MR. TOIV: Good afternoon. Here to brief on the President's long-term care proposals are Secretary of Health and Human Services Donna Shalala, who -- you'll have to forgive her; she's looking a little tired, she's still recovering from celebrating Wisconsin's stunning victory over Ohio State in the Rose Bowl. In fact, Secretary Shalala --

Q UCLA.

MR. TOIV: Who did I say? Oh, well, they would have like that, too. Wisconsin over UCLA -- excuse me. And she actually gave the President a Rose Bowl teeshirt today.

Also, Janice LaChance, who is the Director of the Office of Personnel Management, will brief on the federal government's -- for federal employees, the piece that were trying to produce there. And Chris Jennings is also here to answer questions about the policy.

Chris, as you know, is Deputy Assistant to the President for Health Policy. And Len Burman will be here -- Secretary Rubin couldn't be here, but Len Burman who is the Assistant Secretary of Treasury for Tax Analysis, will also be here to answer questions.

Q Where is Secretary Rubin?

MR. TOIV: He is not here. He was around this morning. He was there at the event.

Secretary Shalala.

SECRETARY SHALALA: Thank you very much. Before I brief a little on long-term care, let me say that I talked to Elizabeth Dole earlier this morning, and as you probably don't know, I'm the President's designee on the American Red Cross Board. I told her that you should always leave jobs when you still love them, and that was clearly the case for her. She has done a remarkable job to ensure the safety and the quality of the blood supply in the United States, which is the area in which the administration and the Red Cross have worked most recently.

In addition to that, I admire her intelligence, her skill and her integrity, which she brought to her leadership of the American Red Cross. And she leaves with our enormous respect and my personal affection. We've had a wonderful working relationship. I think that she'll have an announcement a little later today, but I wanted to make sure that I put our statement on the record.

,

Q Did you clear this with Al Gore, this effusive praise for someone who may run against him in the year 2000? (Laughter.)

SECRETARY SHALALA: That was not either part of my working relationship with Mrs. Dole. She noted that we had been able to work together in a nonpartisan way on issues that were nonpartisan, and that is the quality and the safety of the nation's blood supply.

Q I'd put you in her commercial.

SECRETARY SHALALA: Let me talk about long-term care, which I'd be happy to be in the commercial on. What the President announced today is historic and significant. You will remember that the U.S. government's entry into health care through Medicaid and then Medicare was essentially to put in place hospital programs to take care of people when they were hospitalized. And gradually, as people lived longer, programs have been added on, or as we had scientific breakthroughs, we have introduced changes in Medicare, for example, which improved flu shots early screenings. So we've been changing the health

care system as people's lives change.

In this century alone, we added 30 years to our lives, and so we are now faced with a population that's getting increasingly older. In fact, at the turn of the century, we will have more people who are senior citizens than we'll have children in this country. And as people have lived longer, their health care needs and their own quality of life needs have changed dramatically. Everybody has talked about long-term care. We have a generation of scholars who have been talking about long-term care.

The proposal that the President has put out is the outlines of the first long-term care strategy in the history of the United States -- the federal government taking the leadership. But it's not a cookie-cutter proposal. We didn't walk in and say, okay, Medicare, we're now adding on long-term care to Medicare. In fact, Medicaid has carried most of the long-term care burden by paying for people who are very poor to go into nursing homes.

Instead, we responded in a very practical way, to give support to the way long-term care is being provided in this country -- for the most part, in people's homes, by caregivers that are related to them. And this is a program that supports the major caregivers in this country, who are often women, and people who are in the work force who are trying to take care of loved ones -- people with chronic illnesses that are disabled, but also senior citizens, members of their own family who they need to take care of.

Anyone can tell stories. Every family has a story. In fact, in my own family, over Christmas my cousins were talking to me about one of our aunts who has Alzheimer's -- and they're rushing home in the middle of the day to make sure that she eats -- very much like the woman who spoke with the President today. They couldn't find a single place to get information about comprehensive services in the city in which they live. They could find very few places that would help them because they're lower middle income -- they're above the line for Medicaid that would provide them with services.

,

This approach, which combines a tax credit to help people pay for it and a series of programs that strengthen the information people get and the services they get at the community level, giving money directly to offices of aging in the states, and community-based offices of aging, strengthening both information, the coordination of services, giving people access to where they can find care-givers for periods of time, giving people who provide this care some respite.

The one thing that does happen, as Mrs. Gore pointed

out in the press conference, is that people under enormous stress are often quite depressed themselves because they're running around trying to take care of a loved one. So it's the comprehensiveness. The fact that we didn't find a single solution, we didn't simply write a check, but we're building a capacity out there to support people that are working in this field, a kind of continuity care. People that are 87 need a different kind of care than a younger person with long-term illness.

And so, giving people more choices and an opportunity to put together a program that works for themselves, for their own family while the tax credit is income-based, the other programs to build the capacity out there so that you can call a single place in your community and find out what programs were available, so there are more programs available, that those are not necessarily income-based; we'll ask the states to focus on people who need the services. But the information will be provided to everyone.

It is the comprehensiveness, the fact that this is the first strategy. Everybody has talked about long-term care strategies. We're starting to put the pieces together, it's very pragmatic, it focuses on the caregivers themselves who, for the most part in this country are women, and for the most part are people that are working, that are just struggling to put all of these things together.

Finally, Janice will talk a little about long-term care policies. My sister called me two months ago and said she had -- her insurance agent was in her house and he was trying to sell her a long-term care policy. And I said, wait a minute, don't sign anything. The fact is that we know some things about long-term care policies -- you want to make sure, for instance, that it has an inflation piece in it -- and there are some guidelines for people that want to buy these kinds of policies. What Janice and the OPM people will do -- the U.S. government, because of government employees, may turn out to be the largest purchaser of long-term care policies.

When we operate as purchasers, we can improve the quality of the market out there. So they will be developing insurance and developing instruments out there. And the fact that people like my sister will have a place to call -- in her state, the state insurance commissioner actually does have a pamphlet on the issue that gives people some guidance -- but people have a place to call where they can learn about what they need to ask about as they buy long-term care policies.

Another important element for younger people, for many of us, about what do you need in these policies, and informing people that Medicare doesn't cover long-term care, will also be part of this overall strategy.

One of the things we found out is we moved out to help people with Medicare pick between HMOs and other kinds of instruments; they don't know what's in their current policies. They don't -- many people, when they get our handbook and we start describing what their choices are, they don't know what they currently have. And pointing out to people that long-term care is not part of their Medicare program -- if they want long-term care insurance, they're going to have to buy something separately -- will be a very important part of this campaign. But we also need to make sure that there's an opportunity for them, particularly younger, to buy some long-term care insurance.

So it's comprehensive. It actually has a strategy in mind. It's not cookie-cutter, it's not all government, it's totally supportive of the people who are providing this kind of care.

Janice.

MS. LACHANCE: Thank you, Secretary Shalala. I'm very excited that the Office of Personnel Management has been called upon once again to take the lead in making affordable long-term health care available to all federal employees, retirees and their family members.

It's inevitable, as the Secretary said, that many of us -- most of us -- are going to end up needing this kind of insurance at some point in our lives. And what we're going to do is allow federal employees and retirees some peace of mind in knowing that they will have this sort of coverage and to prepare for that eventuality by getting long-term insurance at group rates, which we think can actually realize a 15 to 20 percent savings for each one of them over individual policies that they may be able to get now.

We're very excited to be part of the President's initiative and the President's vision to make the federal government a workplace for the 21st century. We were the first to fully implement the patients' health care bill of rights for the 9 million people who are covered by our health insurance program -- and we did it at a cost of less than 25 cents per year per enrollee. And we've instituted a number of the President's other visions as far as family and medical leave policies, family-friendly policies. We're trying to make this the kind of workplace that every workplace in America and every worker in America could enjoy across this country.

