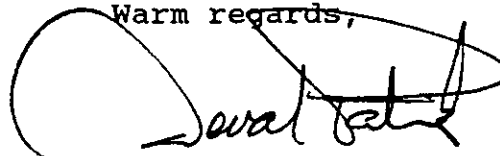
Dear Sandy:

PRACTICE EXPERIENCE

Handled numerous civil litigation matters in trial court and on appeal and criminal grand jury matters and investigations. Represent plaintiffs and defendants, individuals and entities. Representative cases, from the present going back in time, are set forth.

1. Massachusetts Turnpike Authority v. F.L. Roberts, Exxon, Mobil and Canadian/Oxy (1992-1994) (Mass. Superior and Appeals Court)

Represented plaintiff Mass. Turnpike Authority against oil companies who had leased and contaminated service areas along Turnpike since 1956, seeking to recover assessment and clean up response costs and damages for contamination in excess of \$10 million. Briefed and won novel issues of indemnity and application of contribution law to state environmental statute. To reduce costs of litigation and expedite resolution, parties underwent extensive ADR, resulting in agreements in 1993, approved by the court, under which the oil companies are cleaning up the ten sites. Now on appeal taken by non-settling party.

2. Arbitrator - Dalkon Shield Litigation (1993)

Arbitrator for the Center for Dispute Resolution in a case by a woman who claimed injury from her use of the Dalkon Shield IUD. My written opinion found that the medical evidence did not associate the various pelvic diseases she had with use of an IUD.

3. Pension Plan of Public Service Company of New Hampshire v. KMPG Peat Marwick, et al (N.H.)

As Special Counsel to the P.S.N.H. Pension Plan, investigated the loss of \$24 million in plan assets resulting from investments in naked options by an internal fiduciary, who was assisted by the cupidity of a major securities brokerage firm, and the negligent

stupidity of the custodial bank, in violation of ERISA and other laws. Cooperated and coordinated with a concurrent Department of Labor investigation. Recovered the amounts lost to the Plan, obtained contributions from culpable parties and now am in litigation with the accounting firm involved for malpractice. Case raised undecided issues of ERISA remedies and liability.

4. In the Matter of Joseph S. Mitchell (S.J.C. 1992)

Appointed by Supreme Judicial Court as Special Counsel to Judicial Conduct Commission to prosecute disciplinary charges against Superior Court Judge Joseph S. Mitchell. I sought his removal from the bench. Judge Mitchell, after proceedings, took early retirement.

5. Korb v. Raytheon, 410 Mass. 581 (1991)

Successfully represented in trial court and on appeal employer in action by a former company Vice President who had been terminated after he made statements at press conference critical of employer's biggest customers at Department of Defense and contrary to employer's interest. Former Vice President, represented by Civil Liberties Union, claimed termination violated his free speech rights under Mass. Civil Rights Act ("MCRA"). I raised issue of First Amendment limits on use of state power (through MCRA) to force defendant to associate with speech with which it disagreed.

Case had originally been removed to federal court because Korb's complaint alleged his First Amendment rights had been violated. Reaching a novel question, the district court held that an action brought under the MCRA in the private free speech context involving competing claims for First Amendment protection did not raise a federal question. Korb v. Raytheon, 707 F. Supp. 63 (D. Mass. 1989) (Woodlock, J.).

6. New Medico Associates, Inc. v. Kleinhenz, 750 F. Supp. 1145 (D. Mass. 1990) (Skinner, J.)

Two former employees, who worked in Illinois, were sued by their former employer under a non-compete clause. They had been forced to sign an agreement containing a forum selection clause which specified Massachusetts. My motion for defendants to transfer the case to Illinois was allowed, one of the few times transfer happened in the face of a forum selection clause under Stewart Organization, Inc. v. Ricoh Corp., 487 U.S. 22 (1988).

7. Ms. X v. Company Z, U.S. Dist. Ct., (D. Mass. 1989)

Represented female employee raped by her boss after a company function. Her boss was convicted in state court of crime of rape. I brought civil litigation in 1989 in federal court against her employer, alleging employer had notice of problems with boss and responsibility not to expose her to risk of harm. Case settled. Settlement terms and amount confidential.

