from my home state, Blanche Lincoln, who started her career in Washington as his personal assistant. I, too, am grateful to Dan for sharing my vision for America and working with me to make it a reality these past seven years.

Over the years, I continued to be amazed by Dan's spirit and enthusiasm, his generosity and tireless commitment to so many important causes. From the very beginning, Dan was instrumental to one of my proudest achievements as president -- AmeriCorps. Whenever it looked like AmeriCorps might have trouble in Congress, Dan was there for us, devoting his heart and soul to building the support we needed to keep it alive. His dedication sprang not just from his devotion to his wife, who worked for AmeriCorps, but from his belief in the possibilities of giving young people a chance to serve. In no so small measure because of Dan, 100,000 young men and women now have had the opportunity to earn money for college and make a difference in their communities. Hillary tells me that even last weekend at Aspen, Dan was talking up AmeriCorps, upcoming fifth anniversary and asking folks to help out with the celebration.

But most of all, I am grateful to Dan for his friendship. Hillary and I loved having Dan and Deb over to the White House for dinner or the movies. Dan and I shared a love of action movies -- the last one we saw together -- just last month -- was "The General's Daughter." We will miss Dan's big hugs and big heart, his warmth and good humor -- and the legendary energy he instantly brought into the room. We will miss the pride in his voice as he talked of his beloved wife Deb and their two fine young sons, Jonathan and Matthew, whom he adored.

Ralph Waldo Emerson once said, "To laugh often and much; to win the respect of intelligent people and the affection of children (to appreciate beauty, to find the best in others; to leave the world a little better;

whether by a healthy child, a garden patch or a redeemed social condition; to know even one life has breathed easier because you have lived. This is the meaning of success."

Though he was taken from us decades too soon, Dan Dutko, devoted husband and father, respected mentor and cherished friend

This is an important time for the American people. Congress is back in session, and expected to tackle many of the issues that affect our citizens in very direct ways -- from taxes, to health care, retirement, education, campaign finance reform and the minimum wage. We should all pay close attention to the deliberations, because the decisions made by our representatives will have real and long-lasting consequences, and will determine whether we continue along the road to security and prosperity, or return to the short-sighted and ill-advised policies of the past. Under my husband's leadership, this country has witnessed the creation of 19.4 million new jobs, the longest peacetime expansion, and the largest budget surplus in history. The latest economic reports show unemployment dropping to 4.2 percent, the lowest rate since January of 1970. In order not to squander this hard-won prosperity, we must commit ourselves to saving Social Security and strengthening and modernizing Medicare. We must pay down our debt, continue to improve educational and economic opportunity, and inject new investment in areas still untouched by our recovery. And we must do these things now.

A proposed increase in the minimum wage is a good example. Working 40 hours a week, 50 weeks a year, a minimum-wage worker earns just \$10,300 annually -- not enough to make ends meet for many families, and below the poverty level for a family of four. The President and Democratic members of Congress have proposed an increase of \$1 -- from \$5.15 to \$6.15 an hour -- over two years, which would boost a family's income by an additional \$2,000. Although critics traditionally predict that raising the minimum wage is bad for business and benefits mostly middle-income teenagers, the evidence points in the opposite direction. Since the last increase three years ago, more than 8 million new jobs have been added to the economy, and unemployment has declined. And of those who would benefit, 70 percent are adults, and three-fifths are women, many of whom are the sole breadwinners in their households. Raising the minimum wage will be considered as the Senate debates bankruptcy reform -- another bill that will have far-reaching implications for America. Bankruptcy reform is in order, and anyone who can repay a portion of his debts should be required to do so. Bankruptcy reform, however, should be balanced, and should require greater responsibility from creditors and debtors alike. As we approach the end of the federal government's fiscal year on Oct. 1, lawmakers must pass the 13 appropriations bills to fund the government for the next 12 months. As I write this, members of Congress are woefully underfunding programs like education and health care. In other areas, they are cutting key programs altogether. I am appalled that one of the bills passed by the House cuts entirely one of the great success stories of the last five years -- AmeriCorps. Since 1994, with broad bipartisan support, AmeriCorps has given over 100,000 young people the opportunity to serve. It has enabled Americans from every walk of life to work together to revitalize our neighborhoods and our schools. Cutting funding for AmeriCorps sends exactly the wrong message to our young citizens who want to make a difference in their communities, and the President has promised a veto if funding is inadequate. Not only is AmeriCorps in jeopardy, but other important programs are threatened by another bill the President has vowed to veto -- the Republican tax cut bill. This risky proposal does nothing to save Social Security or modernize and strengthen Medicare. Moreover, in 2009, the Republican plan would slash domestic programs across the board by nearly 50 percent. Cuts of this magnitude could mean roughly 425,000 fewer children enrolled in Head Start, over 7,000 fewer FBI agents protecting our streets, and the elimination of funding for all toxic-waste cleanup projects nationwide. The costs of this tax cut would explode just as the baby boom generation begins to retire, Medicare is projected to become insolvent, and Social Security begins to come under significant strain. Now is not the time to abandon our elderly, our children and our future for the sake of short-term political gain. Now is the time to adopt a budget plan that addresses critical priorities, such as Social Security and Medicare, and takes action on the other important challenges facing our country. Now is the time to pass common-sense gun measures to prevent youth violence and keep guns out of the hands of children and criminals. Now is the time to pass a strong, enforceable Patients' Bill of Rights. Now is the time to rebuild and modernize America's schools. And now is the time for Congress to keep its promise to hire 100,000 new teachers to reduce class sizes. We can meet our most pressing national needs. That's what the American people want, and that's what Congress should give them.

Subject: Amendment to Eliminate AmeriCorps Grants Defeated in Senate

Just a little while ago, the Senate voted 61 - 38 to defeat an amendment that would have removed all funding for AmeriCorps grants. Sixteen Republicans joined all Senate Democrats in voting against the amendment. Here is the story.

Quite out of the blue, Sen. Smith (I-NH) offered an amendment that would have taken all of the money in the VA-HUD bill for AmeriCorps grants -- \$224.5 million -- and shifted that money to veterans' programs. In support of his amendment, Sen. Smith argued strongly against "paid volunteers" and suggested that AmeriCorps is unAmerican.

Sen. Bond (R-MO), who chairs the VA-HUD appropriations committee, argued against the amendment, citing the value of AmeriCorps. He also pointed out that there is no chance the President would sign a VA-HUD bill that does not fund AmeriCorps. Sen. Mikulski also spoke strongly against the Smith amendment.

Last year, you may recall Sen. Sessions (R-AL) offered a similar amendment. Sessions' amendment would have moved \$33 from AmeriCorps to the space program. That amendment failed 58-37.

Today, the vote against the Smith amendment was even bigger: 61-38. Further, the Smith amendment was especially difficult because he pitted AmeriCorps against the needs of veterans.

Here is the text of Harris' statement we released in response to the vote.

"As a World War II veteran, I know how important it is to support the men and women who have given so much of themselves to defend our nation in military service. I'm pleased the Senate also recognized the need for supporting patriotism on the home front, the 40,000 Americans who serve their country in AmeriCorps. Today's vote shows strong bipartisan support for national service."

The 61 - 38 vote breaks down as follows. All 45 Senate Democrats voted against the Smith amendment by voting yes on the motion to table. In addition, in another show of the growing bipartisan support for AmeriCorps, 16 Republican Senators voted to defeat the amendment. They are listed below. Sen. When the Senate completes action on the VA-HUD bill, it will move to the House-Senate conference to resolve differences between the two bills -- including of special interest the differences in funding for the national service programs. We will keep you up-to-date on important developments.