So we're very excited about adding long-term insurance to our foundation for this wonderful workplace that we're building for American workers, and we're trying very hard to make sure that it gets expanded beyond the federal work force to all workplaces.

We'll answer any of your questions now. Thank you.

Q Secretary Shalala, one question on the tax credit. The documents say that it starts to phase out at \$75,000 for individuals and \$110,000 for couples. Where is it eliminated entirely?

SECRETARY SHALALA: At \$95,000 and \$130,000.

Q How many people who would otherwise be eligible will not be able to claim the tax credit because their income is too low?

SECRETARY SHALALA: Well, we're talking about 2 million people being able to claim it. Those people that will not be able to claim it, I suppose you could use the Earned Income Tax Credit piece as --

MR. JENNINGS: We're talking about the refundability issue?

SECRETARY SHALALA: Yes.

MR. JENNINGS: Well, as Donna was mentioning, it's two issues that we tried to address as we were evaluating policy options. One is that the design of the policy is such that it can go to caregivers or the individual itself because it is for caregivers as well. And as Donna mentioned, many, many women who are daughters, who are taking care of people who are elderly, may have tax liability that they can take advantage of -- whereas a lower income person who has the actual disability would not. So the design of the policy is actually a creative way to get to that population in a low income way -- to have lower income thresholds.

Secondly, in the initiative that Donna has led with the Vice President through the Administration on Aging, the Caregiver Support Program, that is something that is going to be really targeted to all income thresholds, but particularly for the services component for lower income people. So for all those reasons, we think that we're taking care of that population in a significant way -- we can always do more.

One last point I would like to say about this policy -- no one here -- have you heard Donna or anyone in the administration say that this is the final answer, the only answer to long-term care. But this is the first time in a comprehensive way we've addressed this issue in a way that acknowledges for the first time the important caregiving services that people deliver on a daily basis. And we think for that reason, and that reason alone, it is a major, major development in this area.

SECRETARY SHALALA: That's not the question she asked.

She asked how many people don't have any tax liability that won't participate on the tax credit side. And I think, Susan, that number is probably whatever the Earned Income Tax Credit number is, because we basically wipe out liability, tax liability through that program. So there are people who file for taxes that get the Earned Income Tax Credit that don't have any actual tax liability that would not participate.

So everybody who is a low-income worker below the poverty line, who has no tax liability would not participate in the tax credit side. What Chris is pointing out is that this is a comprehensive strategy because it anticipates that and provides services and access to services, and expands services for people who don't have a tax liability, don't participate in that part, but can participate in the other program.

Q You said there about 5 million people who need long-term care now?

MR. JENNINGS: Yes. Let me go through the numbers real quick -- about 5 million. About a million and a half, almost 2 million are in nursing home settings, in institutional settings; and obviously have caregiving, as Donna pointed out, mostly directed to the Medicare program. An additional 3 million who are community based. We project that there are going to be 2 million individuals who benefit this either directly or indirectly.

I want to point out one thing -- I'm sorry you didn't get the full -- the reason why we don't have the exact number of income distribution, of who benefits and who doesn't, is because this is the first time that we are implementing a program that caregivers themselves can benefit. And we don't have enough experience to project how many people at higher, middle, and lower income levels will be able to do that. So we don't have -- and I think, Len, you would confirm -- that we don't have a specific breakout of that at this point in time.

SECRETARY SHALALA: We are making it simple for them, though, because all you have to do is to have documentation that the person needs care, as opposed to handing in receipts to the IRS to justify the tax credit.

Q Is it correct, as we read, that you don't know how to pay for this yet, but however you pay for it will not come out of the so-called "surplus"?

SECRETARY SHALALA: We have paid for it in the new budget that we're submitting, Sam. And as you know, the President has committed that the surplus would not be used to balance this budget, so this is paid for within the context of the new budget the President will be submitted.

Q The next fiscal year.

SECRETARY SHALALA: For the next fiscal year. It would kick in in October, the next fiscal year.

Q How is it paid for?

SECRETARY SHALALA: It's paid for, and we described that in some detail as you know, how we pay for the overall budget. So when the President submits his budget, this will be part of it.

Q Can you tell us today?

SECRETARY SHALALA: No.

Q Why not?

SECRETARY SHALALA: Well, because we're not revealing the entire budget financing at this press conference. We're talking about the policy issues --

Q You're telling us the good parts, but not the pain.

SECRETARY SHALALA: But you're assuming it's going to be pain.

Q Is it correct that the tax credit portion of it will be paid for on the tax side of the budget through closing loopholes in other revenue-raising measures?

SECRETARY SHALALA: The answer is, yes, we will do this the way we normally pay for these proposals on the tax side.

Q Which loopholes?

,

SECRETARY SHALALA: I think that we'll reveal that as part of the budget.

Q Are you satisfied with the \$1,000 level? It seems kind of skimpy -- people in nursing homes can eat that \$1,000 up in less than a week.

SECRETARY SHALALA: The most important thing to the President, as this proposal demonstrates, is to get the major parts of a national strategy. And, therefore, there's a tax credit component, there's a service component, there's an information component -- and to get the strategy in place.

Now, does it have enough money in it to take care of absolutely everybody's needs? The answer is, no. But we see this as evolving over a period of time. And to get it off the

ground with a significant first step was our goal and that's what this does.

Q Private long-term care insurance is fairly expensive. Do you have any idea, can you estimate what the premium costs would be for --

SECRETARY SHALALA: That's what Janice is going to do for us. She's going to help -- private long-term insurance for individuals buying into an individual market has been expensive. Remember that Janice used the word that they're going to do group buying. And the significance here is that by using the federal workers, the pool of federal workers, we're going to see what we can do to start bringing down the long-term costs by putting a population that's quite healthy -- with the exception of those that work at the White House -- into a large enough pool and see if we can bring down the long-term care costs.

Q Do you have a ballpark range of what --

MS. LACHANCE: We are anticipating a savings of between 15 and 20 percent.

Q Madam Secretary, would you explain, does everyone just get the full \$1,000 automatically, they don't have to produce any documentation of expenditure? And what about people that stay home and lose revenue from working? How would that work without it being open to abuse?

SECRETARY SHALALA: Why don't you come up and answer that question? Do you want to introduce yourself?

DEPUTY ASSISTANT SECRETARY BURMAN: I'm Len Burman, Deputy Assistant Secretary for Tax Analysis at Treasury. The \$1,000 credit would apply to people who have at least \$1,000 of tax liability. It could substantiate your eligibility for the credit by establishing that you have at least three or more limitations in activities of daily living, or a severe cognitive impairment. People with lower incomes or whose caregivers have lower incomes would get a partial credit up to the extent of their tax liability.

Q And can different caregivers claim the \$1,000 for the same individual?

DEPUTY ASSISTANT SECRETARY BURMAN: No, one person would have to claim that individual. If there were several siblings who were sharing in the cost, they would have to make a decision among themselves as to who would take the credit.

,

Q Madam Secretary, the Republicans have already indicated that they might find this acceptable if it does not

include a tax increase. It seems to me what your answer to the question was before is that it will include closing of loopholes of the de facto tax increase. How does what they're saying affect what you might do with this? How would you address their concern?

DEPUTY ASSISTANT SECRETARY BURMAN: I think that what we want to do is get up to the Hill once the budget is announced and explain what we're trying to do and why the tax credit is an important component in the overall strategy, that this can't be a narrow, cookie-cutter approach, that it has to be comprehensive, because different caregivers have different needs. And so our response to them will be, let's sit down and talk together and let us justify why we think that the tax credit is a very important component of a long-term strategy.

