U.S., Russian, European Ministers Issue Bosnia Ultimatum

Eds: RECASTS for AMs, adds more comment, changes byline

GENEVA, Switzerland (AP) - Foreign ministers from the United States, Russia and Europe on Tuesday issued an ultimatum to the Bosnian warring factions: Agree to a new peace package or face international reprisals.

They approved a map drawn up by envoys that would roughly give the new Bosnian-Croat federation 51 percent of territory and 49 percent to the Serbs within a single state.

"It would be a mistake of truly historic proportions for either party to feel they can serve their people well if they reject the proposal," U.S. Secretary of State Warren Christopher told journalists after the three hour meeting.

Russian foreign minister Andrei Kozyrev said the plan "was the only possible alternative" to continuation of the war.

"We have mapped out a peaceful ultimatum. This is the first such effort to force a compromise and peace," he said.

Kozyrev, who acted as host for the meeting, said the new Croat-Muslim Federation and the Bosnia Serbs have two weeks to give their response. Leaders of the Bosnian factions will be given a copy of the new map Wednesday.

The ministers aimed their ultimatum primarily at the Bosnian Serbs, the most likely to reject the territorial plans as they will have to withdraw from land they consider strategically important.

Christopher said international sanctions against the Serbs would be gradually lifted if they withdrew to the borders on the proposed map.

He said that if they did not agree, enforcement of existing U.N. sanctions would be tightened and they might be extended.

"If Serbs do not accept the proposal, then lifting of the arms embargo would be almost an irresistible option," Christopher said. "Everyone here understands that."

British Foreign Minister Douglas Hurd and his French counterpart Alain Juppe both warned they might be forced to pull out their troops for security reasons if this happened. The two nations make up the biggest contingent of peacekeepers.

Christopher also held out the possibility of more air strikes against Serb targets.

He said as an incentive for the Bosnian government to accept the plan, the international community would give aid to rebuild the shattered land. And he indicated that the United States would be willing to send military support to enforce the peace settlement, although declined to give specifics.

If the government does not cooperate, then little financial help will be forthcoming and it will likely lose support from its most important ally, the United States.

The ministerial package will be endorsed at this weekend's summit of the world's seven most powerful industrialized nations and Russia.

During the Bosnian war, a number of peace plans have tried and failed to stop the conflict. This one may carry more weight because the United States and Russia have been fully involved rather than just the United Nations and European Union.

Ministers will meet again in Geneva before the end of July to assess the Bosnian government and Serb response.

Bosnian President Alija Izetbegovic told a meeting of

ambassadors from Islamic countries that his government would not reject the plan out of hand despite reservations that it does not return enough land seized by Serbs.

The leader of the Bosnian Serbs, Radovan Karadzic, last week slammed the envisaged territorial divisions as "humiliating for the winning side."

His arrival in Geneva was delayed, apparently by negotiations in Belgrade with Serb President Slobodan Milosevic. Milosevic is accused of fomenting the war but is desperate to have sanctions lifted.

Charles Redman, who represents the United States on the so-called five nation contact group said the new federation would hold on to the Muslim-populated enclaves in eastern Bosnia, which would be linked to each other and to Sarajevo.

However, the Muslims are unlikely to recover much land around the Serb-surrounded enclaves even though it was mainly populated by Muslims before the war.

The federation would also regain land in the Bihac area in northwestern Bosnia and around the northeastern town of Brcko, Redman said.

But he added that the Serbs would retain a key land corridor near Brcko.

The future of Sarajevo is not covered by the proposals. The aim is that it should be placed under U.N. administration for two years pending a final settlement.

At a separate meeting later Tuesday, Bosnian President Izetbegovic, Prime Minister Haris Silajdzic and Croat leader Kresimir Zubak signed an agreement with European Union foreign ministers for the EU to take over administration of Mostar and provide massive aid to rebuild it.

The city was the scene of some of the worst fighting between Muslims and Croats earlier in the war.

SUBJECT: Agency for International Cooperation for Bosnia Reconstruction.

Mo Sacirbey stopped by on June 20, 1994, to seek our support for creating an "Agency for International Cooperation for Bosnia Reconstruction." Sacirbey's key points:

- o Appears economic and redevelopment issues being left aside.
- o No country or international agency has taken lead to bring economics to forefront.
- o Future B-H may look different but must favor reintegration. Reconstruction essential to reintegration.
- o Rebuilding critical to preventing reigniting wider-war. Need more than one year peace to rebuild. If rebuilding happens, war less likely to restart.
- o Seeks Federation with autonomous regions. Federation performs international and defense functions. Autonomous regions retain most internal authority.
- o Federation needs 5-10 years for economic growth. Time will dampen emotions and Serbs can choose or not to stay with Federation or go to Serbia.
- o EU plan for Bosnia reconstruction side-tracked. Need a lead agency to manage both current and future development. Prefers world bank over UN or ICFY.
- o Would like U.S. to take lead to develop reconstruction plan as carrot for RBH to settle.
- o Proposing creation of "Agency for International Cooperation for Bosnia Reconstruction."
 - A funnel for economic aid to Bosnia.
 - Needs integrity, credibility, and flexibility.
 - A shareholder entity, with government holding 100% or 51%.
 - Agency needs an international board of directors to gain recognition and acceptance.
 - Looking for USG or agency to participate or endorse name of high vis representative.