8. Gene Trak v. Roche Diagnostic Systems, Inc. (Middlesex Sup. Ct. and Mass. Appeals Ct.)

Successfully defeated at trial court and on appeal attempt to enforce non-compete agreement against my client Roche, who hired scientist to help develop DNA/RNA diagnostic test kits which would enable hospitals to quickly diagnose diseases such as AIDS. Case presented issues of freedom of scientist to leave work on one patented technology he believed would fail in order to work on only technology he believed would succeed. Legal issues involved interplay between the public disclosure policies of patent law and confidentiality policies of trade secret/non-compete law. Case involved explaining in simple terms highly technical scientific concepts. I obtained affidavits from Mass. Dept. of Public Health and a Nobel Laureate on severely adverse public policy impact of enforcing non-compete in this arena.

9. Grand Jury Investigation: Matter of Company Y

Represented company in several year Grand Jury investigation involving numerous witnesses. Target was defense contractor and issues involved pricing on multi-year government contracts from three different company divisions. Following my production of evidence and witnesses to Grand Jury and lengthy proffer to AUSA, government decided not to prosecute either civilly or criminally.

10. Anderson v. Cryovac, Inc. (U.S. Dist. Ct. D. Mass.) (Skinner, J.)

Trial counsel to W.R. Grace in lengthy jury trial in Woburn toxic tort case. Families sued, claiming leukemia in their children had been caused by chemicals in drinking water. First stage of case involved two month trial before federal court jury on complex issues of hydrogeology and causation of contamination in wells. Jury verdict vacated against Grace because jury interrogatories were inconsistent. Case settled.

In the face of enormous publicity and a real threat to the ability to find an impartial jury, the trial court issued protective orders prohibiting disclosure of information obtained through discovery except, as needed, to public health and environmental officials. The Boston Globe challenged the orders, asserting there was a public right of access to such materials. We successfully upheld the trial court's orders on appeal. Anderson v. Cryovac, 805 F.2d 1 (1st Cir. 1986).

11. Robinson v. Polaroid Corp., 567 F. Supp. 192 (D. Mass. 1983) (Skinner, J.), aff'd, 732 F.2d 1010 (1984)

Thirty-two day trial in three related class action employment cases against my client Polaroid. Plaintiffs asserted that race discrimination motivated the layoffs of black exempt and non-exempt employees. Defense was that: (1) hourly layoffs were seniority based and, (2) as to salaried employees, Polaroid was exemplary affirmative action employer who took risks in hiring, risks that could not continue in terms of poor performance in time of layoff and that (3) statistical evidence showed no disproportionate impact. Defendants' verdict was affirmed on appeal. Legal issues on appeal involved interplay between disparate impact and discriminatory treatment analyses.

12. Spencer Companies, Inc. v. Agency Rent A Car, 542 F. Supp. 237 (D. Mass. 1982) (Skinner, J.) and Agency Rent A Car v. Connolly, 542 F. Supp. 231 (D. Mass. 1982), vacated and remanded, 686 F.2d 1029 (1st Cir. 1982)

In related litigations, our client Spencer, a local shoe company fought off a greenmail and then take-over attempt by a corporate raider. We convinced the 1st Circuit that a state regulatory order forbidding the raider from purchasing more stock was not preempted by the Williams Act, to require abstention, and to vacate an injunction issued by the district court against enforcement of the state anti-take over statute. The district court had held the statute unconstitutional as an impermissible burden on interstate commerce and declined to abstain.

We ultimately convinced the district court that the raider had violated the provisions of the Williams Act and so it preliminarily enjoined tender offer.

13. Baird v. Bellotti, 443 U.S. 622 (1979)
Planned Parenthood League of Massachusetts v. Bellotti, 641 F.2d 1006 (1st Cir. 1980)

Represented Planned Parenthood League of Massachusetts in attack on Massachusetts statute unduly burdening access to abortions. Won constitutional challenge to statute in U.S. Supreme Court. Legislature amended the statute by requiring fetal description to be read to woman, 24 hour waiting period and two parent or judicial consent for minors to have abortions. We challenged amendment. First Circuit held portions of statute invalid.

In related action I also argued challenge to statute based on state constitutional guarantees before Supreme Judicial Court. Mary Moe v. Bellotti.

I also represented individual minors who brought Mary Moe petitions in state court, under G.L. c. 112 §12S, seeking court permission for abortions.