Q But I'm not talking about the tax credit, I'm talking about how you're paying for the tax credit. Is there another way that you would do that --

SECRETARY SHALALA: That's always been our discussions on the Hill, that we make policy proposals, we identify the sources of funding, then we go up to Congress and we have a bipartisan discussion about, first to agree on the goal, and then we negotiate on how we're going to pay for it. So there is nothing unusual in the issues that they're raising; we welcome the opportunity to talk first about the importance of putting the policy in place.

Q Why are you requiring three or more limitations? One of the limitations could result in very expensive long-term care.

SECRETARY SHALALA: Because that's the common way to identify the need for home health care, that we have experienced -- this proposal didn't just come out of someone's head for long-term care. There is a body of literature and research that has been going on for almost two decades, including our own experience with the disability program in Social Security and with the home health care programs in Medicare and Medicaid. So growing out of experience, what we have identified is the most basic definition of people who need this kind of care, and we have to be on the firmest possible ground as we put this in place. Again, I would describe it as evolving.

Q Are there plans for the administration to resubmit its Medicare expansion policy --

SECRETARY SHALALA: I can't comment on that, because we don't want to preempt the President's right to make either an announcement before the budget or during the budget.

Q So that's a "yes," I take it?

SECRETARY SHALALA: Thank you.

THE PRESS: Thank you.

Q Joe, is there any White House reaction to Lott's statement that the trial will begin on Thursday?

MR. LOCKHART: None that I can speak of. I mean, I saw most of what he said, and I think he indicated that they'll be meeting with their caucuses in the next day or so and they'll let us know at the appropriate time what process they plan to follow. But I don't --

Q Is the White House prepared to go to trial on Thursday?

MR. LOCKHART: Well, we don't know what the process is going to be. We will be prepared to start a process when the Senate indicates they're ready to go. How that process proceeds depends on the process.

Q Well, you must have some idea. Isn't there some informal consultation going on?

MR. LOCKHART: Well, I think we know what you know, which is that there are consultations going on and we look forward to a resolution.

Q What did you make of the Lott statement? Anything encouraging or discouraging about it?

MR. LOCKHART: I think he indicated that he wasn't ready to announce a resolution of this, and we look forward to that day.

Q Did you have any representation at that meeting this morning?

MR. LOCKHART: No. You mean the meeting between the Chief Justice -- no.

Q Joe, it's the lack of a resolution you've just noted. What position does that leave the President's lawyers in

until various issues on timing and --

MR. LOCKHART: It leaves them in the position of preparing for all eventualities.

Q Is there any thought being given to this motion of dismissal before the trial begins?

MR. LOCKHART: I'm not going to get into any of the legal options that might or might not be available to the counsel.

Q Does this raise any concern at the White House?

MR. LOCKHART: I think we generally like to know which direction we're going in, but we understand the process. We understand the consultation that is going forward among the senators. We think it's appropriate that that's where this is being decided. We agree with the senators that these are decisions that that body needs to make, not the White House or the House managers. And we believe we'll be consulted at the appropriate time.

Q Well, the mantra that you and others use is that it should be fair and it should be bipartisan and it should be expeditious, or words to that effect --

MR. LOCKHART: All correct.

Q You are not, then, ruling out a trial that's fair, expeditious and bipartisan, but that results in votes on the articles of impeachment themselves?

MR. LOCKHART: I'm sorry, I didn't follow the last part.

Q You're not ruling out in that mantra that I just quoted from you a trial which ends with actual votes on the articles of impeachment, as opposed to a --

MR. LOCKHART: We're actually not in a position to rule things in or rule things out. We're waiting for the Senate to make a decision on how they plan to move forward.

Q But I just --

MR. LOCKHART: We have, just as a matter of record, said that we expect this process to move forward in a way that's fair, bipartisan and expeditious.

Q Is it unfair, per se, if they actually vote on the articles of impeachment?

MR. LOCKHART: I'm not going to get into a rating game

of what the various options are. I think the Senate will make their decision; they'll make it known to people what their decision is, and we'll move forward from there.

Q Joe, given the uncertainties, is the White House prepared to move ahead with the President's defense?

MR. LOCKHART: The White House will be prepared to move forward the President's defense. Obviously it will be dictated by what the process is, by how this moves forward, but we'll be ready to move forward, to begin the process once the process becomes known.

Q Joe, how many Democratic senators have expressed the viewpoint that if any witnesses are called, that by definition would be the end of a quick process, that if the House decided to call even one witness, it would mean the White House would then be forced to call perhaps many witnesses and you would have a long trial. Does the White House share that view?

MR. LOCKHART: Well, the White House is at this point going to keep our own counsel on the implications of the various options that the Senate is considering. I think the senators have speculated on what the impact are and I'm not in a position to disagree with them.

Q Can I just follow up? Since it might be an important decision for a senator who was mulling over whether to agree to a limitation of witnesses, does the White House not want to warn them about --

MR. LOCKHART: I think if a senator has a particular concern like that, we'd be glad to discuss that in private with them.

Q Joe, since you're preparing for all eventualities and there is a chance that there could be a very long, drawn-out trial that would cripple the Senate, is that fair to the American public to have to sit here and go through this all over again? The American public went through this for one year; during the Christmas holiday you saw the impeachment, and then now --

MR. LOCKHART: April, I think we've been pretty clear that we think that it's important that this is fair and it's expeditious. We don't believe that it serves anyone's interest to make this a long, drawn-out process, and it's our hope that the Senate can find a way to do this expeditiously.

Q What does "expeditious" mean?

MR. LOCKHART: Quickly.

Q How quickly?

MR. LOCKHART: With due speed, without delay.

Q Give us a time.

Q Does that mean Tom Delay? (Laughter.)

MR. LOCKHART: That, too.

Q How quickly is expeditious?

MR. LOCKHART: Listen, this is a process right now that's being dealt with in a very serious way in the United States Senate. That's the appropriate place for this to be dealt with, and I'm just not going to get drawn into handicapping that process.

Q You talked about the possibility of senators concerns -- privately. Are you doing that? Have members of the Senate contacted the White House?

MR. LOCKHART: We've talked to -- if you've stood out here in the freezing cold today, you would see that there is a procession of senators coming in and out on other business.

Q Hog prices?

MR. LOCKHART: Hog prices for one. The drug initiative event we did today. So I think there are informal discussions going on. But the real work, the real formal work is happening within the Senate.

Q Can you be more specific, Joe?

Q Why is it proper for the White House to set a standard of fair, bipartisan and expeditious, and not proper for you to say whether any of the plans up there meet the standard that you've set?

MR. LOCKHART: Because we believe that what's proper is for the Senate to go about their business, and that's what they're doing.

Q Joe, Senator Lott just said about a half hour ago that he also wants it fair and expeditious.

MR. LOCKHART: That's encouraging.

Q Yes, but his definition of expeditious may be different than yours.

MR. LOCKHART: We'll have to see. I think that we're coming to the point where speculation will take a back seat to actual facts and we look forward to that.

Q Can you be more specific? Senator Daschle was just here. Did he discuss the impeachment proceedings with anyone

MR. LOCKHART: Not that I'm aware of. He was here for a meeting with the Chief of Staff on the crisis within the hog prices within the pork industry. The President stopped by and spent about 20 minutes with that group, listening to their presentation and discussing some of the efforts that are going on here.

Some of you know there's an interagency working group headed by Sally Katzen here at the White House with Secretary Glickman, very involved in this. So that was the purpose of that meeting.

Q No discussion of impeachment by him or Senator Leahy or Senator Dorgan?

MR. LOCKHART: Not that I heard.

Q Joe, once the senators are sworn in as jurors, would it continue to be appropriate for the White House to have contact with them on the subject of impeachment?

MR. LOCKHART: I'm not aware that there is any problem in continuing discussions.

Q Joe, one of the original scenarios when it was thought that there would be a full trial -- this was weeks ago or whatever -- lost in all this -- was the idea of convening a trial but then taking maybe like 30 days for the lawyers to prepare their witnesses, to prepare to question witnesses and all that stuff, is that out the door now?

