AmeriCorps*USA at Five Months

A Summary of Accomplishments from 52 Randomly Selected Sites ¹

March 22, 1995

The following report aggregates and summarizes the bulk of the accomplishments of 1,654 AmeriCorps*USA Members serving at 52 sites that were selected randomly from across the nation. Listed accomplishments represent the efforts of approximately 8% of AmeriCorps*USA's operating sites during the first five months of operation--from September, 1994 through January, 1995.

The accomplishments are grouped within AmeriCorps*USA's four issue areas: education, public safety, health and human needs, and environmental and neighborhood restoration. The list, while both long and diverse, is not exhaustive; not every accomplishment has been captured. Nevertheless, the list summarizes the major accomplishments of the selected sites.

¹ Accomplishments listed are from reviews conducted with each operating site by Aguirre International evaluators between February 7 and March 9, 1995.

Education

The AmeriCorps Members helped children and youth from impoverished urban and rural communities to succeed in school. They taught in classrooms, established new learning programs in and out of school, and prepared preschoolers for the demands of school. Specific accomplishments include the following:

- Taught 1,430 and tutored 7,638 pre-school, elementary, and junior high school students in basic educational skills.
- Conducted enriched learning programs and initiated new ones — such as computer-based reading instruction, peer tutoring, scientific experimentation, and programs for children with special needs — for 6,414 children.
- Established after-school and vacation programs to reinforce the academic involvement of 4,656 children.

The AmeriCorps Members helped at-risk children succeed in school by assisting them and their families to develop their sense of civic and community responsibility and to become more stable, more self-sufficient, and more involved in the community. Specific accomplishments include the following:

- Organized and supervised community service projects for 4,469 at-risk children and youth. Projects included neighborhood cleanups and providing food for elderly people.
- Counseled, taught parenting skills, and/or provided problem solving assistance to 390 families, 183 teen parents, and the low-income families of 440 children at risk of failing in school.
- Provided literacy or employment-related training for 694 adults.
- Provided intensive educational support — including regular counseling — to 30 troubled teenagers living in group homes and 33 low-income children, including 22 homeless preschoolers.

Public Safety

The AmeriCorps Members started neighborhood safety programs, mobilized neighbors, and improved community/police relations, resulting in safer communities. Specific accomplishments include the following:

- Escorted 8,500 children to school through safe corridors.
- Started 258 neighborhood safety programs and patrolled 250 vacant buildings to prevent violence, drug-dealing and other illegal activities.
- Initiated 2 programs to improve community/police relations, including assisting a police mobile unit.

The AmeriCorps Members worked to prevent violence in school by teaching mediation techniques, resulting in decreased incidence of violence and negative behavior. Specific accomplishments include the following:

- Resolved 414 school conflicts that might otherwise have ended in violence or with students dropping out of school because of fear of violence.
- Taught conflict resolution techniques to 8,119 school children.
- Counseled and taught alternatives to violence to 1,350 potential or actual gang members and 54 parents of children at risk of becoming involved in gangs.
- Initiated 3 programs to train school and community members to implement violence prevention activities.
- Secured donated materials and created a memorial garden and mural in memory of 3 children slain in the streets.

The AmeriCorps Members worked to prevent violence and drug abuse in families and communities and provided direct assistance to victims of crime as well as referring them to needed services. Specific accomplishments include the following:

- Conducted workshops for 220 at-risk individuals about family violence prevention.
- Answered crisis hotline calls and made referrals for 878 victims of sexual and domestic violence.
- Provided each of 470 victims of sexual and domestic violence with 30 days of counseling and assistance.
- Counseled 35 elementary or high-school students in crisis as a result of rape, violence, or home difficulties.
- Counseled 1,180 teenagers about alcohol and drug abuse.
- Conducted home visits about drug or alcohol abuse prevention with 120 community residents.

Health and Human Needs

The AmeriCorps Members made independent living easier for disabled, elderly, or hospitalized individuals by providing direct support service and by recruiting and organizing community volunteers. Specific accomplishments include the following:

- Helped 123 elderly persons, 50 visually impaired adults, and 9 visually impaired children live independently.
- Provided job-related training, independent living assistance and/or medical referrals for 135 mentally ill or developmentally disabled persons.
- Organized weekly social activities for 400 elderly nursing home residents.
- Constructed wheel-chair accessible trails, ramps, or sidewalks at 3 parks, 5 low-income homes, and 4 public buildings.
- Obtained donated materials, trained 58 volunteers, and repaired the homes of 296 elderly persons.

The AmeriCorps Members provided emergency medical services, as well as health training and education. Specific accomplishments include the following:

- Trained 1,144 inner-city residents in CPR.
- Provided emergency medical services to over 1,500 people.
- Screened 1,100 low-income children for lead toxicity and other health risks.
- Provided health counseling, education, or referrals and transportation to 220 low-income families and over 5,000 individuals.
- Disseminated health care information to 4,567 individuals.
- Distributed 150 children's car seats to low-income families.
- Conducted immunization screenings — immunizing 158 individuals and notifying 500 others of their families' need to be immunized.
- Administered 301 HIV tests and counseled patients regarding results.
- Conducted workshops and distributed information on AIDS and tuberculosis to over 7,000 people.

The AmeriCorps Members helped meet the basic needs of low-income and homeless people for food and shelter. They improved low-income housing, fed the hungry, and improved the methods of service referral and delivery. Specific accomplishments include the following:

- Renovated 238 inner-city housing units and 99 rural homes; began renovation of 121 more.
- Refurbished 2 homeless shelters and began to renovate 3 buildings — one for seniors, one for battered women, and one for the formerly homeless.
- Distributed food to more than 16,625 low-income people and packed 7,000 dinners and 32,000 breakfasts for the hungry.
- Found shelter for 400 homeless families, and sorted and distributed clothes to 350 homeless individuals.
- Secured hospice housing for 27 people with AIDS and helped feed (on a weekly basis) 1,250 people who have AIDS or who are HIV positive.
- Provided housing information or counseling to over 500 low-income and homeless families.
- Secured donated furniture, repaired it, and delivered it to 300 newly-housed families.

Environmental and Neighborhood Restoration

The AmeriCorps Members responded to emergencies, including post-disaster environmental restorations, and worked to improve emergency response capacity in parks and public lands. Specific accomplishments include the following:

- Inspected and repaired 87 small dams, protecting 200 farms.
- Provided disaster recovery assistance to 350 land owners recovering from a flood: activities included sand and soil deposit mapping, advice on pasture and hayland management, watershed mapping, and computer simulations to plan floodplain management.
- Fought 2 major forest fires and saved 1 national park road from washing out.
- Joined at least 5 search and rescue efforts.

The AmeriCorps Members restored and stabilized the natural environment and wildlife habitats. Specific accomplishments include the following:

- Planted 212,500 trees.
- Restored 320 acres of wild land areas by repairing fire and flood damage, re-planting to prevent erosion, and fencing off wetlands to prevent illegal dumping.
- Restored or stabilized 27 miles of riverbed and stream banks to improve the habitat of salmon; fenced another 7 miles to keep cattle from destroying spawning grounds; repaired three aquaculture tanks with a capacity to rear 1,000,000 salmon fry per year.
- Removed 2,000 lbs. of trash from an urban river.
- Monitored water quality in 2 parkland areas.
- Surveyed 5,700 acres of National Forest land as part of reforestation programs to monitor reforestation efforts; conducted biological inventories on 12,000 acres of wetland.
- Built, restored, or maintained 311 campsites, 88 miles of parkland trails, 17 bridges, and 1 mile of forest service road.
- Cleaned up storm debris and trash on 3 beaches, protected sand dunes on one beach, and built one wildlife observation platform and 3 duck blinds.