14. Boston School Desegregation Case: Morgan v. Kerrigan, 388 F. Supp. 581 (D. Mass. 1975), aff'd, Morgan v. Kerrigan, 401 F. Supp. 216 (D. Mass. 1974), denial of stay, 523 F.2d 917, aff'd, 530 F.2d 401 (1st Cir.), cert. denied, 426 U.S. 935 (1976) (remedial plan); Morgan v. Kerrigan, 409 F. Supp. 141 (D. Mass. 1975) (D. Mass. 1974), aff'd, sub nom. Morgan v. McDonough 540 F.2d 527 (1st Cir. 1976), cert. denied, 429 U.S. 1042 (receivership of South Boston High School).

Before Judge W. Arthur Garrity, Jr., I was counsel to the Massachusetts Board of Education, which was a defendant in the federal case and which had originally brought the state Racial Imbalance case against the Boston School Committee. The Board was held not to have violated plaintiffs' rights. Proceedings ranged from trial before masters on remedial alternatives, to fashioning remedial decrees for students and faculty, to enforcement, to emergency receivership of South Boston High School, and related issues. The First Circuit opinion affirming one of Judge Garrity's orders, at 540 F.2d 527, 532 (1976), quotes from my brief. I handled several appeals to the First Circuit and to the U.S. Supreme Court in addition to several times weekly sessions with the trial court.

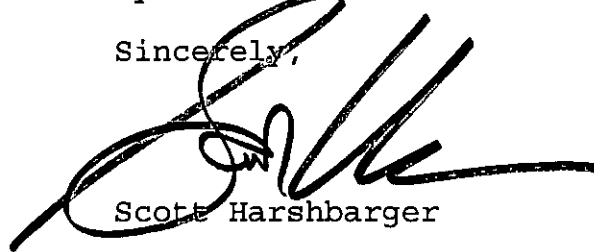
She would bring diversity to the Court of Appeals in not just the gender sense but in the sense of the diversity of her experience and the breadth of her interest. I can personally

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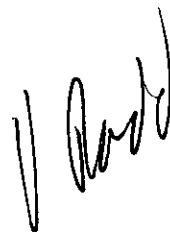

Skirting the old boy network

WHEN THE BOYS ARE calling the shots — as they usually are — a basic rule still applies: Size counts.

That's one reason why speculation about who could fill the so-called leadership gap left by Paul O'Brien, who has stepped down as president of New England Telephone Co., turned up a list of men remarkably like O'Brien. They head the big, downtown institutions. They count because they represent big employers who can write big checks to back big projects. Their titles get them into business groups like the Vault, the Roundtable and the chamber of commerce. Eventually, the status conferred by peers anoints one as the business community's chief spokesman. Sometimes, someone simply anoints himself.

It's the model that has always been used in Boston, and it happens to be one that works against women. That's because no woman heads a big bank, insurance company or utility. There are no female managing partners at the city's big law firms. The handful of women who do hold top positions — like Jimmie Hink, who chairs New England Electric System in Westborough, or Sheryl Handler, a top executive at Thinking Machines Corp. in Cambridge — are excluded by geography: To be a real Boston player, you have to work and play in Boston.

The problem is compounded because women obviously don't hold the top editor's spot at either daily newspaper — or even run the business pages. So, the press reflects the traditional definition of what's important and who counts. Consider The Globe 100, a special business section published last week. It applies the same old bigger-is-better formula, ranking companies strictly by the big numbers — sales and profitability. The executives who head them were singled out for special treatment. The result: Photos of 19 white

men graced The Globe 100 pages.

There are some signs of change. The list of those who might fill O'Brien's shoes embraces the usual suspects — successful white men in their 40s and 50s. But it also includes Fletcher Wiley, a black lawyer and entrepreneur. Slated to be the next chamber president, Wiley is a principal in a small law firm. His inclusion is proof the rules can be bent when the rule-makers want to bend them. Many women work the Flash Wiley circuit, pursuing the same kinds of business, political and do-gooder projects that have traditionally catapulted men into leadership roles — and high-profile newspaper quotes. But so far, no one is bending the rules to let them crash the innermost circle.