MR. LOCKHART: I don't know. It depends on the process. I've heard some suggestion like that from the House managers that -- you know, from Mr. Hyde, that that kind of time frame may need to be used. But I can't speculate until we know what the process is.

Q Would your lawyers need it --

MR. LOCKHART: I'm not going to speculate until we know what the process is.

Q Would the President prefer that a formal trial begin, perhaps after he delivers his State of the Union address?

MR. LOCKHART: I think the President believes it's up to the Senate to set their schedule and he intends to give his State of the Union on January 19th.

Q Joe, do you know if any of the informal discussions have been with Republican senators?

MR. LOCKHART: I don't know the answer to that. I'm not aware, but I don't want to rule out that there isn't somebody here who's crossed the aisle in informal discussions.

Q Joe, what is the latest about the military face-off in Iraq -- and has the President said anything about it?

MR. LOCKHART: Haven't talked to the President about this specifically today. He's certainly aware and has been briefed on the latest incident. I'll leave it to the Pentagon to describe the incident, but I will say that as we've said, we will continue to enforce the no-fly zones; it's an important part of our containment policy, which also includes the economic sanctions that have cost Saddam Hussein \$120 billion and that also includes the credible use of force. That's what our effort is in the short-term. In the long-term, we'll continue to engage with the opposition groups, looking forward to a day where Iraq can enjoy different leadership.

Q Well, Joe, this was the first airborne confrontation in a very long time. To what extent does this escalate tensions in this current situation?

MR. LOCKHART: I'm just not -- I'm not in the position to talk about how it escalates. What we have here is we have a no-fly zone that's designed to limit his ability to threaten his neighbors' fly, and repress his own people, and there's just nothing that's happened in the last days or weeks that indicates that he has regained that ability.

Q Why do you think he's doing this?

MR. LOCKHART: I think as I said yesterday, there's no smart money in trying to psychoanalyze Saddam Hussein. But we've seen over the last eight years that he often takes these steps when he's frustrated and when he's isolated. And we know he's frustrated and we know he's isolated; we know from his own words that he's isolated and that he's very angry that he hasn't received the support he believes he deserves from his neighbors.

Q Given the announcements today on Cuba, do you concede that there has been a significant change in U.S. policy toward Cuba?

MR. LOCKHART: No, I don't believe there's been a significant change. I think we've built on some of the success of the initiatives the President announced in March in engaging the Cuban people, but continuing to try to work to try to change the system of government there.

Q Can you tell us about the meeting --

Q May I just follow up? Was there a change that began in March, then?

MR. LOCKHART: Well, there was a series of initiatives to try to engage the Cuban people, and that is something that the President is trying to build on. But there is no change in the basic policy that we don't intend to have normal relations with the government of Cuba, and if anybody needs any evidence to why, just go back and look at the speech that Fidel Castro gave over the weekend about what his government's all about.

Q Joe, are these steps related at all with the fact that the President intends to meet the Pope in two weeks?

MR. LOCKHART: Well, I think the Pope clearly has an interest in Cuba policy, as you know, from his trip there last year. But this is building on an effort which I think has been described in greater detail over at the State Department within the last hour to build on the success of the initiatives in March.

Q Joe, the meeting between King Hussein and the President -- did the King offer any new ideas about how to get the Middle East peace process started or on Iraq?

MR. LOCKHART: I have very little on that but to say that the two leaders discussed a range of regional issues, including the Middle East peace process, Iraq and the Jordanian economy. The President and the King have conferred frequently over six years; as you now, they enjoy a close personal relationship working closely together.

As far as the details, this was a personal and private meeting, so I'm not going to go beyond any details of any of the mentioned subjects.

Q A follow-up, Joe. Does the King appear healthy enough to resume full leadership of his country?

MR. LOCKHART: I think I'll let you draw your own conclusions from seeing him golf.

Q Joe, does the President have any reaction to talk that his wife might become a senatorial candidate?

MR. LOCKHART: None that he shared with me.

Q Attorney Greg Craig was quoted as saying --

Q Do you think he shared them with her?

MR. LOCKHART: I don't know.

Q What about a presidential candidate?

MR. LOCKHART: Presidential candidate; this is escalating.

Q Joe, Greg Craig was quoted as saying the two articles of impeachment are, among other things, constitutionally deficient. Can you help me understand this? Does this mean something other than --

MR. LOCKHART: Let me address the broader point, because I think there was some coverage in the papers this morning. I think by and large, that coverage, as far as what our defense would be, reflects what we've already argued. We have submitted three extensive memorandum to the House of Representatives. Mr. Ruff gave an extensive presentation, Mr. Craig gave a presentation to the House. I think as I've said before, we sense that those arguments have not yet flowered and not received extensive coverage. But it should come as no surprise what the basic foundation of the President's defense is, which is we don't believe that the allegations have the constitutional or legal foundation to move forward.

Q When you say haven't received extensive coverage --

MR. LOCKHART: Yes, that's what I said. And I will draw your attention to the coverage the day that Mr. Ruff gave his long defense of the President after many months and received scant coverage in many newscasts and in many newspapers. That's not my opinion; you can go back, it's a matter of record. So anyone who is surprised that this is the line that we would take makes my point that you shouldn't be surprised. As far as particular constitutional issues, I'm just not going to preview what the arguments might be.

Q I want to know, though, whether the attorney's assertion involves something more than your belief the President's actions did not rise to the level of an impeachable offense. Are there deficiencies in the ways the legal and constitutional deficiencies in the ways the articles of impeachment were drawn up and voted upon?

MR. LOCKHART: If there are such, we will argue them at the appropriate time.

Q Given your apparent disappointment that your arguments have now flowered more fully, do you intend to be more aggressive in your gardening?

MR. LOCKHART: Well, it depends what sort of field the Senate plows for us. (Laughter.)

Q And what sort of fertilizer is used? (Laughter.)

MR. LOCKHART: Exactly. This isn't going any further, so -- (laughter) -- Sam ends that unfruitful conversation.

Q Not to continue this metaphor, but does that mean you're looking forward to a trial, that you want to make these arguments?

MR. LOCKHART: That we are looking forward to a fair, bipartisan and an expeditious end to this situation.

Q The question is, does the White House team intend to be more --

MR. LOCKHART: And my answer is conditional based on how the Senate decides to move forward with this process.

Q -- would witnesses be more advantageous to the White House -- the witnesses have not been cross-examined in public?

MR. LOCKHART: I just can't speculate on that.

Q Joe, the articles this morning said specifically that the President's team would more aggressively challenge the specific accusations that are in the report and say that he is not guilty, in fact, of those accusations, not just whether or not they rise to impeachable offenses. Is that correct?

MR. LOCKHART: I think that goes to some of what I'm saying. We have already made that argument based on the constitutional standards questioned and based on the facts, the interpretation of the facts has presented by even the Independent Counsel. We have made that case. I think there is some sense that whether it's a deficiency in the way we made it or the way it's been conveyed, but depending on how this moves forward, we'll continue doing it.

Q Given the fact that you are complaining about the amount of coverage on the defense, why don't you use these opportunities now to give us a little more detail on what the defense is going to be? And there about 12 accusations of lying in the articles. So can we hear about how you're going to refute them?

MR. LOCKHART: What?

Q I mean, there are about 12 accusations in the report.

MR. LOCKHART: Which report?

Q From the committee -- the committee report on the four articles that say there are about 12 instances of alleged

lying under oath.

MR. LOCKHART: Well, what are they?

Q One of them is, did the President touch Monica Lewinsky on certain parts of her body, there were other ones --

MR. LOCKHART: If that's what we're reduced to, I don't really want to get in that conversation.

Q Well, wait a second, you just said --

MR. LOCKHART: Okay. And there are --

Q Do you want to argue them or you don't?