The AmeriCorps Members improved neighborhoods, parks, and recreation facilities by converting vacant lots, renovating buildings, repairing public facilities, and conducting recycling and conservation programs, resulting in a heightened sense of community ownership. Specific accomplishments include the following:

- Renovated 11 community buildings, including an inner-city medical clinic, community centers, and public schools.
- Converted 29 overgrown lots into green space; built 7 community gardens; planted trees along 30 city blocks.
- Cleaned 27 miles of road, restored 1 community reservoir, removed illegally dumped garbage from one community; and unclogged more than 14,000 storm drains.
- Created 4 playgrounds, designed 1 picnic area, and improved safety at 1 scenic overlook.
- Restored, repaired, or maintained 19 historical landmarks and a traditional tribal longhouse.
- Completed 61 inner-city neighborhood clean-ups — including a city-wide graffiti removal.
- Distributed 1,375 low flush toilets and 1,700 water conserving showerheads in low-income neighborhoods — along with over 1,400 water conservation guides.
- Recycled 920 inefficient toilets and 1,120 inefficient showerheads.



AmeriCorps and Federal Agencies

AmeriCorps -- the new national service initiative signed into law by President Clinton in September, 1993 -- will establish a "domestic Peace Corps" involving thousands of young Americans who will work through AmeriCorps programs to perform critical service in urban and rural communities nationwide.

AmeriCorps programs -- selected through an ongoing national competition by the Corporation for National Service -- will comprise the **AmeriCorps National Service Network**. The first wave of AmeriCorps programs, announced by the White House on June 20, include national nonprofit organizations, multi-city and multi-state partnerships, schools and universities, inter-denominational coalitions, private sector alliances, and **15 federal agencies**.

The 15 federal agencies selected to operate AmeriCorps programs will involve approximately 2500 AmeriCorps Members working within the critical AmeriCorps National Service Priority Areas of Education, Public Safety, Human Needs, and the Environment.

Department of Agriculture

AmeriCorps Members: 1,200 Sites: 35

The Department of Agriculture's AmeriCorps program will support initiatives in three areas: anti-hunger, rural development, and public land restoration. Through the first initiative, AmeriCorps Members will increase public awareness of food stamp and school breakfast programs, lead nutrition campaigns, and create urban gardens and farmers' markets in low-income communities. The anti-hunger initiative is a collaboration among the Department of Agriculture, local hunger agencies, and youth corps and will operate in Los Angeles, CA; Washington, DC; Milwaukee, WI; the delta area in Mississippi, and across the state of Vermont.

Through the Rural Development Project, AmeriCorps Members will help communities protect watersheds, assess water quality, provide disaster relief, improve housing and more. The rural development sites include: Maine, Vermont, northwestern New York, South Carolina, and select areas of Tennessee, Virginia, and West Virginia.

Through USDA's third initiative, focused on public lands, AmeriCorps Members will rehabilitate park facilities, blaze trails, lead environmental education seminars, and conduct other projects specific to each of the following sites: western Kansas, western Oklahoma, Texas (coast region), Atlanta, GA; Boston, MA; East St. Louis, IL; New Jersey (statewide), Washington, D.C.; Chicago, IL; Portland, OR; San Bernadino, CA; Six Rivers National Forest, CA; Olympic National Forest, WA; Rogue River National Forest, OR; Arizona (national forests statewide); Bienville National Forest, MS; Green Mountain National Forest, VT; White Mountain National Forest, NH; and flood regions in the midwest. **Contact: Joel Berg 202-720-6350.**

AmeriCorps-Federal Partnership Talking Points

- The National and Community Service Trust Act of 1993 allows federal agencies to apply for AmeriCorps grants.
- At the President's very first Cabinet meeting in January 1993, he directed members of the Cabinet to incorporate the concept of service into their missions. He wanted this to be the hallmark of his Administration, bringing problem-solving to the local level by engaging citizens in their communities.
- An AmeriCorps grant to a federal agency is intended to act as seed money, allowing the agency to leverage existing resources and integrate activities into its ongoing programs at the local level. Most agency programs are community-based, involving a wide range of local partners -- businesses, non-profit organizations, community service organizations, city governments, police departments, schools and colleges, as well as ordinary citizens. AmeriCorps Members in these programs do not work at the agencies in Washington. They work out in the communities with these local partners.
- Local partners work closely with the federal agencies to design these programs. Once the program is funded, the local partners have the responsibility for recruiting the members, developing the programs and overseeing the day-to-day operations. This local involvement is consistent with the theory that agencies will work better if they are less reliant on Washington structures, and more connected to citizens outside the beltway.
- Federal agencies often have a unique role to play in delivering particular services to communities. If AmeriCorps wants to help deliver these services, it must work in cooperation with federal agencies. *For example, the Department of Interior is responsible for the stewardship of our national parks. Veterans turn to the Department of Veterans Affairs to address their concerns and FEMA helps communities recover from natural disasters. In order to get things done in these vital areas, AmeriCorps works with these federal agencies - through conservation efforts in the Florida Everglades, and in partnership with the VA and the Collaboration to Help Homeless Veterans in order to help homeless vets move to self-sufficiency.*
- Working with agencies allows AmeriCorps to tap into their extensive network of community organizations to meet particular needs. *Our partnership with the Department of Justice has allowed us to become a part of their successful Weed and Seed program in seven communities, which works with local organizations in cities around the country to reduce crime.*

- The federal government has the ability to access under-served areas through its national network. *Many USDA sites are in rural areas that would not receive any type of assistance from national service but for the fact that the federal government is involved and has resources on the ground;*
- Grants to federal agencies in FY 1995 amounted to approximately \$14.5 million, which represents just 2% of the \$537 million in grant funding that the Corporation made this year;
- Federal agencies were not given special treatment in the application process. They were not given a set-aside in the legislation. They had to compete on their merits like every other organization. In addition, federal programs are subject to the same high standards as all our programs. If the programs affiliated with the federal agencies do not meet our high standards of program quality, they will not be renewed.
- The charge that AmeriCorps members are federal employees is simply untrue. AmeriCorps members working in federal agency programs are not civil servants, and have no status whatsoever as employees of the federal government. Members are recruited, hired and supervised by the local organization that is administering that particular program and work out in these communities, not in Washington.
- It is not our intention to fund these projects for more than a few years - we intend that the programs will put down roots in the communities in which they serve and that the citizens of those communities will want to sustain them;
- Many of the federal agency programs leverage significant resources from local entities -- city governments, non-profit organizations, etc. thus reducing the program's dependence on federal dollars. *These contributions come in various forms, from cash to in-kind donations such as office space or equipment to recruitment of volunteers. For example, each of the local organizations affiliated with the Department of Justice's program has contributed approximately \$42,000 to their projects. The Baltimore Department of Public Works has assigned a full-time employee to work with the Department of Transportation's Sandtown project and has made dump trucks available to AmeriCorps members at no charge. The Sprague Memorial Institute contributed \$30,000 to an HHS program in Chicago which does health outreach to low-income families.*
- Like all AmeriCorps programs, these programs have also provided a structure for non-AmeriCorps Member volunteers to serve their community. *The 212 AmeriCorps Members with the Department of Justice's JustServe program have recruited over 3,000 volunteers to help them in their public safety efforts. These volunteers have added over 18,000 additional hours of service, significantly increasing the impact and cost-effectiveness of the program;*

Summer of Safety Accomplishments

50 Reasons Why the Corporation for National Service Can Be Proud of Its First Corporation-Wide, National Program

The following list reports part of what the 1994 Summer of Safety Program got done in American communities. These outcomes resulted from the combined effort of more than 7,000 national service participants in thirty-five states and the District of Columbia. The data come from end-of-summer reports from the local programs' directors, following strict procedures laid down by the Corporation. Many items on this list have been confirmed by CNS program officers and researchers. While some items have not been verified, our experience from the summer programs in 1993 and reports this year tell us that, if anything, local programs under estimate what they achieve.

