The Volunteers:

Eligibility:

The Foster Grandparent Program (FGP) offers low-income persons age 60 and over, the opportunity to serve one-on-one with special and exceptional needs children. They help children needing literacy assistance and assist teen parents and their offspring. Some care for babies who are HIV- positive. Often Foster Grandparents act as mentors to youth. They help a wide range of children with disabilities, including those who have a physical or specific learning disability.

Volunteers serve in projects in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

Service:

Foster Grandparents serve 20 hours a week in volunteer stations such as mental retardation centers, hospitals, public schools, day care centers and residential facilities.

Training:

Foster Grandparents receive 40 hours of pre-service orientation and training, plus four hours of in-service training monthly from their sponsoring agencies.

Benefits:

Volunteers receive a modest tax-free allowance or stipend, reimbursement for transportation, a meal while in service, accident and liability insurance and an annual physical exam. Persons who exceed income eligibility guidelines, may, under certain conditions, serve as Foster Grandparent volunteers on a non-stipended basis and are eligible for the other benefits described above.

(They have allocated 30 minutes for you, but you may wish to speak only 10-15 minutes and then take questions. You will be speaking at a reception which begins at 6:00 p.m. I told them you had a busy schedule, and would probably be there just shortly before 7:00).

They would like you to speak about the National Service agenda and how a program like Foster Grandparents will fit in.

John Keller, Regional Director, ACTION Region X, (Northwest, office is in Seattle) will be meeting you and doing your introduction. (He is a career employee who has been with the ACTION agency for many years, and a respected advocate for senior volunteer programs.)

The audience will be 275 Foster Grandparent Project Directors from across the country. Foster Grandparents are part of ACTION and started in 1965. They have over 23000 low income seniors (60+) who are paired with over 77000 young people working with children at risk. Foster Grandparents are low income, receive a small stipend (\$2.45 per hour) and work 20 hours per week.

Suggested Talking points

. Emphasize how important a program like Foster Grandparents is within the President's National Service initiative. Working with low income seniors and children at risk is within two of the priorities of the NS legislation. (Human Services and Education)

. Commend them on their work in FGP programming which collaborates with other important programs, i.e. Head Start, Teen parenting, HIV baby care

. Do update on status of legislation. (Note considerable support for their program on the hill. A credit to their past performance and assurance of maintaining the integrity of the program for the future.)

. Review Summer of Service, add importance of intergenerational programs. Note that many of the SOS programs touch the same areas as FGP programming. The new structure can provide support for even more cooperative programming.