MR. LOCKHART: We have made, I think, a sufficient argument in the filings we've made with the committee and with the presentations now. Some of the allegations that were made were made after we had a chance to present a defense, which we've talked about the fairness of that. Now, we will make, at the appropriate time, the same argument to the allegations -- I think no matter how the process moves forward, but we're going wait until that process moves forward.

Q One of them appears to be the fact that now that Article 2 was voted down by the House, and dealt with the deposition, that the argument would be made that Article 1 deals with alleged grand jury perjury and, in fact, if they voted down Article 2 the basis for that is now all gone, and in the grand jury, while there may be a few references, he lied less. So it's okay.

I'm shorthand what I read in the paper. But, I mean, that's a new proposition -- is that one of the things that would be argued?

MR. LOCKHART: Well, certainly we're not going to present a defense to articles that were not voted out of the House. We're going to concentrate on the articles that were. And I think we made a compelling defense in the House. I think, unfortunately, we did not go in and have a body with an open mind. But --

Q Let me just finish this. The deposition, as we all know, he denied having a sexual relationship, as he defined it, with Monica Lewinsky.

MR. LOCKHART: As the court defined it. That's an important point, Sam. And you can shorthand it if you want.

Q Well, the court truncated the three points to one.

MR. LOCKHART: Well, I don't think he defined it; I

think the court defined it. So I think you should be accurate in your --

Q All right, that's back to touching, you see, and you say that we've degenerated to some level --

MR. LOCKHART: If you want to debate this, let's get the facts right.

Q I'm not going to debate with you, that's not my job, but in the grand jury, it is said, that he admitted it. He didn't, of course -- he never admitted, to my knowledge, to this day that he's had a sexual relationship with Monica Lewinsky -- but he had an improper relationship.

MR. LOCKHART: You watched it, your network put the tape on.

Q All of it. Every bit of it.

MR. LOCKHART: Yes. So you know what he testified to.

Q Always patient, gracious, very well done. And that's not a criticism, that's an observation. But I guess what I'm asking, what my colleagues have been asking, is there are new propositions now that aren't reflected in the House record that you say is there if we'd only read it and let it flower -- were asking to what extent you will argue this kind of new proposition before the Senate.

MR. LOCKHART: We will argue, whatever the process, I think effectively and in a compelling way that neither of the articles have a constitutional basis or do the facts offer a foundation to remove the President.

Q Joe, does the fact that the House voted down Article 2 and based its perjury charge exclusively on the President's grand jury testimony change the ground here and make the perjury case weaker in the view of the President's lawyers, and will they argue that before the Senate?

MR. LOCKHART: Well, they made an argument on each of the cases. I mean, I think the fact that majority of the House voted one of them down speaks for itself. I don't know if that makes the case easier. I think it makes it more straightforward. But they will argue based on the two articles and the allegations contained within.

Q Will the argument be that because the House is not alleging and, in fact, voted down an article based on deposition testimony, that the article based on grand jury testimony can't stand?

MR. LOCKHART: Well, I'm just not going not going to

get into what the argument is going to be.

Q Joe, based on your conversations with senators, the White House conversations with senators, do you get the impression that the streamlined trial idea with a quick test vote is out the window?

MR. LOCKHART: I don't get any impression. I take the senators at their word. They have talked about trying to reach a consensus, I assume that's what they're trying to do.

Q Joe, without getting into what you might specifically do about it, is it legitimate for the Senate to take up the House articles of impeachment, even though they were passed by a previous Congress?

MR. LOCKHART: I haven't heard any constitutional discussion on the illegitimacy of it. I'm not familiar with all of the thinking of the lawyers, but I haven't really heard.

Q Before you said that a witness who had broached that idea had an interesting idea that was being -- is it still an interesting idea?

MR. LOCKHART: I'm sure it's academically an interesting idea, but I haven't heard anything about an academic idea being translated into any concrete idea.

Q Joe, you're outlining the prospect here -- pretty vigorous defense by the White House if this thing goes to trial in the Senate. What's the White House position if they shift into the censure mode? Are you going to press with a vigorous defense against censure or will you sort of --

MR. LOCKHART: I think as we've said, censure is an issue for either the Senate, the House, together, separate to deal with. I don't know that we have a role in presenting a defense in that process.

Q So you would not mount a defense against censure in the same way that you would mount a defense against --

MR. LOCKHART: I can't think of a process where we would have an appropriate role in it.

Q Joe, did you mean to say that the President's lawyers are dropping the legal theory that the impeachment articles cannot pass from the 105th to the 106th --

MR. LOCKHART: I'm meaning to stay in the position I was the last time this was asked to me before Christmas to say I haven't heard any serious discussion of that argument.

Q Wouldn't you have a possible rule if the

discussion turned to censuring the President rather than removing him from office if there were conditions that he concedes to perjury or he agrees to --

MR. LOCKHART: The question was in offering a defense. As far as how that might work, I'm going to fall back to the oft-stated previous line that I'm not going to get into negotiating a censure deal from here.

Q Yes, but people yesterday were parsing the idea that the President might accept -- I don't know what the word "accept" means, a censure; I guess they're talking about one that would require his signature -- in which it was stated that he perjured himself, lied under oath, although his stated position, as we know it is, that he did not do so. But you could say, "well, I'm not saying this, they're saying it and I'm signing it as a matter of record." Is that a possibility?

MR. LOCKHART: I suggest people are doing too much parsing.

Q Is that an answer?

MR. LOCKHART: That's an answer saying that I'm just not going to answer the question.

Q Oh, all right. (Laughter.)

Q Joe, the White House has been and you have been deferential to the Senate in terms of how they establish their procedures. If the Senate comes up with a procedure that says there will be either a time limit in terms of the length of the trial or witness limit in terms of the number of witnesses called, is that by definition acceptable to the White House if it's what the Senate decides upon?

MR. LOCKHART: I don't think anything by definition is acceptable. We expect them to come up with a consensus and then consult on a formal basis, and we look forward to the time where we can consult with them. But I can't tell you in the abstract that there is anything that by definition meets --

Q I understand the process. What you're saying is that they could reach an agreement -- for example, Daschle and Lott could come to an agreement, and at that point your position would be they should then come to the White House and say --

MR. LOCKHART: I think both Senator Lott and Senator Daschle have been clear that they plan to consult fully with all interested parties -- interested parties being the House managers and the White House. And we expect that to happen and we look forward to that.

Q Joe, you seem to have suggested that first they

have to decide on a process among themselves, and then they're going to come to you and see if you accept it.

MR. LOCKHART: Well, I think the first step in this is that the Senate is going to reach consensus on what their process is.

Q Right, but what we're asking about is the second step.

MR. LOCKHART: Okay.

Q Why do you -- it sounds like you're saying that you would have to agree to whatever process they come to a consensus on.

MR. LOCKHART: Oh, I'm sure the Senate could go off in any direction, because it is the Senate, and they control the body and they set the rules. But I do expect, I do expect based on the conversations and the public statements, that there will be some consultation, in order, as Senator Lott said, to be fair to all sides.

Q But should we assume that you feel that your interests in the caucusing that's going on on the Hill this week are well-represented by Senator Daschle and other Democrats?

MR. LOCKHART: And I wouldn't limit it to just Senator Daschle. I think Senator Lott is making a good-faith effort to be fair to all parties, and I have no reason to doubt that.

Q Have there been any consultations thus far?

MR. LOCKHART: I mean, as I've stated, we have informal conversations with senators all the time. I don't know that anyone from here has talked to the Senate Republican leadership.

Q And that would be a consultation, right? I mean, an informal conversation could be just what's the feeling in the Senate, what's the feeling on the Hill --

MR. LOCKHART: Right --

Q But what I'm asking about are real consultations about how you move forward.

MR. LOCKHART: Yes, and I think that we've got to get through step one first. And that's what we're doing.