Community Policing

1. Freed up 26,413 hours of police officers time.
2. Opened 11 new police mini-stations, expanded or revitalized 23.
3. Began 47 citizen patrols; expanded or revitalized 63.
4. Identified 1,864 code violations.

Neighborhood Watch or Block Watch

5. Opened 976 new watch programs.
6. Revitalized 265 watch programs.
7. Started 863 neighborhood watch, telephone networks.

Improvement of Household Security

8. Performed 13,513 household security surveys or audits.
9. Installed 1,001 new window and door locks.
10. Identified 866 unsafe areas for local police.

Crime Awareness and Crime Avoidance

11. Provided 6,322 persons with escort services.
12. Trained 4,626 persons to recognize and avoid scams and confidence games.
13. Fingerprinted 4,968 persons.
14. Trained 1,360 persons in tourist safety.
15. Organized 1,313 neighborhood watch, telephone networks.

Safe Places, Safe Houses and Safe Havens

16. Created 99 safe houses.
17. Established 40 safe play streets.
18. Renovated or expanded 156 safe corridors or havens.
19. Trained 1,549 adults and 1,336 youth on the creation and use of safe places.

Conflict Resolution

20. Trained 11,785 persons in conflict resolution
21. Began 49 peer mediation programs.
22. Counseled 871 gang members.

Domestic Violence and Sexual Abuse

- 23. Provided sexual abuse counseling to 638 persons.