Communique of the Meeting of Foreign Ministers
in Geneva, 13 May 1994

The Foreign Ministers of Greece, Belgium and Germany and European Commissioner Hans van den Broek, comprising the Troika of the European Union, and the Foreign Ministers of France, the Russian Federation, the United Kingdom and the United States met in Geneva on 13 May. Together with the Co-Chairmen of the Steering Committee of the International Conference on the Former Yugoslavia, they reviewed the serious situation in Bosnia and Herzegovina and their common efforts to date to end the conflict and achieve a political settlement.

The Ministers underscore their resolve and unity of purpose in working for an early and durable settlement of the Bosnian conflict. They reaffirm that the conflict in Bosnia and Herzegovina cannot be resolved by military means and must be settled through negotiations. Only a peaceful settlement will command the support of the international community and offer the peoples of Bosnia and Herzegovina the prospect of a secure future. They confirm their support for a settlement that preserves Bosnia and Herzegovina as a single Union within its internationally recognized borders, while providing for constitutional arrangements that establish the relationship between the Bosniac-Croat and the Bosnian Serb entities. The Ministers are committed to doing their utmost to promote such a settlement.

They also affirm the readiness of their countries to participate as appropriate in implementing an agreed settlement, and in supporting the reconstruction of war-ravaged Bosnia and Herzegovina.

The Ministers express their strong concern that in the wake of the recent Bosnian Serb attack on the UN-declared safe area of Gorazde, the negotiating process has been set back. They warn all the parties concerning the unacceptability and risks of pursuing military solutions. In this regard, they support the determination of the international community to take necessary action to protect the safe areas within Bosnia and Herzegovina established in accordance with Security Council resolutions 824 and 836. They demand that the parties comply fully with the terms and conditions of the relevant Security Council resolutions, the decisions taken in reliance thereon, and all agreements the parties have concluded. They express their full support for strict enforcement of these resolutions, decisions, and agreements. The Ministers demand that all parties permit the unimpeded delivery of humanitarian assistance in accordance with existing agreements. The Ministers insist on the release of those members of humanitarian organizations in detention.

The Ministers note with concern the recent military action related to Brcko and endorse efforts currently being made by UNPROFOR and under way in the United Nations Security Council to prevent offensive action in safe areas and particularly in and around Brcko and to reduce tensions in other parts of Bosnia and Herzegovina.

The Ministers agreed on immediate steps aimed at an early settlement in Bosnia and Herzegovina. They call on the parties to conclude a comprehensive cessation of hostilities and to resume in parallel without preconditions serious efforts to reach a political settlement.

The agreement on cessation of hostilities must include the separation of forces, the withdrawal of heavy weapons and the interposition of UNPROFOR troops. On the basis of previous discussions with the parties, the Ministers believe that the agreement should be for a period of four months, with provision for extension. Ministers underscored the need for the United Nations and the parties to establish necessary arrangements to insure compliance with this agreement. To complete its task in the safe areas and in support of the cessation of hostilities, UNPROFOR will need further reinforcement.

Previous negotiations have established the concept of a territorial compromise based on 51 percent for the Bosniac-Croat entity and 49 percent for the Bosnian Serb entity. Ministers urge the parties to reach an agreement on this basis.

The Ministers take note of the steps to establish the Bosniac-Croat Federation. They believe that the final arrangement for the Federation must provide it with viable, realistic, and reasonable territory consistent with the concept described above.

The existing UN Security Council resolutions must be strictly enforced and complied with, and the Ministers agree that any attempt to make sanctions relief a precondition for resuming talks is unacceptable. Good faith implementation of a peace settlement that includes provisions for withdrawal to agreed territorial limits will lead to phased suspension of the sanctions imposed by the United Nations.

With a view to achieving an early settlement within this framework, the Ministers invite the parties to begin substantive negotiations under the aegis of the Contact Group within the next two weeks. The Contact Group was instructed to immediately commence all the necessary substantive preparations aimed at facilitating an early settlement.

July 5 Bosnia Ministerial

- o Very encouraged by results of Tuesday's Ministerial meeting on Bosnia. Peace process has reached a decisive point.
- o United States, European Union and Russia -- members of the Contact Group -- agreed on a realistic territorial proposal as a basis for a political settlement to the Bosnian conflict.
 - Proposal would preserve Bosnia-Herzegovina as a single union within its internationally recognized borders, while providing viable territory for the Bosnian Muslims and Bosnian Croats.
 - It would significantly roll back Bosnian Serb territorial gains and "ethnic cleansing," while providing a reasonable territory for the Serb people within Bosnia.
- o In addition to approving the proposed territorial solution, Ministers also agreed on a range of incentives and disincentives for the parties to encourage them to accept the proposal, and to make clear the serious consequences if they do not.
 - In the event the Bosnian Serbs reject the proposal, it was agreed that they would face increased pressure to reconsider, including the option, as a last resort, of lifting the arms embargo against the Bosnian Government.
 - Unprecedented international solidarity underpinning this effort.
- o The Contact Group presented the proposal to the parties today (Wednesday) in Geneva, and they have two weeks to consider it. We hope they will both seize the opportunity for peace.