Q But aren't those things -- isn't that a way for the White House, then, to help them reach some consensus?

MR. LOCKHART: I'm sorry, I don't --

Q These consultations. Isn't that -- if you're in consultation with -- doesn't that help them to reach consensus?

MR. LOCKHART: My expectation is that we've made pretty clear what we mean by bipartisan, fair and expeditious, and it's not that hard.

Q Joe, can we talk about steel?

MR. LOCKHART: No. I'm just enjoying this way too much. (Laughter.) See, a book, black book, lots of stuff in it. Go ahead.

Q Where are we on the steel report that was supposed to be released today? And do you expect that it will include some voluntary --

MR. LOCKHART: I'm not going to get into --

Q And how will it affect the impeachment?
(Laughter.)

MR. LOCKHART: Oh, it's just this afternoon's attempt to divert attention. No, I'm not going to get into what will be in the report, beyond that it will be, as dictated by the statute, a status report of our efforts on the problem of cheap steel imports coming into this country. The work is -- most of the work is primarily done on it. There's some consultation that the President wanted to do. A few of the people he's been trying to reach out to have been out of the country. So we will try to get this done within the next day or so, and we'll let you know.

Q So it's not going to the Hill today?

MR. LOCKHART: I can't rule that out, but it may slip a day or so.

Q Who does he want to consult with, that's out of the country?

MR. LOCKHART: Leaders.

Q Is Rockefeller one of those people?

MR. LOCKHART: He might be.

Q If Lott is to be taken at his word, the day after tomorrow the trial of the President of the United States is going to begin. Isn't it a source of some consternation here that, at this late hour, you have no idea what the rules are going to be?

MR. LOCKHART: I think it would be an understatement to say that we'd like to know what the process is. But we understand how the Senate goes about building a consensus. We believe that they are acting in good faith and that, sometime

within the next day or so, we'll understand what the process is, and that the process will begin to move forward.

Q Is this a sign of disarray in the leadership up on the Hill?

MR. LOCKHART: I don't think so. I think the Senate, as you all well know, most Senators were not in Washington over the last few weeks. They were back home, or doing their work someplace other than in their Washington office. So I think it's a sign of the calendar and geography.

Q Joe, on steel again. Is The Washington Post story this morning generally correct, in that the report is not likely to recommend specific quotas and other --

MR. LOCKHART: I'm not going to preview the report.

Q Has the President read Vanity Fair -- Gail Sheehy's article on his marriage with his wife?

MR. LOCKHART: I sincerely doubt that.

Q What was the question?

MR. LOCKHART: Has the President read Vanity Fair and Gail Sheehy's comment about his marriage and his relationships with his wife.

Q The independent counsel --

Q Have you read it?

MR. LOCKHART: No.

Q The independent counsel law expires this year, and has the White House made up its mind about whether you'll support or oppose the reauthorization? (Laughter.)

MR. LOCKHART: The Press Secretary has, but -- (laughter.) No, I haven't gotten any conclusive guidance one way or the other.

Q Do you think your concerns, the White House concerns about Ken Starr's conduct is reason enough to oppose reauthorization?

MR. LOCKHART: I think there are certainly concerns that have to be considered that go beyond just Mr. Starr. But I'm not aware that any decision has been made, or whether we will support the reauthorization.

Q Joe, would you describe for us the role the President is playing in formulating the Senate defense. Is he

actively involved? Or is he leaving it in the hands of his lawyers? How is he dealing with it?

MR. LOCKHART: I think the President is primarily leaving it in the hands of his lawyers and his staff to prepare the defense.

Q Back to Commerce. What's the deal? What's going on?

MR. LOCKHART: Oh, the deal. Okay. As you know, the President has been working hard over the last few years to try to find some solution to the claims that black farmers from around the country have made about discrimination historically that they've suffered. He's met personally with them. In 1997, the Secretary of Agriculture, the Justice Department, people here at the White House, notably Erskine Bowles and Sylvia Matthews have taken a lead role in working on that.

We believe there is a framework now to come to some agreement. The parties will meet with the judge this afternoon I understand around 4:00 p.m. and we may have some news for you after that meeting.

Q Do you know what the deal -- does the White House know what the deal is, correct?

MR. LOCKHART: I have a draft statement here which I wish I could read.

Q Okay, is the White House happy about this deal?

MR. LOCKHART: I'm going to defer until the judge has a chance to peruse the details and see if it's acceptable.

Q Does the White House have any opinion on the proposed lawsuit against the gun industry being pursued by the same lawyers that did the tobacco --

MR. LOCKHART: I think it's an issue that the President will follow closely. I think as you know when the first suit was filed in Chicago, the President made a statement that said that if this were proven true would demonstrate that some parts of the gun industry are helping to promote an illegal market in firearms.

As far as any particular involvement of the administration, I'm not aware of anything, only that we will monitor and follow it closely.

Q And in the case of tobacco, the administration also came up with legislation at one point that went down. Would you foresee the need to come up with legislation in regard to the gun industry as well?

MR. LOCKHART: Well, we've done a series of legislative initiatives that involve the gun industry. The President is always alert to continuing the work and building on the success, so I don't want to foreclose anything, but I don't have any news for you on that.

Q Julia said that the President is largely leaving his defense in the hands of his lawyers and his staff. I'm curious as to whether Mrs. Clinton has any role in strategy for defending the President in a Senate trial.

MR. LOCKHART: I'm not familiar with what that role might be and I'd suggest you talk to her able spokespeople to explore that further.

Q Why is he leaving it to the lawyers? I mean, this involves his presidency.

MR. LOCKHART: I think I said largely leaving it. I'm not trying to create the impression that he's uninvolved. But a good client allows their lawyers to do their work.

Q But, Joe, is there a role that the First Lady is playing in some way, shape or fashion?

MR. LOCKHART: I'm sure there is, but I'm not going to describe it.

Q A lawyer who represents himself has a fool for a client, remember. (Laughter.)

Q Joe, a compromise within the Senate would guarantee that the President could remain in office. If a trial begins, the outcome no one would be able to foresee. Is it fair to say, then, that the President prefers a compromise solution and wants to avoid a trial?

MR. LOCKHART: I would say that it's fair to say that we want something that's bipartisan and expeditious.

THE PRESS: Thank you.

COLONEL CROWLEY: Good afternoon. In about an hour and a half, the Chiefs of Staff of the military services will be up on Capitol Hill testifying before the Senate Armed Services Committee on military readiness. This weekend the President devoted his radio address to talking about steps the Clinton administration has taken to stay ahead of the readiness needs of the military. And we thought it would be useful to establish a context for the discussion this afternoon in terms of both how current initiatives to help protect readiness, both in the near

-term and the long

-term fit in with the
budgetary trends that we've seen in defense in recent years, and over the past decade or so. So here to help you with that context is Robert Bell, Special Assistant to the President for National Security Affairs.

MR. BELL: Thank you, P.J., and thank you, Sam. Good afternoon. When President Clinton took office in 1993, it's important to appreciate that we were in the 8th straight year of declining defense budgets, measured from the fiscal year 1985 peak, during the buildup under President Reagan, and in the aggregate over those eight years that preceded this administration taking office, defense spending in real terms -- in other words, adjusted for inflation -- had already been reduced by 25 percent.

President Clinton ran for President in 1992 on a defense platform that explicitly called for further restraint in defense spending, but only about five percent more than was being projected by President Bush and then Secretary of Defense Chaney in their last outgoing budget. And that assumes, of course, that you can accept those budget projections as the numbers that would actually have been delivered.

In other words, there was about a \$60 billion difference measured over five years in the campaign that was the distinction

between the Bush position and the Clinton position on defense.