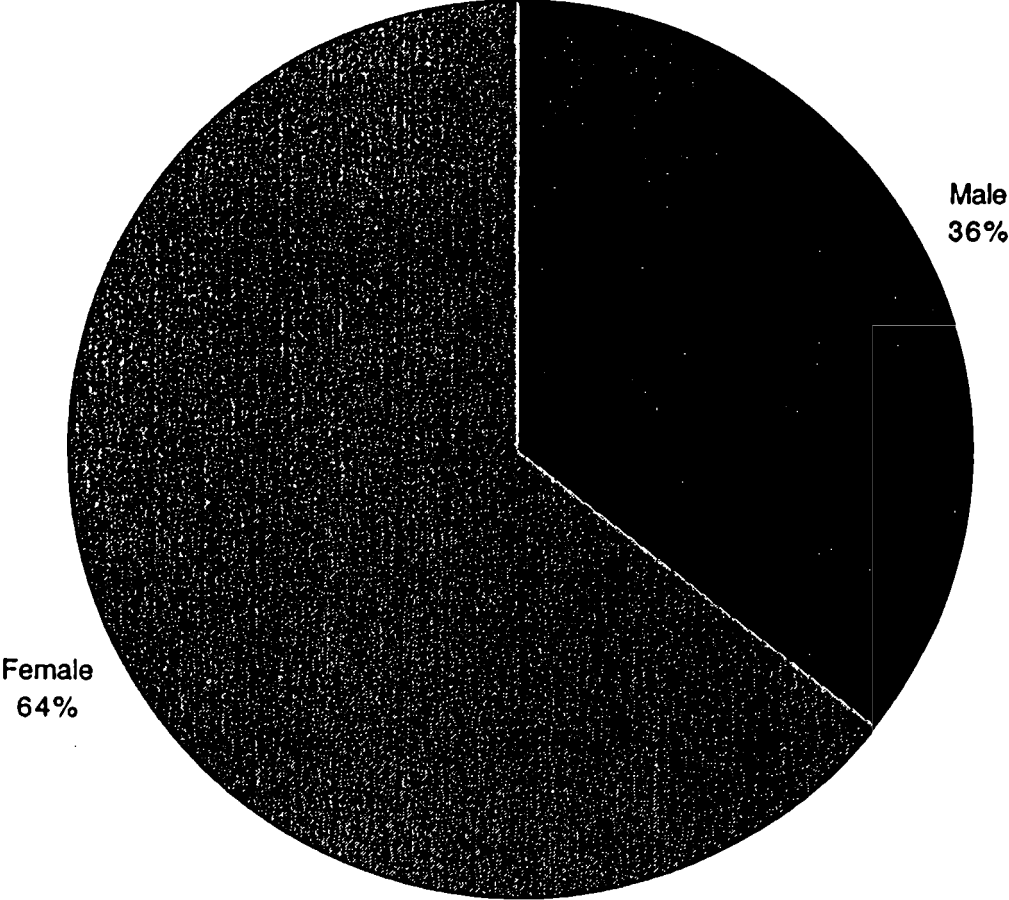

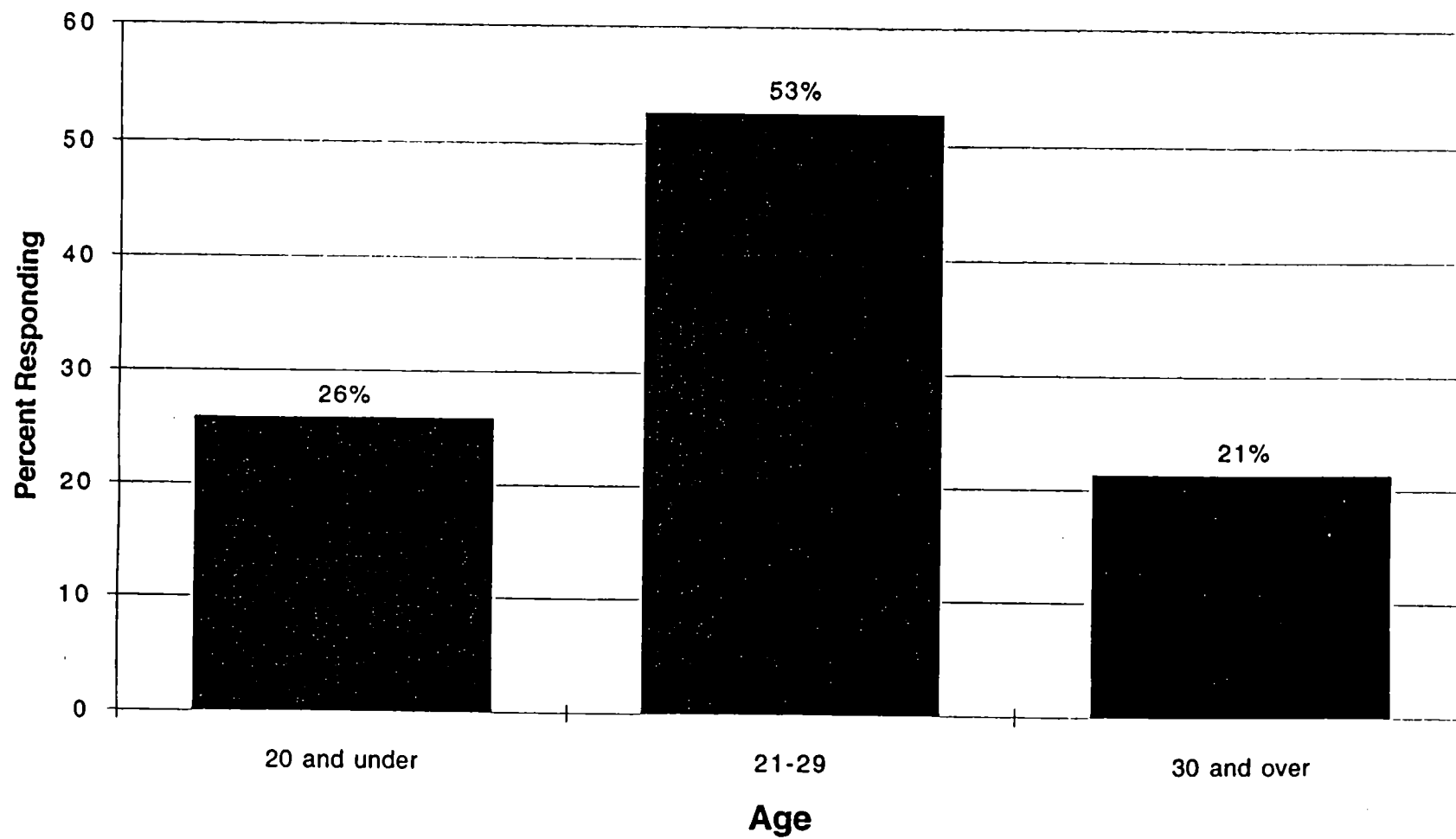

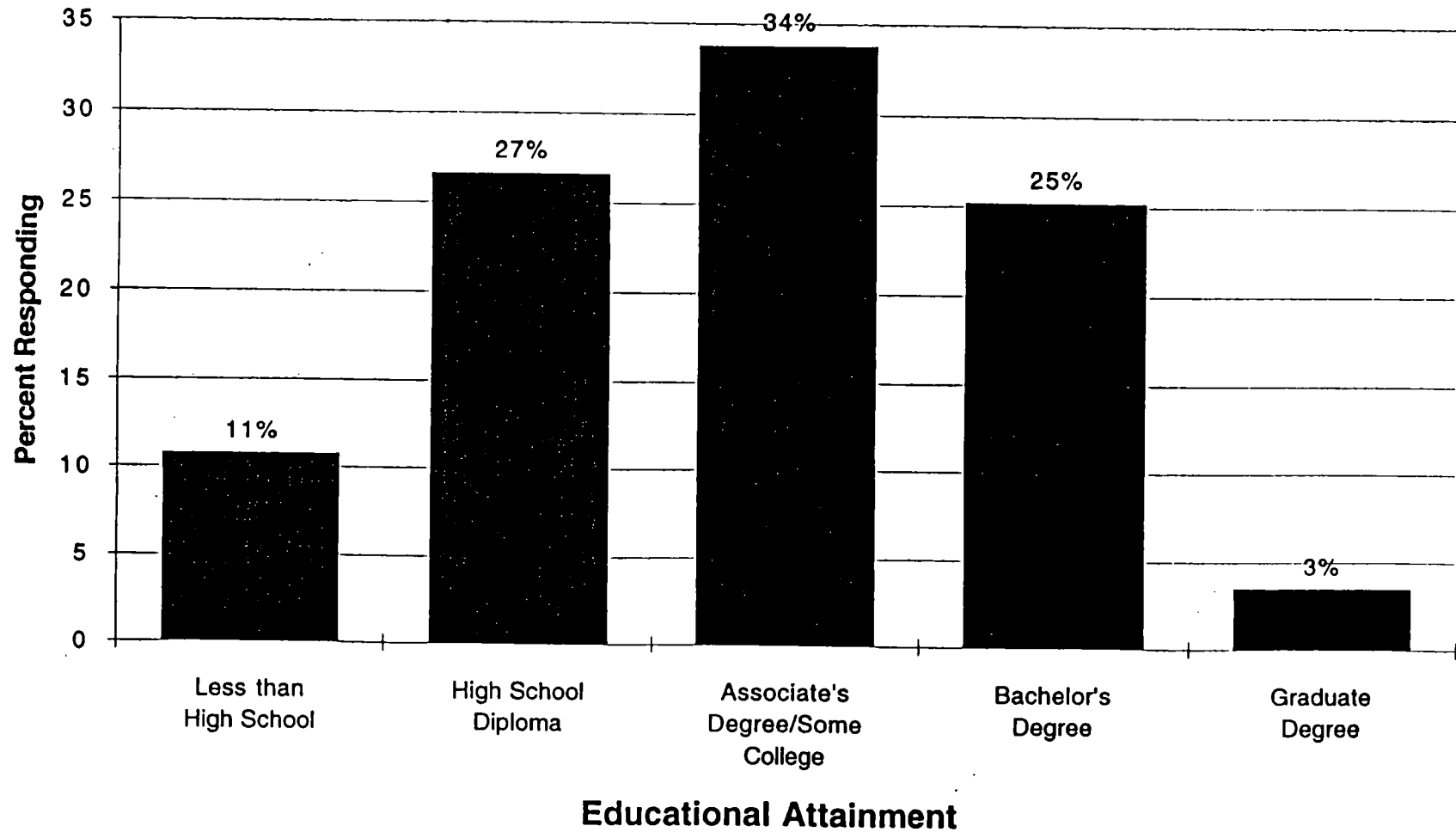
AmeriCorps: Gender



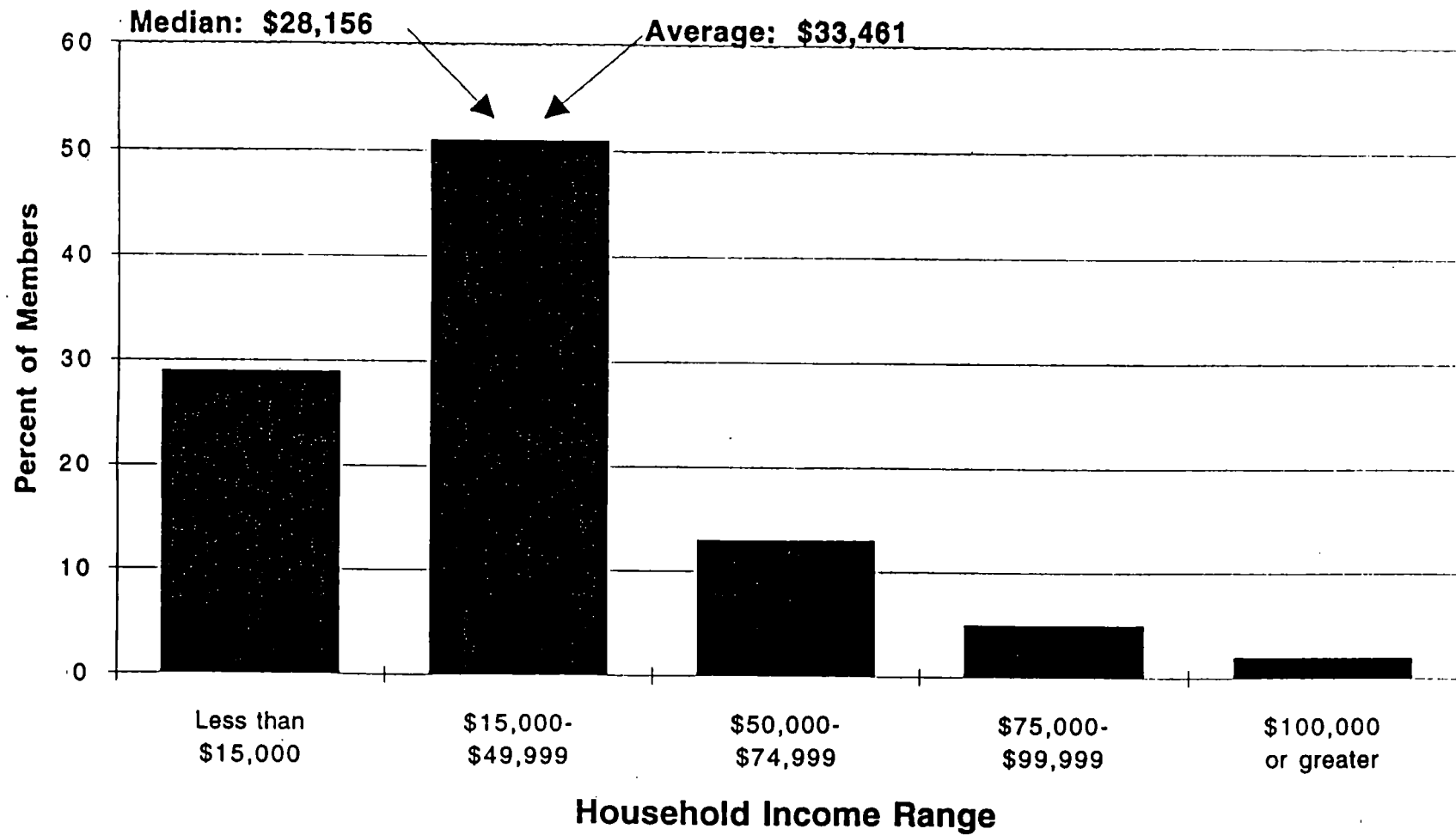
AmeriCorps: Age



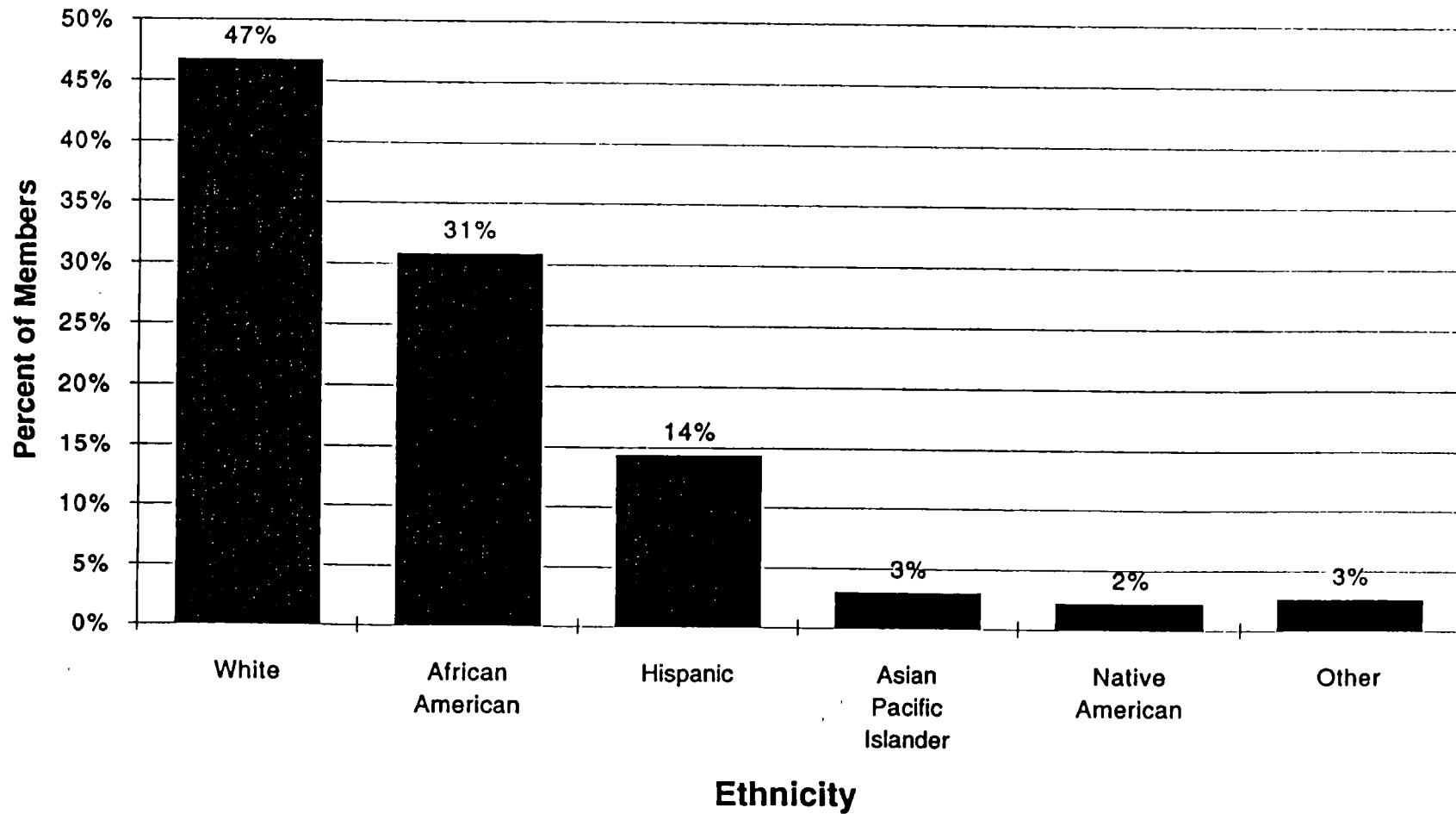
AmeriCorps: Education Level

NATIONAL SERVICE AND RESCISSION

If you were looking to the Congressional Record for well-reasoned debate on national service from Senate critics, you won't find it this session. Let's set the record straight.

Here's what AmeriCorps is:

- A reflection of **core American values**: It is not an entitlement. AmeriCorps requires responsibility; restores a real sense of committed citizenship; and helps to reknit our communities.
- **A smart delivery system**: National quality standards; state competitions and authority; local guidance through non-profits; strong involvement of corporations and foundations; and leveraged use of uncompensated volunteers.
- **Helps hard-working families**: AmeriCorps lets young people earn help affording college tuition by serving our communities and country. Average family income of today's AmeriCorps Members is roughly \$33,000 a year.
- **Proven effective**: An independent evaluation done by Aguirre International -- a firm headed by President Ford's former Commissioner of Education -- on a random selection of AmeriCorps sites shows proven results. AmeriCorps Members have brought safety to hundreds of neighborhoods, knowledge to children and parents, beauty and bounty to streams and parklands and independence to the elderly, the homeless and the ill.

AmeriCorps is not:

- **Anti-volunteer**: Surely the nation's best charities are the most credible judges of that. That's why AmeriCorps has been supported by literally hundreds of the country's premier charities and other non-profits -- from Habitat for Humanity to the YMCA; from the Multiple Sclerosis Society to the American Red Cross; from the United Way to the I Have a Dream Foundation. In fact, AmeriCorps has shown that its Members increase the number and effectiveness of unpaid volunteers. In Miami, for example, Habitat's Kevin McPeak says, "without AmeriCorps, we do not have the construction supervision necessary to safely and effectively involve over 1200 students" helping out over Spring Break. And after those 1200 return to campus, AmeriCorps Members keep construction going on new homes for 90 working families. In the first quarter of operations alone, the 26 AmeriCorps Members with Habitat recruited and trained 2700 of these uncompensated volunteers.