"What is it about our culture that allows women to be viewed as smart, competent and a percentage of some ratio when it comes to representation — but keeps us at arm's length when it comes to power and status?" asks Ellen Lutch Trager, director of health care strategies at Brown Rudnick Freed & Osemer. Trager — who held high administrative positions at several Boston teaching hospitals, before starting up a health care consulting group at Brown Rudnick — doesn't have the answer. But she's working with other women to set up a Women's Roundtable aimed at getting women into the network. The group's first seminar on Clinton health care options, drew 200 women; and Trager says the seminar was oversubscribed by "hundreds."

Some believe the old-boy power network is diluting itself, the classic result of in-breeding. "If the Vault is still constituted so it includes only the CEOs of major companies, and you find either that those companies have declined in influence, or that their CEOs are not necessarily the same individuals who are leaders in town, then you miss including people who are the activists,"

Commerce Secretary Ron Brown, a leading advocate of a tougher trade policy with Japan, termed the April trade showing a clear disappointment and said trade imbalances need to be a priority topic at the economic summit President Clinton will attend July 7-9 in Tokyo.

"The industrialized nations must work together to stimulate faster global growth and higher levels of trade," he said.

Private economists said the level of imports was worrisome because it showed that Americans have lost none of their appetite for foreign goods.

"America seems to be experiencing an ominous surge of import penetration," said Stephen Roach, senior economist at Morgan Stanley & Co. in New York. "It looks to

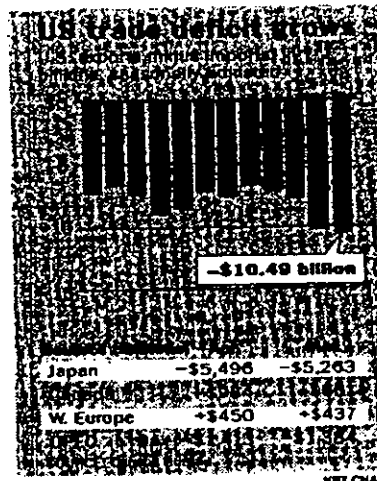
us that with soft conditions [in their home markets], foreigners are getting aggressive in selling goods in America."

America suffered a \$6.50 billion deficit with Japan, the third biggest trade imbalance with that country in history. Economists blamed part of the increase on the fall of the dollar to record lows against the yen, forcing Americans to pay more for Japanese products.

Some economists are worried that by tolerating a weaker dollar, the administration is courting higher inflation.

The administration also is pushing the Japanese to open their markets to more American products. It began talks with Japan last week to establish negotiating ground rules.

The administration's goal is to cut Japan's global trade surplus in half, and it wants to use as a model the successful agreement to boost



foreign sales of computer chips in Japan.

Foreign share of Japan's chip market falls

WASHINGTON - The foreign share of Japan's computer chip market dipped in the first quarter, falling short of a 20 percent target agreed to in a controversial 1991 trade pact, US officials said yesterday.

News of the drop in semiconductor sales came hours after the US government reported yet another gain in the nation's monthly trade deficit, citing Japan as the chief villain.

Commerce Secretary Ron Brown said the nation's weak trade showing in April was "disappointing and underscores the importance of expanding our exports."

But the Clinton trade team - usually eager to jump into the fray on behalf of US exporters - held its fire on the computer chips numbers, saying one set of numbers does not presage a new downturn in strained trans-Pacific ties.

"We welcome this first-quarter share figure," US Trade Representative Mickey Kantor said in a statement.

His office said the foreign share of Japan's semiconductor market fell to 19.6 percent from 20.2 percent in the final three months of 1992, but was up from 14.6 percent a year ago.

"It only follows that market share will resume its upward trend in future quarters as relations solidi-

fy between Japanese users and foreign suppliers," Kantor said.

US suppliers of chips - data storage and processing devices used in computers and other appliances - stand to benefit most from future gains, accounting for about 86 percent of the foreign market share.

"Of course we're not thrilled with the drop, but it's still a relatively high number given where we were a year ago," said one US trade official, who requested anonymity.

She said while the overall size of Japan's chips market held steady - it is the world's biggest at almost \$20 billion a year - foreign suppliers chalked up fewer sales.

"We will be paying close attention to the second quarter figure, and if that declines, we'll need to look again at the whole situation," she added. "We expect a steady increase."