There was a reason why President Clinton, during the campaign, called for that restraint on defense, and it was epitomized in his slogan of "shared sacrifice, shared austerity." President Clinton believed fundamentally, as we still do today, that a strong national security posture must be underpinned by a strong economy, and to get out of the deficit cycle we were in, defense was going to have to do its part to help balance the budget. In fact, this plan, over the course of those six years, worked, and worked spectacularly.

As the President was able to announce in September, we had a surplus in the federal budget for 1998 of about \$70 billion, when in 1993 when he took office the projection for that year had been a deficit of \$350 billion -- in other words, a swing of \$420 billion. And we're now projecting surpluses over the next decade totaling about \$1.5 trillion.

We're also experiencing, as the President underscored

last fall, the lowest inflation, the lowest unemployment rates, the lowest crime rates, the lowest number of welfare recipients in the last 25

-30 years.

Now, I mention all of this because all of these achievements contribute to the national security both directly and indirectly. It's obviously in the interest of the Defense Department to have lower inflation and thereby reduce the cost of future weapons procurement. And it's obviously in the interest of the men and women in uniform and their families to have achieved all of these results on the domestic scene.

But even within the constraints of this six

-year deficit control policy, the defense spending under the first six years of the Clinton administration only declined in real terms -- again, adjusted for inflation -- by about 12 percent. In other words, less than half the rate of decline that had been experienced during the previous eight years of the second Reagan term and the Bush administration.

There are several reasons for this. In part it was because we projected robust defense budget levels from the beginning; and in part, it's because the President, on more than one occasion accepted the recommendation of the Secretary of Defense, whether it was Les Aspin or Bill Perry, to increase the previously projected defense spending level for the Department of Defense across its future year defense program. And on several occasions, including

during the balanced budget agreement negotiations, the White House, with full support of the Secretary of Defense and the Joint Chiefs of Staff, did battle on the Hill to get higher defense numbers than were being projected under the approved congressional budget resolutions.

Nonetheless, over the course of the last year, serious readiness concerns became apparent. And all of you have been reporting on this story over the course of the last year and pointing to specific cases that have come to our attention. Now, why has this occurred? In part, it's because Congress refused to give us the authority we have sought for two consecutive years to reduce our base infrastructure and close additional bases. In part, it's because we've not gotten the cooperation we sought from Congress on legislative reforms to achieve greater contracting efficiency.

In large measure, it's because there continues to be too many, simply too many congressional procurement add

-ons that distort the balance of our defense budget -- for weapon systems or equipment or programs that are not requested either in our budget or, last year, in the case of about \$2 billion worth of add

-ons, not even on the individual service wish list. In part, it's because it's taken longer than we had hoped for the Duma to act on START II, and we haven't gotten as far down that slope as we wanted towards the reductions called for at the Helsinki Agreement of 1997 in strategic nuclear forces.

And in part, it's because we've had to go through a continuing cycle each year with Congress -- and this certainly predates this administration -- of having to take money from readiness accounts to pay for contingency operations and then come back to the Hill months later to get reimbursement in the form of an emergency supplemental, and that causes a distortion in readiness plans of the services.

And finally, I would mention that, in a sense, we've been a victim of our own success on the economic front, because it's precisely this vibrant and rebuilt economy that's been produced by this fiscal austerity that is now exercising a BOTTOM ODD MORE magnet

-like force on the men and women in uniform in terms of drawing them into the private sector and increasing the cost within the context of an all

-volunteer force of meeting our

recruitment and retention goals.

Over the last nine months, the President has moved on five separate fronts, five separate occasions, to address these concerns and to ensure that we maintain the very high levels of readiness and proficiency that were demonstrated so admirably, yet again, during Operation Desert Fox. First, in the late spring last year, we sought and won congressional approval over the opposition in many quarters of funding for \$1.85 billion in contingency operations in Bosnia and Southwest Asia, scored as emergency funding; in other words, money that was added to the defense accounts rather than forcing the services to pay for those operations out of their readiness accounts.

Second, in the late summer, we proposed and won congressional approval for a \$1

-billion reprogramming for readiness accounts -- taking money from lower

-priority programs or accounts and moving it into key readiness accounts. Last fall, we won a \$1.9

-billion emergency supplemental authority for what will be the cost of Bosnia operations in this fiscal year, Fiscal Year 1999. And, there, too, that was in the face, in some quarters, of strong opposition where, for example in the House, the decision had been to force the Pentagon to absorb those costs rather than treat it as an emergency spending.

Fourth, we won approval last fall, also, of a \$1.1 billion emergency supplemental dedicated exclusively to key readiness requirements. And last, but certainly not least, over the last 14 weeks, dating back to the President's meeting at Ft. McNair in mid

-September with his commanders

-in

-chief and service chiefs, the President has developed in very close consultation with Secretary Cohen and General Shelton the long

-term plan that he discussed in his radio address on Saturday which, consistent with his priority of saving the surplus to fix Social Security first, will provide for, first, a major initiative on pay and retirement, which was described by Secretary Cohen and General Shelton just before Christmas; second, a \$12

-billion increase in the Fiscal Year 2000 budget -- in other words, the budget we'll submit in a few weeks -- for defense readiness and modernization through a combination of new spending and budgetary savings; and last, about \$110

-billion increase through Fiscal Year 2005 -- in other words, through the current Pentagon future year defense plan, to meet the most critical requirements that have been identified by the chiefs and the commanders

-in

-chiefs to be able to execute the national military strategy.

So, as the President said on Saturday, this will be a six

-year effort that will represent the first long

-term sustained increase in spending in a decade. And with that I'll stop and take your questions.

Q I may have missed something, but is the administration going to push again for more base closings this year, or what's your position on that?

MR. BELL: Yes.

Q Any specifics on that?

MR. BELL: Absolutely. We continue to believe that we need authority from Congress -- legislative authority -- to conduct two additional base closing rounds, starting in fiscal year 2001. The old base closing authority expired with the last round that we did, in 1995. And we need new authority -- in fact, our budget projections assume that we'll win approval of that. So it's going to be incumbent on Congress to cooperate and give us that authority.

Q How much do you assume you'll save by having those base closings, which may not happen?

MR. BELL: Well, there's several billion dollars within the boundaries of the future year defense plan -- in other words, through fiscal year '05, that are associated with winning approval for those two rounds. In the long

-term, of course, the savings would be much, much greater. It takes a while, in any base closing process, before the lion's share of the savings become available.

Q In the list of items that you listed as reasons why all of this happened up to this point, does any blame attach to the

administration? Is there any little thing that the administration did wrong? Or is it all this other stuff -- Congress, a good economy?

MR. BELL: Well, I think it's important to understand what we were trying to do and the hand we were dealt. I mean, the nation, in effect, Sam, through a consensus reached not only through the campaigns, but in terms of the majority view on the Hill, came up with a rough consensus on what would be available for defense, given other competing priorities, including education, health care and everything else.

Within that context, of the balanced budget amendment, we conducted the most extensive review of our defense posture that had ever been done in the post

-Cold War era, and came forward in 1997 with the Quadrennial Defense Review, the QDR report. In the QDR -- where there was a limitation on the total dollars available for defense -- we had to make some tough decisions, because we faced competing demands for those scarce defense dollars.

We had to strike a balance between the size of the force that we were going to keep on the books, to make sure we had enough combat power to win two regional wars if they occurred; to have enough troops to deploy, as we do every day -- not only for contingency operations, but for normal peacetime exercises -- without breaking the force by sending them out too much; still having enough money to get into the modernization ramp

-up that we're going to require to replace the equipment from the 1980s that's now becoming obsolescent; and, perhaps most fundamentally of all, since people are the backbone of everything, the quality of life requirements for a force posture that assumes an all

-volunteer structure.

And to do that, we had to make some trade

-off decisions.