- **Costly**: Let's cut out all the loose talk about costs. With no rescission, AmeriCorps will invest an average of \$17,600 per Member over this next year. That's a total, and it includes the Member's \$600 a month living allowance, the post-service education benefit, and all program and administrative costs.
- **Bureaucratic**: AmeriCorps is not government as usual -- its overhead is 5 percent of the budget. That's because AmeriCorps pushes authority, responsibility, and resources out to the states -- exactly what many of us on both sides of the aisle have called for.
- **Expanding federal employment**. In fact, no AmeriCorps Members are federal employees. Roughly one-ninth of AmeriCorps grants, as specified by the legislation passed by Congress just 18 months ago, did go to programs run by federal agencies. These agencies competed against one another, not against national charities or local non-profits. And the agencies that won that competition are generally working through or in partnership with local youth corps and non-profits. They are bringing in citizens and community groups to help fulfill the agency's mission -- the essence of reinvented, downsized government. As we cut back on the number of federal employees, communities will step up to the plate, and AmeriCorps helps pave the way.
- And national service is not anti-military or anti-veteran. The Secretary of Defense's Report to Congress says definitively that AmeriCorps "will not jeopardize military recruiting programs", and so have the Personnel Chiefs for each of the military services. And former Joint Chiefs Chair General David Jones has written that AmeriCorps is the perfect civilian complement to military national service.

NATIONAL SERVICE AND RESCISSION

UPDATED FACT SHEET

April 7th, 1995

BACKGROUND: The House Rescission package would rescind 72 percent of the funding for AmeriCorps and Learn and Serve America halfway through the first year -- effectively ending the programs and backing out on commitments made to AmeriCorps members, private sector partners, and hundreds of charitable organizations across the country. The House would slash \$416 million of the \$575 million already approved for fiscal year 1995.

