Senator Richard J. Varn

Senator Varn is the Director of Telecommunications at the University of Northern Iowa, responsible for coordination of telecommunications programs and policy, overseeing operation of a mobile KU band uplink, and coordination of on-campus programs to utilize the State of Iowa's fiber-optic network. Senator Varn has also served 12 years in the Iowa legislature, most recently as Majority Whip and Chair of the Communication and Information Policy Committee. Senator Varn was instrumental in the passage of such cutting-edge programs as the Iowa Communications Network, Iowa's single smart card for all government services, and statewide open access to libraries. He has held numerous positions of state and national leadership in the information policy area including three years as Chair of the National Conference of State Legislatures Task Force on Information Policy, Chair of the State Information Policy Consortium, and member of the National Academy of Public Administration's Panel on Information Management. He was a delegate to the White House Conference on Libraries and serves on the Depository Library Council of the U.S. Government Printing Office. Senator Varn has authored several published articles on information technology and education issues and is writing a book for Oryx Press on electronic democracy. He earned a bachelor of arts degree with honors and a juris doctorate with distinction from the University of Iowa. Senator Varn has distinguished himself as one of the nation's leading policy makers, thinkers, and public speakers on issues related to information technology and its impact on government, education, libraries, and society.

Abstract

Reinventing State Government

Senator Varn will discuss his vision for restructuring government for the information age. He will identify the changes he believes government must make and the process by which they can be made. A new system for intergovernmental cooperation will be identified along with the desired short- and long-term outcomes of such cooperation. The relationship between federal projects, such as the National Information Infrastructure and the National Performance Review, and the many comparable projects at the state and local levels will be explored. The efforts now underway to coordinate these projects to increase the chances of their success will be outlined. Examples of combinations of information technology government-reinvention projects and analysis of their worth, outcomes, and lessons learned will be provided. Finally, Senator Varn will discuss the need for broad-based policy and program coordination for the full program of reinventing government to be realized.
