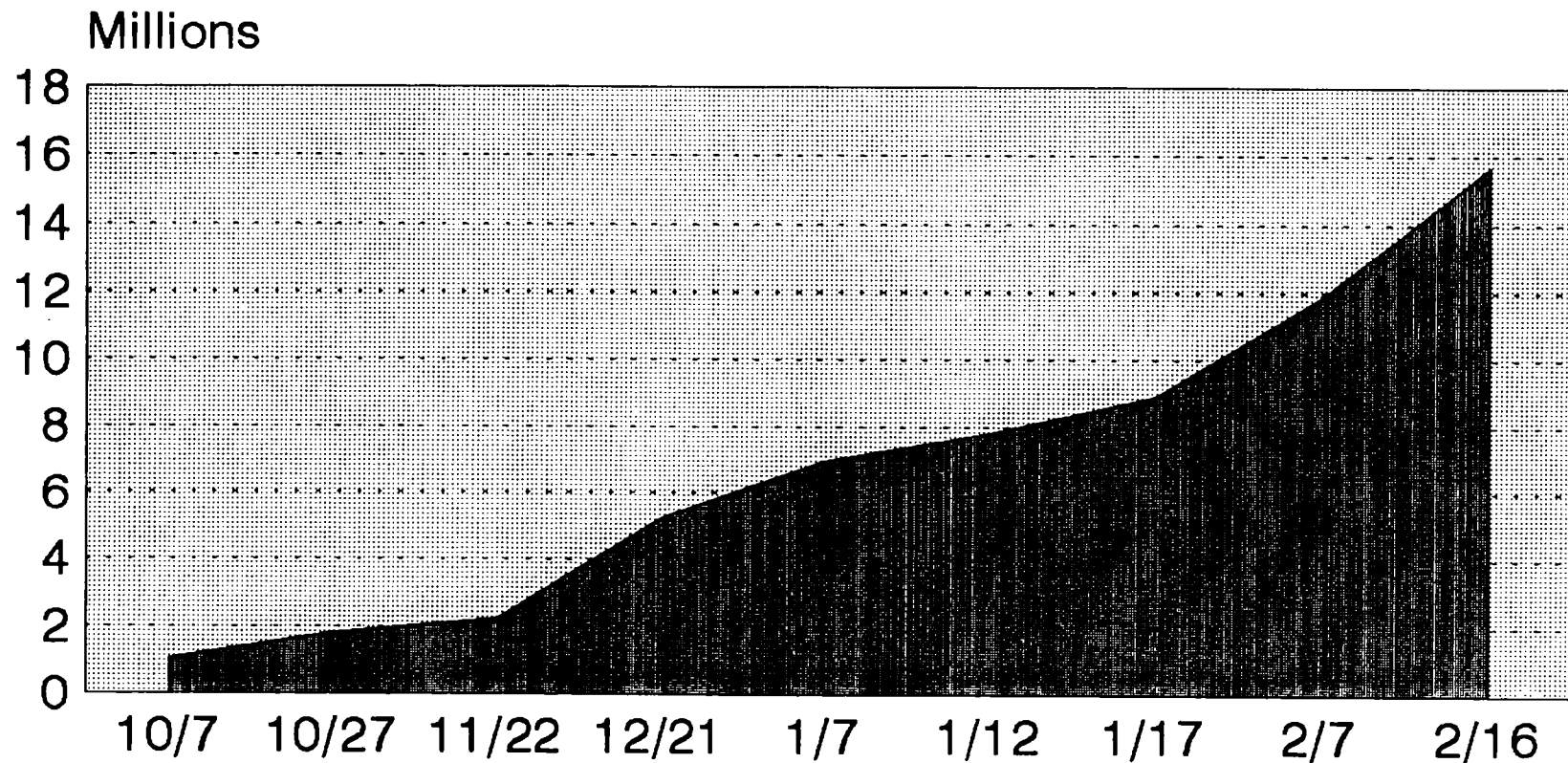

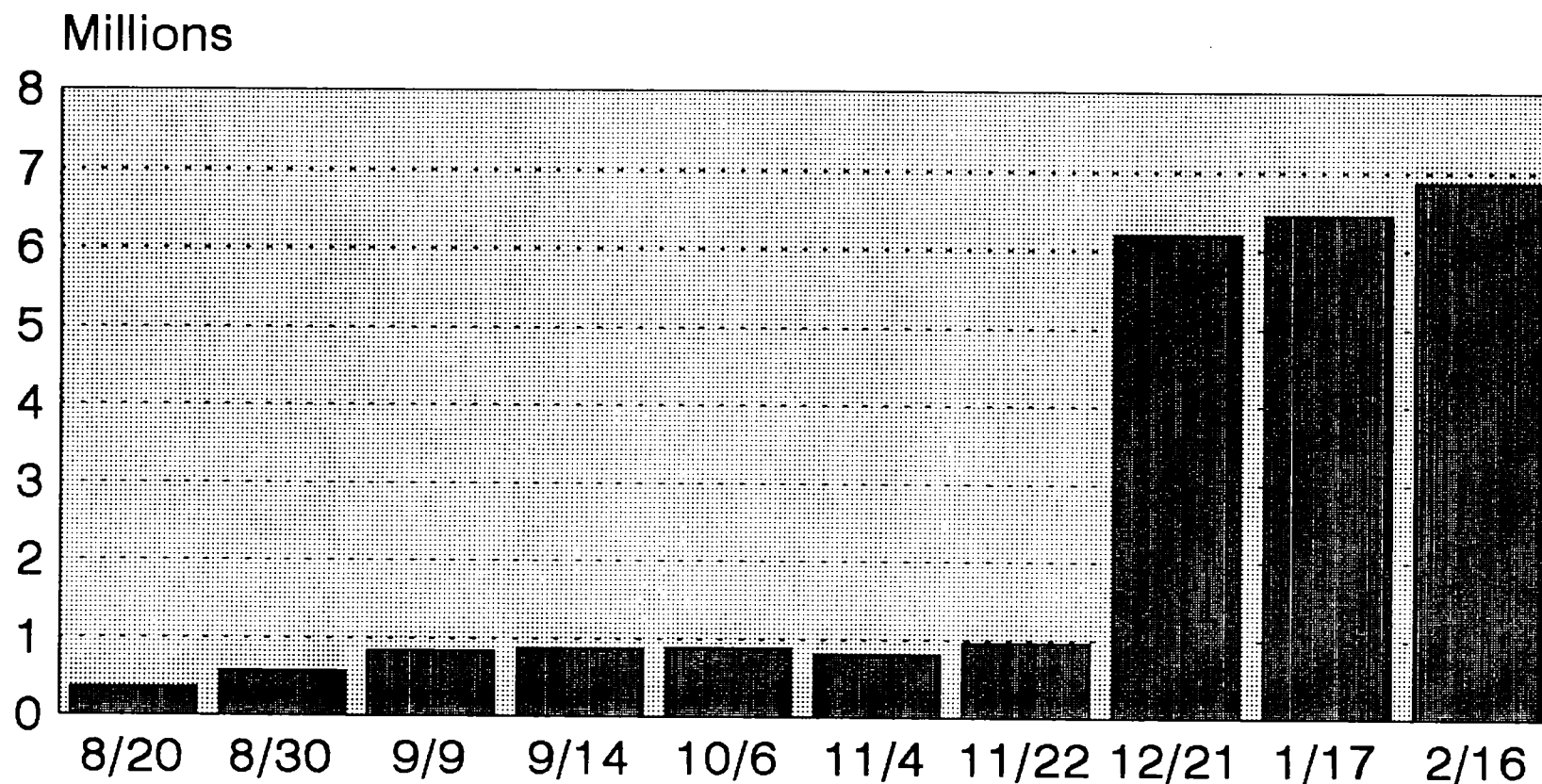

EMERGENCY WATERSHED PROGRAM

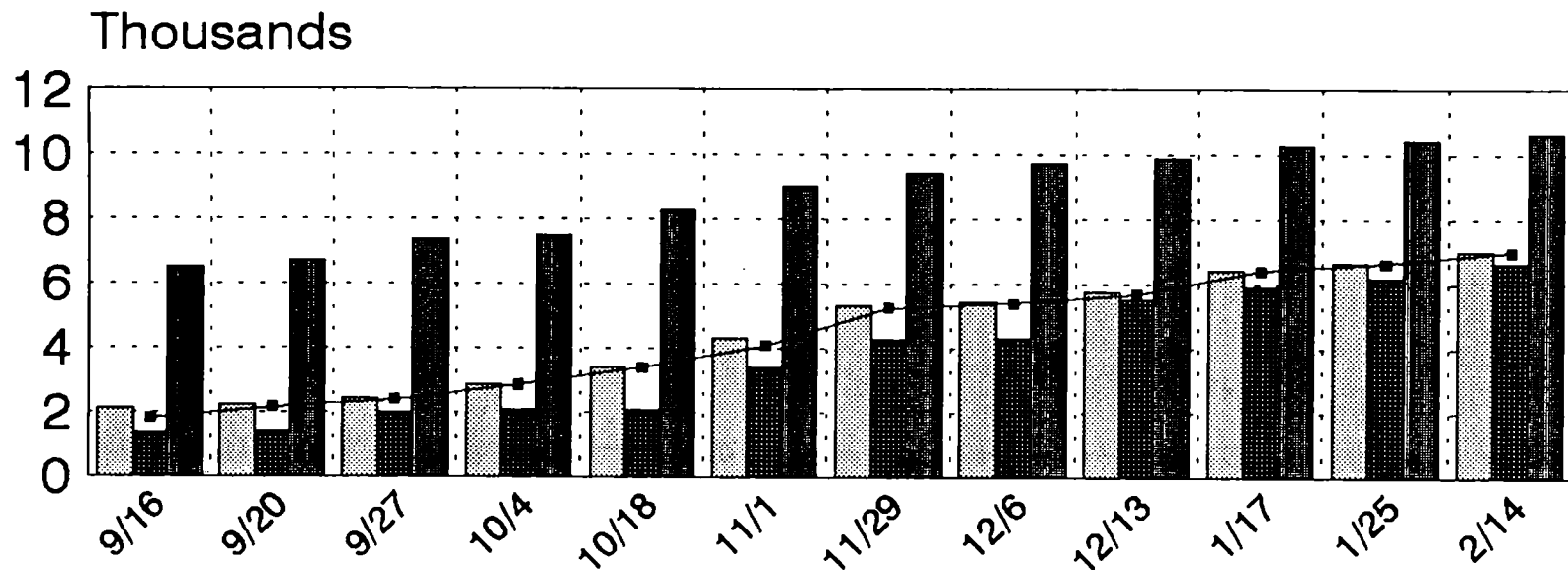

- * The primary cause of levee damage was the floods of 1993.

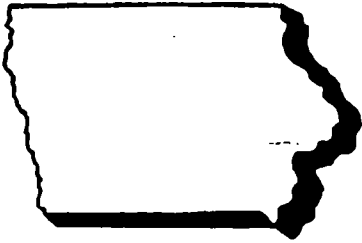

PROJECT IMPACT

Several different entities will experience a substantial economic impact due to the installation of this proposed flood protection project. Thus, future flooding would not expose the City of Keokuk and Roquette America to the level of damage endured during the Flood of 1993. The proposed project requests that a flood wall be constructed to protect the City of Keokuk's Waste Water Treatment Plant and the facilities of Roquette America if flood waters return to record levels. During the Flood of 1993, both Roquette America and the waste water treatment facility suffered catastrophic damage. The waste water treatment facility was severely impaired during the flood and pumped untreated raw effluent directly into the Mississippi River.

While statewide unemployment rates increased only slightly due to the flood, three counties (Lee, Crawford, and Polk) were significantly impacted. The rate in Lee County increased from 8.1 percent to 9.4 percent, which in according to the Iowa Department of Employment Services, was directly relevant to the flood.

Overall, this proposed project is the most viable solution to virtually eliminate future flood related losses and allow the City of Keokuk, Lee County and Roquette America, to return economic stability throughout the region.

PROJECT NEED