The Senate Rescission proposal cuts national service by \$105 million. While the monetary damage done in the House is more damaging, the rhetorical abuse accrued during the Senate debate was equally unjust.

Here's why a Congressional Conference on Rescission must reject the House cuts:

■ **The House Rescission would kill AmeriCorps and Learn and Serve America:**

Cutting 72 percent of funding for AmeriCorps and Learn and Serve America over halfway through the fiscal year would end participation in service for hundreds of thousands of Americans -- and stop something that works.

It would kill AmeriCorps: 1,000 Members would be sent home immediately, with most of the remaining Members sent home over the next few months.

It would kill Learn and Serve America: hundreds of thousands of school children and college students would lose valuable lessons about civic responsibility.

■ **House Rescission breaks a signed contract with tens of thousands of Americans:**

The House Rescission would renege on the bipartisan Congressional commitment to tens of thousands of young Americans who are serving their communities right now, to the communities they serve, to the charitable groups they serve with, and to the partners who share the costs.

A year and a half ago, a bipartisan vote in Congress mandated a three year phase-in for AmeriCorps. Now, six months into their year of service, the contract AmeriCorps Members signed and the oath they swore to would be declared null and void.

The House would turn its back on hundreds of local charitable groups and thousands of communities who are benefiting from the hard work of AmeriCorps Members.

Private sector partners -- who finance a considerable portion of the costs -- will have second thoughts about a partner who walks out in mid-year.

■ **Working families would be especially hard-hit:**

AmeriCorps Members who committed to a year of service to earn help paying for college would be sent home mid-year. Those hoping to begin their service in September would now have that option close, long after submission deadlines for fall semester college applications. Pell Grants are not an option for many families -- the only alternative becomes more student loans to finance the skyrocketing costs of higher education.

Hundreds of thousands of young schoolchildren and college students who are learning about and fulfilling their responsibility to their community through the Learn and Serve curriculum -- would be cut off from valuable lessons about civic responsibility. Our country -- our communities -- would bear the brunt of that loss for years to come.

■ **No fairness, no hearings, no consideration of effectiveness:**

A Rescission would stop AmeriCorps in its tracks before it has a chance to prove its worth or Congress has a chance to evaluate its cost-effectiveness.

There were no congressional hearings on the program's effectiveness or accomplishments before the House acted. Killing this new approach -- barely six months old, with no attempt to determine the program's effectiveness -- is not smart government. Let's make decisions based on real results in communities across America, not pure politics in Washington.

Mr. Chairman and Members of the Subcommittee, I come before you under very different circumstances than I had anticipated, even a mere two weeks ago. We have long looked forward to this -- our first opportunity to present the accomplishments and challenges of AmeriCorps to this, or indeed any, Congressional committee. We had expected that we would review these accomplishments with you to assist your determination of the appropriate level of funding for the Corporation for the 1996 Fiscal Year.

Now, the context is very different. Six months after it first opened its doors, helping nearly a million Americans serve our nation, national service is facing a lock-out. The rescission package passed by the House last week would break our country's solemn contract with thousands of AmeriCorps Members -- sending some home in the middle of their year's commitment to serve our country. And we would also be walking away from the hundreds of thousands of school children whose classroom curriculum is based on service learning -- because the House rescission package also kills Learn and Serve America.

So those are the stakes. Will we honor our commitments and advance our principles?

This Subcommittee will determine the amount of funding that Learn and Serve, and most of AmeriCorps, will receive for the next Fiscal Year. You have before you the Administration's budget, which represents the amounts authorized by Congress a mere 18 months ago. We know we can invest these funds wisely, and our written testimony describes in detail just how we propose to do that, if you provide the funds. But I want to confine my remarks this morning to exactly the questions you posed, Mr. Chairman, at the end of your *Washington Post* op-ed ten days ago: "Does the AmeriCorps program work? Is it efficient? Should it continue?"

First, let me put a face on the 20,000 AmeriCorps Members who are serving now in big cities, small towns and isolated rural areas in every state in this country.

This first chart shows that AmeriCorps Members come predominantly from our country's hard-working middle class -- the very families that need help paying for their kids' college. AmeriCorps provides that opportunity, but demands responsibility. It's help that's earned.

[Chart #2] The majority of AmeriCorps Members are in the traditional "college age years" -- their twenties. Roughly a quarter are more recently out of high school, and about a fifth are part of the rapidly-growing "non-traditional college student" age category, over 30 years old. It's no wonder that AmeriCorps gets things done -- its Members bring skills and experience to their tasks.

Those characteristics are further borne out by this chart [#3]. Slightly more than a quarter of AmeriCorps Members have graduated college; many of the one-third in the middle column are in or intending to return to college; and there are another 38% headed for college or the job market. This underscores the advantage of having the AmeriCorps post-service educational award available to pay for college, graduate or trade school -- or pay back student loans.

[Chart #4] AmeriCorps looks a lot like America -- and I'm especially delighted to tell you that Membership diversity has been obtained not by quotas and not from Washington -- but because of the efforts and goodwill of the local non-profits that make up AmeriCorps -- because it's these organizations which recruit their own AmeriCorps Members.

Now let me tell you how we operate. First, let's lay to rest, once and for all, any disagreement about what AmeriCorps is investing for each AmeriCorps Member. [Chart # 5] When you include everything -- Members' living allowances, post-service education awards, the support of the Governors' state commissions, all program support, and evaluation, and our total AmeriCorps overhead -- the **total** AmeriCorps cost per Member averages \$17,600.

Now let's see how that cost per Member is distributed. [Chart #6]. Please focus on the smallest slices. See the one called "AmeriCorps Overhead?" That shows you something we are enormously proud of: AmeriCorps' federal overhead is just under 5% of our total budget. We said that we'd run AmeriCorps like a business; we said we'd keep operations lean and smart -- here's your proof.

We told you that AmeriCorps Members would serve all over the country. [Map] Well, this map shows you that they are in all 50 states. And they serve in our biggest cities, our most isolated rural areas, and every kind of community in between.

We also told you that AmeriCorps Members would provide an enormous resource to communities. In many of those communities, AmeriCorps Members are serving with police departments. If police chiefs could come before this hearing, they would tell you what they have told us and what we would like to place in the record: national service is a shot in the arm for law enforcement.

And AmeriCorps Members are serving with the country's premier volunteer and charitable organizations. Here are some of them: Habitat for Humanity, the Red Cross, the National Multiple Sclerosis Society, the YMCA, the I Have a Dream Foundation, dozens of United Ways and Big Brothers and Big Sisters chapters -- and literally hundreds more like them, not to mention religious organizations from Notre Dame University to the Greater Dallas Community of Churches.

These AmeriCorps partners know that each AmeriCorps Member can attract, train, supervise and work along-side of many more part-time, uncompensated volunteers. In Baltimore, Boston and San Joaquin County, for example, a program called Magic Me uses each AmeriCorps Member as the nucleus for teams of 100 or more of these volunteers. For the AmeriCorps Members, that's a more-than 40 hour a week commitment; for the seniors, elementary schoolkids and other temporary helpers, it may only be a few hours a month; but for communities, that's a powerful team, and for the federal taxpayer, that's terrific leveraging of the AmeriCorps investment. In fact, based on first quarter results, over the course of this first year, AmeriCorps Members' efforts in our grants programs will leverage more than a quarter of a million uncompensated volunteers -- that's about 12 for every AmeriCorps Member.

And you can see how the AmeriCorps investment pays off for a traditional volunteer-driven charity like Habitat for Humanity. In Miami, for example, Habitat's Kevin McPeak says, "without AmeriCorps, we do not have the construction supervision necessary to safely and effectively involve over 1200 students" helping out over Spring Break. And after those 1200 return to campus, AmeriCorps Members keep construction going on new homes for 90 working families.

