AGREEMENT ON COMPLETE CESSATION OF HOSTILITIES

1. Following the Cease-fire Agreement signed on 23 December 1994, the parties agree to a complete cessation of hostilities with effect from 1200 hours 1 January 1995 along all lines of confrontation. This agreement will be in effect for an initial period of four months, subject to renewal under these same conditions by agreement of the parties.

2. The cessation of hostilities will be supervised and monitored by UNPROFOR through the establishment of Joint Commissions. A Central Joint Commission shall be established under the chairmanship of UNPROFOR, with initial meetings at the Sarajevo Airport, and Regional Joint Commissions shall also be established in permanent session as needed and as determined by the Central Joint Commission.

3. Liaison officers will be exchanged between UNPROFOR and the parties by 15 January 1995 and afterwards where deemed appropriate.

4. Cessation of hostilities will include the following measures:

a. Separation of forces in conflict to mutually agreed positions and the positioning of UNPROFOR forces for observation and monitoring, to include interpositioning.

b. The parties agree to refrain from the use of all explosive munitions, and the use of weapons used to fire explosive munitions. In addition, talks will begin immediately on the modalities for the withdrawal and monitoring by UNPROFOR of heavy weapons of calibre 12.7mm and above.

5. Full freedom of movement with appropriate procedures shall exist for UNPROFOR and other official international agencies, in particular UNHCR, in order to implement this agreement, to monitor human rights and to deliver humanitarian aid, including medical supplies and evacuations. The parties commit themselves to full

respect for the safety and security of UNPROFOR and related personnel. UNPROFOR shall continue to prevent any abuse of freedom of movement by its personnel or convoys which might be of military benefit to either party.

6. The parties agree to comply immediately and fully with all existing agreements including the 5 June 1992 Sarajevo Airport Agreement, the 24 April 1993 Srebrenica Agreement, the 8 May 1993 Srebrenica and Zepa Agreement, the 14 August 1993 Mt Igman DMZ Agreement, the 9 February 1994 Sarajevo Airport Agreement, the 17 March 1994 Agreement regarding the use of civilian traffic across the Sarajevo Airport, the 23 April 1994 Gorazde Agreement and the 14 August 1994 Anti-Sniping Agreement.

7. The parties agree to assist fully in the total restoration of utilities and the establishment of joint economic activities aimed at the normalization of life in all territories, and in particular, in and around the Safe Areas. These activities shall be undertaken on a reciprocal basis.

8. The parties agree to work continuously and simultaneously on processes for the early release of persons detained in relation with the conflict, as well as for the provision and cross-checking of all available information on persons unaccounted for. This work will be undertaken under the auspices of the ICRC, in accordance with their standard procedures. The parties commit themselves to commencing the processes by 15 January 1995.

9. The parties agree to cooperate with UNPROFOR in the monitoring and observation of the withdrawal of all foreign troops. UNPROFOR will perform this specific task on the basis of this agreement with the parties to the conflict and in accordance with its obligations towards the relevant Security Council resolutions and statements.

10. This agreement is to be without prejudice to the final political or territorial solution.

United Nations Security Council Resolution 943, approved on September 23, 1994, suspended a limited number of sanctions imposed against the Federal Republic of Yugoslavia (Serbia and Montenegro) provided that the authorities of the Belgrade government are "effectively implementing" their decision to close the border between Serbia and Montenegro and the Republic of Bosnia and Herzegovina.

Information collected by the U.S. intelligence community suggests strongly that Serbian authorities are not "effectively implementing" the border closing. While cross-border traffic has apparently been reduced compared to the months prior to the imposition of the embargo by Serbian President Milošević, the border closing is far from airtight. It is clear that significant amounts of goods and materiel continue to flow to the Bosnian Serbs. In particular, considerable amounts of fuel supplies -- critical to the mechanized Bosnian Serb forces -- move into Bosnia regularly. Given the estimates of fuel required by the Bosnian Serb forces, and the flow detected by U.S. intelligence, it is reasonable to conclude that the Bosnian Serb military is not suffering any significant shortages; its recent counteroffensives near Bihać and in central Bosnia suggest as much.

The "embargo" also has a major loophole: the continued shipment of fuel and goods -- across Bosnian territory -- from Serbia to Serb-held areas in Croatia. Over 50 trucks are authorized to transit Bosnian territory on a regular basis. Although in theory these trucks are sealed at the Bosnian border, there is no means of monitoring whether (A) they are in fact sealed and (B) whether they reach their appointed destinations in Croatia. Recent reports of military cooperation between the Krajina Serbs and the Bosnian Serbs against the Bosnian Government in the Bihać region highlight the importance of closing this loophole.

Moreover, the U.N. effort to monitor the border closing is woefully inadequate. Of the nearly 60 border crossing points between Serbia and Montenegro and Bosnia, just five are monitored on a 24-hour basis by the personnel deployed by the International Conference on the Former Yugoslavia (ICFY). Most of the remainder are checked only by roving groups of monitors. There is little or no coverage in the evening hours. The ICFY mission has fewer than 100 monitors, far short of the estimated 300-400 needed to monitor the border properly -- a number proposed by Ambassador Albright at a recent Security Council meeting.

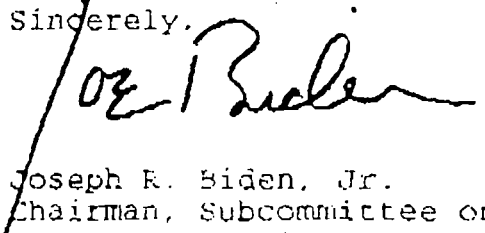
It would be an act of self-delusion to declare the border "effectively closed" when we have full knowledge that we cannot verify that fact. To be sure, minor leakages are inevitable, given the length of the border. But inasmuch as we have evidence that significant violations now occur -- and that we remain largely ignorant about what transpires when the border is not monitored -- our acceptance of the ICFY monitoring mission's stamp of approval of the Milošević "embargo" is baffling.

U.N. Security Council Resolution 943 provides that, if at any time the U.N. Secretary-General reports that the Yugoslav authorities are not fulfilling their pledge to shut the border, then the sanctions that have been suspended shall be reimposed. Rather than considering a further easing of sanctions on Serbia -- as some members of the Council are suggesting -- we should propose the reimposition of the sanctions currently suspended.

In addition, I urge you to continue to press for the strengthening of the ICFY monitoring effort. I recognize that the United States has already contributed some 40 officers, as well as other assets. But the reason for placing monitors on the border in the first instance -- the international community's mistrust of the Milošević government -- has not changed. Milošević has made several solemn "pledges" to the international community over the past several years; few have been honored. It is far too late in the day to take Mr. Milošević at his word.

I realize that the Bosnian crisis has engendered considerable tension between the United States and other members of the Security Council in recent weeks. But I expect that all the Council members would agree that full compliance -- and rigorous monitoring -- of the Milošević "embargo" is required.