The flood of 1993 has placed the City of Keokuk and Roquette America in a vulnerable position. Production was shut down for over 57 days and resulted in a multi-million dollar losses. Losses and expenditures were incurred by not only the city of Keokuk and Roquette America, but hundreds of employees in throughout the region. Virtually all flood-related losses would have been eliminated if a flood protection wall been instituted prior to the flooding of 1993.

The City of Keokuk, one of two county seats in Lee County, has shared in the misfortune of the entire county. Lee County's economic distress has been attributed at least in part to its dependence upon older manufacturing firms and their production of durable goods. Consistent with many river towns, the economic downturn disproportionately affected Lee County whose unemployment rates have continually exceeded both state and national unemployment levels. Lee County has had the highest unemployment rate (or has had one of the highest unemployment rates in Iowa) over the last decade.

BUDGET NARRATIVE

The City of Keokuk and Lee County are committed to flood related efforts. The preliminary project cost is \$13,500,000. With the Iowa Department of Economic Development injecting \$1,000,000, the respectful request of \$3,500,000 from the Economic Development Administration, and \$9,000,000 from bonding by Lee County. *Please note that funding requested from EDA will be implemented exclusively for infrastructure improvements and modifications necessary for the floodwall construction. No EDA funding is requested for the intent of funding the construction of the flood wall.*