Mr. Chairman, I will leave with you and the Subcommittee today a list of just some of the nation's largest volunteer organizations, corporations, foundations, and others already involved with AmeriCorps. If this Subcommittee provides us with more funds for service, as the President has called for, we'll double the list by this time next year.

Corporations, foundations, local Chambers of Commerce and others have stepped up to help the local AmeriCorps efforts, with cash, supplies, expertise and general support. We will provide for the record a partial list of just some of the major businesses investing in AmeriCorps -- from a review of the reports of about a third of the AmeriCorps programs.

And this is not casual support. We'll also give you copies of letters explaining why the country's toughest-minded business people are investing in AmeriCorps. Taxpayers couldn't have better partners. When we step out of the politicized debate within the Beltway, Americans have already made up their minds on national service. They believe in it. They back it with their own money and time.

The broad public support for national service has been proven time and again. Over 90% applauded the idea in a recent national Gallup poll, even when told the cost. Over 60% of self-described conservatives wanted to continue federal funding, in an *LA Times* poll.

Governors have been some of AmeriCorps strongest supporters. They applaud AmeriCorps' values of responsibility, opportunity and community. They like the service AmeriCorps Members are doing in their states, and the help AmeriCorps provides for working families to pay for college. And these Governors love AmeriCorps' structure. It is a funded, non-mandate. States don't have to participate -- but if they do, they get real authority and key responsibilities -- and the funds to fulfill them.

Governors appoint the members of state commissions that run the competitions selecting the lion's share of AmeriCorps programs, and get federal funding for oversight, evaluation and administrative support.

It's no surprise that Republican Governors think that AmeriCorps is a good American idea. Across the United States, they're making AmeriCorps work for their citizens. Montana's Governor Racicot says "While balancing the budgets, fighting unfunded mandates and streamlining government, I am committed to this community service program for Montana." Michigan's John Engler goes even further: "AmeriCorps captures the promise found in all citizens, young and old, who see problems in their communities and work together to solve them. And Massachusetts' Bill Weld joins the chorus: "Governors of both parties...have shared my enthusiasm for...national service."

They know from direct experience something you deserve to see demonstrated: **national service works**. AmeriCorps Members have been serving a scant six months or less -- but already their accomplishments are substantial.

Mr. Chairman, I think you know that the 92 AmeriCorps Members in your District have already helped restore over 15,000 acres of the San Bernadino Forest charred by fires. You've seen television coverage of AmeriCorps Members on the frontlines of disaster relief, whether the danger has been western forest fires, southern hurricanes, California earthquakes or midwestern or Texas floods. And yes, Mr. Chairman, AmeriCorps Members are working all over your home state right now, helping Californians recover from their latest flooding.

That's why FEMA's Richard Krimm has said that AmeriCorps Members "have helped literally thousands of victims pick up the pieces of their lives" -- and they're there after the good samaritans have had to return to families and jobs.

You have read some of the more than 2,000 newspaper articles describing the substantial accomplishments of local AmeriCorps Members. You heard during the President's State of the Union Address about the AmeriCorps program in rural Simpson County, Kentucky, which is well on its way to raising reading scores of the bottom half of all that county's second graders by three full grade levels. You have heard that our NYPD Cadet Corps kept New York City's pools safe last summer for the first time in memory -- and that our Kansas City summer program shut down 12 drug houses and drove gangs out of the Blue Hills neighborhood park, so families could return.

These are impressive anecdotes. But now we know more. The California evaluation firm of Aguirre International - headed by President Ford's Commissioner of Education - was selected through competitive bidding to analyze the results of the first five months of operations of a randomly selected sample of AmeriCorps sites. I have just received their summary from 52 sites -- about 8% of AmeriCorps' total -- and I want to give you just a few examples of what the 1,500 or so AmeriCorps Members at those sites accomplished in their first five months. Thanks to them:

- 258 neighborhoods have block watches or other safety programs;
- 470 crime victims have received counselling and assistance;
- 8,500 school children are getting to school safely through some of our toughest neighborhoods;
- 238 city apartments, 296 homes of the frail elderly, 99 rural homes and 15 shelters and other community buildings have been renovated;
- 400 homeless families have a place to stay and 16,000 needy Americans have food to eat;
- 1,100 children have been screened for lead poisoning and other health threats;
- 1,144 people now know CPR and 1,500 others received emergency medical help;
- Over 200,000 trees have been planted; 27 miles of river and stream banks have been stabilized and 88 miles of parkland trails have been built, restored or maintained; and
- 7,638 children had tutors and more than 1,430 school kids had skilled teachers.

These are a tiny fraction of the lives touched, the communities improved, the hard and vital work done by AmeriCorps Members in just their first five months. These are critical services, delivered with impact and accountability -- and they wouldn't have been delivered any other way.

Mr. Chairman, you have dedicated your life to public service, and I know that every Member of this Subcommittee is committed to the good of our nation. As you begin what I know is a most difficult budget process, I ask you to look past political smokescreens. On behalf of the 20,000 AmeriCorps Members, the hundreds of thousands of students, seniors and others involved in national service, and the communities they serve, I ask you to keep in mind what national service is and what it is not.

National service is not:

- Anti-volunteer: Surely the nation's best charities are the best judges of that. And we've shown that AmeriCorps Members increase the number and effectiveness of unpaid volunteers.
- National service is not political: Certainly not a Democratic ploy, with the bulk of programs to be selected by appointees of Republican governors. Certainly not a liberal plot, with the overwhelming majority of AmeriCorps programs run by organizations that all Americans support -- and when the business community and others have given their vote of confidence in the clearest terms of all: hard cash support.
- National service is not an entitlement. Individuals and programs have to compete -- and the competition has been fierce: better than 10-to-1 to become an AmeriCorps Member, and better than 5-to-1 to become an AmeriCorps program.
- And national service is not anti-military or anti-veteran. We are providing you with copies of the Secretary of Defense's Report to Congress, finding that AmeriCorps "will not jeopardize military recruiting programs". And we will also place in the record a paper by former Joint Chiefs Chair General David Jones, arguing that AmeriCorps is the perfect civilian complement to military national service.

National service is:

- Effective: It's been shown by an independent evaluator and attested by thousands of the nation's toughest journalists. Look at Aguirre International's randomly-selected survey of results. AmeriCorps Members have brought safety to hundreds of neighborhoods, knowledge to children and parents, beauty and bounty to streams and parklands and independence to the elderly, the homeless and the ill.
- National service is efficient: Our overhead is only 5%. And we've forged real partnerships -- not smiles and handshakes -- with the private sector, getting the greatest return for each tax dollar.
- And national service is decentralized: We gave authority to the states before it was fashionable, and we put programs in the hands of local communities, where they belong.

Members of this Subcommittee, I am happy to have had this first opportunity to make even the briefest case for national service. But I tell you that the clearest, most compelling voices for service are those of the Americans outside of the Capitol -- the voices of those who serve, and the neighbors who know their efforts. In two weeks, you will return home. While you are on Recess, I urge you to find out for yourselves. Go see service in action. These ordinary Americans are doing such extraordinary things. They will lift your spirits and remind you why you work so hard in this city on their behalf. They will renew your faith in America's future. They will show you the values of responsibility and citizenship in action. And they will remind you that commitments are not lightly made and must not be casually abandoned.

AmeriCorps: Making a Difference

The House Appropriations Committee proposed last week to renege on a bipartisan commitment to thousands of Americans, by retroactively slashing funds already authorized and appropriated for AmeriCorps members by more than one-third in the current fiscal year. Working families with college-age members willing to serve their communities full-time for a full year—and who are counting on the new AmeriCorps program to help them afford college educations—will be especially hard hit if the congressional commitment is not kept.