The latest number was calculated jointly by US and Japanese government officials, who met this week to thrash out their differences over market penetration.

Those differences had led to a ground-breaking 'quota' pact in 1991, under which Washington called on Tokyo to open 20 percent of its market to foreign suppliers by the end of 1992.

Japan saw the deal as a target - not a commitment - but it nonetheless surprised industry specialists by living up to its word and exceeding the 20 percent goal late last year.

Despite the dip, advocates say such pacts clearly work, and Kantor said it is "reasonable" to expect foreigners' share of the Japanese market to average 20 percent over the four quarters of 1993.

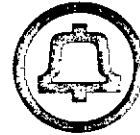
Dear Senator Kennedy:

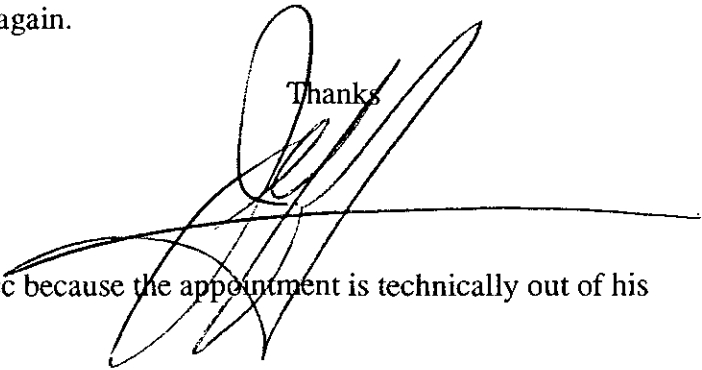
Attached for your consideration is a proposed letter to Senator Kennedy on behalf of Sandy Lynch.

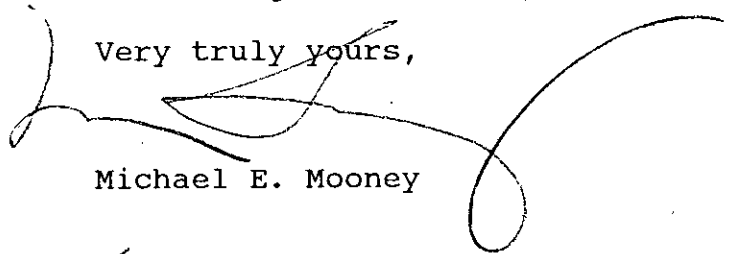
The Summer Jobs Program is just one illustration of Sandra's commitment to her community, as evidenced by the many pro bono projects in which she has been active over the years.

The purpose of this letter is to recommend Ms. Sandra L. Lynch to a seat on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the First Circuit.

This recommendation is from a distinctly different vantage than those who will recommend Sandy on the basis of her professional legal experiences. I strongly believe that it is of great importance to know about Sandy's deep and abiding commitment to social and economic equality among those persons in Boston who have been left out and live in left-behind neighborhoods.

Several years ago, I had the opportunity to prepare an economic development strategy for Boston Mayor, Raymond Flynn. In the preparation of this report--a document that concentrated on the emergence of Boston as a knowledge-based urban economy--Sandra argued persuasively for greater emphasis on a more balanced strategy. Her concerns were as sensitive as they were clear--specifically, the transition of a knowledge-based urban place is of unquestioned value to U.S. global competitiveness, but the strategy must be accomplished with great sensitivity to inner city residents.

These important principals were ultimately included in the report, and, hopefully, over time, they will play their just role in our community. As an economist, I am afraid that all too often one's views are focused on the intended business and economic impact of policy and program changes. Sandy Lynch reminds us that changes have unintended as well as intended consequences on all classes of individuals. This is an important judgemental attribute that she will bring to the U.S. Court of Appeals.

I urge you to recommend Sandy for this important judicial position.

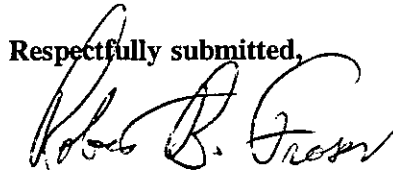

I am writing to urge that you recommend to the President of the United States that he appoint Sandra Lea Lynch to serve as a Judge of the United States Court of Appeals for the First Circuit, filling the vacancy created by the appointment of Stephen G. Breyer as an Associate Justice of the Supreme Court of the United States.