One of the things we decided to do in the QDR was to keep the readiness capabilities of our forward

-deployed and first

-to

-fight

forces very high. But the flip side of that, the corollary of that, was a deliberate decision to back off on the readiness goals for stateside units that were slower to respond and not in the first deployments for regional contingencies. That, inevitably, led to putting this on the radar screen. As stateside units realized that reduction in their readiness, there were a lot of complaints -- not only up the chain of command, but in some cases to the media. And the anecdotal reporting began coming in as the effect of that QDR

decision sunk in, and I think that's what launched the initial interest in trying to deal with the readiness concerns on a priority basis.

Now, if we had had a higher defense number out of the balanced budget agreement, for example, maybe we could have put more money into readiness for stateside units. But as I said in my lead

-in, the number we got out of the balanced budget agreement was a higher number than the number than was being proposed from the Hill when we negotiated it.

But at any rate, I mean, the point here is that as Desert Fox demonstrated and as continuing tension in the Gulf demonstrates, not to mention the DMZ and Bosnia and Kosovo and Haiti and everywhere else where our forces are performing with distinction, the forces that we need to execute the national military strategy are doing their job with high readiness and performing with great proficiency.

Q Bob, does the President feel he made a mistake as a candidate in 1992 when he pledged to cut defense spending by \$100 million through 1997?

MR. BELL: Not sure you were in the room when I started, but I think it was a \$60

-billion gap. No, we think that the proposal, the concept, the plan worked spectacularly. We stayed at peace, we've met our national military requirements, we've executed the national military strategy, and we've done that while still balancing the budget, reducing the surpluses and all the other domestic achievements that I enumerated.

Q Bob, can you discuss how the ongoing situation with Iraq and the occasional ramp

-ups to do attacks, affect your readiness posture, your availability of personnel and using up dollars?

MR. BELL: Well, I think we've demonstrated that our readiness is more than equal to the mission requirements in the Gulf. If that's not apparent to Saddam, I don't know what is. Of course, there is a cost associated with that, but it's a cost that we're willing to bear and it's a cost that we'll budget and make sure that we win congressional approval to meet.

Q Without challenging your readiness in the Gulf area, what about the readiness of the forces beyond the Gulf area, the forces back at home, the forces in Europe? Doesn't having this readiness posture there affect readiness in other parts of the system?

MR. BELL: I think what you've seen as we got further into 1998 was that the main area of concern in terms of degradation of readiness for stateside units was mostly associated with units that were slated to go fight a second major regional contingency should we find ourselves in a situation where not only Saddam did something very reckless and ill

-advised, but you had a conflict in Korea.

That doesn't mean you couldn't fight and win that second war. It means that it would take you longer to close and engage. It might take you longer to fight and win it. But we've never lost our ability, at any point in the course of 1998, to fully execute the national military strategy.

Q Has anything changed in the perception of the external threat that would now argue for higher military spending? For example, does the continuing, the periodic bombings of Iraq -- is there anything new or different in your perception of the external threat that is an argument for putting more money up?

MR. BELL: No, I don't think it's a function of external threat. I think the two main variables here are, first, because we've succeeded in rebuilding our economy, the costs of maintaining an all

-volunteer force are greater. That's a simple fact of life. And second, we've been living off of seed corn, going back to about the beginning of the 1980s, in terms of what, then, was a bow

-wave of procurement and modernization of equipment. And that's been a dividend that we've been able to realize and apply towards our domestic and fiscal goals.

But you can only do that so long. You can only take equipment into a second or third decade before the readiness difficulties of doing that -- keeping that equipment functioning; keeping spare parts; avoiding cannibalization -- starts to snowball. And that's the point that the Chiefs have been making, and I'm sure will make again this afternoon, that we've got to increase defense spending, here, as we're now proposing to do, not just to meet the immediate readiness near

-term needs, like spare parts and flying hours, but to make sure we get up that ramp that we need -- up to the QDR level of \$60 billion in procurement per year -- to buy new equipment so we don't have increased long

-term readiness problems that otherwise would be associated with equipment that's become obsolete.

Q You mentioned that being unable to implement the cuts under the START treaty has, in effect, added costs to the military. Can you give an estimate of that? And also, what is your assessment of the prospects of finally getting START II signed in Moscow?

MR. BELL: Well, I think it's principally an opportunity cost to date. If things had gone much faster -- after all, the Senate approved START II in January of '96 and the treaty was signed in '92, so -- if this had been realized years earlier, you could speculate that we could have gotten on to START III and much

-reduced

levels a lot sooner. But in terms of staying at START I, which has been a Congressional mandate for the last several years, that cost is just beginning to sink in. It's now measured in hundreds of millions but will quickly grow to billions unless the Duma acts.

We, of course, hope that the government in Moscow can deliver -- as they are now telling us it is their intention to do -- this treaty early in the year. They've made clear, in the recent week or two, that they don't consider the treaty dead and they intend to resume that effort early in the year. The question is simply going to be, within the Duma, particularly within the Communist faction, where the sentiments rest.

Q Is there any sign that -- what's the change? I mean, every six months or so, President Yeltsin and other Russian officials have said, we're sure we're going to get this ratified in the next few weeks. It's gone on for several years. What's changing there?

MR. BELL: Well, I think you're just seeing -- again, in this theme of victim of our own success -- in part because of the triumph of this democratization process in Russia, you have a truly independent Duma, no longer a rubber stamp of the Kremlin, as during the Soviet Union. And it's very vulnerable to the vicissitudes of developments on the world stage. It just seems there's been one linkage or one complication after another the last couple of years that have been the immediate, proximate cause of the delay, and you have to work through each one of those events. But you can't allow your foreign policy, or your national security strategy, to be dictated simply by a calculation of START II ratification prospects.

Q What leads to your optimism about the base

-closing

round? It's been several years now, the administration has hoped each year that Congress would go for it, and they've shut you down every year. Have you gotten some new reading from the Senate?

MR. BELL: Well, we hope that the Congress will accept the proposal this year and give us this authority. One of the reasons I think we have a better chance this year is that we're now operating under the constraints of a balanced budget agreement. And those on the Hill that would say, let's provide more for defense, more even than the President discussed in his radio address Saturday -- they, too, have to come up with the dollars in the context of a total federal budget. That means there will be a real premium on both ends of Pennsylvania Avenue in looking for savings. It's not easy for them to, just out of spite, or whatever is motivating this, decide not to take an obvious source of \$2 or \$3 billion in savings.

Q How much did you say was included in the fit

-up

from the base

-closing rounds you want? How much savings?

MR. BELL: About \$2 billion is my recollection, but I would direct you to OMB to get a more precise figure.

Q Well, sort of along those lines, is there any other legal option? I mean, I don't know how a base was closed before the commission was set up and all those things --

MR. BELL: I don't think so. There is authority under current law to adjust and realign small installations, those that have, I believe, 500 or fewer employees. But above that, you really have no practical recourse other than a base closing round like effort. It's like Churchill's comment about democracy: it's the worst imaginable way to conduct business second only to anything else anyone's ever thought of. The fact is, over decades and decades and decades, it's proved impossible to close major bases as long as one senator or one group in the House can stand up and obstruct a bill, short of an all

-or

-nothing list kind of approach that's been at the heart of the -- approach for the last decade.

Q With two rounds, about how many bases?

MR. BELL: Oh, I don't know. I don't want to suggest anything that would approach what a hit list would look like, or a total number. But we have a sense of what the lag has been. If you compare reductions in defense spending, reductions in the number of people in uniform, and then compare that, in terms of reductions on the infrastructure side, the infrastructure is lagging about 10 percent in the level of reductions that otherwise should have been achieved by now.

Q Do you have a preliminary estimate of what Operation Desert Fox cost?

MR. BELL: No. I don't. I know that OMB is working with OSD Comptroller's Office on that, Bob, and I'm sure that will be a point of interest on the Hill now that they're back in session, so I expect that will be forthcoming. But I can't tell you what the answer is or when we'll have it.