A year and a half ago, a bipartisan Congress mandated a three-year phase-in of AmeriCorps. Six months into its first operational year—with 20,000 citizens working in communities across America, without the benefit of any congressional hearings to consider the benefits of the work they are doing—House appropriators would now turn the phase-in into a phase-out.

AmeriCorps is a funded non-mandate—a decentralized approach that moves most of the decision making and responsibility to the states that elect to compete for AmeriCorps members,

along with the funds to carry out the mission. Fewer than 200 people in Washington oversee 20,000 members on 1,100 projects in communities across America. That's why rescission would have such a devastating effect—any cuts made on Capitol Hill would directly cut the number of members who are working in the field. One thousand members would be sent home immediately, and 15,000 fewer young people would have the opportunity to begin service in September.

The public-private partnership of AmeriCorps would be undermined if the "public" reneged on its commitment. Programs are required to raise 25 percent of operating costs and 15 percent of the living allowances from private sources. Private investment in AmeriCorps has been remarkable; in its first year of operation, the corporation has received hundreds of commitments from companies such as General Electric, American Express, IBM and a myriad foundations. Our business partners make investments based on stable growth, fulfilled commitments and real results. They might understandably be

wary of a partner tossed by political currents.

AmeriCorps should not be penalized for rewarding results. The Corporation for National Service makes its grants after a tough evaluation process—that's why AmeriCorps awards funded in FY 1995 are not made until late in the fiscal year. AmeriCorps funds programs that work well and get things done, and eliminates those that don't. AmeriCorps members and communities should not be made the victims of this "smart government" approach.

AmeriCorps may be new, but members are already meeting challenges in public safety, education, environment and human needs:

■ The New York Police Department reports that recreation areas policed by its AmeriCorps members in the 1994 pilot were free of assaults for the first time in memory.

■ AmeriCorps members in Kansas City have shut down 12 crack houses and reclaimed a neighborhood's only park from gangs.

■ In rural Simpson County, Ky., AmeriCorps members tutoring half of the

county's second-graders are raising reading scores from two grades behind grade level to one grade above in one year of service.

■ AmeriCorps members have also been on the front lines in natural disasters, from the floods in California, Houston and the Mississippi River Valley to the Idaho forest fires and the California earthquake. FEMA official Richard Krimm wrote: "They have helped literally thousands of victims pick up the pieces of their lives."

Moreover, AmeriCorps members are still there, long after the waves of initial volunteers have had to return to their jobs. That's why many of our nation's premier charities compete for AmeriCorps members. From the YMCA to the Multiple Sclerosis Society, from the Red Cross to the Children's Health Fund, from Notre Dame to the National Council of Churches, they know that the focused efforts of full-time, trained and committed AmeriCorps members help them accomplish more—and deploy part-time, sporadic volunteers more effectively.

A perfect case in point: In Miami, 26

AmeriCorps members working with Habitat for Humanity have learned all facets of home construction and have trained, supervised and worked beside 2,700 temporary (and uncompensated) volunteers they've attracted since October. As a consequence, the AmeriCorps team is nearly halfway to its goal of building 90 homes in Miami this year, and members are teaching working families how to make the transition from renting to homeownership. Habitat's Jerry Bass says, "We could not do this job without them."

We do not maintain that AmeriCorps will end crime or illiteracy, pollution or hunger, but AmeriCorps members are making a real difference every day in communities across America. We should strive to match their commitment to making our country even better instead of letting them twist in the political winds. They have earned a chance to be America's next generation of heroes.

Back to Citizenship

House Speaker Newt Gingrich performed a huge service for President Clinton last week. No, this isn't about that book deal. It's about Gingrich's attack on Clinton's national service program. By forcing the president to defend national service, Gingrich has given him a chance to shift the political debate from a moldy contest over "more" or "less" government to one about prior questions: What should government do in the first place, and what obligations do democratic citizens have toward each other?

The service program is certainly worth defending in its own right, and the best arguments for it have been made over the years by conservatives. It's true, as conservatives have said, that bureaucratic charity is not the preferred solution to social problems. Far better to have citizens engaged in helping each other, person-to-person, and to do so through local, voluntarily established institutions.

One of the most useful pieces of work done by conservative intellectuals over the last two decades was a 1977 essay, "To Empower People," by sociologist Peter Berger and the Rev. Richard John Neuhaus. They argued that if government relentlessly took over all charitable functions, it would endanger soci-

ety's "mediating structures"—the institutions created by families, communities and churches—that nurture individual virtue and "mediate" between government and the individual. Government, they argued, should make strengthening these institutions a central goal.

That, roughly, is what the service program does. The volunteers for AmeriCorps, as the main service agency is called, do not work for a federal bureaucracy. They work for already established local institutions that are trying to solve problems: preventing crime, teaching literacy, immunizing kids against disease, helping the homebound elderly, curbing teen pregnancy. The main function of the program's Washington arm, the Corporation for National and Community Service, is to monitor the programs—not for their adherence to bureaucratic rules but simply to make sure they're doing broadly what they claim to be doing.

Why spend any federal money on this sort of thing? Because the voluntary sector needs strengthening, and because federal money spent supplementing voluntary activities has a big payoff. A lot of volunteer organizations are having trouble finding people. Many parents—both parents—necessarily spend so much time working and then raising

their kids that they don't have a lot of time left over. Eli Segal, who heads the service program, sees it as "an effective way of filling in the holes" in the voluntary sector and a recognition of "the chords that bind us together as a people."

This last point is why the broader argument raised by the service program is so important. The idea of democratic citizenship inherent in the program is the one idea capable of answering the problems of two other ideas that are gaining currency in American politics: radical individualism and extreme multiculturalism.

Both ideas start at reasonable places. Almost all of us are individualists in that we value autonomy and freedom. But radical individualism suggests that we are completely free agents, thus denying the reality that our freedom depends on preserving a community that is civil, just, tolerant and nurturing of the other values on which freedom depends. Apart from such a community, freedom withers.

Multiculturalists started out with the fair argument that too little attention was paid to the contributions, ideas and interests of groups other than affluent white males—women, African Americans, Hispanics, working class people

and others. But pushed to the extreme, multiculturalists argued that the only forms of solidarity that counted were those within these particular groups.

Those who value the idea of democratic citizenship argue, against the radical individualists, that preserving freedom is a cooperative enterprise that carries burdens of responsibility. We can't just walk away from social problems. Against extreme multiculturalism, advocates of democratic citizenship argue that our sense of solidarity needs to transcend all our particularisms. Whites need to vindicate the rights of blacks, blacks the rights of whites, men those of women and women those of men.

The Clinton administration has been obsessed with its failure to "communicate" its achievements to the American people. This is the wrong obsession. It implies that the American people are too dumb or too bamboozled by Republican propaganda to "understand" all that the president has been doing.

What the administration should worry about instead is that it is losing the political argument. Americans have surveyed what they see as a series of messes—crime, family breakup, stagnating living standards for many in the middle—and a majority has decided (tentatively) that the best way to deal

with all of them may be for government to do little more than throw the book at criminals. This is not the product of selfishness but a retreat from government that is seen as ineffective, intrusive in the wrong places and insufficiently concerned with nurturing civic responsibility.

There is a corresponding retreat into enclaves. Suburbanites, to pick one example, are tempted to give up on the inner cities, figuring they have enough problems of their own. Think of it as the suburban (or male or white) answer to multiculturalism.

Clinton and the Democrats won't win the argument unless they reverse these trends. One worthy way of doing so is to preach the rewards—and the obligations—of democratic citizenship. A government based on this idea does not pretend to have all the answers. Still less does it claim the right to replace the civic institutions of a free people with its own. But neither is it an indifferent government, because it recognizes that government either strengthens or saps the ability of citizens to live together, solve problems and accept their moral obligations to each other. In this telling, government is not some alien structure out there. It becomes the realm of us all.