I first met Sandy in 1968 when I was the Assistant Dean of Boston University School of Law, responsible for all student affairs and services including recruitment, admissions, financial aid, counseling, placement and commencement. I had fairly constant contact with Sandy throughout her three years at Boston University, and we have stayed in consistent touch with one another over the twenty-three years since she graduated from law school. I believe that I know her quite well.

When Sandy applied for admission to law school in 1968, I was attracted to her application for a number of reasons. She had a fine academic record at Wellesley College, a high LSAT score, and strong recommendations; she would improve the gender diversity of her class at a time when the number of women attending law school was still very low; and the fact that she graduated from a high school in Dallas, Texas would, I thought, bring the benefit of geographic diversity to a class that was overwhelmingly from the Northeast. (I subsequently learned that Sandy's background was more universal. As the daughter of a

United States Army officer, Sandy had been the classic "Army brat," moving from time to time with her family as her father was assigned to different foreign stations. Sandy's father died while stationed in Taiwan when Sandy was 13 years old. Her mother then moved the family to Dallas, Texas. However, as of now, Sandy has been established in Massachusetts for a full 30 years.)

Because Sandy's family was in no position financially to support her legal education, Boston University provided her with scholarship and loan assistance - very large awards by the Boston University standards of the day but not enough to cover all of a student's expenses. Sandy took part-time jobs, mostly in public service law offices, to support herself.

Sandy fairly immediately distinguished herself as a law student. She was critically interested in the important social issues of the day - the civil rights movement, the Vietman conflict, the "new feminism" - and devoted a considerable amount of her time and energy to activities that addressed these issues. However, unlike many of the other social activists of the day, Sandy also devoted herself to serious scholarship, becoming an editor, then the Articles Editor, of the Boston University Law Review, finally graduating in 1971 with honors.

You will undoubtedly recall that the period between 1968 and 1971 was one of great turmoil on university campuses throughout the country. While we did not have any serious student riots or other tragedies at Boston University, we did have our share of student strikes and the like calculated to highlight the concerns many had about the failure of our society adequately to address the critical issues of race, peace and gender. Through all of this turmoil, while Sandy agreed with the substance of the concerns being pressed by student activists, she remained committed to orderly process. Her leadership and influence with the student body, coupled with the respect with which she was regarded by the faculty and administration, contributed to the relative stability enjoyed by Boston University School of Law during that critical period.

When Sandy was a third year law student, she decided that the best way to begin a career as a trial lawyer would be to clerk for a Federal District Court Judge. She was particularly interested in clerking for Raymond J. Pettine, a Judge of the United States District Court for the District of Rhode Island, because of the reasoning in two opinions that he had written. I spoke to Judge Pettine about Sandy's interest in clerking for him. He was initially apprehensive, observing that there had never been a female law clerk in that Court, a fact that he

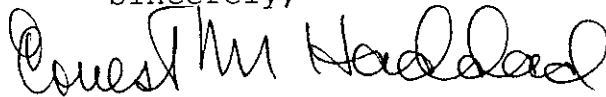

attributed to the location of the Court in what was then a high crime area of Providence. However, Judge Pettine did interview Sandy, hired her, and later told me that it was about the best employment decision he had ever made.

Others will be able to speak more knowledgeably than I about the details of Sandy's career since she completed her legal education. From my perspective, I noted with great pleasure that, when Sandy finished her two-year clerkship with Judge Pettine, she continued to pursue her interest in public service, serving first as a litigator in the Government Bureau of the Department of the Attorney General of the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, then as General Counsel of the Massachusetts Department of Education. When she left her employment in public service to join the law firm of Foley, Hoag & Eliot, she continued to represent the public interest in a number of different ways - as counsel of record in a number of cases with significant societal implications including issues of constitutional law, as a member of the governing boards of the Boston Bar Association and the Civil Liberties Union of Massachusetts and of several of their committees, and ultimately as President of the Boston Bar Association in 1992 and 1993.

As Sandy was the balanced and effective student leader during the period of 1968 through 1971, she continues to be the consummate professional today - a distinguished member of the Boston Bar who is respected for her wisdom, judgement, hard work and balance. I am extremely proud to have been her "Dean." She would be an outstanding member of the Federal bench. I urge you to give her your very careful consideration.