Although alternative methods have been sought, the economic feasibility of each has been more financially strenuous for each entity involved and do not address the long term economic impacts that can be felt by the entire southeast Iowa economy. Finally, the City of Keokuk incurred massive damage to its public infrastructure and in an effort to bolster their waste water treatment facility they are engaging funding resources to a variety of infrastructure repairs due to the flood of 1993.

SUMMARY

The proposed project will allow the City of Keokuk and Lee County and Roquette America to stabilize their industrial base. The proposed construction of a protective flood wall serves several motives. First, the facility allow the protection of the City's

wastewater treatment facility which was inundated due to the flooding of 1993. Second, the floodwall will protect Roquette America which employs over 500 employees. This wall will protect several essential buildings in the production process for Roquette America and encourage the investment of \$400 million dollars over the next 10 years. Finally, the construction of this flood protection wall will allow Roquette America to inject their financial resources toward other flood costs and provide the setting of 400 million dollars of investment to the Keokuk facility.

Several severe repercussions will appear if this proposed project is not implemented. First, the investment of \$400,000,000 over the next ten years by Roquette America will not proceed due to the inability of ensured flood protection. Second, the wastewater treatment facility would become extremely vulnerable to future flooding and thus pumping raw effluent directly into the Mississippi River. Thus, if recent damage levels are repeated without any significant type of floodproofing the economies of the City of Keokuk, Lee County and the State of Iowa will experience a severe negative impact.
